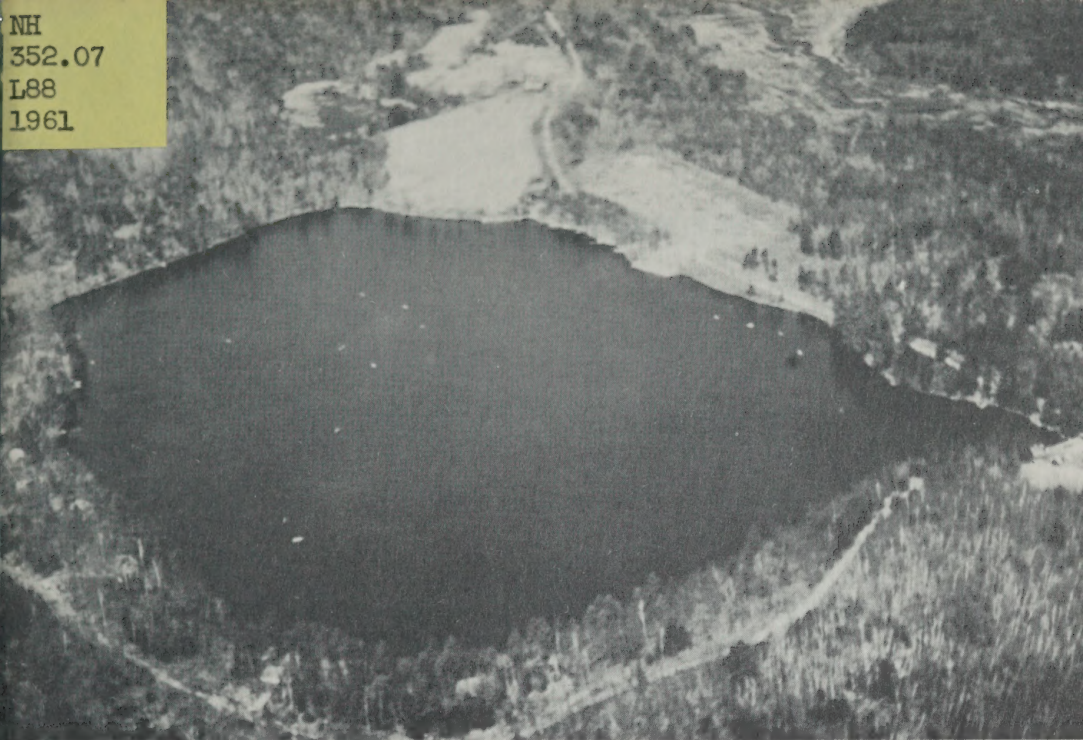

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Loudon in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Loudon on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to allow 2% discount on all property taxes paid within thirty days after presentation of tax bill.
4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums of money not to exceed in the aggregate more than 75% of the anticipated amount to be collected in taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town of Loudon negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be paid in 1962 from taxes collected during the current municipal year.
5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Capital Reserve Fund.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred and thirty dollars (\$330.00) for the Concord Hospital to help their estimated deficit for the year 1962.
7. To see if the Town will vote to suspend a ruling (for this article only) made at the 1938 March Town meeting

in regards to the sale of property taken for taxes; the purpose to be for exchanging the land now owned by the Town on School Street and Oak Hill Road for land of William H. Brown on School Street west of and along side the school building.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the Town Officers' salaries by four hundred dollars (\$400.00) .

9. By Request of Loudon Planning Board

To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the purpose of erecting street signs on all roads and intersections: a town directory to be printed with the names and numbers of all residents, advertising in the directory to reimburse the Town for this appropriation.

10. By Request of Loudon Planning Board

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for the purpose of sidewalk construction in 1962. This sidewalk is to be constructed from the school to the Loudon Garage. (The State Highway Department has agreed to extend the sidewalk 100 ft. north of the bridge and 120 ft. south of the bridge) .

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$160.00 which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the Town, to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purposes of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Merrimack Valley Region.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Polls will close not earlier than seven o'clock in the evening.

During the past year besides the usual grading and maintenance, the following work has been done:

Oak Hill Road between Route 106 and School Street was tarred by Roger Dow. This was sealed later in the summer.

