TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lee in the County of Strafford, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

[L. S.]

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Lee on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To raise the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for payment on Trunk Line Note.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to complete the road from Hale's Corner to the Five Corners, provided the State shall contribute the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) for the same purpose.

5. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of four hundred and eleven dollars and ninety cents (\$411.90).

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

7. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of highways.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appro-

priate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) for fire protection.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200) for old age assistance and relief.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

11. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Australian Ballot Law in the election of Town Officers.

12. To choose a delegate to the Constitutional Convention to be held in Concord, N. H., beginning on the second Tuesday of May, 1938.

13. To see if the Town will vote to celebrate the anniversary of New Hampshire's Ratification of the U. S. Constitution, and to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25) therefor.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Lee:

This year the schools are joining in the sequicentennial of the Constitution of the United States. One hundred fifty years ago last September 17, John Langdon signed the document for New Hampshire. With ratification by our state June 21, 1788, the Constitution went into effect. One of the aims of our schools is to produce good citizens, able to take their places in a government "of the people, by the people, and for the people." History and civics are especially stressed in the years preceding graduation from the eighth grade.

The report of the School Nurse, Miss Margaret Macdonald, records 29 physical defects, including marked underweight, vision, teeth, tonsils, and breathing. Six of these were reported as corrected during the year. As practically all of these conditions can be remedied, parents are urged to note such conditions when reported by the Nurse and take steps to restore the children to normal health. The nurse and the teachers also record the regular growth of the children in height and weight, which of course is normal in most cases. As the School Board has voted not to admit children into the schools next fall until they have complied with the vaccination law, parents will save much delay and inconvenience by having this matter attended to well in advance of the opening of school.
