HISTORY OF THE GLEN FIRE STATION BUILDING

It wasn't easy but it finally got built would be a good way to sum up the building of Bartlett's first Town House. It first appears on the warrant for the town meeting in 1846 as well as in 1848, 1856, 1858, and 1869 but was passed over each time. It then appeared in 1872 but was voted down. Finally in 1875 it was voted to build it with so much of the State Bonds as it would require and appointed the Selectmen as the committee to locate the land and build it.

At the 1894 Town Meeting, it was voted to grant the use of the Town House to the I.O. of G.P. free of charge and allow them to make improvements as they so desired. In 1895 a Special Town Meeting was called to allow individuals to make additions to the back of the building as long as there was no expense to the town. The 1903 Town Meeting voted to allow the Glen Grange to build a stable on its lot near the Town House, however, passed over the article which asked for a town appropriation to build it. The Town Meeting of 1912 brought some major changes in that it voted to cut off 18 ft. from the back of the building, move it back 18 ft. and in between build a stage and wing booths for voting purposes as well as laying a hardwood floor on the ground floor, however, the amount was not to exceed \$900.00. But then a petition was presented for a Special Town Meeting which was held March 27, 1912 which apparently rescinded the vote. They tried again in 1913 and it was approved this time plus voted to accept \$170 from the Glen Dramatic Club for putting in a furnace. The Town Meeting of 1915 instructed the Selectmen to purchase folding chairs to accommodate no less than 100 people for the Town House, attach the so-called lobby to the building and convert it into a toilet with dressing room, and build a double chimney.

Unfortunately, remaining pieces of history have been difficult to ascertain, but we do know that the building was used as the Town Garage for a period and then as the Fire Station. The small building beside the main building was used for many years as

the Selectmen's Office and the old vault is still in place in the building.

In 1947 the Glen Volunteer Fire Co. was formed (the year of the Brownfield fire) and was incorporated on December 9, 1947 by the State of New Hampshire. From what we can gather, the first Fire Chief was Arnold Kenison. Other Chiefs of the Glen Station have been Fred Hanscom, Ray Kelley, Severin Way, Dennis Lufkin, Reggie Illsley, Ray Kelley, Jr., John E. Moulton, Carroll Young, and John E. "Eddie" Parker, Sr. This brings us up to 1981 when the Glen and Bartlett Village departments became one town-wide department with Robert L. Jones as its first Fire Chief. In 1989 the Town voted to hire its first full time Fire Chief Roger Labbe.

Since we have embarked on this project, it is hoped that more information will be forthcoming and a complete history of the buildings will be put together as part

of the Town's history.

1997 TOWN MEETING WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs: You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday the eleventh day of March 1997 at eight o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Articles 1-2 will be by official ballot at the Town Hall and the polls shall open for balloting at eight o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before seven o'clock in the evening. The following articles (Articles 3-29) in the warrant will be acted upon on Thursday, March 13, 1997 at six thirty o'clock in the evening at the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School in Bartlett Village.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. Are you in favor of adoption of AMENDMENT NO. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: To amend Article V Height Limitations to change (as shown in underlined capital letters) the last sentence only to read: (DELETE the first word "Excluded from") "The height limitations of radio and television antennas, silos for storage of feed crops, church towers, cupolas, water storage structures, chimneys, radio towers, TELECOMMUNICATIONS TOWERS, ski area tramways, flagpoles, or ski area crash fences and any other similarly slender, unoccupied structures SHALL NOT EXCEED 60 FT. IN HEIGHT FROM THE LOWEST POINT OF FINISHED GROUND LEVEL EXCEPT BY OBTAINING A SPECIAL EXCEPTION UNDER ARTICLE XVIII-D-1-u."; and add to Article XVIII Zoning Board of Adjustment Section D-1 provision "u. Unoccupied Structures - a deviation from the height requirement in all districts."

