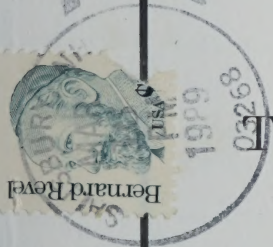

## SCHOOL REPORT.

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Schools have been maintained in six of the nine districts of the town. The whole number of scholars attending not less than two weeks was 103,—boys 52, girls 61. Average attendance for the year, 70½. Amount of money appropriated for the support of schools, \$658. Literary fund, \$73.71. Other sources, \$16. Amount to each scholar, \$7.26. Length of summer terms in weeks, 8. Fall terms, 14, except one school, which was 11½ weeks.

*Bashan.*—Miss Augusta H. Eaton, teacher. Summer term, wages a month including board, 26; number of scholars, 17; average attendance, 14. Fall term, wages \$28; number of scholars, 21; average, 16.

*Corser Hill.*—Miss Sarah E. Sawyer, teacher. Wages a month, \$24. Summer term, number of scholars, 20; average attendance, 18. Fall term, number of scholars, 22; average, 18.

*Little Hill.*—Miss Ellen K. Abbott, teacher. Wages a month, \$16. Summer term, number of scholars, 4; average attendance, 3.7. Fall term, number of scholars, 4; average attendance, 3.5. Length of fall term, 11½ weeks.

*Putney.*—Miss Mary R. Webster, teacher. Wages a month, \$24. Summer term, number of scholars, 23; average attendance, 18. Fall term, number of scholars, 18; average attendance, 13.

*Sweatt's Mills.*—Summer term, Miss Lessie E. Thurston, teacher. Wages a month, \$20. Number of scholars, 13. Fall term, Miss Ida L. Sweatt, teacher. Wages a month, \$22; number of scholars, 16; average, 14.

*White Plain.*—Miss Lizzie M. Carpenter, teacher. Wages a month, \$18. Summer term, number of scholars, 6; average, 4. Fall term, number of scholars, 9; average, 6.

Of the four ladies whose names are first mentioned in this report, it is proper to observe that they are teachers of extensive experience, thorough qualifications, and mature judgment. Their schools were judiciously managed, correctly instructed, and exhibited evidence of improvement that appeared to be satisfactory to those most deeply interested. The teacher of the fall term at Sweatt's Mills may also rank in this class. The others entered their schools without previous experience, but each, in her capacity, did what she could for the boys and girls committed to her charge. The teacher at White Plain retained her situation during the year, and her efforts and attainments were such as to merit encouragement to persevere in the honorable and responsible occupation of a teacher.

An examination of the books in use at the commencement of the year revealed the fact that many of the readers were in a dilapidated condition, some of them having broken loose from their bindings and gone to pieces like the "one hoss shay." As a mere matter of economy, it was thought best to exchange them for a new series. The result was an increased interest in the reading classes of nearly every school in town.

Most of the school-houses are in a comfortable state of preservation. Perhaps the five per cent. allowed for temporary repairs may answer for a year or two before a larger appropriation will be needed for more extensive improvements. The house at Sweatt's Mills, however, furnishes an exception. For twenty-five years this old building has been reported unfit for its purpose. The heavy burden of taxation necessary for the payment of the public debt, together with the exemption for a time of certain real estate in the vicinity from taxes, affords a reasonable excuse for the apparent negligence. But these conditions are now practically removed. By a system of purchase and equalization, the school-houses have become town property, and every citizen must take his share of responsibility for their condition. A prudent regard for our own reputation would seem to suggest the propriety of furnishing a new and commodious school-house at the business centre of the town.

We must act conscientiously with reference to our educational interests. A word or a ballot employed in a worthy cause may seem a trifling thing, but who can estimate, in its beneficent results, "how far that little candle shall throw its beams." "The mightiest works of human hands live but an age before they fall," but the words we speak and the efforts we put forth for the benefit of the young, will be repeated and reflected along the generations when our voices are silent and our work is done.

With these suggestions the foregoing report is respectfully submitted.

To see if the Town, in accordance with RSA 674:43, having adopted a Town wide zoning ordinance in 1974, will authorize the Planning Board, which adopted subdivision regulations in 1967, to review and approve or disapprove site plans for the development of tracts or changes or expansion of use of tracts for non-residential uses or for multi-family dwelling units, which are defined as any structures containing more than 2 dwelling units, whether or not such development includes a subdivision or resubdivision of the site. This resolution shall take effect upon passage and the Town Clerk shall file a certificate of notice with the Merrimack County Register of Deeds showing that the Planning Board has been so authorized and the date of approval by the Town of the authorization.

27. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Hopkinton-Webster Refuse Disposal Agreement, entered into by the Towns in July of 1975 to provide as follows:

1. Amend Paragraph I of original agreement: There shall be a Refuse Disposal Committee, consisting of three citizens from the Town of Hopkinton and three citizens from the Town of Webster, appointed by their respective Boards of Selectmen to 3 year terms.
2. Amend Paragraph II of original agreement: Delete power of said Committee to expend joint funds appropriated for such purpose.
3. Eliminate Paragraph VIII of original agreement: Deleting the power of said Committee to authorize other towns, not parties to this Agreement, access to the refuse disposal facilities.
4. Amend Paragraph IX of original agreement: Should a party to the Agreement seek to withdraw from the Agreement, it shall nevertheless be the continuing responsibility of the withdrawing town to fund its share of all bond indebtedness incurred prior to withdrawal.

To authorize the Board of Selectmen to adopt and approve such contract language within the scope of the foregoing provisions as may be necessary to carry out its general purpose and intent and take any other action relative thereto.

28. To see if the Town will vote to accept a deed of a short terminal section of a public highway with a cul-de-sac, known as Manchester Drive Extension, which road has been fully completed to Town standards and approved by the Planning Board.

29. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell, trade or dispose of any surplus used items or equipment which are available or may become available during the year, at an amount or in a way they determine to be in the best interest of the Town.

30. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax lien property to private owners by advertised sealed bids with the power to accept or reject any or all bids, or to negotiate the sale of the property at an amount they determine to be in the best interest of the Town. The Selectmen shall sign and deliver suitable deed to successful purchaser. As provided by RSA 80:42 the authority herein granted shall continue in force indefinitely until otherwise voted by some future Town Meeting.

31. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal or state grants which may become available during the course of the year, and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money, provided: (1) that such grants and other monies do not require the expenditure of other town funds, (2) that a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and monies, and (3) that such items shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to limitation and expenditure of town monies, all as provided by RSA 31:96-b.

32. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

We have audited the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Webster as of and for the year ended December 31, 1988, as listed in the table of contents. We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Assets Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Webster at December 31, 1988, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements and schedules listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Webster. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

**NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

December 31, 1988

**NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

The following is a summary of significant accounting policies employed in the preparation of these financial statements.

**A. Governmental Reporting Entity**

The financial statements of the Town of Webster have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) as applied to the government units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The more significant of the government's accounting policies are described below.

For financial reporting purposes, in conformity with the National Council on Governmental Accounting Statement Number 3, "Defining the Governmental Report Entity," the Town of Webster includes all funds, account groups, agencies, boards, commissions and authorities that are controlled by or dependent on the Town's executive or legislative branches. Control by or dependence on the Town was determined on the basis of budget adoption, taxing authority, outstanding debt secured by revenues, or general obligations of the Town, and obligation of the town to finance any deficits that may occur, or receipt of significant subsidies from the Town.

**B. Fund Accounting**

The accounts of the Town are organized on the basis of funds or account groups, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures, as appropriate. Government resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled. The various funds are grouped by type in the financial statements. The following fund types and account groups are used by the Town:

**GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS**

**General Fund** – The General Fund is the general operating fund of the Town. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to another fund are accounted for in this fund. From the fund are paid the general operating expenditures, the fixed charges, and the capital improvement costs that are not paid through other funds.

**Special Revenue Funds** – Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than expendable trust or major capital projects) requiring separate accounting because of legal or regulatory provisions or administrative action. Included in this fund type is the Library Fund.

**FIDUCIARY FUNDS**

**Trust Funds** – Trust Funds are used to account for the assets held in trust

by the Town. The Nonexpendable and Expendable Trust Funds (which include Capital Reserve Funds) are shown in this fund type.

#### C. Account Groups (Fixed Assets)

All governmental funds are accounted for on a spending or "financial flow" measurement focus. This means that only current assets and current liabilities are generally included on their balance sheets. Their reported fund balance (net current assets) is considered a measure of "available spendable resources." Governmental fund operating statements present increases (revenues and other financing sources) and decreases (expenditures and other uses) in net current assets. Accordingly, they are said to present a summary of sources and uses of available spendable resources during a period.

General fixed assets have been acquired for general governmental purposes and have been recorded as expenditures in the fund making the expenditure. These expenditures are required to be capitalized at historical cost in a General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts for accountability purposes. In accordance with the practices followed by other municipal entities in the State, the Town does not maintain a record of its general fixed assets and, accordingly, a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in this financial report.

#### D. Basis of Accounting

The accounts of the General, Special Revenue and Expendable Trust Funds are maintained and reported on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, sources of financial resources and assets are recognized when measurable and available to finance operations during the year. Uses of financial resources and liabilities are recognized when obligations are incurred from receipt of goods and services, when assessments are made by the State or, in the case of judgments and claims against the Town, when there is a probability that such judgments and claims will result in liabilities, the amount of which can be reasonably estimated. Exceptions to this general rule include: 1) accumulated unpaid vacation and sick pay, and 2) principal and interest on general long-term debt which is recognized when due. All Nonexpendable Trust Funds are accounted for using the accrual basis of accounting.

