NEW HAMPSHIRE PRIMARY IMPACT

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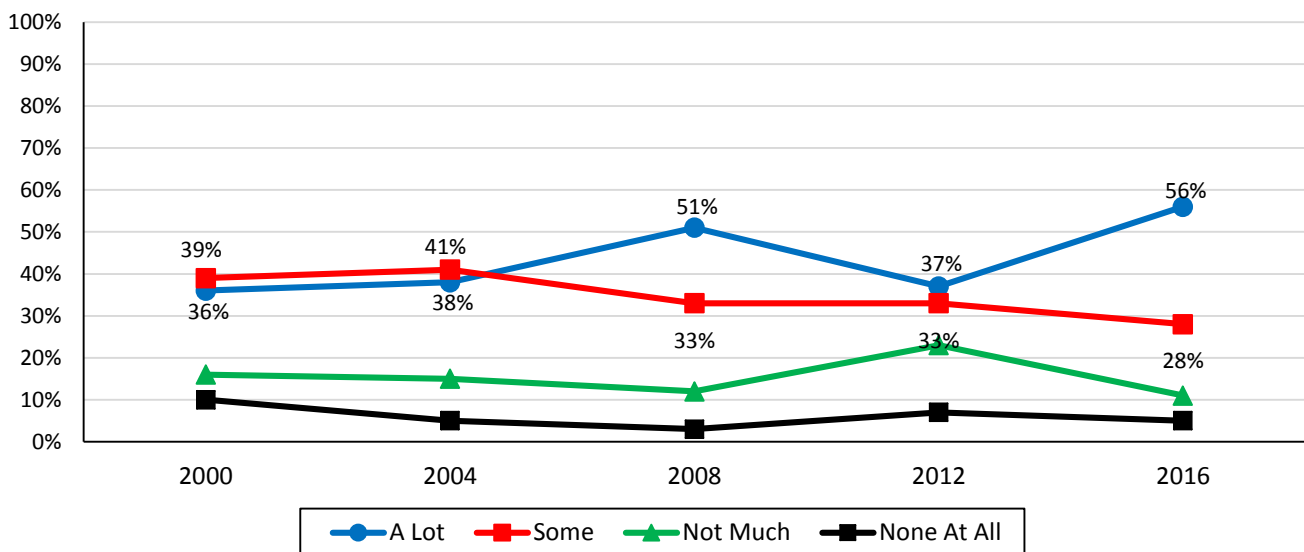
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DURHAM, NH – There was record interest in the 2016 New Hampshire primary and one fourth of all state residents reported going to a campaign event. Most Granite Staters believe that losing the First-in-the-Nation primary would have a negative impact on the state.

These findings are based on the latest **WMUR Granite State Poll**,* conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Six hundred and twenty-one (621) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between April 7 and April 17, 2016. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 3.9 percent. Included were five hundred and fifty-three (553) likely 2016 general election voters (MSE = +/- 4.2%).

Attention Paid to 2016 New Hampshire Primary

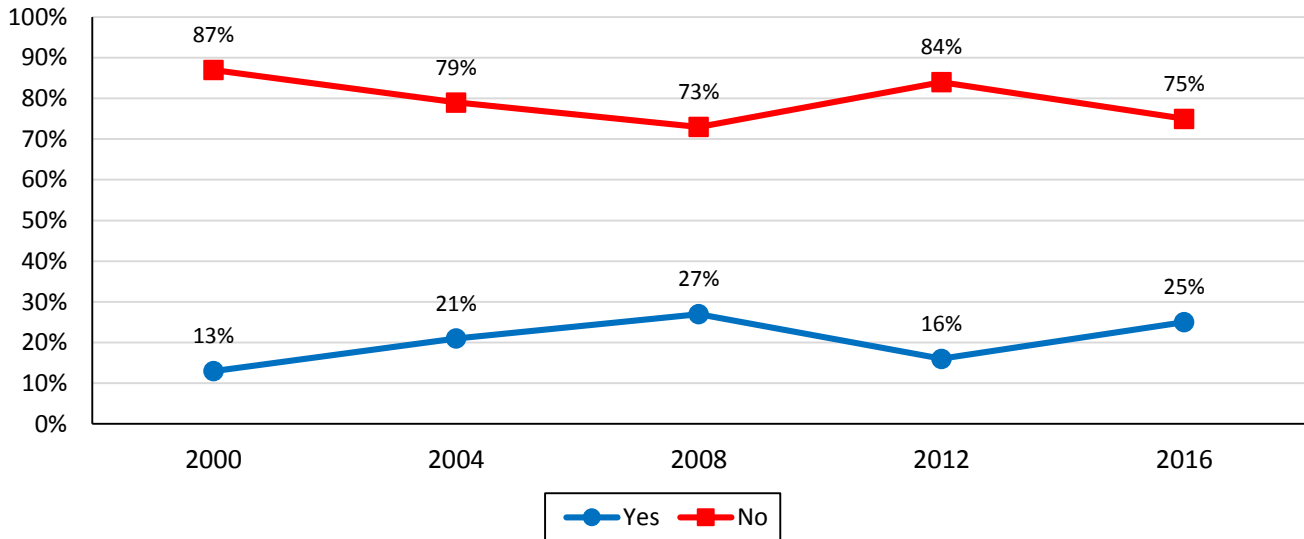
The 2016 primary was contentious for both Republicans and Democrats and spurred record turnout as more than half of all potential voters voted in the primary. The campaigns were certainly effective in spurring interest in the primary as a majority of Granite State adults (56%) say they paid a lot of attention to the 2016 New Hampshire Primary, 28% paid some attention, 11% paid not much attention and 5% paid no attention at all. The percentage of Granite State residents who say they paid a lot of attention to the primary is at its highest since the Granite State Poll began measuring this in 2000. Unsurprisingly, Republicans (63%) and Democrats (57%) were more likely to say they paid a lot of attention to the primaries than Independents (43%). Among Granite Staters who said they voted in the primary, 65% said they paid a lot of attention to the primary.