ARTICLE 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70,000.00 for town road improvements and reconstruction. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to hook up to the Lower Bartlett Water Precinct water line for water supply to the Town Hall and Town Garage. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for its share of updating the Bartlett, Jackson, and Carroll County emergency communications system. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for the purchase of computer hardware and software for a municipal tax billing and accounting program for the Town Clerk/Tax Collector and Selectmen's Office. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$68,000.00 for the purchase of a two wheel drive diesel engine highway truck with a plow, frame, and an additional plow and frame; and authorize the withdrawal of \$25,000.00 from the highway equipment Capital Reserve Fund for this purpose; and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$43,000.00 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33) and to authorize the municipal officials to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for the purchase and installation of a new 10 key diesel fuel pump at the Town Garage. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 as Bartlett's share of a waste oil collection facility at the Bartlett Jackson Transfer Station. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000.00 for the construction of a roof over the handicap ramp at the Town Hall. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 for the purchase of four air packs and turnout gear for the Fire Dept. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$57,000.00, to be added to the existing \$67,000.00, for final closure of the old Garland Landfill. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to approve the establishment of a Trust Fund entitled "Public Educational/Governmental Cable Television (PEG)" and direct that funds derived from the State Cable TV Franchise Fees be placed in the Fund to support the local PEG channel activities until rescinded by voter action. Trust funds, at the discretion of the Selectmen, shall be distributed to the nonprofit PEG organization, Valley Vision, to support the operations of the PEG channel for the benefit of the community. Agreeable to a petition signed by Peter Pelletier and others. Selectmen oppose - if passed approximately \$30,000 of town revenues would be lost to an unproven entity.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to turn over to the abutters that portion of frontage, with the minimum width acceptable to the Planning Board, off Rt. 16 at Intervale Lane travelling west at the north side of the railroad tracks per the survey prepared by Ammonoosuc Survey Company drawing #C-97-04 dated January 29, 1997. Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie Kroger and others. Selectmen favor concept but Town should decide whether to receive payment for the land and Article should be amended to allow Selectmen to have some latitude due to the road right-of-way.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the support of the Mount Washington Valley Economic Council. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joanne Campbell and others. Selectmen oppose.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to defray the expenses of the service programs and operating costs of the Mt. Washington Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross who takes our Cares and Concerns and puts it into Action. Agreeable to a petition signed by Cheryl Alander and others. Chandler/Patch oppose - not a proper use of town funds for national organizations; people should have an individual choice concerning donations to charitable organizations/Roode favors.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for support of operating expenses of the Eastern Slope Regional Airport Authority. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,620.00 to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service. Agreeable to a petition signed by Vicki Varrichione and others. Chandler opposes - Patch/Roode favor.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,380.00 for the Children's Health Center. Agreeable to a petition signed by Prudence Plusch and others. Selectmen oppose - this is a \$1,045 increase over last year.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,150.00 for the Early Intervention Program of Children Unlimited, Inc. (birth to 3 yrs.). Agreeable to a petition signed by Cheryl Moody and others. Chandler/Patch oppose - Roode favors.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,769.00 for the support of the Gibson Center for Senior Services. Agreeable to a petition signed by Richard Nealley and others. Selectmen favor last year's request of \$4,499.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 for support of the Tri-County Community Action Program in North Conway. Agreeable to a petition signed by Charles Gothreau and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,326.00 for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie Kroger and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$589.00 for the support of Carroll County Against Domestic Violence and Rape's shelter for battered women and children. Agreeable to a petition signed by Charles Gothreau and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,165.00 to assist the Family Health Centre. Agreable to a petition signed by Vicki Varrichione and others. Selectmen oppose.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,105.00 for the Family Support Program of The Center of Hope. Agreeable to a petition signed by Susan Fox and others. Selectmen oppose.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 as its share to participate in the Hazardous Waste Collection Day along with the Town of Conway. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 29. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Probably the top story of 1996 was the approval of the new Grand Summit Conference/Condominium Hotel at Attitash Bear Peak and the seemingly endless meetings, votes, and lawsuits required to finally bring that issue to a conclusion. Despite dealing with many issues, personalities, and suggestions, the process was carried out democratically, with every faction having their say and changes being made to ensure the best product for the Town. By the time this report is printed, part of the complex should be open and the hotel should become a tremendous asset to the Town.

Unfortunately, our one year reduction in school taxes did not continue and the school and county portions of the tax rate went up \$0.76 and \$0.11 respectively while the town portion decreased by \$0.37. It is anticipated that the county tax will not increase this year and some restraint shown by voters at town and school meetings along with some increased property valuation should result in at least holding our tax rate steady for another year.

The new fire station should be occupied by the time of this printing and the new facility should solve the Town's emergency department needs for a long time to come. The Town received a very fair settlement from the State for our old facility and the Selectmen set out to provide a quality replacement station. The facility could have been scaled back but since the money was available, the Selectmen felt it was a proper time to meet the Town's needs for many years. The Town has not had a sufficient place to house people should a disaster, bad storm, or other problem occur nor have we had a suitable space for emergency training meetings for the fire and ambulance personnel and the Selectmen felt that this was the opportunity to provide that type of space. The new station will have room to house people, with cooking and showering facilities all powered by a generator should the need arise. In addition, this same space will provide much needed training and meeting areas for our fire department and ambulance service, something that has been sorely lacking for years. It was also decided that it was best to have a full cellar under part of the station and an additional storage area/garage area should be built at this time as both areas will provide future space and storage needs.

The Selectmen would like to thank everyone who helped with

the new facility. In addition to LA Drew, Inc. and all of their sub-contractors, Ward D'Elia, Architect, Fire Chief Roger Labbe and Ambulance Director Jim Clemons, the Selectmen especially would like to thank George Howard and Diana Allen of the Howard Family Trust and Lynn and Judy Roberts who were all abutters to the project and without their help with land swaps and water hookups would have left the Town with a much less viable facility. We also would like to extend thanks to the NH Department of Transportation for their cooperation throughout this project.

The Selectmen have moved very close to finally receiving a permit to close the old landfill. While this event has gone on for a number of years, the end result will be a closure that represents the least expensive alternatives to meet State standards. The State has been very cooperative in meeting with us and accepting some of our alternatives to their proposals so we believe we have a win-win situation for everyone but especially the taxpayer. To paraphrase Boston Red Sox fans - this is the year! Elsewhere in the Town Report is an up to date report of the status of the Dump Capital Reserve Fund and available monies to complete the closure project.

