

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SELECTMEN'S REPORT

We are pleased to provide this overview of progress made in 1993. For the third year running we have successfully reduced the town's share of the tax rate, this year by \$.12, and have continued to make progress in accomplishing various projects within the town.

The Selectmen/Sewer Commissioners have negotiated a contract with Gobin Disposal Systems for the purpose of locating a dewatering facility on the grounds of the waste water treatment plant. The contract also contains provisions concerning operations of the composting facility on Old Concord Road.

The board solicited comments from concerned citizens and hosted an informational meeting whereby the procedure and technology that will be used in the dewatering process and composting facility were explained and questions addressed.

At the Town Hall, new front doors were installed, a handicapped accessible restroom completed, and the interior of the building painted.

The board formally adopted the Riverfront Parking Ordinance relative to the parking lot below Main Street and provided assembly permits to various establishments seating more than 100 persons.

We were most pleased to have Timothy Russell elected 3rd Vice President of the NH Chief's Association. This distinction honors not only the chief, but also the town. Chief Russell is now in line to become the president of the organization in a few short years.

All the officers on the police department and the fire and rescue personnel, were afforded the opportunity to obtain Hepatitis B shots to protect them from potential infection. Also, the establishment of a parking enforcement officer has proven to be very successful.

The Building Committee has been hard at work designing plans for a new fire and rescue building. In addition, they cleared the lot on Maple Street so as to provide a better opportunity to view potential lay-out schemes for a new facility.

The highway department upgraded portions of Old Concord Road in the area of the heavy industrial zone and Hemlock Corner Loop in accordance with the town's road improvement plan. The new dump truck with plow bought with funds appropriated at last year's Town Meeting certainly has been tested with recent snows we have received in 1994.

Further, the town crew has expended much time in roadside ditching and tree clearing as well as drain installation in anticipation of future road improvement projects, but more importantly, to help remove standing water from roadsides and to allow the sunlight during the winter months to penetrate onto the road surfaces.

With last year's appropriation of the initial funds needed for the repairs to the Amey Brook Bridge, we have entered into arrangements with the State of New Hampshire to

participate in the State Bridge Aid Project and at the present time, plans are being developed for the upgrade of that bridge on Old Concord Road. The remainder of the town's 20% share of the cost is budgeted for approval at the 1994 Town Meeting.

Work is progressing on the development of a landfill closure plan which will have to be funded in the near future

The Rescue Squad purchased its new defibrillation unit so both ambulances now have the critical life saving units.

The Animal Control Officer continues to work to insure that all dogs are properly vaccinated against rabies and registered through the town, and has undertaken several programs relative to disseminating information relative to the rabies epidemic.

The Henniker Athletic Program for Youth has started planning for the development of the 9.25 acres they received from the Army Corps of Engineers for additional baseball and soccer fields.

The Conservation Commission has continued work on the wetland mapping project and has provided the board with recommendations as to which of the various town tax deeded properties should be retained and which should be sold.

The Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission decided not to hold the yearly household hazardous waste program. Under the guidance of Tom Woodley, Henniker organized and hosted the 1993 household hazardous waste day. It was a major success. We thank Tom for his efforts.

The Parks Board oversaw the fertilization and trimming of various trees in the parks, cemeteries and around the Town Hall. A new fence was installed in Azalea Park.

We cannot go without giving major congratulations and a thank you to the Henniker Old Home Days Committee. They provided this town with a great deal of pride for the programs and events that they sponsored during the month of August in celebration of Henniker's 225th anniversary.

We wish to thank the efforts of Ken Ward, whose term ended as selectman and also to Dr. Francis Brown, who retired after numerous years as Supervisor of the Checklist. Thank you both for your years of service!

In January 1993, the staff of the Henniker Wastewater treatment facility won the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Region I Operation and Maintenance Excellence Award. This made the staff eligible for the National O&M Award contest in which Henniker placed second nationwide in their facility size category.

In order to be considered for a nomination, a facility has to have an absolutely perfect year of no discharge permit violations whatsoever. From that point the facility is rated according to innovations at the plant, exceptional process control, degree of upgrade made by plant personnel, effective financial management and ongoing operator training.

The Selectmen certainly extend their heartiest congratulations to the employees who made this possible. The whole town can be proud of all the dedicated employees who, through their work over the years made this award possible.

In closing, we want to recognize an individual who has given much of himself to this community, E. Benjamin Ayer.

Ben, as he is known to all of us, was feted by the members of the fire department for his half century of service, 25 years of which he served as chief. The NH Municipal Association singled Ben out with 9 other individuals across the state as an "Outstanding Volunteer." And there can be no higher recognition that this community can bestow upon an individual that recognizes his many efforts as Henniker's "Citizen of the Year."

Ben...from all your fellow residents, we wish to express to you our warmest, heartfelt and sincerest thanks for everything you have done to make Henniker like no other...the only one on earth! Thanks Ben!

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The Meeting reconvened on March 10 at the Cogswell Memorial School Gymnasium at 7:00 p.m. to act on the following:

4. ACCEPTED the reports of the Town Officers, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds and other Committees as amended.

AMENDMENT: On February 27, 1993, the Old Home Days Committee received confirmation from the 39th Army Band of the New Hampshire Army National guard. The Band will perform in Henniker on August 11, 1993 at 7:30 PM. The location has yet to be determined. Community Park may provide ample space providing we can arrange for electricity. Admission will be free. We would like to thank Steve Burritt for his assistance with making the arrangements to bring this award-winning band to Henniker.

9. VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of \$507,923 to defray the charges for Highway and Streets, Bridges, Sidewalks, Solid Waste Disposal and Well Monitoring for the ensuing year, divided as follows:

11. VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred one thousand three hundred eighty seven dollars (\$101,387) for 1993 road improvements contingent upon the receipt of the town's share of the Highway Block Grant.

