The Polls will be open from 1:00 P.M. to 9:00 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Andover in the county of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Andover Elementary School Gymnasium in said Andover on Tuesday, the 9th of March, next at 1:00 of the clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.
2. To hear the report of the #9 Shed Committee and take any action or vote thereon.
3. To see if the Town will vote to renew the Landfill Contract with J. Dale McLeod with the following changes:
 - a. The escalator clause for determining annual price is to be eliminated; the price for 1982-83 is to be the same as 1981-82 and in the future the price is to be determined annually on the basis of cost and reasonable return.
 - b. The Sunday date for operating the Landfill is to be changed to Saturday.
 - c. Should it be determined sometime in the future that use of the Landfill by another town would have significant financial benefit to both the Town and Mr. McLeod, the parties agree to consider such a situation, with any forthcoming agreement subject to approval by Town Meeting.
 - d. The Contract with the changes incorporated is extended to 1986.
4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$321.00 as its share of the cost of supporting the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association—the only official State of New Hampshire non-profit vacation travel promotion organization for this area. (Not recommended by Budget Committee)
5. To see if the Town will vote to join the Lakes Region Planning Commission and further raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,131.00 as the Town's share of operating expense. (Not recommended by Budget Committee)
6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1981 appropriation, said funds to be placed in a special Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5. (Sum total of unexpended appropriation = \$34.45) (By Conservation Commission)
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the physical upgrading of the unimproved portion of the so-called Chase Hill Extension Road. (By Petition) (Not recommended by Budget Committee)
8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the expenditure of any funds received in 1982 under Title II, VI or any other State or Intergovernmental Assistance Act.
9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to expend the remaining balance of Federal Antirecession Funds. (Sum total of remaining balance = \$139.00)
10. To see if the Town of Andover will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$354.85 for services to Andover through the Franklin Day Care Center. (By petition)
11. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget as presented by the Budget Committee.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as off-sets against budgeted appropriations in the amounts indicated; and further, to authorize the Selectmen to make pro rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced, or take any other action hereon.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Noteworthy events for your Town Government in 1981 were the completion of property revaluations in Andover, and the repair of the Keniston Covered Bridge.

All property revaluations were completed in June, basically on schedule and well within the allocated budget. The new assessments for all properties are listed in this town report. We believe that Andover received a competent and fair revaluation. The results continue to be substantiated by more recent property sales. While we have been busy responding to requests for reconsideration, the number of requests has not been excessive and we anticipate that few cases will be brought to the State Tax Court for resolution.

The repairs to the structure of the Keniston Covered Bridge were completed in the early fall without serious inconvenience to the residents of Bridge Road. Damage to the sub-structure was found to be much more extensive than expected and the final cost of repairs exceeded the budgeted amount of \$66,000.00 by over \$14,000.00. Budget Committee and State approvals were obtained for absorbing this additional expense out of existing surplus, avoiding any immediate impact on taxes. We believe that the Town received good value for its money, that the work performed was of excellent quality. If reasonable maintenance is performed in the future, no major repair should be required for another 30 to 40 years.

We expect your taxes for Town government will increase in an upward trend in 1982. This trend results, as you all know, from the ever increasing cost of services due to inflation, and the decreased revenues provided by the State. In addition, Federal Government budget cuts are expected to eventually impact local communities unless the State establishes additional sources of revenue.

Budget items specifically impacted by inflation are road maintenance and general highway expense, police protection, insurance costs, interest costs on tax anticipation loans and some town officers' expenses. In addition, the road maintenance budget has been increased over 10% to offset the costs of the extreme winter we have experienced to date. We are recommending an increase in budget for the Administrative Assistant to provide our one full time employee with a retirement program comparable to the State's, and to increase the base salary to a level that is competitive with what is being paid in other communities. Increased bridge expenses reflect the need to re-roof the Keniston Bridge in order to properly protect the newly made repairs.

In light of these increased expenses, we are proposing to operate next year with smaller margins than have been traditional in the past. This is generally reflected in a number of unchanged budgets, and specifically in decreased proposed budgets for Town officers' salaries, town office building expenses, parks and recreation, and reduced (but adequate) amounts set aside for aid to the elderly and town poor. We do not anticipate a reduction in services by these actions. The smaller margins will reduce the amount of tax increase in this year's tax rate which would otherwise occur, but will result in less surplus at year end normally used in the past to offset the following year's taxes.

In the case of the Town Landfill, we are pleased to report that Mr. McLeod volunteered to renegotiate his contract with the town to remove the cost of living escalator clause, to provide the 1982-83 services at the same cost as for 1981-82, and to negotiate annually through 1986 on the basis of cost and reasonable return. We are indebted to Mr. McLeod for these changes and hope

you will support the warrant article.

We are currently pursuing other ways to reduce the cost of town government and solicit your constructive suggestions. In this regard, we have instructed the Police Department to cease special patrolling of vacant homes free of charge. We believe this kind of service is outside the responsibility of a part-time police force and that the expense should not be borne by the general taxpayers.

The police department reports an increasing number of calls which do not really require their services. As the number of calls serviced each year has a direct reflection on cost, we ask that you not use this service for problems you can reasonably solve for yourselves if you will take the time and initiative. Similarly, we find that the police are required to spend an excessive amount of time patrolling the town beach to keep out unqualified users. The sticker system was designed to preserve the beach for the use of Andover residents, taxpayers, and their guests, but unless the stickers are properly used, there is no way to readily identify those who are qualified from those who are not. We find that we are issuing far more citations to people who should be qualified rather than intruders, because of no sticker or improper use of the sticker. Considerable expense to the town (and to you in terms of fines) could be saved if you will be sure that any vehicle taken to the beach has a properly mounted sticker on the rear window. Stickers for 1982 are now available in the town office and must be installed by April 1 for vehicle access to either the beach or landfill.