Contrary to recent letters to the newspaper, Bartlett does indeed recycle and the effort is going quite well. Brochures are available with the complete details on what is mandatory to recycle, what is voluntary, and fees for certain items. In 1996, we received \$6,841 for our recyclables and saved \$8,268 in tipping fees plus \$2,000 in trucking fees for a total savings effort of approximately \$17,000. In addition, the towns took in over \$4,000 in other fees at the Transfer Station. Recycling pays and the Selectmen thank everyone for their efforts and urge even greater participation in the program. Also, the Town's contract for hauling the non-recyclable waste has gone down by \$3.00 per ton for 1997 affording us additional savings in our solid waste disposal budget.

The highway improvement program is moving ahead with another year of significant progress towards the goal of rehabilitation of the Town's roads. While we could appropriate significantly more money to spend on our roads, the Selectmen have tried to increase the amount of improvements and still keep an eye on the tax burden. While this is a difficult balance, the amount in the budget and warrant articles seems to be a fair compromise towards improvements and taxes. During 1996

major repairs, ditching, culvert work, shimming and tarring were done on the following roads: Town Hall Road, Dundee Road, Glen Ledge Road and in Linderhof.

This winter like last has so far been very tough on the roads, both for the Town and State, due to the amount of rain and inconsistent up and down freezing and thawing weather. Once warmer weather arrives, the Selectmen and Road Agent will take a look at the roads, winter damage, and embark on the continuing program of regular maintenance and rehabilitation. One aspect of work not immediately recognizable are the drainage improvements that are being accomplished. These ditching and culverting efforts will help maintain our roads after they have been repaired and these efforts represent significant improvements over recent years.

The Town is in remarkably good financial shape despite the slight increase in the 1996 tax rate. Our surplus remains healthy and at the end of 1996 property tax collections are in good shape with \$488,095 owed for 1996, \$92,134 owed for 1995 and \$58,557 for prior years. The Town has only \$70,000 in long term debt with \$45,000 to be paid off in 1997 and the remaining \$25,000 in 1998. In addition to a new fire station from the State, the early payment by the State allowed the Town to reduce not only the amount but the length of our short term borrowing known as Tax Anticipation Notes (TAN's). Unfortunately, the State won't be buying anything this year so our short term interest expense will increase over last year's levels. This is an expense which can be reduced by twice a year tax billing, and although the idea was shot down a few years ago, it is a way to reduce expenses. It should be understood that there are some increased expenses with extra billing so all of the interest expense is not saved, but a conservative estimate would see a savings of \$30,000 per year.

The Town has changed its employee health insurance coverage this year by switching from Blue Cross/Blue Shield Comp 200 to Blue Choice but still using the New Hampshire Municipal Association Health Insurance Trust program to benefit from rates via a municipal pool. Even though there is an increase in the premium for this program, changing to Blue Choice results in an approximate \$18,000 savings to the town than if we had stayed with the old plan. The Selectmen would encourage other taxpayer paid insurance plans to also adopt this change as it not only results in a savings to the taxpayer but provides the same essential health care services to the employee and if the plan is

not used too many times by the employee, it may actually result in a savings to them due to the change in the deductible format.

Unfortunately, the completion of the E-911 System is coming a little later than desired. The holdup has been the need of a day's work with the State's mapping crew and satellite truck and the difficulty in getting them back to finish the job. When completed, the Selectmen will hold a series of meetings to discuss new road names in areas of town where duplicate names need to be changed or have never been formally established. Fortunately, we do not have too many duplicate names so we hope the new naming process will go relatively smoothly.

This year the Annual Hellen Hayes 4th of July Parade will be held on (surprise!) the 4th of July. With the holiday coming on a Friday, the parade can be held on the holiday and hopefully more events will be held on the weekend continuing the newly started Old Home Weekend format.

This year in addition to thanking all of the Town employees for their continued excellent work and the volunteers to the various Town Boards, the Selectmen would like to encourage more people to become involved in their Town and School functions and meetings. The Bartlett Athletic and Recreation Association needs volunteers and fundraisers, the Conservation Commission, Planning Board and Zoning Board of Adjustment all need interested people to donate their time to benefit the community. Please give it some thought the next time you're asked to help or step forward on your own to volunteer.

BARTLETT PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORT 1996

The library book, periodical, and audio-visual circulations for 1996 were 13,148. Four hundred seventy-three books were added to the collection with 68 being gift books. The library continues to use NHAIS, the New Hampshire Automated Information System, to search for materials in its system of more than 200 libraries in New Hampshire. It also provides ARTICLE EXPRESS, a service provided by the NH State Library, which will fax full-text magazine articles to researchers on the same day as requested. The NH State Library van service delivers requested brooks to our library once a week. Another service provided by our library is the rotating video collection provided by the libraries belonging to the BearCamp Video Cooperative. This collection rotates through the participating libraries every two months.

Our summer reading program "READING AROUND THE WORLD-1996" was popular with the children. Stories and activities representing France, England, Australia, Mexico, China, Africa, and United States of America were held Wednesday mornings for six weeks. A closing party provided lots of fun for all with challenging games, puzzles, mazes and face painting. Awards and gift certificates were given to the reading participants.

