THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Campton in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Campton on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the ensuing year for the maintenance of its highways and bridges and make appropriation of the same.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for Campton Cemetery, also to clean up and fence other cemeteries in Town.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Memorial Day.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the White Mt. Region Association.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 to reimburse the Campton Village Precinct for rent of use of hydrants in Campton Village.
- 9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital.

- 10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for permanent improvement of the Main Street in the Town of Campton, N. H., beginning at the Watering Trough, south easterly, so far as money will provide. Providing that the State will contribute the same amount. (By petition)
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for use of the Campton Volunteer Fire Dept.
- 12. To see what action the Town will take in regard to a route number for the East Side road so-called, from Holderness to North Woodstock. (By petition)
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept the report of agents and officers heretofore chosen.
- 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Forest Fire Prevention Is Everybody's Business

Carelessness is responsible for 97 per cent of all our forest fires. This is a serious indictment of our interest in our own welfare and that of our neighbors. In too many instances this carelessness results in the destruction, not of the careless one's own property, but of someone not even known to him.

Thoughtlessly thrown lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles, by hikers, hunters, and fishermen; the careless burning of debris during hazardous periods; high winds or in dangerous locations; improperly extinguished camp or cook fires—all add up to the CARELESSNESS that means serious loss of property, disruption of industry and farm work and unnecessary expenditures of town and state funds.

It points to the need of eliminating CARELESS-NESS so far as it concerns fire from our daily life. The rules are simple — your cooperation—is earnestly solicited.

- 1. Be careful with fire in or near woodlands.
- 2. Be sure that all lighted material—cigars, cigarettes and matches—is completely out before discarding it. Use ash trays in autos.
- 3. Secure the required written permission to burn from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not completely covered with snow.
- 4. Insist that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
- 5. Call the warden promptly when fire is detected and aid him to extinguish it.

Let's remember that FOREST FIRE PREVENTION is EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS and our MOST IMPORTANT undertaking!

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

To the Campton School Board:

I herewith submit my final report as School Nurse in Campton.

This report covers work accomplished during the school year 1953-54.

In the 160 inspections made symptoms of these defects were found:

Eight children were treated at three dental clinics held in February and March where 14 extractions and 8 fillings were done.

Thirty-five children had skin tests by Miss Ellen Clough, Grafton County Tuberculosis Nurse, and seven had examinations and chest x-rays at the Tuberculosis Clinics.

The attendance was exceptionally good with no epidemics of communicable diseases. Only nine cases of mumps were reported.

To date this year the children have had inspections, eyes tested and hearing tested as usual. Several children have had examinations or treatment through the Sight Conservation program, the mental clinics, the Orthopedic Clinic and Speech clinic of the State.

I have been your school nurse for 20 years and have enjoyed pleasant associations with School Boards, Superintendents, Teachers, Parents and children and sincerely thank all for their interest and help in maintaining good health in the schools.

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT TO THE CAMPTON SCHOOL BOARD

I hereby submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools of the School District of Campton.

I have hardly been with you long enough to have made a complete and thorough study of the Campton Schools, but I have been here long enough to make the following observations which I am sure will be of interest to you.

Campton does much and is very generous with books, supplies and equipment for its schools, and you should be commended for it. You have an excellent basal reading system and by the end of this year new arithmetic books and new language books will be in all classes. There is much to be said for standardized textbooks, grades 1 through 8 where a continuity exists from year to year. Under such a situation the work is made easier for the teacher, and children learn more readily.

An Otis Quick Scoring Mental Ability Test has been given this Fall to all of the pupils in your schools, and an achievement test battery will be given in the Spring. As a general policy mental ability tests do not need to be given more than every third year, but due to the fact that no up to date information of this nature was on hand, I deemed it advisable to test all pupils now and later test as outlined above. Achievement tests, of course, give us a basis for checking the pupil and evaluating instruction, and should be given at least once a year and preferably twice.

It is very difficult to decide in a town like Campton, with as many schools as it operates, what course of action is best to take in order to see that the future needs of your children are best met. However, it is not

difficult to see that in the situation as it now exists, pupils cannot possibly be getting all they should from what you are offering. You are fortunate in having a staff of teachers who do such fine work in multiple grade situations, either 1 through 4, or 1 through 8, but everything being equal, a child cannot help but gain where a teacher has only one or two grades under her jurisdiction, and it should be kept in mind also that if any of your present staff leave, you will be fortunate indeed to replace them with teachers who are as good. The young people who are graduating from teacher preparation courses today are not trained in multiple grade situations and the teacher shortage is such that the majority of them can secure a position where there is only one grade in a room.

