Howard W. Sanborn, a lifelong resident of Sanbornton, died at the age of 69. He was the fourth generation of his family to live on the Sanborn homestead, one of the original land grants in the town.

He attended Tilton Seminary and was graduated from the University of N. H. in 1914. He was a member of Alpha Tau Omega fraternity and taught at Colby academy, New London, from 1914 to 1916.

Mr. Sanborn was a Farm Bureau insurance agent and during World War II he was an assistant in the soil conservation program of the Dept. of Agriculture. For two years he was president of the Belknap County Farm Bureau.

He served as selectman of Sanbornton for 17 years and held other town offices. In 1927-1929 he was Sanbornton's representative to the State Legislature. He was a former member of the Sanbornton band and a 50-year member of Harmony Grange of Sanbornton and was a past master of the Grange. A member of the Sanbornton Square Congregational Church, he served as deacon for many years.

Selectmen's Summary and Recommendations

Roads:

On June 8, 1957 the Board of Selectmen accepted and laid out the remaining four tenths of a mile of Black Brook Road to the Meredith line. The road has been widened and gravelled by the town.

A survey has been completed on the Dr. True Road to the Lake Winnisquam shore line and stone markers were placed indicating the town lines. The right of way to the lake is being used by the townspeople.

In accordance with article 37 in last year's warrant, 2/10 of a mile of the Cram Road has been surfaced.

Town-Owned Land:

In the fall of 1956 the selectmen looked over the Erickson lot bordering on the Town of New Hampton. Last year we had the State Forester appraise the timber on this lot. After reviewing the State forester's report with our own findings the selectmen have decided to sell the timber on this lot in April to the highest bidder but reserve the right to reject all bids.

In checking over the description of the Burleigh lot we found that this lot has actually sixty-one acres owned by the town. This lot will be sold when the deed is in order.

Town Hall:

Within a year or two the Town Hall furnace will need a grate or be replaced by a new furnace.

Town Dump:

The Town Dump was kept open from May through October and once in November and December, under the able direction of Mr. Currin, the custodian. The Board is still trying to locate another more centrally located site for a dump.

Inventory Blanks:

There were 619 Inventory blanks mailed and only 380 returned. Again we ask you to fill out the blanks and return them. This year the selectmen are enclosing copies of the Town Warrant with all the inventories mailed to the non-residents.

Public Relations:

The Selectmen have been meeting once a month with officials of the neighboring towns of Belmont, Meredith, Gilford and the city of Laconia to discuss mutual problems relative to Area development.

We deeply appreciate the wholehearted cooperation and assistance given us by all the town officers in expediting their share of the town's business

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(Tentative)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sanbornton in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sanbornton on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March, next at Ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing, and as voted at the 1957 Town Meeting to act upon the following subjects at 7:00 P. M. March 11, 1958:
- 1. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to employ the Municipal Accounting Division of the New Hampshire State Tax Commission to audit the accounts of the Town until rescinded. (The cost provided for in Town Officers' expenses).
- 3. To see what action the Town will take upon the Budget as recommended by the Budget Committee.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire such sums and amounts of money as may be necessary to defray town charges in anticipation of Taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate at public auction acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand five hundred dollars (\$15,500.00) for the Maintenance of Highways and Bridges; six thousand five hundred dollars (\$6,500.00) for Summer Maintenance and nine thousand dollars (\$9,000.00) for Winter Maintenance.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred seventy-five dollars (\$175.00) for general highway expenses.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand one hundred seventy-four dollars and eight-eight cents (\$4,174.88) for the purpose of oiling black top roads.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept, raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand one hundred twenty-three dollars and twenty-three cents (\$1,123.23) for Town Rural Aid (T. R. A.). The State share (7,488.17).
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to put the sum of six thousand four hundred forty-two dollars and sixty-six cents (\$6,442.66) the amount of surplus accumulated in the Yield Tax Reserve Fund in a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of buying a road grader.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for the Sanboruton Fire Department.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a fire truck at the cost of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000.00) to be paid for over a five year period; and raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred ninety-six dollars and twenty-five cents (\$796.25) the initial payment and interest on the note due in 1958.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eight hundred dollars (\$800.00) for the purshase of a 2½ inch hose for the Sanbornton Fire Department.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred dollars (\$700.00) for the Winnisquam Fire Department for the purpose of maintenance and operation of the Department. (By request)
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-five (\$35.00) dollars for Memorial Day.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) to finish the repair of the cemetery located on Tower Hill. (By request of the Sanbornton Historical Society).
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty (\$50.00) for Old Home Day.

- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00) for band concerts. (by request.)
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600.00) and make the same available for the use of the Library Trustees.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for the Laconia Hospital.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for the Franklin Hospital.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred seventy-two dollars and thirty-seven cents (\$172.37) which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the Town for the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicising and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other Towns in the Lakes, Region.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for necessary expenses of the Planning Board.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred sixty-one dollars and seventy-one cents (\$361.71) for culverts.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for Civilian Defense.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) provided the State contributes two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) toward the reconstruction of the Winnisquam-Steele Hill road.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Moderator to appoint two owners of Winnisquam Lake shore property to work with the Planning Board and the Selectmen on a long range plan to improve the roads in the Winnisquam Shore Area, the plan to be presented at the next Town Meeting.

- 28. To see if the Town will vote to have the Town business meeting held annually at seven (7) P. M. until rescinded.
- 29. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Net Decrease

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Sanbornton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1957, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Library and Fire Departments.

Financial Statements

Comparative Balance Sheets-December 31, 1956-December 31, 1957:

(Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1956 and December 31, 1957, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the surplus decreased by \$6,563.96 in 1957.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town durng the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures-

Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1957, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$1,219.40, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$356.29, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$863.11.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1957, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's Balance as of December 31, 1957, is indicated in Exhibit B-2

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes were made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collctor's records.

General Comments

Tax Liens:

It is noted that as of December 31, 1957, there were unredeemed taxes from the tax sales on account of the levies of 1956 and previous years amounting to \$6,106.88, as follows:

It is also noted that unredeemed taxes were abated during the year as follows:

Levy of 1952 \$635.60 Levy of 1949 \$111.25

It is further noted that a redemption had been made from a tax sale after abatement had been made.

Inasmuch as the two-year period, during which the law provides that redemptions may be made, has expired on all unredeemed taxes on account of the levies of 1954 and prior years, the Tax Collector should make deeds to the Town for all properties represented by these unredeemed tax liens.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184, of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmitta!) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Sanbornton for their assistance during the course of the audit.

Born April 28, 1899 — Died Dec. 6, 1955

Ernest (Ernie) F. Woodman was born and died in Sanbornton, the town which he had always lived.

When he was 18 years old he left Sanbornton to go into the army in World War I, and upon his discharge he settled in Malden, Mass., where he met and married Bessie I. Lane. They had one daughter, Pauline.

In 1937 Ernest and his family returned to Sanbornton to make their home. He purchased a house at four corners in Sanbornton Bay, where he built a small colony of cottages.

He was an electrician by trade, but being a man who loved people, he joined many organizations among them the Bay and Pomona Granges, the Masonic Lodge and the American Legion, charter member.

In the years before his death his strongest interest outside of his home and family, which always came first with Ernest, was the Winnisquam Fire Department of which he was chief.

For the period beginning January 1, 1957, and ending December 31, 1957, the cost of maintaining the Winnisquam Fire Department was \$2,530.93.

This was taken from appropriations of Belmont, Tilton and Sanbornton. From barbecues, Beano, raffles and suppers, etc, we had a net income of \$1,861.15 on our own efforts. This was used in building a kitchen, toilets, and drying tower, all of which were necessary additions.

REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

Forest Fire Prevention is Everybody's Business

New Hampshire faces a continuing challenge in its forest fire problem — 97 per cent of all our forest fires being man-caused and preventable — a serious indictment of interest in our own welfare and that of our neighbor. Both the State and the towns are striving diligently to effectively meet the challenge through education of the public to the threat fire presents to our woodlands; by maintaining a well trained corps of wardens and deputy wardens in every community and by providing ample opportunity for all who wish to dispose of unwanted waste materials. Careless and perverseness, however, continue to be the big hurdles.