Our library is continuing to sponsor the Birthday Book Club. Parents may purchase a book from our Birthday Box for twelve dollars as a gift to the library in honor of their child. A special book plate honoring the "birthday child" is placed on the inside cover of the book. Books in the Birthday Box are recommended Reading Rainbow books or books from a "best books for children" book list.

Mrs. Garland (librarian) was chairperson to the Area Forum #1 (a group of North Country libraries); attended two Five Rivers User's meetings (NHAIS); attended the annual NHLA Conference; and also spent two days at the Christa McAuliffe Technology Conference.

Some figures in the financial report need explaining. The H.W. Wilson Company ran the Reader's Guide Periodical Abstracts (CD ROM version) subscription longer than anticipated, therefore, renewal funds were not expended in 1996 and are

being held to fund this line item this year. Our dedicated phone line was installed in December.

Our library will soon be using <u>Athena</u>, a library automation system. We now have two computers that will be linked using Windows for Work Groups. This set-up will allow cataloging, circulating books, etc. to be done electronically. Another computer and printer will be needed to complete the system and allow patrons to search our book catalog electronically. The library's June Book Fair will help fund these needs.

This year the school added a bank of five computers and a printer into the library. This computer set-up, containing three electronic encyclopedias and Wilson Reader's Guide Abstracts, is available to public library patrons when the school is not in session.

Do plan to visit our library that is striving to meet today's information needs as well as prepare for the needs of the future. Our goal is to meet the needs of all patrons of the community. Public library patrons are welcome to visit the library any time the school is open as well as during our public library hours:

THE BARTLETT HISTORY FUND

The Bartlett History Fund was established by the Bartlett Library Trustees following the Town's bicentennial in 1990. The purpose of the History Fund is to further the recording of the history of Bartlett and its vicinity. Profits from the sale of the Bartlett history book, *Bartlett, New Hampshire, In the Valley of the Saco*, and the sale of bicentennial memorabilia were set aside to establish the Bartlett History Fund.

The following guidelines for the Bartlett History Fund have been established:

- All monies received from future sales of the Bartlett History Books, bicentennial memorabilia, and any other project undertaken by the Trustees for the History Fund will go to the History Fund.
- The money is put into a separate account under the name "Bartlett History Fund."
- This fund may not be used for the Library budget. The Library may, however, use this fund to purchase books and material which relate to the history of the town and region which will then become part of the Bartlett History Collection which is being maintained in a special fireproof file cabinet.
- The money in the History Fund may be expended for historical projects, pictures, postcards, and other types of historical materials.
- The Bartlett Library Trustees must approve the above expenditures. Donations of materials and monetary gifts may be made to the Fund.

Cash on hand as of December 31, 1996 is \$7,669.32.

The Library has copies of its two histories, Bartlett, New Hampshire: In the Valley of the Saco, and The Latchstring was Always Out: a History of Lodging Hospitality and Tourism in Bartlett, New Hampshire, by Aileen Carroll, for sale; these books are also on sale in the local bookstores.

BARTLETT-JACKSON AMBULANCE SERVICE REPORT

In 1996 we responded to 258 calls for service, which is down about 10 percent from 1995.

We ended the year with twenty-four members, all of whom are nationally certified Emergency Medical Technicians. Some members have gone on to higher training at the Intermediate Level, which allows these medically certified members to start intravenous fluid lines into the body and give certain drugs in the field. We have one member currently enrolled in a Paramedic course and another starting soon. It is interesting to note that all members combined have invested over three thousand hours of training or service to the Towns in the past year alone.

This past year, Bob Kroger has retired from the Ambulance Service after giving nineteen years of service to the Towns of Bartlett and Jackson. Bob was always there when needed regardless of the time of day or weather conditions. His specialty was water rescue and high angle rescue. He will be missed by all and we like to give a big "Thank You, Bob!".

By the time this report is out we should be in our new station, which is adjacent to the State Highway Garage in the Glen area. We will be planning an Open House in the spring. This facility is modern and so far ahead of what we had - it even has indoor plumbing conveniences!

This will be the second year in a row that our budget comes to you with no cost to the taxpayers. Over the past two years, we have gone to computer billing and collecting systems. A lot of hours have been invested by Sue Gaudette to set this system up.

As always, many thanks to the fire and police departments for their help and support on our calls.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

In calendar year 1995, our three (3) leading causes of fires were Children, Non-Permit fires not properly extinguished and Smoking Materials.

Violations of RSA 224:27 II, the fire permit law, and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire, are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violations are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Fire Officials, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. This also helps to prevent unnecessary response to a controlled burn.

ROAD AGENT REPORT

The Highway Department is responsible for maintaining approximately 90 lane miles of road as of this year. This represents approximately 5 times the amount of road we were responsible for just 25 years ago and this number keeps creeping upward.

