Duncan money was spent on the Parsonage Road, one half mile, the road off Town House Road to the lobster trap shop, three-tenths of a mile, the road to Comings cemetery and one mile of the East Road starting at the first bridge south of Myron Quimby's drive, then going north. The road off Jackson road to Edna Guest's house was improved with Duncan money.

T.R.A. funds were used to improve the road starting at the junction of Town House Road with route 120 going South to the junction of East Road and the Mountain Road.

The Town has a deed for the (pool) in Cornish Flat. This was given to the Town by Irene, Clyde, and Arthur LaClair.

The construction of the addition to the Town hall is completed. As you all know we would not be in this position if the people in Town had not rallied to the call.

A building committee was organized and through their direction the necessary funds were raised and some besides.

A fine example of what can be done when the people themselves take over to do a worthwhile project like this.

3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,219.96 to pay the 1966 Police bill.

4. To see if the Town will vote to buy one Olivette Electric adding machine and one checkwriter for use by the Treasurer and raise and appropriate \$280.00 for same.

5. To see if the Town will vote to buy two Air Paks, with two extra oxygen tanks for the Fire Department, and raise and appropriate \$709.20 for same.

6. To see if the Town will vote to buy one hundred metal Folding Chairs for use in the Town Hall, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for same.

7. To see if the Town will vote to repair or replace the Town Hall floor, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for same.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Assn.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for use in the operation and planning of the Lebanon Regional Airport.

10. To see if the Town will vote to sell the land and buildings in Cornish Flat known as the Harry Butman place.

11. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue sections of the old Jackson Road not included in the relocated right of way. Said sections as follows:

(a) Beginning at the entrance to the Clara Smith residence and going southwest to the old Pete Daniels road.

(b) Beginning at the southwest side of the old Pete Daniels road and going southwest to the new road.

12. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a resolution authorizing the Town Planning Board to regulate new subdivisions of land under Chapter 36: 19-29, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955.

13. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell, or otherwise administer, property acquired through Tax Sales and Liens.

14. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money, if necessary, in anticipation of taxes.

15. To see if the Town will elect a Committee for a Memorial Day program.

16. To hear the reports of Officers, Agents, Auditors, and Committees heretofore chosen, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The polls will not close before 6 p. m.

Report of the Fire Chief and Warden

The Cornish Fire Department was called to one fire caused by an incinerator, one fire caused by children playing with matches, one fire by lumber operation, one caused by lightning, one caused by high wind blowing tree onto power line, and five woods and grass fires of mysterious origin making a total of ten woods and grass fires. There were four and one half acres burned over.

We had two chimney fires, two house fires, and one barn fire, one car fire and one truck fire.

The town purchased 1000 feet of 1½ inch hose this year.

There were 151 fire permits issued during 1966.

FIRE RECORD

Fire records are made by people—those who cause fires and those who control them. Your forest fire warden, deputy wardens, fire chief and firemen have, in spite of a prolonged drought, made one of the best fire control records in recent years. Despite a very dry Spring, we in New Hampshire working together, have substantially reduced our fire incidence (885 in 1965 to 595 in 1966.)

This enviable record is largely due to two factors:

1. A closely coordinated and integrated state-town organization jointly carrying out programs of forest fire prevention, training and suppression with dedicated personnel.
2. Your appreciation of our forest fire control program and your individual effort in practicing fire prevention.

Statistics show, however, there is room for improvement. Major problems are still with us (1) the careless disposal of cigarettes; (2) the householder's carelessness in burning rubbish; (3) the failure of woodlot owners and contractors to completely extinguish their brush burning fires; (4) failure to extinguish camp fires; (5) unsupervised children playing with matches.

New Hampshire has 4,339,000 acres of woodland to be protected. In 1966 we experienced 595 forest fires on this area and restricted acreage burned to 395 acres—a fine testimonial to the efficiency and dedication of the men who make up our forest fire control organization.

