ARTICLE No. 49. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to help defray the expense of the Community Food Center at St. Andrews Church-in-the-Valley.

ARTICLE No. 50. "To see if the Town will grant authority to the Planning Board under RSA 674:43 to review and approve or



disapprove site plans for the development or change or expansion of use of tracts for nonresidential uses or for multi-family dwelling units (more than two units).” In the event that the Zoning Ordinance is defeated, this article is to be passed over.

ARTICLE No. 51. To see whether or not the Town will vote to accept Eutaw Place Road and the deed therefor from C. Properties, Inc., as a town road. This being a paved road running westerly from Route 16 approximately 600 feet to a cul-de-sac at the end.

ARTICLE No. 52. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Town’s representatives to the General Court to respond to our solid waste crisis by taking all necessary measures to insure that New Hampshire adopt legislation that will permit consumers to return for refund of deposit within New Hampshire all soda, beer, wine cooler and liquor containers and that all unclaimed deposit monies shall be collected by the state and no less than 80% shall be returned annually to local municipalities for the sole purpose of implementing, expanding and reimbursing community recycling projects.

ARTICLE No. 53. To authorize the Trustees of the Trust Funds to spend monies from their reserves to purchase land for cemetery purposes.

ARTICLE No. 54. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend funds from the State, Federal, or any other governmental unit, or any private source which might become available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95b.

ARTICLE No. 55. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any property acquired by Tax Collector’s deeds.

ARTICLE No. 56. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

ARTICLE No. 57. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

## FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Finance Committee had a very short season this year. We had only one meeting with four representatives of newly petitioned articles being requested to give information and answer questions on these new articles.

The following is a brief explanation of the Committee's voting on various articles:

### Article #5- Police Department:

We would like to request that this total amount be amended as per the original request of the Chief. Due to an increase in the population of Tamworth, an increase in the workload, and years of service by the Chief, we feel he deserves a raise; more than just a "cost-of-living" raise.

### Article #7 - Solid Waste Facility:

We felt more of this appropriation should be expended toward future rehabilitation of the solid waste facility. We would also like to see more research done on other alternatives within the next few years.

### Article #19 - Tamworth Fire Department:

We wish to amend the maintenance of department amount because we feel the parking/driveway area around the entire building did not need to be paved. We felt the paving should be limited to the area in front of the building and the bay area only.

### Article #21 - Tamworth Fire Department (Dump Fires):

We felt this amount should be included in the department's budget of fire prevention and inspection.

### Article #27 - Water Safety Program:

Even though this is now a Town controlled program, we would like more reassurance this will be for Tamworth children only, and, should children from other Town's partake of the program, that they will be charged accordingly.

### Article #28 - Mt. Washington Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross

The Committee felt the Town was not receiving sufficient services for the amount requested.

### Article #35 - Carroll County Mental Health Service;

### Article #36 - Center of Hope, Inc.; and,

### Article #38 - Children Unlimited, Inc.

We would like to have the above articles tabled indefinitely.

### Article #43 - Professional Audit of the Town:

We were led to believe this federal grant money would be kept

separate from all other Town finances. If an audit is required, the Tamworth Pre-School, Inc., should either pay the entire bill, or, make a donation of half the cost to defray expenses.

Article #46 ) Capital Reserve Fund

Re-evaluation of the Town:

We would like to have this re-evaluation held over and done when all the current new constructions are mostly completed and save having the re-evaluation done more than once within a twelve year period. It's not that we are against a capital reserve fund being established, just the re-evaluation being done at this point in time.

Article #48 - Household Hazardous Waste Collection:

The list of materials declared hazardous, are materials that are still useable; also, the individual would have to transport these hazardous materials themself to the specified pick-up-point.

The Fire Department held twelve regular drills, one special drill and a leadership class this year for a total of 490 hours of training. The firefighters have also donated 2500 hours for calls, meetings, and maintenance of the department.

The Town is fortunate to have these dedicated individuals who make many personal sacrifices to maintain an effective firefighting organization, the cost of which is saved many times over in the form of reduced insurance costs created as a result of reduced life and property loss.

If there is anyone interested in joining the Department, please contact one of us for an application and a copy of the by-laws.

I would like to point out to anyone opening a restaurant that an inspection and a Place of Assembly Permit is required before opening for business. Also, all Bed and Breakfasts, Inns, etc. must be inspected, have alarms systems, and other requirements before opening for business.

## REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1987 and June 1988, we experienced more fires than normal. The three leading causes of forest fires were again children, fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden and debris burning. All causes are preventable, but only with **your** help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden, Concord Forest Protection Headquarters at (603) 271-2217, or local Forest Ranger.

On January 1, 1989, the Deceptive Forestry Business Practices Law (RSA 224:54) goes into effect. This law, in summary, states that a person is guilty of a misdemeanor if, in the course of buying or selling a forest product, uses a false weight or measure for falsely determining any quality or quantity of a forest product. ## TAMWORTH PLANNING BOARD ANNUAL REPORT 1988

Once again the Planning Board witnessed a very busy year. The board reviewed and approved 16 new subdivisions totalling 71 building lots. Several other projects were reviewed and either withdrawn or are still pending at this time. Three apartment house projects were also presented to board, and if built would add another ten unit to the community.

Much work was done to update the town subdivision regulations. This includes a major revamping of the private road standards with the guidance of our consulting engineer H. Edmund Bergeron. Also in a combined effort with the Selectman a driveway permit system was enacted.

1988 found the Zoning committee hard at work on a draft proposal of zoning regulations for the town. As of this writing the proposed ordinance has received much review, including two public hearings with a third scheduled. The final draft of the proposed ordinance will be presented to the Tamworth voters by paper ballot on March 14, 1989, at the annual town meeting. It is the boards hope that we will have a large voter turnout to decide the outcome of this very important issue.

## **TAMWORTH CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT FOR 1988**

**DREDGE AND FILL** - The Commission has checked on fourteen dredge and fill operations, in nine of which applications were approved and so reported to the Wetlands Board. One operation, which has been ongoing for several years, is still not entirely resolved as to compliance with Wetlands Board orders. In another, a borderline case with insufficient evidence as to whether it was a wetland, it was decided no application was required. In this instance two field trips were held, one with a member of the Soil Conservation Service. Three are still ongoing. The Commission, in effect, acts as an agent for the State Wetlands board which in virtually all cases, so far, has agreed with Commission reports.

**FIELD TRIPS AND MEETINGS** - Commission members have gone on twenty field trips, chiefly in conjunction with dredge and fill, several to look at land which might be donated or easements given, one in conjunction with State Forest Service to consult on a planned timber cutting, one at the request of the Selectmen and one at the request of an individual wanting advice. Commission members have attended a Soil Conservation Service Workshop in Conway, Land Use Workshop in Tamworth and Annual Meeting and Workshops of N.H. Association of Conservation Commissions in Concord.

**TAMWORTH LAND PROTECTION COMMITTEE** - The Commission was instrumental in organizing this committee, which was appointed by the Selectmen. Five Commission members serve actively on it. Report of the T L P C will be seen elsewhere in this town report.

**HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE** - The Conservation Commission has been approached by Lakes Region Planning Commission for Town participation in a regional program for disposal of household hazardous wastes such as paint, machine oil, pesticides and other materials that cannot go on the Town Dump. An article has been submitted for the Town Warrant for an appropriation so Tamworth residents may take part in this. Commission members will attend a workshop in February, so will be able to give information about this when it comes up for vote at Town Meeting.

**GREAT HILL TOWER** - The State has granted the Commission permission to cut several trees to improve the view from the



tower. Broken glass and cans around the tower continue to be a problem. But, even more so, vandalism which occurred late this fall, with several clapboards ripped off the north side. Repairs will be completed in the spring.

**TRAILS** - Trails are maintained on preserves in the Big Pines, Black Spruce Pond, Jackman Pond and Remick Natural Areas. At present a log bridge is needed across the brook on the Jackman Pond North trail. It is planned to have this done this winter.

**EASEMENTS** - An easement has been accepted from Richard Alt on 22 acres on the west side of Bunker Hill Road, although not bordering the road, to restrict land use to forestry and agriculture. An easment has also been accepted from Robert Freeto on 8.6 acres with 2500 feet along Mill Brook, to set it aside for forestry and agriculture.

**TOWN ENVIRONMENTAL ORDINANCES** - The Commission has drawn up a list of environmental ordinances passed by the Town. The list may be requested from the Town Clerk and many have already been given out to people as they came to pay taxes. Texts of these ordinances are available for reading at the office of the Town Clerk and copies may be purchased.