It has been the practice of the town government for some time to pay for the expenses of the custodian and police protection provided when private organizations use the school gymnasium. Recently this policy has come under renewed scrutiny because of the difficulty of defining what organizations qualify for this free service, and the substantial amount of money spent for this service. The Department of Revenue Administration has informed us that use of town funds for any purpose related to the school facilities other than town business is illegal. Our town counsel concurs that this determination is correct. Therefore, we cannot legally continue to pay for custodian or police protection for private organizations using the school facilities. Further, we were advised that the town government should remove itself from the management of the use of the gym. This situation is currently under discussion with the school board and will be reviewed at the town meeting.

REPORT TO THE SELECTMEN ON THE NO. 9 SHED

The Commission has had the problem of what to do with the No. 9 Shed under consideration since its April meeting. We have sought and obtained the advice of several persons not members of the Commission. Messrs. Howard George, Gary Olson, Scott Robart and Howard Wilson volunteered to be members of the Committee on No. 9 Shed and have each attended one or more meetings in which we discussed this subject, and have given us the benefit of their counsel. We also sought the opinion of Mr. John Jurta, Jr., and of Mr. Dale MacLeod. We held a special meeting at the Shed on May 26 for inspection of its condition.

From the beginning we have judged that four options were possible:

- 1) Have the building demolished, the cost to be covered by salvage of the timbers.
- 2) Keep a small part of the building for storage of town or precinct property, and demolish the rest.
- 3) Keep the entire building, and repair it.
- 4) Have the Fire Department burn it down.

From the beginning it was evident that options 1 and 3 were the ones that had significant support. We sought and obtained estimates of the cost of repairing the building. The cost of repairing the roof would be in the four to five thousand dollar range, and at least that much would be required to repair the exterior not including any interior renovations. We could foresee no reasonable use for the building that seemed to deserve serious consideration.

This brought us back to option 1. We voted unanimously to recommend that the No. 9 Shed be demolished by the highest bidder, and any moneys received go to the Conservation Commission for improvement of town land by the Blackwater River.

MANAGEMENT LETTER

May 27, 1981

Members of the Board of Selectmen

Gentlemen:

As part of our examination of the various funds and groups of accounts of the Town of Andover for the year ended December 31, 1980, we reviewed and tested the Town's systems of internal accounting control to the extent we considered necessary to evaluate the systems as required by generally accepted auditing standards. Under these standards the purpose of such evaluation is to establish a basis for reliance thereon in determining the nature, timing, and extent of other auditing procedures that are necessary for expressing an opinion on the financial statements. It was not designed for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the internal accounting control and would not necessarily disclose all weaknesses in the system.

As a result of such review and in an effort to be of assistance to the Town, we are submitting for your consideration a number of comments and observations intended to improve operations and internal control. These deal exclusively with the Town's operations and controls and should not be regarded as reflecting upon the integrity or capabilities of any Town employee.

We recognize that practical considerations are an important factor in instituting changes in accounting procedures and the system of internal control. The Town must weigh the possible additional costs of such changes against the risks inherent in the present procedures and systems.

We wish to express our appreciation for the cooperation we received from Town officials during the course of our examination.

After you have had an opportunity to consider our comments and observations, we would be pleased to discuss them with you.

I. GENERAL ACCOUNTING

The financial records maintained by the Town consist basically of cash receipt and disbursement ledgers. Though this type of system appears adequate for the current needs of the Town, the present records require considerable amounts of clerical time in order to properly classify revenues and expenditures and compare same with budgeted amounts on a periodic basis. In addition, the cash journals being used do not readily provide for proper classification of all budgeted items. We recommend the Town consider the purchase of a one-write accounting system. The benefits of implementing a one-write system which would summarize in a concise manner the financial activity of the Town include the following:

- A. All entries are made in one writing. As a receipt or check is written, the same entry is being made on cash receipt and disbursement journals and budgetary control cards for revenues and expenditures.
- B. Pre-numbered receipt forms are used along with pre-numbered checks for overall control over receipts and disbursements.
- C. Ensures that daily recorded transactions are summarized on budgetary control cards, enabling periodic financial reports to be prepared for the Selectmen's review.

II. STANDARD PURCHASE ORDER SYSTEM

At present the Town has no set policy in regards to purchases for obtaining goods and services. We suggest the Administrative Assistant develop written purchasing procedures to include the use of prenumbered purchase order forms in order to strengthen the internal control over goods and services purchased.

III. CHANGE FUND

The Town Clerk and Tax Collector does not have a change fund. In order to ensure that all receipts are remitted to the Treasurer intact, we suggest that the Town Clerk and Tax Collector be provided with a change fund.

IV. RECONCILIATION OF SELECTMEN'S RECORDS TO TREASURER'S RECORDS

Our examination revealed that cash receipt and disbursement records maintained in the Selectmen's office did not agree with the Treasurer's records at year-end. We recommend that the Selectmen's records be compared with the Treasurer's monthly report of receipts and disbursements and any differences be reconciled on a monthly basis.

