REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

As in the past, our town government has run efficiently and effectively. This is evidenced by the fact that we expect the tax rate for 1982 to remain the same as for 1981. Special thanks should be given to all the employees of our town for doing a fine job and keeping their respective budgets in line. The time and effort spent by these employees, acclimating two new selectmen to their routines, is especially appreciated.

The biggest issue faced by the Board of Selectmen this year was the awarding of a Cable TV franchise. Many hours of research, deliberation and meetings were held prior to making a decision. Our citizens Advisory Board made up of Fred Rust, Cynthia Ivey and Lou Baker should receive special commendation for their interest in Cable TV and the time spent in helping the Selectmen reach a decision.

In the years ahead, we look forward to the continued orderly growth of our community and the ongoing dedication of our employees.

REPORT OF THE TOWN MANAGER

In spite of it all, "Operation Greenup" (the post windstorm cleanup) was a success, and all things considered, the town did not look too bad by summer. Again, the cooperative spirit of Watervillians was in evidence as the townspeople worked hard to restore the visual attractiveness of our town.

Another major project which became a reality was the construction of the long awaited trail bridges and the opening of the Mad River Trail to replace the obliterated River Path.

1982 marks ten years since the voters adopted the Selectmen-Town Manager form of government. It has been a period of growth and transition for the Selectmen and I. It is also time to recognize that we are now entering a period where due to age capital improvements will become necessary during the years to come. Equipment that was new years ago is showing signs of wear. The Fire Station/Town Office, which was originally designed only as a fire station has become crowded by the various town functions.

It is time that a master plan for capital improvements be formulated. Such a plan will allow the orderly replacement of major equipment.

Finally, credit should go to the dedicated and hard working employees of the town. Within the framework of government, they truly are the town's most valuable asset without whom the high level of services that the citizens enjoy would not be possible.

REPORT OF THE PUBLIC SAFETY DIRECTOR

1982 was a routine yet active year for the Department of Public Safety.

High visibility is the policy of the Police Division with the deterrence of criminal activity being the department's goal.

The absence of major crime indicates that this goal is being achieved.

The department's emergency medical training has been improved with the addition of full time emergency room doctors at the Sceva Speare Hospital in Plymouth.

A training program using these physicians as instructors has been developed and will continue on an ongoing basis.

Recruiting of new department members became a matter of importance after several members moved from Waterville Valley. Efforts in this regard were successful and the "class of 1982" is now in training.

1982 will see additional emphasis being placed on building inspections and code enforcement in an effort to ensure that buildings are being constructed and maintained in a safe manner.

The department would like to thank the citizens of the town who have supported us and have cooperated in helping make Waterville Valley a safe and pleasant town in which to work and live.

REPORT OF THE RECREATION DIRECTOR

Now in its third year of operation, the Municipal Recreation Department has been offering a variety of programs and activities to residents, guests, and families in Waterville Valley.

This past year the Recreation Department offered over 50 different programs and special events. Programs such as Western Fun Nights, Creative Clowning Workshops, Volleyball, Mystery Bus Rides, Roller Skating, "Locals" Broomball, and much more.

Along with two assistant interns we served over 4500 people during the summer months. It was a busy time and also a period of transition for the Recreation Department with a new staff. We offered an assortment of summer programs with some of the favorites being Ice Cream Socials, Movies, Softball, Bingo, and Hikes. We are looking forward to serving even more participants for the summer of 1982, and seeing the return of many familiar faces.

Winter programs have also been successful with activities such as ping pong and backgammon tournaments, roller skating, inside games and activities, and special events.

Holidays in Waterville Valley are always special, not only for the residents, but for the guests as well. For instance, who could forget the Halloween Haunted House and the mystery ride, Christmas Caroling, and of course, the ever popular return of the infamous Reindeer at the Annual Christmas Dinner.

I'd like to thank you all for being so supportive of the Recreation Department and in offering your help, suggestions, ideas, and in developing a real sense of community spirit.

REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL SERVICES DEPARTMENT

Things ran smoothly in the Municipal Services Department during this past year.

All systems functioned well with increased demands being placed upon them.

