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MESSAGE

READ TO THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN

BY

His Honor Mayor Burque AT THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD JANUARY 1, 1922

To the Board of Aldermen:

At the beginning of every fiscal year it is well for us to review the work we have done in the past year, and consider also what confronts us the coming year. I feel it my duty to lend you such assistance as I can in this respect and give you the benefit of what information I have at hand.

First: our finances. As foreseen last year, our net debt for 1922 has increased. January 1, 1922 it was \$1,058,943.29; December 31, 1922 we find it has reached \$1,153,769.54, an increase of \$94,826.25. As compared with 1920 when some of us came in to office the increase is only \$63,918.08. Should we receive the necessary legislative relief to enable us to carry on the work proposed last year, to wit:—should the legislature increase the borrowing capacity of municipalities, and should we execute our program already mapped out, then we will witness another increase in debt, larger than heretofore. The question then arises:—what have we to show for our expenditures, and what will we have in return for further expenditures?

We have, as I have pointed out before, and as the reports from different departments state, in the last three years, completed and paid for: A Public Comfort Station, our High School equipment, the Spit Brook Road Bridge, Extension of Sewers in many

parts of the City, Permanent Highways, and new Motor Fire Apparatus. We will have, if we can carry out our program, two new Schools, and an addition to a third, more Fire Apparatus, more permanent highways, more sewer extensions. All of these not only add wealth, comfort, needed protection, greater educational facilities, and increased valuation to the City itself, but make a better, cleaner, healthier, safer, and more attractive city to live in, and is also drawing the attention of outside industries to us, preparing Nashua, we think, for a boom such as it has never witnessed before.

Our Assessed Valuations are increasing yearly, and will, we all hope, continue to so increase. We have in 1922 reached the amount of \$38,734,891. for real and personal property, not figuring the value of Polls, as compared with \$37,052,503.00 in 1921, and - \$35,715,391,00 in 1920. 1923 will see further increases, due to new industries, new buildings on our Main St., and quite a number of new residences and tenement buildings. More industries are expected to be drawn to Nashua in the near future, more residences and tenements are and will be needed, all of which will mean more business, more expansion, more development. We must keep pace with this growth, we must do all in our power to encourage and preserve the good community spirit which now exists, we must help Nashua to progress and prosper, our valuations, our population, our wealth, our business depend upon it; the time is at hand, let us take hold and make the very best of this great opportunity.

May I take advantage of this occasion to congratulate the men responsible for bringing to Nashua the New McElwain Company and the Whitney Screw Corporation. The feat accomplished in securing the former, in organizing the Paterson Realty Company, in raising the money in such a short time, and in erecting the factory on Temple Street with such speed, is especially worthy of mention and of our admiration. It shows what Nashuans can do when they are determined, and the spirit displayed will necessarily cause all eyes to turn to Nashua and its people when a good, live, up-to-date community is sought.

I have referred to Motor Fire Apparatus. Two new units have arrived, delivery of the third is promised immediately. This will fully equip the Amherst Street Station. I recommend that the necessary equipment be secured for our other two stations. The efficiency, and superiority of Motor over the old horse-drawn apparatus has been so overwhelmingly demonstrated that no hesitancy should arise in supplanting the new for the old.

The School situation remains the same as last year, and what recommendations I made last year, I renew this year.

Street work must continue, as well as the continuation and improvement of our sewers. Owing to the lateness of the season when our work stopped in 1922, and the setting in of winter immediately thereafter, we have not been able to compile our data so as to acquaint you with the mileage covered. I can simply say that it surpasses that of 1921, and I believe 1923 should show a similar increase over 1922.

In order to accomplish all of the above we need the relief referred to in the beginning of my remarks. Already an act has been drawn seeking to place all municipalities in the State on the same basis, and this act will be introduced immediately. I earnestly recommend it to our Legislative delegation, and if perchance any opposition should develop and this act defeated, as some reports would have it, then a special act should be introduced for Nashua, so that we may be enabled to go on with our work, and not be forced to stop in the midst of it.

I have up to this point considered matters that will require special appropriations through Bond issues, and affecting our debt. I might add that in connection with our Highways, it has been practically agreed between Massachusetts and this State, to build a trunk line road connecting Groton, Mass. with Nashua, through either Dunstable, or Pepperell, or both. This will mean a new highway, much needed, which will relieve traffic over the Daniel Webster Highway. Our Legislative delegation should sponsor this piece of legislation and leave no stone unturned to

assure its adoption.

Let us now consider our general work, taken care of by our regular appropriations. I might take up in the first instance our new enterprise, e. g. our Recreation. We have been slow in embarking into this field, but the results achieved have, I feel assured satisfied us all that the moneys expended for this purpose are well worth the while. I am informed by the Chief of Police that Juvenile offences are now, and have been for the last year, at their very lowest minimum. As a matter of fact they have practically disappeared. This condition is attributed mainly, yes wholly. to the fact that our youngsters have been given good, wholesome, attractive amusements, their minds occupied with these amusements, and so a field opened up to them for the exercise of their physical, as well as mental energies. Such a result cannot be calculated in dollars and cents; it means the training of our youth in the right direction, the foundation for better citizenship. The work of the Recreation Commission should therefore be encouraged and the necessary funds appropriated to expand it.

Our Board of Health is continuing its good work, and the results of continued efforts yearly to improve the Health of the Community are felt to an appreciable degree. The best proof is the reduction in the cost of operating this Department.

Our Police Department, joining with Citizens generally, rejoice in the good behavior prevailing in Nashua, never so well exemplified as in the year 1922, with our great industrial strife during so many months. Guided by past experience, some of us may think that the Department was over cautious. Whatever this error of judgment might have cost the city, if error it was, we are well repaid by having the assurance that our people are law abiding citizens, and that the disastrous struggles of years gone by will never berepeated.

Our Fire Department is always ever alert, ever efficient, and with its new apparatus, Nashua will have protection surpassed by none. Money expended in maintaining such a department is

a good investment.

Our Parks are being developed step by step, so as not only to make them attractive, but also to provide suitable facilities for the Recreation Commission, and also for other sports indulged in by older people. Winter as well as Summer sports are receiving attention, and I think are so appreciated and so productive of good results, that they should be continued.

Our Schools are always maintained to their high decree of efficiency, and of course we must continue to so maintain them. Not only the demands, but the absolute necessity, for good, solid education are so well recognized by all, that they need no discussion. Libraries are really a part of our Educational system, and we are improving our own yearly. The Branch Library, particularly adopted for the use of children, has been a great asset, and is doing much towards aiding the youth, particularly on the south side of the Nashua River.

I have already touched upon the question of highways. Nashua is now enjoying the reputation of having the best, cleanest, most permanent and most attractive streets of any City in New England. We are continuously receiving high praise for our work in this respect; let us be jealous of this and continue to construct streets until every street in the City is a permanent one. I have in the past enumerated the advantages to be derived therefrom. I will not repeat them. I will simply state that as we progress in this field, the more work we do the more there seems to remain to be done. And so it is of our sidewalks. Sewers are a constant study; we have reached the point where surface drainage sewers must be installed in certain districts so as to relieve the pressure in our sanitary sewers. The engineering department is constantly at work on this problem, and we trust we may be able to solve it properly.

