

### WARRANT FOR THE TOWN OF GRAFTON THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

#### THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 1 P.M. TO 6 P.M.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Grafton in the County of Grafton in Said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Grafton on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at 1:00 of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- The Business Meeting to act on the remaining articles in the 1981 Town Warrant will begin at 7:30 P.M. at the Grafton Town Hall.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to hear a report of the Budget Committee and to act thereon.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow in anticipation of tax revenue.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to convey by quitclaim deed all property acquired by tax deed or to take any other action pertaining thereto.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand, two hundred seventy seven dollars and sixty-six cents (\$1,277.66) and thereby receive eight thousand, five hundred seventeen dollars and seventy-two cents (\$8,517.72) from the State for Town Road Aid.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize withdrawal from Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as setoffs against budget appropriations or other purposes, and authorize expenditures of these funds by the selectmen as detailed below and appropriated in the 1981 Budget and to further authorize the selectmen to make pro rata reduction if the amount of estimated entitlement (\$8,928.00 for E. P. #11) is reduced or take any other action thereon:
  - (a) Town Offices Building Fund

\$8,928.00

The addition of this money will raise the balance of the Town Offices Building Fund to \$34,957.49.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to petition the Representatives and Senators who represent the Town in the General Court to support in the current session of the General Court, the concurrent resolution to amend the State Constitution to limit the annual increase in spending by the State or any city, town, or other governmental unit of the State to five percent.
- 9. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to accept a donation of land consisting of approximately five acres,

bordered by Smith River and South Grafton Road from Mildred Brailey to be used for recreational purposes. Such a donation to be commemorated by a placque dedicated to her parents.

- To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to accept a 10. donation of land consisting of approximately three acres bounded by the parcel of land in Article #9 and South Grafton Road from James Thoresen with the provision that a fifty foot right of way be retained for access to a back lot. Such a parcel to abut that land in Article #9 and also to be used for recreational purposes.
- To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to 11. replace the thirty (30) incandescent street lights with thirteen (13) mercury street lights at the following locations:
  - (1) At the fire house;
  - (2) On Route 4, across from South Grafton Road, beside Library Road:
  - (3) On Route 4, on Library Road at Gordon's General Store;
  - (4) At post office;
  - (5) At library;
  - (6) At intersection of dump road with Route 4:
  - (7) At intersection of Bridge Road with Route 4 at Weatherall's;
  - (8) At intersection of Bridge Road with Common's Road at Waldo Webster's:
  - (9) At intersection of Common's Road with Route 4 at Brewster's;

  - (10) At intersection of Grafton Turnpike with Route 4; (11) At intersection of Grafton Turnpike with Wild Meadows Road;
  - (12) At town hall:
  - (13) At East Grafton Church.

  - (1) Selectmen's Clerk from \$700.00 to \$1,000.00;
  - (2) Town Hall Supervisor from \$100.00 to \$300.00.

  - (a) To see if the Town will authorize the appropriation of funds for a requested increase in police salaries, as follows:

(c) To see if the town will authorize the appropriation of

\$500.00 for expenses of the police department, to cover such

items as badges, radio repair, legal fees, stationary, and clerical costs. This represents the same level of funding as 1980.

NOTE: The police department appropriation for 1980 was \$6,500.00. This year's request is for \$8,300.00.

- 14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$30,000.00 for purpose of bringing Cottage/Whittier Road on Kilton Pond, such road beginning at Stanley's and ending at Ribero's up to town standards. Furthermore to authorize the selectmen to borrow an amount of money not to exceed \$30,000.00 for this purpose. This expenditure is expressly conditioned upon the town being reimbursed by the abutters and those served thru betterment assessments levied under RSA 234-23: a-f, to be repaid over a period of ten years, and provided that the selectmen determine that a conditional layout of this road as a public road is justified.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$9,000.00 for the purpose of bringing Birch Avenue at Kilton Pond beginning at Cottage Road and ending at a turnaround at Dale's up to town standards. Furthermore to authorize the selectmen to borrow an amount of money not to exceed \$9,000.00 for this purpose. This expenditure is expressly conditioned upon the town being reimbursed by the abutters and those served thru betterment assessments levied under RSA 234-23: a-f to be repaid over a period of time not to exceed five years and provided that the selectmen determine that a conditional layout of this road as a public road is justified.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to withdraw Revenue Sharing money remaining in the Tax Map accoun to cover costs of maintenance of the tax map. (Note: originally the developer of our tax map, Land Inventory Systems, was obligated to provide a year of maintenance as per contract however, they have filed bankruptcy.
- 17. "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:62 for a property tax exemption on real property equipped with a solar energy heating or cooling system which exemption shall be in an amount not to exceed \$10,000.00 of market value for a period of five years?"
- 18. To see if the town will vote to rescind RSA 466:30a, the ordinance passed on November 4, 1980 by a margin of 81-55 out of 320 who cast ballots that day. RSA 466:30a states, "it is unlawful for an owner of any dog licensed or unlicensed to allow said dog to run at large except when accompanied by the owner or custodian when used for hunting, herding,

