## TOWN WARRANT

## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pembroke, in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pembroke on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars for State Aid Maintenance of highways, as required by the State Highway Department.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-six hundred dollars for Trunk Line Maintenance of highways, as required by the State Highway Department
5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate



the sum of seventy-five dollars for the observance of Memorial Day.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars for the purpose of securing the services of the Suncook Union Cornet Band for a series of free band concerts.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the control of the White Pine Blister Rust in town.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to oil streets in Suncook village.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction of concrete or cement sidewalks, wherever the abutters will pay one-half the expense.

10. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the running expenses of Pembroke Library.

11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars to help in the care and upkeep of Pembroke Park for the ensuing year.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, to be set aside for the purpose of erecting a new building for town purposes.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a tractor snow plow.

14. To see if the town will vote to install three electric street lights on the Suncook Valley Trunk Line Highway

in extension of the Glass street lights; provided the selectmen can make satisfactory arrangements with the Public Service Company therefor.

15. To see if the town will accept the sum of three hundred dollars left by Frank L. Aldrich to be used for the upkeep of the Levi L. Aldrich lot in Evergreen Cemetery. The interest to be paid yearly to the Agent of Evergreen Cemetery.

16. To see if the town will vote to accept one hundred dollars, in trust, from John T. Merrill, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the Daniel T. Merrill lot in the Evergreen Cemetery.

17. To see if the town will vote to confirm the action of its Trustees of Trust Funds in accepting the following named funds, in trust, the income to be used for the perpetual care of designated burial lots:

(1) Bequest of one hundred dollars from Mattie A. W. Morgan for George P. Morgan lot in the Pembroke Street Cemetery.

(2) Gift of fifty dollars from Harris M. Dolbeare for Bailey Parker lot in the old North Pembroke Cemetery.

(3) Gift of one hundred dollars from Flora J. Parker and Luida S. Varney for James Stevens lot in the Buck Street Cemetery.

18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate two thousand dollars to continue the sewer from Drake's Garage up Pembroke street.

19. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

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For the Year Ending June 30, 1928

The school work has been carried on as usual with very little interruption from our regular programme. Sickness among the scholars during the winter term, made it necessary to close the Brickett School for about ten days. The other schools have maintained their regular schedule and we call your attention to the several reports following, financial, treasurer's, estimates for the coming year, and the very able and comprehensive report of Superintendent Roberts.

The school buildings are nearly all in excellent condition, except the one at the Borough, which should be shingled and painted. Only minor repairs will be needed at the others.

The Borough school has remained closed and the few scholars in the district are carried to North Pembroke. This arrangement has worked very satisfactory. Some of the rural schools are struggling along with only a handful of scholars, and it is our judgment, that unless there is a change in conditions, some of these schools should be closed and the scholars carried to some other building, where they may obtain better advantages, and the cost per scholar be materially reduced. There is, of course, some objection to this arrangement, but it is being done in other districts with good results and the advantages of such a plan will deserve careful consideration.

The school nurse has been active and looked after the physical condition of the pupils, in the time which has been allotted to this part of the supervisory union.

Music and manual training have each been conducted as usual and we feel sure that good results are being obtained, so far as we are able to go in these departments. The

graduating exercises of the town schools were held in the Community Building. It has also been used several evenings each week by the Athletic Association of the academy, and by the pupils of the public schools. It is constantly showing its worth to our citizens in the improvement of health and physical welfare of the young people.

The expense of maintenance is small, compared with the benefits received.

We appreciate the hearty co-operation given us by the superintendent, teachers and parents, which has helped make our work pleasant, and we trust, profitable to the district.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

*To the School Board and Citizens:*

I herewith submit my sixteenth annual report of the schools of Pembroke for the year ending June 30, 1928. There were maintained during the year ten schools for a school year of 36 weeks with no change in the teaching force.

The school enrollment was 220, (116 boys and 104 girls), with a daily average attendance of 95.43 per cent. Forty-four more pupils were enrolled than in the last school year.

The schools were in session on an average of 347.20 half days.

The school attendance was good. Most of the absences were caused by sickness.

The cases of truancy were confined to a few families who gave as a reason their inability to provide proper clothing.

The school laws of New Hampshire, Chapter 117.

"The school board of every district shall provide standard elementary schools for at least thirty-six weeks in each year at such places in the district as will best serve the interests of education and give to all the pupils within the district as nearly equal advantages as are practicable."

The school authorities have endeavored to so arrange the school calendar that this law may be carried out, and are constantly studying methods of improving the work done in our schools and ways and means of eliminating waste in the expenditure of effort and money.

Some rural schools are becoming so small that the cost per pupil is more than double the cost per pupil in the village schools and the educational advantages not as good.

The school board now, as in times past, hesitates to close a small school and transport the pupils as long as there is a

reasonable prospect of an increase in the number of pupils large enough to warrant keeping the school open.

The rural school, with the great decrease in rural population, presents a serious problem. This decrease is taking place not only in New Hampshire but in every state in the union.

Frank O. Lowden, former governor of Illinois, speaking before the National Educational Association at Washington on Rural Education said:

"The trek cityward is already under way. If it shall go on as rapidly as it has in the last five years, the next generation will witness a farm population largely composed of the physically and mentally unfit."

"Educators have not been blind to this distressing contrast. In some sections of the country consolidated country schools have been established. These schools have marked a vast improvement in the life of the community, for farmers are as eager to give their children a good education as are those who live in the cities and the towns."

In some localities there is no boarding place for the teacher located near the schoolhouse having the conveniences of a modern home. Teachers hesitate to accept a school unless they can have a good boarding place with a well-heated and lighted room in which they may do their work undisturbed.

#### HEALTH

The school nurse, Miss Douillette, has done faithful and efficient work.

The health of the child, in a large measure, determines his regularity of attendance, his behavior and his ability to do his work.

Efficient supervision and instruction in matters of health should have an important place in the school organization.

## SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

The teachers were faithful and worked earnestly for the best interest of the pupils.

The noon and recess periods offer to both teacher and pupils an opportunity for pleasure and profit. Athletic games—baseball, volleyball, basketball and other games may be promoted, and on stormy days educational games—arithmetic, geography, history, spelling, and cross-word puzzles may be enjoyed.

The success of these supervised school periods depends upon the initiative and the skill of the teacher.

The standardized tests given during the year in all the fundamentals showed an improvement in the work done in these branches during the year.

The boys were interested and did excellent work in manual training under the instruction of John Hobson, whose detailed report follows:

Parents and citizens are invited to visit the schools frequently.

In conclusion I express my appreciation for the co-operation and assistance given to me by the teachers, the school board and the citizens.

The schedule—Bread board, swing board, mixing board, tool box, and shoe shine box. Rough drawings were made of each project, showing the correct dimensions and how constructed.

Many practical articles were made by boys in the eighth grade. Some of these were, library table, study table, large cabinet, medicine cabinet, stationery rack, flower stand, foot stool, large tool boxes, and tooth brush holders. Some very good sketches of these projects were made by the pupils.

A few odd jobs around the building were done by the boys.

To you, Miss Irving, Mr. Ludlow, and all others who helped to make my task so enjoyable, I express my sincere thanks.