In conclusion let us rejoice at the public spirit with which most of our people are imbued; Main Street particularly is soon to show the result from it; it is about to put on a new garb. We trust that the improvements now under way are the forerunners of others to come, and that 1923 will be as successful, happy and prosperous as the most optimistic among us would have it. To this end we must bend all our efforts, lend a helpful and co-operating hand, encouraging each and every enterprise that will promote the advancement of Nashua.





Report of the Board of Health

Nashua, N. H., March 1, 1923.

To His Honor the Mayor and Board of Aldermen:-

GENTLEMEN:-

The following is submitted as a report of this department for the year 1922.

- 1. The office has been maintained with clerk in the Montcalm Building, 115 Main St., and opened from 8.30 to 5.00 P. M. daily and Wednesday and Saturday evenings from 7.00 to 8.30 P. M.
- 2. CLINICS. Are maintained and carried on at our Quarters. The Venereal Disease Clinic being held Tuesday and Friday afternoons and evenings with Dr. McLaughlin in charge, assisted by Miss Agnes Lee and later by Miss Marie Hallisey, who succeeded Miss Lee as Nurse for this Department. During the year 532 treatments were given in this Department.

Tuberculosis Clinic. These Clinics are conducted at our Office being held every Thursday afternoon. Dr. Robert B. Kerr is Chief of Clinic, and Miss Lucy Beaudet is the Nurse in charge. 604 visits were made to the Clinic. 18 patients were sent to sanatoriums for treatment and 967 house visits were made by the Nurse.

3. Contagious Diseases. This Department supervised by Dr. McLaughlin as Chief and Miss Agnes Lee and later Miss Hallisey as Nurse. All contagious diseases reported are investigated, contacts and suspects examined. Weekly visitations made in which the Nurse instructs in bed-side disinfection, detains all suspects and releases all active cases.

This Department is very anxious to adopt the Schick Test to determine those susceptible to Diphtheria and further immenize

against the disease. We have asked your Board for appropriation to carry on this work.

SPRING CLEAN-UP. During the month of April the annual Clean-up Campaign was conducted by this Department in conjunction with the Board of Public Works. Since this movement was inaugurated 10 years ago a marked improvement has been shown in all sections of the City.

Garbage. We would recommend that our City take charge of the collection and disposal of garbage in its entirety adopting some new and modern method.

HEALTH AND MILK INSPECTOR. On account of an increase in work in this Department especially during the summer, some arrangement should be made for an additional Inspector during that period.

RECOMMENDATION. The extension of Medical Inspection now being carried on in our public schools to extend in the private schools of the City. The erection and maintenance of a modern Isolation Hospital. An assistant Health and Plumbing Inspector, also an Ordinance which would make it compulsary that all

barn cellars should be screened, and the proper care and disposal of manure within certain limits of the City where pigs are now being kept.





Report of Park Commission

To HIS HONOR THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN:-

The Park Commission makes its annual report for the year ending December 31, 1922.

The usual care of the general upkeep of the parks and squares has continued as in the past. No improvements have been undertaken this year other than at South Common where all the available funds with the special appropriation for this purpose has been used to make a substantial beginning of an up to date play ground. With the fine co-operation of the Board of Public Works much has been accomplished. We shall ask for an additional appropriation of \$3,000 to continue the improvements because we feel that we are warranted in doing so as many of the citizens have expressed their approval of the plans which the Commission are attempting to carry out. At the old Artillery pond the Commission has had the Board of Public Works dump in several hundred loads of ashes with an end in view of establishing one of the finest athletic fields in New England, in the heart of the city away from street traffic; It will take several years to accomplish what we desire but with the help of the Board of Puble Works and a small appropriation each year a substantial improvement can be made. When this is accomplished the Amherst Street ball diamond can be discontinued and shade trees set out which will make a pleasing grove and resting place for a large part of the year. Also the small diamond on Manchester Street can be discontinued thus removing most dangerous condition in having ball games so near to Manchester and Courtland Streets and Sargents Avenue. The Commission would urge the purchase of some of the wild land in the Crown Hill and Chandler Street district which could be used to develop suitable play grounds. The day is fast approaching when such land cannot be purchased at the price it can be today. The park Commission

has co-operated with the Recreation Commission in the matter of recreation for the children during the summer and winter as far as was in their power to do so. The fight to control the gypsy moths continues. So far we have been able to keep them in check as far as the trees on the streets are concerned.

Report of Recreation Commission

To the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Nashua:

The Recreation Commission respectfully submit their report for the year 1922 to which is attached a detailed report by Mr. R. F. Martin, Director of the work during the Summer Season.

We wish to express our thanks to the Mayor and Board of Aldermen for their interst and co-operation, also to the Board of Public Works and officials of the Department who have rendered every assistance promptly and with excellent spirit. We received very practical help from Miss Lee of the Community Council, Miss Rowe of the Public Library, Miss Elizabeth Taylor, and others. Mr. Harry Gregg had constructed at the expense of nearly \$400.00 a permanent slide for the South Common, which he gave to the City. Colonel Walter Scott of New York sent a check for \$100.00 to be used to develop the swimming pool.

The kindly interest shown by everyone has been of material assistance to the Commission and made the work a pleasure. We were very much gratified with the results secured by Mr. Martin and we cannot commend his efforts too highly. The benefits which have been derived from his work as director and that of his assistants is of inestimable value and your Commission have been so much impressed with the results derived in the short Summer period that we hope at an early date your Honorable Board may see the advantage of having a Director for recreational work throughout the year, as we feel positive from the results already secured that great good would come to the City and its younger generation.

In cities where a permanent Director of Recreation is employed it is found that the benefits which accrue are far in excess of the money expended, if such results can be put upon a monetary basis. Your Commission do not specifically state in this report just the amount which they would like to have appropriated

for their work during the coming year, although we hope that it will not be less than that which we had during the Season of 1922 to which should be added an amount to cover Winter Sports and some construction work to be done in the Summer so that the Winter Sports may be conducted on a better basis than is possible when due preparation has not been made.

We offer as suggestion the following:

The engagement of a permanent Supervisor of Recreation or Athletics who should have the authority to direct the recreational and development work of the children of the City as a whole, having supervision of the work in the schools, on the playgrounds, and to effect a general organization among the younger generation wherever it may seem possible or advisable. He should work in conjunction with the Recreation Commission and the Board of Education, and should be given the authority to arrange competitions, develop teams in various athletics in schools, and bring about a general plan of athletic development.

We think such a man would be able to supervise all recreational work and athletics through all grades, including the High School. We are of the opinion that there should be an Athletic Field in the City which would be used by all of the schools for school games, also by all of the athletic and recreational organizations which could be developed. This Field should be enclosed so that admission could be charged and games thoroughly supervised. It would appear to us that when the filling of the Artillery Pond section is completed that such an Athletic Field could be established there and nothing better in the way of location or natural advantages could be found. We suggest that such a Field might very properly serve as a Memorial from the City for the soldiers in the World War who went from Nashua. We suggest that on the panels of the walls around the inclosure that tablets could be inserted which would earry perpetually the names of all of the boys from Nashua who participated in the World War.