1. If you must burn you will need a permit. Permits are not issued between 9:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M. except on rainy days. Permits are not needed when the ground is covered with snow. To minimize risk the best way to dispose of rubbish is at your authorized town or municipal dumping area.
2. Be sure all discarded smoking material is out.
3. Don't leave a live camp or cooking fire.
4. Most important—Instruct your children that matches are not play things.

Town Planning Board

The Planning Board has held nine meetings this year and has devoted its time and attention to the following matters:

1. A detailed review of the existing Building Construction and Zoning Ordinance has revealed a number of omissions, errors and inconsistencies which indicate the need for amendments. The Board proposes to present these amendments to the citizens for their consideration and action next year.
2. The Board has continued its study of the possible need for the adoption of a Zoning Ordinance to assure the future orderly growth of the Town. The ordinances of other towns of comparable size have been examined, members of zoning boards of other communities have been interviewed and a representative of the New Hampshire Department of Economic Resources and Development has met with the Board. It is expected that continued study of this matter will result in the presentation of specific proposals and recommendations to the voters next year.
3. A petition from residents of the northwest section of the Town was received by the Board requesting the establishment of a zone in which mobile homes would not be permitted. In accordance with the State statutes the Board has arranged for a public hearing to discuss the merits of the petition.
4. Investigations have been made and will continue regarding the enlargement of the local area which serves the Plainfield telephone users so that subscribers listed in the Claremont area could call and be reached without toll charges.
5. The Board prepared and adopted a set of rules and Operating Procedures.
6. The Board has arranged for inclusion in the Town Warrant an article which would give it authority to prepare for public consideration any regulations considered necessary for controlling land subdivisions.

TOWN PLANNING BOARD (Continued)

7. The Board plans to schedule a series of meetings with clubs and organizations in the Town in order to keep the citizens informed about its activities and to solicit suggestions from the Town's residents. It is hoped that these meetings will serve to establish better communication between the public and the Board.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Cornish qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said district, on the eleventh day of March, 1967, at ten o'clock in the morning to act on Article 1; the meeting to be recessed and opened again at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the remaining articles in the Warrant:

1. To choose a Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Auditors for the ensuing year and a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

2. To determine and fix the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To choose Agents and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.

5. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, together with other income, the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

6. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the U. S. Government and/or state agencies. Further, to see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.

7. To see if the district will authorize the school board to appropriate receipts from federal lunch reimbursements, tuition, gifts and any other receipts from miscellaneous sources in addition to the original appropriation for 1966-67, for the lunch program, general expenses, equipment and improvements.

8. To see if the district will vote to accept the provisions of Title I, Public Law 89-10 (Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965), and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the district under said Federal Act for such particular project as may be determined by the school board. Further, to see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.

9. To see if the district will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 197 of Revised Statutes Annotated, section 1a, to enable the election of its district officers at the annual town meeting in the Town of Cornish instead of at the annual district meeting, to become effective with the election to be held in the calendar year 1968.

10. To see if the district will vote to instruct the School Board to appoint not less than four or not more than six voters to act with the School Board as a building study committee to review the building needs and submit recommendations for consideration by the Cornish School District at the 1968 annual School District Meeting.

11. Shall the school district accept the provisions of the RSA 195-A (as amended) providing for the establishment of an area school located in Claremont to serve the following grades 9-12 from the school districts of Claremont and Cornish and Unity, in accordance with the provisions of the plan on file with the district clerk?

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Report of the School Board

The Cornish School Board has been very active this year, trying conscientiously to do the best job for your school, against some odds which were not confined to Cornish alone, but were evident throughout the nation.