#### E. Budgetary Accounting

General governmental revenues and expenditures accounted for in budgetary funds are controlled by a formal integrated budgetary accounting system in accordance with various legal requirements which govern the Town's operations. State Statutes require balanced budgets but provide for the use of beginning general fund unreserved fund balance to achieve that end. In 1988, the beginning fund balance was applied as follows:

## F. Encumbrances

Encumbrance accounting, under which purchase orders, contracts, and continuing appropriations (certain projects and specific items not fully expended at year end) are recognized, is employed in the governmental funds. Encumbrances are not the equivalent of expenditures and are therefore reported as part of the fund balance at December 31, 1988 and are carried forward to supplement appropriations of the subsequent year.

The General Fund reserve for encumbrances at December 31, 1988 is detailed in Exhibit A-2 and totals \$32,512.

## G. Cash and Investments

At year end, the carrying amount of the Town's deposits was \$509,026 and the bank balance was \$537,339. Of the bank balance, \$395,997 was covered by Federal depository insurance and \$141,342 was uninsured.

State Statutes authorize the Town to invest excess funds in the custody of the Treasurer in obligations of the United States Government, in savings bank deposits of banks incorporated under the laws of the State of New Hampshire, in certificates of deposit of banks incorporated under the laws of the State of New Hampshire, or in national banks located within this State or the State of Massachusetts. These financial statements report investments in certificates of deposit and savings bank deposits under the caption Cash and Equivalents.

The Town is further authorized to invest Trust Funds in obligations of political subdivisions and stocks and bonds, as they are legal for investment by New Hampshire savings banks. Capital Reserve Funds must be kept separate and not intermingled with Trust Funds. Capital Reserve Funds may be invested only in savings bank deposits of New Hampshire banks, or in United States or State of New Hampshire bonds or notes.

## H. Taxes Collected For Others

The property taxes collected by the Town include taxes levied for the Merrimack Valley School District, Merrimack County, and Pillsbury Lake Precinct, which are remitted to these governmental units as required by law. The ultimate responsibility for the collection of taxes rests with the Town.

## I. Property Taxes

The National Council on Governmental Accounting, Interpretation 3, referring to property tax revenue recognition, requires disclosure if property taxes receivable, which are to be collected beyond a period of 60 days subsequent to year's end, are recognized on the balance sheet and not reserved. In accordance with the practice followed by other municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Webster annually recognizes, without reserve, all taxes receivable at the end of the fiscal year. The Town feels this practice of accrual is justified, as it more appropriately matches the liability to the school district entity at December 31 with collections which are intended to finance these payments through June 30 of the following year.

Annually, the Town establishes and raises through taxation an amount for abatements and refunds of property and resident taxes, known as overlay. All abatements and refunds are charged to this account. The amount raised in 1988 was \$5,016 and expenditures amounted to \$3,336.

As prescribed by law, the tax collector places a lien on properties for all uncollected property taxes in the following year after taxes are due. The lien on these properties has priority over other liens and accrues interest at 18% per annum.

If property is not redeemed within the two-year redemption period, the property is tax-deeded to the Town.

#### J. Interfund Transactions

During the course of normal operations, the Town has numerous transactions between funds. The accompanying governmental and fiduciary fund financial statements reflect such transactions as transfers.

#### K. Total Columns (Memorandum Only) on Combined Statements

Total columns on the combined statements are captioned "Memorandum Only" to indicate that they are presented only to facilitate financial analysis. Data in these columns do not present financial position, results of operations, or changes in financial position in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Neither is such data comparable to a consolidation. Interfund eliminations have not been made in the aggregation of this date.

#### L. Comparative Data

Comparative total data for the prior year have been presented in the accompanying financial statements in order to provide an understanding of changes in the government's financial position and operations. However, comparative data have not been presented in all statements because their inclusion would make certain statements unduly complex and difficult to understand.

#### NOTE 2 – LEGAL DEBT MARGIN

According to State Law, Town borrowing (exclusive of Water and Sewer Bonds or Notes properly approved under the provision of the Municipal Finance Act) may not exceed one and seventy-five hundredths percent (1.75%) of the valuation of property based upon the applicable last locally assessed valuation of the municipality as last equalized by the Commissioner of Revenue Administration. At December 31, 1988, the Town of Webster had an equalized value of \$70,595,317 and a legal debt margin of \$1,235,418.

#### NOTE 3 – DEFINED BENEFIT PENSION PLAN

Only the Police Chief participates in the New Hampshire Retirement System, a multiple-employer public employee retirement system. The payroll for the employee covered by the system for the year ended December 31, 1988 was \$30,826; the Town's total payroll was \$80,246.

All Town full-time employees are eligible to participate in the system. Employees who retire before age 65 are entitled to a retirement benefit equal to 1/60 of the employee's average final compensation multiplied by years of service. After attainment of age 65, the payment by the retirement system is reduced to 1/66 of the average final compensation. The system also provides death and disability benefits which are established by State Statute.

The Police Chief is required by State Statute to contribute 9.3% of his salary to the plan. The Town is required by the same statute to contribute 5% of the employee's salary based on an actuarial valuation of the entire State plan per-

formed June 30, 1985. The contribution requirements for the year ended December 31, 1988 were \$3,125, which consisted of \$1,116 from the Town and \$2,009 from the employee.