V. YIELD TAX SECURITY DEPOSITS

At the present time no formal records are being maintained for controlling and reconciling Yield Tax Security Deposits. The deposits are placed in a separate savings account until such time as they are to be used for payment of yield taxes or to be refunded to the depositor. At this time, they are transferred from savings, recorded as a receipt and deposited in the General Fund checking account. The total of the deposit is then disbursed to the Tax Collector for payment of yield taxes, regardless of whether the amount is greater than or less than the yield taxes committed for collection. The balance remaining in the savings account is not reconciled as to individual depositors. We recommend that Yield Tax Deposits be recorded in the Selectmen's records by individual depositor when received and disbursed to the tax collector for payment of yield taxes in the following manner:

A. Yield Taxes Committed Greater Than Security Deposit

The total deposited be disbursed to the Tax Collector for partial payment of taxes.

B. Yield Taxes Committed Less Than Security Deposit

That portion of the deposit required to pay the yield taxes committed be disbursed to the Tax Collector, with the balance of the deposit being disbursed to the depositor.

In addition, we recommend that the receipt and disbursement of security deposits be controlled by individual depositors so as to enable the Selectmen to determine the names and amounts of deposits on hand at any given time.

VI. REVENUE SHARING FUND

At present, the Treasurer does not maintain separate records for the receipt, investment and disbursement of Revenue Sharing funds. Entitlement payments are deposited in a separate savings account or placed in short-term investments. Transfers are made from savings to the General Fund checking account as required. We suggest the Treasurer establish separate cash records for control over the Revenue Sharing Fund, recording all entitlement receipts, investment of same, interest earned on investments and disbursements.

VII. INVESTMENT OF IDLE FUNDS

During our examination, we noted that at several times during the year a large cash balance existed in the General Fund and was being carried in the non-interest bearing checking account. We suggest that cash balances in excess of amounts required to meet current needs be placed in short-term investments or, at a minimum, be transferred to the General Fund savings account in order that the Town may realize interest income on all idle funds.

VIII. FEDERAL ANTIRECESSION FUNDS

At December 31, 1980, there remains an unexpended balance of \$139 in Federal Antirecession Funds. We suggest that the Town vote to expend these funds at its next annual town meeting.

IX. TOWN CLERK'S RECORDS

The Town Clerk collects various miscellaneous receipts such as filing fees, sale of town histories, parking fines, permits, etc., for which no formal cash receipts journal is maintained. We recommend all receipts collected by the Town Clerk be recorded on suitable records prior to being remitted to the Town Treasurer.

X. TAX COLLECTOR'S RECORDS

Our examination revealed numerous inadequacies and inconsistencies in the records maintained by the Tax Collector, requiring the scope of our examination to be expanded to include a detailed examination of all aspects of the records in order for us to determine the amounts of taxes remaining uncollected. The reasons for expanding the scope of our examination include the following:

- A. Tax warrants not reconciled at any time during year resulting in incorrect summaries of tax warrants at December 31.
- B. Receipts per cash book not remitted to Town Treasurer intact or on a timely basis; some not remitted at year-end.
- C. Numerous posting errors in warrants:
 1. Some cash receipts not posted

2. All abatements of taxes not posted
 3. 1980 resident tax abatements issued by Selectmen not posted at December 31
- D. Numerous errors in uncollected tax lists prepared.
 - E. No formal warrants maintained for Yield Taxes.
 - F. Records of Tax Sale property not reconciled.

In addition, we felt it necessary to confirm 100% of all uncollected property and yield and unredeemed taxes through written requests to the taxpayers. Resident taxes were confirmed on a test basis. Several adjustments were made as a result of replies to these confirmation requests.

Since a new tax collector was elected at the 1981 Town Meeting, an examination of the accounts for the period January 1 through March 10, 1981, was requested by the Selectmen. The same detailed examination was required of that period, and all confirmation requests were for uncollected and unredeemed taxes at March 10. The report for that period is issued under separate cover along with a report of the Town Clerk's accounts for the same period. This management letter is intended to suffice for both reports.

We have spent time with the new tax collector in reviewing the basic records required to be maintained, the importance of maintaining the records accurately, and of reconciling remittances to the Treasurer with cash collections on a periodic basis.

In our opinion, other than the omission of the General Fixed Asset group of accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the second paragraph of this report, the combined financial statements and the combining financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of Andover, New Hampshire at December 31, 1980, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as supplemental schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Town of Andover, New Hampshire. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined and combining financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The year was busy for the Planning Board but in a different way than in 1980. Whereas the activity in 1980 seemed to presage a boom in subdivisions, 1981 marked a return to smaller subdivisions—"family" subdivisions, annexations, etc.

There were two significant matters which occurred in addition to regular subdivision action. The first concerns three separate cases presented under the Non-Residential Site Plan Review Ordinance were: R. P. Johnson applied for a permit to build a retail outlet for hardware supplies on Mill Road in Potter Place; the Planning Board approved the plans as presented while the Zoning Board of Adjustment granted a variance to permit the construction in a FA zone. The variance was necessary since such a retail establishment is not permitted under the terms of the Andover Zoning Ordinance except by special exception (variance).

Both of the other applications under this ordinance were from Carol and Kenneth Sanborn who sought permission to build a Post Office on Lawrence Street just off Routes 4 & 11. The Planning Board denied the first application by a 4 to 3 vote arguing that the lot was too small for the intended use. The Planning Board unanimously approved the second proposal subject to receiving a variance from the 30 foot setback requirement. The Zoning Board of Appeal denied the appeal for this variance, thus negating the second application.

