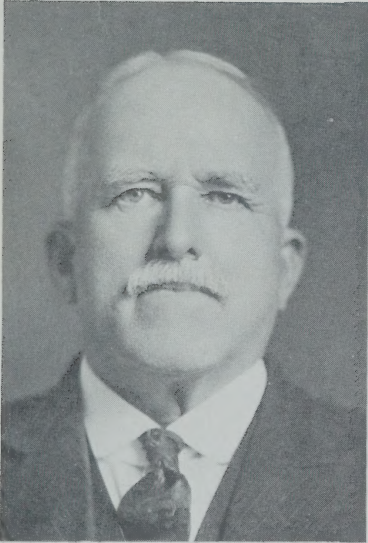

You are hereby notified to meet at the Kenneth A. Brett School in said Tamworth on Tuesday, the eight day of March, next at Ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE No. 49. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for \$19,124.54 for the future purchase of Town road equipment.

ARTICLE No. 50. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw all monies and accrued interest from the Computer Capital Reserve Fund, said monies to be used to pay for the computer.

ARTICLE No. 51. To see if the town will vote to hire a Town Manager and raise and appropriate the necessary funds to do the same.

ARTICLE No. 52. To see if the town will vote to exempt itself from the laws (RSA 645:8 and 654:9) that allow the Town Clerk to accept the applications of new voters wanting to be added to the

checklist. Exemption (RSA 654:10) will mean that all voters registering for the first time must apply directly to the Supervisors. A "YES" vote means that you want the Supervisors only to register new voters. A "NO" vote means that you want the Town Clerk to continue accepting new applications.

ARTICLE No. 53. We, the undersigned, hereby ask that the following article be inserted in the warrant of the upcoming annual town meeting.

"Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 80: 58-86 for a real estate tax lien procedure? These statutes provide that tax sales to private individuals for non-payment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with a real estate tax lien procedure under which only a municipality or county where the property is located or the state may acquire a tax lien against land and buildings for unpaid taxes".

ARTICLE No. 54. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to accept private donations of land, interest in land or money to be deposited into the conservation fund for the purposes of contributing to the local matching portion required for acquiring conservation land or interest in land and other costs associated therewith for permanent conservation use under the N.H. Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP)RSA 221-A, and authorize the Selectmen to apply for and accept the state matching funds under the LCIP for the purposes of acquisition of the fee or lesser interest in conservation land. Said appropriated or donated funds and state matching funds may be expended by majority vote of the conservation commission.

ARTICLE No. 55. To the voters of Tamworth.

Non-Binding Referendum:

Are you in favor of the Conway State Liquor store being open on Sundays.?

ARTICLE No. 56. To authorize the Trustees of the Trust Funds to spend monies from their reserves to purchase land for cemetery purposes.

ARTICLE No. 57. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend funds from the State,

Federal, or any other governmental unit, or any private source which might become available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95b.

ARTICLE No. 58. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any property acquired by Tax Collector's deeds.

ARTICLE No. 59. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

ARTICLE No. 60. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Finance Committee held six meetings in which every warrant article involving a request for an appropriation was reviewed. Representatives of petitioned articles and organizations were given opportunities to present reasons for their requests and to answer questions from members of the Committee on any point needing clarification. After all requests were discussed, the Committee voted on all articles concerning money. The results of these votes are recorded with the articles.

Before we give a brief explanation of the Committee's voting on certain articles, we would like to explain the "abstained" vote on certain articles. An abstention is neither a negative vote, nor is it a positive vote. If we may quote from Webster's Third New International Dictionary, copyright 1981, the definition for abstention is: "withholding of a vote; nonparticipation in political life or in international affairs." As you know, it is very difficult to find volunteers to serve on committees that are not involved in some way or another, with other committees. Hence, when there is an abstained vote on various articles, it is because one or more members of the finance Committee are involved with that specific organization requesting the appropriation.

Tamworth Outing Club \$2,000.00

We recommended that this petition be amended to read "for the operation of Babe Ruth and Little League" because of insurance responsibilities.

Tamworth Constitutional Bicentennial Commission \$5,000.00

The reason there was a majority of "no" votes was because we were unsure of insurance status, and we felt the Town should be protected from possible liable. Also, we felt there would be better supervision of the area and events where the Family Day events take place. Last year, we were led to believe this was a one year program, not a five year on-going event.

