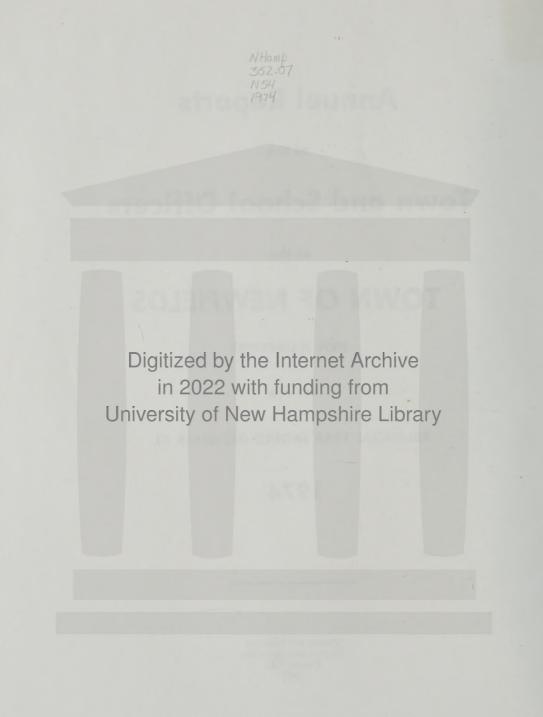

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN WABRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newfields, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, gualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Newfields on Tuesday, the fourth (4th) day of March next, at two o'clock in the afternoon until nine o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects: (Business meeting to be held at eight o'clock in the evening)

- 1. To choose all necessary Town and School District Officers for the ensuing Terms.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in amounts indicated or take any other action hereon:

Fire Dept.	1,700.00
Town Dump	4,000.00
Summer Maintenance	2,500.00
Winter Maintenance	2,500.00

- 3. To raise and appropriate such sums as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, in case of disaster, to apply for, contract for, receive and expend federal funds for disaster relief.
- 5. To see if the Town will grant a discount of 2% on taxes paid in full thirty days after the taxes are committed to the Collector.
- 6. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate of \$30,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes therefore, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year from taxes collected within the current municipal year.
- 7. To see what action the Town will take relative to the authorization of the sale of real estate held or acquired by the Town on account of purchase at tax sale.
- 8. To see what action the Town will take toward the acceptance of reports of Town Officers as printed in the Town Reports.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Water Commissioners, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of revenue..

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- 10. To see if the Town will vote to construct a new bridge on Cuba Road and for that purpose to see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by the issuance of its bonds or notes to defray the cost of the bridge and necessary equipment and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the rate of interest to be borne by said bonds or notes; the denominations and form of said notes or bonds; the time and place of payment of principal and interest and terms of sale; and further to authorize the Selectmen to sign and affix the Seal of the Town of Newfields to said bonds or notes and the Treasurer to countersign the same; and to authorize the Selectmen to make application to the State Department of Public Works and Highways for Town Bridge Aid.
- 11. On petition of Norman S. Rollins and 65 others to see if the Town will vote, by a yes or no ballot, to create, establish, and maintain a Town Mosquito Control District under the provisions of R.S.A. 437-A of New Hampshire State Laws. The boundary of the District shall be the boundaries of the Town. The goal is to try to eliminate breeding conditions for mosquitoes. Joint efforts with neighboring towns will be necessary. N.H. Law R.S.A. 437-A provides a maximum of 5 cents per \$100 of property valuation. This levy shall be a separate item on a tax bill.
- 12. On petition of Lyle K. Clinansmith and 17 others to see if the Town will vote to spend the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the improvement of the Town Landing.
- 13. On petition of Frances P. Brigham and 9 others to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the Seacoast Regional Office of Child and Family Services of New Hampshire, a private charitable organization. Said sum to be used for current operating expenses to enable the Seacoast Regional Office to continue providing services to residents of the Town of Newfields whether or not said residents are able to pay.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to accept the gift of the Revere Bell from the United Methodist Church as a memorial and to appropriate the balance of the Torrey Fund and interest to suitably erect a mounting for the bell.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Conservation Commission.
- 16. To see what further action the Town will take regarding the sidewalk along State Route 87 and what sum will be raised and appropriated for the same.
- 17. To see what sum the Town will raise and appropriate to extend Locust Grove Cemetery.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,053.93 for the Town's participation in the expenses of The Greater Exeter Area Youth Group Home.
- 19. To see if the Town will appoint a committee of five to make plans for a suitable memorial for the Korean and Vietnam Veterans, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for this purpose.

