TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newport, qualified to vote on Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified and warned to meet at the Town Hall in said Town of Newport on the second Tuesday of March next at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To elect a Selectman for a term of three years; to elect a Town Treasurer; and a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. To elect a member of the Trust Fund Commission for three years, and all other officers, Auditors, Agents, and Committees necessary for the Town Business.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to employ State Auditors to inspect and audit the books of the Town and its departments for the ensuing year, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 4. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Auditors, and Committees heretofore chosen, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money on the notes of the Town in anticipation of Taxes, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 6. To see what discount the Town will vote to allow on 1951 taxes if paid on or before July 15, 1951.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds or in any other manner.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a non-partisan ballot system, as provided in Sections 112-122 of Chapter 34 of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint the Town Manager as Building Inspector.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance relative to building permits:

Section 1. No person, firm, or corporation shall erect any new building or structure, or alter, change, improve, or

make any additions to an existing building or structure, or cause the same to be done, within the Town of Newport which shall be in the excess of two hundred dollars without first obtaining a permit from the Building Inspector.

Section. 2. Any person, firm, or corporation violating the provision of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of one dollar and each day's neglect to obtain such a permit shall constitute a separate offense.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will approve and adopt the recommendations of the Budget Committee, raise, and appropriate the various sums contained in the report and listed in the Budget, which include the following recommended special appropriations:

(a) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1045.63 provided the State will contribute \$4182.52 to the Town to be used for T. R. A. Roads, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

(b) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the collection of garbage for the ensuing year, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

(c) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for Blister Rust Control, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

(d) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,000.00 to be used for the Carrie F. Wright Hospital at Newport, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

(e) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for installation of a fire alarm box at Summer Street near the site of the new hospital, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

(f) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

(g) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1475.00 to be used for the Richards Free Library, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

(h) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5000.00 for the purpose of taking care of surface water on the Common and on North Main Street,

from Pearl Street to Belknap Avenue, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

(i) To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and/or Town Manager to borrow an amount not to exceed \$16,000.00 for the purchase of a power shovel for the use of the Town, and instruct the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to issue serial notes or serial bonds to the amount of \$16,000.00 as obligations against the Town. Said obligations to be signed by the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer, they to determine the maturity and rate of interest to be paid. Said serial notes and/or serial bonds to be issued in compliance with the Laws of the State of New Hampshire, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the purpose of preparing for publication, and for the distribution thereof to all the taxpayers of the Town, an accurate copy of the Public Records of the Town showing the assessed valuations of all the property of the Town as of April 1, 1951. (This article and the appropriation of \$150.00 is submitted without recommendation of the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 14. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

(Polls shall be open for the reception of ballots at 9:30 A.M. and shall not be closed earlier than 7:00 P.M.)

TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

To the Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Newport:

It is a privilege and an honor to have the pleasure of serving you as Town Manager. The year 1950 has been a fair year, financially and otherwise. Newport is a beautiful town and we are trying to make it more beautiful and a better place in which to live.

The position of Manager was more than a task, it was a challenge because people wanted to be shown that this was the type of government for this town. Some people are still doubtful, others are satisfied.

To attempt to tell you everything we did last year, would make this report much too long, so will emphasize the most important facts.

The first thing we did we moved the office downstairs and changed the whole bookkeeping system. It was hard to get used to it at first but now we are satisfied and pleased.

The **Police Department** had many parking problems on Main and other streets in town. The installation of Parking Meters has made their work easier, pleasant, more efficient and has eliminated many difficulties. Most of the men in this department are doing their utmost.

The **Highway Department** accomplished a lot during the year, considering the mileage of roads and such a small group to maintain same. Cement curb on the center of Main Street, installation of parking meters, sidewalks and curbs repaired, improved the general condition of roads, Paradise, Chandlers Mills and many others. Parking lot and wall in back of Records Building and parking lot near highway sheds. Took good care of athletic field, parks and playgrounds. We had quite a few heavy rain storms which caused a lot of damage to our roads and it was quite a problem to keep them in good condition. Icy roads last fall somewhat increased the burden. I find the highway men always willing to do their utmost and am proud of their work. The Police and Highway Departments do not get much credit for what they do even though they try to please everybody.

The **Cemetery Department** did a very satisfactory job and with less money than the previous year.

The **Fire Department**: I do believe we have the best volunteer fire department in Nw England.

The **Sewer and Water Departments**: Work done by these two departments is something that we can talk about with pride. A lot of work was done by contractors but our local crew also did a lot. Work is listed in the separate reports submitted for these two departments.

Health Nurse: Mrs. Butler is doing a great job for the Town and taking very good care of the people of Newport. Her services are very much appreciated and her work is very satisfactory.