**SCHOLARSHIP** - The Commission has again contributed a Scholarship for a Tamworth student to attend Conservation Camp. This year is was awarded to Jimmy Walker.

**MEMBERSHIP** - Chris Conrod has been appointed as an alternate to the Commission and Laralie Gerard and Dana Steele were re-appointed.

## TAMWORTH LAND PROTECTION COMMITTEE

This committee was appointed by the Selectmen in February 1988 to work on Tamworth's part in the Trust for N.H. Lands/Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP). This public/private initiative was funded with 7 million dollars by the State in 1986 in response to the tremendous growth New Hampshire is experiencing. It seeks to help towns and landowners protect important and threatened natural areas, especially wetlands, floodplains, agricultural land, wildlife habitat, scenic beauty, historic values, unique vegetation, forested watershed and recreational use. Public access is also a factor, though not appropriate in all cases.

Through the program, Tamworth may apply for up to \$250,000 to purchase land or, more likely, easements from landowners. An easement is a deed covenant for development rights only. The cost of the easement is based on the difference between the current use value and the development value of the land. The landowner keeps the land and the right to farm, lumber, etc., but agrees never to develop. Future owners are equally bound. The state holds and guarantees the easement in perpetuity.

The way the LCIP works is that the Town must match 50-50 any state funds requested; this may be done not only with cash (privately raised) but also with land or easements. Thus one landowner's easement could be purchased with another's donated easement. Also a landowner could add to the match by offering a bargain sale. On any project undertaken, an open hearing and the Selectmen's approval are required.

The committee began by doing a natural resource inventory of the town, in terms of the LCIP criteria, using existing maps at the Town Offices and some newer information. And we circulated a survey asking townspeople to identify land you especially would like to see protected from development. We had a booth at Family Day July 2, an informational meeting August 8, and put the surveys in stores and Libraries. The overlay map we made showed a concentration of natural resources in the lower Bearcamp River valley, the lower Swift River and Mill Brook valleys. Tamworth Village, Wonalancet, Intervale and the Ossipee Mountains also ranked high in resources and in survey responses. And we found we felt a particular concern to protect Tamworth's farmland. There isn't a great deal of it and it is already proving attractive to develop. We chose to focus first on Tamworth Village

and the Lower Bearcamp, sending a letter in October to Bearcamp landowners.

Since last February a number of landowners have contacted the committee, interested in selling or donating land or easements. We hope to apply this May for purchase of an easement on about 30 acres of the Behr family's farm fields in Tamworth Village. If we can put together matching donations, we will be able to ensure that this beautiful, productive open land in the heart of town will never be built on. In future grant cycles (assuming this session of the Legislature funds the program again) we hope to pursue other dreams: perhaps a Bearcamp River greenbelt, footpath/ski trail networks, more farmland protected? What would you like to see? These ideas may seem premature or suburban, but Tamworth is bound to grow, and with growth 'No Trespassing' signs can suddenly block a favorite walk, wildlife be pushed out or exterminated by overbuilding, or an old family farm have to be sold. We are lucky that considerable land in town is already protected - White Lake, Chocorua Lake, the Hemenway Forest among others. This program offers us an exciting chance to do even more for future generations in Tamworth.

Your opinions and participation are crucial. Please contact any of us. We would welcome new members to expand our committee and make it more representative. We hope to have a table at Voting Day, and hope to see you there.

**Meetings, Conferences and Workshops**

State inspection of Tamworth Community Nurse Association was conducted on January 21 with Mary Frost, R.N. from the Bureau of Health Facilities in Concord and again on August 9 by Thomas Marsh for the State of New Hampshire Health and Human Services in Concord. Licensure was obtained on both occasions without any major altercations.

This past year, 10 monthly staff meetings were held to discuss patient recorded reviews, patient care, statistical and office record keeping as well as office policies.

Throughout the year, the T.C.N.A. nurses have had conferences with medical doctors concerning patient's care; 21 such conferences occurring between July until December. Conferences were also held with agencies, hospital social workers, town officials, discharge planners and other professionals as well as family members, in preparation for support groups, care of family members at home, for placement of a patient in a necessary facility, or to assist a client in obtaining necessary assistance/support from other sources or agencies.