Meals-On-Wheels \$3,000.00

We recommended this request be amended because Tamworth Meals on Wheels program does not receive the appropriation, but Ossipee Concerned Citizens does.

Cook Memorial Library \$2,500.00/painting

The Finance Committee felt that this added expense could be delayed another year because of the substantial operation expense increase needed this year. We also felt this should be "put out to bid" before it is approved.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank the people who came to the Finance Committee meetings to answer our questions and clarify other points of interest. If you would like to become a member of the Committee, please contact the Selectmen's Office.

The Fire Department held eleven regular drills in 1987. Four members took the EMT course, one took a white-water rescue course, two took high angle rescue, eight participated in an air-pak class and the department held a controlled burn drill for a total of 1,006.5 hours of training.

At present there are 19 fire fighters on the roster. We need more, and if there is any one interested in joining, please contact me or one of the other fire fighters for an application and a copy of the by-laws.

Although the number of chimney fires are down, we are finding poorly installed stoves and unsafe chimneys. We have pamphlets on the safe installation and use of wood stoves and they can be yours for the asking.

Remember all new homes must have hard-wired smoke detectors and all other homes at least battery operated smoke detectors. They are probably the best life-saving measure you can install in your home.

1987 REPORT OF EMERGENCY SERVICES TAMWORTH RESCUE SQUAD

1987 saw many changes for the Squad. The State authorized defibrillator, drip and I.V. therapy in the field, and we now have 4 of our 5 E.M.T.s certified to use the defib unit, and 3 in the process of being certified to use I.V. therapy. The purchase of a defibrillator during the year would not have been possible without the generosity of townspeople, or service organizations, and companies, who donated \$8,000 for the unit. Thanks also to Dottie Provenzano and Louise Birch, who worked so hard to raise the funds.

Citizen CPR training is essential when a defib unit is in use by emergency personnel in the field. To this end, we have given 6 courses in CPR to Tamworth residents, and more are anticipated in 1988.

Squad members participated in various training courses including mountain search and rescue, scene command, patient assessment, and E.O.A.

We accepted, with regret, the resignation of Dom Bergen, a long-time dedicated member, and Captain for several years. We currently have 5 E.M.T.s, 3 first responders, and two E.M.T. trainees. With the continued growth of the town, we are always in need of new members.

Once again we have been able to hold the budget down. Thanks to the generosity of towns people and out-of-state friends who have sent in many personal donations throughout the year.

TAMWORTH PLANNING BOARD ANNUAL REPORT 1987

The very steady growth in Tamworth was evident again in 1987. The planning board reviewed and approved projects which will eventually add 200 new buildings in town. Most of these will be single family or cluster type housing, however some may become commercial. As we are already reviewing projects which could result in 50 to 75 new house lots in 1988 it is obvious that growth in Tamworth has not yet peaked.

The Zoning committee has made much progress in the past year. A draft ordinance has been prepared and is currently being reviewed by The Lakes Region Planning Commission as well as land use attorneys. Additional funds will be requested in 1988 to continue the committee's work. It is expected that a special town meeting will be held in the summer of 1988 to vote on the zoning ordinance.

TAMWORTH CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT FOR 1987

TRUST FOR N.H. LANDS - The Conservation Commission is participating in this statewide program to protect environmentally valuable land through purchase or easement. The State will provide matching funds to a Town for this, for which the Town match may be by gifts of land or of easement, or by cash. A Task Force is being set up, headed by Commission member Loralie Gerard, to develop goals for the program, inventory unprotected land of local importance and make application to the State.

PRIME WETLANDS. This project, on which the Commission has worked for several years was completed in 1987 with a vote by the Town to designate eight wetland area as "prime," thereby giving them additional protection from dredge and fill. After the vote Commission maps and wetlands description were submitted to the Wetlands Board and were accepted.

DREDGE AND FILL. There have been ten applications for dredge and fill in wetlands, which the Commission has checked with on site inspection and reported to the Wetlands Board. All were minor and approval was recommended, though in two cases restrictions were suggested, and were approved by the Wetlands Board. In two other dredge and fill cases the Commission reported violations for failure to make application. One was a major project for a causeway across Chocorua River. This, the Commission felt, was unsound environmentally, and when application was made the Wetland Board held a hearing. Commission members testified at the hearing and the application was rejected. Fill already in place was ordered to be removed.