12. FAILED to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand nine hundred dollars (\$4,900) for the drilling of a well, pump installation and piping into the recycling building.

13. VOTED to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of Capping the Landfill and to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to be placed in this fund and to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend. (Majority vote required)

14. FAILED to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand ninety-one dollars (\$3,091) as its contribution toward the Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day in cooperation with surrounding towns and that said expenditure be released and expended only upon the Town of Henniker being selected host community.

VOTED on the amendment to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand ninety-one dollars (\$3,091) as its contribution toward the Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day in cooperation with surrounding towns.

VOTED to authorize the Trustees of Tucker Free Library to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, money from state, federal or other governmental unit or private source, which becomes available during the fiscal year, in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 202-A:4-c.

20. VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.) for Capital Reserve purposes, to be appropriated as follows: five thousand dollars (\$5,000) is to be added to the Fire Department Capital Reserve Account and five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to be added to the Rescue Squad Capital Reserve Account previously established under the provisions of RSA 35:1.

VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of eight thousand four hundred eighty dollars (\$8,480) to be used for the development of a swimming area to be located south-east of the Ramsdell Road Bridge and to authorize the withdrawal of \$8,480 from the Swimming Pool/Recreational Fund Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose.

26. VOTED to authorize the Selectmen to sell to Dennis Gregoire property previously owned by him located on Weare Road, State Route 114, Lot 592-D2, acquired by the town via tax deed. Said sale to be contingent upon the purchaser paying all back taxes, lien costs, accrued interests and taxes due during the ownership by the town and any expenses incurred, including but not limited to recording and attorney fees, for said transaction pursuant to RSA 80:80-III.

27. VOTED to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal and state grants which may become available during the course of the year and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private sources to be used for purposes for which the municipality may legally appropriate money in accordance with RSA 31:95-b, provided the Board holds a public hearing prior to accepting grants or funds.

28. VOTED to authorize the Selectmen to sell by sealed bid or public auction any property which become available through the real estate tax lien procedure or to disposed of such lands as justice may require pursuant to RSA 80:80.

29. VOTED to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of constructing a new municipal safety complex and to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) to be placed in this fund, furthermore, to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend. (Majority vote required)

30. VOTED to authorize the Selectmen to inventory, harvest and sell mature trees located on Town owned lands.

31. VOTED in favor of amending the Henniker Noise Ordinance as proposed by the Board of Selectmen.

AMENDMENT to Article 31 **FAILED** as follows:

B Section #1 - It shall be unlawful to cause a noise disturbance across a real property line by operating any mechanically powered saw, grinder, drill, lawn mower or garden tool or similar device used outdoors, with the exception of snowblowers, between the hours of 10:00 PM and 6:00 AM.

32. FAILED to amend the Henniker Assembly Permit as proposed by the Board of Selectmen.

33. FAILED to amend the Henniker Waste Management Ordinance as proposed by the Board of Selectmen.

34. FAILED to direct the Selectmen to allow the display of a banner across Main Street for functions that benefit community welfare. Submitted by Petition.

35. FAILED to see if the Town of Henniker will perform regular year round roadway maintenance on Brown's Way Road to maintain it in its present gravel condition, from the Old Hillsboro Road to the former John Deere equipment shop. Submitted by Petition.

AMENDMENT to Article 35 **FAILED** as follows:

By adding the words "provided the aforementioned length of road specified is brought up to Town standards for gravel roads through "Betterment Assessments" as outlined in RSA 231:28 through 231:33.

AMENDMENT to Article 35 **FAILED** as follows:

To see if the Town of Henniker will perform regular year-round roadway maintenance on Brown's Way Road to maintain it in its present gravel condition from the Old Hillsboro Road to the Town Line as needed.

36. To transact any other business that may properly come before this meeting.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

This would have included such things as significantly reducing the number of burglaries that took place in our community as well as reducing the instances of other crimes against property such as vandalism, etc.

However, one day some of the officers were talking about some of the successes they had experienced, both professionally and personally, during the past year and because I am extremely proud of these people, I thought that it would be appropriate to share some of their personal triumphs with you.

Officers Paul Montray and Darrin Brown are avid joggers. Throughout the past year they have represented this department and community in various road races throughout this state and beyond. For instance, Officer Montray ran in the New York City Marathon. He has done this for the past several years and usually completes this marathon with a respectable time. During the fall of this year, Officers Montray and Brown competed as a team, representing this department, in a state sponsored D.A.R.E. road race, which took place in Concord. In this race, they competed against several other police departments and agencies from throughout the state. They brought home a second place trophy for this race, which certainly is an accomplishment to be proud of. Officer Mark Lindsley regularly takes part throughout New England in competitive pistol shooting matches. He usually places among the leaders in the competition and this year won a match, which was held in Connecticut. It should be pointed out that each of these officers competes in these events on his own time and receives no compensation from the town for competing. Officer Scott Jordan returned to college this year on a part-time basis and expects to complete his degree in about a year and a half. He then plans to attend law school full time and someday in the near future, become a practicing attorney. Sgt. Doug Paul competed in Henniker's first roller blade race this past year. In addition to roller blading, you may have seen Sgt. Paul tooling around the back roads on his mountain bike. The department secretary, Jeanette English, who greets all of you with a smile and a helping hand, added a new grandchild to her family. During the spring, she travelled to Virginia to visit her son, daughter-in-law and the new arrival. As for your truly, in June of 1993, I was honored by my fellow chiefs when I was elected to the position of Third Vice President of the New Hampshire Association of Chiefs of Police. The significance of this election is that it places me in the chairs, which means in June of this year I should be elected Second Vice President, the following year First Vice President and if all goes as it should, I will be President of the association from June of 1996 until June 1997. This is indeed an honor for me and I believe also for our community. Our part-time officers are also held in high regard by me. They vary in their professions ranging from being a student at UNH to a full time bank administrator. They work very hard for us and fulfill an important mission within our department and community.

