

#### REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

#### To the citizens of the Town of Lyndeborough:

The school board respectfully submits the following report for the year ending February 15, 1913:

At the annual meeting of the school district, Jacob A. Woodward was elected moderator; L. Nute Woodward, clerk; Charles H. Tarbell, treasurer; Jacob A. Woodward, auditor; Ella R. Holt, a member of the board of education for the term of three years; Bertha P. Woodward, a member for two years and E. Belle Barrow, a member for one year.

The school board organized with Ella R. Holt, chairman, and Bertha P. Woodward, secretary. Herbert A. Potter was appointed truant officer and upon his resignation G. W. Eastman was appointed and has served during the year. Jacob A. Woodward declined to serve as auditor and Algernon W. Putnam was appointed by the school board in his place.

Five schools have been in session the whole year and one during the fall and winter. One hundred five pupils have been enrolled, 75 registered during the year. The smallest number in any school was 7 in Johnson Corner, and the largest number 27 at the Center. Thirteen different teachers have been employed, eight of whom were certified teachers. The average wage per month of each teacher has been \$37, and the average number of weeks for each school 32. There have been 345 cases of tardiness. The average per cent. of attendance has been 92, Perham Corner having  $95\frac{1}{3}$ , the highest per cent., and North Lyndeborough,  $87\frac{2}{3}$ , the lowest.

The board of last year called attention to the excessive number of tardinesses. This report will show a decrease but there is no reasonable excuse for the present large number. Teachers work along the lines of -cultivating punc-

tuality in all the ways they can devise. It is this habitual "just a few minutes late" that is the worst school evil and one which the home should take the responsibility of correcting. An occasional tardiness may be excusable, even justifiable. The reasonable teacher will understand this and make allowance. But when a child frequently comes lagging in just behind the bell, the fault is chargeable not to the school, not to the child, but to the home and to the failure of parents to appreciate the importance of punctuality. There should grow up in every family the idea that school is the regular business of the child. He should be trained to this feeling and be made to understand that neither outside interests, personal pleasure, . nor just feeling a little bad should be allowed to interfere with that business. Parents are often disappointed at what their children accomplish. They do not stand as well in their studies as they should. They fall behind their grade. Much of this condition is due not to the indifference of the teacher or the much abused school system. but the go-as-you-please pace which so many children are allowed to take in reference to their school work. The average home is more intelligent today in its treatment and care of the child than ever before. It may not be any more interested, but its interest is wiser. The home expects more of the schools today and it has a right to. But the home must become more sympathetic in its criticism of our schools and their aims.

We know our schools have progressed the past year. With one exception they have been graded and the state program of study placed in all and followed by our teachers.

We believe the standard of our schools could be raised much faster and with a financial saving in the end to the town if we were under expert supervision. However, we feel sure the time is not far distant before supervision will be compulsory with every town.

We have prepared our estimate for the coming year with the hope of having thirty-five weeks at least of school. The average number of weeks in the school year in this state is thirty-six, some towns having more, but with our appropriations up to the present time we have not been permitted over thirty-three.

That the high school tuition is such a drain on the treasury is no reason our elementary schools should be restricted. We have asked for \$150 for repairs and if you investigate you will find every cent of it needed and more. The toilet facilities in some of our school houses are a serious menace to health and a worse menace to morals, while the condition of the interior of some of our school rooms is a disgrace to a civilized community. We find in nearly every district a hearty willingness on the part of pupils and most parents for any improvement and we implore your financial aid.

As the school term opens again let the home consider what it can do. Let us coöperate. Make the schools more of *your* business, *not* to criticize, not to blame, but to help and encourage all connected with our school system.

We thank all who by words or deeds have made the past year more pleasant and profitable.