The second significant matter concerns an effort to review all of the Andover planning ordinances. The Board never really got started although small beginnings were attempted. So this important matter awaits this years Planning Board.

The following observations are based on the past Chairman's seven years on the Planning Board and flow from recent experience:

(1.) Members of the Planning Board must be prepared to totally familiarize themselves with all of the planning ordinances. They must stand ready and be available to spend whatever time is necessary to do a thorough job.

(2.) The planning ordinances must be reviewed and changed as necessary to reflect whatever changes might affect our town. All ordinances need such a review and some changes. The probable order of review is as follows:

- a. Master Plan
- b. Zoning Ordinance
- c. Sub-division Regulations
- d. Building Code
- e. Non-Residential Site Plan Review Ordinance

The Board, when reviewing the Zoning Ordinance, should consider the following difference in philosophy which has been represented frequently before the Board but most notably during the hearings concerning the Post Office. The Zoning Ordinance, when read strictly, is very explicit as to variances and special exceptions. In this view, both the Planning Board and more specifically the Zoning Board of Adjustment are limited in their decisions to what is stated in the ordinance. All other desired uses not noted in the ordinance should be presented to a Town Meeting for approval. The opposing view represents that the two Boards should be permitted to exercise judgement consistent with the intent of the Master Plan. Such a view led to the adoption of an amendment to the Zoning Ordinance permitting the Zoning Board of Appeal to grant special exceptions.

The Planning Board should consider the merits of some type of ordinance to permit control for orderly growth in the town. Perhaps some refinement of the currently mandated footage requirements on a town road should be explored to

allow for the creation of separate woodlots, sale of "back land" which lacks frontage, or the sale of land existing on unimproved roads.

ANDOVER CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT

An amendment to the Zoning Ordinance for the purpose of protecting the shores of lakes, ponds, and streams, which was drawn up in joint meetings between this Commission and the Planning Board in 1980, was approved at the 1981 Town Meeting.

The pine seedlings that we planted at the site of the former town dump last year did not do well. Less than half of the 1500 that were set out survived. Dry weather following the planting in September is the probable cause of the failure. We set out 500 additional pine seedlings at the same locality in the spring of 1981. When last seen they appeared to be doing well.

At the last Town Meeting the Commission was asked to examine the No. 9 Shed and make a recommendation as to what should be done to it. Our report advising that it be demolished has been presented separately.

The Selectmen asked us to make a study of the gypsy moth infestation as it affects Andover. Members Bardsley, Graves, Hersey and Elkins attended meetings out of town at which this problem was examined. We collected and read various pamphlets about the moths. After inspection of several areas to note the abundance or otherwise of the moths' egg masses, we concluded that defoliation in Andover is not likely to be severe enough to justify the great cost of spraying at the expense of the town. Natural controls are expected to solve the problem in time. Moreover, the environmental impact of spraying might be worse than that of letting nature take its course.

On August 1 there was a Workshop on Prime Wetlands at the Harris Conservation Center in Hancock. Mr. Elkins attended on behalf of this Commission, and brought back some useful printed matter, but we have not yet received from the New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions the promised guidelines that we need before undertaking an inventory of wetlands in Andover.

We have included in our proposed budget for 1982 the request for a small sum to be used for improvement of the town land along the Blackwater River.

The Conservation Commission meets at 8:00 P.M. in the Town Hall on the second Wednesday of each month except July and August.

REPORT OF THE ANDOVER RESCUE SQUAD

The Andover Rescue Squad responded to 84 calls in 1981. Forty-seven trips were made to New London Hospital, twelve to Franklin Hospital, seven to Mary Hitchcock, three to Concord Hospital, two to local nursing homes and one each to White River Junction and Laconia. Nine of these were related to motor vehicle accidents. There were two structural fires to which the ambulance responded. Additionally, there were trips to participate in blood drawings at Proctor Academy, Fourth of July Festivities and the Camp Marlyn horse show.

During the past year, the eighth grade completed a CPR course taught by squad member Marge Whedon. Kevin Johnson, a teacher in the upper grades at the Andover Elementary School, applied for and received a grant from the N. H. Heart Association. It was used to purchase equipment related to CPR instruction and will be for both school and town courses.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ANDOVER BOARD OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES

The Andover Board of Library Trustees added a new member in March, to fill the place of Mr. Bryant Adams whose term expired. Mr. Adams gave most generously of his time and experience during his six years on the Board. Newly elected Susanne P. Whitbeck has taken over the responsibilities of being Treasurer for the Board.

Over the past year the Board has committed itself to several projects. The By-Laws have been revised and amended. Currently we are working on the Library Policies. There have been some major renovations and some minor repairs at the William Adams Bachelder Library. The cork floor has been sanded and resealed, and the stairwell wall repaired. The Mollie Bachelder Meeting Room facilities have been repainted, and new vinyl flooring has been installed.

The addition of storm windows and a new downstairs door, in 1980, resulted in a saving on the fuel bill. Therefore, the Board felt it would prefer not to ask the Town for an appropriation for the Bachelder Library this year. However, in view of inflationary heat and electricity costs the Trustees would be pleased to accept donations for any permitted private use of the Mollie Bachelder Meeting Room.

Both libraries continue to serve many people in the community. Several town commissions and organizations meet regularly in the Bachelder Meeting Room and in the Andover Public Library. A number of students come to the Bachelder Library during its evening hours. Thursday afternoons, between 12:30 and 2:30 p.m., the schoolchildren come by classes to the Andover Public Library to use the facilities for research projects, to pick out reading books, and to discover the library's potential as a resource center.