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20. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

#### REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

The year 1974 is past history. It can be remembered in the Newfields Fire Service as having no great loss of life or property.

The summer morths were extremely dry, and while the surrounding towns had their share of fires, we were lucky. The department has been called upon for Mutual Aid outside of town, and we were pleased to have the manpower and equipment to be able to respond.

At the 1974 Town Meeting the town voted to purchase a four wheel drive Unit to replace the 1949 Chevrolet pick-up used for Forest Fire Service. It will be equipped with a 150 Gallon Mini Pump; 200 gallon Water Tank; 200 feet three-quarter inch Booster Hose; Electric Hose Reel; 500 feet one and one-half inch Hose; 3 lengths of Suction Hose 8 feet two and one-half inch; 14 foot Extension Ladder; Portable Pump; Pack Pumps; Shovels; Backs: Pails; all necessary fittings; Electronic Siren; and will be Radio Controlled.

Ar International Four Wheel Drive Chassis 10,000 G.V.W. was purchased. The body is being constructed by Edward G. Moody & Sons, Inc., Nashua, N.H. A Unit of this type is a very practical piece of equipment in the Fire Service of today. We expect the Unit to be delivered by February 1, 1975.

I enjoyed working with the Committee that set up the specifications for this new Fire Truck. I also will take this opportunity to thank each and every member of the Department, the Fireflies, and townspeople who helped to make this a very successful year.

#### REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

All open burning when the ground is not covered with snow is controlled by the Town Forest Fire Warden in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service. Anyone wishing to kindle a fire out-of-doors when the ground is not covered with snow must have a written permit signed by the Town Forest Fire Warden. If the fire is to be kindled on land not owned by the person kindling the fire then he must have the permission of the landowner. No outdoor fires can be kindled between 9 A.M. and 5 P.M.,unless it is raining, without the additional approval of the District Forest Fire Chief.

The 1974 forest fire season was one of the worst in the past two decades. Woodlands in central and southern New Hampshire became so dry in mid August that the Governor and Council, upon the recommendation of the State Forester, enacted a partial woodlands closure in Sullivan, Cheshire, Hillsborough, Merrimack and Belknap Counties and a complete woodlands closure in Strafford and Rockingham Counties plus the towns of Barnstead, Gilmanton and Alton in Belknap County. Through the excellent cooperation of the citizens of our State no major forest fire occurred at any time during the year.

I have examined the statement of assets and liabilities arising from cash transactions of the various funds of the Town of Newfields as of December 31, 1974 and the related statements of revenues collected and expenditures disbursed for the year then ended. My examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as I considered necessary in the circumstances.

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#### VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

The Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association is a Community Health Service providing health care (skilled nursing and physical therapy) to individuals and families in their place of residence or in ambulatory care settings for purposes of preventing disease and promoting, maintaining or restoring health or minimizing the effects of illness and disability.

The Nurse gives care and treatments as ordered by each person's physician; assists with the rehabilitation of persons (of all ages) handicapped by arthritis, heart trouble, diabetes, cancer, stroke, mental illness, accidents and similar conditions. The Nurse instructs designated persons to give needed care between nursing visits; teaches families and individuals good nutrition and understanding of special diets, sickness and accident prevention; advises new and expectant mothers in the care of themselves and their babies; provides Tuberculosis and psychiatric follow-up; refers when appropriate to other agencies.

The physical Therapist establishes and supervises a program to return each person to his maximum potential.

The Association provides the service of a Home Health Coordinator to the Exeter Hospital for the purpose of discharge planning of patients to their homes. It spensors a Well Child Clinic monthly providing physicals to children of eligible families and immunizations to children in this area.