The quality of treatment of wastewater continues to meet State and Federal standards; the purity of water being pumped from our wells requires no chlorination and the Town of Ashland is willing to enter into a new multi-year contract for the use of their sanitary landfill. All things considered, the town is in good shape as far as these vital services are concerned.

OSCEOLA LIBRARY SUMMARY OF THE YEAR 1981

The Osceola Library had a very good year in 1981. Our circulation reached 1,687 volumes, about 500 more than in any previous year. This total is very gratifying to the Trustees and volunteers who work so hard to make it successful. So many patrons admire the library and compliment us on our selection of new and popular books which they say are only available in larger libraries after months on a waiting list

We purchased 70 new books in 1981, fiction, general and children's and are very grateful to the many people who donated a variety of books, a total of 134. The bookmobile comes much less frequently; only one visit during this year instead of the usual three, due to severe cuts in the State Library budget. We miss the variety that the State books provide.

The front door was replaced during the summer as well as a double-hung sash on the west wall. The hour sign on the front door was rebuilt thanks to Merrill Hunt. New bookcases were built, two each side the full length of the east and west walls under the windows, the labor again being donated by Merrill. In spite of the nearly 70 feet of additional shelving, we are still pressed for space.

A great deal more work was done on the new land behind the library thanks to a generous donation by the Rusts to the Conservation Commission for library landscaping. More fill was added and the whole area was leveled as much as possible. A small raised flower bed was constructed and planted with perennials and grass seed was spread over the bare ground. The dead trees and brush were cleaned out along the edges. Not only is the appearance of the grounds greatly improved but the land is now usable for picnics and resting in the shade.

As the use of the library increases with demand for more and varied books, it becomes increasingly evident that an addition to the building will be needed in the near future. The library seems the logical place to display and store the Town's historical papers and objects which are presently housed at the Town office and in numerous attics. We do not even have a suitable place to keep the two albums of old Waterville pictures where visitors to the library can find them to look at. So many people ask us why we do not have more material available on the history of the valley.

As always, the Trustees wish to thank the faithful volunteers who man the library and all those who have contributed so much time for odd jobs, construction and repairs as well as the many donors of books.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board of Waterville Valley was again extremely active in 1981. The number of projects considered were not numerous, however, the variety of sub-division projects under consideration has forced the Planning Board to seriously evaluate the overall planning objectives of the community.

In 1981 the Planning Board considered sub-division for whole unit condominiums, timeshare conversions of existing lodges and a condominiumized hotel conversion. These are added to the typical minor sub-divisions that also occurred. Some of the other specific topics that had been completed during the 1981 year are:

1. With the approval at the March 1980 Annual Town Meeting for site plan review, the Planning Board has finalized a comprehensive Site Plan Review Regulation which is now in effect for the town of Waterville Valley.
2. New Hampshire State legislative changes have required rewrite updates for both the Sub-division Regulation and Zoning Regulations. The sub-division regulations have been updated and changed accordingly and final approval for the zoning regulation changes will be voted on at the 9 March 1982 town meeting.

Every year the Planning Board takes this opportunity to encourage residents of the community to observe the growth trends in Waterville Valley and express their feelings to any Planning Board members. Only through this constant process of evaluation and communication can we do our job effectively.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION
Report For Year 1981

The chief activity for the Commission this year was a citizen-financed tree-planting project along Valley Road and on Osceola Library land. This enterprise, suggested by Joan Corcoran following the Big Blow of December 1980 as a way to enhance the appearance of the road entering the Valley and give townspeople a feeling of participation, resulted in \$2,110.00 being donated for the general tree fund and an additional \$1,171.50 given specifically for the Library planting. The total of \$3,281.50 from 39 different donors, added to a special \$500 gift from Kay Tucker in the wake of the Big Blow, gave us a sum of \$3,781.50 of which \$3,113.54 was spent in the fall. We thus have \$667.96 left to finish the job in the spring.

The Commission held four regular meetings; several special meetings were held to consult with Gifford Nutbrown and Bill Kennedy on plans for tree purchase and planting. In the end, a large part of the physical work was done by Fred Rust, Bill Kennedy and George Webster, with assists from Gifford, the Watrville Co., and the Town. Thirty-five trees were planted at various locations, along the borders of the golf course, at the Valley Road-Loop Road corner, at the Stadium Court, and at the Library. Extensive clearing and grading of the Library plot was done in the process, under Fred's direction, with the result that this property probably looks better than it ever has.