The **Dump**: Those of us who have to take our rubbish to the dump truly appreciate the good work that Mr. Gamash is doing in trying to keep the place clean.

The people of Newport should be proud of their town for it has a lot to offer. No new industries as yet but the commit-

tee appointed is doing all it possibly can to get some and will not give up until it has. I personally feel that we have made satisfactory progress and credit is due the Board of Selectmen, our two girls in the office, Mrs. Osborne and Mrs. Rego, and our Town Clerk Mr. Dudley, and all town employees for their untiring efforts and cooperation, without which no one could hope to attain success.

We have had property involved in fire to the insured amount of \$68,300.00 Our insurance loss for the year has been \$19,525.70.

The number of calls for the year total 123, listed as follows: 112 still calls, 5 box alarms, 2 false alarms, 2 brush fires and 2 out of town calls.

The personnel of the Department is well trained and equipped.

The 1939 Chevrolet ladder truck, the Reo 1948 Buffalo equipped 500 gallon pumper and the American LaFrance 1928 are in good condition.

The 1934 Chevrolet Combination truck will have to be replaced in the near future.

The men of the Department and myself feel deeply the loss of our formr Captain Harry G. Brown, who served so faithfully the 33 years he served as a member of the Department.

I wish to thank the Town Manager, Town Fathers, Firemen and Citizens of Newport for their splendid cooperation during the past year.

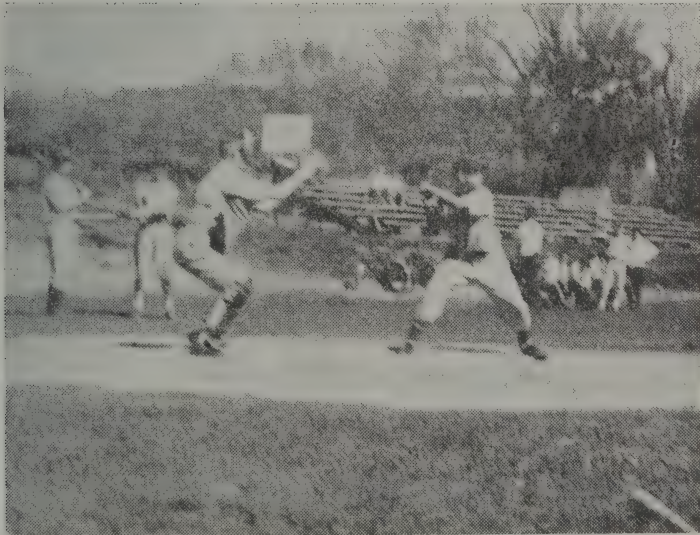

Summer Street: 1051 ft. of 6 in. cast iron.

Pinacle Road: 133 ft. of 1 in. copper tubing.

Services were laid to fifteen additional houses. Two new hydrants were added to the system, one at Wilmarth Park and one on Summer Street near the new hospital.

We have enough pipe on hand to extend our main line on Summer Street to the eight houses beyond the new hospital. This work will be done early this spring.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Newport School Board:

I herewith submit my third annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Our schools are operating this year on an "austerity" budget. The failure to receive any state aid, coupled with the economic condition of Newport, caused a number of economies to be effected. Several of these were: reductions in the allotment for textbooks, scholars' supplies, athletic and commercial equipment; the amounts for repairs and new equipment were substantially reduced; the position of full-time nurse was eliminated and part-time nursing service substituted; the consolidation of the principalship of the Junior and Senior High Schools; the one-room school at Guild (Grades 1-4) was closed and that teaching position eliminated.

By practicing economy in several areas of the budget, it was possible to continue the Teachers' Salary Schedule. This marks the third school year that a salary schedule has been in operation in Newport. Practically all members of the teaching staff have reached their proper place on the schedule, determined by experience and training. According to the provisions of the Schedule, yearly increments will be received by those teachers who have not reached the maximum salary for the degree held.

In-Service Training

For the third successive year an extension course was offered in this School Union. The course this year was in Guidance and was conducted by Dr. Harold Hyde, Chief of the Division of Education Research of the State Department of Education. Many Newport high school and elementary teachers took the course.

Repairs

Minor repairs and the regular summer cleaning of all buildings were carried out by the janitors. Principal items at the various buildings were:

Towle:

The walks to the gym were covered with hot-mix and the two parking areas were oiled.

Two folding gates—to shut off the gym area from the rest of the building—were installed.

Two drains were installed on the gym roof.

The exterior trim was painted.

Two wooden cabinets and an additional work bench were installed in the Science Laboratory. The Science Laboratory, boys' basement, and Commercial Room were painted. An asphalt tile floor was installed in the Commercial Room.