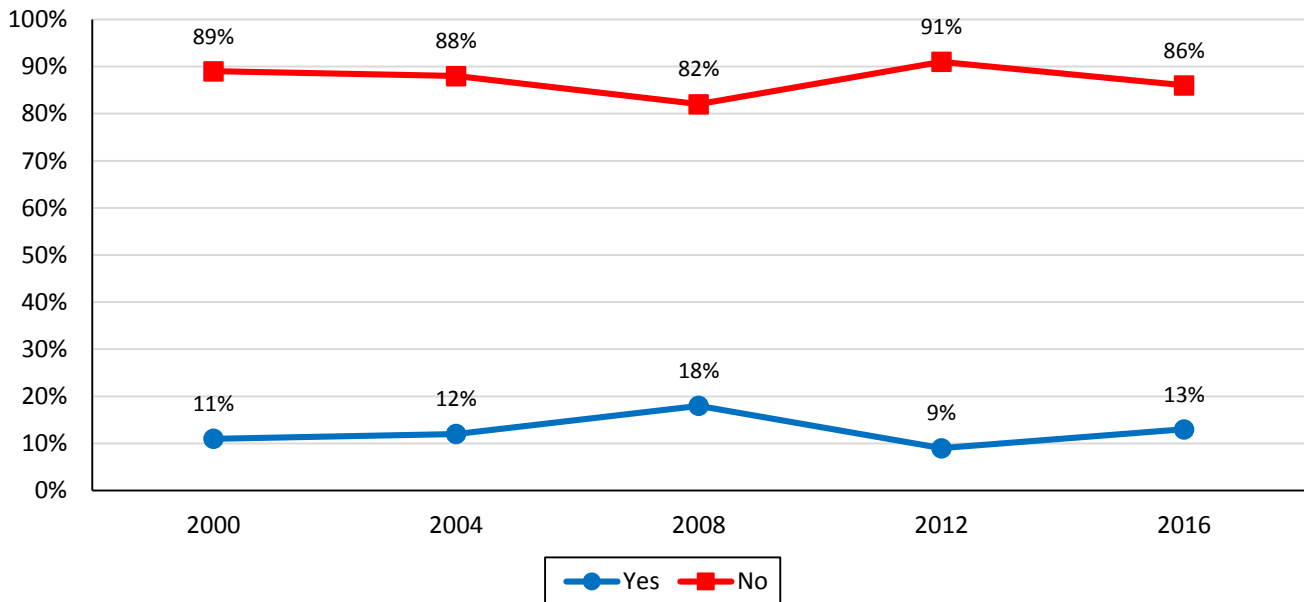
Attend an Event With A Presidential Candidate?

A hallmark of the New Hampshire Primary is the expectation that candidates must meet with voters and New Hampshire residents do take advantage of this opportunity. One in four (25%) New Hampshire adults say they attended at least one event with a presidential candidate during the 2016 campaign. Residents with a post-graduate education (37%), liberals (36%) and residents who regularly listen to conservative talk radio (36%) were most likely to say they attended an event. Nearly one in three (30%) of New Hampshire Primary voters said they attended a campaign event.