TRAILS. Commission trails are monitored annually for needed work. On Big Pines Trail trees across the trail were cleared by volunteer work of a Commission member. There are serious problems on Jackman North Trail, some caused by beaver and some by clear cutting across the trail where it goes on private land (for which the Commission has a Right of Way.) It will involve some expense to correct these, and a decision on how to solve them cannot be made until spring when there is no snow cover.

N.H. ASSOCIATION OF CONSERVATION COMMISSIONS. Four Commission members attended the annual meeting in November which featured workshops on Trust for N.H. Lands, high intensity soil mapping, and powers and duties of Conservation Commission.

REMICK NATURAL AREA on Route 113. The State Highway Dept. offered the Town \$200 for land taking for the new highway here. The Commission appealed, a hearing was held, and an additional \$600 was awarded in compensation for the taking, which involved cutting several fine trees.

**MEETINGS, CONFERENCES AND
WORKSHOPS**

Monthly network meetings of the Carroll County Community Professionals continue to be held at Mountain View Nursing Home in Ossipee. Topics cover health and community projects and concerns. Some of the guests we heard from this past year were: George Lubeley from State Council on Aging who spoke on Preretirement Planning stressing that one can never begin too soon to plan for retirement and avoid the emptiness that so many feel upon retirement; Charles LaCasce from Welfare explained the Home and Community Based Care (HCBC) program which offers financial help and an alternative to nursing home care if it costs less to keep a patient at home; Lora Philip, the nurse evaluator for the New Medico System, Highwatch in Effingham is one of their sites in a series of sites to care for the head injured individual.

January 5 - Met with Dr. Edwin Remick at his office to discuss a patient.

January 23 - Met with Stan Hammond, Selectman to discuss possible financial help for a patient.

February 26 - Met with Barbara Cleveland, Chairman of the T.C.N.A. Board to discuss criteria we need to meet for State Licensing of Home Health Agencies.

March 10 - June Donovan and I attended a workshop on The Living Will in Concord. The legal, medical and ethical aspects were explored. There are 39 statutes, which includes 38 states and

D.C., that have accepted legal Living Wills. New Hampshire is one of those states. In summary, it was felt that we make decisions throughout our life; that it is our **Right** to make the decision how to end our lives. Our office now has Living Will documents and information available to the community.

March 17 - Held the first of our regular staff meetings at the office. The nurses and secretary use this time for support, information exchange, patient conferences and office related needs.

May 21 - The nurses attended an all day workshop at St. Anselm's College. Topics discussed were: The Flu vs. the Common Cold; post Menopausal Zest; Assessing the Elderly who are at risk for falls; and Depression and Loss in the Elderly.

May 27 - The nurses met with Phyllis Hatch from Carroll County Mental Health at the office.

September 14 - Record Review, ten patient charts were reviewed using standardized forms to help us evaluate ourselves and the care we give to our patients.

September 22 - Attended workshop on Ethical Issues in Community Nursing in West Lebanon, New Hampshire. Reviewed a valuable tool enabling the nurse to make ethical decisions which come up every day in home health nursing: such as how to handle the patient who refuses treatment or the issue of forcing patients into nursing homes just because someone feels it is a safer place to be.

September 24 - Met with Ann Lance, R.N. from the State Bureau of Health Facilities Administration who reviewed our agency, policies and procedures and patient records in order to receive our State License which is now mandatory to function as a Home Health Agency in this state. We received our temporary license on October 23, 1987.

October 6 - Carol attended workshop entitled Risk Factors for Heart Disease: Our Patients, Ourselves sponsored by Dartmouth Hitchcock.

October 21 - Met with Policy/Program Review Committee at the office to review our medical/nursing policies.

November 5 - The nurses attended the 4th annual Alzheimer's Conference at Sunny Villa.

COMMUNITY PROJECTS

Meals on Wheels continues to serve a very important function in our town. In their 9th year in Tamworth, their volunteers

delivered hot meals to (10) of our clients. Once again, a big round of applause and thanks goes out to Charlotte Remick, Coordinator and to the volunteer drivers. They all help make my job a little easier. Congregate meals are now served in Madison on Tuesdays and Center Ossipee on Wednesday. Tamworth has recently joined the list who serve a hot lunch in Tamworth on Mondays at the Town House. I attended the December 7 meal and held a Blood Pressure Screening. I plan to be there every 32 months for health screening.

