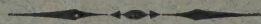

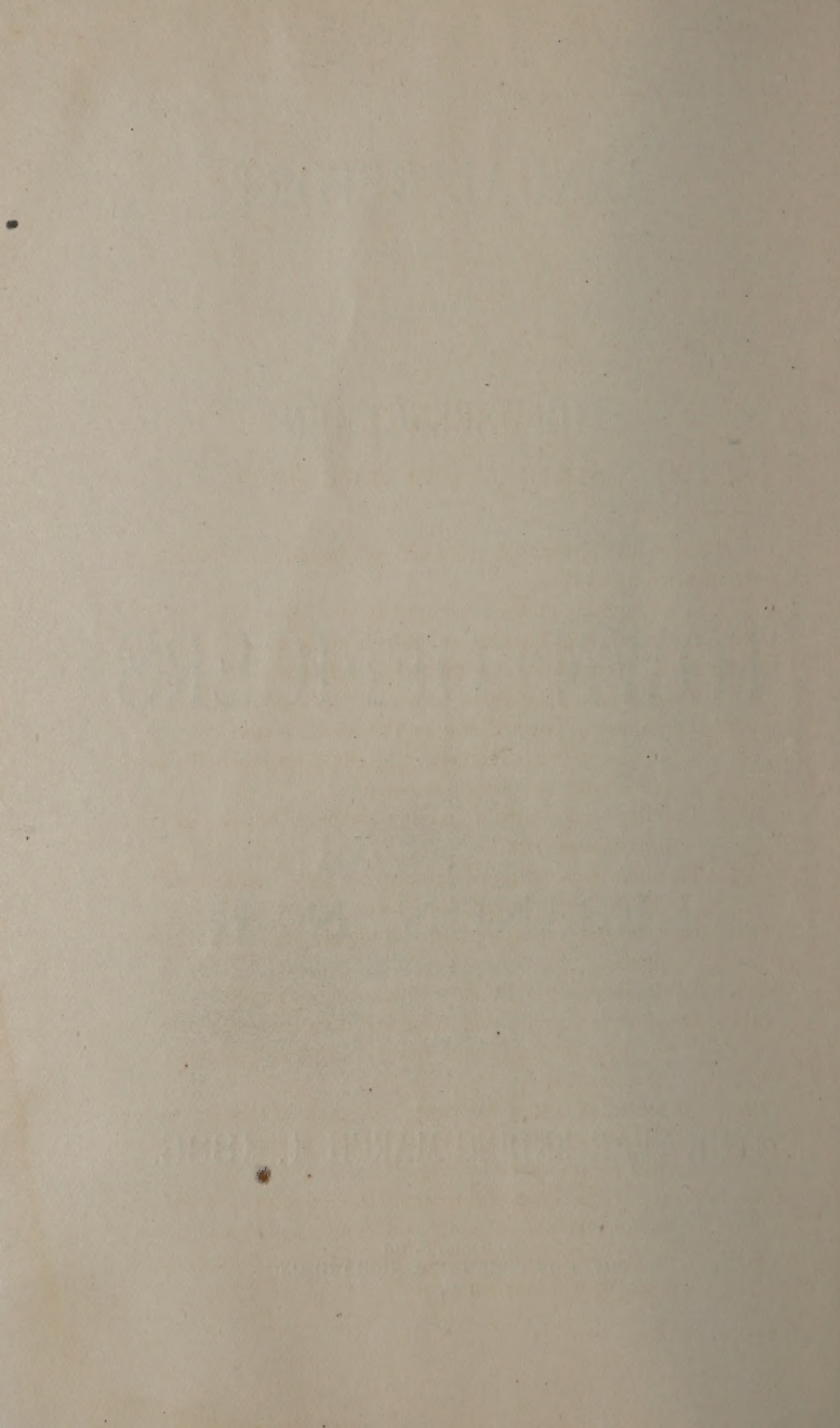

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the town of Lebanon, qualified to vote in town affairs :—

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :—

- 1st. To choose a Moderator to preside in said meeting.
- 2d. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3d. To choose three Selectmen, and all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- 4th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to repair highways.
- 5th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges the ensuing year.
- 6th. To hear the reports of the Auditors and School Committee.
- 7th. To determine the division of the school money.
- 8th. To see what action the town will take in relation to the payment of the Town Bonds which will become due July 1st, 1886.
- 9th. To see what action the town will take in relation to the balance of the dog tax of 1885, not ordered to be paid for damages by dogs.
- 10th. To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen to enforce the provisions of chapter 115 of the General Laws, in relation to licensing, regulating and restraining dogs, or act thereon.

- 11th. To bring in your votes on the question submitted by the Legislature, viz : " Is it expedient that a Convention be called to revise the Constitution?"
- 13th. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money not exceeding fifty dollars for the observance of Memorial day.
- 13th. To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen to describe the limits of Lebanon High School District and the Lebanon District, and cause the same to be recorded in the records of the town.
- 14th. To see if the town will vote to exempt any Creamey from taxation that may be erected in said town within one year, or act thereon.
- 15th. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of chapter 92 of the Pamphlet Laws of the June session, 1883, in relation to the distribution of invoice blanks.
- 16th. To see if the town will vote to render the sum heretofore appropriated for the erection of a memorial hall building, available for immediate use, or act thereon.

The schools of the town have been almost universally successful during the past year, considering the opportunities.

Good work has been done in nearly all the districts both by teachers and pupils. Quite a number of the schools have been very small, while others have been crowded. In several districts there has been but one term, while in others there have been three, thus affording very unequal advantage to pupils residing in different parts of the town. It is hoped that in the future arrangements will be made which will give to all better and more nearly equal advantages. As far as practical, the grading of schools seems one of the best methods of accomplishing this end. Although our schools are in the main good, yet they are not perfect, and every means should be used to secure their constant improvement. A higher standard of examination for teachers should be demanded, and teachers who prove themselves efficient should, if possible, be retained, even though inferior ones may be secured at a somewhat lower salary.