Although use of the Statewide Borrower's Card has been discontinued, patrons may secure library materials through the Inter-Library Loan System.

The Andover Public Library has become increasingly more congested. It is desperately in need of renovated and more adequate shelving. Subject to approval of the Town Meeting, together with the very generous donation received from the Andover Service Club, the Board will attempt to alleviate these conditions.

At this time, the Board would like to express its appreciation to all of the organizations and individuals who have contributed to the two libraries. A special Thank You to Mr. John Seymour for the donation of his time, energy and "Cheery Self" in caring for the premises of the Andover Public Library.

KEARSARGE VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

The Kearsarge Visiting Nurse Association has touched the lives of many people in your town this year. The enrollment in the Child Health Program has increased serving 17 children in your town with a total of 124 immunizations given. We have screened 43 people at your Blood Pressure Clinics/Health Fairs with 37 new people in attendance. The growth of KVNA is also reflected in the 433 nursing care visits, 30 Physical and Occupational Therapy visits, and 488 hours for Homemaker and Home Health Aide in your town.

In 1982 we are requesting for the third straight year, the per capita assessment of \$1.95. Total town appropriations equal 15% of our operating budget. RN's, Homemaker/Home Health Aides, a Physical Therapist and Occupational Therapist are offering more sophisticated health care including blood drawing and plans for IV Therapy. For the patient, this may mean reduced time spent in the hospital and lowered health care costs. For the elderly, our supportive services may enable people to remain in their own homes, forestalling or preventing institutional placement. These visits are reflected in the following age distribution of our total caseload.

Your continued support and confidence in our organization allows us to grow and serve the health needs of your community.

FRANKLIN COMMUNITY ACTION PROGRAM

On November 9, the Franklin Area Center moved from the Syndicate Block on 336 Central Street to the old Bi-Rite Building at 82 Elkins Street. This move was made to answer the need for better accessibility for all our participants; especially the elderly and handicapped. The other programs located here are Family Planning, W.I.C. (Women, Infants and Children), Weatherization, Twin Rivers Support Services and Franklin Day Care. We cordially invite everyone to come and visit our new offices. We are open from 8:30 to 4:30, weekdays.

All of our programs have expanded this year, particularly our energy assistance program, due to increased fuel costs. Funds extended from the Area Center totaled \$527,396.77, more than \$96,000 over the previous year. The W.I.C. program has tripled its program this year. On September 1 a new meals-on-wheels route was started in Sanbornton. We are still looking for more home-bound handicapped and elderly persons to join the program.

A group of students from U.N.H., under the Morehouse Grant, coordinated their efforts with CAP and St. Paul's Church resulting in a new food-co-op in Franklin. If anyone is interested, please call our office at 934-3444, for more information.

In addition to the above programs, we have continued to serve our clients in Franklin and the surrounding areas with our regular programs such as: Weatherization, Rural Home Repair, Transportation, Senior Companion, Elderly Nutrition Congregate, Meals-on-Wheels and Family Planning.

We still have openings on our Advisory Board for anyone interested. Please call if you need help with anything.

MINUTES OF TOWN MEETING

Andover, New Hampshire
March 10, 1981

Meeting called to order at 7:09 P.M. First order of business was to inform the assembled body that the *one year* Library Trustee was incorrect and that the term would be a three year term.

ARTICLE 1: To Elect Officers.

Selectmen: (3 yrs.) George Upton - 383; (2 yrs.) Dennis Fenton - 387; (1 yr.) John F. Graves - 271, Joseph D. Roberts - 46, Armand Boisvert - 98; Town Clerk: Donna C. Duclos - 190, Lorraine Locke - 99, Diane Beaudoin - 87; Tax Collector: Donna C. Duclos - 190, Lorraine Locke - 99, Diane Beaudoin - 93. Treasurer: Ann W. Clark - 399; Road Agent: J. Dale McLeod - 313, John Jurta, Jr. - 124; Budget Committee: (2 yrs.) Paul Nagy - 308; Budget Committee: (3 yrs.) Alan Doherty - 356; Library Trustees: Kimball Elkins - 35, Susan Whitbeck - 18; Trustee of Trust Funds: Kimball Elkins - 12.

ARTICLE 2: To vote on the official ballot the amendments to the Andover Zoning Ordinance. Question 2: Yes - 252, No - 106.

ARTICLE 3: To vote on the official ballot the amendments to the Andover Zoning Ordinance. Question 3: Yes - 250, No - 88.

ARTICLE 4: To vote on the official ballot to see if the Town will adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43B and C, relative to the Expanded Exemptions on Real Estate for the Elderly as printed in the Town Report. Yes - 337, No - 54.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as off-sets against the budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in the amounts indicated herewith or take any other action hereon. Visiting Nurse Assoc. - \$2,000.00; Town Hall and Other Buildings - \$1,000.00; Library - \$5,000.00; Welfare - \$1,000.00; Police Department - \$3,000.00. So moved, seconded and passed without discussion.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to make the term of office of the Road Agent two years instead of the current one year. A motion was made to Pass Over Article 6. A second was made. The moderator explained the voting of Passing Over an article. The question was moved to a vote and was not passed. It was moved that we adopt Article 6 and seconded. Mr. Henderson explained that it seemed more feasible to have a 2 year term due to the fact that the Town owns none of its own equipment and it was expensive for someone to provide the equipment for the year if the only reason it was purchased was to serve the Town. The vote was called for and passed. It was amended that the two year term should become effective in March of 1982.