During 1993, we also were the benefactors of several items of equipment from the federal government which we either got for free or for a very nominal administrative fee. We also applied for a grant from the Digital Corporation for some computers, monitors and printers which was approved. The Digital Corporation donated two 286 computers and one 486 computer as well as two laser printers to us. Although they are not new, they certainly are serviceable and have filled our needs very nicely. We certainly owe them a hearty thank you. In all, during 1993 we received in excess of \$20,000 worth of various equipment from the grant mentioned above and the federal government.



REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

During calendar year 1993, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were campfires left unattended, unsupervised children and debris fires that escaped control. All of these fires are preventable, but ONLY with your help!

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27 II) requires that, "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material in the open, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done.

Violations of RSA 224:27 II and other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail and you are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1993 and participated in many fire prevention programs. This year, the nation is celebrating Smokey Bear's 50th anniversary. The State of New Hampshire Forest Protection Bureau will be working with many communities to spread the fire prevention message - "Remember...Only YOU can prevent forest fires." Fire prevention is the most cost effective fire suppression tool. Please be careful around fires and help us and our communities have a fire safe year.

1993, overall, was a good year for building permits and we are looking forward to a more productive year in 1994.

The position of Code Enforcement Officer and Health Officer have been combined with the Clerk of the Planning and Zoning Boards to provide the public with the advantage of working with one person through all the stages of from planning, zoning and building. This person will assist the applicant with setbacks, site plans, building permits, variances, special exceptions, etc., at one time and will eliminate the necessity of dealing with more than one department. The new days for this position will be Monday through Friday.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

1993 was a busy year at the Department of Public Works. Several major snow storms signaled the return to old-fashioned New Hampshire winter. The highway crew did an excellent job of handling the often back-to-back storms that ended with a storm on April first. (Some April Fool's Day!) We even had to plow snow right after leaving last year's Town Meeting.

We cut a great deal of brush and cleaned roadside ditches and put down gravel in many locations. This work will continue in 1994 as part of an on-going program.

A large section of Hemlock Corner Loop was reconstructed and paved as well as a section of Old Concord Road.

The new 4 X 4 dump truck was received and placed in service to replace the twenty year old one that was sold at the state equipment auction.

The waste water treatment plant staff was awarded second place in the entire nation for Excellence in Operations and Maintenance. We are very proud of them for this accomplishment. Hats off to Mary Dowse, Ken Levesque and Keith Gilbert.

We flushed and TV inspected another 1/3 of the waste water collection system this year and will complete this project in 1994. It appears that there are some repairs to be made in the coming months, however the system is in overall good condition.

At the Transfer Station we received 2302 tons of trash for disposal and recycled 356 tons of material, representing 15% of our waste. Items recycled include: newspaper, cardboard, glass, plastic milk jugs and soda bottles, automobile batteries, scrap metals and tin cans. We also received in excess of 1300 gallons of waste oil for use in the furnace.

In 1994 we hope to expand our collection with a Salvation Army drop box for good used clothing. Also in 1994 we may begin collecting unusable clothing for sale to a rag dealer.

The closure of the old landfill is getting nearer and will probably begin in 1995. At that time we will have to find an alternative to landfilling our demolition materials as well as the sludge from the treatment plant.

I wish to personally commend all the employees in the public works department for all of their hard work during 1993.

RECYCLING COMMITTEE

We are happy to report that 356 tons of recyclables were recovered from a total of 2302 tons received at the Recycling Center and Transfer Station (exclusive of material dumped at the landfill or burned in the burn pile). This recovery rate of 15% reduced the town's costs by \$17050.65 as a result of avoiding the expense of sending this material to the Penacook incinerator and also receiving revenue from the sale of the recyclable materials. Congratulations to all you recyclers!

The committee was busy in January, February and the first part of March preparing the proposed waste management ordinance and background information for town meeting in March.

Two public hearings, hosted by the committee, were held on the proposed ordinance in January.

After making preliminary drafts, the committee and the selectmen arrived at the final version of the proposed ordinance in February.

In early March the committee published the "Report on the Waste Management Ordinance." This document discussed the data, studies, and public input which guided the committee in drafting the ordinance. Copies were placed in the Town Hall and Tucker Free Library for public review, and are still available at these locations.

Near the end of town meeting, the ordinance was discussed and voted down. Many of those present objected to the requirement that everyone separate aluminum cans, tin cans, glass and cardboard if they wish to leave these items at the transfer station and recycling center.

A Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day was held on October 2 at the highway garage. 76 households from Henniker took part of a total of 172 participating households, the balance of which came from neighboring towns. Members of the committee helped publicize the event and assisted during the collection. The committee would like to thank Tom Woodley, director of public works in Henniker, for the tremendous job he did in organizing and managing the collection. This was the first year that the Central NH Regional Planning Commission did not organize and manage the collection, and without Tom's leadership we probably would not have had the collection in 1993

We are pleased to welcome three new members: Judith Coleman, Arthur Kendrick, and Joan O'Connor.

The Committee will continue to assist townspeople in their efforts to reduce the wastestream and reuse and recycle all they can in the year to come.

RESCUE SQUAD

The Henniker Rescue Squad had a very busy and successful year in 1993. Preliminary statistical reports indicate that we responded to 272 calls for the year. Over 25% of our patients were under 20 years old and 37% were over 60 years old. While the emergency medical service industry has always geared itself for the adult patient; with good training programs and equipment designed for the adult, it never concentrated on specific training, medical protocol, and equipment sized for children.

