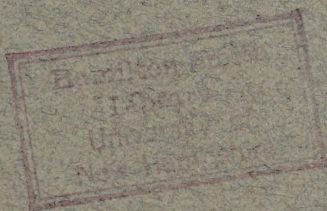

**TOWN WARRANT**

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## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pembroke in the County  
of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in*  
[L.S.] *Town affairs:*

1. You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Pembroke on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-six hundred thirty-one dollars and thirty-seven cents for State Aid Construction of highways, as required by the State Highway Department.

4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars for State Aid Maintenance of highways, as required by the State Highway Department.

5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-six hundred dollars for Trunk Line Maintenance of highways, as required by the State Highway Department.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five dollars for the observance of Memorial Day.



7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars for the purpose of securing the services of the Suncook Union Cornet Band for a series of free band concerts.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the control of the White Pine Blister Rust in town.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to purchase supplies for the Fire Department.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to oil streets in Suncook village.

11. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction of concrete or cement sidewalks, wherever the abutters will pay one-half the expense.

12. To see if the town will vote to accept the gift of \$100 in trust from Agnes J. Fowler, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the burial lot standing in the name of Adin G. Fowler in the North Pembroke Cemetery.

13. To see if the town will vote to accept the gift of \$200 in trust from Henry T. Fowler, the income to be used for the perpetual care of two burial lots and the memorial markers thereon in the North Pembroke Cemetery, one standing in the name of his father, Trueworthy L. Fowler, and the other lot standing in his own name.

14. To see if the town will vote to accept the gift of \$100 in trust from Ida M. Fowler, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the burial lot standing in the name of Philip Holt, her father, in the North Pembroke Cemetery.

15. To see if the town will vote to accept the legacy of \$100 in trust from the estate of Clara Ellen Brown, the

income to be used for the perpetual care of the burial lot standing in the name of Jonathan Payson in the Pembroke Street Cemetery.

16. To see if the town will vote to buy of Alvin H. Batchelder as an extension of the Buck Street Cemetery, the land East of said cemetery already laid out for burial lots, and raise and appropriate one hundred dollars to pay therefor.

17. To see if the town will vote to accept the legacy of two hundred dollars in trust from the estate of Addie M. Jenkins, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the burial lot of Annette K. Knox in the Pembroke Street Cemetery.

18. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of one hundred dollars in trust from the estate of Ann O. Drake, the income to be used for the perpetual care of her burial lot in Pembroke Street Cemetery.

19. To see if the town will vote to accept a gift of one hundred dollars in trust from Samuel D. Robinson, the income to be used for the perpetual care of his burial lot in the North Pembroke Cemetery.

20. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars, in addition to what is paid each year, for the running expenses of Pembroke Library.

21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars, as its share of the expense, for the construction of a new bridge across the Suncook River on the Concord and Dover Turnpike.

22. (By request.) To see what action the town will take in regard to placing a street light on the Academy road between the driveways of Mrs. Betsy Brown and C. H. Ludlow.

23. (By request.) To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to extend the sewer from Millard street to Drake's Garage.

24. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

25. (By request.) To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee of three to inspect all the bridges and culverts in Pembroke (excepting the river bridges) to ascertain the extent of the town's liability to damage therefrom, and make the necessary repairs thereon; also to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding five hundred dollars to defray the expenses of said repairs.

26. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

---

The great importance of our public schools' influence upon the people seems to grow from year to year because of the increasing demands of the times in which we live. To keep these schools anywhere near the maximum of efficiency demanded by the state requires no small expenditure of thought and money. Even then we cannot always live within the money given.

At the beginning of the present school year the Board was confronted with the problem, namely, a crowded condition in the primary department of the Suncook school. After due deliberation it was thought best to open another room in the building to accommodate these children and procure a teacher. In this room were placed the older of these children, with the understanding they should be promoted to a higher grade as soon as their efficiency would allow.

The work has been very good in these rooms and illustrates the well-known fact that the first grade should not be crowded as it is the foundation upon which the child's education is built.

This year the schools have been provided with a school nurse in order that the pupils may be fortified as much as possible against contagious diseases and undernourishment.

It had been hoped that a Junior High school might be established, but a lack of funds prevented. However, a small beginning has been made.

The former grammar school has been remodeled and is already being enjoyed by the athletic students of this town.

As usual the past year has been very pleasant for the Superintendent and School Board as citizens, parents and teachers have done all in their power in working for the welfare of the scholars.

In closing we also extend our thanks to the Extension

workers of this town for the interest taken in our rural community, and appreciate their unpaid work, so willingly given, and which is bringing such good results.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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*To the School Board and Citizens:*

I herewith submit my fifteenth annual report of the schools of Pembroke for the year ending June 30, 1927.

There were maintained during the year nine schools for a school year of 36 weeks with no change in the teaching force.

