Richard, Clarence, & Faithful Jeffery

Five-year-old Richard and two-year old Clarence Jeffery came to Acworth's Black North Farm with their parents, James and Emily (Snell) Jeffery, and older brother James in 1902. Faithful was born the following year.

James married and moved to Vermont, where he died in 1933, but the other three boys remained in Acworth. After selling the farm, Richard, Clarence, and Faithful built a house on the Charlestown Road, where they lived from about 1947 until the end of their lives.

Doing factory work and odd jobs around town, helping out with firefighting or other crises, hunting and walking through the woods, and to the local store, where they exchanged news with their neighbors each day, the Jeffery Brothers led seemingly ordinary lives, but with a way of accepting and making the most of whatever came along. Although short in stature, they were big men around town, well-known and well-liked by everyone. Faithful's gift for recalling the escapades of everyday life and his special way of putting words together made him a favorite storyteller, and in later years, he became known as Acworth's unofficial oral historian.

Although not a direct cause of his death, a cruel attack by three thugs he had let in to use the phone, seemed to leave him with less spirit and put a blight on the whole town.

Memories of the Jeffery Brothers will live on with all who knew them. Their legacy will live on through future generations.

ARTICLE TWO: Motion was made by Craig Lawler and seconded by Lou Tallman to accept the minutes of the Town Meeting of March 9, 1993. Motion passed.

ARTICLE THREE: Motion was made by George Hanson and seconded by Patricia Titus to empower the Selectmen to serve as pound keepers, measurers of wood and fence viewers. Motion passed.

ARTICLE FOUR: Motion was made by Earl Luther and seconded by Ralph Balla to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Motion passed.

ARTICLE FIVE: FIRE AND RESCUE SERVICES AGREEMENT Motion was made by Craig Lawler and seconded by Sam Stephens to: This agreement, made this 8th day of March, 1994, between Acworth Volunteer Fire and Rescue Co., Inc. of Acworth, Sullivan County, New Hampshire,(hereinafter referred to as AVF&R) and the Town of Acworth, a municipal corporation having its situs in the said County and State (hereinafter referred to as Town).

Where as the Town is desirous of ensuring that fire and rescue services are available to the residents and visitors of the said Town; and, whereas AVF&R is a non-profit corporation whose principal purpose is to provide fire and rescue service to the residents and visitors of the Town, excluding brush or forest fire activity; and

Now therefore in consideration of the mutual promises hereinafter contained, AVF&R and the Town agree as follows:

1. AVF&R shall furnish, during the period of this agreement, its equipment and personnel, to provide fire and rescue services to the town, its residents and visitors, for one year commencing on Town Meeting, 1994 and ending on Town Meeting, 1995.

2. The Town Agrees to pay to AVF&R the sum of \$18,000 (in support of the annual operating budget) to be paid in two equal installments - the first payment to be on or before April 1, 1994, and the second on or before October 1, 1994, that before the board of Selectmen pays the second installment the board shall receive from the Company a certificate of Liability Insurance with the Town of Acworth named as additional Insured and a certificate of Workmen's Compensation Insurance. Town will pay money on condition that the AVF&R submit a report to the annual Town Report on yearly activities. Motion passed as amended.

1. Amended after \$18,000 (in support of the annual operating Budget) Motion made by Val Shand and seconded by Claude Bassinne.

Amended after October 1, 1994 added That before the Board of Selectmen pays the second installment the board shall receive from the Company a certificate of Liability Insurance with the Town of Acworth named as additional Insured and a certificate of Workmen's Compensation Insurance. Motion was made by Earl Luther and seconded by Ralph Balla.
 Amended to added Town will pay money on condition that the AVF&R submit a report to the Annual Town Report on yearly activities. Motion

was made by Tracey Hanson and seconded by Geraldine Rudenfeldt.

ARTICLE SIX: Motion was made by Craig Lawler and seconded by Mr. Ginter to raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same as recommended in the Budget by the budget Committee. Motion passed.

ARTICLE SEVEN: Motion was made by Ralph Balla and seconded by Lorraine Dion to authorize the Selectmen to sell the Deptula Lot, so called, Lot 128 on Map 2. Motion passed.

ARTICLE EIGHT: Motion was made by Geraldine Rudenfeldt and seconded by Lorraine Dion to authorize to sell the Champney Lot, so called, Lot 260 Map 66. Motion lost.

ARTICLE NINE: Motion was made by Ralph Balla and seconded by Paul Turcotte to authorize the Selectmen to sell the St. Michael lot so called, L542 on Map 66. Motion passed as amended.