Carroll County Community Professionals have continued to meet every month at the Mountain View Nursing Home in Ossipee for "Network" meetings. These gatherings enable area health care related professionals to meet, exchange ideas and gather insights into pertinent issues. Discussions covered areas such as "affordable" housing, abuse, neglect and abandonment (of any age group), legal rights and issues of clients, aids, statewide



health care networks, Welfare Reform, Alzheimer's disease and Children and Youth services.

### **Workshops**

Carol Lovely, R.N. attended Cancer Prevention and Early Detection Workshop in Manchester, New Hampshire. Preventative medical care and primary prevention behaviors were discussed.

On May 2, Connie Curtin, R.N. attended a workshop in Concord about the New Hampshire Nurses Practice Act.

Nancy Wiggin, R.N. attended a seminar on October 7, in West Lebanon, New Hampshire depicting current therapies and treatments being used for chronic wound management.

November 10, Nancy Wiggin, R.N. attended a conference at the Tamworth Inn centered on Alzheimer and Related Diseases-Legal Issues facing this group of people.

### **Community Projects**

The Community Food Pantry is gratefully acknowledged for their provision of food baskets for local families over the past year. Tamworth Community Nurse Association assisted with delivery of baskets containing complete meals to 5 families at Easter, 6 at Thanksgiving and 6 at Christmas. In addition to the wonderful food baskets, the Community Food Pantry at St. Andrew's provides a vital support system for supplying food stuffs as needed by families and individuals throughout the year. I am appreciative of their cooperation and efforts which enabled better than 50 families to receive extra food assistance at Thanksgiving and again at Christmas time. This extra offering of food support was made possible largely due to the efforts of local Boy Scouts, who worked very hard gathering canned goods donated by many caring local residents. A very big thank you to you all!

Meals on Wheels is once again under the Tamworth Community Nurse Association umbrella, its' smooth and effectual coordination being credited to June Donovan, our T.C.N.A. secretary. Ten years ago, Meals on Wheels originated in Tamworth, principally through the efforts of Virginia Damon, the community nurse at that time. Early on after its' inception, Charlotte Remick was able to step in to coordinate the expanding program. This fall, as Charlotte handed over the reins to T.C.N.A. once again and to June, she was honored at a very special congregate meals luncheon for her years of dedication and service to the com-



munity and to Meals on Wheels. The party also payed tribute to the many volunteer drivers who deliver the meals, without whom Meals on Wheels would not exist. Nutritious hot meals and frozen meals for weekends and holidays have been delivered to an average of 15 Tamworth residents 5 days a week throughout the year.

Priscilla Remick coordinates the congregate meals held on Monday, which offer hot meals and interesting programs for many senior citizens.

The Tamworth Community Nurse Association nurse has provided bi-monthly blood pressure screenings at the congregate meals. As has been long standing, T.C.N.A. continues to offer monthly Blood Pressure screening clinics. These are held on the last Wednesday of every month, are free and open to all ages of the general public. Many physicians recommend periodic checks of their patient's blood pressure, supplemental to office visits, to assist the patient with health maintenance. Even if **not** taking medication, awareness of one's blood pressure reading is an important step in promoting good health. By acknowledging possible variances in one's normal blood pressure appropriate interventions can take place before major health problems develop.

Tamworth Community Nurse Association sponsored the dental program again this year. This program provided dental care for 23 children from Kenneth Brett School. These young people, who otherwise may not have received proper dental attention, ranged in ages from 6 to 14 years old. Dr. Michael Glick of Ossipee deserved special recognition for his compassionate and generous assistance with this program.

Tamworth Community Nurse Association produced a Community Events Calendar for 1989, in an attempt to provide another Community service, as well as raise some funds for the agency. Many local events throughout the year are included in the calendar, as is some beautiful artwork by local artists. These are available in the Nurse's office. Your support is greatly appreciated.

In October, T.C.N.A. sponsored a 2 part Substance Abuse Symposium. The first week featured an exposition of over 20 displays depicting various aspects of substance abuse. The second week featured the noted speaker Sandra Cohen Holmes who spoke about the Impact of Substance Abuse on the Family and the Community.

On November 17, T.C.N.A. sponsored a Cholesterol and Blood

Screening in our office. This all day event produced long lines of people waiting to check their levels. A total of 127 people were screened, presenting approximately 10% of those testing with results in the "high risk" levels. (Those people were referred to their physicians for further testing.)

