ARTICLE III. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year. The budget was explained by F. Andrew Schulte, Chairman of the Budget Committee for a total of \$452,015.00.

ARTICLE VIII. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to erect a War Memorial.

PASSED

ARTICLE IX. On petition of James B. Sullivan and seventy-nine (79) other legal voters to adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-f for the adjusted elderly exemptions from property tax.

PASSED

ARTICLE X. Passed through adjournment.

SELECTMEN'S ANNUAL LETTER

Once again we are pleased to report to the citizens of the Town a brief outline of those transactions that may be of interest to you.

The \$8,000.00 Grant for the development of a Master Plan for the Great Island Common was received. The Kimball-Chase Co. of Portsmouth was awarded the contract and completed the plan for us. The plans are in the Selectmen's Office and can be reviewed any day during regular working hours. (Monday thru Friday between 8:00 A.M. and 12:00 Noon). More information on these plans should be available at our annual Town meeting.

The Selectmen have initiated a maintenance program for all our Town buildings. The Library has been painted and repairs made to the exterior of the building. The Town Hall has been painted (Did you notice?) on two sides with the other two sides to be completed this spring. A fire alarm system and emergency lights have been installed in the Town Hall to fulfill State of New Hampshire requirements on public buildings.

November was highlighted by the dedication of a War Memorial to "honor her citizens who served their country in all wars and conflicts." A picture of this memorial is on the cover of this report.

We would like to offer our thanks "Again" to Janet Macomber for her inspiration and dedication to see this project to its grand conclusion. Also, thanks to George Pitts for the carved eagle on the top of the flag pole at the Common. Kenneth Redden has donated a colored aerial photo, which is to hang in the Selectmen's Office, for which we want to offer our thanks on behalf of the town.

We take this opportunity to thank all those who serve on the many Boards that allow our Town to function in an orderly manner. The selectment, and I am sure that all the citizens in town appreciate their dedication to their respective Boards.

For those who may wish to offer their services to participate in town government, we encourage you to seek those positions that become available and let you selectmen know of your interest in serving.

In my opinion, the accompanying statements present fairly the financial position of the Enterprise Funds of the Town of New Castle, New Hampshire, as of June 30, 1984, and the results of operations and changes in financial position of such funds for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

I have the combined and individual financial statements and account groups of the Town of New Castle, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended June 30, 1983 as listed in the table of contents. My examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as I considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described more fully in Note 4, the financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the enterprise funds and general fixed assets, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In my opinion, except that the omission of the financial statements described above results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the preceding paragraph, the financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of New Castle, New Hampshire at June 30, 1983 and the results of its operations and the changes in financial position of its proprietary funds for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

The supplementary data included in the schedules are not necessary for a fair presentation of the financial statements, but are presented as additional analytical data. The supplementary data have been subjected to the tests and other auditing procedures applied in the examination of the financial statements mentioned above and, in my opinion, are fairly stated only when considered in conjunction with the financial statements taken as a whole.

Your library has continued to expand and improve during the past year. We continue to offer you a most complete and up-to-date selection of books; in addition, an ample supply of large print books are also available along with a shipment each month from the state library. Language tapes and a cassette tape recorder were recently purchased due to the generosity of several patrons. These are available for the use of everyone in the library or may be checked out for home study. We can request any book you desire through our network of libraries in the state and try to fulfill everyone's requests and serve every interest for all ages.

Numerous physical improvements have been performed. The exterior was painted in September and many of the shelves indoors were painted bright, cheery colors. New eye-catching posters decorate our walls; many stuffed animals grace the corners of the kid's area.

The summer reading program for the children was most successful and prizes were awarded to each child who participated weekly in this program. The students from Maude H. Trefethen School continue to enjoy their Tuesday afternoon visits to the library along with Mrs. Diane Share's story at the end of their book selection period.

A variety of programs were held for the public along with book sales, fund-raisers, luncheons and teas. Many thanks go to Pam Cullen and Anita Lomas for their endless efforts and competent leadership of the Friends of the Library. The New Castle poster featuring Elizabeth Plumer's photo was sold by the Friends and has been a most popular item. The montly displays arranged and provided by this organization are enjoyed by all who enter and we thank the volunteers who have so kindly shared their hobbies and collections with us.