The "pension benefit obligation" is a standardized disclosure measure of the present value of pension benefits, adjusted for the effects of projected salary increases and step-rate benefits, estimated to be payable in the future as a result of employee service to date. The measure, which is the actuarial present value of credited projected benefits, is intended to help users assess the system's funding status on a going-concern basis, assess progress made in accumulating sufficient assets to pay benefits when due, and make comparisons among retirement systems and employers. The State retirement system does not make separate measurements of assets and pension benefit obligations for individual employers. According to plan administrators, the pension benefit obligation at June 30, 1987 for the system as a whole, determined through an actuarial valuation performed as of that date, was \$633,344,000. The system's net assets available for benefits on June 30, 1987 (valued at market) were estimated at \$792,615,988, leaving no unfunded pension benefit obligation. The percentage that the Town of Webster has in relation to the entire plan cannot be determined.

#### NOTE 4 – TRUST FUNDS

The principal amount of all Nonexpendable Trust Funds is restricted either by law or by terms of individual bequests, in that only income earned may be expended. The Town's Nonexpendable and Expendable Trust Funds at December 31, 1988 are detailed as follows:

**NOTE 5 – SANITARY LANDFILL AGREEMENT**

The sanitary landfill agreement with the Town of Hopkinton provides that the Town of Webster will pay 20% of the yearly expenses of the landfill operation. In addition, the Town receives from Hopkinton 20% of gross receipts from the use of the facilities.

**NOTE 6 – CONCORD REGIONAL SOLID WASTE/  
RESOURCE RECOVERY COOPERATIVE**

During 1986, the Town entered into an intergovernmental agreement with several municipalities to create a cooperative among them, in order to design, construct, operate and maintain a “centralized solid waste-to-energy facility.” Under the terms of the agreement, each municipality is obligated to appropriate annually its share of the budgeted costs of the ensuing fiscal period. This agreement was subsequently ratified by a special act of the legislature. The cost incurred in 1988 was \$2,322.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

This report will begin to show you what has kept us busy this year with the growth of the Town, the landfill and transfer station problem and the many extra meetings that have had to be held. This does not necessarily show you why our Monday meetings seem to run four to five hours long—seemingly much longer than in previous years.

Therefore, let us list for you what we have been involved with this year and some of the problems that we are faced with down the road.

1. Yes, taxes did increase, but the town share was a dollar less than the previous year. We don't have much control over the school and county budgets.
2. The Town is growing and again, for the third year in a row, all building permits (21) were spoken for.
3. We perambulated the Concord and Warner town lines. Salisbury and Boscawen were done a few years ago. State law requires this be done every seven years.
4. The Class Six road situation is still a problem and we are still working on whether or not one can build on a Class Six road. After meeting with Town Counsel and the Planning Board, it would appear that no one can build on Class Six roads. A definite decision will be forthcoming.
5. Numerous joint meetings have been held with the Hopkinton and Warner Selectmen to discuss Warner joining us in the building of the transfer station and the closing of the landfill. The final result was that Warner voted to build their own transfer station.
6. Numerous meetings have been held with the Landfill Comm. and the Hopkinton Selectmen to keep us up to date. Plans have been let out for bid, but at the time of this report no definite word has been returned. You may find later in this report (we hope) the final decision on the cost of building the transfer station and the funding of same. Our thanks to the Landfill Comm. for their many hours of time and frustrations in working on this project.
7. We followed the work on rebuilding the Schoodac Bridge (Warner Road). It was finally completed in December and the resurfacing of the area will be done in the spring.
8. Due to the Road Agent's accident last summer, no work was done on Deer Meadow Road. This money was encumbered and with an additional appropriation this year, a longer stretch will be completed this coming year.
9. All of a sudden two Cable TV companies have approached us with proposals to come into Webster. There is a good possibility of Cable in most of the town in the next year or so.
10. The Selectmen's Office is fast becoming too small for the meetings that are held there as well as storage. And the Planning Board uses the same facilities. How many of you realize that there is no water in the building? A Town office building is something we are seriously considering and looking into. The day is fast approaching when other Town Officers may not want to work out of their own homes.
11. Another building problem is the Fire Station and they have had a committee working on it for the past year. Their report will be found elsewhere in this report.
12. A third building problem is the salt shed (behind the office). It is about ready to collapse and presently we are waiting for an estimate on a new build-

ing which we hope to present to you at Town Meeting.

13. More and more people ask us what are we going to do about taxes. As mentioned above, there is not much we can do. However, we did make an appointment with DRED to have one of their Industrial Development men come out and look the Town over and give us his input as to the possibility of having some commercial or industrial land available for future businesses. There are a few areas that might be considered, but our access roads to 89 and 93 do not lend themselves to anything large. At least we have an opinion of how they feel at DRED.
14. Our equalized valuation has now fallen just below 30% and we have requested DRA to set a time for reappraisal of the Town. This probably will not be done until the mid '90's, but we are on the list.
15. The time has come when Webster must think of going on computer, and you will find an appropriation in the Warrant to pursue this course.