supervised by competition and  $\overset{6}{\text{exhibition}}$  or training or such."

19. To see if the town will appropriate funds for affiliation and/ or defrayment of program costs of Regional Associations according to the following schedule:

- 20. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road leading from Route 4 to Leonard White's residence at the foot of the overpass at Grafton Center, Leonard White waiving any claim for damages resulting from discontinuance of this road.
- 21. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to use the Blackstone Rock Fund to purchase street signs. Such signs to be determined by a committee established by the selectmen. The purpose of these signs is to provide a uniformity of street names.
- 22. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to withdraw money from the Capital Reserve Fund to be applied towards the purchase of a front end loader for the highway department.
- 23. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to raise and appropriate \$17,000.00 to pay the balance on the purchase of a front end loader for the highway department.
- 24. To see if the town will authorize the collection of taxes on a semi-annual basis (50% based on previous years tax payable on June 1st and the balance paid on December 1st RSA 76:15A, 1973:128). Furthermore to raise \$800.00 (\$300.00 for postage and additional billing and \$500.00 for additional salary for the tax collector to cover increased labor) to implement this program.

Town Auditors

Robert J. Bassett Sara G. Belloir The first year of the new year has ended, but is sure to mark the beginning of a decade of changes for Grafton. The U.S. Census figures show that, of twenty-eight Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee towns, Grafton is among the fastest growing-nearly doubling in population during the past ten years.

Growth in population increases the demand for services and the accompanying administrative duties have certainly put a burden on the existing town office facilities. The efforts of the Building Needs Committee in investigating the possibilities of improving our facilities has brought us to a point where we can soon make the proper decision and act to solve our problem.

The population increase has also effected our school system. The need for reconstruction and alterations in the district schools has allowed us the opportunity to look at many possibilities of improving the school system. Certain benefits to the district may be had by establishing a "Feeder School" in Grafton which would have facilities for the education of several of the lower grades. This is an exciting possibility for many Grafton families who feel the current necessity of long bus travel time is a burden to the younger children as well as an expense to the school district. Perhaps the most logical remedy would be to combine town office facilities, classrooms, and general public meeting area into a multi-purpose civic building situated on land which is centrally located within the town and which offers adequate parking and recreational area. The next several months should see some definite action regarding this matter.

Favorably influencing our thoughts of a school in Grafton is our recent good fortune in the form of an offer by Mildred Braley and by James and Josephine Thoresen to each donate several acres of recreational land to the town. A favorable response to an article in this year's warrent will allow us to accept the donation. We certainly appreciate the generosity of Mrs. Braley and the Thoresens.

Our long awaited tax map of Grafton has finally been delivered by Land Inventory Systems of Newport. The maps, a statutory requirement of all New Hampshire towns, will be used as a basis for taxation and planning from this point forward and will be in a constant state of update as boundary line surveys are completed and given to the town.

The tax map, however, shows only land. Taxation is also based on the value of existing structures and many weeks of assessing by the Selectmen have been completed to try to insure that properties are assessed fairly.

Another project which has occupied many hours of our time this year involves a petition to lay out a public highway over Whittier Road near Kilton Pond. The petition essentially asks the Selectmen to lay out a public highway over the existing private road which runs from Stanley's to Ribeiro's. The existing road, however, is substandard in many respects. Provisions for proper drainage are severely inadequate causing annual flooding and washouts. Width of road surface is inadequate to allow for snow removal during a year of normal snowfall. A recently enacted statute allows for

the cost of upgrading private roads to be borne by the abutting landowners and others served by the road. In this years warrent, the Selectmen will ask for the authority to borrow the funds necessary to lay out the highway and upgrade the road to a standard acceptable to the town. According to statute the cost can be repaid to town by the abutters over a period of up to ten years and should not affect the tax bills of other citizens except through a somewhat increased cost of road maintenance. We believe that if the standards of road design as set forth by the Grafton Planning Board and documented in the Subdivision Regulations of Grafton are maintained, all future town highways, whether accepted as a dedication or as a lay-out by the Selectmen, will be a less costly burden to the taxpayer.