Our librarian now contributes a monthly article to the Rockingham Gazette featuring any information pertinent to happenings at or in the library. "Between the Covers" has added greatly to our circulation and publicity.

Mrs. Helen St. John was re-elected as Trustee for three more years. In December, the Trustees received and accepted with sincere regret the resignation of Deborah Schulte as Librarian for the past ten years. A Christmas tea was held in her honor and she was presented with a lovely pewter keepsake for her years of service and friendship. Jane Barrett was hired as the new Librarian effective January 1, 1985. Elizabeth Toomey has remained on as Assistant Librarian. We mourned the passing of Gladys Barker who served as Librarian for 40 years. Many generous donations were made in her memory and used to purchase children's books at the request of her family. We thank all of the many residents who give so freely of their resources throughout the year for the pleasure of others year round.

We look forward to a busy and productive year ahead and urge each of you to stop in for a visit and browse. We're open on Tuesdays from 1:30-7:30 P.M. and again on Fridays from 9:30-11:30 A.M. and 1:30-5:30 P.M. NEW CASTLE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Castle, in the County of Rockingham and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Recreation Building in the Great Island Common in said New Castle, on Tuesday, the fourteenth of May, 1985 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE I. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. The polls for the election of Town Officers and Ballot Articles will open at ten o'clock in the forenoon and shall not be closed before six o'clock in the afternoon.

ARTICLE II. To hear the reports of agents, officers committies, Boards and other heretofore chosen and to pass any vote in relation thereto.

ARTICLE III. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE IV. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur temporary loans in anticipation of taxes for the year 1985-1986 upon credit of the Town, and to issue its notes therefor in accordance with the Municipal Finance Act.

ARTICLE V. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept, and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or private source which becomes available during the fiscal year as provided by RSA 31: 95-b.

ARTICLE VI. To see if the Town will authorize the withdrawal of Five Thousand (5,000) dollars from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as a set-off against budgeted appropriations for the Police Department.

ARTICLE VII. RSA 80:42 Sale of Tax/Liens Deeded Properties. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the town by tax collector's deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.

ARTICLE VIII: To see if the town will vote to establish a capital reserve fund for construction or reconstruction of a community building and/or recreational facilities at the Great Island Common and to transfer \$50,000 from unencumbered surplus to be placed in this fund.

(Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE IX: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,000 for architect's fees to design a suitable community building at the Great Island Common.

(Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE X: To see if the town will vote to authorize the retention of 1984-85 surplus revenue in excess of \$40,000.00.

(Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE XI: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Trust Fund for the Bicentennial Park. This fund may be spent in whole or in part for the Bicentennial Park.

ARTICLE XII: Are you in favor of adopting Amendment 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Building Code?

Section 1. The current issue of the Boca Basic National Code be adopted by the Town.

(On the Ballot)

ARTICLE XIII: Are you in favor of adopting Amendment 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Building Code?

Deletion of any allowance of wood shingles as roof covering in the Boca Basic National Building Code - current edition.

(On the Ballot)

ARTICLE XIV: To transact such business as may legally come before this meeting.

ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICERS REPORT

In 1984, 133 dogs were licensed in the Town of New Castle. Twenty-four (24) fines, four (4) warnings and several verbal warnings were issued during this reporting period.

I continue to receive calls of dogs running at large and/or unleashed while on public ways, in the Common, and on the beaches. The Town Ordinance reads, "It shall be unlawful for the owner or keeper of a dog to permit a dog so owned to run at large without being controlled by a leash, except upon his property under the direct control of his owner or keeper." This means that if you are walking your dog it must be on a leash. Should you wish to report any complaints in the future, please direct all calls to the police department as this ensures an immediate response to the caller in the event that I am not available.

I wish to thank all the dog owners who have made my job a little more pleasant by observing our dog ordinance.

As a final reminder all dogs three (3) months or older must be registered on or before May 1. At time of registering you must provide to the town Clerk a valid rabies certificate.