This past summer we were able to do a good deal of road work. Some of the projects we accomplished were ditching and shimming portions of the Linderhof development, Dundee Road, Glenwood, and Glen Ledge, a major face lift to about half of Jenks Hill, re-engineering a drainage problem at the end of the Cobb Farm Road and a section of Alpendorf was reshaped, penetrated, and sealed. Linderhof also had some crack sealing done. Anyone who has driven in the Village area knows that the roads in the area were brought up to a substantial improvement as a result of a cooperative effort between the Bartlett Village Water Precinct Commissioners, Conn Construction, and the Town. This coming summer season we hope to do more ditching and shimming to Dundee Road, Linderhof, Glen Ledge, Town Hall Rd., Thorn Hill Rd., and River St. With some luck and cooperation from Mother Nature, we will be sealing the areas done last season as well as those done this upcoming season.

Thanks mainly to the support of taxpayers and the Selectmen, we were able to purchase some equipment that has made our job more productive. The roller/trailer combination has enabled us to do more shimming at a lesser cost because we do not have to rent a roller at a substantial cost and with the trailer we can move the roller ourselves without interrupting our schedule or anyone else's to get the roller (or anything else we need) moved. The tractor/mower has also worked out well. Although the job is somewhat of an eyesore right after it is done, within a few years it will be less of one by getting rid of the larger growth and mowing the smaller growth every year. The new garage doors together with the waste oil heater have dramatically reduced our heating costs as we now use the propane for back-up heat only. The new truck seems to be performing its duties well so far this winter season. We already have more snow on the ground than we received all last winter. It looks like it is going to be a very long and snowy winter.

As far as a backhoe is concerned, thanks to Conway Tractor, we are able to rent a small excavator at a very reasonable rate.

This piece of equipment is invaluable to our efforts. We hope we will be able to take advantage of this for many years to come.

Lastly, I would like to thank two groups of people. First, I would like to thank my crew of Tim, Vin, Steve and Gerald for the job they do throughout the year as this can be a thankless and tiring job at times. Secondly, I would like to thank the tax-payers and Selectmen for their continuing support; without it none of our work would be possible.

ATTITASH BARTLETT ASPIRATIONS COMPACT SCHOLARSHIP FUND

On July 4th weekend 1997, the Attitash Bartlett Aspirations Compact (ABAC) will be hosting the second annual July Family Festival at the Fields of Attitash in conjunction with our Home Week activities slated for the holiday weekend. The day long event was extraordinarily successful last year with live entertainment, local food and craft vendors, softball, children's games and a fireworks display that was attended by nearly three thousand people.

The ABAC Scholarship program is a community supported effort intended to provide financial resources to encourage and support the pursuit of job skill training, career education, mentorship programs and post secondary education, for all Bartlett children. The program began with the class of 1994-95 Fourth graders and is expected to provide funding for those children and their successors when they reach graduation.

Our first year fund raising activities generated over \$6,000 from annual contributors, including Berlin City Bank, Storyland, S. Szetela Inc., Arthur's Memorials, A.D. Davis, Wills Inn, Dana Djerf, Phil Gravink, White Mountain Oil and Attitash Mountain Service Company. The real excitement is that each dollar raised in the community, is matched by a like contribution from Attitash Bear Peak Resort (up to \$15,000 per year). Our goal is to build a fund that is self perpetuating and will provide a viable financial resource for our children.

Fund raising efforts for 1996 saw the first ever ABAC Car Raffle which generated nearly \$18,000 in ticket sales and \$6,000 in revenue from the Family Fun Festival and other fund raising activities before expenses.

We are particularly proud of our supporters. Without their financial commitment and community support, we'd have never been able to achieve the kind of success, which we believe will guarantee an educational opportunity to all of our children.

A visit makes for a pleasant family outing. A walk along the Saco shows the awesome effects of a river in flood stage, with huge trees strewn about like kindling, as well as bank erosion. Based on the easement, we wonder if other property owners might consider conservation easements to further protect our precious Saco River or other scenic areas in Bartlett.

1996 TOWN MEETING MINUTES

Moderator William Paine opened the Annual Town Meeting by opening the polls at the Town Hall on Tuesday, March 12, 1996 at 8:00 AM by reading the following:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs: You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday the twelfth day of March 1996 at eight o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Articles 1-10 will be by official ballot at the Town Hall and the polls shall open for balloting at eight o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before seven o'clock in the evening. Under NH RSA 675:5, a favorable vote of 2/3 of all the members of the legislative body present and voting shall be required to act upon any amendment if signed by the owners of 20 percent of the area of the lots included in such proposed change. The Selectmen have determined that the petitioners do own 20 percent of the area of the lots included in such a change and that the petition is valid. This notice was then posted at the polling place.