Richards:

Windows in two Annex rooms were weatherstripped. Annex windows were caulked. Pupils' desks in four rooms were sanded and re-finished. The Music Room was painted. A number of blackboards were re-surfaced. Several minor recommendations of the Fire Chief were completed as follows:
 Wood shop door was made to swing outward.
 A metal cabinet for the paint room was obtained.
 A roof gutter was installed over the fire escape.

Primary:

Some worn stair treads were re-surfaced. Pupils' desks in five rooms were sanded and re-finished. The Lunch Room was painted. The play area was oiled.

New Equipment

The major items of new equipment are as follows:

Towle:

10 typing tables.
 1 metal file—Commercial Department
 Donation of 3 used typewriters from Surplus Property (These were re-conditioned at small expense).
 New black curtains and drapes in Chellis Auditorium.
 3 wooden mats for boys' shower room.

Richards:

20 desk and chair units.
 2 metal cabinets for the Music Room.
 1 metal cabinet for Principal's Office.
 Wood lathe.

Music Department:

1 Oboe.
 An alto sax, tenor sax and French Horn were ob-

tained from Surplus Property and re-conditioned at small cost compared to the value of these instruments.

Superintendent's Office:

Electric adding machine.

Insurance

Fire insurance on all Newport school buildings and equipment now totals \$230,400. This year's budget provides for \$25,000 additional and also would place extended coverage on all existing policies.

Recommendations

There are several areas in which the schools' offering should be improved at the earliest opportunity.

I recommend that the present part-time typing position at Towle High School be made a full-time position. By so doing, it would be possible to lighten the teaching load of some members of the staff so that they could serve as class guidance counselors. This would give every student an opportunity for educational and vocational guidance not now provided—yet vitally needed. It would also be possible to offer a course in auto-driving. This course, highly recommended by safety and law-enforcement officials, is now offered in many high schools in New Hampshire. Over 100 of our high school students in the three under-classes have signified an interest in taking such a course if it were offered. Such an interest should not be ignored.

We are one of the very few communities in the state where a school lunch program is not maintained. The absence of such a program is not due to lack of need but rather to lack of adequate facilities.

The present Grange Hall, a building owned by the School District, has been mentioned as a possible site for a school lunch program. This building has possibilities but it would take a sizeable expenditure to put it into condition for such use. This is a project that should be contemplated for the future but is not recommended for the coming year.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation for the cooperation received during the past year from the school staff, together with the loyal support of the School Board and the continued interest of the other citizens in the welfare of the schools.

Dear Mr. Flint:

It is my privilege to submit my first annual report as Principal of Towle High School and Richards Junior High School. A supplement of statistical tables is attached which includes the following:

There are very few problems in the field of education that can be solved without reference, sooner or later, to the objectives of education. Both the program and its evaluation are given direction by the purposes of education. Educators are in general agreement that the major purposes of education are these:

1. Sound health.
2. Worthy home membership.
3. Mastery of the tools, techniques, and spirit of learning.
4. Faithful citizenship.
5. Vocational effectiveness.
6. Wise use of leisure time.
7. Ethical character.

It is obvious that the school cannot rightfully be held accountable for the quality of many outcomes in these varied fields because in the community there are conditions affecting them over which the school has little, if any, control. The combined efforts of all our community agencies must be coordinated and directed toward the fruition of these noble objectives. We have recently witnessed the introduction of projects for youth ac-

tivity which are indeed gratifying. These must be continued and expanded in scope.

An examination of the curricular and extracurricular offerings of our schools reveals that we are providing our youth with experiences comparable, if not superior, to communities of similar size. This, however, does not imply that we can afford to rest on our laurels. Because we are a part of a rapidly-changing society, we are obliged to constantly re-evaluate our educational product in terms of newly-defined social ideals.

To insure continuous progress toward better educational offerings in our community and to better achieve the purposes of education listed elsewhere on this report, I offer these proposals for your consideration:

1. The teachers salary schedule should not only be maintained, but also, revised to be brought in line with current living costs. Since its adoption the community has experienced an unprecedented stability in its teaching personnel. The obtaining and holding of successful, efficient teachers pays off abundantly in educational achievement.

2. A serious deficiency in our present program of studies is the lack of a four-year course in Industrial Arts. This we must take steps to rectify. Currently, our offerings in this area consist of a one-year course in Cabinet Making and a course of similar duration in Mechanical Drawing. We need to do more for a larger percentage of our pupils in the vital area of vocational skills. Too many of our graduates have only a general education to offer to prospective employers.