This year a Homemaker/Home Health Aide Program has been added. A H/HHA provides personal and unskilled care to patients, does light housekeeping, laundry, meal planning and preparation under the supervision of a Registered Nurse.

The Agency in cooperation with the N.H. Department of Health sponsors various screening programs.

As of October 31, 1974 a total of 180 visits (nursing, physical therapy and H/HHA were made to 23 individuals in Newfields.

#### NEWFIELDS VILLAGE SEWER DISTRICT

The annual meeting of the Newfields Village Sewer District was held on March 26, 1974 at which time all officers of the District were re-elected.

During the business meeting it was voted that the Sewer District Commissioners be authorized to accept some gift of money from the Kingston-Warren Corp. for defraying a portion of the sewer district expenses. Article 5 asked for a money appropriation from the District and Clark Gady, Chairman of the Commissioners, didn't feel that the District was ready for this. At this point it was voted to adjourn the annual meeting until May 21, and there would be two public hearings between the annual meeting and the adjourned meeting. One such public hearing was held on April 16 and one on May 2, 1974.

At the adjourned meeting on May 21, 1974, after much dicussion, it was voted that the Newfields Village Sewer District appropriate the sum of \$75,000.00, subject to the equivalent receipt from the State of New Hampshire, Federal Funds and the Kingston-Warren Corp., to be used by the Commissioners of the Sewer District for the final planning and land acquisition for a sewerage system including sewage treatment facilities to serve the District, said costs to be reduced by Federal and State Aid, and to authorize the Commissioners to apply for and utilize Federal and State Aid in connection with the implementation of said project or to take any action related thereto.

Mr. Cady told the District that the Kingston-Warren Corp. offered to donate approximately \$30,000. and also offered to advance what the District would have to pay for surveys, borings etc. which, in all, would come to a total of \$75,000. The money the Kingston-Warren would give would be part of their fair share of the cost. He further stated that when we agree to take this money if the project doesn't go through, the money goes back to the Kingston-Warren and Mr. Simpson will take the land back.

There are many other items to be further discussed; many of which will probably wait until the annual meeting of the District in March of 1975.

Minutes of the Newfields School District Meeting held on Monday, March 4, 1974, as taken by the Newfields School District Clerk

The annual School District meeting was held in the town hall on Monday evening, March 4, 1974 with approximately 45 people in attendance. The School District Warrant was sworn to by Jere Allen, chairman of the School Board. The school warrant was read by the Moderator, Lindsey Brigham as follows:

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Newfields, New Hampshire, qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said District on the fourth day of March 1974, at eight o'clock in the afternoon.

District officers to be elected at Town Meeting on Tuesday, March 5, 1974 as follows:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 4. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

School District business meeting to be held at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon on March 4, 1974 to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- To choose agents, auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 3. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of Schools, for the payment of salaries for School District Officials and Agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against and appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Equalization Fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by the Town.
- 4. To see if the District will vote to authorize the employment of an Assistant Teacher Consultant for Supervisory Union 16, as provided in RSA 186:11, XXII and XXIII, effective July 1, 1974, and raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Nine Dollars (\$809.00) as Newfields' share of the salary, travel, retirement, F.I.C.A., and Blue Cross-Blue Shield.
- 5. To see if the District will vote pursuant to RSA 31:105 to provide indemnification for district employees, school administrators, school board members, district officers or agents from personal loss or expense including reasonable leagal fees and costs, if any, arising out of any claim, demand, suit or

Business of meeting

Article 1 - School Board Chairman Jere Allen reported that everything published in Town Report is correct.

Article 2 - Mr. Allen said there was nothing to report on this article.

Article 3 - Mr. Allen read the school budget and he explained the items as he read it. Mr. Allen also explained that \$1,209.00 had been omitted from the budget by mistake - said amount to be paid for a speech therapist for the school. There are 13 Newfields' students that need the help of a speech therapist. Dr. Thomas Hackett moved that \$1,209.00 be added to the school budget for a speech therapist. Motion seconded by Leonard Stevens and so voted.

Mr. Allen also stated that the budget included \$120.00 for any teacher wishing to take a course at the University of New Hampshire. It was further stated by Mr. Allen that the transportation contract

may have to be written with an item that if the gas continues to go up, we shall have to share the extra cost.