Articles 1-10 were then voted on until 7:00 PM when the polls were closed and ballots were counted. The results were announced as follows:

XI-A-1 to provide for a 500 ft. setback from residential districts and public streets, Article XIII-C to add conference/condominium hotels as a permitted use, and Article XIX to add the definition of Conference/Condominium Hotels. YES = 654/NO = 534 (DEFEATED - needed to pass by 2/3 majority due to protest petition)

ARTICLE 3. Are you in favor of adoption of AMENDMENT NO. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: To add to Article XVIII-D-1 Special Exceptions Section (s.) to allow for the construction of commercial structures at a sideline setback of 15 ft. and rear setback of 50 ft. if they are setback at least 500 ft. from the road, with accompanying green area requirements. YES = 800/NO = 380 (PASSED)

ARTICLE 4. Are you in favor of adoption of AMENDMENT NO. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: To amend Article XIX Definitions to change the definition of Agriculture. YES = 595/NO = 480 (PASSED)

ARTICLE 5. Are you in favor of adoption of AMENDMENT NO. 4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: To amend Article XVI Signs Section B-5 to allow clustered business enterprises of 3 or more on one lot to have one main directory sign of 120 sq. ft. as well as one additional 10 sq. ft. sign for these businesses at their entrance door only. YES = 618/NO = 511 (PASSED)

ARTICLE 6. Are you in favor of adoption of AMENDMENT NO. 5 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: To amend Article VII Minimum Frontage to clarify that the frontage for commercial/industrial lots must be on Rte. 302, Rte. 16, and/or West Side Road. YES = 693/NO = 394 (PASSED)

ARTICLE 7. Are you in favor of adoption of AMENDMENT NO. 6 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: To amend Article IV General Provisions by adding Section P. Outdoor Lighting to provide for lighting requirements for commercial and industrial enterprises. YES = 721/NO = 391 (PASSED)

ARTICLE 8. Are you in favor of adoption of AMENDMENT NO. 7 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: To amend Article XV Off-Street Loading and Parking by adding Section I. to provide for green

Are you in favor of adoption of AMENDMENT NO. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: To provide for CONFERENCE/CONDOMINIUM HOTELS by amending Article III-C-1 to allow for perpetual frontage easement rights in the TCD, Article IV-0 to include them under the requirements for fire protection provisions, Article VI-C to allow the minimum land area requirements to be calculated at the commercial rate and allow contiguous land to be dedicated to the parcel, Article

areas between parking lots of 80 or more cars, exempting lots of 20 or less. YES = 793/NO = 313 (PASSED)

ARTICLE 9. Are you in favor of adoption of AMENDMENT NO. 8 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance as follows: To amend Article IX Green Areas to provide for definitions of front, back and side and to add to Section C. the words "routine maintenance". YES = 800/NO = 288 (PASSED)

ARTICLE 10. Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 40:13 (also known as SB 2) to allow official ballot voting on all issues before the Town of Bartlett? Agreeable to a petition signed by Joseph DeMinico Jr. and others. Selectmen opposed. (Must pass by 3/5 majority) YES = 489/NO = 577 (DEFEATED)

Meeting was adjourned until Thursday, March 14, 1996 at 6:30PM at the Bartlett School.

Moderator Paine opened the deliberative portion of Town Meeting on Thursday, March 14, 1996 at 6:40PM at the Bartlett School. Nancy Hodgkins led the Pledge of Allegiance. Moderator Paine then read from the minutes of Town Meeting of 1796.

(Approximately 130 people present)

ARTICLE 11. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Selectmen favor. Motion was made by Selectman Gene Chandler seconded by David W. Roode to accept the amount of \$1,018,282. Chandler reviewed the budget item by item. Chandler stated that the budget included a 3% salary increase for town employees, however, if the school teacher contract is approved with a 4% raise this year, then the Selectmen will consider giving the town employees 4% as well. Motion was made by Jean Gustin, seconded by James Clemons, Ir. to add \$200 to the library budget. Brief discussion ensued on need for additional funds for copy machine contract and books. Vote was taken on the amendment = PASSED. Joe DeMinico expressed his feelings on the need for a set of NH RSA's at the library. Motion was made by Joe DeMinico to add \$2,000 to the library budget for the purchase of a set of NH RSA's. There being no second to the motion, the motion failed. Motion was made by Gene Chandler, seconded by David Roode to approve the budget of \$1,018,482. VOTE WAS TAKEN - ARTICLE PASSED.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70,000.00 for town road improvements and

reconstruction. Selectmen favor. Motion was made by Gene Chandler seconded by Robert Jones to accept the article as read. Chandler spoke to the article explaining the planned road work and directed voters to review the first Road Agent report in this year's town report. Chandler also explained that as promised at the 1995 Town Meeting, the Selectmen got an engineer's estimate of work for the dugway area of Cobb Rd., it would cost \$46,000 to widen the road in this area, and this was not included in this year's work. William Fabrizio stated that he appreciated the town getting the information, he still feels that it is a very hazardous area, and that a respected local contractor says it can be done for \$6,000. Chandler stated that with all due respect to the local contractor, that the Selectmen would only do this project with the assistance of an engineer and that his estimate is a lot higher to do the project right, however, more of a problem is the fact that the town does not own the land. No further discussion. VOTE WAS TAKEN - ARTICLE PASSED.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000.00 for an equipment shed at the Town Garage, ceiling fans for the Town Garage, and a pressure steam cleaner. Selectmen favor. Motion was made by Gene Chandler seconded by Richard Patch, Sr. to accept the article as read. Chandler spoke to the article. No discussion. VOTE WAS TAKEN - ARTICLE PASSED.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,689.00 for the purchase of a new police cruiser. Selectmen favor. Motion was made by Richard Patch, Sr. seconded by David Roode to accept the article as read. Patch spoke to the article stating this was a State bid price on a Ford Crown Victoria, the car had to be ordered in January to get price but with the condition that town approval is necessary, and we would be replacing the 1992 Ford Taurus. No discussion. VOTE WAS TAKEN - ARTICLE PASSED.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 for a new copier at Town Hall. Selectmen favor. Motion was made by Gene Chandler seconded by Richard Patch, Sr. to accept the article as read. Chandler spoke to the article. Questions raised on size, price, and does it include a service contract. No further discussion. VOTE WAS TAKEN - ARTICLE PASSED.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for a property valuation update. Selectmen favor. Motion was made by Gene Chandler second-