As of December, John March was preparing a revision of our Walking Guide, updating that which was printed in 1978, and the new guide is expected to go to the printer early in 1982. The 1978 printing of 2500 copies has been used up, and \$464.15 has been received in sales, @ 25¢ a copy, through the end of 1981.

The \$500 Town Appropriation is being allocated to help with completion of the tree-planting project to pay part of expense of reprinting the guide, and for N.H. Assoc. of Conservation Commissions dues and a donation to the Squam Lakes Science Center.

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FOREST FIRE WARDEN REPORT

Since the first forest fire laws were written in 1895, the state and local community governments have worked together to prevent and combat forest fires. The State Forester has divided the State into ten districts with a full time District Forest Fire Chief, and the organization is charged with assisting the municipal forest organization in any way possible.

All outside burning, when the ground is not covered with snow, is permitted only after obtaining a written fire permit from the local Forest Fire Warden. Penalty for burning without a permit when one is required is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine up to \$1,000 or a jail term up to one year or both.

We have been very fortunate to have had no serious forest fires in the Town since the devastating windstorm of December 3, 1980.

GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

In our continued effort to communicate more directly with the taxpaying citizens of Grafton County, we are taking this opportunity to reach you through your annual town/city report.

We are pleased to report that, due to the unusually high interest rates during our 1981 fiscal year, Grafton County had a very good investment year, realizing \$71,375 in interest earned, which contributed to the \$257,458 surplus, most of which was applied to the fiscal year 1982 budget to reduce tax requirements. Budget appropriations for the current fiscal year beginning July 1, 1981 are about on target. However, we may be looking to a deficit at fiscal year end and we definitely anticipate a sizeable budget increase next fiscal year due to shifts in programs and financial responsibilities without accompanying federal/state funding to administer these programs, many of which are mandatory, not optional. Impact is already being felt by towns as well as counties in the educational, child protection/placement, and medicaid programs. In line with state and local "belt tightening", the County Commissioners will be taking a hard look at budget requests this next fiscal year. Priorities must be established to "hold the line" in future budget appropriations.

The computerized bookkeeping system is working out well, proving to be an asset in controlling appropriations and allowing on-demand reports showing the County's financial position at any given time.

Grafton County Commissioners, along with the maintenance supervisors and Nursing Home administration, continue to work closely with Dynamic Integrations in effecting energy conservation measures, both for the Courthouse and Nursing Home Complex. Many dollars have been and will continue to be saved through these efforts.

Superior Court has requested finishing the second courtroom in the very near future as there is a greater demand for jury hearings and use of two courtrooms at the same time. The Commissioners have engaged Wright-Pierce architectural firm to submit proposals for finishing the second courtroom, with the intent of having funds included in the next fiscal year's budget to carry out the project.

Again this year the farm has been productive. Cattle sales grossed an all time high of \$35,235. While cattle sales have been very successful, our herd has remained consistently highly rated in the Dairy Herd Improvement Association reports. Cattle were entered into eight various sales in three different states. The total herd, including milkers, heifers and calves, numbers about

187. The swine program has also had a most fruitful year, with a combination of production and sales. As in the years past, we maintain a waiting list for piglets. There have been quite a few field trips through the facility by the local school districts and Future Farmers Association, utilizing our farm for their educational programs. The Nursing Home purchased \$32,402 of food and produce from the farm, which was advantageous to our residents by having fresh produce in season and frozen produce during the winter months, not to mention the cost saving factor.

Grafton County had the highest census ever this past year in the Jail and House of Correction, resulting in an increase in management problems such as overcrowding, staff stress, and much higher than anticipated inmate medical costs. Inappropriate admissions to county jails of mentally disturbed inmates has created a great portion of inmate behavior problems within the facility.

The Commissioners hold their regular meeting every Monday, except holidays, at 9:30 a.m. in the Commissioners' Office of the Grafton County Courthouse, followed by a second meeting at the Grafton County Nursing Home Complex at 1:00 p.m., which regularly includes visits to farm and jail facilities. Public and press are welcome, and, in fact, are encouraged to attend the meetings.

Article 19: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to help support advertising, resort and regional associations and the Visitor Information Center during the ensuing year.