With 25% of our patients under the age of 20, and 45% of our calls being trauma, we were very interested in working with Dartmouth College and the Concord Hospital this past spring to develop and pilot a specific training program that looked just at kids. This training required us to look at how we approach pediatric patients, what standards of care we delivered, and what specific equipment we carried to address the emergency needs of children. One needed change that became apparent to us was to gather all of our pediatric size equipment into one portable bag. Each ambulance is stocked with this kid size gear all sorted to assist immediately.

Other training this year included expanding our ability to deliver advance life support services through IV therapy and with limited drug therapy. EMT-1 Kevin Mather has taken the courses to be certified to administer a standard drug protocol. This training has already paid off with several unconscious diabetic patients.

I need to conclude this year's report by reminding the Henniker citizens that Henniker Rescue is a completely volunteer department. No member receives any salary for responding to calls or for any training. This is becoming rare in New Hampshire and Henniker has been fortunate over the years to enjoy the benefit of these truly dedicated volunteers. This job has become increasingly more difficult with the increase in calls, especially during the workday, especially with increased liability exposure for each of our members.

This change in liability exposure, both for the town and for each individual member, means that in the near future we must consider the need to staff the day-time crew with a full-time paid professional crew to insure that the town has coverage when needed. Most neighboring communities have already done this or are seriously considering it. Henniker must also face this decision in the near future.

I would like to thank all of the members for volunteering their time this past year. The 1993 members include: James Crane, Chief; John Belt, Jr., Assistant Chief; Steve Randall, Treasurer; Kit Sanborn, Secretary; Shawn Mitchell, Training Officer; members Brent Bell, Kip Euler, Varyl French, Karan MacEachran, Shelagh Mannix, Kevin Mather, Cathy McComish, George Patterson, Rebecca Paul, Richard Reed, Peter Twombly; and Matt Wayland.

Our uniform and equipment purchases are declining, but our insurance and registration fees continue to go up.

The future of the program is developing fields for play on the newly leased land on the Old Concord Road. But the real future of this program means new parents/people must get involved. Our committee of 11 is currently short 2 people and more vacancies will occur as many members whose children have almost outgrown the program retire. Without this group working behind the scenes, there would be no games. HENNIKER CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Activities included a continuation of the Prime Wetlands Delineation project which we expect to complete in 1994. We initiated a study of town owned land and public lands in Henniker. The Commission also provided technical assistance to the Code Enforcement Officer on wetlands delineations and responded to a number of citizen complaints.

We currently have 6 Commissioners and one open seat. We are pleased to now have a file cabinet at the Town Hall making our considerable library of conservation related literature available to the public during town office hours. 1993 has seen a strong active Conservation Commission in Henniker. The Commission meets on the second Wednesday of the month at 7:00 PM in the Town Hall.

TUCKER FREE LIBRARY ANNUAL REPORT

The past twelve months at the Tucker Free Library were busy and rewarding as the library continued to pursue its commitment to provide reading materials and to answer the information needs of today's society. The primary goal of supplying reading matter remains constant as the requests for reference services, programs and non-print items, such as audio and video cassettes, continues to increase.

Through the year, a variety of programs was offered to patrons of all ages. Topics ranged from advice on healthy cooking and eating to illustrating children's books. The children's summer story hour and reading programs were especially successful, with a total enrollment of 307 youngsters. Funding for these programs is provided from the partial proceeds of the annual book, bake and plant sale held by the Friends of the Library. This year, they also purchased new shelving for the children's room. The library appreciates the help and support given by this group of volunteers.

In 1990, the library embarked upon a two phase building plan. Phase I, which provided handicapped accessibility, was completed in 1992. We have indefinitely postponed Phase II, which calls for library expansion into the space now housing the town's artifacts and memorabilia. This will afford the town the time to formulate their plans for relocating the historical collection.

This year the library will be requesting funds to replace the antiquated furnaces (which are surviving on "borrowed time") and to revamp the heating system. We will also ask for the establishment of a five year capital reserve fund, to allow replacement of old electrical wiring and to automate the library card catalog and circulation. These steps would insure that the library continues to operate safely and effectively into the twenty first century.

The library continues to benefit from the proceeds of the Town Trust Funds. Other funds, including the Sanborn Connor Brown, Scott J. Barry, Marjorie B. Bennett, James W. Doon, Francis O. Holmes and Mary F. Kjellman, allow purchase of books in specific categories. The library is honored to be the recipient of these memorials.

The Tucker Free Library gratefully acknowledges the strong support which the citizens of Henniker provide for this institution. The library will continue to endeavor to fully serve the needs of the community.

COGSWELL SPRING WATER WORKS

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The water main on Pearl Street failed and had to be replaced this summer. It was a 1" iron pipe. It was replaced with 520' of 6" water main and new gate valves were installed on each end for maintenance purposes. This project took some time due to ledge that had to be blasted before it could be removed to allow for the new main to be installed. Overall the project went well and the end result is better water quantity and quality for the water consumers in that area.

As the town grows, so does the need for the water department to grow with it. In preparation for this, the water department purchased a piece of property on Davison Road. This property will allow the water department to install a new water storage tank. When this tank is built it will give the water system more storage capacity and will balance the system out on both sides of the river which will be a tremendous help during peak demand hours and for fire fighting purposes.

The water department responded to 3 water leaks due to freeze ups in customer homes, 3 water main breaks, changed 6 fire hydrants, replaced 5 service connections, 2 curb boxes, and repaired the float control system twice after lightning strikes had damaged it.

The lead and copper testing program is under way. The first round of samples have been taken and we are waiting for the results from the laboratory.