Our monthly Blood Pressure Clinic is still held the last Wednesday of each month at 12:00 noon at the nurse's office. This is a free service. So, no matter what age you are, please stop in and take control of your blood pressure.

In January, I arranged with RSVP (Retired Senior Volunteer Program) to become a Volunteer Station. We now have a limited list of drivers in the area who get reimbursed to transport seniors. But we need more help. If you are over 60 and would like to volunteer driving services to Tamworth seniors, please put your name on our list.

On April 13, I spoke with a group of women at Union Hall who are concerned about weight watching. We discussed nutrition, exercise and blood pressure as it relates to women's health. The evening was topped off with individual blood pressure screenings.

I assisted the Easter bunny on April 17 with the delivery of Easter baskets to six needy families in Tamworth. Special thanks goes to the Food Pantry at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church for providing the dinners.

In August, we hosted Marion Dolon, R.N. who spoke on the Living Will. This meeting was open and free to the public and held at Runnell's Hall.

Peg Marshall, R.N. from Carroll County Home and Health Care and I presented a program on Normal Aging and Dementia at the Nurse's office on October 13. Anyone who was interested was invited free of charge.

In November, we sponsored a CPR recertification course for professionals in town held in the new wing of the firehouse. Again, thanks to our wonderful instructor, David Hughes.

Once again, the Food Pantry at St. Andrew's Church prepared Thanksgiving baskets for T.C.N.A. to deliver to needy residents. Six baskets were delivered. Our deep appreciation and thanks goes to those who helped.

Our yearly children's dental program provided 20 children

from Kenneth Brett School with free dental care. Due to increasing dental care costs and a tightened budget, we were able to only provide service to children up through grade 5, where in the past we've covered through 8th grade.

Once again, Santa Claus made it to 39 individuals and 13 families on December 23. Donations, which helped make Christmas a success, were abundant this year and seen as an all time high. Many, many thanks to the townspeople, the Lion's Club, the T.C.N.A. Board of Directors, and the Food Pantry at St. Andrew's for donating valuable funds, gifts and time. This year, special thanks goes to the Boy Scouts Troop 151 who not only held a fundraiser to add to our bounty, but took time out from school and work to help Santa deliver cheer to the shut-ins and the needy. I hope these boys noticed the joy in the faces of those who received from us all.

Along with letter appeals we send out during the year for your support, the Tamworth Community Nurse Association, Inc. Board organized a special fundraiser last July 4. An open house was held before and during the parade with blood pressure screening in front of the Nurse's office. Barbara Cleveland and I screened 38 people that day. Tee shirts with a constitutional message and map of Tamworth were also sold. We saw this as a successful endeavor. Due to the increasing costs of running a non-profit business and in order to provide quality free care to all Tamworth residents, fundraising will be a major issue for us. We appreciate your generous help at holiday times, but remember, we need your help all year long.

I would like to extend sincere and special thanks to my secretary, June Donovan who always has time to listen to patients, as well as to me and my associate nurse, Carol Lovely, whose reliability and professionalism has made it possible for me to take on a 3 day work week and spend more time with my wonderful daughter, Sydra.

ANIMAL CONTROL 1987

During 1987 I received 88 Animal Nuisance Complaints. The majority of these were canine complaints but horses, cows and cats also caused problems and a skunk sought shelter under the Town Offices. In response to the above complaints, 40 dogs were held at the Tamworth Dog Holding Facility. Most of these were claimed by their owners, two were placed in new homes and three required euthanasia. A total of 1,016 miles were travelled in order to carry out the above responsibilities. Three situations required hearings at Ossipee District Court.

A Rabies Clinic was held in April. Dr. Tevis Kraft gave 25 Rabies Vaccines, and 14 dogs were licensed at this time. A thank you to Ann McGarity who assisted at the Clinic. A Rabies Clinic will be held in April of 1988. The Rabies Vaccine is considerably less expensive when given at this Clinic and I URGE you to attend. There has been a confirmed case of canine rabies in the southern part of New Hampshire. This brings a very serious problem closer to us than has been so for many years. PLEASE MAKE SURE YOUR DOG HAS AN UP TO DATE RABIES INNOCULATION. New Hampshire law RSA 436:100 states: "Every dog shall be revaccinated at such intervals and with such vaccines as the commissioner shall specify from time to time." ALL DOGS MUST HAVE A RABIES VACCINATION AND ALL DOGS MUST BE LICENSED BY 1 MAY 1988.