We maintain and restore the Nature Trail markings. The pipe and concrete blocks that replaced the old wood signs have reduced vandalism and destruction.

NEW CASTLE FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The year of 1984 was another milestone for the New Castle Fire Department. Tone alert pages were purchased and passed out to fire department members. The firefighter now, does not have to be within hearing distance of the siren. With the pagers, we are getting more firefighters to the station, and apparatus to the scene faster. Twice last year during the weekdays, the firefighters responding to these fire calls in town were out of town. Without the pagers those calls would not have been answered.

Membership of the New Castle Fire Department is the single most important item which makes the wheels turn. Without it, the doors don't open and the wheel doesn't turn. It is said that being able to afford to buy Real Estate in New Castle is costly. Yet once you own real estate in town, it is inexpensive to live in New Castle because of it's low tax rate. This is because most of the Town's services are done by people who receive little or no pay. If the Fire Department is forced to start to pay for services rendered, only to maintain membership because of the lack of volunteers then look for the Fire Department budget to at least quadruple.

As in the past years, training is the hub of the wheel, without it the wheel falls apart. The most difficult part of training is trying to simulate actual fire conditions. In the past year, thanks to the Kittery Point Yacht Club and Dr. & Mrs. Tilney, we have had two buildings in which we could simulate actual fire conditions. One building we had live burns and the other we were able to use for smoke training.

Did you know that smoke detectors save lives. Did you know that New Hampshire State Law requires smoke detectors in all homes. Existing homes built prior to 1982 only need battery operated detectors. Homes built after 1982 need A. C. powered smoke detectors. Information on the state smoke detector law can be obtained from the Fire Department.

Fire wise, 1984, was a very quiet year for the Town of New Castle. The department responded to 13 calls with no fire loss or damage. the following is a breakdown of the 1984 fire calls.

REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Our first forest fire prevention law was enacted by our State Legislature 90 years ago. This early law set in place a cooperative forest fire prevention and suppression effort between city and town governments and State government. It simply stated that no open fire could be kindled, when the ground is free of snow, without the written permission of the town/city Forest Fire Warden. This law also stated that anyone kindling a fire without written permission shall be liable for the damage caused and subject to a \$1000 fine.

During the past 90 years, this law has worked so well that it has remained unchanged. All open fires when the ground is not covered with snow must be authorized by the local Forest Fire Warden. Persons kindling a fire without a permit when one is required are liable for damages caused, fire suppression costs and subject to a \$1000 fine.

This cooperative fire prevention law has contributed significantly to our nationally recognized annual forest fire loss record.

NEW CASTLE PUBLIC WORKS REPORT

The Public Works Commission is in charge of the water and sewer systems owned by the Town. These do not raise much excitement except when they cease to function. The last year was a year without much excitement as the systems functioned with a minimum of major problems. The efforts of Dan Barrett and the Board have contributed much to minimizing the costs and problems incurred with these utilities.

Water System: The town owns and operates approximately 4 miles of waterlines serving 280 metered users. Treated water is purchased from Portsmouth. Another 75 residences on the oceanside of our island, along Wentworth Road, are served directly by the City of Portsmouth off the main running to the Coast Guard Station.

Our on-going program of replacement of old lines and installation of remote meters continued. In 1984 we replaced the lines on Riverview Road and Laurel Lane. In 1985 we plan to replace the line on Elm Court. During 1984 we added 30 remote meters. Fire hydrant maintenance and line flushing is performed by the Fire Department under the contract from the Public Works.

We changed our accounting system, at the request of our auditor, to reflect depreciation of the system in our operating statement. As 44% of our income is for the purchase of water, and most of the balance is used for operating and maintaining the system, as well as billing and clerical functions, this leaves little operating surplus to apply toward depreciation of the system and funding for future replacement. Based on this we again determined it necessary to have a modest rate increase for 1985.

Sewer System: The Town owns and operates approximately 4 miles of sewer lines and 3 pumping stations serving 170 users, including the Coast Guard and The Wentworth Hotel facilities. Sewerage is pumped to the Portsmouth treatment plant. The residents along Wentworth Road area plus other isolated locations, distant from the sewer mains, use individual treatment - primarily septic systems.