The Selectmen sincerely appreciate the cooperation of the townspeople in allowing us to follow the sometimes lengthy details of administration. Even small details seem to involve weeks when piled on a crowded desk. Without the townspeople's willingness to serve on committees and the energies of other town officials and the advice from past officers, the duties of our position would certainly have been multiplied.

# ROAD AGENTS' REPORT

During the early winter of 1980, due to heavy rains, four roads in the Town were washed out: Quimby Hill, Grants' Hill, Prescott Hill and Robinson's Four Corners. This cost to the Town was above the Town budget appropriation. Additional cost was incurred through the purchase of a steamer to steam culverts frozen due to the excessively hard winter.

Spring maintenance included repairs to the above mentioned roads, plus damage to secondary roads which required a number of yards of gravel for repair.

During the fall of 1980, we replaced the old wooden bridge at the foot of Grant's Hill on Wild Meadow Road with a steel bridge which included footings and abutments, steel I beams, 6" asphalt decking. This should set a standard of excellence for future bridge building in the Town. This leaves us with five more bridges to be replaced in order to conform with State and federal requirements.

Three culverts on Dean Hill Road were replaced in order to bring the road to state specifications. Numerous other maintenance operations were required in order to maintain roads at State specifications.

The costs for maintaining roads has risen drastically: Cost of sand, gravel, costs for steaming culverts and ice 36

removal, labor costs, etc.

In 1981, we plan to replace three culverts at Robinson's Corners with a steel bridge, replace the wooden bridge at Stevens Hill with a multi-plate culvert, and replace the bridge at Danbury Town line with a multi-plate arch culvert.

We recommend that the Town consider the purchase of a new loader as outlined in the warrant.

The Grafton Volunteer Fire Department-Ambulande responded to 49 call's from January 1 to December 31, 1980. Many of the call's were to transport and some were standby at fires.

The ambulance squad helped to set up a Advanced First Aid Course which was held at the Grafton town hall last spring, instructors, John Carpenter and Lorraine Carpenter from the Lebanon Chapter. From this course we gained two members. The ambulance team would like to hold another course for interested persons, that the ambulance team might gain new membership.

The Grafton ambulance and three members responded to a mock school bus accident which was held in Enfield. The purpose of this drill to see if the area towns could handle this type of a disaster. There were 35 student victims who participated in the mock disaster from Cardigan Mountain School in this exercise.

In December of this year ten members of the squad took there refresher EMT course which consisted of 20 hours and was held at the Grafton Town Hall. The instructors were Bob Hamlin and Martha Merritt from Hanover.

The new dispatching system, started on town meeting day of last year March 1980, has been a great success. The Upper Valley Mutual Aid Association replaced the repeator on Moose Mountain with a new one which cost \$6,000.00 during the year to give better communications. This gave the ambulance members direct communications with Hanover dispatch from the time the tone, that dispatches the members to the location, in transport and back at fire station.

January 26, 1981, I, Paul Alan Gove, resigned as Captain of the ambulance squad. The position has been filled by Betty Stiles. Best wishes and support is extended to her.

# REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Forest Fire Prevention: Your Business, Our Business, Good Business. Forest Fire prevention slogans have been seen in association with Smokey Bear since the late ninetten forties when a national effort to check the spread of forest fires was implemented.

New Hampshire residents recognized that forest fire prevention and suppression was the responsibility of every citizen, a half century before this national campaign, when our legislature established our first forest fire laws in 1903. Since that date, the State has appointed a town/city forest fire warden who is responsible for forest fire law enforcement in his municipality.

All fires kindled out of doors when there is no snow on the ground must be approved in writing by the forest fire warden before being kindled. All forest fires must be suppressed by the warden and his deputies as soon as they are reported. The cost of fire suppression is shared jointly by the town/city and the State of New Hampshire, as are forest fire prevention and forest fire training costs.

This State and local municipality cooperative forest fire program has given New Hampshire one of the best forest fire records in the United States.

# POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

To the People of Grafton:

Your Police Department respectfully submits the following:

1980 has been an eventful year for your police department. We now have three members and the assistance of two neighboring police chiefs as special officers. Marie Bean as our police woman has been assisting Nelson and myself by doing paper work, handling dog complaints and by helping with numerous female and juvenile transports. As of now she receives no salary but acts on a voluntary basis.