We are currently working with the consulting firm Sterns and Wheeler on a wellhead protection program. This will enable us to identify any possible contamination within the 4000 foot protective radius of our wellfield set by the Environmental Protection Agency thus protecting our water shed.

BUILDING COMMITTEE

**HENNIKER FIRE AND RESCUE HEADQUARTERS
MAPLE STREET SITE**

Approximately 10 years ago a process was started to design, plan and construct a municipal building to house the Henniker Fire/Police/Rescue departments. The present buildings housing the fire and rescue departments have been in service since 1900 and 1974 respectively and are in need of replacement for many reasons. The present fire station is in need of substantial electrical, heating and structural upgrading; no parking is available for the firemen; OSHA required HAZMAT response equipment will not fit in the present building. Joint training facilities are needed to allow the two departments to train at the same time, the rescue squad building is not capable of housing future full time personnel, and per the recommendations of the Emergency Services Committee the town must upgrade the facilities in which our Disaster Management Control Center is located.

In an effort to insure the most complete and useful design for the new building, the Emergency Services Committee (now called the Building Committee), appointed by the Selectmen in 1990, enlisted the help of many people to determine what they felt should be included in a new building. Townspeople and neighbors of the proposed site were interviewed to determine what they did, and more importantly, did not want. Other fire and rescue departments have been consulted as well as visited by Henniker personnel to determine how their buildings have served the needs of their respective communities. New England College administrators were consulted to determine the college's fire and rescue needs in the coming years. Additional planning input was provided by the Selectmen's Office and the Planning Board to provide insight to the long term plans and projections for growth that Henniker can anticipate for the future.

The following shows the evolution of the project:

1986 Town approved \$15,000 for the purchase of land and site development for a joint fire/rescue building

1989 Town approved \$57,000 to purchase land on Maple Street for the construction of a Public Safety Building

1989 Site purchased and deed received

1990 Town defeated appropriation of \$600,000 for the design, site development and construction of a new Public Safety Building

1991 Town defeated establishment of Capital Reserve Fund with \$15,000 for the purpose of an Emergency Services Building

1992 Decision made that Henniker Police Department would stay in their present location

1993 Town approved \$5,000 to defray planning costs

1993 Site cleared to allow for the layout of buildings on the property

1993 Finalization of preliminary plans and initiation of scheduled Bond hearings

1994 January 11, 1994 hearing on Fire/Rescue building. Consulting architect estimates costs of building at \$399,000

1994 January 25 Bond Hearing. By changing some designs in the building and securing commitments of volunteer labor, the donated use of heavy equipment and reduced prices for materials, the committee lowered the cost estimates of the Fire/Rescue building to \$295,000.

Board of Selectmen passes motion to place a motion on Town Meeting Warrant asking for authorization to bond up to \$295,000 for a Fire/Rescue building. As Committee suggested, they also will ask Town to apply \$150,000 of Fund Balance (money from under-expended budgets and from amounts actually received over estimated revenues) to the cost of the building. Expecting that if the Town approves these requests, the amount of money that has to be raised directly will be less than \$100,000; the Board also agrees to place an article on the Warrant which allows voters to raise the money for the Fire/Rescue building directly from taxes.

Because other large scale projects will be addressed by the Town in the near future, this year, 1994 is the year to complete the construction of a new fire and rescue building to support the needs of an ever expanding community such as ours. The committee strongly urges the taxpayers of Henniker to support this project.

RECREATIONAL SWIMMING COMMITTEE

The Henniker Recreational Swimming Area Committee gratefully acknowledges the Town's action at Town Meeting wherein they voted to release the Capital Reserve Funds for the development of a swimming area east of the Ramsdell Road Bridge. However, the Committee did not actively pursue this endeavor during 1993. The Committee hopes to continue its effort in defining the exact scope of the activities during 1994 and have a Warrant Article for you to consider at the 1995 Town Meeting.

TOWN WARRANT 1994

TOWN OF HENNIKER, STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Henniker in the County of Merrimack in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Cogswell Memorial School Auditorium in Henniker on **Tuesday the Eighth (8) of March**, next, at **ten (10:00)** of the clock in the morning to act upon the following:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the Ensuing Year.

To vote on the following:

2. Are you in favor of amending the Henniker Zoning Ordinance by adding an Open Space Residential Development option for the RV, RR and RN zone? The purpose of the open space development option is to permit greater flexibility and design without increasing the number of dwelling units allowed on a specific parcel of land.

3. Are you in favor of amending the Henniker Zoning Ordinance to include the word "motorized" in the wording of Article II Section 201.15, "Commercial/Services/Technical," in the existing ordinance to permit the repair of non-motorized vehicles as a home business?

4. Are you in favor of amending the Henniker Zoning Ordinance to make changes and additions Article XXIV, "Floodplain Development Ordinance," by including reference to recreation vehicles construction, size, mobility and use and as to locations within specific zones within the Floodplain area? The Federal Emergency Management Agency has mandated adoption of the amendments so that the Town will remain in compliance with the National Floodplain Insurance Program.

5. Are you in favor of amending the Henniker Zoning Ordinance to include the definition of "kennel" to be added to Section 201 of the Henniker Zoning Ordinance? Definition shall be "a commercial kennel is any operation that (1) provides food and shelter and care of animals for purposes not primarily related to medical care, or (2) engages in the breeding of animals for sale or trade."

"A private kennel is any structure or land designed or arranged for the care of 5 or more adult animals, excluding animals used for agricultural purposes."

6. Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:62 for an exemption for property tax purposes from the assessed value of real property equipped with a solar energy system, for the purpose of heating, cooling or providing electricity, which exemption shall be in an amount of 50% of the cost of the solar energy system up to \$10,000? The amount of the exemption shall be indexed and brought forward to maintain a constant percentage of the assessed valuation of the property.