First we tackled teacher-contracts. Mrs. Lillian Symonds and Miss Doris Williams retired after many years of faithful and dependable service to the school. Mr. Bond became ill during the school year, and Mr. Bent found a position more suited to his capabilities in Claremont. We faced three teaching and one non-teaching vacancies to fill. With the acute teacher shortage across the nation, Cornish faced a real dilemma. Fortunately we did have an applicant for the 4th Grade, Mrs. Lois George, who has given us no regrets for our choice, and Mr. Billings, our only applicant for the English in 6th, 7th and 8th grades has proven to be the type of teacher who can and has upgraded the English curriculum. This is the area where most of our recent graduates have had some difficulty on entering High School. About the middle of August, we realized that our hopes for a non-teaching principal were fruitless. While planning an alternative, Mrs. "Sally" Lavalle applied for our 3rd grade position, and she has proven to be a real "trouper" on the faculty.

As an alternative, it was finally resolved to hire Mr. Alice Cushing as a full time secretary and Mrs. Marion Stone, with some trepidation, accepted the responsibility of teacher-principal.

The School Board has only praise and a sense of gratification for every member of the teaching staff, the custodian, the secretary and hot lunch personnel who felt a crisis developing, and banded together for the good of the school. It is running very smoothly on the whole with very little serious disciplinary problems. The whole atmosphere within the building is becoming more conducive to learning.

Your Board has directed considerable attention this past year to the establishment of general and special policies for school operation and management. These include a wide range of subjects such as:

1. The review and revision of schedule for care of the building and summer maintenance.

2. The policy that requires teachers to continue study in special and extension courses, earning at least 6 credits every 5 years the school district paying one half the tuition cost.
3. The policy establishing entrance age requirements as follows: Those children whose 6th birthdays occur on or before October 31st of the year in which they are entering will be admitted without the necessity of passing readiness tests. Children whose 6th birthdays come in November and December will be admitted upon the successful completion of readiness tests. Children whose 6th birthdays fall on or after January 1st will be admitted only upon the successful completion of the readiness tests plus the advice and certification of a recognized doctor and psychiatrist.
4. Specifications were drawn for the position of full-time principal; which we were unable to fill this year, and for the teaching-principal, a position being ably filled by Mrs. Marion Stone.
5. Duties of the School secretary were also drawn in detail; a position occupied by Mrs. Alice Cushing, who is proving to be a very valuable aid to the principal, teachers and other school personnel.
6. Of special importance was the policy on discipline, both at the school and on the school busses. These rules were sent to all parents, and it is hoped that everyone;—parents, teachers and students will cooperate to the utmost in observing them.

Each year the Board has tried to direct improvements to the building, working towards greater efficiency, and with an eye to easier maintenance. This year fluorescent lights were installed in grades 6, 7, and 8 and the bulletin boards in grades 1, 2 and 3 were re-covered with cork. The last of the re-roofing was completed, as well as the screening of the rest of the windows. The main hall was finally painted, after twelve years of gray cinder blocks, and plans are underway to complete the "primary" hall this summer.

Due to the Federal Aid made available under Title I, Public Law 89-10 in 1966 and voted by the District to be used, a great deal of longed for, and needed equipment was purchased as follows:

This list was drawn from recommendations of all the teachers, the Board, and advice of the superintendents, and the equipment is proving invaluable.

Heating fuel for the School District was again put out for bids in cooperation with the Town, and we feel we have obtained the best possible price and service.

The need for the Opportunity class was evident on the opening day of school. We anticipated 31 youngsters in Grade 1. Thirty-nine registered, with the 40th appearing the following week. About half of these young people needed a great deal of help just learning to conform to classroom routine as well as the usual skills of 6 year-olds, and they presented too wide a range to be handled in a single classroom. Great credit must be given Mrs. Kidder who handled this confrontation for two months without losing her mind.

At regular and Special Board meetings, many solutions were made and explored. Their fulfillment depended on whether we could find a teacher at that late date or a place to set up another classroom. We felt an assistant teacher in the 1st grade room would compound the already existing confusion. This emergency situation was finally resolved, in part, by the use of the "Little Town Hall", and the limited services of Mrs. Verna Bailey.

By December 1st the first class began. Ten youngsters were chosen for this opportunity to get individual help from one of the most experienced and successful teachers in the area. This has relieved the pressure on Mrs. Kidder, and the children are making slow but steady improvement. We would wish this could have been a full-time venture, but contrary to some beliefs, remedial teachers are an almost unknown quantity, and it was impossible to find a qualified teacher after the school year had started.