Marie Finn questioned why the individual teacher salaries were not listed in the town report.

It was moved by Beverly Allen, seconded by Dr. Hackett that the district raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district the sum of \$224,242.00, and that there be applied against said appropriation such sums as are estimated to be received from the State of New Hampshire together with any other income and that the School Board be authorized to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated income and the appropriation as an assessment to be raised by the Town by taxes. Motion carried.

Article 4 - It was moved by Norman Rollins, seconded and voted that the School District raise and appropriate the sum of \$809.00 as Newfields' share for an Assistant Teacher Consultant for Super-visory Union 16.

Article 5 - So many questions came up regarding this article, and no one seemed to be able to answer them. It was finally moved by Elwood Floyd that the School Board as a committee study the intent of Article 5, and report back to an adjourned School District Meeting to be held on Tuesday, April 9, at 8:00 p.m. This motion was seconded and so voted.

Article 6 - Jared Rumford said he would like to ask the School Board "Why my Country's flag isn't flying on top of the flag pole at school, and why it hasn't been all year?" Mr Allen stated that the flag pole needed repairs and was unoperable. Mr. Rumford asked when it was last tried to raise a flag on that pole; that he had been up school that evening and had raised his flag on said pole. Mr. Rumford then asked who was responsible for seeing that the flag is flying, and was told by Mr. Allen that the Principal of the school was responsible. After further discussion Mr. Allen asked Mr. Rumford if he would be responsible for getting a group of men from town to go up to the school on Saturday morning and fix the flag pole. Mr. Rumford said that he would be glad to.

David Peaslee said that he thought the District should thank Mr. Allen for all he had done during his term of office on the School Board.

Moved by Hared Rumford that the meeting be adjourned until the second Tuesday in April. Seconded and so voted.

#### Report of the Superintendent of Schools Frederick B. King

The Newfields School has been moving forward under a philosophy which recognizes that learning is an individual matter and is unique with each child. The implimentation of "levels" in reading and mathematics is a forward step toward the recognition of individuality in children.

It is a well known fact that the children in the elementary schools will face the solution of problems not now envisioned or even remotely realized. Because we are living in a society which is in constant change we need to develop in children the ability to make the necessary adjustments that life in the latter part of the twentieth century will surely demand.

The above two paragraphs in essence give a picture of the careful planning required as we proceed with educational plans for Newfields. Currently we have two study committees, one in Social Studies, the other in Language Arts who will need to direct their attention to future recommendations based upon the philosophy of the school. Teachers in all towns will participate in lively discussions and reviews of many new materials as we plan for the future.

Despite rising costs and unavailability of some materials the staff has continued to perform their duties in an admirable way. A competent staff is essential to a good elementary school. Their performance has consistently reflected the philosophy and objectives we have set for the school.

The enrollment of the school as reported by Principal Eugene Haight continues to remain constant. By grades the enrollment is as follows:

Mr. Haight in his report mentions a number of interesting activities of the school. He states "Mini-Courses have been instituted in the school in an effort to enrich the students' school experiences. Students have the opportunity to choose among these activities: Simple Science Experiments, School Newspaper, Lettering and Poster Making, Cloth Crafts, Conversational Spanish, and A Preview of French. These classes are held each Friday afternoon and students go to the various rooms according to the courses they have chosen. They may change activities each month.

Last April, Grades 1-6 presented a very successful musical, The Wizzard of Oz. The funds realized from the performances were used to finance educational trips for the students to the New England Aquarium and Stoneham Zoo, Odiorne's Point, and to provide a Disney film on the final day of school.

This report would be incomplete if the Newfields P.T.O. were not mentioned. The school appreciates the time and effort expended by the members in the interest of the students. They have recently contributed funds to help provide entertainment for the students at the annual Christmas parties, equipment for the Safety Patrol, and operating the milk and hot soup programs and have provided room mothers to assist the teachers at special events.

In closing I would like to express our appreciation to those mothers who have given of their valuable time serving as Volunteer Aides in the classrooms and the library."