The Planning Board has prepared a draft proposal for naming all the streets and roads in the town and the numbering of the houses, subject to the approval of the Selectmen. This will include the printing of a town directory and the erection of suitable signs. To implement the plan it is necessary that the town underwrite the initial costs to be repaid later from sale of advertising space in the Directory. Estimated cost \$500.00. This would be a "first" for any New Hampshire town. The advantage to residents, strangers, business and in case of fire or other casualty are obvious.

With the approval of the selectmen the planning board has initiated an article in the town warrant to cover the transfer to the town of a tract of land adjacent to the school in exchange for a tract of town owned land not so favorably situated.

The proposal to build a sidewalk along the westerly side of route 106 from a point near the Loudon Garage northward to School St., has been favorably received by the State Highway Dept. The State would pay for the construction costs from a point 120 feet south of the bridge to a point 100 feet north of the bridge. The balance of the construction would be at town expense. This would require an estimated expense of \$1,000.00 in 1962 and \$1,000.00 in 1963. The abutting property owners have been consulted and are in favor of the proposal.

The proposal to build a civic center is difficult to finance. Perhaps the best approach would be to build an auditorium as an addition to the school. This would provide needed additional school facilities, and could be made available to serve other community needs. State and/or Federal financial aid might be available under such circumstances.

The construction of a swimming pool at the school was considered but the costs are prohibitive at present. A better way might seem to be to provide a swimming pool at or near the village bridge over the Soucook River.

REPORT OF FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Fire Department responded to 40 alarms in 1961 — 10 chimney, 9 brush-grass, 1 accident, 3 resuscitator, 1 rub-bish, 1 flooded oil stove, 1 over heated motor, 1 over heated wiring, 3 building, 6 Mutual Aid, 2 motor vehicle, 2 false.

The Ridge school house purchased from the School District by the Town for a fire station, was put in service in June 1961.

With the expenditure of many hours of labor by men of the Ridge area, a concrete floor and over head doors have been installed. The building is heated by an automatic oil burning heater.

An 800 gallon tank truck, with new pump is stationed there. Making this truck into an efficient piece of fire fighting apparatus was made economically possible from donations of pipe, fittings and other parts. Men of the Department furnished all labor.

The audible alarm is from 2 sirens mounted on the roof of the station, a gift from a good friend of the Department.

An automatic fire alarm box on the outside of the station is accessible to any one to sound an alarm.

Drills with this apparatus (to be known as Tank No. 4) were held under the directions of Capt. Page, to familiarize the men of the Ridge area with this apparatus. The four runs made by No. 4 proved the drills paid off.

Regular inspections of this equipment are made as a certainty of its readiness for instant use.

Nearly 50% of the monetary cost of making this building and truck serviceable came from funds earned by the firemen, plus a substantial donation from the Ladies Auxiliary.

Three new mobile radios have been added to our radio net, at no cost to the Town. Loudon is second to none in the field of emergency communications.

The Ladies Auxiliary is still a very necessary branch of this Department. Money earned by the Ladies is funneled into the Department for necessary equipment and additions to the station and trucks. They fill a vital role in

communications, providing lunches when needed, on stand-by at the station to lend a hand when and where needed, and many, many other ways.

Many hours and some dollars were spent in 1961 on improvements to the station and apparatus.

Inspections and maintenance of apparatus and fire alarm are never ending chores, which are shared by men of the Department.

Drop in at the station any time to look over YOUR fire fighting equipment.

Let every one make fire prevention their business in 1962.

CIVIL DEFENSE

Operation alert 1961 was held April 28th at 3:00 P.M. to noon April 29th. This was our National Test Operation, in which all cities and towns throughout our Country test their local C.D. units.

The units in Loudon that were asked to help with the test were operational shortly after the air raid warning signal (yellow).

Your R.A.D.E.F. and communications group was perhaps the most worked because of the special orders received through our State C.D. Headquarters from National. To better explain this, we have received from the Federal Government two new sets of test equipment for monitoring any radiation in our area. To receive this equipment we had to set up two monitoring stations with radio communications, one is at the Loudon Central Fire Station called AQB-1 and the other is located in Royal Page's home called AQB-2. Both groups received sealed envelopes containing problems which had to be worked out and, if possible radioed back to headquarters.

To the citizens of Loudon it is hoped that you will give some consideration to fallout protection of your own, at the present time our Government is making surveys throughout our State in regards to group shelters but Loudon does not seem to fall within the possibilities of Federal funds.

Our National Civil Defense has been re-organized and also our State Civil Defense, moving to the National Guard Armory in Concord and under the direction of the State National Guards.