Christmas 1988 found T.C.N.A. spearheading "Santa" efforts for 17 Tamworth families (including 36 children). Words are simply inadequate to thank the many people who generously contributed of their time, goodies, gifts and money. It is those people who **are** the real spirit of Christmas! In addition, better than 50 of our clients, as well as Meals on Wheels recipients, also received remembrances. My added "special" thanks to the T.C.N.A. Board, Bonnie Herget and her Cub Scout Troop, Peg and Herb Damon and George Donovan for their invaluable delivery assistance!

When Connie Curtin, R.N. and Carol Lovely, R.N. left as the community nurses in June, the community experienced a loss. The nursing care offered by these two nurses, as well as the friendships formed as they assisted the community will not soon be forgotten.

As I took this position in June, I was greatly impressed by the caring, concerned attitudes extended to me by the T.C.N.A. Board, the community as a whole and by the clients I began to meet. I have made so many valuable friends; Tamworth is truly a very special community.

The nature of public health care has been changing dramatically. As hospital stays are shorter in length more acutely ill patients are being sent home sooner than ever before - in need of greater nursing and supportive services than ever before. T.C.N.A. is striving to meet these ever-changing and growing demands, without losing availability to all of the community, which has been its' cornerstone of operation since its' inception in 1921. As a community agency, Tamworth Community Nurse Association looks to support these changing needs of all ages and spectrums of the community. As a non-profit agency, it must also look to the support of the entire community in order to continue its' services to and for the community.

Finally, I cannot conclude my Tamworth Community Nurse Association report, without acknowledging the importance of June Donovan. I thank her for her time, her many talents and support given to me and to so many others.

## ANIMAL CONTROL 1988

As the number of people in this area has increased, so has the need to rescue abandoned, lost or wandering dogs. I received a total of 103 complaints, an increase of 15 over 1987 and all but three were canine complaints. I travelled a total of 1,631 miles, an increase of 615 miles and a total of 60 dogs were held at the Tamworth Holding Facility, an increase of 20 dogs. Most of these dogs were claimed by their owners. Two required euthanasia and eight were placed out for adoption. I responded to four complaints of dogs chasing deer one of which involved a deer fatality, two calls involving loose or trespassing horses, one call for dogs chasing sheep, several calls in reference to loose cattle, one call involving a dog bite, and one call for a dead dog on Rt. 16. Six complaints required hearings in Ossipee District Court.

A Rabies Clinic was held at the Tamworth Town House in April. Dr. Tevis Kraft gave 35 Rabies Vaccines to dogs and cats and 22 dogs were licensed at this time. A thank you to Melinda Heimlich who helped with the paper work and to Terry Woodward who handled the licenses. There will be another Rabies Clinic in April of 1989. Remember that the vaccine is considerably cheaper when given at the Clinic and that the State Law requires all dogs to receive the Rabies Vaccine at specified intervals and to be licensed at three months of age and by May 1st of every year.

The majority of the complaints I receive continues to be dogs running at large and hence becoming a serious nuisance problem. There is a Town leash law. It is unfair and illegal to allow your dog to roam off his property at any time. You have a responsibility to your dog to keep him safe and off the highways as well as to the community to keep your dog from causing problems on property not his own, chasing deer or harrassing livestock. Please be considerate of your dog and your neighbors.

Dogs in heat must be confined within a defined space, inside a building structure or an adequately fenced in pen. **THEY CANNOT BE JUST TIED OUTSIDE.**

Major Henry Mock of the N.H. Fish and Game Dept. has confirmed the fact that Hunting Dogs ARE NOT exempt from Town ordinances and fines.

Again I remind you that if you cannot reach me directly with a complaint I can be reached on my police radio through the Sheriff's Office or Troop E. You may also bring a dog found running at large to my Town Facility and place him in a pen. If you do



this PLEASE leave information as to where the dog was found and the nature of the complaint. Your complaints about dogs causing problems are confidential unless they ultimately require a court hearing at your request.

I enjoy my job as your Animal Control Officer. The best implementation of the job depends on you. Please let me know if you have complaints and I will do my best to rectify them. I care about your animals and you..