3. We need to study the feasibility of adding agricultural courses to our program of studies. Due to the nature of our surroundings, a considerable number of our school patrons need training along these lines. Results of educational surveys show conclusively that learning is most effective when the natural interests of pupils are utilized. Unfortunately, our present facilities make these offerings an impossibility.

4. A functional vocational and educational guidance program must be devised. Adolescence is a stage of life characterized by indecision. Pupils cannot make wise choices unless we place before them an abundance of information about themselves and career opportunities. Guidance properly administered, however, requires trained personnel and an allotment of time for individual counseling with pupils. This year several of the teachers have received this training by enrolling in an extension course offered locally. The problem before us now is to lighten the teaching load so that teachers best qualified for

guidance work can participate in the program. Again this year we have made use of the testing service offered by Boston University. Armed with these test results we are able to show pupils their strengths and weaknesses and to indicate in what vocational areas they are likely to succeed.

This report would not be complete if I did not express a very real debt which I feel to the students, parents, members of the teaching staff, and administrative associates. To me that debt is very real and I mean its acknowledgment to be entirely sincere.

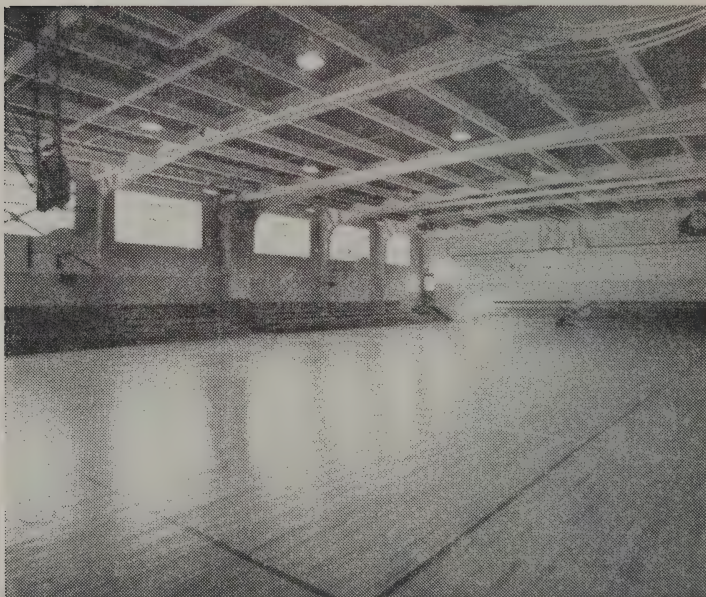

SCHOOL WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Newport, in the County of Sullivan, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in district affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said District on the tenth day of March, 1951, at two o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

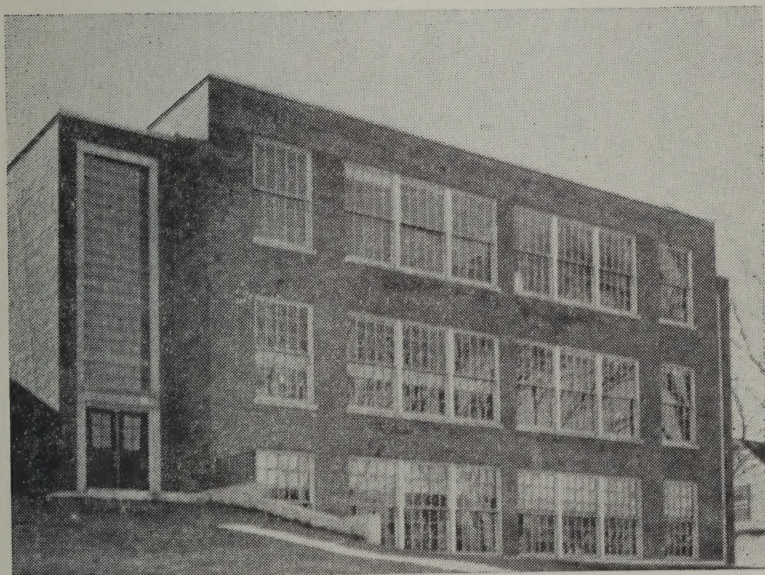
Article 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Article 9. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to sell the land and buildings known as the North Newport School and to convey the same to the purchaser by proper deed in the name of the School District.

Article 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The completion of the six-room Richards Annex Addition—pictured above—in the spring of 1949 made it possible to reduce the heavy class load of 45-50 pupils per teacher in the middle grades, and to abandon two temporary class rooms, (one was in a Sunapee Street store and the other was at the former curtain factory) and to close three one-room rural schools. (Kelleyville was closed in 1948, North Newport in 1949 and Guild in 1950). All Newport students (Grades 1-12) are now housed in three buildings where in 1948 there were eight different centers of school operation.