AMENDMENT: Motion made by Leon Newton and seconded by Kenneth Bascom to deed to the Estate of the previous owner on payment of all taxes interest and cost. Motion passed.

ARTICLE TEN: Motion was made by George Hanson and seconded by Earl Luther "Shall the Town accept the provisions of RSA 31:95-b providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, unanticipated money from a State, Federal or other governmental unit, or a private source, which becomes available during the fiscal year?" Motion lost.

ARTICLE ELEVEN: Motion was made by Lorraine Dion and seconded by Geraldine Rudenfeldt to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept gifts of personal property, other than money, which may be offered to the Town for any public purpose, on the condition that the Selectmen must hold a public hearing on the action to be taken and on the condition that the Town shall not be required to expend other Town funds, except such funds as may be lawfully appropriated for the same purpose, as provided in RSA 31:95-e, and such authorization shall remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of another Town Meeting."

ARTICLE TWELVE: Motion was made by Kenneth Bascom and seconded by George Hanson to "Shall the Town accept the provisions of RSA 202-A4c, providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific recission of such authority, the public library trustees to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, unanticipated money from state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source, which becomes available during the fiscal year?" Motion passed.

ARTICLE THIRTEEN: Motion was made by Ralph Balla and seconded by Werner Rudenfeldt to shall the Town of Acworth revoke its acceptance of the provisions of Sections 1-10 of Chapter 53-B of New Hampshire Revised Statutes annotated, and withdraw from the Sullivan County Regional Refuse Disposal District. (as provided under the terms of said District's Agreement?)

AMENDMENT: Motion made by Claude Bassinne and seconded by John Tuthill to delete (as provided under the terms of said District's Agreement)

Ballot vote Yes 81 No 2 Blank 1 Motion passed as amended.

ARTICLE FOURTEEN: Under this article Jack Rieck made the motion and Pat Rieck seconded to reconsider Article #10.

ARTICLE TEN: Motion was made by Earl Luther and seconded by Hanford Auten "Shall the Town accept the procedural provisions of RSA 31:95-b excluding the provision for indefinite authorization providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing the Selectmen to aply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting unanticipated money from a State, Federal or other governmental unit, or a private source, which becomes available during the fiscal year? Motion passed as amended.

AMENDMENT: Added the procedural provisions of RSA 31:95-b excluding the provisions for indefinite authorization.

Under Article Fourteen was also brought up to have the Selectmen and the Conservation Commission get together and have a completed resolution

on land to be sold at any other Town Meeting.

Meeting recessed at 10:20 P.M. to count votes.

You are hereby notified to bring in your votes for Town Officers, and any other questions, to the Town Hall on Tuesday the 14th day of March next, between the hours of two of the clock in the afternoon until nine of the clock in the evening to act upon the following:

ARTICLE ONE: To vote by non-partisan ballot for the following Town Officers:

One Selectman to serve for a term of three years.

One Town Clerk to serve for a term of three years.

Treasurer to serve for a term of one year.

Tax Collector to serve for a term of one year.

Trustee of Silsby Library to serve for a term of three years.

Trustee of Trust funds to serve for a term of three years.

Two members of the Budget Committee to serve for terms of three years.

Two members of the Planning Board to serve for terms of three years. One member of the Planning Board to serve for term of two years.

Two members of the Road Committee to serve for terms of three years.

One member of the Road Committee to serve for a term of one year. Auditor to serve for a term of one year.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD 1994

The Planning Board met 12 times during the year.

Work on the Master Plan update preceeded smoothly. One public hearing was held last May. Attendance was sparse. Another hearing will be scheduled when the work is concluded.

Ben Porter's work, the final definition of the village district line from the Northeast to the Southeast corners, will be completed by surveyor Ron Teney of Bellows Falls.

There was one acquisition-annexation on Crescent Lake.

Dr. John Herpel resigned from the Board in September. The members of the Board would like to extend their special thanks for his donated time over the years. The Board will miss his brilliant grasp of issues.

As this report goes to print, we have received Maggie Hanson's resignation. Maggie has served the town as a member of this board for almost 20 years. She has been tirelessly willing and able: her effervescent presence will be sorely missed.

Meetings are held at 7:30 p.m. every last Wednesday of the month. They are open to the public. Your attendance is always welcome.