A message from the N.H. Animal Rights League addressing an on-going complaint problem:

### **Give Dogs Proper Shelter**

Addressed to Joe McQuaid, editor-in-chief: Keeping a dog outside without proper shelter is a violation of state law and is punishable by a heavy fine or a jail sentence. Only dogs especially bred for cold weather should be kept outside. Dog houses should be built off the ground and be wind-tight and water-tight with insulation either on the inside or outside with a flap across the entrance facing away from the wind. The interior should be large enough so the dog can stand, turn around, and lie down comfortably. Dry bedding should be provided and changed frequently. Hay, shavings, and pieces of carpeting make good bedding.

But don't plant your dog outside like a tree. If your dog is chained make sure the chain is long enough to allow him some exercise and that it will not get wound around obstacles, choking him. A chain on a pivot is best and can be purchased. And make certain you chain him within reach of his dog house so he may take shelter when it is necessary to do so.

## COOK MEMORIAL LIBRARY

In 1988 more patrons (6,545) utilized the services of the library than ever before. Circulation (8,878) was second only to 1987 (8,896). These figures are indicative of the continued growth in our library membership, patronage and in the entire town.

We could not handle the always increasing volume of work without our wonderful family of volunteers. During National Volunteer Week last April we held a celebration honoring our volunteers and the Friends of the Library who have always faithfully offered their gifts of time, love and labor. My personal thanks are herewith acknowledged to: Martha Sylvia, Isabel Hoag, Evelyn Cunningham, Sally Zink and Bertha Eastwick for their help in carding and shelving of books, to Louise Wrobleski and Debbie Demaine for the summer story hour, to the Garden Club for the plants in the summer and the greenery in the winter, to Angie Stearns for her fresh cut flowers all season long, to Bob Trask, Dick Stearns and Scott Evans for helping me so many times, to Sally Zink, my assistant and to Pat Trask, my substitute, for their aid.

As most of you know my dear husband, Bernard Ulitz, died this past September. He served as a Trustee of the Library since November of 1972, was Chairman of the Board during our building years and was always a volunteer - subbing for me when I was ill or at a meeting, stepping in when help was needed wherever it was needed. He is missed deeply.

In 1988 we purchased or were given 567 books, received 215 books on Inter-Library Loan at the request of individual patrons, borrowed 104 Large Print books for our visually handicapped readers and borrowed films from the State for 140 showings for Day Care.

The Library may be used for meetings by any local group. In 1988 20 different organizations held 83 meetings at the library.

Cook Memorial Library serves as storage center for the town movie projector (charge \$1.00 maintenance fee), speakers and screen as well as cassette players, a collection of Tamworth 1966 Bicentennial slides and Tamworth's U.S. 1976 Bicentennial celebration slides and a collection of oral history tapes. The library also has a genealogical card file of early Tamworth vital statistics and an alphabetically arranged record of early Tamworth families compiled by Helen Hidden many years ago. We also have on permanent loan from the Tamworth Historical Socie-



ty the remaining volume of the Tamworth Social Library (founded by Parson Samuel Hidden in 1796).

In 1988 we offered these programs for the public: A slide program on China by Cam and Jean Greene, a lecture and slides on Borneo by Peg King and the Boy Scout trip to Australia with comments and slides by Russ Staples and Scouts Brian Streeter and Robbie Troon.

We are grateful to those talented residents of our community who exhibited their art in our hall for the enjoyment of all. We appreciate also the gifts of books, paperbacks, magazines, newspapers and financial donations. Any material we cannot use is placed in our annual book sale.

Friends of the Library meets at 1:30 on the 4th Tuesday of the month (except in winter) with Barbara Fromm as President. New members are actively sought and always welcome. The Friends sponsored the Summer Story Hour, decorated the library in Christmas finery, gave donations in memory of Sal Provenzano and Bernard Ulitz, purchased bookends and a book of poetry by a local author. They arranged for the purchase and installation of overhead fans for the library in 1989. We want to thank Dot Provenzano, a Friend, who donated one of the new fans.

We thank those who made donations in memory of Donald Weare, Esther Steele Flood, Ruth Flaccus, Margery Morgan and Bernard Ulitz. We are grateful for the Gregg Memorial Fund (for the purchase of children's books) and the Bear Paw Memorial Fund. ### **TAMWORTH RED CROSS WATER SAFETY PROGRAM**

During July 1988 238 individuals ranging from toddlers to adults enrolled in a variety of Red Cross approved swimming courses from Beginner to Advanced Lifesaving.