The spirit of Community Cooperation on enlarging the Town Hall must have spilled over into the readying the "Little Town Hall" for this class, and special thanks of the Board are extended to: George Runnals who put on the counter tops Paul Ivanov who scrubbed the walls and wookwork for four hours; to the United Church and Joe Woodward who made possible the use of some blackboards and to Raymond Mark who took the extra custodial work-load in his stride.

The Board does not feel that the problem of educating our

growing population has by any means been resolved. The need for this Opportunity Class is indicative of what is to be expected, so the probability of enlarging our facilities looms ahead in the very near future. A stop-gap of some form or other can be used for a year—perhaps two, but this situation must be faced. Therefore, the Board recommends, very strongly that a committee be set in motion at this District meeting to study our needs (and wants) and bring in recommendations for consideration by the voters at the 1968 District meeting.

Also the Board has been ever cognizant of the untiring help and extra time given us by Superintendent Disnard and his assistant, Richard Waldo. We are conscious of our demands upon them, and take this opportunity of extending our grateful thanks for their wise guidance.

REPORT OF THE CORNISH SCHOOL LUNCH

During the school year 1965-1966 the Cornish School Lunch program maintained its high standards of quality and service, but lost more than \$1,200.00 in the operation. Some of this is being recovered, but it was necessary to borrow \$1,045.00 from school district funds to pay the bills.

In November 1965 Mrs. Pauline Weld who has managed the school lunch for several years accepted a position at the Claremont Nursing Home. Her assistant, Mrs. Frances Ackerman, took over the operation of the program and Mrs. Vera Bean became her co-worker.

The current year's operation, through careful accounting, selective buying, a number of donations, and hard work by Mrs. Ackerman and Mrs. Bean, has resulted in a growing favorable balance, all bills paid, and a beginning made on the repayment of the school district loan.

The pupil lunch count has been growing this year, and is now the highest ever recorded in the lunch program.

The price per lunch remains the same for children at 30c. The price for adult lunches was increased this year from 40c to 45c. No free or reduced-price lunches have been furnished this year.

The school lunch is indebted to several generous individuals for donations of apples, eggs, carrots, tomatoes, and other vegetables.

Superintendent's Report

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Cornish School Board and Citizens of the Town, I herewith submit my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

TEACHING STAFF

Three new teachers joined the Cornish school system in September for the 1966-67 school year.

Mr. Edward A. Billings

Mr. Edward A. Billings of East Thetford, Vt., was employed to teach English in Grades 6 through 8. He replaced Mrs. Frances Kelsey, whose teaching assignment was changed to History and Geography in Grades 6 through 8, formerly taught by Mr. George Bond, who resigned. Mr. Billings holds a B.A. degree from Western State College in Gunnison, Colorado. He formerly taught in several Vermont communities, most recently in Hartford and Bradford, Vermont.

Mrs. Lois George

Mrs. Lois George of Windsor, Vt., was named Grade 4 teacher, succeeding Daniel Regan who resigned. Mrs. George earned a B.A. degree at Hofstra University, and had done substitute work in Windsor and Claremont before coming to Cornish.

Mrs. Seraph Lavalle

Mrs. Seraph Lavalle of Claremont succeeded Mrs. Beverly McKenzie as Grade 3 teacher. Mrs. Lavalle is a graduate of Keene Normal School, and had had prior teaching experience in Newport, Haverhill and Woodsville, N. H., and in Wellesley Hills, Mass.

ENROLLMENT-BUILDING PROBLEMS

Cornish, as most school districts continue to grow in the area of student enrollment. The total enrollment in the Cornish Elementary School is 245 as compared with 225 pupils last year. The District may be faced with a critical housing problem within the very near future. The first grade enrollment this year, at one point, was 39. The state strongly recommends a maximum of 40 pupils per room and the new "Guidelines and Recommendations for New Hampshire Public Elementary Schools:" suggest a "pupil-teacher ration of 25-1 or less in Grades 1-6."

