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
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

# TOWN WARRANT

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy in the County of Cheshire, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the 10th of March next, at nine-thirty in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a town clerk, one selectman for three years and all other necessary town officers.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.

Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for snow removal and sanding.

Article 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for repairing town highways and bridges.

Article 5. To see if the town will accept state aid for Construction of Class 5 roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$316.70.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of snow removal equipment.

Article 7. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for street lighting. Article 9. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on all taxes, excepting poll taxes, paid before dates to be designated at this meeting and the selectmen to extend the dates if the adjournment of Legislature necessitates, and all poll taxes shall be collected on or before July 1, 1942.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the fire department.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of—dollars to provide for additional fire protection due to the war emergency.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of dollars to provide watchmen and additional police protection due to the war emergency.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be set aside as a sinking fund, to pay for the water bonds at maturity.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance and purchase of additional land for the water system.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of employing a district nurse.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of dollars for the use of the town health officer and board of health due to the war emergency.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to borrow money to pay town charges.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for observance of Memorial Day.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to allow the American Legion to use the town hall one Friday night each month without pay.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and improvement of cemeteries.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400.00) in addition to the amount required by law for public library.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for the purpose of advertising the resources and natural advantages of the town, said sum to be expended under the direction of the selectmen, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 23. To hear the reports of agents, officers or committees heretofore chosen, and take any action relating thereto.

Article 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

### **REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

To the School Board and Citizens of Troy:

I herein submit my eighth annual report as superintendent of schools.

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# REPORT OF HEADMASTER OF TROY HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

In an attempt to conserve paper and a portion of your time, I shall make this report as brief as possible—itemizing our achievements of the past year rather than elaborating upon them.

1. Our high school enrollment September 1, 1941 was 66.

2. Our high school enrollment September 1, 1940, was 64.

#### NEW EQUIPMENT

The following new equipment has been added to that of the school during the past year:

- 1. A new cooking table for the Home Economics Laboratory.
- 2. A hot-water supply tank piped to the Home Economics Laboratory, the Shop, and the Teachers' Room.
- 3. A new chemistry table, made by the shop classes, and installed during the summer vacation. The new unit is completely equipped with water and gas outlets.
- 4. A used sound motion picture projector purchased by the school children with money earned through musical activities.
- 5. A large tract of land in the rear of the high school building to be used as an athletic field, the completion of which will undoubtedly be held up until after the present emergency.
- 6. A new woodworking lathe for the shop.
- 7. This list does not include a long list of apparatus supplied by the federal government for the use in the Metalworking course.

#### DEFENSE EFFORTS

- 1. Adequate precautions have been taken to cope with air raids and "black-outs."
- 2. The safety and protection of all children has been given careful and painstaking consideration.

- 3. Air raid drills are being practiced weekly.
- 4. Plans have been perfected for immediate and rapid evacuation of all children in the event it becomes necessary.
- 5. The older boys and girls have been organized into auxiliary police, fire, first aid, and conservation committees to assist, guide, and instruct in the school's defense effort.
- 6. Finger prints of all school children are to be taken in the near future.
- 7. Hot lunches are being served each day by the Home Economics Department as a health measure.
- 8. The Mechanic Arts classes are making stretchers, nightsticks, and telephone booths for the local defense council.
- 9. "Paper, supplies, electricity, and heat must be conserved" is the slogan of all of the children. Great savings have already been effected on these items.
- 10. Many of the teaching staff have completed the course in First Aid.
- 11. Instruction in First Aid is now being given to a large class of high school boys and girls.
- 12. Twelve high school boys are acting as messengers for the local defense council.
- 13. Inter-scholastic athletics are at present being conducted as scheduled—and with gratifying results. Because of the transportation problem, however, this type of training will undoubtedly have to be given up in the near future and a program of intra-murals substituted in its place.
- 14. Approval of a course in Vocational Training for Defense Workers has been granted to the school through the Federal Security Agency for out-of-school youth between the ages of 17 and 25. The course is in Metalwork and is being conducted by Mr. Michaud. The course, which is conducted for fifteen hours per week, will last for eight weeks. At the conclusion of the course a new one may be started if there is a demand for it.

#### IN THE CLASSROOM

- 1. Our staff fully realizes that youth needs an opportunity to participate in the war effort, and that they have an urgent desire to feel that they are doing something worth while for the cause. To that end everything possible is being done to associate their work and studies with our "all-out" effort.
- 2. Through the medium of the social studies every teaching effort is bent toward the teaching of pupils of the origin, development, and future prospects of democracy. To teach toward a goal of a greater love for this wonderful country of ours is our motto.

In conclusion may I assure you that the teachers and pupils of Troy stand ready, as never before, to cooperate in every possible way with all of their available means toward securing for their town, state, and nation those tenets of democracy which we Americans hold so dear.

### **REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC**

In this report I am able to state that training in singing, reading, theory, rhythm and appreciation has been conducted as usual.

In May, 1941, Troy High School was represented in the New Hampshire High School Music Festival by the participation of Esther Isakson in the All-State Chorus. Many rehearsals with the Jaffrey High School group were held under the supervision of the Music Supervisor. This group also attended the regional rehearsal in Claremont in April. As this report goes to press we are awaiting acceptance, (or non-acceptance) of our applications for this year's Festival.

In April the Grades and Junior High presented an operetta, "Sally in Our Alley," which was very successful.

An assembly program in the form of a concert was presented by the Troy School Band, Festival Chorus members, and Jaffrey Glee Club, followed by a repeated concert in Jaffrey.

Before Christmas, 1941, a concert was given by the Band, Junior and Senior High Glee Clubs. This included candle-light processionals, antiphonies, and tableaux.

For the first time ever the High School is being represented in the New England Festival by Esther Isakson, who has been admitted to the New England Festival Chorus which, this year, is being held in Keene.

Plans are underway to give the pupils the opportunity of attending this concert on Saturday afternoon, March 21. It is hoped that parents will cooperate to this end as it is a concert of great educational and inspirational value with the Symphony Orchestra of 125 players, chorus of 200 voices and band of 175 players.

I wish to express my gratitude to Superintendent, School Board and teachers for their interest and cooperation.