ARTICLE 7: To take the qualified sense of the Town as to the disposition of the No. 9 shed and the use of the surrounding property. Motion was made to leave as is but not let it deteriorate any further. Mr. Henderson spoke to the assembly to explain the reason this article was placed in the warrant. The No. 9 shed is in very bad shape and something must be done. It was suggested that: (1) it be torn down due to the potential danger, (2) that the conservation commission is trying to turn the area into a park and swimming hole and that No. 9 could be used as a shelter, (3) that shed maintenance is expensive and the police cannot defend it from vandals, (4) No. 9 should be torn down and the salvage

sold for profit, (5) it is an old landmark and should be preserved, (6) the fire department could burn it down as a practice drill and (7) that a committee be set up to take care of the problem. It was explained by Mr. Henderson that there is pressure by the State to stop swimming at Bradley Lake. If it were turned into a swimming hole, the problem of the lake could be alleviated and people would still have a place to swim. Motion to leave as is was defeated. A Motion was made and seconded to form a committee. Mr. Henderson suggested that if a committee was needed that it be formed immediately. It was very hard for the Selectmen to appoint a committee. Mr. Fenton said he didn't think it would be a problem for the Selectmen and he thought it should be left to the Selectmen. Mr. Scott Robart, Mr. Harold Wilson, Jr. and Mr. Gary Olson volunteered to be on the committee. Hand vote after verbal vote being indistinguishable. Yes –82, No – 48.

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will vote to remove the remaining funds in the Dump Capital Reserve amounting to \$14,076.60 plus interest and apply it to funding the Keniston Covered Bridge. Mr. Henderson explained the money has been in Capital Reserve for 4 years. It won't be necessary for the landfill for two years at least. There was a question as to whether the Bridge actually needed to be done this year and it was explained that the actual necessity could be discussed under Article 9. If this was voted down then Article 9 would not be altered and the decision of the Bridge could be made. If a yes vote was returned on this article and Article 9 was defeated the money would remain in Capital Reserve. The motion was made to pass the article, a second was given. The vote was a hand vote by statute necessity and was passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to repair the Keniston Covered Bridge, at a cost not to exceed \$60,000.00, and to authorize payment by the following means: (a) withdrawing the \$22,000.00 plus interest from the Keniston Covered Bridge Capital Reserve Fund, (b) to authorize the Selectmen to borrow up to \$38,000.00 at the best possible interest for a five year loan. It was explained that since the \$60,000.00 estimate was given, the cost has increased so it is necessary to raise the ceiling figure to \$66,000.00. Mr. Henderson explained that the grader cannot get over the bridge in its present condition and there are people on Bridge Road and that road needs maintenance. Mr. Upton explained the bridge value in detail. He stated that if we waited until next year the cost would most likely be in the area of \$74,000.00 and could go as high as \$83,000.00. It was explained, due to a request by a citizen, that the bridge would be under construction during a dry period so that the road through Wyeth's field could be used by the people living on the other side of the bridge.

An amendment was made to make the total appropriation \$66,000.00, this including \$20,000.00 plus interest from the Keniston Covered Bridge Capital Reserve fund and \$30,000.00 at the best possible interest for a five year loan. (The residual coming from the Dump Capital Reserve Fund as voted in Article 8.) A motion was made to adopt the article as amended and a hand vote was called for. The vote was unanimously in favor of passing the article as amended.

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will vote to withdraw \$1,800.00 from the Proctor Cemetery Operating Fund for the purpose of improving new lot layouts. So moved, seconded and passed.

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to withdraw \$400.00 plus interest from the Tax Map Capital Reserve for the professional updating of the Tax Map. So moved, seconded and passed.

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town will accept the so-called Old Boston Hill

Road for a distance of 1200 feet from its intersection with Boston Hill Road. So moved, seconded and passed.

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to pave the section of the road known as the Currier Road between its inter-section with Boston Hill Road. Mr. Delaney explained that they (the homeowners along the road) were interested in the section from Plains Road to the bridge on Currier Road. It was explained that just the oil would cost \$22,000.00 at last year's price. The Board of Selectmen stated that they were not for or against the article. It was stated that the problem of dust was terrible along the road. Calcium chloride and its expense and ecological dangers were discussed. Motion was made and seconded and the amendment did not pass.

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will vote to petition the Representatives and Senators who represent the Town in the General Court to support in the current session of the General Court the concurrent resolution to amend the State Constitution to limit the annual increase in property taxes to five percent and to limit the annual increase in spending by the state or and city, town or other government unit of the state to five percent. It was explained that this was submitted by petition. It was moved that it be adopted and seconded. It was stated that we should send a message to our Representative to send a mandate to the General Court stating that we did not want the hand of Mr. Thomson on our budgets. Vote was called for and did not pass.

ARTICLE 15: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the expenditure of any funds received in 1981 under Title II, VI, or any other State or Intergovernmental assistance act. So moved, seconded and passed.

9:09 P.M. Moderator called for a brief intermission.

Meeting resumed 9:30 P.M.

ARTICLE 16: To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget as presented by the Budget Committee. It was moved and seconded to consider the Budget section by section. Passed.

General Government: So moved. Question of Officer's Expenses was explained by the fact that the Administrative Assistant's salary was part of that figure. Seconded and passed.

Protection of Person & Property: Conservation Commission should have \$50.00 more in budget. Insurance appropriations \$5,500.00. An amendment was made to increase the Conservation Commission budget by \$50.00. Seconded and passed to adopt as amended.