Susan Metsack, chairman John Balla Bruce Bascom Olga Bassinne Marguerite Hanson Jack Rieck, selectman The transfer station has been an item of concern this year, there is an anticipated cost for Acworth to make final its departure from the articles of agreement with the SCRRD. This our attorney has assured us is clearly permitted, however the cost is another question. An additon, overhang, was constructed at the transfer station this year also.

One town truck was lost in a fire this winter, but has been replaced with one of similar vintage with insurance funds. Cold Pond Road has proven once again that it can hold up to an early spring thaw, without the mud problems so many of our roads are plagued with.

At the town garage the addition is finished and the new heating system was installed just in time for the real cold weather.

The Deptula and St. Michael's lots have been sold, monies collected go into the general fund to defray taxes next year.

For the coming year we are looking at; sealing 7.5 miles of Acworth roads, some major bridge repairs, processing and using pug mill on several areas of town roads and offering for bid the Johnson lot (map 24 lot 293) consisting of 29.61 acres on Nye Road., this lot has a current assessed value of \$23,800, and would be sold to the highest bidder.

ACWORTH CONSERVATION COMMISSION 1994 ANNUAL REPORT

The Commission worked again this year with the Unity Conservation Commission and the New Hampshire Volunteer Lake Assessment Program to test water quality of Crescent Lake three times last summer. Some samples again showed elevated levels of E. coli and phosphorus which merit watchful concern. We are also aware of changes in water clarity (turbidity) which almost certainly is contributed to by more powerful and faster running powerboats. We are working to understand better this lake use and its consequences, and would be supportive of public sentiment to reduce this use.

In reponse to the selectmens' request, the Commission investigated two town owned properties for any notable conservation features. We continued our monitoring of four parcels of land in Acworth with conservation easements. These are Pierce Brook Forest (a privately established easement) and the Moody, Roy and Clark parcels (easements established through the Land Conservation Investment Program). We feel the relatively quiet circumstances we enjoy in Acworth do not merit exhaustive monitoring, but we are gaining some familiarity and baseline data for this permanent responsibility of the Commission.

An ongoing interest of ours is the condition of the Town Wetland in East Acworth. We investigated complaints of littering. Any littering is an abuse of a town land set aside for education in habitat and enjoyment of the outdoors.

Hoping to locate an interested student this year to participate in a Community Conservation Camp or a Land Planning Seminar, we mention our eagerness to sponsor someone in grade 10, 11, or 12. We should soon get confirmation that this opportunity will again be offered.

ROAD AGENT'S REPORT 1994

The snow was deep this year, but we suffered no frozen culverts and much less ice. However, mud season was a different story. In spite of the difficulties encountered, Cold Pond Road handled the season well and that was a first. In order to maintain that status, we will have to add gravel. Heino Road was very bad and we will have to find a solution. The really bad spots could be treated in the same manner as the Cold Pond Road solution.

The department thanks you for the new office, bathroom and storage space in the new town garage addition. It's great. We were, howev er, sorry to see the demise of the 4WD which caught fire this past December. The town replaced it with a 1967FWD, a nice old truck. Replacement balanced out with the insurance at no further cost to the town and we were able to salvage the sander. There has been talk of a new truck and this may be necessary in the future as the GMC is aging rapidly and our year round maintanance depends on keeping it in service. With a new truck added to the present equipment, we would have two trucks to haul gravel in summer. The GMC has little value as a trade in, so keeping it in service as long as we can seems the best way to go. Buying a new truck would eliminate a road maintenance crisis if it quits mid season.

There has been some in-depth discussion about the deteriorating condition of our roads and the solution. There are no easy answers. Some would tar Cold Pond Road but it is my recommendation that we should shim and seal the tar roads already existing before we take on the creation of another tar road. Our present tar roads would be maintained much better with a little shimming each year. This past year, all roads were graded and graveled.

Culverts were put in as follows: 7 on Black North, 3 on Turkey Shoot, 1 on Labars, 2 on Lynn Hill, 3 on Gates Mt., 1 on Quinns, 2 on Harvey Putnams, 1 on Ingoldsby. 1000 feet of underdrain was put on Heino and we screened our own sand for a supply of stone. All roads were mowed.

There would be additonal relief to the department if we could add a part time helper to operate the one ton. This would give us three trucks in operation allowing us to get the plowing and sanding completed faster.

I wish to thank everyone for th eir patience and understanding during our equipment and weather difficulties and I would also like to thank everyone who helped and worked with me this past year.