Yes, it has been a busy year and there does not seem to be any letup in the future. We would be remiss if we did not take this opportunity of thanking all those people who sit on the various Town Committees and Boards and do this on a volunteer basis. Let's face it—it's time consuming. We especially thank Randy Inman who has spent endless hours as Webster's representative on the Regional Resource Recovery Board. Randy has resigned and will be replaced by Jack Chwasciak. And to our Administrative Assistant, Barbara Mock, who can be found behind stacks of paper work that fills her desk along with keeping the books and records up to date and answering the many, many phone calls that come to the office.

## REPORT OF THE WEBSTER POLICE DEPARTMENT

1988 has been an exceptionally busy year. Our focus of crime seems to be shifting more to that usually found in larger communities. This year we had 4 Child Sexual Assaults; 36 Juvenile cases; and 2 Indecent Exposures.

Harassment cases also nearly doubled this year. It seems some idle persons have found another use for the telephone other than communication! If they are caught, this can be a very serious charge, and we DO have methods of finding out WHO these parties are now!

Animal complaints have skyrocketed—and we have had to take more animals to the S.P.C.A. this year than usual. Remember, if a dog isn't wearing his license, we have no way of knowing who he belongs to, so have no recourse but to take him to the S.P.C.A. They only keep an animal an average of 7 days before making other arrangements for him. If you are missing your dog, please notify us AS SOON as you miss him!

Last year we had over 100 persons who neglected to license their dogs. This year, as of **May 1st, 1989**, if your dog is not licensed and is taken to the S.P.C.A., it will be left along with paperwork stating that the owner is subject not only to the S.P.C.A. fee, but also for a \$10.00 "nuisance" fee payable to our Town Clerk within 96 hours (plus licensing of the unlicensed animal), or be summoned to court.

This year we had several changes in Department personnel. Howard Hook had previously retired from his regular job, but had remained on the Police Department. This year he retired from the Police Department. During the last 30 years Howard has given admirably of his time and expertise for many years of service to the Webster Police Department. Many thanks, Howard; we shall miss you! We wish you the best in your much deserved retirement!

Brian Sheldon and Reginald LaClair both resigned for personal reasons. We thank them both for the time they spent with us, and are sorry it didn't work out for them.

We were fortunate to be able to replace them with:

1. Steve Faer (Part-time Certified and experienced in State Prison work)
2. Larry Hilton (Part-time Certified and formerly employed by Weare P.D.)
3. William Shackford (formerly a Lt. for the Sheriff's Dept.) He has consented to be our Training Officer. He has many years of experience and we are fortunate to have him join us. (Full-time Certified).

Our Department suffered a great loss this year upon the resignation due to poor health of Charlotte Berry, coordinator and treasurer of the Webster Police Ladies Auxiliary. Charlotte is remembered with much love and thanks for her untiring devotion and work not only for the Auxiliary but also for the Police Department and her involvement in other Town activities. Our prayers are with her.

This year, Mr. Austin will be retiring. He has given many years of service to the Town of Webster as a Selectman, and will be truly missed. I find he has been a pleasure to work under, and his sense of fair play has certainly been appreciated by us. We wish him and his wife, June, a very happy retirement.

**REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Between July 1987 and June 1988, we experienced more fires than normal. The three leading causes of forest fires were again children, fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden and debris burning. All causes are preventable, but only with **your** help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Fire Fire Warden, Concord Forest Protection



Headquarters at (603) 271-2217, or local Forest Ranger.

On January 1, 1989, the Deceptive Forestry Business Practices Law (RSA 224:54) goes into effect. This law, in summary, states that a person is guilty of a misdemeanor if, in the course of buying or selling a forest product, uses a false weight or measure for falsely determining any quality or quantity of a forest product. ## CONCORD SOLID WASTE / RESOURCE RECOVERY COOPERATIVE

In 1988, the construction of the 500 ton per day refuse to energy facility by SES Concord (Wheelabrator Technologies) in Penacook has proceeded. The construction of the facility is nearing completion, with the initiation of shake-down operations scheduled for this April. During the spring and early summer months, refuse deliveries by the Cooperative to the plant are anticipated to be intermittent as start-up operations proceed. Full commercial operation is anticipated to begin in the late summer/early fall of 1989.

The power generated by the refuse to energy plant is to be sold to Public Service of New Hampshire (PSNH) under the terms of a rate order previously issued by the NH Public Utilities Commission. The impact, if any, of the PSNH bankruptcy on the price to be paid for power is not yet clear. The Cooperative, which entered into financial obligations on the basis of the PUC rate order, continues to maintain the position that the PUC specified rates are in place. Significant progress has been made in dealings with PSNH and Concord Electric Company on finalizing and constructing electrical distribution system improvements.

In March, 1988, the Cooperative was apprised by the NH Department of Environmental Services that the Concord Landfill, which had been approved for disposal of ash residue from the refuse to energy plant, would not be available for use. The Cooperative was successful in acquiring a 38 acre parcel in Franklin. Obtaining permits, securing long term financing, designing and constructing a double lined secure residue landfill in ten months. The landfill was constructed using intensive quality control procedure and, despite the aggressive schedule, was completed at a cost under budget. The landfill is substantially complete and will begin operation in April.