The on-going dog problem continues to be dogs running at large off their own property. THERE IS A TOWN LEASH LAW. A dog running at large can seriously injure a dog who is tied on his own property as required by law. A dog running at large also causes restrained dogs to bark resulting in unfair complaints. A dog running at large is in danger himself as well as a hazard and a nuisance to others. Please keep your dog on your own property unless accompanied by you.

Another problem is the question of shelter for your dog. New Hampshire law RSA 644:8 states, "cruelty shall include but not be limited to, acts or omissions injurious or detrimental to the health, safety or welfare of an animal, including the abandoning of any animal without proper provisions for its care, sustenance, protection or shelter. A person is guilty of a misdemeanor if he without lawful authority negligently deprives or causes to be deprived any animal in his possession or custody necessary care, sustenance or shelter." This means that you CANNOT leave a dog on your pro-

perty either restrained or otherwise without providing him with a shelter.

Again I remind you that if you cannot reach me directly with a complaint I can be reached on my police radio through the Sheriff's Office or Troop E. You may also bring a dog found running at large to the Town Facility and place him in a pen provided you leave information as to where the dog was found and the nature of the complaint. Your complaints about dogs who are causing problems are CONFIDENTIAL. Your identity does not need to be revealed unless you come to Court to validate your complaint. NO DOGS MAY BE REMOVED FROM THE TOWN FACILITY WITHOUT MY AUTHORIZATION.

I enjoy my job as your Animal Control Officer and I do my best to serve you to the best of my ability. But the best implementation of this job depends on you. If you have complaints please let me know. I cannot solve a problem unless I know there is one. I do care about your animals and you.

Two tips from the Village Veterinary Clinic of Rollinsford, N.H.

Canines can get lost more easily in winter. Snow and ice do not retain the smells needed to guide dogs home again.

Check under the hood of your car or blow the horn before starting your car. Cats often curl up near a car engine in search of warmth.

Thank you to the Selectmen, the Town Clerk, Troop E, the Carroll County Sheriff's Office and the Police for their help and cooperation.

COOK MEMORIAL LIBRARY

It is a pleasure to report that more books, magazines, records, tapes, etc. have circulated and more community groups have met at the library this past year than at any other time. It is particularly gratifying to see the increase of circulation of children's books, films and materials over the last two years. Pre-school classes visit the library every other week for a story and to check out books. This gives our young children an early and most important acquaintance with a library and with books. This should make the children more comfortable in a library setting for those all important grade and high school years and at the same time should start our youngsters off with a love of books & a love of reading.

We purchased or were given 667 books, 28 audio tapes, 2 records, received 248 books on individual patron requests for Inter-Library loan, borrowed 119 Large Print books for our visually impaired readers, borrowed movies from the State Library for 150 film showings and utilized the meeting room by 24 different community groups 102 times.

Cook Memorial Library serves as a storage center for the town movie projector (a charge of \$1.00 for maintenance fee), speakers and screen as well as cassette players, collections of Tamworth 1966 Bicentennial slides and U.S. 1976 Bicentennial Celebration slides, and a collection of oral history tapes. The movie projector may be borrowed by any local community group. The library also has a genealogical card file of early Tamworth vital statistics and an alphabetically arranged record of early Tamworth families compiled by Helen Hidden many years ago. We also have on permanent loan from Tamworth Historical Society the remaining volumes of the Tamworth Social Library (founded by Parson Samuel Hidden 1796).

We are deeply appreciative of the Gregg Memorial Fund (for the purchase of children's books), the Bear Paw Memorial Fund, and the other funds in memory of Edna Mason, Merle Dunn, Sal Provenzano, Ruth Flaccus, Ned and Joan Behr--all of which aid us in the purchase of books (more expensive each year) and at the same time enable us to remember a much loved fellow townsman. We are also deeply grateful to the Tamworth Foundation for their generous gift each year.