ACWORTH POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT 1994

The Acworth Police Department is now considered a part-time/full-time department, consisting of Sargent David Webber and myself. Both of us are also part-time Deputy Sheriffs for Sullivan County. Since one officer works for the County mornings and the other afternoons, we have, in effect, twenty-four hour coverage for the town. Each year we must be recertified by Police Standards and Training. The Police Standards and Training Council establishes the protocol for the operation and guides for all police departments within the State.

In August, the new Acworth Police cruiser arrived and to minimize costs, some basic equipment was installed by the Department. The old cruiser was subsequently sold. The Department is pursuing all State and Federal grants for needed equipment.

Our 1994 budget was based on fifty reported calls per year. The Department has seen a dramatic increase in documented calls which have far exceeded our projections as evidenced by the following list:

ACWORTH SILSBY LIBRARY TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR 1994

Library trustees and staff held twelve regular meetings plus several work sessions this year. Individual trustees also met with library consultants, the Friends Of The Acworth Silsby Library, the Library Development Committee, The Acworth Historical Society, the State Historical Association, the New Hampshire Trustees' Association, and other regional library associations throughout the state. Keeping up with changes in technology, federal and state laws, library standards, and allsorts of new information requires many hours of reading and research as well.

Revised State LIbrary Standards and anticipated State budget cuts will place even greater demands on local libraries. We will be expected to be open more hours, for instance, and to perform some of the services now provided by the State Library, which will require having our own computer.

This year's budget includes increases for the extra hours and necessary education, as well as slight raises for our administrators. Librarians have been underpaid for many years, while the demands on them keep increasing. The raises still leave them underpaid, but we realize that many taxpayers are in the same position. We're very fortunate to have dedicated staff, who are willing to accept this compromise. We also appreciate the volunteers who contribute so many hours, both at the library and helping with special events.

Several gifts have helped stretch an otherwise static materials budget. Guy and Michelle DuBois donated a good collection of children's books. Dr. Paul Lundstrom donated \$500.00 worth of classics, reference, and other non-fiction books and tapes, in memory of his grandfather, George W. Collins. Everett Walsh donated several boxes of fiction. The Friends donated a collection of children's video tapes. And scores of people donated used books for the annual August book sale, which provides income for purchasing other materials.

Marion Neff gave a handmade banner that promoted National Library Week. The Friends of the Library gave a new VCR, a computerized thermostat, updated phone directories, a coffe pot and server and other supplies, and have established a fund to help pay for a computer. They also continue publishing the Acworth Newsletter. Several people loaned handmade rugs for a special Old Home Day exhibit, and local musicians provided entertainment. The Historical Society has reorganized and expanded their genealogy collection, which attracts many out-of-town visitors, as well as local researchers.

Donations established a memorial fund in honor of former trustee and long-time patron, Scott Farley. Local civic groups continued their longtime support.

The Friends of the Library and the Library Development Committee conducted several fund-raising and library promotional activities, as well as helping with library programs. Several businesses and individuals responded to those efforts by sending donations to the library building fund.

The final layer of Stonedust was added to the front path and the handicapped parking space. This provides a natural, water-permeable surface approved for handicapped access. Routine maintenance included repairs and tightening of doors and windows. Otherwise capital income was added to the building fund as decided last year. This year we will be looking at ways to double the accumulated funds to accomplish a major project.

Other usual business, such as self-evaluation, policy updates and amendments, and long-range planning are ongoing. The challenge of meeting today's library needs seems to grow more complex each year, but the wide support from so many inspires us in our efforts.

ACWORTH SILSBY LIBRARY ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT - 1994

I'd like to start this year's report by explaining some of the duties involved in running our library. There is more than meets the eye.

As a member of the Statewide Library Development System, we are expected to comply with certain standards. These are the rules by which all libraries must abide, if they are to receive services through the State Library, including inter-library loans. I don't have room to list them all, but a few of the behind-the-scenes requirements include attending regional meetings, earning library certification through college courses, and attending all library board meetings, in additon to managing the library. All of which takes time and energy. Luckily Devik and I enjoy being librarians.

We must keep library collections current and in good condition. By reading reviews in newspapers and book journals, we are able to provide Acworth patrons what they need and want -- most of the time. We always encourage people to make suggestions.

We would also like to encourage people to volunteer. We have several volunteers who do many important tasks. If you come in on a Tuesday, you'll probably see Sue Willoughby hard at work covering books, filing cards, or shelving. If you come on a Sunday, you'll probably see Jessica Foote - a senior at Fall Mt. High -- doing the same kinds of things. she has been with the library for over four years, and we appreciate her hard work and continued support.