Thoughtlessly discarded lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles, by hikers, hunters and fishermen; careless burning of debris during hazardous periods in dangerous locations; illegal burning; improperly extinguished debris, camp and cook fires — all result in serious loss of property disruption of industry and farm work and unnecessary expenditure of town and state funds.

To meet the challenge successfully, the state, your community and your local forest fire warden need YOUR thoughtful and cooperative effort — The rules are simple.

- 1. Don't burn at home use your town dump and avoid all fire problems.
- 2. If you do burn, be sure to secure a written permit from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow. Permits are required for open debris fires, home incinerators, outdoor fire places and camp fires. Your warden is instructed to permit burning if weather conditions, site and type of burning are safe.
- 3. Be sure that all lighted material cigars, cigarettes and matches are completely out before discarding them. Use ash trays in automobiles.
- 4. Make certain that your debris, camp and cook fires are completely out before leaving them.

- 5. Insist that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
- 6. Call the warden promptly when fire is detected and aid him to extinguish it.
- REMEMBER—the fire you prevent might be the one which could burn YOUR property.
- REMEMBER—Forest Fire Prevention is Everybody's Business and our Most Important Undertaking.

For the Year Ending December 31, 1957

5645 books have been circulated during 1957. Of these 5070 were loaned to children. 121 new books have been added, of which 25 were gifts.

Mr. Gardner Soule, Extension Librarian from Concord was at the Library a part of two days continuing his work of classifying the books.

Along with rising costs in general, the price of books has almost doubled in the last five years. This necessitates our investing more of our funds in reading matter if we are to keep with the increasing child population.

We cannot over estimate the value of a good library to the children of our town. They are learning at an early age to appreciate library facilities, not only for entertaining and educational reading, but for research purposes connected with their school assignments. Because of our interest in giving these youngsters a good reading foundation, and since they are the ones who visit the Library most often, we have invested the greater part of our available funds in children's books. Those who contribute books for their use are performing a real service for our future citizens.

We extend an invitation to our older citizens to visit our Library and observe the fine selection of good books at their disposal. Our Librarian is always at your service. And we are especially grateful to all who have made contributions to the Library during the past year.

The installation of an inlaid linoleum floor covering has contributed greatly to the appearance and comfort of the room.

SANBORNTON PLANNING BOARD

The citizens of the Town voted at their annual meeting to authorize and employ the Planning Board to approve or disapprove, in its discretion, plats, showing new streets or the widening thereof, or parks.

During the year we have lost two members of the Board, Henry W. Erickson by resignation and Elwyn V. Chesley by death. Ellwood V. Bennett was appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Henry W. Erickson.

The Planning Board secured from the State Planning and Development Commission small copies of our base map of the Town with scale of 3,000 feet per inch which have been much in demand by citizens of the Town.

At the request of the Planning Board of a neighboring town comparable in many respects with Sanbornton, a meeting was held with our Board. They wished assistance in their work for the general welfare of their community. We hope we may have been of some help to this group.

We held five meetings during the year. We have secured from the State copies of our base map with the topo map inserted. Although we have given the regulations for the Land Subdivision as authorized by the Town, much study, we have not yet adopted them.

The Planning Board is interested in any project which will promote the general welfare of Sanbornton, such as permanent improvement of roads, location of desirable building sites and in general the broadening of our tax base.

Annual Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of the Sanbornton School
Districts

I herewith submit my fourth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools:

Personnel

There were no personnel changes during the current school year.

New Building

At this writing, the foundation is in for the three room addition to the Sanbornton Central School. Some of the cement block and brick work on the walls have been completed. It is expected that this building will be ready before the close of the school year. It will be a welcome addition to the building and will enable us to move out of the cafeteria and hall. An additional staff member is being planned for next year.

The School Board is considering the possibility of allowing the present seventh grade to continue their elementary education in Tilton next year. If this plan is adopted, the assignment of grades will be approximately as follows:

This results in a relatively small seventh grade, but there does not seem to be any other way to divide the rooms on a sound educational basis.

Teachers Salaries

Beginning teachers from Keene and Plymouth Teachers College are requesting \$3,500. This is \$300 more than the average beginning salary last year. In order to keep experienced teachers in our system, we must continue to give sizable increases.