Loudon is to have a new program but to date we have not received it from State Headquarters.

At anytime feel free to call upon us for information on disaster and survival, if we do not have the answers we will get them for you.

Annual Meeting Proceedings — March 11, 1961

Moderator Stanley H. Prescott called the meeting to order at 7:30 P.M. Salute to the flag, led by William Brown. Members of the School Board, Anne D. Brown, Harold W. Hill and Raymond C. Cummings, and Superintendent William B. Hounsell were introduced by the Moderator.

In the absence of the Clerk, Pauline Haines, Beatrice Jenkins nominated Marion C. Stuart to serve as Clerk Pro-Tem. The warrant was read.

ARTICLE 1 — Stanley H. Prescott was nominated for Moderator by Charles Shaw. It was voted that the clerk cast one ballot for Stanley H. Prescott as Moderator, the act declaring him elected.

ARTICLE 2 — Nominations made for Clerk were Ellen Foster, nominated by William Brown and Pauline Haines, nominated by Beatrice Jenkins. The Moderator appointed William Chesley and Homer F. LaBonte to serve as ballot inspectors for this session.

ARTICLE 4 — Fred J. Hackett was nominated for Treasurer by Herman Annis. It was voted that the Clerk cast one ballot for Fred J. Hackett, the action declaring Fred Hackett elected Treasurer for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 5 — On motion by Anne Brown, seconded by Warren Jenkins, the salaries of School Board, Truant Officer and other officers or agents of the district remain the same. Article 5 was adopted.

ARTICLE 6 — The auditor's certificate by C. A. Brinkmann and G. B. Smith was read by the Moderator Stanley Prescott. No question on the report.

ARTICLE 7 — It was voted that the town auditors serve as school auditors. Motion made by William Brown, seconded by Warren Jenkins.

The Moderator declared a ten minute break and announced coffee and donuts on sale by the P.T.A.

Vote made that Article 9 be discussed before taking up Article 8.

ARTICLE 9 — William Brown questioned. Would the owner of the land give a deed to the town if school building remained on site as a fire house? Selectman, Lauris Moore assured that Mr. Hason, owner of the land was agreeable and pleased that the building remain on present site as a fire house. William Brown made the motion that Article 9 be adopted, seconded by Charles Shaw.

It was voted that Article 10 be taken up before Article 8.
Motion made by William Chesley.

ARTICLE 10 — Questions on finishing the classroom were answered by Raymond Cummings. The plan would be a classroom, the same size as present classrooms and storage space in the remaining basement area. On motion made by Harold Hill, Article 10 was adopted.

ARTICLE 8 — School Board's Estimated Budget was read by Anne Brown. Total amount to meet budget \$103,601.83 — Estimated income \$29,379.77 — Estimated Assessment to Balance Budget \$74,222.06. \$71,843.49 with old school account deducted and amount to be raised to be \$101,223.-26. Superintendent Hounsell informed that fifty dollars from recent sale of a school building was included in sum to be raised.

Question on retirement figure of \$2,829.98 — Mr. Hounsell explained this figure as the district's share and includes social security. On question — Does \$37,700.00 for teachers' salaries include that of an extra teacher? Raymond Cummings of the Board explained that salary for a new teacher and \$200 raise for present teachers was included.

Effect on taxes and cost of room carried over a 2 year basis was discussed.

Motion made by Harold Hill that the budget be accepted as read. Article 8 adopted by vote.

ARTICLE 11 — Harold Hill urged that the district recognize the need for a cooperative school in the future. Dorothy Downs stated that there is no position for Loudon in present plans. Alice Marston spoke of the activity of an old committee studying the problem, of which she was a member.

Harold Hill made a motion that a committee of prevailing School Board Members and Prevailing Selectmen be given authority to study and investigate possibilities of a

consolidated school. Charles Shaw seconded Hill's Motion, a vote so declared.

William Chesley reminded that it was legal to have a special school meeting if results of study and investigation of a consolidated school deemed it necessary.

Everett O. Dow asked for a rising vote of thanks, which was given to Anne Brown for her three years as a faithful and untiring member of the School Board. Mrs. Brown responded with appreciation for the gesture.

Anne Brown moved that the next annual meeting of the School District of the Town of Loudon be held the Saturday before town meeting at the Town Hall at 7:30 P.M.

Meeting adjourned at 10:05 P.M.