7. Shall we adopt optional adjusted elderly exemptions from property tax? The optional exemptions, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers shall be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$15,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$20,000; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$25,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$15,000 or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$20,000; and own net assets not in excess of \$40,000 excluding the value of the person's residence.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Cogswell Memorial School Auditorium in said Henniker on **Wednesday the Ninth (9) day of March**, at **seven (7:00)** of the clock in the evening to act upon the following:

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$298,000 for the construction and original equipping of a new Fire & Rescue Building, and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$298,000 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33) and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. (2/3 ballot vote required). Recommended by the Selectmen.

9. To see if the Town will vote to utilize up to \$45,000 from the proceeds of the sale of lands taken by tax deed to help defray the costs of the construction and original equipping of a new Fire & Rescue Building. Recommended by the Selectmen.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the use/transfer of up to \$150,000 of the December 31, 1993 fund balance to help defray the costs of the construction and original equipping of a new Fire & Rescue Building. Recommended by the Selectmen.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$298,000 for the construction and original equipping of a new Fire & Rescue Building with \$298,000 to be raised through general taxation. Not recommended by the Selectmen.

12. To hear and act upon the reports of the Town Officers, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds and other Committees.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for General Government purposes, Debt Service and Insurance.

14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Public Safety purposes.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fourteen thousand five hundred dollars (\$14,500) for the purchase of a new police cruiser. Recommended by the Selectmen.

16. Shall the Town ratify the organizational structure of the Henniker Fire Department wherein the Chief, 1st Engineer and 2nd Engineer are elected directly by the firefighters with the Selectmen ratifying said vote by appointment of the Chief and Engineers to one (1) year terms of office, further, that the firefighters are elected by the membership at large?

17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highways, Street Lights, Solid Waste Disposal purposes and Road Improvements.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand one hundred thirteen dollars (\$3,113) as its contribution toward the Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day in cooperation with surrounding towns. Recommended by the Selectmen.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-eight thousand six hundred fifty-four dollars (\$28,654) for the purchase of a new one ton pickup truck with a 9 foot power angling plow, body and 8 foot salt/sand spreader. Recommended by the Selectmen.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for the purchase of a 10 foot stainless steel salt/sand spreader for the 1993 International Dump truck acquired in 1993. Recommended by the Selectmen.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty-nine thousand two hundred forty dollars (\$59,240) for the balance of the town's share to rehabilitate the Amey Brook Bridge, Bridge #149/111, on Old Concord Road, under the State Bridge Aid Program 80/20 funding formula. Recommended by the Selectmen.

22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Health and Welfare.

23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Culture and Recreation and Parks care.

24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Tucker Free Library.

25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to replace the furnaces and revamp the heating system at the Tucker Free Library.

26. To see if the Town will vote to establish an Expendable Maintenance Trust under the provisions of RSA 31:19-a for the purpose of maintenance and repair at the Tucker Free Library and to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to be placed in this fund and make the Library Trustees the agents to expend.

27. Shall the town accept the provisions of RSA 202-A:4-c providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the public library trustees to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, unanticipated money from a state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year?

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) for Capital Reserve purposes to be appropriated as follows; five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to be added to the Fire Department Capital Reserve Account, five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to be added to the Rescue Squad Capital Reserve Account and five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to be added to the Highway Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Account previously established under the provision of RSA 35:1. Recommended by the Selectmen.

Recommended by the Selectmen.

30. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the operating expenses of the Waste Water Treatment Plant. **This sum is to be funded by sewer assessments.**

31. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the operating expenses of the Cogswell Spring Water Works. **This sum to be funded by water assessments.**

To see if the Town will authorize the Water Commissioner and the Board of Selectmen to convey to Calvin and Viola Tucker a landlocked parcel of land containing about 1/3 acres, Tax Map Lot #96E, abutting said Tucker property near Davison and Bradford Roads, said parcel to be annexed to the Tucker property and not to be sold as a separate lot.

33. Shall the town accept the provisions of RSA 31:95-b providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, unanticipated money from a state, federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year? This authorization will remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of Town Meeting. (Majority vote required.)

34. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept gifts of personal property which may be offered to the town for any public purposes, pursuant to RSA 31:95-e. The selectmen must hold a public hearing before accepting such gift, and the acceptance shall not bind the town to raise, appropriate, or expend any public funds for the operation, maintenance, repair, or replacement of any such personal property? This authorization will remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of Town Meeting. (Majority vote required.)

35. Shall the town accept the provisions of RSA 33:7 providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the selectmen to issue tax anticipation notes? This authorization will remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of Town Meeting. (Majority vote required.)

36. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 80:42-IV and RSA 80:80-IV, an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, to authorize the

Selectmen to sell by sealed bid or public auction any lands which become available through the real estate tax lien procedure or to dispose of such lands as justice may require? This authorization will remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of Town Meeting. (Majority vote required.)

37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell by sealed bid or public auction, land on Ramsdell Road, Tax Map Lot 2-483, which was previously voted by the Town to be developed into a park.

38. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept, on behalf of the town, gifts, legacies, and devises made to the town in trust for any public purpose, as permitted by RSA 31:19.

39. Are you in favor of amending the Henniker Waste Management Ordinance as proposed by the Board of Selectmen?

40. To see if the Town will vote to urge the State of New Hampshire to develop and implement a plan of action to redesign the intersection of Proctor Square in order to improve the safety for both motorists and pedestrians.