The member municipalities need to ensure that arrangements are made to allow full delivery to the refuse to energy plant by no later than August, 1989. The Cooperative requests that each community make arrangements for the storage and disposal of unacceptable waste, including motor vehicle batteries which constitute the greater source of lead in municipal solid waste. Such batteries are not to be delivered to the refuse to energy plant. The Project Director further encourages all communities to consider and implement materials recycling to reduce anticipated excess tonnage.

## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE WEBSTER FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY

554 new books were added to the library collection in 1988, 168 were weeded out, leaving a total collection of about 6484 volumes. We are constantly upgrading the material to try to meet the needs of townspeople. Our newest addition is adult audio cassettes. These cassettes are for those who want someone else to read the book to them, and are not to be confused with those provided for the visually impaired, which are furnished free of charge by the State Library's Division for the Handicapped.

The library is now open a total of 18 hours per week, 4 short of the 22 required by the state for libraries in towns with a population of between 1001 and 3000. We feel that we have done well to reach this level at this time. We also have the Sunday New Hampshire News available on Monday. A weekly newspaper is mandated by the state. Running water and handicapped access are still beyond our reach.

A summer reading program for elementary-aged children was very successful with a total of 38 children taking part. A very effective castle scene was the result of the many books read. A story hour for pre-schoolers attracted over 20 youngsters. A variety of story-tellers entertained them and refreshments were provided by the Friends. Three dimensional planets were made in the fourth grade during the school year that were later displayed in the library.

In September Charlotte Berry resigned as trustee and treasurer because of ill health. Nancy Rideout was appointed by the Selectmen to fill out the remainder of the year. Charlotte was a very active trustee who contributed a great deal of time and effort to the workings of the library. We are sorry that she had to resign and our best wishes and affection go with her. We would like to welcome Nancy to the board of trustees. She has jumped right in with both feet.

The trustees wish to thank everyone who has contributed time, effort, materials and money to the library this year. The librarian has thanked individuals each month in the Webster Grapevine. We need all of these people to help the library operate effectively. Many thanks also to the librarian, Lorna Austin, for doing a fine job for another year.

The library is now open from 9 to 2 and 6 to 8 on Monday, and 9 to 8 on Wednesday.

## REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

In 1988 the Conservation Commission: reviewed applications to the State Wetlands Board; studied the Walker Pond watershed; asked for and received a conservation easement to the town on marsh below bank and along edge of Beaver Dam Brook just upstream from Long Street; led family nature walks; held a litter clean-up day; cleared the Blackwater River for canoeing; distributed a town questionnaire on conservation goals and recycling; held a Hazardous Waste Collection Day; organized a town meeting about the Land Conservation Investment Program of the Trust for N.H. Lands, with speaker and slides on the program and Webster (over 60 people attended); formed a Webster Land Trust Task Force appointed by the Selectmen to work to apply for state funding to protect private conservation lands in Webster; is working on an inventory of the town's natural resources; and is studying recycling. The Commission's application for assistance from the Water Resources Management and Protection Planning Board was approved: a study will be made on the Beaver Dam Brook.

Commission Meetings, open to the public, are held once a month, at 8:30 A.M. on the 2nd Wednesday, and are publicized in the Webster Grapevine.

## REPORT OF THE TOWN HISTORY COMMITTEE

### Highlights of 1988

During 1987, 35 building permit applications were issued, 16 homes were constructed, and one mobile home permit issued.

In 1988, 21 building permits were issued.

A revised plan for a town hall building was presented at town meeting. A vote to construct this building was defeated.

Also, at town meeting, it was voted to discontinue collecting a \$10.00 resident tax. This tax had been instituted in 1971 to replace the \$2.00 poll tax and \$5.00 State head tax first levied in 1951.

The town adopted the provisions of RSA 80:58-86 for a real estate lien procedure, under which the town may purchase any land or buildings which are for sale for unpaid taxes.

Webster lost by death three of its oldest residents, Naomi Fifield, Ann Smith and Nina Howe; all were over 93 years of age.

The Fourth Annual New England Division Championship Canoe and Kayak races were held on April 16-17 on the river below the Blackwater Dam.

The Conservation Commission sponsored five "nature walks" and a public informational meeting regarding how the Trust for N.H. Lands could help Webster preserve and protect its natural resources.

Scholarships to Webster students were awarded as follows: Joseph Degen Scholarship (Old Meeting House Society), Mark Shilansky; William R. Pearson Memorial Scholarship. Mark Kimball; Helen Drown Memorial Scholarship (Daniel Webster Grange), Clinton Jones and Bethany Drown.

The Old Meeting House Society sponsored an old-fashioned ice cream social at the meeting house on June 25. Senior Citizens over 80 years of age were honored at a special party. Both events were well attended.