My personal thanks go to Sally Zink, Bertha Eastwick, Martha Sylvia, Isabel Hoag, Peg Cavalier and Bernie Ulitz for their

love of the library and their help to me with carding & shelving of books. I appreciate very much the time and effort and the love of books given by Louise Wrobleski to the town's children during the many story hours she so ably undertakes at the library. The Garden Club-in the person of Martha Sylvia-has kept our window boxes in colorful flower all summer and in greenery through the winter and we thank her from the heart. Our thanks also to Angie Stearns who supplied us with beautiful fresh flowers right up to frost time. We also express our gratitude to all those people who displayed their art in our hall through the year for the enjoyment of all our patrons. We are always grateful to friends and patrons for the gifts of books, paperbacks, magazines, newspapers & financial donations. Any material we cannot use is placed in our annual book sale.

The Friends of the Library meet on the 4th Tuesday of each month (except in the winter) at 1:30 under the leadership of President Barbara Fromm. New members are always welcome. The group sponsors the summer story hour (directed by Louise Wrobleski with the aid of Debbie Damon), decorates the library so beautifully at Christmas and purchases much needed items for the library. This year they bought a garden hose and holder which Martha Sylvia needed for the outside garden. In addition the Friends participated in the 4th of July Fair by sponsoring a booth.

In 1987 the Library held 3 programs--first on **Minerals & Rocks** by Herman Robinson, second was on **The Moose** by Kris Klein and the third was on flower arranging by Hill Florists. We do plan to offer further programs in 1988. Cook Memorial Library participated in celebrating the U.S. Constitutional Bicentennial by entering a float in the 4th of July parade & winning a Special first for best expressing the Constitutional theme. The Library also held a contest for Brett 7th & 8th graders on the Constitution, held a 2 month exhibit of books and constitutional materials, displayed for 2 weeks the N.H. Constitutional Bicentennial State exhibit for the public, and held a lecture in the meeting room by Professor Jere Daniel on the **Ratification of the Constitution**.

We appreciate the cooperation of Ellen Tirone of the Brett School Library in advising us each year of the areas where books would be needed by children for school reports-in time for us to check our sources and, where possible, to augment our collections.

The Library Board of Trustees meets on 2nd Monday of each month at 4:00 at the library and the public is always welcome.

CHOCORUA LIBRARY

The Chocorua Library continues to be an important part of the cultural and educational life of the town. During the fiscal year ending August 1, 1987, attendance was 1,913 people and 4,061 books were borrowed. Thanks to a very generous bequest by Mrs. James Whittimore, the Library is financially self supporting and no town funds need to be appropriated. For the financial year ending on July of '87, the Library had income of \$17,699 and total expenses of \$17,682.

Many people in town will be interested to know that 1988 will be the 100th anniversary of the Library. We quote from the first incorporation document:

“The undersigned persons subscribe the amount set against their several names for the purpose of funding a public Library in the village of Tamworth Iron Works to be called the **Chocorua Public Library**.

These subscriptions are on condition - **first** that at least three hundred dollars (\$300) shall be subscribed for the purpose named. **Second** that the ownership and control of the Library shall be vested in five trustees, all of whom shall be taxpayers in the town of Tamworth. Third that each subscriber irrespective of the amount of his or her subscription, shall have free uses of the Library as a nontransferable right.”

The names on the list of subscribers are familiar as names of families still in town.

By December 29, 1888, the “Library was ready for use.”

The trustees are planning an event or party sometime later in the year to celebrate this 100th anniversary.

TAMWORTH CONSTITUTIONAL BICENTENNIAL COMMISSION

The Tamworth Selectmen appointed the Tamworth Historical Society as the coordinating group for the celebration of the 200th anniversary of the U.S. Constitution on October 29, 1986. Although the U.S. Congress originally designated 1987 as the year for this celebration, it soon extended the period to cover the anniversary of the ratification of the Bill of Rights in 1991.

The Tamworth Historical Society formed a committee under the name of Tamworth Constitutional Bicentennial Commission with the goal of educating residents of Tamworth in the meaning and significance of the U.S. Constitution. An enthusiastic response led to the involvement of 26 Tamworth organizations.

