Sullivan County Convention — For Purpose of Adopting Budget for 1958 Sullivan County Home February 6, 1958

At twelve-thirty noon Superintendent and Matron, Mr. and Mrs. Ahern, were hosts to the County officials and the Delegation at dinner. All food served was raised and processed at the farm. It was a very delicious meal and a rising vote of thanks was accorded Mr. and Mrs. Ahern.

The Delegation retired to the Chapel where they received the explanation of the budget from the County Commissioners in the business session, presided over by Vice Chairman Frizzell in the absence of Chairman Angus. Commissioner Read explained all facets of the budget and also the necessity for the forty thousand bond issue for installation of new heating system, repair of chimney, new beds and related equipment and for renovation of diet kitchen. Commissioner Reed also requested a Delegation committee be appointed to work with the Commissioners on the heating plant problem. The delegation was also requested to advise the Commissioners on their wishes regarding the use of County land for Field Trials. The Commissioners and other County Officials retired and the Delegation went into Executive Session.

Executive Session of Sullivan County Delegation, Vice-Chairman Frizzell presiding:

Representative Vaughan, Chairman of the Finance Committee, explained the changes recommended by his committee for the County Budget and the Finance Committee's recommendations regarding the proposed bond issue. The Delegation VOTED to consider the budget before the bond issue.

On motion of Mr. Bloomfield, seconded by Mr. Desnoyer, VOTED that \$77,446.00 be the amount of revenue anticipated for the fiscal year 1958.

On motion of Mr. Wirkkala, seconded by Mr. Smith, VOTED that the delegation adopt the following salaries:

On motion of Mr. Merrifield, seconded by Mr. Desnoyer, VOTED that the sum appropriated for the Board and Care of Children be \$25,500.00.

On motion of Mr. Brown, seconded by Mr. Bloomfield, VOTED that the amount appropriated for Soldiers' Aid be \$7,500.00.

On motion of Mr. Merrifield, seconded by Mr. Davis, VOTED that the amounts recommended for Welfare administration through All Other Payments be accepted as read in the budget and that the sums be appropriated for said items as follows:

On motion of Mr. Merrifield, seconded by Mr. Brown, VOTED that the sum appropriated for Insurance be \$5,500.00.

On motion of Mr. Davis, seconded by Mr. Brown, VOTED that the sum appropriated for Employees' Retirement and Social Security be \$3,300.00.

On motion of Mr. Desnoyer, seconded by Mr. Riley, VOTED that the sum appropriated for Civil Defense be \$100.00.

On motion of Mr. Riley, seconded by Mr. Bascom, VOTED that the total sum appropriated for expenditures be \$300,800.00.

On motion of Mr. Bascom, seconded by Mr. Crane, VOTED that the amount necessary to be raised by County Tax be \$223,354.00.

Other matters discussed and formal vote taken by Delegation:

1. Subject: \$40,000.00 Bond Issue

On motion of Mr. Bradbury, seconded by Mr. Crane, VOTED that the County Commissioners and the County Treasurer be authorized to borrow upon the credit of the County of Sullivan the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars, (\$40,000.00) to be expended in the following manner and with the following stipulations: The monies so raised to be expended for installation of a new heating system at the County Home, repair of the Chimney at the County Home and for new beds and related equipment and to renovate the diet kitchen at the County Hospital, and for these purposes the County Commissioners and the County Treasurer are hereby authorized to issue Bonds in the name of and on behalf of the County of Sullivan.

Stipulations: Said sum shall be expended as recommended by the finance committee and the special committee requested by the commissioners. The Chairman of the Delegation shall appoint a special committee to work with the Commissioners and no money shall be expended for the heating plant until final approval is authorized by the Delegation. It being understood that there are no restrictions on the expenditure of monies for the other improvements authorized by this Delegation, or to be paid for by this bond issue.

2. Subject: Feasability of establishing a maximum security Jail at County Home.

On motion of Mr. Bradbury, seconded by Mr. Bloomfield, VOTED that the Chairman of the Delegation appoint a special Committee to work with the Commissioners and the Sheriff's Department to investigate the cost differential in handling maximum security prisoners at the Farm Jail or transporting to Hillsborough, and to make recommendations to the Delegation for future action.