The First Congregational Church of Webster made progress in cleaning, remodeling and renovating the parsonage. Various newly formed committees: altar guild, budget, missionary outreach and pastoral search committees were active.

The public suppers, held during the summer months by Church, Women's Union and Grange, netted over \$1,000.00 for each organization.

The summer of 1988 was one of the hottest on record, with the thermometer topping 90 degrees F on more than 25 days.

John Allen was Grand Marshal of the Old Home Day parade on August 20. The Concord Coachmen Barbershoppers furnished music; games, baseball and a chicken barbecue were held. The second annual street dance was again a huge success. Breakfast was served at the Grange hall following the dance.

The Webster Church Booth at Hopkinton Fair had another successful year, netting \$12,000.

Additions to the remodeled elementary school were completed and an open house was held on September 18, 1988. The fifth graders now attend school in Webster.

A high percentage of voters turned out for the Nov. 8 Presidential election (George Bush/Dan Quayle vs. Michael Dukakis/Lloyd Benson). Of 785 on the checklist, 559 voted (35 by absentee ballot).

The old-fashioned Christmas party held on December 4, 1988 at the Old Meeting House was very well attended. As in 1987, an outside tree was decorated, ethnic refreshments and exhibits were on display, and carol singing appropriate to the season was enjoyed.

On December 15, 1988, our school's Christmas program returned to Webster, with five grades taking part in the new multi-purpose room of the Webster Elementary School.

The annual popcorn party, sponsored by Grange and Women's Union, was again held at the Drown farm.

Of interest to many was the continued work on the Hydro-Quebec transmission lines which will pass through Webster as power is carried to Massachusetts. Service roads were built and towers set by helicopter.

ARTICLE 5. Harold Janeway, Chairman of the Town Building Committee, reported on the results of the committee's work, commending Bill Davis for the plans which were on display, both at the Grange Hall for the daytime balloting and at the Central School, to be seen by those attending the night time

meeting. A need for town offices, as well as a hall and firehouse was emphasized. One alternative was to build an addition on to the Library, for town offices but there was concern whether the present building is in good enough shape; very little land is available. An estimated figure for this would be around \$100,000.00. The other set of plans featured a combination Town office and Firehouse, with an approximate cost of \$300,000.00 to \$400,000.00. There was a very lengthy discussion, pro and con and the question arose about voting to use money from the Town Hall Fund; to act on this at Town Meeting of 1989, after further study of the subject. Voted to eliminate the final statement (“a vote will be taken to determine which of two proposals developed during 1987 is preferred) Hand vote: Yes – 52; No – 49. A ballot vote was requested and the necessary 7 people required stated their wish for a ballot vote. Results: Yes – 50; No – 65.

Therefore, the article to raise \$10,000.00 to develop the town offices plan and present it at the 1989 Town Meeting was defeated.

ARTICLE 6. Motion to vote a lump sum a. through c. made by Kim Berry and withdrawn.

- a. Operating Budget (Police Dept.) . . . . . \$38,078.00 voted
- b. Capital Outlay – Light Bar & Portable Radios. . . . . 2,200.00 voted
- c. Capital Outlay – Police Cruiser . . . . . 13,152.00 voted

and to authorize \$7,993.00, plus interest from the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund to be withdrawn, as stated in the warrant article.

ARTICLE 7. Following sums were voted for the Fire Department:

d. Voted to raise \$10,000 for Capital Reserve Fire Truck (instead of \$2,500.00 as in the warrant)

ARTICLE 8. Voted to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of purchasing a defibrillation monitor and to raise and appropriate \$2,500.00 for this fund (an increase of the \$1,500.00 requested in the warrant.) Voice vote. Roy Fanjoy spoke in behalf of the Rescue Squad of the dire need for the monitor.

ARTICLE 9. Voted \$50.00 for Civil Defense and \$350.00 for Flashing School lights.

ARTICLE 10. Highway Department:

- a. Town Maintenance . . . . . \$88,000.00

ARTICLE 11. Voted to clarify the purpose of the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund by specifying the specific items of equipment, namely acquisition of a chipper, snow plows and wings and a grader and to designate the selectmen and the road agent as the town's authorized agents to acquire said equipment by expenditure from said fund. This vote to continue in effect until amended or revoked by the Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 12. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000.00, the town's share of the cost of repairs to Schoodac\* Bridge, to be expended under the New Hampshire Department of Transportation's bridge assistance program. (\* The bridge near the Hatch and Sullivan residences.)

ARTICLE 13. Voted the sum of \$14,901.00 for Webster's share of the operating budget at the Hopkinton-Webster Sanitary Landfill.

ARTICLE 14. \$65,500.00 was voted for this town's share, for the purpose of defraying the cost of plans and engineering for closure of the Hopkinton-Webster Sanitary Landfill (including further test holes) and for eventual construction of a transfer station; said sum to be funded by borrowing in the name of the Town under the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act as amended, and to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to take all necessary action in accordance therewith. In the summer we will know our share. Votes: Yes—58; No—8.

ARTICLE 15. \$2,322.00, Webster's share of the budget for the Concord Regional Resource Recovery Cooperative was approved and voted.