A Grand Stand could be built on the sloping sides and the field in front of the Grand Stand developed for football, baseball, running track, and other athletics and also provide a small pool in which small children could bathe in the Summer time, while the field itself could be used for a skating rink in the Winter time.

The Recreation Commission are ready to render every assistance toward development of this nature and hope the Board of Aldermen have approved of that which they have already done and that they can expect the same co-operation in the future that they have had in the past.

We feel that the Board of Aldermen should know how much has been done with the money which was appropriated for the year 1922 and if they care to increase the appropriation for 1923 to cover additional work which will be possible with the increased funds, further development could be made on the bathing pool and Winter activities another year and that the further improvements would be well worth the additional expenditures.

We suggest that it might be well if the Board could make some arrangements regarding the purchase of the property from the Field Estate which would cover the bathing pool on which some slight development was made last year so that the Recreation Commission could map out a permanent bathing pool which would be a credit to the City and would fill a long felt necessity.

This equipment has been stored in the hay loft of the city barns on Hollis St. The keys to the locks with Mr. O. M. Flather, Chairman Recreation Commission.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:-

The Playground season of 1922 has been very successful. Four grounds have been equipped and supervised:— South Common, Nashua Mills, Canal St. and Jackson Mills.

The supervision of the various grounds has been excellent and the directors on the various grounds have formed as good a group as ever it has fallen to my lot to be associated with. Miss Florence Hodge and Mr. Marcus Tinker at South Common; Miss Winifred Kittridge, later Miss Olive Buxton and Mr. Al. J. Dubois at Nashua Mills; Miss Carmen Buckley at Canal St., and Mr. Waldo Seifert at Jackson Mills.

The equipment bought consisted of five, six swing galvanized pipe outfits; four giant strides; two playground slides; three horizontal bars; three jump standards; besides balls, bats and minor equipment. In addition a large double slide presented by Mr. Gregg was erected at South Common.

One of the big features of the season's work was that of story telling which was organized by Miss Lee of the Red Cross and Miss Rowe of the Library. They selected Captains for the various grounds as well as for the Crown Hill section who were as follows: South Common, Miss Elizabeth Taylor; Nashua Mills, Mrs. Caffray; Canal St., Mrs. H. Tinker; and Crown Hill, Mrs. Clarence Woodbury. These with their volunteer helpers did a very fine piece of work for us.

The Civic Committee of the Nashaway Woman's Club thru its chairman presented a flag staff and Mrs. Flora Wheeler, Patriotic Instructor of the Woman's Relief Corps presented a flag which was the personal gift of the president of the Corps, Mrs. Jennie LaFayette. These were very appropriately received by Mr. Flather, chairman of your commission. The ceremony of personation and acceptance took place at South Common where the pole had been placed.

We were very fortunate in having the hearty co-operation of the Mayor, your commission, the police department, the Board of Public Works, particularly Supt. of Streets, Mr. Wm. Tolles and others. The Board of Public Worksthruthe willing and ready co-operation of Mr. Tolles furnished men and materials to set the equipment which was a big item.

Owing to the fact that the purchase of equipment was allowed to await my arrival and that it was necessary because of the delay occasioned by one business house not responding promptly to an order, to change our original plans, some extra pipe was ordered that could not be used. This is stored at the city barn and part with the Johnson, Barker and Devlin Co., to be sold if possible. An inventory of this pipe as well as other equipment is appended.

In addition to the playground work, a start was made at Field's Grove at having a municipal bathing beach. A contribution of \$100.00 from Col. Walter Scott of New York opened the way for this project. The Board of Public Works matched this contribution by donating \$100.00 in labor in leveling the shore of the creek. The Pennichuck Water Co., erected a very fine diving board, while an old slide from the playgrounds was placed in the brook. Mr. Field very generously donated the use of the club house on the provision that we supply supervision. This was done by securing Mr. Morris Burtt who served in a very acceptable manner. This project opens up a subject of municipal recreation that will be taken up later in my report. The attendance at the Grove approximated an average of 165 daily.

Nashua offers a great field for recreational activities both from the standpoint of need and the possibilities of meeting these needs. A manufacturing center, with a large foreign population, needs recreational work, as it is one of the best means of breaking down national and racial prejudices. Because of the kindly disposed attitude of the City Government, your commission and because of many natural advantages such as parks, commonswaterways, etc., Nashua can easily come to the front as a city that has developed this phase of community life so that it will be well recognized throughout the country.

Your base ball league is meeting a great need and is to be congratulated on its success. However, it involves only a group of less than 75 players while the rest are spectators. This is the wrong ratio, as the number of players ought to exceed the spectators. Base ball is fairly well taken care of here. A number do not care to play base ball, but would enjoy golf, tennis, horseshoes, bowling and winter sports such as skating, skiing, snowshoeing, coasting, hockey, etc.

While you have a country club here that partially meets the need, yet the expense and limitation of members, prevents a large number from participating in golf and tennis because of a lack of facilities. Many cities are now establishing municipal courses and making them self sustaining or largely so. Nashua has such possibilities at Greeley Park or by the purchase of land near here at a very reasonable price.

Beyond question, the municipal bathing beach started at Field's Grove should be continued and appropriately equipped, The ground should be purchased, water rights secured, and a substantial building with locker rooms, showers, toilets, etc., erected. If feasible, the creek should be cleaned out, so that winter sports such as skating, hockey, etc., could be enjoyed. It is also unfortunate that rowing and canoeing do not have any popularity here. It is my understanding that a committee of your commission and the Park Board are working on this problem now.

Four to eight tennis courts ought to be provided at South Common and an equal number at Greeley Park. This is a coming game, while it is individual, yet it gives to the individual a splendid out-door game, easily played and inexpensive. To build courts of the best type would be expensive, but courts can be built that will meet the need and yet not be too costly.

More playgrounds are necessary to meet the needs of the city. There is a crying need for a playground nearer the Nashua Mills for small children. It may be necessary to purchase property there for that purpose. A trip thru that section on a warm day will show a large number of children in the streets.

Playgrounds ought also to be established at Crown Hill, North Common and near the Franklin St., Section. These areas perhaps do not need the grounds from the standpoint of congestion as they do for the results obtained from supervised play.

In order to arrive at budget for next year, the following items ought to be considered:

Supervision for each ground, 10 weeks	\$275.00
Salary of Supervisor	
Apparatus for each new ground	450.00
Apparatus to complete present grounds	405.00
Small equipment, balls, bats, etc.,	
each ground	50.00
Miscellaneous	150.00

Thus with an appropriation of \$4,000 for playgrounds for next year, you can supervise the grounds now open, add to their equipment so that they will be well equipped, and in addition open two other grounds, equip and supervise them. This does not take into consideration the purchase of any land or the fencing of any of the grounds.

In addition, I would suggest that your supervisor be secured in April, that he be given the amount of the budget, number of grounds to be opened and other necessary information so that he may buy the equipment and that it be here awaiting his arrival to place it.