3. Subject: Field Trials held on County Property.

On motion of Mr. Simms, seconded by Mr. Merrifield, VOTED that the County Commissioners be requested to investigate liability of County for any damages incurred through use of property and VOTED that the Commissioners be authorized to take such action as they deem necessary or proper in this matter.

In legal action taken at the Sullivan County Delegation Meeting, County Home, February 6, 1958, you have been requested to appoint two special committees for the following purposes:

- That the Chairman of the Delegation be authorized and requested to appoint a special committee to work with the County Commissioners in determining the proper heating system to be installed at the County Home and that said Committee and the Commissioners be instructed to report their findings to the Delegation for final approval before installation.
- 2. That the Chairman be authorized and requested to appoint a special Committee to work with the Commissioners and the Sheriff on problems arising from present method of handling maximum security prisoners and the cost differential in the present method against renovation of County Jail and maintenance of maximum security cases in the county. Said committee to make recommendations to the Delegation for further action by the Delegation.

Arthur Bradbury, Chairman of the Committee to investigate the feasability of remodeling part of the House of Correction in Unity, to hold Superior Court prisoners. Other members of the Committee are—Frank D'Amante, Herbert Brown, Harry Bloomfield and George Merrifield.

A meeting of the Committee was held on May 21, 1958, in the Probate Court Room in Claremont. Present at the meeting were Arthur Bradbury, Chairman, Frank D'Amante, Herbert Brown, George Merrifield.

Absent-Harry Bloomfield.

At the request of Chairman Bradbury, Sheriff McCusker submitted the cost of boarding and transporting the prisoners for the year 1957. A sketch of remodeling one of the dormitories at the House of Correction was also submitted to the Committee by Sheriff McCusker.

The feasability of keeping and maintaining a jail at Unity was very thoroughly discussed relative to cost of remodeling, maintenance and cost of labor (three jailers).

George Merrifield made a motion which was seconded and passed that Sheriff McCusker send to each member of the Committee, the cost of transporting and boarding the prisoners held at Hillsborough County Jail for the years 1955, 1956 and 1957, and that another meeting be held on June 4, 1958, at 7:30 p.m.

The meeting was adjourned.

June 4, 1958

A meeting was held on June 4, 1958 at Sheriff McCusker's Office. The meeting was called to order by Chairman Arthur Bradbury. Present at this meeting were Arthur Bradbury, Chairman, Frank D'Amante and Herbert Brown.

Absent-Harry Bloomfield and George Merrifield.

During the discussion that was held, the consensus of opinion was that the cost of remodeling part of the House of Correction in Unity was too costly and that the hiring of three jailers to supervise this jail alone would be more than the cost the County is now paying for transporting and boarding the prisoners at Hillsborough County Jail. Also that underneath the hospital was no place for a jail, and, as it would cost thousands of dollars to build and equip a separate building, the Committee reached the following conclusion and herewith submits the following report:

This Committee, after careful study, recommends to the Delegation that the remodeling or the building of a separate building to house Superior Court prisoners is not warranted at this time. The cost of such would be too great and the cost to the County to keep the prisoners in Manchester is cheaper than we can keep them in a jail of our own.

SULLIVAN COUNTY DELEGATION SPECIAL MEETING

At a special meeting held in Claremont, New Hampshire June 12, 1958, in the absence of the Chairman, Martha Frizzell, Vice-Chairman called the meeting to order at $7:00\ P.M.$

Report of the Committee appointed by the Chairman to work with the County Commissioners was heard relative to the heating plant at the County Home. Chairman Mr. Vaughan read the report recommending that no new equipment be purchased at this time. It was reported by Commissioner Read that the cost to repair refractory brick of both boilers would be \$2400.00, if the County furnishes the rough labor.

Vice-Chairman read inspection reports of the boilers.

Upon motion of Mr. Merrifield and seconded by Mr. Desnoyer it was voted to accept the report of the Committee and not to authorize purchase of any new equipment.