The lack of state financial support for local schools in New Hampshire is a difficult one to overcome. With rising costs the burden becomes more critical. Local taxes are indeed stretched to the limits just to maintain the "status quo" of the school. Mr. Durgin speaks of this in his report which I hope you will read carefully.

I have a strong belief that the citizens of Newfields recognize that the public school is a primary force by which the future of each individual child, and indeed the community will depend. I will continue to work closely with the school board to provide quality education at a price consistently reasonable with today's economic market. I ask for the support necessary in order that we do not "short change" the youth currently proceeding through our schools. I will strive to see that we utilize the resources, time, money, space, personnel and material in such a way as to get all the "mileage" possible to serve the youngsters of Newfields.

#### Annual Report of the Newfields School Board

The annual Newfields School District Meeting was held on March 4, 1974. School District officers elected at the Newfields Town Meeting on March 5, 1974 were George Jack Shaw, Jr.; Mary B. Hallinan, Clerk; Barbara Hallinan, Treasuerer; Charles G. Mixter, III, School Board member for two years. The Board elected Lynne Sweet, Chairperson and Charles Mixter, as Secretary for the year.

During the past year Newfields has been represented by Lynne Sweet at the AREA Advisory Committee while Raymond LaBranche has represented the district on the Rockingham School Committee. This latter committee has been actively exploring new ways of educating handicapped children and soon hopes to implement a program whereby such children may be integrated into the school system wherever possible.

This year began under the strong guidance of Dr. Jerome Melvin as Superintendent, who along with Fred King, has instituted the "levels system" of teaching in both Math and Reading. Such a system allows for the maximum stimulation of gifted students and in addition allows for individualized instruction of students having difficulties in a given area. Unfortunately Dr. Melvin submitted his resignation as of August and the Union was again required to search for an interim Superintendent. Ready to take over in this interim year was Fred King. He had a strong commitment to continue the programs initiated during the past two years. We are indeed indebted to Fred for the fine guidance he has provided us.

This year has seen the fruition of an experimental "open classroom" for the 3rd and 4th grades under Ms. Myers and Keitt. In general there has been good acceptance of this approach to education, and many students have appeared to thrive under the system.

This year has seen the departure of four fine teachers. Mrs. Chisholm will be a great loss to the Newfields School. Over the past ten years of teaching art, she has left fond memories of her imaginative classes in the hearts of all.

Again this year the Board has been in lengthy discussions with the other Supervisory Union Boards trying to determine the future of the Union #16. At its December meeting the Joint School Boards overwhelmingly approved the continuation of the agreement and cooperation, and recommended the establishment of a position of Assistant Superintendent to help alleviate the intolerable load of the Superintendent.

The school has again been fortunate in its devoted and excellent staff guided by Eugene Haight. The varied abilities of the staff and its undying enthusiasm has given the town and its children a great deal. The Spring production of the "Wizard of Oz" played to sell out crowds and was warmly received and professionaly performed by the students. The P.T.O. continued to be an invaluable asset to the school running a hot soup and milk program which otherwise would have been impossible to provide. The many donations of the PTO are greatfully acknowledged. The teacher aides have again selflessly provided an invaluable assistance to the teachers thereby providing a really personalized form of instruction to our students. To all of these people and to the administrative staff who enable Newfields to have such a fine elementary school, we express our thanks and hope that all will continue to work with us in the future.

#### Report of the Business Administrator

#### Daniel C. Durgin

Perhaps it can be fairly stated that modern education has never undergone greater financial pressure than is currently the case. Economic realities demand that every facet of our educational operation be subjected to the closest scrutiny as to cost, cost-benefit and possible alternatives. Because measuring educational output is far from a pure science, assessing the end product (the "educated" student) versus the cost of producing that student is most difficult.

Most School Business Officials feel that, in many ways, our schools can and should be operated like a business. I subscribe to this view. However, there is a point where the analogy breaks down since our product is not material in the true sense nor is our main goal profits. Somehow, we must relate our educational goals to the community's ability to support those goals. This is a matter with which school boards and administrators must constantly wrestle. The demands of modern society make new and expanded programs and updated facilities more important than ever while the negative forces in our economy create a perplexing dicotomy.