Article 20: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for donations to hospitals and health organizations during the ensuing year.

Article 21: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Conservation Commission during the ensuing year.

Article 22: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to operate the Waterville Valley Post Office during the ensuing year.

Article 23: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and ap-

appropriate for the installation and maintenance of street lights during the ensuing year.

Article 24: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the cost of cemetery maintenance during the ensuing year.

Article 25: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the cost of town insurance during the ensuing year.

Article 26: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of town debts during the ensuing year.

Article 27: To see if the Town will vote to establish a contingency fund to meet the cost of unanticipated expenses during the ensuing year in an amount not to exceed (1%) one percent of the amount appropriated for town purposes during 1981 all in accordance with RSA 31:4.

Article 28: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of capital equipment during the ensuing year, and to determine whether such sum shall be raised by borrowing under the Municipal Finance Act or otherwise.

Article 29: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for capital road construction and repair, and to determine whether such sum shall be raised by borrowing under the Municipal Finance Act or otherwise.

Article 30: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of repairing the Fire Station-Town Office roof, and to determine whether such sum shall be raised by borrowing under the Municipal Finance Act or otherwise.

Article 31: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of planning an expansion of the Fire Station-Town Office building, and to determine whether such sum shall be raised by borrowing under the Municipal Finance Act or otherwise.

Article 32: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of the receipt of taxes to pay town obligations.

Article 33: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept, and expend such Federal, State or other assistance as may be available for the purpose embraced in this warrant, and to pass any vote relative thereto.

Article 34: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply

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for, receive, and expend for the purposes voted in this warrant any interest earned on proceeds of any serial bonds or notes in connection with such projects.

Article 35: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of Four Thousand Forty Eight Dollars from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as an offset against the amount appropriated under Article 13 to defray the cost of the Public Safety Department.

Article 36: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer, lease, rent, sell and or convey or otherwise dispose of any real property acquired by the Tax Collector's deed.

Article 37: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 76:15-a to authorize the semi-annual collection of property taxes.

Article 38: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to grant a two-percent (2%) discount to any taxpayer for early payment of his property taxes.

Article 39: To transact such other business as may legally come before the meeting.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Waterville Valley Elementary School in said District on the eighth day of March, 1982, at 7:30 p.m. to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To see what action the District will take relative to the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers.
2. To see if the District will vote to establish a contingency fund in accordance with New Hampshire RSA 198:4-b, such contingency fund to meet the costs of unanticipated expenses that may arise during the year and further to see if the district will appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) therefor.
3. To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to make application for, accept, and expend on behalf of the School District all gifts, advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes, as may now or hereafter be available or forthcoming from the United States government, the State of New Hampshire, or any other federal, state or local agency.
4. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials, employees, and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.

WATERVILLE VALLEY ELEMENTARY SCHOOL FACULTY REPORT

Our school enrollment this year consists of 12 students, grades 2 through 8. Grades 5-8 are being taught by Mr. Richard Scott, whose experience in teaching reading and English and in coaching at the high school level is serving as a good basis for instruction of the older children. Mrs. Seeger is teaching grades 2-4 and 5th grade math. We have 2 new specialists this year. Linda Deneau, with degrees in Elementary Ed. and Art. Ed., is our art teacher and Debbie Nechay, town recreation director, is our physical education teacher. Terry Lidral continues as our music instructor, providing both class lessons and individual instrumental lessons each week.

Our goals this year continue to be an emphasis on basic communication skills, problem solving skills in math, and the social skills of teamwork, cooperation, and respect for other people.

Jane Banquer Burnham, a printer from Warner, N.H. is our artist-in-residence this year. Jane's work has been on display at Dartmouth and Boston art shows this fall, and her dynamic approach to the art of printing has inspired our students to produce their own masterpieces using materials ranging from styrofoam to stencils. A mural depicting the different media is on display at the school.

Our students are again participating in the weekly ski instruction program sponsored by the Waterville Company.

Our library, with a collection which provides for the needs of our wide range of student ages and interests, has been catalogued with the able assistance of Donna Crovetti.

This fall we have travelled to Boston to the opera, to the Salem Museums, to Mt. Major in Alton, and to Campton Elementary School to share in the visiting artists assembly programs which the two schools sponsor.