Helping Teacher

The School Warrant this year includes an item on the appointment of a helping teacher for the four towns in the Supervisory Union #18. This position is being recommended in order to give special attention to supervision of instruction and the improvement of elementary courses of study. The need for such a position has grown in recent years because the typical Superintendent of Schools has to devote nearly all of his time to school buildings, school building maintenance, preparation of budgets, school board meetings, employment of teachers, supervision of school lunch programs, supervision of transportation, supervision of nurses, etc. The addition of this position would create a stable plan for the supervision of teachers and the general improvement of instruction.

The salary of a helping teacher would be approximately \$5,000 for an eleven month year. In addition, a travel allowance of approximately \$500 would be required. The State requires that all helping teachers have a Master's degree. The reimbursement of \$2,500 from the State Board of Education means that the net cost to four towns in the Union would be approximately \$2,500. If we are able to hire a person at the above salary figure, the costs to each school district would be as follows:

Report of the Principal

The Central School is a popular meeting place for many activities. Each week at least one or two groups meet and enjoy the facilities of the school. We do have some splended equipment that adds much to the enjoyment of all.

The average enrollment has been 136 for the first six grades. It is still necessary to utilize the corridor, teachers' room and stage as classrooms, even though grades seven and eight are attending school in Tilton.

A most successful operetta, "The Season of Happiness," was presented two evenings during the month of May. This money has been used for snow coasters and entertainments on special holidays. These are occassions that every child looks forward to.

The school exhibit at Plymouth Fair was again a success, and received many favorable comments from the judges.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the members of the School Board, Superintendent, School Nurse, parents, and fellowworkers for their continued support and splended cooperation throughout the year. Because of your help and understanding it has been a most pleasant year in which it has been possible to attain the high standards which every community strives to attain.

Report of the School Nurse

Good health in children involves the inter-related aspects of physical and emotional well being, each of which has its own important components. Contributing to good physical health are such important factors as: a) proper foods including milk, butter, eggs, proteins, fruits and vegetables, cereals and breads; b) play and exercise properly supervised to avoid excessive fatigue; c) personal practices of hygiene which are designed to inculcate an abiding habit of cleanliness; d) adequate amount of sleep according to age level; and, e) regular medical and dental checkups to insure proper growth and development. The factors contributing to good emotional health in children include among other things the satisfaction of such basic needs as love, security, protection, independence coupled with proper adult control so that the child may acquire the moral and social standards which are to govern his personal and social life. All school health programs endeavor to keep the above in mind as they cooperate with the home in carrying out their specific health activities during the school year. The following is a digest of the major activities of the health program in the Sanbornton School during the past year.

A Tuberculosis Skin Test Clinic was held on March 22, 1957 with thirty-eight children, teachers and lunch workers attending. All who had a positive reaction to the test were x-rayed. The importance of such a diagnostic tuberculosis program is self-evident. Not only does it protect the public health by preventing the spread of infection thru discovery of incipient cases, but at the same time it fosters the knowledge that control of the disease is possible.

No disease in modern times causes as much fear and anxiety, particularly among parents, as does poliomyelitis. Fortunately, the rate of paralytic poliomyelitis has decreased markedly among those immunized with the Salk vaccine. During April and June a Poliomyelitis Clinic in cooperation with the New Hampshire Board of Health was held at which 101 children were immunized.

Our health program is constantly aware of the relationship between proper diet and the development of strong muscles, good bone structure and other essentials of physical fitness. I believe that the children are receiving all the necessary food elements in the hot lunch that is served at the Central School

The Hearing tests administered thru the health program of the school can play an important part in preventing both emotional and educational problems by detecting the hard-of-hearing child at an early age and instituting proper care so that he may live a happy, normal life. This year the Audiometer test was given to 150 pupils.

Since modern teaching procedures as well as so many of our living and learning activities depend on good eyesight, adequate provision for visual health particularly as it relates to the detection of eye defects is of great concern to all. In view of this, the Massachusetts Vision Test was administered to 160 pupils.

A Pre-registration Clinic was held on May 13, 1957 with 21 children registering.

During the school year the children were weighed and measured twice.