During 1980 your three officers have attended various police and law enforcement courses and have taken the test for police certification that is required now by the New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Council. This was done on our own time and expense.

Our cruiser has been equipped further to handle transports and is now equipped with radar to aid in speed and traffic control.

During 1980 the cruiser logged 11,536 miles in responding to over 540 calls and complaints. This number does not include traffic citations and motor vehicle checks. We have made a sincere attempt to respond to every call, whatever the time of day and whatever the weather condition.

The increase in population figures of our town, 581 in June of 1979 to 732 in June of 1980, set by the State of New Hampshire as a 95% growth rate is resulting in more calls and the need for increased coverage. We have therefore requested an increase in the police budget to help us keep up with the growth rate and to provide adequate coverage for the town. Increased costs of fuel, tires and maintenance of uniforms, our equipment and our cruiser have made this necessary.

### GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS REPORT

To the Citizens of Grafton County:

In an effort to communicate more directly with the taxpaying citizens of Grafton County, we, the Grafton County Commissioners, are writing to you through your individual town or municipal reports.

Due to inflated Nursing Home expenses with somewhat reduced revenues and rapidly increasing costs of welfare reimbursements to the State, our budget year ended very close to the line, with a \$3,620 surplus. Because of the Delegation's decision to use a two-year surplus in one budget year to allow citizens a reduced county tax in FY 1980, the 1981 fiscal year budget resulted in a heavier tax factor making up that decrease as well as offsetting reduced revenues and allowing for standard budget increases.

As with towns, the county welfare assistance programs are increasing and becoming more involved, especially with the current energy crunch and rapidly inflating economy. We also foresee a possible decrease in Federal and State contributions to social service programs which could have considerable impact on local budgets.

The sewage disposal system has progressed slightly, with planning completed and ready to go out for bid. If all goes well, we may be able to submit a final report next year.

The Commissioners worked closely with the Nursing Home Employee Council to set up a wage/benefit package more compatible to the State program for Glencliff employees. The Commissioners hope to work out a job description/wage scale plan for courthouse employees in the near future.

Grafton County is gradually converting from a bookkeeping machine system to a computerized system for all county accounts. Payroll was converted effective January 1, 1980, and vendor payment and receipt programs were recently added. Patient accounts and purchase order programs will be added later. The system is too new for comprehensive comments, but we anticipate constructive changes in the overall accounting and reporting system.

The Commissioners hold their regular meeting every Monday (except holidays) at 9:30 a.m. in the Commissioners' Office of the Grafton County Courthouse, followed by a second meeting at the Grafton County Nursing Home Complex at 1:00 p.m., which regularly includes visits to farm and jail facilities. Public and press are welcome, and, in fact, are encouraged to attend the meetings.

# MASCOMA HOME HEALTH SERVICES - 1980

Mascoma Home Health Services, formerly known as Mascoma Area Health Council will this year start its 13th year of service to the Mascoma Valley Towns of Canaan, Enfield, Grafton, Dorchester, and Orange.

The services are funded in part by the towns that are served and this guarantees that home health services, visiting nurse, physical therapist, home health aide and the recently added service occupational therapy will be available to all residents of that town. Participation also allows for disease prevention programs, well child clinics, dental clinics and blood pressure screenings.

The agency is a certified agency under the Medicare program and all towns which it contracts with will have at least one representative on the Board of Directors, so have a decision in policy making.

Anyone can request services - you need not wait for your doctor to refer. A nurse or therapist will make an evaluation visit to determine if services can be helpful, further visits will be made under physicians orders.

The agency serves all ages - all economic groups with a goal of preventing or shortening institutionalization, promoting rehabilitation to patients maximum and return to independence.

Some examples of services possible are, treatments, dressings, injections, tea ching families the care of a patient, evaluation of status care of the acutely ill, chronically and terminally ill. Some of the most common conditions seen are cardiac disease, cancer, stroke, neurological diseases, diabetes, respiratory disease and orthopedic problems.

The services of a pediatric nurse practitioner are available to young families and a newborn visit is made by the nurse if new parents so desire it.

The office and clinic space of the agency is located on Prospect Street in Enfield, the phone number 632-7234. We are always happy to answer questions by phone or if you would care to stop at the office, show you the facility and tell you more about the work we do.