Upon motion of Mr. Bascom and seconded by Mr. Desnoyer, it was voted that the Commissioners be authorized to repair the boilers and chimney at the County Home and to borrow by short-term notes sums not to exceed \$2400.00 for repair of the boilers and \$1250.00 for the repair of the chimney.

Upon motion of Mr. Merrifield and seconded by Mr. Desnoyer, it was voted that the Delegation recommend that the Commissioners contract for the repair of the boilers and chimney without competitive bidding.

A report of the Committee appointed by the Chairman to investigate the feasibility of remodeling part of the House of Correction in Unity, N. H., to hold Superior Court prisoners was given by its Chairman, Mr. Bradbury, recommending that remodeling of the building or a separate building to house Superior Court prisoners is not warranted at this time.

Upon motion of Mr. Vaughan seconded by Mr. Desnoyer it was voted to accept the report as read.

Upon motion made and duly seconded it was voted to adjourn at $9:00\ P.M.$

A true copy attest: Margaret B, DeLude At a duly called meeting of the Sullivan County Delegation on September 22, 1958 in the Claremont offices of the County Commissioners the Sullivan County Delegation were informed of the revised estimation of the necessary repairs and alterations and their costs as resubmitted by Commissioner Read. County Treasurer Merton J. Sargent explained fully the difference in financing the lesser amount of twenty-four thousand dollars in short term notes as against financing by bond issue and recommended that the financing be done in this manner: Three year serial notes with the first note due in 1959, the second in 1960, and the third in 1961. After discussion with the Commissioners and Mr. and Mrs. Ahern on the renovations and improvements in question, the County Officers retired and the Delegation went into Executive Session with Chairman Angus presiding.

Executive Session of Sullivan County Delegation—Chairman Angus presiding.

On motion of Mr. Desnoyer, seconded by Mr. Vaughan, it was unanimously VOTED to rescind the vote whereby the Delegation had authorized a \$40,000,00 bond issue.

On motion of Mr. Vaughan, seconded by Mr. Desnoyer, it was unanimously VOTED that the County Treasurer be empowered to borrow, in short term notes, a sum of money not to exceed twenty-four thousand dollars, (\$24,000.00). Said sum to be in serial notes with the first coming due in 1959, the second note due in 1960 and the third note due in 1961. The money thus authorized to be used for the purpose of making alterations to the diet kitchen, for the purchase of beds and mattresses and the renovation of the heating system at the County Farm.

Moved by Mr. Merrifield to appropriate \$300.00 for the Town of Sunapee for recovery of body in lake, Chairman Angus regretfully ruled motion out of order. Discussion ensued.

On motion of Mr. Riley, seconded by Mr. Desnoyer the Delegation VOTED to urge the County Solicitor to offer all possible cooperation to the Fish and Game Department in retrieving the body.

Motion by Mr. Monblo that the Commissioners install six G E LA 70 E and one high pressure boiler, total cost \$18,451.00. Not seconded.

No further business being brought before the executive meeting, the County Commissioners were asked to return and attend the vote of the Delegation. The Commissioners also suggested the Delegation would be interested in a progress report of the renovations which was given by Mr. and Mrs. Ahern. More attractive and commodious quarters have been made for the patients by removing partitions and enlarging rooms providing a minimum of 82 sq. ft. of space per patient. Electric outlets have been installed. In the diet kitchen the stainless steel sinks have arrived as has the dishwasher. New floor cupboards are being installed. Mrs. Ahern

explained that with 63 patients presently in the hospital and the diet kitchen in constant use, it is somewhat more difficult to make major alterations as quickly as they might like, but that progress was most satisfactory.

Chairman Angus thanked the County Officers and expressed the

Delegation's satisfaction with the progress of the work.

COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

To the Citizens of Sullivan County:

In accordance with the Public Laws of the State of New Hampshire, the Commissioners of Sullivan County herewith present the Annual Report of the County Commissioners, the Solicitor, the Clerk of the Court, the Sheriff, the Chaplains, the Physician, the County Agent, and the Auditors for the year ending December 31, 1958.