Again this year we are grateful to the Sanbornton Parent-Teacher Association for the necessary funds with which to conduct our Dental Clinic. In the more progressive states the dental hygienist has become a very potent force in educational dental hygiene. Our dental hygienist this year was Mrs. Reed who cleaned and examined the teeth of eighty-seven children. It has been my observation during the past year that a number of the children have received the dental care from their own dentist. This is but one of the many instances of good home and school cooperation in our health program.

The total number of school visits made by the nurse during the past year was ninety-five.

It is my pleasure at this time to extend my personal gratitude to all persons and the Sanbornton Parent-Teacher Association who have in any way contributed to the Sanbornton School Health Program.

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Sanbornton School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1957, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

Financial Statements

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1956 and June 30, 1957 are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$9,858.46 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1957.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expendi-

tures - Estimated and Actual Revenues:

(Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1957 are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$1,859.74, plus a revenue surplus of \$198.72, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$2,058.46.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1957, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance, as of June 30, 1957, is indicated in Exhibit F.

Statement of Bonded Debt: (Exhibit H)

A statement of the bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1957, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit H.

Statement of School Tax Account: (Exhibit I)

A statement of the School Tax account with the Town of Sanbornton for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1957, is presented in Exhibit I. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1957, a balance of \$81.64 on account of the 1956-57 School Tax was due the School District from the Town. This amount is included as an Asset Account in the Balance Sheet.

It is noted that the current financial condition of the School District changed from a current deficit of \$3,736.81 to a current surplus of \$2,121.65 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1957, as shown herewith:

According to the posted notice the School District meeting was called to order on the 30th day of March, 1957 at 8:11 o'clock in the afternoon by Moderator Carl Hanson.

The warrant was read by the Moderator.

- 1. Robert H. Gray was elected Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. Elizabeth C. Cotsibas was elected Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. James B. Dodge was elected a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

The vote was taken by ballot using the check list. Total votes cast — 176. James B. Dodge — 89. William Powers — 86. One blank vote.

- 4. Catharine B. Currier was elected Treasurer for the ensuing year.
 - 5. It was voted to accept Article 5 as read.
 - 6. It was voted that Article 6 be tabled.
- 7. It was voted that the Division of Municipal Accounting be employed to audit the accounts of the School District.

At this time it was voted that a committee be appointed to work on a two or three room addition to the school, amended by addition that the Moderator appoint a committee of five if Article 9 is defeated.

8. It was voted that Article 8 be laid on the table until after Article 9 has been voted on.

9. It was moved and seconded that Article 9 be dismissed. The motion was defeated. It was moved that Article 9 be accepted as read. It was moved and seconded that the sum of sixty-two thousand five hundred dollars (\$62,500.00) be amended to fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00). The motion to amend was defeated.

The vote was taken by ballot using the check list. Total votes cast — 173. Yes — 76. No — 97.

- 8. It was voted that Article 8 be taken from the table. It was then voted that the sum of eighty-three thousand eight hundred ninety-six dollars (\$83,896.00) be appropriated for current expenses for the year 1957-1958.
 - 10. It was voted that Article 10 be accepted as read.
 - 11. It was voted to adjourn the meeting at 11:30 p.m.

SCHOOL WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Sanbornton qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Sanbornton Town Hall in said District on the eighth day of March 1958, at eight o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and to fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.
- 9. To see if the District will send the eighth grade to Tilton-Northfield High School during the school year 1958-59 and to see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$6,300 for the payment of transportation and tuition.

- 10. To see if the District will vote to appoint a committee of four members to work jointly with the School Board to investigate the possibility of establishing a cooperative school district with neighboring towns, said committee to prepare a report for the District not later than Nov. 15, 1958.
- 11. To see if the District will vote to approve the establishment of a position of a helping teacher in the Supervisory Union #18, beginning July 1, 1958, and to see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$263.50 for the Sanbornton share in Supervisory Union #18 for the salary of such teacher.
- 12. To see if the District will vote to have all school district candidates file their intentions with the School Clerk fourteen days prior to the next annual School District Meeting; said procedure to continue until otherwise voted by the District. Unless otherwise voted, this action shall not prevent nominations from the floor.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.
- 14 To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to introduce a bill in the 1959 session of the New Hampshire General Court for permission to increase the number of members of the School Board from 3 to 5.