Health Department: Moved and seconded to accept. There was an explanation of landfill cost increase of over \$4,000.00. Mr. Henderson explained briefly to everyone's satisfaction. Passed.

Highways & Bridges: Moved, seconded and passed as recommended.

Libraries: Moved and seconded, passed as recommended.

Public Welfare: Moved and seconded. There was a question as to the increase in the Community Action Program. It was explained by a CAP worker and Mr. Henderson that the cost of the program was divided among the towns served by CAP and that this amount was our share. There was a question why the Old Age Assistance had been decreased. It was explained that we have a credit with the county. It was further stated that if someone in the town was using this assistance, we were responsible for the first year and after that, the county footed the expense. Passed.

Patriotic Purposes: Moved, seconded as recommended and passed.

Recreation: Moved, seconded and passed as recommended.

Public Service Enterprises: Moved to accept as recommended, seconded and passed.

Unclassified: Moved and seconded as recommended. Passed.

Debt Service: Moved and seconded as recommended. Passed

Capital Outlay: Not necessary.

Payment Capital Reserve Fund: Moved and seconded as recommended. Passed.

New total Appropriations \$287,639.95 is correct figure for budget.

ARTICLE 18: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. So moved, seconded and passed.

ARTICLE 19: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting. Mrs. Cuyjet requested that the elected officials—specifically the Road Agent—must have a report in writing each year of expenditures and accomplishments. Mr. Henderson explained that the other officials do give such reports and that the Road Agent has to submit a weekly report of what has been done, what has been spent and why. There was a second and the motion did not pass.

The salary figures above refer to the local share as determined by the joint School Administrative Unit Board. They do not include the amount of \$7,770 paid by the state, of which \$3,000 is on the salary of the superintendent and \$2,385 on salary of each of the assistant superintendents.

ANDOVER SCHOOL BOARD REPORT 1981 – 1982

We selected Dynamic Integrations Corporation of Fairlee, Vermont to do our technical assistant report. A special school district meeting was held August 25, 1981. It was voted to complete all improvements which had an accumulative payback of three years or less for a total of \$27,500.00. This was financed by a three-year note, the first payment due during the school budget year of 1981-82. All of the improvements except for storm windows and the new gas hot water heater have been implemented and these should be completed by the annual district meeting.

We very much appreciate the work the PTO Playground Committee has done at our school. They spent a weekend cleaning the play area, repairing and painting the equipment, adding a bark ground covering, and installing a new slide.

This year all schools are now working with the handicap of minimum state aid. This will be reflected within our own school budget, particularly in the areas of School Administrative Unit support and in the education of special students.

Some of the changes in our school this year include the addition of a second fifth and sixth grade due to the large number of students in those classes. We also have a new volunteer coordinator this year—Alice Perry, who works with volunteers in the school. The volunteers help in all grades, often in a one-on-one situation, enriching our education programs. School staff have added two new areas to the scheduled extra-curricular activities—computer club and cross country ski program.

Our health curriculum has been improved this year through the work of Kevin Johnson who wrote and received a grant from the New Hampshire Heart Association to purchase materials and equipment necessary to teach CPR and cardiovascular education to our eighth grade students. Thanks to the assistance of Mrs. Marge Whedon nearly all the students received their certification in CPR.

At joint Merrimack Valley and Andover School Board meetings we continue to receive good reports on how well our students are doing, both in academics and in sports.

ANDOVER SCHOOL DISTRICT REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board, and Citizens of Andover:

Increased enrollment in grades 5 and 6 led to the addition of a staff member this year at the Andover Elementary School. We now have ten full time classroom teachers in grades 1-8.

The Andover Elementary School's program of studies strongly emphasizes the basic skills of reading, writing, mathematics, sciences, and the history, government and geography of New Hampshire and the United States. In its effort to maintain and strengthen student performance in these subjects, your school board is supporting a comprehensive program of testing and evaluation. Both individual students and the overall program are tested yearly. Information for this evaluation is collected through the Accountability and Achievement Testing Programs.

The Accountability Plan developed over the past three years describes specific expectations of the Language Arts, Mathematics, United States History and Government and New Hampshire History and Government. The Plan develops a system for monitoring student programs toward achieving these outcomes, institutes a process for reporting that progress to you, the citizens of the district, and sets up an instructional improvement plan which will promote improved student performance.

Students in Grade 5 took their Accountability Test this fall in the following areas:

- I. Language Arts
 - a. Listening
 - b. Reading
 - c. Composition — rules
 - d. Composition — student writing sample
 - e. Handwriting — student writing sample

- II. Mathematics
 - a. Computation — addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division
 - b. Problem Solving

- III. Social Studies
 - a. Map Reading
 - b. New Hampshire history, government and geography

Andover students attending Merrimack Valley High School have also been tested. Results of student performance will be made available to the Andover Board and staff.

An achievement and intelligence testing program is carried out in grades 3 and 7. Students are tested with the Iowa Test of Basic Skills and the Cognitive Abilities Test. These tests measure the achievement level of each student in each discipline tested with relation to age and ability. The program also compares the achievement of the students in our school with national norms. Andover students consistently score at or above the national level at both grades 3 and 7.

Grades 5-8 increased from four to six classrooms this year because of increased enrollments in grades 5 and 6. As a result a schedule change was required which added one additional period to the day and also required a lengthening of the school day. The resulting schedule has worked well and allowed for additional emphasis on reading and language arts in grades 5-8.