ed by Richard Patch, Sr. to accept the article as read. Chandler spoke to the article. No discussion. VOTE WAS TAKEN - ARTICLE PASSED.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the placement of above ground fuel tanks at the Town Garage. Selectmen favor. Motion was made by Gene Chandler seconded by Richard Patch, Sr. to accept the article as read. Chandler spoke to the article. No discussion. VOTE WAS TAKEN - ARTICLE PASSED.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of a loader, to raise and appropriate up to \$25,000.00 to be placed in this fund, and authorize the transfer up to that amount of the December 31, 1996 fund balance for this purpose. Selectmen favor. Motion was made by Chandler seconded by Richard Patch, Sr. to accept the article as read. Chandler spoke to the article explaining the advantages in this procedure in its flexibility of using fund balance. No discussion. Moderator Paine split the article for the vote by calling for a vote on the first part to establish the Capital Reserve Fund. VOTE WAS TAKEN - PASSED. VOTE WAS TAKEN ON THE BALANCE OF THE ARTICLE - ARTICLE PASSED.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of a highway truck, to raise and appropriate up to \$25,000.00 to be placed in this fund, and authorize the transfer up to that amount of the December 31, 1996 fund balance for this purpose. Selectmen favor. Motion was made by Gene Chandler seconded by David Roode to accept the article as read. Chandler spoke to the article explaining it was the same procedure as Art. 18 just different purpose and it would be for replacing the 1986 International 2 wheel drive truck. Moderator Paine split the article for the vote by calling for a vote on the first part to establish the Capital Reserve Fund. VOTE WAS TAKEN - PASSED. VOTE WAS TAKEN ON THE BALANCE OF THE ARTICLE - ARTICLE PASSED.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Cemetery Land Capital Reserve Fund created in 1990 in order to purchase additional land for the cemetery. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal (\$25,000 + interest) are to be transferred to the town's general fund at the time of purchase. Selectmen favor. Motion was made by Gene Chandler seconded by David Roode to accept the article as

read. Chandler spoke to the article. Discussion ensued on the wording and whether it provided for the fund to remain until the purchase of the property. Chandler clarified the issue. VOTE WAS TAKEN - ARTICLE PASSED.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the purpose of funding school and community events and entertainment to be presented as part of New Year's Eve celebration December 31, 1996. Agreeable to a petition signed by Charles Gothreau and others. Selectmen opposed. Motion was made by Brian Hill seconded by Jim Langdon to defeat the article as read. Brian Hill spoke to the article. VOTE WAS TAKEN - ARTICLE DEFEATED.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,226.00 for the support of the Mount Washington Valley Economic Council. Agreeable to a petition signed by Kathlyn Nealley and others. Patch and Chandler opposed/Roode favors. Motion was made by Kathlyn Nealley seconded by Phil Gravink to accept the article as read. Nealley spoke to the article. Question asked on use of funds were answered by Nealley. VOTE WAS TAKEN - Moderator Paine declared ARTICLE PASSED. Request was made for standing vote - Moderator was correct - ARTICLE PASSED.

Moderator Paine took a break to allow the Eighth Grade Class to auction a cake for the benefit of their class trip. Successful bidder was Joe Russo for \$35.00.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to defray the expenses of the service programs and operating costs of the Mt. Washington Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross. Agreeable to a petition signed by E. Sharon Wroblewski and others. Selectmen oppose - not a proper use of town funds for national organizations; people should have an individual choice concerning donations to charitable organizations. Motion was made by Bob Boynton seconded by Bill Fabrizio to accept the article as read. Boynton spoke to the article. Gene Chandler spoke on the Selectmen's position stated on the article. No further discussion. VOTE WAS TAKEN - Moderator declared ARTICLE PASSED. Request was made for a standing vote - Moderator was correct - ARTICLE PASSED.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for support of operating expenses of the Eastern Slope Regional Airport Authority. Selectmen favor.

Motion was made by George Howard seconded by Richard Patch, Sr. to accept the article as read. George Howard, the town's rep. to the Authority, spoke to the article. Ken Billings asked if there were landing fees. Howard stated no. No further discussion. VOTE WAS TAKEN - ARTICLE PASSED.