The system, built in 1975, requires extensive maintenance of the pumping stations as well as daily monitoring. The collection line themselves require a minimum of maintenance. A major cost is for the overhead of the treatment plant. As depreciation now is factored into the total costs of our system, we will be showing a loss. Consideration is being given to adjusting our rates to minimize this loss and establish reserves for replacement, especially of the more rapidly wearing lift stations.

With the volunteer help, the support of the Town Board, the services provided by the Fire Department, plus the cooperation of the water and sewer users in minimizing the demands on the Department, as well as the efficient and thorough job Dan Barrett has been performing, have all aided us in providing these utilities at minimum cost on a reliable basis.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS REPORT Cont.

With an average water or sewer bill at less than \$100 per year, when compared with other living costs, such as telephone, electricity, heating, auto taxes, etc., water and sewers are a good value especially in recognition of their contribution to our quality of life here in New Castle.

Charles Clark will be leaving the Board this year and we extend our thanks and appreciation for his efforts over the last 4 years. Just in the last year, among other projects, he arranged and supervised the installation of our hydrant permanent markers as well as his major involvement in the Riverview Road project. This opens up a slot for another member of the Board, so if you are or would like to be into water and sewers, and be involved with some fun people doing some this and that's, come-on-down and let us know.

TOWN OF NEW CASTLE WATER DEPARTMENT

Subject: Water Contamination

1. It has been brought to our attention by the N.H. Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission that there have been many instances throughout the country where dirty water has been "backflowed" into public water supply and caused serious illness and in some cases death. This condition could exist wherever there is a cross connection between a potable water supply and an unapproved substance.

2. A cross connection is defined as "any actual or potential physical connection or arrangement between two otherwise separate systems, one of which contains potable water and the other which contains water of unknown or questionable safety and/or stream, chemical, gases or other contaminants whereby there may be a flow of an unapproved water to a water supply."

3. The Town of New Castle, and the Water Department in particular is fortunate in that there is no appreciable amount of industry in Town and that the City of Portsmouth is responsible for all of the Wentworth Road area served by them including the Wentworth Hotel complex and the U.S. Coast Guard Station.

4. While individual homes are not considered cross-connection hazards per se, unless per chance they have an auxiliary well, dark room, swimming pool, or dock facilities connected to the Public Water system. In these cases the home owner will be informed that they must disconnect the questionable item from the water system until they install a safety device that will prevent backflow. It is also conceivable that a backflow condition could exist at a home when a hose is left immersed in or connected to a harmful substance. (i.e. bucket of dirty water or a pesticide applicator).

5. It shall be the policy of the Town Water Department to require new water installations to have installed a double check valve assembly near the water meter as an added protection from backflow within the home.

MOSQUITO CONTROL BOARD

1984 was the 7th year of mosquito control in New Castle under the supervision and licensing by the State of New Hampshire. The state has stressed the safe use of insecticides.

Because of the flying habits of mosquitos the adjoining communities must cooperate for effective local and area control. The state assists by holding annual meetings of community representatives to assist in this program. I am particularly interested in the detailed work of Rye and Portsmouth.

New Castle mosquito control is limited to larviciding where control is exercised before the insect flies. No air spraying is done.

Surveys and spraying began on 15 May 1984 and ended on 20 September 1984. Forty-one surveys were made, larviciding was done on 18 occasions.

We larvicide in the areas of Lavenger Creek, Pit Lane, River Road, and Wild Rose Lane.

Abate 4E is the chemical used. Less than one ounce of this insecticide was used. Our spray equipment is a two gallon garden variety, hand operated unit.

We added adult monitoring to our control procedure this year. the mosquito trap was placed in the Wild Rose Lane area. This monitoring was performed for us by the Rye Control Board. It tells us what species of mosquito is flying in our area. Our larva control indentifies the mosquito that is breeding in our waters.

Thomas Smith is a licensed operator.

Our budget for the year was \$1200.00. The bulk of the cost was for surveying and larviciding. The insecticide cost \$5.00; the monitoring cost was \$175.00.