In addition, the collective demands which society trusts upon the educational system magnify the problem to the extreme. I cite the very valid doctrine of equal education for all and the relatively recent emphasis on greater attention to the slow learner and the handicapped. Many of these societal demands are being translated into legal mandates all too often without broad based funding to support them. The cost, necessarily, has to be borne by the local property owner.

In New Hampshire, the property tax supports 80%-95% of local educational costs compared to a national average of 52%. With a limited base for funds, each successive year of inflation creates additional erosion of the state's ability to adequately fund services such as education. Thus, the property owner is forced to shoulder a greater burden while the property tax, by its very nature, bears no relationship to his ability to meet that obligation.

As a Business Administrator, I realize that one of my prime responsibilities is to see that your tax dollars are spent prudently. With the help and support of our School Boards and staff, we are constantly searching for practical ways to reduce our cost of operation while maintaining our high standard of educational offering.

The advent of the "energy crisis" brought an all out effort on the part of Union #16 to reduce the consumption of energy to the lowest possible level. With the approval of the School Boards, staff members were asked to follow certain guidelines such as reducing lighting in non-instructional areas and turning off the row of lighting nearest the windows in classrooms. Also, thermostats were set at 68° during the day and  $55^{\circ}$  or  $60^{\circ}$  at night. As an example of what can be accomplished, fuel consumption was reduced on an average of 25% for the 1973-74

winter season over the previous year. Obviously, we are continuing these conservation measures in an effort to blunt the effect of rapidly escalating energy costs.

Last January, I was successful in negotiating a bulk purchase of our 1974-75 duplicator and mimeograph paper requirements far in advance of our normal procurement time of April or May. This was done in the belief that paper prices were set to undergo another increase in the spring. This arrangement resulted in a savings of approximately 20¢ per ream. Considering Union-wide useage of approximately 4500 reams annually, this translated into a savings of \$900.

Our supply and equipment requirements are carefully screened to assure a true need before approval. Except in the case of specialty items, all supply and equipment purchases are either bid or negotiated.

Every districts' insurance program is constantly undergoing close scrutiny to establish adequate coverages in light of inflation, while attempting to keep the premiums at as low a level as possible. Package policies and the sensible use of deductibles are two methods which are in use in an attempt to get the most from our insurance dollar.

All of us are well aware of the continuing rise in food prices. Contrary to the national trend, in school lunch programs, I am pleased to say that as of this writing all three of our lunch programs in Union #16 are growing in participation and all are operating successfully with little or no financial support from school district funds. Exeter's program, which is by far the largest in the Union (approximately 1800 lunches per day), has the lowest per meal charge to students in the state and is totally self-sufficient financially. As one might suspect, all three lunch programs are staffed with extremely dedicated people with enthusiasm and much imagination.

Last year we began a program of instructional workshops for custodians. These workshops are held three times annually and are designed to bring new and more economical methods of building care to the attention of our custodians. They have been well received and very successful and they will become a regular fixture in our maintenance program.

In conclusion, I need not emphasize that difficult and trying times face all of us. With your support, we shall continue to see that your tax dollar is carefully and wisely spent. Report of School Health Services Newfields Elementary School

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Routine health screenings have been provided with the addition of special height and weight graphs to be done annually on all children starting with this year's first grade. The Health Education program initiated last January has been incorporated smoothly into the curriculum, and the students seem to be enjoying this area of study.

A voluntary dental program was offered to students in the fourth grade last spring and this fall. It involved thorough instruction by the state dental hygienist in proper brushing and flossing techniques. The children then brush and floss their teeth daily at school after lunch. The program continued for eight weeks to allow time for the children to master the technique. At the end of the program children were encouraged to continue on their own at home.

A Red Cross First Aid certificate program is being planned for Grade 6 students in the spring.

Courses are being taken to fulfill state requirements for school nurse certification, and workshops pertinent to school nursing have been attended.

I would like to express thanks to the volunteers who have helped with the School Health Program. I would also like to express my appreciation to the School Board, Superintendent of Schools, Principal Eugene Haight, members of the staff, and Dr. John Tuthill, school pediatrician, for their continued help and cooperation.