The school enrollment was 176 (91 boys and 85 girls), with a daily average attendance of 94.45 per cent.

The schools were in session on an average 347.56 half-days.

### LENGTH OF SCHOOL YEAR

The minimum length of a standard school year shall be at least 36 weeks, 360 half-day sessions. Cities and many large towns provide schools for 38 or more weeks per year.

In order that our pupils may enjoy as nearly as possible equal school opportunities with those living in cities and larger towns, it behooves the school board to so arrange the terms that the schools shall be in session on as many half-days as possible.

This may be accomplished by arranging the terms so that most of the holidays shall come in vacation. On some of the holidays as Washington's Birthday, Columbus Day and Fast Day the schools may be in session and exercises arranged to commemorate the day. Parents and citizens may well be sent special invitations to visit the schools upon these days.

Another plan is to contract the teachers for 360 half-days of service in 37 weeks; this plan allows for making up lost time.

Either of these plans will add greater school value without increasing school cost. If 360 sessions are paid for,

wisdom and economy call for an administration where few if any sessions are lost.

Another important factor in school administration is the assignment of pupils to the different schools. The number of pupils and the number of grades per teacher call for serious consideration by the school authorities and citizens. It is clearly evident that where 25 or 30 pupils in 6 to 8 grades are assigned to one teacher good school work cannot be accomplished. It is equally as evident that where too few pupils are assigned to a teacher the best results cannot be obtained.

In recent years roads and transportation have been so greatly improved that pupils may be assigned to schools where good conditions exist, and this assignment makes a financial saving for the district.

#### SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

Many requests come from parents and guardians to excuse their children from attending school for reasons that cannot be considered as legal, such as want of shoes and other clothing, distance from school, a need to work in order to help support the family, and the over-age pupil who, for truancy or dullness, finds himself in one of the lower grades at the age of 15, making a plea that school work is not profitable for him.

"The New Hampshire school attendance law is very simple. All children must attend a public or an approved private school every day that the school is in session from their eighth to sixteenth birthdays, or to their fourteenth birthday if they have then completed the eighth grade. There is no excuse except physical or mental incompetence. Neither poverty of parents nor isolation of the home may stand in the way. At least eight years of schooling is an inalienable right of New Hampshire children.

"For thirty years this law has been unchanged and has been enforced. For this purpose, each district has its own

truant officer. Commonly these men are vigilant and effective. The cities are particularly well served. In the small towns often difficulties arise, due to the fact that the truant officer and the negligent parent are neighbors or relatives, and an official act is likely to be regarded as a personal one."

#### HEALTH

An important factor in modern education is the care of the health of the pupils.

Examinations of the pupils for defects of eye, ear, teeth, throat, respiratory organs, and for the causes of underweight are made.

Dental clinics are held and defects of the teeth recorded on a card which is carried home by the pupil. These examinations are free. The parents may employ the school dentist at a greatly reduced cost or their own dentist as they prefer.

All health cards are sent out as danger signals with no thought on the part of the school authorities of dictation, but with a desire to work with the parents to safeguard the health of the child.

Excellent work in health inspection was done by Katherine O'Donnell, R. N.

A uniform and carefully graded course of study in health and health habits was taught by each teacher.

#### MANUAL TRAINING

This department of work has been supervised by three cadet teachers from the Keene Normal School as in the year last past. The pupils were greatly interested and did good work.

#### MUSIC

Music under the direction of Miss Kate L. Smith was well taught. Miss Smith's report follows:

Public school music is a fascinating field for action, and I know of nothing more worth-while than to have the privilege of opening this storehouse of treasures, and presenting to the boys and girls music that shall not only give pleasure during the lesson period, but at the same time enrich the mind and lay a foundation for an ambition to know more of the subject in the future. The rural school presents problems every year. No class of pupils are more eager and willing to learn than the children in the rural schools, many of them become proficient in the subject.

The five rural schools are banded together in a club whose slogan is "Better music for self, for school and for community." They edit a magazine sheet each month in the interests of music called "Musical History." The annual invitation to the school children from the Grange was accepted and a program presented by the rural schools.

A fine Christmas pageant was given by the Pembroke grammar school.

I thank the committee, the superintendent and the able corps of teachers for helping to make school music a success.

#### SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

The state program of studies for the elementary school is well taught by the teachers.

The junior high school program in mathematics, English and history is now taught in the higher grades, and the other branches of the junior high program will be introduced as soon as conditions permit.

Standardized tests have been given during the year in all the fundamentals.

Teachers' meetings have been well attended. At these



meetings instructive and inspiring addresses were delivered.

The relation of teachers, superintendent and school board is cordial, and all are earnestly working for the better education of the children.

In conclusion I express my appreciation of the cordial cooperation and assistance given to me.