It has been a pleasure to work for your commission and to cooperate with the various members and particularly has the assistance of your chairman, Mr. Flather, been appreciated.

This branch of service is now in good condition except the placing of wires in ducts located by N. E. T. & T. Co., in place of overhead wires, which work is still in progress as fast as ducts are laid.

INSTRUCTIONS TO KEY HOLDERS

- 1. Upon the discovery of a fire, go to the nearest box, break the glass on the key box; place key in lock, turn key and open door (be sure to hold door open as there is a spring lock on the door). Pull down on the lever and let go. Do not try to remove key, as it is locked in and can only be removed by some one in authority.
- 2. Any person ringing in an alarm should remain near box so as to direct the Firemen to the Fire.
- 3. No person should give an alarm for the same fire after the first alarm has been given without an order from the Enginer or Officer or Commissioners in command. And the person so ordered shall be sure to go to the same box from which the first alarm was given and report to the Officer who issued this order.
- 4. Never signal for a fire seen at a distance. Never touch a box except to give an alarm for fire. Do not give an alarm from a box for a chimney, or grass fire, call Central Station, Telephone 112-1. Do not get excited when you tell Central where the fire is located. Talk slow and distinct.

TO HIS HONOR THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN:

Gentlemen:

Eclosed find a detail report of the Police Department for the year 1922.

This department has been called upon to perform a large amount of extra duty, which received careful attention and was executed in an efficient manner.

A traffic officer has been on duty at the junction of Main and Temple Streets during the season when traffic has been heavy and a motorcycle officer has been on duty the same as the previous year, both of these officers have become a necessity by reason of the heavy traffic on the Daniel Webster highway and the roads leading into it.

The department has been able with the aid of the special appropriation granted them by the Finance Committee to construct 1200 feet of 3 inch duct and 2 brick manholes on Courtland St., 1350 feet of 3 inch duct on Stark Street, 100 feet of 3 inch duct on Orange Square, a total of 3100 feet of 3 inch duct and 7 brick manholes.

There has also been installed in ducts 2400 feet of new lead cable on Concord Street, from Laton to Beasom Streets, 1200 feet of new lead cable on Courtland Street from Concord to Manchester Streets and 300 feet of new lead cable on Amherst Street, from Concord to Abbott Streets, a total of 3900 feet of new lead cable.

As one half of the expense of constructing the 3 inch ducts was charged to the Fire Department, which uses the same duct the

cost of the 3 inch ducts was 35° cents per running foot to this department.

The wisdom shown in the expenditure for the construction of these ducts is borne out by the decrease in the cost of maintenance of this part of the system in the past winter months and the more efficient service.

We also present with this report the report of the Chief of Police as made to this department.

Fifth:—I give, bequeath and devise in trust to the city of Nashua the sum of two thousand (\$2,000) dollars, the income to be used annually to purchase two (2) Gold Medals, to be suitably inscribed, one to be awarded to the boy of the Senior Class of the High School, who produces the best essay on the subject relating to the History of New Hampshire under the provincial and provisional government. The other to the girl in the same class in the High School who produces the best essay on the Fauna or Flora of the Valley of the Merrimack River. The Board of Education for the City of Nashua to have charge and make all necessary rules governing said awards.

Codicil:—Item Fifth in said will, the words "the sum of two thousand (\$2,000) dollars" in the second line of said clause is hereby revoked and the following is hereby inserted in place thereof "the sum of two thousand (\$2,000) dollars in United States Liberty Bonds at the par value of one hundred (\$100.00) each."

That the City Solicitor be authorized to receive whatever money or properties are to be divided and paid over to the city of Nashua under said will and give proper release for same to the executor of said will.

Section 5 Any motor vehicle or horse drawn vehicle remaining in one place in any public street or part thereof herein-before named, shall be stationed within twelve (12) inches of the curb and parallel thereto, excepting on the west side of Main St. between Ayer Block and the watering trough south of Pearl St. and the north side of Deschenes Park, where all motor vehicles shall be parked and backed into the curb at an angle of about ninety (90) degrees, if the same are to remain in one place for a period exceeding ten minutes and the engines of motor vehicles when left unattended shall be brought to a full stop.

Now Therefor Be It Resolved, that all machinery, stock in trade and other property, which may be owned or used by the Whitney Screw Corporation, or any addition which may be made thereto, together with any other property, such as buildings, which may hereafter be acquired during the term of this expantion, and to be used in the manufacture of Wood Screws, bolts, nuts etc.; together with the capital to be used in the operation of the same and the business connected therewith, be exempted from taxation for the period of ten years from the first day of January 1923; provided, that said Whitney Screw Corporation pay to the City of Nashua, annually, the amount of the State and County tax due in respect to said property from said City of Nashua to the State of New Hampshire and the County of Hillsborough, as required by an Act of the Legislature of said State approved April 9, 1909 and entitled "An Act in amendment of Sec-

tion 11 of Chapter 55 of the Public Statutes relating to tax exemptions", be it further

Resolved, that this resolution shall take effect upon its passage.

As in previous years the plan of renovation and replacement has been continued and the Hospital building and furnishings are in excellent condition. The most expensive item was the application of a water proofing material to the parapet and roof.

The new work for the year includes a double deck sleeping porch at the back of the nurses' home and a roof garden constructed of permanent material rather than the awnings formerly in use. Both of these structures are much appreciated by both nurses and patients.

The wisdom of changing the heating system last year by substituting a horizontal tubular steel boiler for the sectional cast iron boiler, and using soft instead of hard coal, has been shown by the saving of nearly \$1,000. in this year's coal bill.

This Hospital has had the same experience as other similar institutions in the country in the matter of total number of patients treated, in which there has been a decrease. The health of the country as broadcasted by the U. S. Public Health Bureau has been the best in any year on record and with no epidemics and favorable weather conditions the health of the community has been reflected in empty hospital beds. While filled to capacity at times there were periods when the house was running comparatively light. This condition was influenced, too; by economic conditions which resulted in idleness of about one third of our working population for one half of the year and as a consequence many cases of sickness were treated at home which otherwise would seek institutional care.

As in former years the Ladies' Auxiliary has done wonderful work in their special line and have saved this Association hundreds of dollars

After examination of the work and facilities for scientific and practical care of patients was made by a representative of the American College of Surgeons, the Regents of that body decreed that every requirement of the College was met by our hospital and at the Annual Meeting, held in Boston in October, 1922, the Nashua Memorial Hospital was placed in Class A, the highest class for hospitals in this country.

Your Committee commends the good work of the Superintendent, Miss Martha Wallace, the heads of departments, and nurses. Worthy of mention also is the work of our Treasurer whose mechanical knowledge has been of wonderful service in matters relating to heating, lighting and allied work.

A careful analysis of the above figures shows that contrary to the more or less popular belief, this hospital together with all others, generally speaking, is not self-sustaining. That is the amount paid by patients does not meet expenses by a substantial sum, and were it not for our endowment fund, the appropriation from the city and the generosity of friends, it would be only a short time before we would cease to exist.