We were very fortunate this past year to receive an anonymous donation which has allowed for the purchase of two micro-computers at the Andover Elementary School. Through the efforts of Mrs. Betty Bardsley and Anne Clark the computer program has been established in the library at school. Students in grades 2-8 have been able to learn how to use the computers for math, spelling, grammar, history and geography exercises as well as learning how to set up their own programs. Development of this program will provide our students with a knowledge and understanding of computers which are becoming a part of our everyday lives.

For the first time in many years all Andover high school students attended the same public high school. Seventy-eight Andover students are attending Merrimack Valley High School this year. It is expected that 92 Andover students will be attending Merrimack Valley High School next year. From all reports of Guidance and Administration of Merrimack Valley High School, Andover students continue to do very well academically and in many sports and other school activities.

The 1981 census results show an increase in the newborn to five year old population. For each year of the five year period, 18-22 children were reported. Past experience has been that these numbers generally increase by the time that children enter first grade. Any significant increases could result in a space problem in our school as we are now using all of the current classrooms.

As recommended by the Technical Assistance Study completed by Dynamic Integrations Corporation of Fairlee, Vermont, \$27,000 was authorized for the purpose of completing energy saving projects at Andover Elementary School. This work includes insulation of walls, pipes and roofs, new energy saving lighting fixtures, improved heating system operation through balancing, valve controls and reduced fan operation and storm windows. It is expected that this work, when completed will show a reduction in oil and electrical use throughout the building.

It is worth mentioning that, even prior to these conservation measures, the school staff and students were able to accomplish very substantial energy savings during the 1980-81 school year in oil use and electricity use.

We have examined the combined financial statements and the individual fund financial statement of the Andover School District as of and for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1981, as listed in the foregoing table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset group of accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset group of accounts results in an incomplete presentation as explained in the above paragraph, the combined financial statements and the individual fund financial statement referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Andover School District at June 30, 1981, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole and on the individual fund financial statement. The accompanying financial information listed as supplemental schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Andover School District. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined and individual fund financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

June 30, 1981

NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following is a summary of significant accounting policies employed in the preparation of these financial statements.

A. Fund Accounting

The accounts of the School District are organized on the basis of funds or account groups, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues and expenditures, as appropriate. Government resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled. The various funds are grouped by type in the financial statements. The following fund types and account groups are used by the School District:

GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS

General Fund – The General Fund is the general operating fund of the District. All general revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to another fund are accounted for in this fund. From the fund are paid the general operating expenditures, the fixed charges and the capital improvement costs that are not paid through other funds.

Special Revenue Funds – Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than expendable trust or major capital projects) requiring separate accounting because of legal or regulatory provisions or administrative action. The Food Service fund is shown in this fund type.

FIDUCIARY FUNDS

Trust and Agency Funds – Trust and Agency Funds are used to account for the assets held in trust or as an agent by the School District for others. The Student Activity fund is shown in this fund type.

B. Account Groups (Fixed Assets)

All governmental funds are accounted for on a spending or “financial flow” measurement focus. This means that only current assets and current liabilities are generally included on their balance sheets. Their reported fund balance (net current assets) is considered a measure of “available spendable resources.” Governmental fund operating statements present increases (revenues and other financing sources) and decreases (expenditures and other uses) in net current assets. Accordingly, they are said to present a summary of sources and uses of available spendable resources during a period.

General fixed assets have been acquired for general governmental purposes and have been recorded as expenditures in the fund making the expenditure. These expenditures are required to be capitalized at historical cost in a General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts for accountability purposes. In accordance with the practices followed by other municipal entities in the State, the School District does not maintain a record of its general fixed assets and

accordingly, a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in this financial report.

C. Basis of Accounting

The accounts of the General and Special Revenue Funds are maintained and reported on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, sources of financial resources and assets are recognized when measurable and available to finance operations during the year. Uses of financial resources and liabilities are recognized when obligations are incurred from receipt of goods and services, when assessments are made by the State or in the case of judgments and claims against the School District, when there is a probability that such judgments and claims will result in liabilities, the amounts of which can be reasonably estimated. An exception to this general rule is accumulated unpaid vacation and sick pay.

D. Budgetary Accounting

General governmental revenues and expenditures accounted for in budgetary funds are controlled by a formal integrated budgetary accounting system in accordance with various legal requirements which govern the School Districts' operations.

E. Inventories

Inventory in the General and Special Revenue funds consists of expendable supplies held for consumption. The cost thereof has been recorded as an expenditure at the time individual inventory items were purchased.

F. Accumulated Unpaid Vacation and Sick Pay

Accumulated unpaid vacation and sick pay is not accrued in the governmental funds using the modified accrual basis of accounting. Employees may accumulate up to sixty days sick leave at a rate of 10 days per year. Full-time employees other than teachers are allowed two weeks vacation time. The cost of sick leave is recognized only at the time payments are made. Vacation pay accumulation does not exceed a normal year's allowance.

G. Interfund Transactions

During the course of normal operations the School District has transactions between funds, including expenditures and transfers of resources to provide services. The accompanying governmental fund financial statements reflect such transactions as transfers.

NOTE 3 – PENSION PLAN

The teachers and employee

The teachers and employees are covered under the State of New Hampshire Retirement System. The District's contribution for normal cost of the plan is based upon an actuarial valuation of the entire State plan. Since the actuarial valuation is performed on the entire State plan the amount, if any, of the excess of vested benefits over pension fund assets for the Andover School District is not available. The District does not have an accrued liability for past service costs. The retirement cost for 1980-81 was \$3,068.