The School Board is aware of this problem and has included an article in the warrant for a Building Study Committee.

The District has employed Mrs. Vera Bailey on a part-time basis to work three mornings per week with selected first grade students in the Town Hall.

I have found, in my short tenure, the School Board and citizens of the Town are extremely cognizant of maintenance problems, and willing to spend money to keep the school building in good repair. The roof has been completely recovered and thus a three-phase project has been completed. Last summer, the lighting in three rooms was renovated and plans call for the second phase (three rooms) this coming summer. A similar project is under way regarding cork bulletin boards. Good building maintenance requires a preventive schedule and I honestly believe Cornish will save tax dollars in this way.

AREA CONCEPT

The District will vote on the proposed Authorized Regional Enrollment Area (AREA) contract at the annual District Meeting, and I sincerely hope it will meet approval in Cornish (Unity and Claremont).

The advantages to the sending schools are:

1. Guarantee of a school to which to send pupils in Grades 9-12 residing within the proposed area.
2. Lower per pupil costs.
3. Guarantee of a meeting three times per year of the School Boards of the sending and receiving districts to discuss suggested improvements or changes in curriculum, program, or services.

The disadvantage is: The District will be committed for the life of the contract.

The districts of Cornish and Unity conceivably could, in the very near future, be presented with the problem of finding a receiving school for the pupils in grades 9-12 in the event the proposed contract is not accepted.

SUPERVISION AND INSTRUCTION

Mr. Anthony Amari has been employed by the Supervisory Union as Teacher Consultant. Mr. Amari will aid in instruction and supervision for Grades 1-8 in Cornish and Unity, and Grades K-4 in Claremont. Mr. Amari has been spending a large amount of his time in the Cornish and Unity schools, working with teachers and pupils. This position does not include administration. The

Supervisory Union policy is for the Teacher-Consultant to devote all his time and efforts in the area of instruction and curriculum.

The District was not able to employ a full-time principal due to the cost factor and lack of qualified candidates who would be willing to remain for more than one year at the stated salary. Mrs. Marion Stone was appointed Principal-Teacher and Mrs. Alice Cushing employed as secretary. This arrangement has been satisfactory. Mrs. Stone has accomplished an excellent job, and Mrs. Cushing has proven an able worker and an asset to the school.

A full-time supervisory principal educationally would be welcome and should help to upgrade the curriculum and other aspects of the school. It is very doubtful if the District could employ and retain for a few years a qualified person for this position with available funds. The New Hampshire General Court may legislate minimum salaries this session, and in this event the District may be faced with a large increase in the area of instruction for the 1968-69 school year. Therefore, I recommend the School Board continue the present arrangement with a Principal-Teacher and secretary for at least another year. The General Court may fund to a larger degree the Foundation Aid and implement other financial grants to School Districts in the future. I will recommend a full-time Supervisory Principal when the renovations at the school are completed and additional aid is available to the District.

FEDERAL ACT—PUBLIC LAW 89-10

The District was able in 1965-66 to take advantage of Public Law 89-10 (Title I and II). Title I made available \$6,238.20 for equipment to improve and enrich the curriculum and aid the hot lunch program, and Title II provided approximately \$500.00 for library materials and aids. The District did not approve participation in Title I and Title III for the present school year. Title II is directly under the supervision of the Supervisory Union office and approximately \$500.00 of library materials will be available this year.

The citizens of Cornish are fortunate in the make-up of the School Board. The members spend many hours discussing school problems needs, budget, et cetera, and in my opinion, always consider the needs of the school and the ability of the town to pay. I wish to thank the Board, faculty, cafeteria workers, custodians, and community for the understanding and cooperation extended to my staff and me this past school year.

Principal's Report

To the School Board and Citizens of Cornish, I herewith submit my first report as Teaching Principal.