Using the figures for the past year, which are average ones, it will be seen that the total expenses for the year amounted to

\$41,834.83, while the receipts from patients were but \$35,635.58, making a deficit of \$6,199.25. Under the circumstances it is impossible to do as much charity work as we should like, yet no extension of same can be undertaken without more income to work with; therefore we appeal, in the name of the worthy and needy sick, to all people of means for endowments.

Report of the Superintendent

TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF NASHUA:

The school census shows that there were 3719 children registered in local public schools on September 30, 1922, and that there were 2484 in the private schools of the city. The night school enrollment of the present time added to that of the day schools makes a total in all the schools of the city of 6483. In connection with the census enumeration of the pupils we obtained a card for each one in the private schools as well as one for each pupil in the public schools.

A personal census taken by the Assistant Superintendent in the public schools shows that twenty-two nationalities are represented and sixteen of these are in the High School. Nearly 1-6 of the High School pupils are of French descent. In the O'Donnell, Palm, Belvidere, and Quincy St. Schools together, the Polish and Lithuanian children are 46% of the whole number and in all the public school enrollment they are 20%.

In the night schools 190 persons, illiterate in the language of this country, have enrolled to study the English language.

The change in the hours of work in the cotton mills caused the closing of the 15 classes which had been held in the rooms of the Nashua Manufacturing Co.

This year it was not deemed advisable by the Committee to open any evening classes for work in Manual Training and house-old arts therefore the total registration in the night schools is about 1-3 of what it was a year ago.

A considerable number of young people would be glad to get into the cooking laboratories and shops for evening work. An opportunity to take an automobile course would also be appreciated. During the summer of 1922 the following Nashua teachers attended summer schools:

The need of new school houses has not diminished during the year. The plans for buildings at the Mt. Pleasant and the Harbor Schools were held up by the question concerning the right of the city to borrow sufficient funds. It is expected that the General Court will pass an act authorizing the issuing of bonds to the amount of 5% of the valuation. More accomodations are urgently needed in the Palm St. section where about 50 kindergarten children are attending school in a private house and 32 first-grade children are now doing their school work in a corridor of the Palm St. building. Either a large addition or a new building should be provided as soon as possible. There is now no grade above the third in this neighborhood and therefore children in the upper grades are compelled to walk long distances to school.

The school houses on Temple St. and Quincy St. are very full but new buildings in other parts of the city will relieve the congestion in the central schools to some extent. We now have three sixth grade rooms in the Quincy St. School. This would probably not be the best arrangement if there was room elsewhere for a part of the pupils in these three rooms.

Parents of young children have petitioned the School Board for a kindergarten at the Amherst St. School. All the rooms in that building are used for the first four grades and a kindergarten is not very satisfactory when placed in a private dwelling especially if the rooms are small. There is at present only one kindergarten on the North side of the Nashua river while seven are maintained on the south side where there is a greater need of agencies like kindergartens to teach children the English language.

The scarcity of anthracite has compelled us to burn soft coal in many of the school houses where the heaters are not well adapted to this kind of fuel. The results have not all been satisfactory.

I would like to see an enabling act passed by the legislature which would authorize Nashua to pension teachers as Manchester is now doing. The cost would not be large while the gain to teachers in contentment would be more than can be measured.

The expense of taking a house-to-house census of children each year seems to me greater than the results justify. Once in three years would be better. The statutes permit this in Manchester but require an annual census elsewhere.

The reports which accompany this set forth many facts concerning the Nashua schools and these reports are cordially commended to the attention of the School Board.

Report of the Assistant Superintendent

MR. CHARLES H. NOVES,

Superintendent of Schools, Nashua, N. H

Dear Sir:-

During the school year ending June 30, 1922, I made 1258 calls at schools, and conducted 15 teachers' meetings. Since schools opened last September I have made 615 calls and held 10 teachers' meetings.

The plan of testing classes by informal and standard tests has continued as reported last year. All pupils admitted to special rooms are first given a standard test, either a group or individual test. Of the pupils reported by teachers as mentally incapable of doing regular grade work, 107 have been given a special test and 32, or 29 per cent, were not found to be mentally incapacitated for grade work. Several of this number were admitted because of unusual conditions or behavior. Pupils admitted to the special rooms are practically all over 14 years of age and would otherwise be enrolled in grades 1, 2, 3 or 4. The special language room now numbers 35 pupils who could not read and write English, and many cannot speak or understand English, having come to Nashua directly from foreign countries. The two special rooms, one for boys and one for girls, are limited to about 20 pupils each, who are handicapped for reasons other than language, and who could not do the ordinary work of the primary grades. The work of these special rooms is especially commendable.

Candidates from fourth and fifth grades for promotion to accelerated grades last June were given a standardized test.

Tests given in several subjects provide in the office a fairly reasonable record of progress of the several classes and grades. The following table will serve as an illustration. The same type of spelling test was given and the city median scores are indicated:

January 1921 City median, all grades	70.5
January 1922 City median, all grades	86
January 1923 City median, all grades	94

More detailed, comparative tables are given at teachers' meetings. The object is to give the teachers information on scientific basis as to exact and comparative standing of their classes, and not to have teachers vie with each other simply for honorary supremacy. Weaknesses have been pointed out and definite classroom remedies suggested.

I call your attention especially to the age-grade table. The percentage of pupils retarded more than two years shows a steady decline in the last three years, due to the selections for admission to special rooms and to particular attention paid to individual promotions.

A plan for alternation of classes in the suburban schools is working out well. This provides for combination of certain classes and a systematic record is kept so that pupils progress in larger class units, promotion is by subjects rather than grades and the number of classes is materially decreased, thus allowing more time for each subject.

All suburban schools and first four grades of the city schools are on the eight grade basis in accordance with vote of the board. The plan is a gradual change. Next year the first five grades will be on this plan and the whole change completed in 1925-26.

Report of Principal of the High School

Mr. Charles H. Noves,

Superintendent of Schools, Nashua, N. H.

Desr Sir:-

I submit herewith the annual report of the Senior High School for the year 1922.

The enrollment at the time of moving into this building was 439; today it is 735, increasing almost 100 pupils during each of the last three years. Four new teachers were elected to care for this year's increase, two others were elected to fill vacancies caused by resignations, thus making twenty-five full time high school teachers. It seems reasonable to predict an increased enrollment for the next two years, - perhaps not so large as for the past two years, but from the outlook now, it is probably a safe guess that three new teachers will be required next fall. If we are to continue our method of teaching English Composition individually to the two upper classes, one of the new teachers must be a composition teacher.

Nearly all of the regular class teachers (exclusive of laboratory and composition teachers) teach five periods each day. The size of the classes is much greater than formerly. Thirty-eight classes have more than thirty pupils, while seventy-eight of the regular $1\underline{0}$ 6 daily classes have more than the desired twenty-five.

The school has for many years distinguished itself in the matter of retaining its pupils through the whole course. The present senior class is 65% of its size at entrance. Of each 100 pupils of the last seven classes to graduate (with the present senior class) 82 returned for sophomore year, 61 for junior year and 52 were graduated.

The following table shows the progress of the pupils through the high school.