Motion was made by Vicki Harlow, seconded by Bill Fabrizio to vote on Articles 25-33 as a block. Brief discussion on procedure. Motion was made by Curtis Tinker, seconded by unknown person to table the articles. Since a motion to table takes precedence, Moderator Paine called for a vote on the motion to table. VOTE WAS TAKEN - FAILED. VOTE WAS TAKEN ON VOTING ON ARTICLES 25-33 AS A BLOCK - PASSED. Discussion continued on Articles 25-33 as noted at each article. No further discussion of Articles 25-33. VOTE WAS TAKEN ON THEM AS A BLOCK - ARTICLES 25-33 PASSED.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,545.00 to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service. Agreeable to a petition signed by Vicki Varrichione and others. Selectmen oppose - use of public funds should require salary disclosure. Gene Chandler explained that the Selectmen requested salary disclosure from all social service agencies this year and that CCMH complied with the request in an acceptable manner and the Selectmen withdraw their opposition to the Article. (ARTICLE PASSED)

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,335.00 for the Children's Health Center. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert Clark and others. Selectmen oppose. Bob Boynton asked why the Selectmen opposed this article. Chandler stated that it has been a long standing opposition as a result of new programs constantly coming to the town and the Selectmen felt that the town had met its social service level of funding. (ARTICLE PASSED)

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,150.00 for the Early Intervention Program of Children Unlimited, Inc. (birth to 3 yrs.). Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie Kroger and others. Roode favors/Patch and Chandler oppose. (ARTICLE PASSED)

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,499.00 for the support of the Gibson Center for Senior Services. Agreeable to a petition signed by Charles Gothreau and others. Selectmen favor. (ARTICLE PASSED)

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appro-

priate the sum of \$900.00 for support of the Tri-County Community Action Program in North Conway. Agreeable to a petition signed by Charles Gothreau and others. Selectmen favor. (ARTICLE PASSED)

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,326.00 for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie Kroger and others. Selectmen favor. (ARTICLE PASSED)

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$589.00 for the support of Carroll County Against Domestic Violence and Rape's shelter for battered women and children. Agreeable to a petition signed by Karen Hebert and others. Selectmen favor. (ARTICLE PASSED)

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,118.00 to assist the Family Health Centre. Agreeable to a petition signed by Vicki Varrichione and others. Selectmen oppose. (ARTICLE PASSED)

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$919.00 for the Family Support Program of The Center of Hope. Agreeable to a petition signed by Susan Fox and others. Selectmen oppose. (ARTICLE PASSED)

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 as its share to participate in the Hazardous Waste Collection Day along with the Town of Conway. Selectmen favor. Motion was made by Gene Chandler seconded by Bill Fabrizio to accept the article as read. Chandler spoke to the article. No discussion. VOTE WAS TAKEN - ARTICLE PASSED.

Moderator Paine then read the results of the voting on Tuesday, March 12, 1996 (already listed in detail previously in the minutes).

ARTICLE 35. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. Moderator Paine auctioned off a second cake to benefit the Eighth Grade class trip. Successful bidder was Carol Koerner for \$35.00.

Motion was made by Phil Gravink seconded by Bill Fabrizio to adjourn. Vote = adjourned at 8:50 PM.

TOWN OF BARTLETT REGULATIONS

The Town of Bartlett Officials closely monitor compliance with the following ordinances, regulations, and by-laws. This list is provided to make people aware that these regulations exist and a summary of each regulation appears here. Complete descriptions may be obtained from the Selectmen's Office and any questions should be directed to that office.

WINTER PARKING ORDINANCE: prohibits parking on town streets between Nov. 1 and May 1 (24 hours a day). Violation = fine of up to \$50.00 plus towing charges.

SNOW PLOWING REGULATION: prohibits the plowing of snow into or across any town road.

EXCAVATION PERMIT REGULATION: requires permits to be acquired 24 hours prior to excavation in a town road. Violation - fine of \$100.00.

ILLEGAL DUMPING ORDINANCE: prohibits dumping and littering at other than in authorized areas at the Transfer Station. Violation - fine of \$100.00.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE ORDINANCE: prohibits drinking of alcoholic beverages in public places. Violation - fine of \$25.00.

TEST PIT INSPECTION ORDINANCE: requires inspection of pits prior to application for State septic design approval. Fee of \$20.00 per pit dug.

SEPTIC SYSTEM DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION ORDINANCE: governs the design and construction of septic systems and requires all septic system designs, prior to submission to the State, to be reviewed by the Selectmen's Office. Fee of \$50.00 per design.

BUILDING PERMIT ORDINANCE: required for construction valued at \$1,000 or more, AND/OR which would affect the assessed value of a property, AND/OR to which zoning requirements apply. Violation = fine of up to \$100/day.

PERMIT TO OCCUPY ORDINANCE: required prior to occupancy of any construction that is intended for habitation or for which a septic system is required. Violation = fine of up to \$100 and/or \$10/day each day of violation.

ZONING ORDINANCE: requires compliance with such items as signs, setbacks, density, green areas, frontage, permitted uses, etc.

FLOODPLAIN ORDINANCE: governs activity in the floodplain. GRAVEL PIT ORDINANCE: governs excavation of gravel pits.

DOG LEASH BY-LAW: requires that all dogs be restrained by leash or under direct control of owner. Violation - fine of up to \$100 plus board reimbursement.

SPECIAL EVENTS ORDINANCE: regulates the conduct of special events. Violation = fine of up to \$300.

ELECTIONEERING ORDINANCE: eliminates all electioneering or signature gathering on Town or School owned property at any meetings or elections held within the Town of Bartlett.