ARTICLE 16. Voted to raise the sum of \$48,230.00 to cover items a. through l. as presented.

A representative from the Franklin Visiting Nurse Association, Karen O'Rourke, spoke briefly.

ARTICLE 17. Voted to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of re-appraisal of real estate, and as otherwise stated in the warrant and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be placed in this fund.

ARTICLE 18. Replacement of gasoline storage tanks and a fuel oil tank, with the sum of \$10,000 to be raised, was defeated by a vote of Yes—28; No—30.

ARTICLE 19. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Yes—53; No—0.

ARTICLE 20. Voted to pass over this article (authorizing the Selectmen to sell the 1985 Ford police cruiser to the Hy-Mar Fire Co. for \$1.00.)

ARTICLE 21. Voted to amend the article: to include the 1952 Dodge Forestry truck, as is, with the other items; i.e. to authorize the Selectmen to sell by advertised sealed bids the 1985 Ford police cruiser and Miscellaneous office equipment (and the '52 Dodge forestry truck),. The Selectmen are to have the power to accept or reject any or all bids, provided, however, if in the best interest of the town the bids are not acceptable, to further authorize the selectmen to negotiate the sale of the property at an amount they determine to be in the best interest of the town.

ARTICLE 22. Voted to authorize the Tax Collector to accept prepayment of taxes.

ARTICLE 23. Voted to adopt the provisions of RSA 72: 1-C to authorize the town not to assess, levy and collect a resident tax.

ARTICLE 24. Adopted provisions of RSA 80: 58-86 for a real estate tax lien procedure; these statutes provide that tax sales to private individuals for non-payment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with a real estate lien procedure under which only a municipality or county where the property is located may acquire a tax lien against land and buildings for unpaid taxes. So voted. (by ballot) Yes—46; No—4.

ARTICLE 25. Voted to convey by quitclaim deed to the abutting property owners that portion of the former N.H. State Highway Route 127, beginning at the easterly end of the earthen berm, easterly to Station 144 at the present N.H. State Highway Route 127, as shown in N.H. Highway Department project number B-2176 map dated May 3, 1977; thereby confirming its status as an abandoned Class VI road by virtue of non-maintenance for more than five successive years.

ARTICLE 26. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal or state grants which may become available during the course of the year and as otherwise stated in the warrant.

ARTICLE 27. A rising vote of thanks was given George Cummings for serving as Selectman, in a fine, commendable manner. He, in turn, expressed appreciation to William Davis for his work on the town office/firehouse plans, to Harold Janeway and the Building Committee members for their time and efforts. They were also given a rising vote of thanks.

The meeting adjourned at 12:15 A.M.

1. To hear the reports of the district commissioners and any vote relating thereto.
2. To choose all necessary officers as follows:
  - a. To choose a clerk to serve until the next annual meeting.
  - b. To choose a moderator to serve until the next annual meeting.
  - c. To choose a treasurer to serve until the next annual meeting.
  - d. To choose an auditor to serve until the next annual meeting.
  - e. To choose one (1) commissioner to serve until the annual meeting of 1990.
  - f. To choose one (1) commissioner to serve until the annual meeting of 1992.
3. To adopt a budget and make necessary appropriations from water revenues and other available funds for the ensuing year.

4. To see if the District will vote to authorize the commissioners to withdraw and expend the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000) from the Water Survey, Exploration and Engineering (Capital Reserve) Fund for the purpose of contracting for the fabrication and installation of street signs within the District at locations to be designated by the commissioners.
5. ARTICLE 9. To authorize the District Commissioners to pursue the ongoing management and sale of harvestable timber with profit going into the Water Survey, Exploration & Engineering Fund (Capital Reserve).

It was moved and seconded. The vote was unanimous.

ARTICLE 10. To authorize the District Commissioners to drain the lake in order to contract with a private contractor to dredge the lake bottom, with payment for this work being the dredge material itself and/or monies allocated in the budget under Lake Maintenance.

It was moved and seconded. The vote was unanimous.

ARTICLE 11. To authorize the District Commissioners to be able to disconnect water service for the following reasons:

- (a) failure to pay the water tariff within 45 days of billing, or arrangements for payment.
- (b) unreasonable refusal of access to customer's premises for a necessary inspection.
- (c) unauthorized or fraudulent use or procurement of water, tampering with connections or other utility property.
- (d) existence of conditions dangerous to the health, safety or utility service of others.
- (e) abandonment by customer of his/her premises.

The Commissioners will utilize applicable parts of the New Hampshire Code of Administrative Rules as provided by the Public Utilities Commission.

It was moved and seconded. The vote was unanimous.

ARTICLE 12. To authorize the District Commissioners to limit future water hookups pursuant to the State Water Supply & Pollution Control Commission's assessment outlined in its July 7, 1987 report.

It was moved and seconded. The vote was unanimous.

OTHER BUSINESS: Since a Master Plan must be established an Ad Hoc Committee should be formed. People were asked to sign up for this Committee.