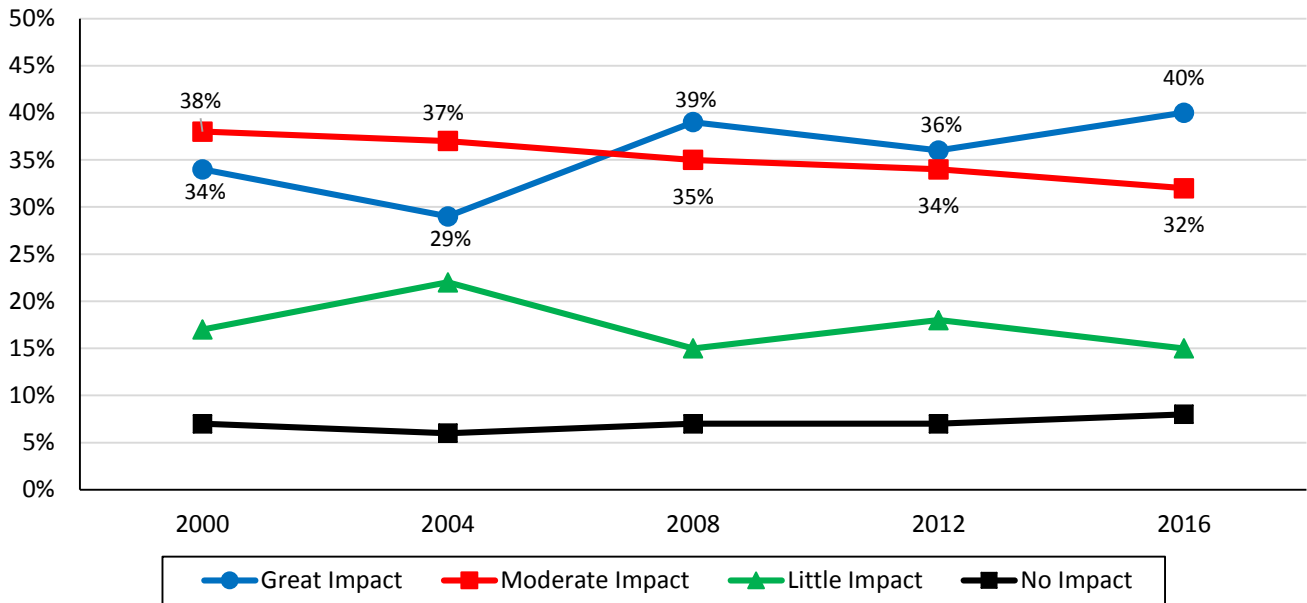
Shook Hands With A Presidential Candidate?

Not only do voters get to see presidential candidates, many actually personally meet the candidate -- 13% of New Hampshire residents say they shook hands with a presidential candidate during the 2016 campaign. Listeners of conservative talk radio (24%), readers of the Boston Globe (24%), and residents with a post-graduate education (23%) are most likely to say they shook hands with a presidential candidate. Fifteen percent of Primary voters said they had shaken hands with a candidate.



Impact of NH Losing First Primary Status

Despite attempts from other states to take away New Hampshire's First in the Nation status, New Hampshire has maintained its position since 1920. Most Granite State residents (72%) believe that if New Hampshire were to lose the first primary it would have a great (40%) or moderate (32%) impact on the state. Just 15% say it would have little impact, 8% say it would have no impact and 5% were unsure. This concern is bi-partisan as 41% of Democrats, 40% of Republicans and 38% of Independents believe this would have a great impact on the Granite State.



Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest WMUR Granite State Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center and funded by WMUR-TV, Manchester, NH. Six hundred and twenty-one (621) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed in English by landline and cellular telephone between April 7 and April 17, 2016. If a household included more than one adult, the adult who had the most recent birthday was selected to be interviewed.

The margin of sampling error is +/- 3.9 percent for the entire sample. Included were five hundred fifty-three (553) likely 2016 general election voters (MSE +/- 4.2%). These MSE's have not been adjusted for design effect. The design effect for the survey is 1.1%.

The random sample used in the WMUR Granite State Poll was purchased from Marketing Systems Group (MSG), Horsham, PA. MSG screens each selected telephone number to eliminate non-working numbers, disconnected numbers, and business numbers to improve the efficiency of the sample, reducing the amount of time interviewers spend calling non-usable numbers.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households. Additionally, data were weighted by respondent sex, age, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response. Due to rounding, percentages may not sum to 100%. The number of respondents in each demographic below may not equal the number reported in cross-tabulation tables as some respondents choose not to answer some questions.