An enrollment of 245 pupils this year has resulted in overcrowded classrooms. All classes except two have 34 or more pupils.

The first grade hit the forty mark in January. To alleviate this situation somewhat, Mrs. Vera Bailey has been employed to teach 10 to 12 children in the newly-equipped Little Town Hall. We regret she is available only three mornings a week. (She had previously contracted to teach music in the Claremont schools the other two mornings.) However, this is helpful to Mrs. Kidder, grade one.

Next year, enrollment for grade one will be large again. In all fairness to your children and the teachers, something should be done to provide more classroom space and fewer children per teacher. This is especially true in the lower grades for the best educational results.

Grades six, seven and eight continue to be departmentalized with Mrs. Frances Kelsey teaching History and Geography classes, and Mr. Norman Stowell, Science and Mathematics with sports as extra-curricular activity.

As to curriculum, new math texts have been received in grades three, four and five this year, thus completing the program for all grades.

This is our first full year with Claremont under Supervisory Union #6. We appreciate the help of Supt. George Disnard and Asst. Supt. Richard Waldo. Mr. Anthony Amari, Teacher Consultant, has given much assistance in teaching classes in reading and mathematics, and has provided much material for the lower grades.

We appreciate and thank all the organizations and individuals for supporting our athletic programs this year. Everyone seems to enjoy our seasonal activities.

The P.T.A. has furnished athletic equipment and a new bed, mattress, sheets, pillow cases and blanket for the nurse's room. This is put to frequent use when children are ill.

The enlarged and renovated Town Hall is, and will continue to

be—much appreciated as a setting for Christmas entertainment, athletic programs, and graduation.

We miss the services of the State Bookmobile, but are thankful for the privilege of borrowing, for an extended time, from our own Stowell Library.

We are grateful to our custodian, Mr. Raymond Mark, for the excellent care he gives our building, and for the many extra services to all of us; to Mrs. Ackerman and Mrs. Bean for the well-planned and “tasty” lunches served to the secretary, Mrs. Cushing, for her many and varied helpful services to the staff and pupil enrollment; and to School Board members, parents and friends whose cooperation and support has helped us in our work throughout the year.

Special thanks is given to the faculty, each of whom has cooperated in making an effective school program.

Report of the School Nurse

To the Cornish School Board and the Citizens of Cornish I herewith submit my annual report as school nurse.

During the school year 1965-66 220 vision tests were done. Seventeen children were found in need of further eye examination and were checked by family eye specialists. Corrections were made as necessary. 181 hearing tests were done and five children were found in need of further examination. This was done.

Two hundred and thirteen children were weighed, measured and checked for noticeable health problems by the school nurse.

Twenty-three children attended the Dental Clinics and received treatment at the office of Dr. Karl Rund in Claremont. The Cornish P.T.A. sponsored this program.

Two children attended the Child Guidance Clinics. Two children attended the Orthopedic Clinic on a monthly basis. One child attends the Convulsive Disorder Clinic.

Seventy-four students and ten adults were given the Tuberculin Heaf Test. This is to determine whether a person has had a contact with Tuberculosis which might have caused him/her to react to the Test. There were three who reacted and chest x-rays were done on these people. Results were negative.

A series of three Immunization Clinics were held during the school year. They were fairly well attended. Immunizations against Diphtheria, Whooping Coughh, Tetanus, Small-Pox and Poliomyelitis were available. Many parents assisted with these Clinics and their cooperation was appreciated.

The Cornish Elementary School continues to have one of the finest Hot Lunch Programs to be found. It is well patronized both by pupils and school personel.

An unusually large number of cases of Measles and Chicken-Pox during this school year affected school attendance.

Physical examinations were given 26 boys. These examinations were done by Dr. Lanzer of Claremont on the boys participating in the Athletic Programs. No serious defects were found.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the community of Cornish for the whole-hearted support which has always been given the School Health Program, the School Board for their continuing support and interest and the school personel for making such pleasant working conditions.