Some of the failures shown in this list are caused by misfits. Many pupils come to high school with the perfectly praiseworthy idea that they are going to college and elect their subjects accordingly. At the end of the first year, not being of college calibre, they fail. They begin the second year with a handicap and the result is another failure. This is true in some of the other subjects besides the college subjects. It seems that too many pupils are not advised or are ill-advised in regard to choosing their course when they enter high school.

Since stenography was introduced into the Junior High School, we have rearranged our program so that it is continuation of theirs. We have, and always will have, pupils entering the commercial curriculum of our school who do not come from the Junior High School; consequently we must also beginstenography here. These two sets of pupils do not coalesce well. Another handicap has presented itself. Those who begin stenography young easily master the memory part of that subject, but soon find that the subject deals with a vocabulary for which their limited training in English has not prepared them. Then also pupils, thinking they are finished stenographers at the end of two years, are beginning to leave school with only a smattering of commercial subjects and accept positions for which they are only half prepared. Teachers find that teaching classes alternate days for two years is not so efficient as teaching every day for one year. These, it seems to me, are sufficient reasons for postponing stenography to the sophomore and junior years of the Senior High School.

A few of this year's internal changes which have resulted in worth-while improvements are as follows:

Lengthening the day has given an average recitation period of forty minutes.

All laboratory courses have seven periods per week instead of five.

All unit courses now meet five times per week.

Each teacher returns regularly one afternoon each week to assist pupils.

It is an increasing custom of many parents not to return to their homes after the summer vacation until the day following Labor Day. This means that after the school has been organized a large number of students enter one day late, which amounts to two beginning days. It seems that beginning school the Wednesday after Labor Day as is the method at Concord is very desirable.

I wish to express my thanks to you, Mr. Superintendent, and to the members of the Board of Education for the time given and the consideration and interest shown in the affairs of the high school.

Report of Principal of the Junior High School

Mr. CHARLES H. NOYES,

Superintendent of Schools, Nashua,

Dear Sir:-

This report dates from April 10, 1922, as it was at this time, the beginning of the Spring term, that I took up the work of Principal of the Junior High School.

I will mention three items which especially mark the period from April to the close of school in June:

- 1. Baseball. The first uniformed baseball team in the Junior High School was organized at this time. The team played with school teams from Manchester, Lowell and Nashua and was very successful. In addition to this school team, a baseball league was formed of all the grades in the Temple Street School. Mr. J. C. Mandelson offered a silver cup as a trophy to the grade winning the greatest number of games. This was won by grade seven and presented by Mr. Mandelson at an assembly meeting of the school. The cost of uniforms for the school team and other equipment for the league amounted to about \$150.00. The chairman of the committee on Athletics went sponsor for \$25.00 and the remaining \$125.00 was raised by the pupils.
- 2. The School Entertainment. This entertainment proved such a success that two performances were given in the school hall. The proceeds from the entertainment started a much needed school bank account with a deposit of about \$350.00. This money is being used to place pictures upon the school-room walls, to buy books for the school library, and for general school improvement. One hundred dollars worth of pictures have already been purchased.

3. The School Lunch Counter. Realizing that the long school session necessitated some means of providing for growing appetites, a lunch counter was started and continued throughout the year. This lunch service was admirably conducted by the teachers of the school with the assistance of the pupils.

I mention these three features because of the genuine school spirit which they promoted.

ENROLLMENT

The enrollment at the opening of school in September was 418 pupils. At the present time the enrollment is 419. Although no increase in the number of pupils could be shown over the previous year, it early became evident that no additional teacher would be necessary because of certain modifications in the Program of Studies. In September Ruth I., Kelley was added to the teaching staff of the School.

ATTENDANCE

The record of attendance and tardiness is one which bespeaks the interest and loyalty of the pupils in maintaining certain standards which have been held before them throughout the year. The percent of attendance from the opening of school in September to January 1923 was 97. The total number of instances of tardiness was 40, averaging 10 a month. There have been only 10 cases of truancy for the same period of time.

ACTIVITIES

The ideal of the school is to prepare its pupils to become efficient members of the community. To this end pupils should have the opportunity in school to come in contact with experiences which shall be of value to them when they get out into life. Such experiences should tend to develop in the plastic minds of

adolescents of the Junior High School age, habits and qualities of self-reliance, responsibility, initiative and leadership. The following are activities undertaken this year, apart from the regular school studies, by which it is hoped that the above-named objectives may be reached:

- 1. Physical Exercises. A period of ten minutes each day is provided in the school program for physical exercises for all pupils of the Junior High School. These are conducted by pupil leaders. The boys and girls are grouped separately, there being thirteen groups in all. Each group has a pupil leader and pupil demonstrator. The exercises are systematically arranged and should develop good posture, and produce such muscular activity as to cause a wholesome and general reaction of the circulation.
- 2. The School Paper. As a project for making practical use of school material, and for stimulating the pupils to a larger interest in the life of the school, the school paper is unrivalled. About 500 copies of the first issue of "The Broadcaster", the name of the Junior High paper, were sold on the day of publication. The paper is published by the pupils of the school under the supervision of a faculty advisory board. This project gives promise of ever increasing usefulness.
- 3. The Assembly Exercises. This year the first period of every Wednesday morning is given over to the assembling of the entire student body into the school auditorium. It is aimed to make this period one of inspiration and help that there may be a general toning up of school spirit and morale. Pupil participation by way of speaking, acting and instrumental playing have been of great benefit to those who have performed as well as to those who have enjoyed the performances. Addresses by outside speakers have added unusual interest to these programs.
- 4. Club Activities. The following clubs have been organized:

English Club Historical Club Latin Club Sewing Club Hiking Club Radio Club Science Club Dramatic Club

Each of these clubs has its own organization, and holds its meetings at regular periods at the school in the afternoon. In these various activities boys and girls are given the opportunity of developing certain innate powers which might otherwise find no channel of expression. Here, too, may be awakened a desire or aspiration which shall give joy to the present and hope for the future.

PARENT-TEACHER ASSOCIATION

In the early part of December, during the observance of National Education Week, a Parent-Teacher Association was formed for the entire Temple Street building which houses children of seven other classrooms in addition to the Junior High School. This Association will meet on the Wednesday evening following each six weeks marking period. It gives promise to be active in promoting the common interests of home and school.

RECOMMENDATIONS

I earnestly recommend the following:

- 1. Lengthening of the class period. The period of thirty-five minutes is found to be too short for effective accomplishment. I recommend, with the unanimous endorsement of the teachers of the Junior High School, that the period be lengthened to forty-five minutes.
- 2. A modification of the Program of Studies so that it shall be less crowded than it is at present. This would have to follow if the class period were to be lengthened.
- 3. That the Junior High School consist of three grades: seventh, eighth and ninth; and that the ninth grade or last year shall be the first year of the Senior High School. I offer three reasons in support of this recommendation:

1. There are already four seventh grades in the Junior High building. The bringing of these classes into the Junior High School would unify the entire school.

The work of our ninth grade is very similar to that of the first year of the Senior High School.

3. The tendency throughout the country is strongly toward the combination of grades, 7, 8 and 9 for the Junior High School. The report of the United States Commissioner of Education for 1914, pp. 148-49 shows this to be true. Also a study in 1920 by Professor Briggs of Columbia University showed two and a half times as many of the three-year as of the two-year type of Junior High School.