Again it is with pride and satisfaction that the Commissioners can report a year of progress and accomplishments. The most important were the completion of the chlorination system, the renewal of the two large fire boxes under the Dillon boilers as well as rebuilding the top of the smoke stack and the installation of a lightning arrestor. We purchased fifty new hospital beds and related equipment; the diet kitchen and the top floor of the hospital were enlarged; a new dishwasher with stainless steel sink and shelves, and a new tile floor and cupboards were installed in the diet kitchen. Thanks to the Delegation for their cooperation.

The County has been fortunate the past year in having competent personnel operating the farm. The crops were all very good although the weather conditions weren't quite as good this year. The farm has supplied the institution with all of its beef and pork as well as milk and vegetables. At the present time we have 69 Holstein cattle including fifteen registered females and 51 hogs of which twenty are registered Yorkshire brood sows. There are always many other factors associated with farming. This year there were new cement sills and floors put under the work shop; the living room and dining room in the superintendent's home were painted, and there is always the continual renewal of water and steam pipes.

Due to the recession in business, the relief load in Sullivan County has been very heavy and has cost much more than was anticipated. Relief offt he Farm and Soldiers' Aid has cost about \$16,000 more than was provided for. In the year ahead these costs will not be as much as they were in 1958.

The cost for the fifty-one children that the County is caring for continually rises. However, the Commissioners are very grateful to these

Foster Parents who are sharing their homes and blessings with these

unfortunate youngsters.

The Commissioners wish to take this opportunity to thank the Superintendent and Matron, Mr. and Mrs. Omer Ahern, for the efficient manner in which they have performed their duties at the County Home. We appreciate the interest and service that they have contributed to this very successful year of 1958. We also want to thank all the County Officials for their splendid cooperation as well as the County Delegation, the Chaplains, the Physician, the Office Staff, all of the Employees, the County Agent, the Home Demonstration Agent, and all other organizations, clubs and individuals who have in any way contributed to the comfort and happiness of those whose care is our responsibility.

We wish to extend a cordial invitation to the residents of Sullivan County to visit THEIR institution and become better informed of the many problems that have to be solved and the way THEIR tax dollars

are being expended.

At a duly called meeting of the Sullivan County Delegation on September 22, 1958 in the Claremont offices of the County Commissioners the Sullivan County Delegation were informed of the revised estimation of the necessary repairs and alterations and their costs as resubmitted by Commissioner Read. County Treasurer Merton J. Sargent explained fully the difference in financing the lesser amount of twenty-four thousand dollars in short term notes as against financing by bond issue and recommended that the financing be done in this manner: Three year serial notes with the first note due in 1959, the second in 1960, and the third in 1961. After discussion with the Commissioners and Mr. and Mrs. Ahern on the renovations and improvements in question, the County Officers retired and the Delegation went into Executive Session with Chairman Angus presiding.

Executive Session of Sullivan County Delegation—Chairman Angus presiding.

On motion of Mr. Desnoyer, seconded by Mr. Vaughan, it was unanimously VOTED to rescind the vote whereby the Delegation had authorized a \$40,000.00 bond issue.

On motion of Mr. Vaughan, seconded by Mr. Desnoyer, it was unanimously VOTED that the County Treasurer be empowered to borrow, in short term notes, a sum of money not to exceed twenty-four thousand dollars, (\$24,000.00). Said sum to be in serial notes with the first coming due in 1959, the second note due in 1960 and the third note due in 1961. The money thus authorized to be used for the purpose of making alterations to the diet kitchen, for the purchase of beds and mattresses and the renovation of the heating system at the County Farm.

Moved by Mr. Merrifield to appropriate \$300.00 for the Town of Sunapee for recovery of body in lake. Chairman Angus regretfully ruled motion out of order. Discussion ensued.

On motion of Mr. Riley, seconded by Mr. Desnoyer the Delegation VOTED to urge the County Solicitor to offer all possible cooperation to the Fish and Game Department in retrieving the body.

Motion by Mr. Monblo that the Commissioners install six G E LA 70 E and one high pressure boiler, total cost \$18,451.00. Not seconded.