The Friends of the Library also are a big help. They have helped with various fund raisers through the year and served many refreshemtns and pots of coffee at the monthly programs. Our community is lucky to have such an enthusiastic group.

This year we registered 40 NEW patrons. That is a record in the eight years that I've been library administrator.

The free monthly programs also keep gaining attendance. Some of this year's programs included an herbal workshop, a family concert, a craft fair, a talk about regional archeology, and a children's film festival. Programs scheduled for 1995 include speakers, a family photograph workshop, an April 22 celebration of the 25th Earthday, and a May mother/ daughter pot luck supper. Please watch the Acworth Newsletter and area newspapers for further information about these and other programs.

The Acworth Community School students visit our library almost every Tuesday and Thursday of the school year, and junior and senior high school students are usually here on Sundays working on school reports or just looking for a good book.

The video tape collection now includes two Ken Burns series, The Civil War and Baseball, purchased with funds from the Jeffery Memorial. We have a varied and growing audio tape section as well. These are very popular with people who have to drive frequently to Boston or New York, but you don't have to leave town to borrow them.

Please bring your out-of-town guests in to see our wonderful bird collection too. If you don't have any guests, come anyway.

THE FAITHFUL, RICHARD, AND CLARENCE JEFFERY MEMORIAL LIBRARY FUND

The Acworth Silsby Library benefits from income derived from several trust funds and memorial gifts of one sort of another. As individuals, we are often saddened by this, because these gifts so often come as a result of losing a good friend or neighbor. As trustees and staff, we feel honored that our institution has been chosen and feel an extra responsibility to spend these funds wisely and in a way that reflects honorably upon the person we knew. All of these trust funds and memorial gifts are equally important to us.

This year we learned that the Silsby Free Public Library of Acworth is the beneficiary of "The Faithful, Richard, and Clarence Jeffery Memorial" trust fund, which has the significance of being the largest such gift received since the original Silsby bequest. The bequest of more than \$43,000 provides perpetual income "to be used for the purchase of books, periodicals, and other materials conducive to intellectual and cultural enjoyment of the inhabitants of Acworth and others who may utilize the library facilities." The will further stipulates that this income is not to be used to reduce the town appropriation but to "enlarge the supply of cultural materials" which might not otherwise be affordable.

This fund will be a tremendous boost to our materials budget at a time when it is desperately needed. With constantly rising costs and new types of materials required to get up to date, we have a long list of items that have been out of reach during the past few years.

The first payment has been used toward items already on that list. During the coming months, library trustees will be working with the staff to develop a general policy for use of this money, but, for now, we are well occupied with catching up.

The Jeffery will designated several other benevolent associations that benefit many of us or our neighbors as well. We are very fortunate to have enjoyed the Jefferys during their lifetime, and many generations will benefit from their thoughtful bequests.

RECREATION ANNUAL REPORT 1994

This year we are proud to announce the completion of the renovations to the old Turkey Shoot building. Work was done by recreational committee members and their families. The building was dedicated by Jack Rieck last spring at the town's baseball picnic. It was also the site of the Sunday Old Home Day Picnic. The building is free to any resident for family reunions, birthday parties, weddings, etc. If you would like to use the building, please give Brenda Longley a call up at the Town Office and she will be happy to reserve a date for you. Please make sure to book through Brenda in advance so we can be sure the building will be free. All we ask is that you make sure the area is left clean and that you take away your own trash.

Baseball was very successful again this year. There were two Pee Wee Teams and one Minor League as well as having a number of Acworth children on the Tri-Town Little League. We had a tough time trying to find enough coaches to satisfy the demand so if you are interested in helping us for the upcoming season please contact us. We would hate to see children lose out on the opportunity to play because we don't have enough coaches. Through the Friends of The Recreation Committee, members of the baseball teams helped to raise over \$1,000 to help pay for recreational supplies and activities. An awards picnic was held for them at the end of the season.

The town had two teams while the Pee Wees played on Alstead teams (due to no available coach). The older team played in the Putney and Fall Mountain tournaments. They received an award for their good sportsmanship. That is something we can all feel proud about!

It may seem impossible to believe but over 50 man hours have been put in to make the beautiful skating rink down on the Mill Pond Lot. It would still be there if it weren't for Mother Nature taking off with her. Maybe by the town meeting it will be back - who knows. If you see those guys out there working away, don't think your help wouldn't be welcomed. The hours that they spend for you are all volunteered. Involvement by the community would be greatly appreciated.