CONCLUSION

In conclusion may I take this opportunity to express my great pleasure in being privileged to work with such a corps of loyal, progressive and able teachers as are found in the Junior High School. Our aims, interests and ideas have been shared in common; and I am profoundly grateful to them for the cheerful spirit with which they have carried forward the work of the year. I wish also to express my sincere appreciation to the Superintendent of Schools, and to members of the Board of Education for courtesies shown and assistance given.

Report of Director of Music

Dear/Sir:-

Nothing can fit the occasion better than to quote a famous philosopher in beginning the report of the Director of Music. Says this philosopher, "Enthusiasm is the greatest asset in the World. It is greater than money or influence. Enthusiasm is faith in action, and when combined with initiative will remove mountains and accomplish the seemingly impossible. Those who know the thrill of enthusiasm know what pleasure is, and are most likely to be of great service to the world." This quotation aptly describes the condition of music in the Public Schools of Nashua, for the pupils are truly enthusiastic about their work.

The past year has been as successful as any year in a successful series of years since 1900. The big musical event in school activities was the twenty-second Annual Music Festival, given jointly with the Nashua Oratorio Society, May 18 and 19, 1922, the High School Chorus of 360 voices giving the first of the three concerts of the festival, when the oratorio "The Seven Last Words of Christ," composed by Theodore Dubois, was produced with Boston and N. V. soloists, Bernice Fisher Buttler, formerly prima donna of the Boston Opera Company, soprano; Charles Stratton, tenor, and Walter Kidder, baritone. The Boston Festival orchestra furnished the instrumental support of the concert, the second part of which was made up of numbers given by the soloists and orchestra, brought to a close by the chorus singing "The Pilgrims' Chorus" from Wagner's Tannhauser. As usual the Nashua Oratorio Society finance the concert, that the students should be privileged to have the support of great artists and a professional orchestra.

The chorus in the High School this year is the largest we have ever had, 420 students electing the subject this fall. This chorus has in preparation S. Coleridge-Taylor's "Hiawatha's Wedding Feast," which will be given at the twenty-third Annual Music Festival, the dates being May 10 and 11, 1923, when professional soloists and the Boston Festival Orchestra will again assist.

An orchestra of forty-five pieces has been organized, and already has played in public with much credit to itself and the High School, the occasion being the Teachers' Club entertainment, given in the Auditorium, the instruments represented being the violins, viola, cello, clarinet, saxaphone, trumpet, drums bells, mandolin, banjo, and piano. Before the season is thru we shall add the trombone to this list.

The Junior High School is studying the folk-song literature of the world in assembly one period each week, and class room study another period a week, using the Junior Song Book, published by Ginn & Company. An orchestra of eighteen pieces did creditable work in a concert of this school last season and also at graduation. The same line of work will be carried on this year and already an orchestra of fifteen pieces has been formed.

With the excellent material used in all the grades below the Junior High some splendid work is being done. Two and three parts singing is done in the sixth and seventh grades; one, and two parts singing in the fifth grades, and one part melody singing in the second, third, and fourth grades. The first grades sing mostly rote-songs, but in the last part of the school year take up sight singing from the staff on the blackboard.

In all this work the teachers are doing excellent work, with much enthusiasm, and the results are very gratifying. The Director of Music is grateful to you, Mr. Superintendent, for courtesies and help, to the teachers for enthusiasm and excellent work, and to the Board of Education for the fine material furnished and co-operation.

Report of Director of Manual Training

MR. CHARLES H. NOVES,

Dear Sir:—

I submit to you the report of the Manual Arts Department for the year 1922.

Our present enrollment is practically the same as last year, which was the largest in the history of the department. The registration is as follows:

I advocated last year substituting an auto-motive course in place of our forging course. I have received many favorable comments on the adoption of this course. Several other schools in the State are planning to add this course to their curriculum in the near future; thus substantiating the wisdom of our local School Board in making this change.

Ten machines were purchased from Mr. Cohen, owner of the Canal St. Garage, which was destroyed by fire last January (1922), for the total sum of \$300. This was an opportunity of a lifetime and was immediately accepted. It was necessary to do considerable work on these cars before it was deemed advisable to deliver them at the school. The bodies were removed, the burnt wheels were taken off, and the cars were thoroughly cleaned. This work was done by Messrs. Barker, O'Neil, and myself.

The course has worked out very satisfactorily to date. The boys are deeply interested; one example will suffice to show the interest manifested by the students.

The boys are divided into groups with three or more working on the various machines. One group was overhauling an eight cylinder engine at one end of the shop, while another group was overhauling a Ford engine at the opposite end of the shop. The Ford engine was completely overhauled and set running before the group on the eight cylinder engine realized that the Ford engine had even been touched.

The object of the course is to familiarize the boy with the various units of which an automobile is constructed, the mechanical operations, and the different cycles of an internal combustion engine, also to enable him to locate and repair any trouble in the mechanical or electrical construction of a car.

The methods used are the lecture course and the practical work itself. For instance, the boy is lectured on a special unit and then he goes to the shop and applies the principles obtained from the lecture in practical work.

CABINET-MAKING

There has been a slight change in this course. Wood turning has always been taught in the Sophomore year in the High School. This course is now taught in the first semester of the Freshman year. In past years a student was confined to strictly

straight-lined and curved furniture. Consequently he was unable to choose furniture that required turning, such as table-legs, table or floor lamps, etc. This change was instituted last year, and is now working very satisfactorily, giving the boy greater freedom in the choice of his furniture. The State now recommends the same plan.

My idea has always been that the heavy type massive mission furniture belonged in the Dark Ages, and had no place in our present day Cabinet-Making course. Some five years ago if a boy built a table or chair of this type he had done all that was required of him. The past few years we have been trying to have the boys choose the best that was made in the Commercial World, and teach them the beauty of a well designed piece of furniture.

Our later period furniture meets our modern requirements of utility, has good taste, harmony of form and beauty, and gives a boy a greater number of operations in construction. Greater skill is required and the boy is taught the finer points of becoming a true Artisan.

The boys in the Junior year in Senior High School are given about three months of furniture design and drawing. Blue prints are made of the drawings and later used in the shop.

This year, as usual, a large number of jobs have been done for the various departments in the entire school system. There were approximately 1500 hours of labor and \$125.00 work of material used. Total value of time and labor \$800.00.

Three new instructors have been elected to the department this year, Mr. George Tinker has the automotive classes as well as several woodworking classes. Mr. Hargrove has wood-turning, cabinet-making and pattern-making in Senior High School work. Mr. Hargrove succeeds Mr. Warren. Mr. Connor, who has elementary grade work, succeeds Mr. Ralph Acker. Mr. Acker resigned to accept a position in New York State with a larger salary and better opportunity for advancement.

There was not a Manual Aets exhibit this year. We co-operated with the Asst. Supt. in the Grade exhibit. We are planning an exhibit for this coming June.

I am sorry to report that for the first time in a number of years, there was not any practical Arts work given at Night School this year. A number of applications were made to enter these classes, but the men were denied the opportunity for further advancement in their chosen professions. I consider this a step backward and trust that in the future we will be able to continue the work that has already been started.