No further business being brought before the executive meeting, the County Commissioners were asked to return and attend the vote of the Delegation. The Commissioners also suggested the Delegation would be interested in a progress report of the renovations which was given by Mr. and Mrs. Ahern. More attractive and commodious quarters have been made for the patients by removing partitions and enlarging rooms providing a minimum of 82 sq. ft. of space per patient. Electric outlets have been installed. In the diet kitchen the stainless steel sinks have arrived as has the dishwasher. New floor cupboards are being installed. Mrs. Ahern

explained that with 63 patients presently in the hospital and the diet kitchen in constant use, it is somewhat more difficult to make major alterations as quickly as they might like, but that progress was most satisfactory.

Chairman Angus thanked the County Officers and expressed the

Delegation's satisfaction with the progress of the work.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Sullivan County Home

Claremont

January 1, 1959

To The Honorable Board of County Commissioners:

Gentlemen:

Another busy year has come to a close with still a great deal more work to be done in the year ahead. Due to the foresight of the County Delegation we were able to procure some much needed equipment in the nursing home. We purchased new beds, mattresses, dressers, bedside cabinets, and over bed tables.

Our number of patients has varied from fifty-five to sixty-five which means that our nursing home has been filled almost to capacity. Many of our patients come to us for terminal care which accounts for the great number of deaths. We have done some physical therapy to teach our stroke patients to help themselves and to do for themselves as much as they are physically able. One who is not an employee has been most kind and has been very generous in giving her time to help some of our patients.

According to regulations determined by the State Department of Health each patient should have at least eighty-five square feet of space. This has been almost impossible. When we were authorized to buy new equipment we discovered that it would not be possible to put two or three beds in each room, so something had to be done.

In May the men were moved downstairs so that their rooms could be renovated. The rooms were enlarged by removing petitions and combining two rooms into one when possible. This not only gave us room for the new equipment but made better ventilation as the rooms would have two or three windows. Single rooms for terminal care and private rooms are now available. We are now meeting the square footage required by the State.

The nursing staff has had to work under very difficult conditions but was most cooperative. The work of renovating was done almost entirely with the help of the men in the House of Correction and employees at the institution thus completing the work at a minimum of expense. The second floor is now completed with a nurses' station centrally located. Due to the increase in patients it was necessary to keep the men on the first floor. It was also a necessity to add more nurses so that the patients will continue to get the excellent care for which the County Home is noted. The second floor is now maintained for the women. Not only are living conditions improved for the patients but this change has resulted in better working conditions for the nursing staff.

Our diet kitchen has been completed with the exception of a steam table which we hope to purchase during the coming year. A new dishwasher with stainless steel tables has been installed. The dumbwaiter has been motorized. These changes have greatly improved the working conditions in the diet kitchen and have made it possible to serve the meals to the patients in a more efficient manner.

Due to poor weather conditions our garden was not as productive as the previous year. However, we still stored many of our vegetables in our root cellar, froze others, and made the usual relishes and pickles.

It was necessary to make extensive repairs to what is known as the milk room apartment to make it livable for employees. Repairs were made in other apartments as were needed. This work was completed with our men in the House of Correction.

In order to cut expenses we have been doing our own butchering and have recently started to cure and smoke our own hams and bacon.

It would be almost impossible to mention all the individuals, clubs, school groups, etc. who have done so much for the patients in so many different ways. We are most fortunate to have so many kind and generous people in our county and we wish to take this opportunity to thank them for the wonderful work they have done and are continuing to do for our sick people.

Under the guidance of Dr. Carl Stearns, our attending physician, monthly staff meetings have been instituted so that the problems confronted in our nursing home can be discussed with the charge nurses and superintendent and matron. One of the main objectives has been the promotion of good public relations. New drugs and their uses, modern hospital methods, and other ways of improving our work are discussed.

At this time we would like to thank our County Commissioners for their gracious assistance and fine cooperation; Dr. Stearns for his commendable work among patients, prisoners, an demployees; the members of the clergy of various faiths; Sheriff McCusker and his working staff; the County Attorney, Mr. Zopf; and the many other individuals whose kindness has manifested itself in so many ways.