It seems to be at this writing that all things point toward a consolidated school for your town. Many of your buildings are obsolete, and while they served the purpose at the time they were built when transportation was difficult, they are now inadequate. For health and sanitation purposes running water is an essential in a school of today and this is not true in many of your schools. Furthermore, the maintenance and upkeep of your buildings are an expense which year after year is hard to justify. It was a step well taken when new lighting was put in all your schools, and the policy you are now adopting of furnishing some classrooms with new equipment each year is wise. In the event that at some future date consolidation does become a reality, then these lights and equipment may be readily moved into a new building which would decrease to an extent capital outlay.

It should be brought to your attention further that any pending legislation, whereby the State would aid building construction, would be retroactive to 1947, and in the event that you did build before legislation was an actuality you would be reimbursed.

Please do not feel that this report is being critical of your schools. It is not, but rather it is an opinion of an outsider given to you for what it is worth. Your schools are doing a fine job and tests show your children measure up to or above national norms.

My aim in education, as you doubtless know, is to see that for money spent pupils get the best possible education we can offer them, and I feel strongly we could offer them more under a consolidated situation. Please feel free to call on me for professional advice or any other way I can help with your school problems.

I appreciate very much the cooperation and consideration I have received from the School Board, Teachers and Parents of Campton. I now wish to thank each of you for making my work here so pleasant.

EXPLANATION OF

SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953, requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent as per the following quotation:

"REPORTS. Each superintendent of a supervisory union shall annually prepare a report showing the total salary paid to the superintendent, which report shall show in detail the amount derived from the per capita tax and the amount paid directly by each school district in the union."

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the schools for the previous school year ending June 30th. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union No. 48 during 1953-1954 received a salary of \$5600 which was made up as follows: \$2500 paid from the per capita tax, \$3100 pro-rated among the several school districts. Allowance of \$750 for travel within the union was also pro-rated as stated above.

The table below shows the portion of salary and travel charged to each school district.

Superintendent's salary for 1953-54 based on the above figures is reconciled as follows: \$3100 paid by various districts, plus \$2500 received from State per capita tax, equals \$5600 Superintendent's basic salary. This, plus \$750 travel allowance allocated as indicated above, totals \$6350 — amount received from State Treasurer for salary and travel of the Superintendent of Schools.

SCHOOL CALENDAR FOR THE TOWN OF CAMPTON SUPERVISORY UNION NO. 48 FOR 1955-56

School opens Wednesday, September 7, 1955.

October 7 (one session) Supervisory Union Teachers' meeting.

October 12, Columbus Day, schools close.

October 20th and 21st, State Teachers' Convention, schools close.

November 11, Armistice Day, schools close.

November 23rd, Wednesday, (one session) schools close for Thanksgiving recess; reopen Monday, November 28th.

December 21st, Wednesday, schools close for Christmas recess (all day session).

Tuesday, January 3rd, 1956, schools reopen.

February 21st, Tuesday (all day session) schools close for Washington's birthday vacation; schools reopen Monday, February 27th.

April 20, schools close for Spring vacation; reopen Monday, April 30th.

May 30, Memorial Day, schools close.

June 15, 1956, end of school year.

This school calendar allows for 180 days actually in session plus two days for State Teachers Convention which count as school days. This makes a total of 182 days for the school year 1955-1956 and no time will need to be made up unless more than two days are lost because of storm or various other reasons.

REPORT OF THE MUSIC SUPERVISOR FOR THE SCHOOL DISTRICT OF CAMPTON

During a weekly visit to each classroom basic routines are set up to help in the daily music period. Singing, note reading, rhythm, and listening are four main objectives in this program.

In the lower grades we concentrate on learning many songs by rote and by note reading. So that we may all sing in tune some remedial work has been started with individuals who need help. Many of our songs are action songs that help with coordination and rhythm. The children have learned new singing games and have dramatized songs with skipping and galloping, etc. The rhythm band is another help in developing timing, beat, and ear training. We have added some instruments this year and need a few more to obtain better balance and tone.

In the upper grades we have instituted a square dance program. The children have advanced training in note reading, enunciation, phrasing, and tone work.

In all the grades we are expanding our listening program. New Victrolas and records now give each school a better opportunity to hear and understand other forms of music, rhythms, harmonies, and techniques, as well as biographies of the composers. Through this medium we are also learning about the instruments of the orchestra.

By next year most every school in Campton will need to replace well-used, and in some cases, out-dated books.