I thank you, Mr. Noyes, and the gentlemen of the Board of Education, and all others who have contributed to the success of this Eepartment.

Report of Director of Domestic Science

Dear Sir:-

In February Miss Marion Shepard of Cambridge, Mass., was elected to teach sewing in the Junior High School and grades. Miss Shepard has studied at Simmons College and Columbia University and has had six years of teaching experience.

At the close of school in June one piece of representative work from each grade was placed in the "Type" Exhibit which Mr. Tuttle held at the Auditorium.

In September the Junior High lunch room was again organized, this time on the same basis as the one at the High School. At present it seems to be filling the need for a recess lunch for all the children of the Temple St. building. In time we hope it may be as successful as the one at the High School.

The classes number about the same as last year with an increase of 40 in those electing Household Arts in the High School. We now have 48 Juniors and Seniors, 52 Sophomores and 73 Freshmen.

These with 592 in the Junior High and grades make a total of 765 in the department.

All the work is being carried on as usual. The Sophomore cooking seems of special interest. With the increased number in these classes we have the problem of providing work in quantities large enough to give practical experience at a minimum expense. The following is a partial list of the catering these classes have done the past year for various organizations:

A ten-week contest in home cooking was held during the Spring term between two divisions.

At the close of the contest the home work for an average girl showed at least two meals prepared in a week besides bread, cake, doughnuts and pudding made. Fairly accurate records were kept and the pupils showed a gain of 50% in the amount of work independently done at home. This met with the approval of the parents.

Report of Director of Drawing

Dear Sir:-

In June there was a general exhibit of school work in the high school auditorium. The drawing department mounted and hung work on the south wall. It also showed a spring garden project, worked out by the first grade pupils in the Amherst Street school. They made with paper, colored pencils, clay, plastercine, and dyed sawdust, a formal garden, with lawns, paths flowerbeds, bird baths, birds and trees. It was particularly interesting to the children who visited the exhibition.

Many teachers report that their desks and closets are not supplied with adequate locks. I recommend that the janitors be asked to provide them. Drawing supplies are expensive, and attractive and are always the first thing taken if a building is entered.

In December the manual training department put panels of beaver board in every room in the Junior high school building. The board cost \$24.30 and was paid for out of the appropriation for drawing supplies. Drawings can be fastened onto these panels with thumb tacks, and school rooms decorated in this way look infinitely better than they did when the drawings were hung against the blackboards on sagging strings or wires. I, and the Junior High School teachers are very grateful to the manual training department for its kindness in doing this considerable piece of work.

Report of School Nurse

MR. CHARLES H. NOYES,

Dear Sir:-

As requested I present the annual report of the Dental Clinic and of the Medical Inspection of the schools at the south side of the river.

Defective teeth is one of the most progressive troubles among school children. A large percentage of children entering the first grade have defective sixth year molars. It is difficult to make the parents understand that these are permanent teeth and should have dental attention. We have given each child literature on the care of the sixth year molar. In doing this we feel that we are bringing the parents attention to the necessity of caring for these important teeth.

For clinic work it is necessary to divide the schools into two divisions, taking half of the children each year. Any child suffering from bad teeth is taken at any time during the year. We call these emergency cases. This is the only way we can arrange the work with the amount of time we have at the clinic, so that children in each school can have dental care.

From September 1921 to June 1922 four hundred and forty children were treated at the clinic.

Medical inspection in the Schools of which I have charge is the same as in the past. Dr. A. F. Mulvanity made the usual inspection of the children and parents were notified of defects found and advice was given. He is now making a physical examination in the first, fourth and ninth grades and he also vaccinated one hundred and ninety four children. This year we find a great many defects corrected and in a number of cases the parents are willing to do as requested when they have the necessary means.

I would be very glad to give a more detailed report of my work, but I understand a general outline is all that is required.

Submitting my report for the year 1922 I wish to thank you and all others that have been helpful to me in the past.

During the year 1922 I have had charge of the Nutrition work in the public schools of Nashua. 3714 pupils have been weighed and measured. 574 were found to be under-weight.

A notice has been sent to the parents of each under-weight child telling them of the condition and making suggestions as to correction.

We feel encouraged concerning this work as there seems to be a decrease in the number of under-weight pupils.

The drinking of milk has been continued at the morning recess and there has been an increase in the number of children taking it.

Health clubs have been started in each class room and health talks have been given to encourage better health habits.

Dr. Davis and I have done the Medical inspection work in all of the schools on the north side of the river also in Belvidere, Temple Street, and Suburbans No. II and III, and we have shared the work at the High School with Dr. Mulvanity and Miss Sullivan.

I have assisted Dr. Davis in all his examinations. Notices have been sent to the parents concerning all defects found.

Home visits have been made to encourage parents to have these defects corrected.

Pupils have been taken to the orthopedic, tuberculosis, and eye clinics.

Dr. Davis vaccinated 86 pupils.

Whatever success has been accomplished is in a measure due to the kind co-operation of the teachers. I wish to thank all who have in any way helped us to carry on this work.

The pupils in the Evening School may be classified as follows:

- 1. ILLITERATE MINORS. These are persons between the ages of 16 and 21 who can not read and speak English understandingly, and who are required by law to attend Evening School.
- 2. ILLITERATE ADULTS. Persons 21 years of age or over who can not read or speak English understandingly, but who are not compelled to attend Evening School.
- 3. LITERATE PERSONS. These are 16 years or above who do not belong to either of the other two classes.

The following data compiled to January 1, 1923, may be of interest:

It can be seen from number 8 above that there are only 21 pupils in the school who are getting instruction in the work of the grades. There might be obtained with profit, information which would show the following:

1. Names of all pupils who, during the last 5 years, have left school upon reaching the age of 16 years.

2. Names of all who, for the same period of time, left having completed the 8th grade at the age of 14.

These two facts will show how many young persons there are in the city who should be having more work of the grammar grades. The Evening School is not for illiterate persons alone but for those who have not entered High School or who have left before completing the High Shhool course. Such subjects as the following ought to appeal to these young people: English, Business English, Mathematics, Civil Service subjects as Arithmetic, Spelling, History, Geography, and possibly classes in Civics and Salesmanship.

ATTENDANCE

This year there is being put into practice a method which ought to be an accurate check upon the nightly attendance of those who by law are compelled to attend; and at the same time it shows the attendance of all other members of the school. By this method the attendance of each person enrolled in the school is quickly determined each evening. In this way attention can be more directly centered upon the securing of good attendance.

The record of 90 for the percent of attendance is high for Evening School.

Since January 1, 1923 the enrollment has increased to 280, an increase of 24. There are now 13 teachers in the school.

It is gratifying to observe the definite progress and advance of the young people of the Evening School. Realizing their limitations they are, for the most part, eager to learn and appreciative of what is being done for them. There is a deep sense of satisfaction in knowing that real service has been done in opening up the way for a boy or girl, man or woman, to overcome a great handicap,— the inability to speak English or to read it understandingly. In this way and through the medium of other instruction the Evening School is helping to produce more useful members of the community.