41. To see if the Town will vote to rescind article 22 of the March 1993 Town Meeting regarding the Sewer Commissioners entering into a contract with a private company. Said article 22 was misleading in that it failed to state that the Town's waste water facility would: a. make Henniker the location of a regional waste treatment facility. B. be part of a two phase project the other would consist of a sludge composting plant to be located else where in Henniker. C. Also that it would incur increased costs to the taxpayers and sewer users. (Submitted by Petition.)

42. To transact any other business that may properly come before this meeting.

PARKS BOARD

The restoration project in Azalea Park started during the summer of 1993.

The chain link fence was removed and replaced with a post and rail type fence which can be seen from both the covered bridge as well as the Edna Dean Proctor bridge. The foot path on the riverfront in Azalea Park was also leveled off and all the tree roots covered with hard pack gravel to provide a safer walk. Drainage was installed in the area that would wash out due to run off coming from the school, library and fire station parking areas after heavy rains.

This summer, if all goes well, the park restoration will be completed with the removal of the cement walk in back of the fire station. The new walkway will be installed to allow more drainage from Western Avenue to be channelled and controlled to avoid erosion. Two tables have been purchased for Azalea Park. The tables have been placed for use in back of the Town Hall until the project in Azalea Park is complete. Benches will also be purchased and put in the park after the completion of all the work.

While the project moves along at a slow pace, we are optimistic that it will be completed in 1994.

The grant money received a few years ago from the Cogswell Benevolent Trust to restore the park will be expended at the completion of the project.

For those that may be wondering, there will be no lighting in the park except that which comes from neighboring properties.

Sadly we must report that some unsupervised teenagers took it upon themselves to hammer log cabin spikes into one of the trees that the town had just spent a few hundred dollars to make the tree safe to walk under. The spikes were nailed to suspend a rope to use for swinging out into the river. The Police Department was able to find the parents of the nail pounders and rope hangers and explain the seriousness of what the teens did. The rope was removed. We are now waiting to see if the tree will survive. The tree is one of the oldest in the park.

During 1994 some of the plant barrels will be replaced because of the rot which has occurred in the wood. We look forward to 1994 to provide the town with well groomed parks, even though we have a very tight budget.

Lord Henniker received several gifts from townspeople and New England College. Lord Henniker presented the town with a portrait of the first Lord and Lady Henniker painted in the 1700s. New England College sponsored Lord and Lady Henniker's historic trip and lodging. Without their support this event would not have occurred.

On August 11th, the 39th Army Band filled the evening with a lively entertaining performance on the lawn at the Town Hall. Laughter, clapping and song provided an opportunity for all ages to enjoy. The Band's evening was appropriately entitled "Stars and Stripes and Meteorites!" The evening sky was filled with a meteor shower which many townspeople enjoyed from the Old Concord Road fields.

August 15th began with a "blast!", a cannon blast, at the opening ceremonies on the Town Hall lawn. E. Benjamin Ayer was named Citizen of the Year.

Following the opening ceremonies was a Children's Parade with guest of honor, everyone's favorite "purple dinosaur" leading the many colorful bikes and costumed children. Commemorative ribbons were awarded in a variety of categories. White Birch Children's Fair began and Old Home Days Children's Games started. The games were designed to provide an example of Henniker's theme, "Past, Present and Future". All children's games were well participated in and they included: Biggest Bubblegum Contest, Bullfrog Race, Egg Pass in the Spoon, Blue Booberry Jello Eating Contest and Ezy-Kneezy Race. Prizes were awarded in each category. Wings of Dawn held a bird and mammal presentation. The days events were followed by a church supper at the Congregational Church and were rounded off by some wonderful family entertainment performed by "Peggosus."

August 16th Doug Clegg and Tom Pirozzoli performed a wonderful old and fun-filled evening for all ages at the NEC Science Building.

August 17th the Henniker Community Band performed.

August 18th the United States Postal Service held a "Pictorial Cancellation" outside Henniker's first post office - the Police Station - with Postal Clerk Bill Belanger manning the postal truck, cancelling envelopes, post cards, etc. with Henniker's historic first pictorial cancellation. Over 4000 cancellations were struck.

Ha Penny Theatre's Mr. Bear and Company entertained young and old and the Teddy Bear Picnic went on as planned inside the NEC Field House, a golf scramble took place at Dustin's and a youth dance was held at the NEC Doon Center.

August 19th was a beautiful warm day. "Strings N Things" performed at NEC Doon Center and "Close Quarters" performed under the stars at Community Park.

August 20th, a difficult decision, the day was cloudy with a 75% chance of showers. The stage at Community Park had worked so well the night before and was actually set up for Friday night's "Open Cafe" atmosphere. However, without a tarp to cover expensive equipment the decision was made to hold Friday night's events inside.

The NEC field house was open and people began to set up booths. Merri Mac Morris Dancers began dancing and people started to filter in. Many folks were disappointed because it was inside, however the aroma of fresh delicious food filled the air and Carolyn Parrot performed. After a short break the Newport Opera House Big Band played songs from Benny Goodman, Glenn Miller and people danced.

Around 10:15 PM a loud noise muffled the bands music and the clouds had opened up for a heavy rainfall. Yes! the right decision had been made.

August 21st, booths were set up at the Town Hall, people started to line the streets, vehicles and floats started to arrive. The parade line up began. Both Village Green and Hillside Drive were used to line up all the floats, bands, shiners, horses and vehicles.

With the help of judges, a narrator and the Contoocook Valley Radio Club, the parade began and lasted 40 continuous minutes. Ribbons were awarded for 1st, 2nd and 3rd prize as well as Best of Show for the theme "Henniker: Past, Present and Future."

Benjamin Ayer a plaque for 50 years service as a fireman and 25 years as chief serving Henniker.