Mr. Hunt, our custodian, continues to do an admirable job of keeping our school spotless, safe, and comfortable.

Teaching in a community where the interest in and support for the school is as constant and enthusiastic as it is in Waterville Valley is a very satisfying experience. We thank you for caring. Your children reap the benefits of your continued support.

REPORT FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS WHAT IS A SCHOOL ADMINISTRATIVE UNIT?

New Hampshire School Law states that the State Board of Education has "the same powers of management, supervision, and direction over all public schools in this state as the directors of a business corporation have over its business, except as otherwise limited by law." The state of New Hampshire has 168 school districts which the State Board of Education has divided into approximately 47 School Administrative Units, each administered by a superintendent of schools.

Schools, like other public agencies and business corporations, must have a management system. The New Hampshire school management system is the School Administrative Unit. School board members who are elected by the voters of their individual school districts comprise the policy making School Administrative Unit board. The superintendent serves as the executive head of the public schools, and is responsible for planning and administering their affairs subject to statutory requirements, the regulations of the State Board of Education, and the policies of the local districts. In performance of these duties, the superintendent is responsible to the State Board of Education through its Commissioner, and the board or boards of the School Administrative Unit.

School Administrative Unit budgets, following a public hearing, are annually voted by the School Administrative Unit School board. The budget provides for the salaries of the superintendent and other School Administrative Unit personnel along with other necessary central office expenditures. School Administrative Unit school boards decide the number of persons to be employed, their duties, and their salaries. Local districts share the services provided by the School Administrative Unit and share the costs of operating a central office. The local school district's share of the School Administrative Unit budget is determined by two factors: half on the basis of pupil membership and half on the basis of equalized valuation. Approximately 285 million tax dollars will be expended in 1981-1982 to educate New Hampshire's 180 thousand public school students. About 2 percent of the above expenditures is spent to provide management services to the 168 school districts.

School Administrative Unit #48 includes the communities of Campton, Holderness, Plymouth, Rumney, Thornton, Waterville Valley, and Wentworth. It is one of the largest in the State of New Hampshire from the standpoint of school boards (9) and square miles (200). It was formed so that

local school districts could join together to provide themselves with necessary administrative services they could not independently furnish efficiently or economically. Services provided include, but are not limited to: budget preparation and control; building and maintenance programs; state and federal, record keeping and reporting; recruitment and employment of all staff; public relations, annual reports; supervision and evaluation of all staff; curriculum development and coordination of school programs; staff development and retraining; energy conservation activities; coordination and development of federal programs; school health services; school food service programs; special education programs; salary preparation and fringe benefit documentation; and teacher negotiations and professional assistance to school boards in many areas.

The Superintendent of Schools and his staff function so that the above mentioned services are provided with a single goal in mind—to provide the best possible education to the children in our communities in a cost-effective design. The attainment of this objective is enhanced by your continued support and cooperation.

**EXPLANATION OF SUPERINTENDENT'S AND
ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY FOR 1980-1981**

Chaper 189, Section 58 Revised Statutes Annotated of the State of New Hampshire, requires that the school district annual report show the total amount paid to the Superintendent of Schools as per the following quotation: "Reports. Each superintendent of a School Administrative Unit shall annually prepare a report of the total salary paid to the superintendent, showing in detail the amount paid by the state and each local school district and their share of same . . . Said report shall be included in the annual report of the respective school district as a separate entry. A like report and entry shall be made for each assistant superintendent, teacher consultant, and business administrator if any is in service in the unit."

One-half of the School Administrative Unit expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the unit on the basis of adjusted valuations. One-half is pro-rated on the basis of average daily membership in the school for the previous school year ending June 30th. The salary of \$29,838 which was received by the Superintendent of Schools of School Administrative Unit #48 during 1980-1981 was made up as follows: \$2,500 paid by the State of New Hampshire and \$27,338 was prorated among the school districts comprising the School Administrative Unit. Allowance for \$1,500 travel within the Unit was also prorated as stated above.

The salary of the Assistant Superintendent during 1980-1981 was made up as follows: \$2,274 paid by the State of New Hampshire and \$24,309 was prorated as stated above.

The table below shows the portion of salary and travel charged to each school district.
