

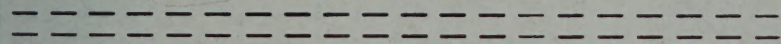
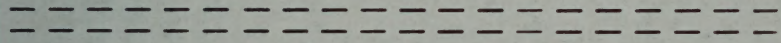

## TOWN WARRANT

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### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. s.]

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newbury, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Newbury on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, for current expenses.
4. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid, known as T.R.A. on class V. Roads. If so, vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$529.46, the State to contribute the sum of \$2,117.83.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum equal to not more than one one-hundredth of one percent (1/100 of 1%) of the assessed valuation, based upon the 1940 assessment, for the purpose of advertising the attractions and resources of the Town, in connection with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00, (Four Hundred Dollars) for publicity purposes.

7. To see if the Town will vote to purchase (2) two new Portable Pumpers and raise and appropriate money for the same.

8. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a new chassis for the Fire Truck and raise and appropriate money for the same.

9. To see if the Town will vote to purchase an Inhalator and raise and appropriate money for the same.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500. (\$1500.00) to be used to widen and re-surface the Cresséy Road from Harold Croft's to junction of Bowles Road.

11. To see what action the Town wants to take in regards to zoning, appoint committee, to draw up regulations, and raise and appropriate a sum of money to cover expense of printing.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 (Four Hundred Dollars) for the control of Pine Tree Blister Rust, the State to contribute the usual amount.

13. To see what action the Town wants to take in regard to the report of the Winter Sport Committee and raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same.

14. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the old entrances to the so called Province Road, at Mt. Sunapee.

15. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue, subject to gates and bars, the so called Cross Road.



16. To see what action the Town desires in regard to discontinuing, subject to gates and bars, the so called Morse Road.

17. To see if the Town will vote to accept the gift of Lake Ave. to Indian Road and Indian Road to the bounds of Kelsey Cottage.

18. To see what action the Town wants to take in regard to discontinuing the use of water tubs.

19. To see what action the Town wants to take in regard to accepting the gift of 1 Badger 50 gallon Fire Extinguisher on wheel frame, from the Cottage Owners' Association of Blodgett's Landing.

## FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

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*To the Citizens of Newbury:*

Our forest lands represent a substantial proportion of the town's valuation. They provide income to our citizens, from the sale of forest products and through employment to woods' workers. The protection of our forest lands is essential to the continued welfare of the town. Fire is the forests' worst enemy. It not only destroys the growing crop but leaves the land in such condition that nothing of value will grow for a long period of years. In addition it costs good tax money to extinguish forest fires.

An analysis of forest fire records indicate that 97 per cent are man-caused and consequently avoidable. Carelessness and failure to comply with reasonable regulations governing the building of fires in and near woodlands has been costly to both towns and individuals. Through elimination of the human equation, forest fire losses would be reduced to a minimum. This is possible if every citizen would be careful, familiarize himself with burning regulations, comply with them and then use proper discretion.

We have been particularly fortunate in this town since the hurricane in not having had more serious fires. This is due in part to the strictness of our wardens in issuing permits and splendid cooperation on the part of the public. Great care is needed because conditions in our blown-down areas are more critical with down material drying out and becoming more highly inflammable. *The continued cooperation* of every one is necessary.

*We should all remember that:*

1. *Written permission of forest fire warden to burn brush, rubbish or other debris in or near woodlands or where*

fire may be communicated to woodlands *is necessary when the ground is not covered with snow*. Violation of this requirement makes the responsible party liable.

- a. To a fine not to exceed five hundred dollars or imprisonment of not more than one year or both.
  - b. To the town for expenses incurred by the warden or deputy warden in attending or extinguishing such fire.
  - c. For damages to abutting owners if the fire runs onto the abutters' property.
2. It is a violation of the Forest Laws of the state to—
- a. Drop or throw any lighted match, cigar, cigarette, live ashes or any other substance liable to cause a fire, from any vehicle while the same is upon a public highway or private way.
  - b. Drop, throw or otherwise deposit on or near woodlands any lighted match, cigar, cigarette, live ashes or any other substance liable to cause a fire.

Violation of these prohibitions penalizes whoever is found guilty by a fine of \$25.00.

3. You should promptly notify your local forest fire warden of any fires you see.
4. The forest laws are being more strictly enforced each year.

Your cooperation will save the warden considerable worry; you and your town much trouble and expense.

The number of days schooling lost in the district remains the same as last year. The percent of attendance is lowered, but we hope that this year there may be an improvement. There is a considerable decrease in the amount of tardiness, but the average per pupil still remains more than 1.5. Parents and teachers should make every effort to reduce this figure this year; much tardiness is a clear indication of the lack of interest of parents in the progress of their children, the inefficiency of a teacher, or a combination of both.

The number of different pupils registered in the district was 85. Thirty high school pupils and three elementary pupils attended schools outside the district. This accounts for 118 pupils residing in the district and attending public schools—an increase of 17 over last year.

The plan of dividing the lower and upper grades between

the Center and South schools started in September 1939, continues this year with the expected improvements in pupil progress and advancement. The pupils of the Baker Hill school should also share the benefits of this division. On account of the smaller number of pupils at this school it would be to the advantage of the district to drop the expense of running it as a separate school, and transport the pupils to the other schools where they could receive the advantages derived from a division of lower and upper grades.

During the summer of 1940, flush toilets were installed at the Center School; thus eliminating the old chemical toilets which had passed their usefulness. The chemical toilets in the other schools should be replaced by similar toilets or septic toilets.

The real need of the district is a three-room central building housing all the pupils of the district, giving them equal facilities and opportunities.

The success of the work of the school year is due to the cooperation of all those who had a part in it, and we credit this to all for whom credit is due.