Tamworth Bicentennial activities included educational programs sponsored by the Tamworth Historical Society, the Arts Council of Tamworth, Cook Memorial Library, Chocorua Public Library and Union Hall. These programs involved New Hampshire speakers of note and historical exhibits. To further the U.S. Constitution theme, Kenneth A. Brett School students did Tamworth historical research, historical essays, a memorial planting, and snow sculptures.

The Tamworth Constitutional Bicentennial Commission coordinated the many activities of the July 4th Family Day beginning with the parade and ending with fireworks. Many colored photos showing the joyful celebration of the Bicentennial are included in the commemorative booklet, **Tamworth, N.H. Celebrates the U.S. Constitution Bicentennial 1787-1987**. The overwhelming response from the community supports the concept of continuing the 4th of July Family Day on a yearly basis.

TAMWORTH RED CROSS WATER SAFETY PROGRAM

The 1987 Tamworth Red Cross Swim Program had another very busy session during the month of July at White Lake State Park. 199 swimmers from toddlers to adults were enrolled in classes ranging from Beginner to Advanced Swimmer and Advanced Lifesaving. We again offered the Swim and Stay Fit Sessions for both adults and children of varying swimming abilities.

This summer some of our students and instructors par-

ticipated in the Mt. Washington Valley Red Cross Chapter Swim-a-Cross held at the Red Jacket Motor Inn. Our swimmers swam over 300 laps for which they obtained sponsors to raise money for the Red Cross. Next summer we plan to attend again and hope more local swimmers will join us.

Currently there is a shortage of qualified water safety instructors and lifeguards throughout the state. This past summer our program was understaffed by one instructor. We encourage our local youth to get certified in Adult Lifesaving which they can do at age 15 and in W.S.I. (Water Safety Instructor) at age 17.

REPORT OF THE TAMWORTH OUTING CLUB

1987

Last year proved to be another busy year for Tamworth Outing Club members who helped organize and sponsor many programs and activities held throughout the year. While these activities have become a tradition that many Tamworth residents and visitors look forward to, the T.O.C. has found it necessary to purchase liability insurance coverage if it is to continue its various activities.

The T.O.C. is requesting an additional \$500 appropriation from the Town this year bringing the total to \$2,000. The \$500 would be used to help defray the cost of liability insurance but the T.O.C. feels the money would be well spent to continue programs that young and old enjoy.

Much of the remaining Town appropriation is used to fund the Little League and Babe Ruth baseball program for children in the summer. Some 90 children between the ages of five and 12 participated in the Little League games last year with another item to be organized this year as the number of players increases. About 25 kids played in the Babe Ruth League last year. Town funds are used for equipment, umpire fees and the purchase of insurance through the National Parks and Recreation Association.

The alpine ski program at the Brett School continues to be popular with approximately 150 children participating in alpine skiing at King Pine once a week while about ten youths opted to learn cross country skiing this year. Through the combined efforts of the school administration and the T.O.C. this program continues to succeed.

Last year was the first year the Ned Behr ski award was presented to the student who improved their skiing ability the most during the season. Ned died last spring, and, because he was the driving force to get the ski program organized and running for many years, the T.O.C. felt having an annual award in his name would insure that his time and effort would be remembered from year to year.

The annual sled dog race on Chocorua Lake was a success last year in part to a timely snowfall on the eve of the two day event and more from the efforts of Stan Coville who organized the event with the New England Sled Club; Nat Steele who helped transport and set the food stand up; trail grooming by Dave Bowles and Nate Hughes' cooking expertise along with other T.O.C. members who helped sell souvenir hats and buttons.

The square dances have had a loyal following in the past year thanks to Nat and Helen Steele's organization and persistence to see them succeed. Dances were held Saturday night at the Town House throughout the summer and from time to time during the winter months.

Thanks to Nate Hughes the annual July Fourth chicken barbeque was once again a success. Many people enjoy the barbeque as a delicious break from the hectic events of the day. Once again T.O.C. members supported the July Fourth parade with one of their award winning floats.

Christmas wouldn't be Christmas in Tamworth without the lights decorating the Brett Memorial tree in the village. Each year T.O.C. members take the time to decorate the tree with lights for the enjoyment of the entire community.

Thanks goes to all T.O.C. members and the board of directors which has made all these activities a success as well as to Tamworth residents who continue to participate and support T.O.C. activities.