The success of any institution depends largely on the cooperation of its employees. It is with deep sincerity that we say thank you to all our employees for work well done.

To the Sullivan County Commissioners:

There were 85 patients admitted to the County Hospital and 42 deaths. The number of patients is now between sixty and sixty-five. Once again I wish to emphasize that many patients are sent here for terminal care, thus accounting for the high death rate.

We have now started an intensive program of physical therapy to help patients who have lost or partially lost the use of an arm or leg due to a shock.

The rooms have all been renovated, enlarged, redecorated, and are very comfortable for the patients on the second floor.

I again wish to thank all law enforcement officers in our County for their cooperation and help to my department during the past and present year, and especially to thank our County Attorney, George Zopf, who gives us so much of his valuable time and advice without which my department would not operate so efficiently. I also thank my deputies for their efficient work and loyalty to their duties as deputy sheriffs.

Your Sheriff's Department has worked in close contact with the County Commissioners over the years, but during the past year, due to the great number of unemployed, our contacts have been greatly increased, and I want to say that I am impressed by the low amount at which the Commissioners have kept the relief costs.

At this time I will ask the delegation to appropriate funds to install a two-way radio communications system between the County Home and the Sheriff's Department, as has been done in other counties. This request is justified, since our County Home has been designated as a 'Welfare Center for Evacuees' and an 'Emergency Hospital', in case of nuclear attack. In cooperation with Civil Defense, the cost for the installation will be shared evenly. The cost to the County not to exceed \$2,700.00.

REPORT OF COUNTY ATTORNEY

January 28, 1959

The Commissioners of Sullivan County Newport, New Hampshire

Gentlemen:

I herewith submit my report as County Solicitor for the year ending December 31, 1958.

In the law enforcement field, the year just ended was quite average and not particularly remarkable. As in the past, we had committed within our borders a great variety of crimes, but crimes against property such as burglary and larceny seemed to be on the rise. Economic conditions doubtless provide the explanation of this increase. In recessional periods when employment is at a low ebb and money scarce, a community generally notes a marked increase in thefts of all sorts. It is my pleasure to report that your Sullivan County law enforcement officers have apprehended the culprits involved in the many breaks and thefts reported to us in 1958, and that as of this writing there are no unsolved thefts or breaks in our county. Credit for such a fine accomplishment must go to your sheriff, James F. McCusker, and his able deputies, to our local Police Departments and to the State Police personnel assigned to our county.

In past annual reports I have commented that each year a considerable, perhaps disproportionate, amount of time and effort was expended on the so-called non-support cases. Again in 1958 many hours were spent in consultations with mothers, wives and welfare workers in an attempt to compel a recalcitrant father or husband to fulfill his obligation of support. Despite the fact that we use all the legal machinery available to us, the results obtained are not always to our liking. In many cases the family was barely getting by when living together as a unit. After the "bread winner" separated himself from his dependents and established another home for himself, there was bound to be suffering since there was not sufficient income to run two homes. The law does not require two persons to live together even though they are married and have children. These cases are time consuming and county officers everywhere, not only in our county, are frequently hard pressed to come up with a solution which is fair to all concerned.

About twenty felony cases in which the defendants waived indictment by the Grand Jury were disposed of by the Superior Court. Our four Municipal Courts carried their usual heavy case loads, disposing in the aggregate of hundreds of misdemeanors. Your Solicitor handled all cases in the Superior Court, and also those cases in the Municipal Courts wherein the defendant pleaded not guilty and engaged counsel to represent him.

As your chief law enforcement officer, I am pleased to report that 1958 was a successful year in that all offenders were apprehended and brought to justice. To adequately do my job, I need the assistance of all law enforcement officials in the county. The annual report affords me my one opportunity to publicly praise and thank Sheriff McCusker and all our law enforcement officers for their cooperation, efficiency and devotion to duty. I desire also to gratefully acknowledge the consideration shown to me and the invaluable assistance rendered to me by the County Commissioners and the personnel of their offices.