August 22nd the Aurora Lodge #43 sponsored a breakfast and open house. Henniker Sports held an inline skate race the length of Old Concord Road with the finish line being Rush Road. WBCC held their 11th Annual Auction and Henniker's PTA/PATH held a Cow Bingo on the little league field.

An ongoing event was the town landmark tour held August 15, 21, and 22. Patrons traveled in WBCC's van with a member of the Historical Society providing a verbal overview at each landmark. The tour was educational, informative and amazing in how many landmarks can be in your backyard...or close to it! The Historic Society Museum sponsored special hours during which they were open to the public.

CENTRAL NEW HAMPSHIRE REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION

The Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission (CNHRPC) is a voluntary association of 20 towns and the City of Concord in Merrimack and Hillsboro counties.

The CNHRPC is one of nine RPC's organized under RSA 36:45-53. Our principle charges are to prepare coordinated plans for the region and to provide planning assistance to member communities. Every city and town in New Hampshire is within an organized region.

Our accomplishments over the last year include:

The Commission prepared and distributed the complete draft of the transportation element of the regional master plan in October. The plan describes the transportation system of the region, identifies current and future transportation issues, discusses the role of the CNHRPC in transportation, and makes recommendations to towns, the region, and the state to address the transportation issues in the region. Although the plan element is scheduled for adoption in February 1994, public comment on implementation of the plan is continuously welcomed.

Transportation will continue to be a focus in 1994 and beyond. We will adopt and submit our first ever transportation improvement program (TIP), the capital improvement plan for transportation in the region, and will continue to review, comment, and participate in state transportation projects, programs and plans.

Working with interested cities and towns, the RPC updated the Merrimack County overall economic development plan. The Commission continues to provide administrative and technical support to the participating communities.

We are in the middle of the five year update to the affordable housing assessment. The project will identify the need for housing affordable to low and moderate income families in the region, the available amount of such housing, and the fair share of affordable housing which should exist in each community.

The Commission continues to provide high quality and timely services to member municipalities through circuit riding, master plan assistance, research, and other technical assistance.

Specific activities in Henniker included:

Providing information on the limits on and methods to appeal decisions of the planning board on site plan reviews; providing definition of abutter and assistance in determination of who is legally an abutter in the case of a trailer park.

WHITE BIRCH COMMUNITY CENTER

White Birch Community Center (WBCC) is a private, non-private organization which focuses on the educational, social and recreational needs of the community so as to enable people to create a balance of work and leisure. As well as offering youth programs and senior citizen programs, the Center also provides licensed child care and pre-school programs for children aged 18 months to 12 years.

YOUTH PROGRAM SUMMARY

The goal of our youth programs is to continue services to the children of Henniker.

From July through August, WBCC holds a Summer Camp for children. Camp offered 7 weeks of fun this past year: during "Magic Carpet Ride" week, the children went to the New London Barn Playhouse to see "Aladdin" and learned about Arabian customs; and during "Awesome Animals" they visited the Franklin Park Zoo. Children in kindergarten through 4th grade filled 144 camper spaces. 144 spaces represents a 53% increase from last year.

Outdoor Adventure Days for youth 5th to 8th grades offered exciting trips for children this year. The eight summer trips had a total attendance of 168 children, an increase of 29% from last year. There were trips to the Boston Museum of Science, Surf Coaster, Sergeant Camp, Canobie Lake Park, a roller skating rink, The Whale's Tale, and Water Country. A bike clinic included a biking trip and a picnic at Tall Pines Cottages on Keyser Pond. In addition to the summertime activities, WBCC also offered youth trips to a Haunted House and to the Boston International Festival.

The 1993 Halloween Party had over 375 people in attendance. The Party was held at the New England College Field House. In addition to the Halloween Party, the Center also sponsored a Children's Fair, Breakfast with Santa, and other special events. The Center wishes to acknowledge the Fraternity and Sorority organizations of New England College who offer valuable assistance in making these events possible.

SWIM PROGRAM

The 1993 Swim program served 103 children from ages 6-12. The program is offered at no cost to Henniker children and is taught by a Red Cross-certified instructor. Lessons are available in levels ranging from pre-swim to Advanced Skill. We hope to continue to serve many children with this important program.

SENIOR CITIZEN PROGRAM

WBCC has 370 senior citizens on our mailing list. Our goal is to continue with day trips, special events, and monthly luncheons, while providing a consistent series of craft projects, seminars, Bingo, and holiday activities for Seniors. The support of Carol Gaidos, our VOLUNTEER Senior Citizen Coordinator, has been the most important factor in the Center's ability to provide these services to local Seniors.

SAFETY COMMITTEE

In January 1993 the Safety Committee met for the first time. The Committee is comprised of personnel from each of the town's departments. Their charge is to discuss safety methods for the various departments, offer suggestions on safety procedures, evaluate job-related accidents and offer suggestions on corrections that can be made so that repeat accidents do not occur, and provide a mission statement stating the town's overall safety conscientiousness.

The members of the Committee are Doug Paul (Police Department), Nate Kimball (Fire Department), Cathy McComish (Rescue Squad), Mary Dowse (Public Works Department), Cindy Marsland (Town Offices) and Ed Wojnowski (Town Administrator).

The Committee has met and discussed accidents that have occurred this past year and made recommendations to the department heads regarding possible changes in the manner in which certain tasks are performed. They have also provided workshops through Compensation Funds of NH in proper safety procedures such as "enclosed spaces entry", flagging procedures, and "slips, trips and falls."

The Safety Committee also inspects the safety of town buildings. They inspected the fire house and made recommendations to the fire chief for additional safety procedures to the building. They will be conducting further "walk-throughs" of the remaining town buildings in the spring and making any recommendations to the Board and specific department heads.

As this time the Committee is working on a mission statement and overall safety procedures for the Town to institute on behalf of its employees.