The committee once again donated to the school's annual Halloween party. They sold refreshments at last year's Town Meeting (and will be doing the same this year). We are always looking for ways to develop and support recreational activities for our town. There has been talk of making some nature trails, having a winter carnival, making a volleyball court, having some recreational clubs for our youth. ACWORTH VOLUNTEER FIRE & RESCUE COMPANY, INC. REPORT FOR 1994

The Acworth Voulnteer Fire & Rescue Company responded to 45 emergency calls this year. Expenditures totaled \$25,181.76. The Town provided \$18,000 of this. The balance came from donations, voluntary payments for services, and earned income.

After 25 years, David Lyle retired from firefighting, but our newest members, Firefighter Edward Grant and Firefighter/Emt Tim Kirby are proving to be a great asset.

Our five-year plan, as presented in 1990, will be completed this year. The addition to the station provides our first real meeting and office area, as well as additional space for equipment. Landscaping included driveway paving and regrading of parking areas. Donated shrubs and volunteer laborers have improved the grounds, with special attention from Nancy Acheson who donated, planted, and weeded the flower garden in front of the post office. New and updated monitors have improved communications. Some of our breathing apparatus has also been updated to current standards. Renovation extended the life of the 1973 Ford pumper truck.

During the coming year, we will develop plans for new apparatus. The 1972 tanker truck, for instance, is being held together with corn meal and chewing gum. While our 1978 four-wheel-drive M2 truck is still servicable for as a rescue vehicle, its 45-year-old pump is exhausted, and we simply can't depend on it as a firetruck. Today most of our equipment is inadequate, outdated, or worn out.

As members of Southwestern Mutual Aid, the town is fortunate to have help from surrounding communities, when it's needed, but we are also expected to do our share in return. Paying dues is the easy part. We are also required to maintain apparatus and equipment according to minimum standards and to provide educated and otherwise qualified people. It takes a special person to accept the responsibility, to give up the many hours needed for training, and to be willing to drop everything, no matter what, whenever the alarm calls. Just keeping the equipment up to date, keeping up with regulations, managing the business, training, and responding to emergencies whenever the call comes, requires that these few volunteers give a great part of themselves to their neighbors and community. This personal and financial sacrifice is something few are willing to make.

State legislation that take effect next year, further clarifies independent fire companies versus municipal fire departments. We hope this will promote greater understanding of our situation.

The political bickering and backbiting endured during the past few years has seriously undermined the morale of this volunteer group. Attendance at meetings and non-essential functions has fallen off. Some good members have been lost, and new ones willing to endure the current atmosphere are hard to find We are very grateful to those who have sent donations and otherwise offered their support.

We continue to try to provide the highest level of prehospital care to all we serve. In the past year many of our personnel have, in order to continue to provide the highest level of care, upgraded their levels of training. Early in the year one of our Paramedics directed an Emergency Medical Attendant Intermediate class and currently two are engaged in conducting this years Emergency Medical Technician class sponsored by EMS District 11. These classes are held at Springfield Hospital, a central locastion of the district. This class is well attended by area people. Personnel from our service have been assisting. We continue to be active in community education in providing Emergency Care Attendant/First Responder courses, Basic First Aid and CPR courses to both lay persons and professionals in our communities. Our personnel have just completed an Emergency Care Attendant course and we saw eight graduates joining our local Rescue Squads. We shall continue to provide this service as needed.

During the year 1994 LeFevre Ambulance Service responded to the following calls in Acworth:

We want to continue to work with our First Response Squad. In 1994-95 we again want to continue to provide the highest level of care possible to you and your families. This means working closely with the Fire and Rescue Squads, our schools, and encouraging citizens to participate in emergency medical trainings, continually improving the training of our staff and purchasing the most cost-effective equipment available.

Once again, we wish to take a moment to clarify a point in reference to how to call for an ambulance. If a call is received by our dispatcher, we will respond an ambulance and notify Keene Mutual Aid to tone the Rescue Squad, when appropriate. If Keene Mutual Aid receives the call, they will tone the Rescue Squad and LeFevre Ambulance automatically responds an ambulance. Therefore, either method will result in the dispatching of both Rescue and ambulance. Residents of Bellows Falls need only to dial 911 to request an ambulance in an emergency. Our prime concern is the patient Our special thanks go to the Acworth Rescue Squad for their assistance during the past year. Also, we would like to take this opportunity to again invite members of your squad to participate in our monthly training sessions.
