REPORT OF TOWN MEETING

Town Hall, March 14, 1950.

Article 1. Town officers elected were:

Town Clerk—E. O. Foss.

Selectman—A. W. McDaniel.

Treasurer—Edna B. Glover.

Tax Collector—H. W. Sly.

Library Trustee—Virginia E. Sly.

Auditors—Theresa Batchelder, Beatrice Travis.

Chief of Police—Albert C. Hartford.

Road Agent—A. W. Neilsen.

Trustees of Trust Funds—Elmer Holmes, 3 years; John R. Tuttle, 2 years.

On the Beano question: Yes (68) No (27).

In the absence of Dr. Fred Fernald, office of Moderator filled by A. W. McDaniel. Officers sworn in at open meeting by asst. Moderator A. W. McDaniel, except Theresa Batchelder, Virginia E. Sly and Elmer Holmes. These to be sworn in by the Clerk at a later date.

Article 2. On motion of K. A. Cooper, it was voted to raise the sum of \$16,177.74 to defray town charges and appropriations made for same.

Article 3. On motion of C. H. Laughton, the sum of \$400.00 was voted for White Pine Blister Rust Control in 1950.

Article 4. On motion of John A. Perkins, the sum of \$250 was voted for fire equipment.

Article 5. On motion of Frederick L. Fernald, the sum of \$640.34 was raised. The State to contribute \$2,561.34 for Town Road Aid.

Article 6. On motion of John A. Perkins, the sum of \$100.00 for purchase and maintenance of a town dump was approved.

Article 7. On motion of K. A. Cooper, the sum of \$150 was voted for snow fence.

Article 8. On motion of W. H. Sanborn, the article on question of purchasing a road maintainer was tabled.

Article 9. On motion of D. M. Perkins, the Selectmen were authorized to sell surplus equipment and property.

Article 10. On motion of C. H. Laughton, the Selectmen were authorized to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 11. On motion of D. M. Perkins, the Selectmen were instructed to insert an article in the warrant for next town meeting authorizing non-partisan type of ballot.

Article 11. Appointment of Budget Committee left to elected Moderator by Asst. Moderator A. W. McDaniel.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Nottingham in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Nottingham on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To adopt non-partisan type of ballot.
4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust in 1951.
5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$250 for fire equipment.
6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$678.65, the State to contribute \$4524.33 for Town Road Aid.
7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for the purpose of acquiring and maintaining a Town Dump.
8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for the purchase of cutting edges for the large road machine.

9. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a road grader at a cost not to exceed \$9000, and for that purpose to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2000 and issue four serial notes: one for \$2000 payable one year from date of issue; one for \$2000 payable two years from date of issue; one for \$2000 payable three years from date of issue; and one for \$1000 payable four years from date of issue; and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and sign said notes.

10. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the same wage scale as the State.

11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell surplus equipment and property.

12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Nottingham qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the thirteenth day of March, 1951, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary District Officers for the ensuing year.
2. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
4. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
5. To see if the District will vote to construct and equip a new school building on the site now owned by the District.
6. To see if the District will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$48,000.00 for construction authorized under Article 5 and expenses related thereto, and authorize the School Board to raise said sum by issuing bonds of the District.

7. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to move, use or dispose of either or both of the present school houses and other property of the District.

8. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to accept any gifts for School purposes.

9. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equilization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen and balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Nottingham:

Schools in Nottingham at present are organized as follows:

There are also 7 pupils in Coe-Brown Northwood Academy, 4 in Dover High School, 2 in Robinson Seminary, and 2 elementary pupils attending in Lee. An estimated 12 pupils will enter the first grade next September. This year the district is back to 4 classrooms, with 2 grades in a room.

Following action of the district last year, the school board has acquired land for a school site, pleasantly situated in a central location. It is convenient to the main highway, and in sight from it, but apart from noise and traffic hazards. If it is decided to utilize some of the present facilities in the new project and use local materials in part for the balance, considerable economies could doubtless be made.

A re-arrangement of transportation this year is designed to use the larger and smaller vehicles to the best advantage. The school board has made progress in furnishing improved seating equipment for the pupils.

Last year the school nurse, Miss Myrtle Fletcher, examined 82 pupils, including the fall check-up, special tests of vision and hearing, a record of growth, watching communicable diseases, and special attention to teeth and other remediable conditions. Due mainly to difficulty in securing adequate volun-

teer help for the school lunch, the project has been suspended for the time being. Nottingham was one of the pioneers in this program, and has always felt that definite good from it was clearly seen. It is probable that management of the lunch would be greatly simplified and volunteer help more readily obtained if the district would make an appropriation for a regular paid worker.

High School tuition rates are being increased. The old "legal rate" of the state average cost of instruction is no longer available. The new "legal rate" of the total current costs is more likely to be the basis of future high school tuition charges.

The proposed new state-aid plan, designed by the State Board of Education to meet the Legislature's request for a formula based on need, is certainly better (on the whole) than the one adopted two years ago. Although Nottingham does not get quite so much from it, the district might not get more from any other formula likely to be adopted.

Further attention, both inside and outside the district, has been given during the past year to the proposed consolidation of districts. None of the districts concerned, however, have seen their way clear to take any definite steps toward any plan that would involve Nottingham.
