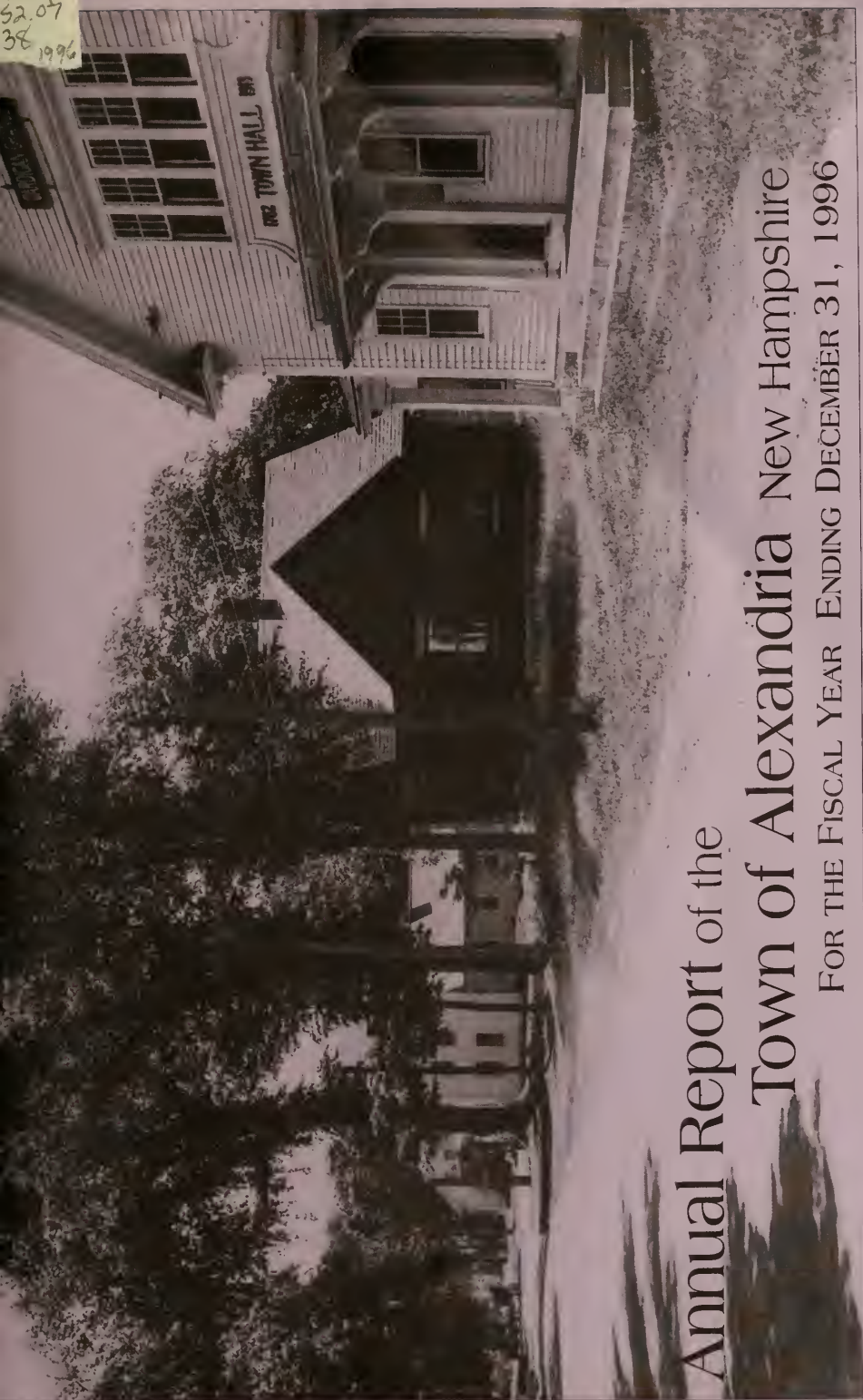

1997 TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Alexandria, in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Alexandria on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March 1997 at eleven o'clock in the morning to vote, by official ballot, on Articles 1, 2, and 3.

The Polls will be open for voting on Articles 1, 2, and 3 from 11:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, the Eleventh Day of March, 1997:

1. To choose for the ensuing year the following Town Officers:

Selectman for three years
Town Clerk/Tax Collector for three years
Town Treasurer for one year
Trustee of Trust Funds for three years
Road Agent for three years
Police Officer for one year
Sexton of the Cemeteries for one year
Budget Committee Member for seven years
Planning Board Member (1) for two years
Planning Board Members (2) for three years

2. To choose all necessary School District Officers for the Newfound Area School District for the ensuing year.

3. Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 40:13 to allow official ballot voting on all issues before the School District?

You are further notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Alexandria on Thursday, the Thirteenth day of March 1997, at seven o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Two Hundred Fifty-one Thousand Nine Hundred Forty-four Dollars (\$251,944.) for operation of the Town. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise One Hundred Seventy-seven Thousand Four Hundred Seventy-seven Dollars (\$177,477.) and appropriate Two Hundred Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$230,000.) for the maintenance, sealing, reconstruction and plowing of all Class V Town roads and for posting of all Class VI Town roads. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. Highway funding would then be:

Town Funds	\$177,477.
Highway Block Grant	52,523.
Total	<u>\$230,000.</u>

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Ninety-five Thousand Dollars (\$95,000.) for the repair and paving of one mile of Cass Mill Road and the repair and paving of the Thissell Road. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000.), authorize the withdrawal of Twenty-two Thousand Dollars (\$22,000.) from the Police Department Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund and appropriate the Twenty-nine Thousand Dollars (\$29,000.) for the purchase of a new, equipped four-wheel drive Explorer for the Police Department. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Forty-seven Thousand Dollars (\$47,000.) for the operation and maintenance of the Alexandria Police Department. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Sixty-eight Thousand Dollars (\$68,000.) for Solid Waste Disposal. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Eleven Thousand Two Hundred Eighty-seven Dollars (\$11,287.) for the following health and welfare agencies:

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Nine Thousand Three Hundred Fifty-five Dollars (\$9,355.) for the support of the Bristol Community Center.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Six Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars (\$6,700.) for the purchase of Tax Maps software.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.) for the support of the Newfound Region Chamber of Commerce Fourth of July Fireworks.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000.) to the following Capital Reserve Funds.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to establish compensation for the position of Town Clerk/Tax Collector by means of salary and benefits of Twenty-five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.) per month and abolish other means of compensation for this position, to be reviewed annually and to become effective April 1, 1997.
16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen, in addition to the authority conferred upon the Selectmen at the 1996 Town Meeting under Warrant Article #19 to dispose of the house located on Washburn Road, Tax Map 16 Lot 666.10 through sale/removal or demolition, to lease the building to the Alexandria Historical Society for a nominal sum of \$1.00 per year with the condition that any improvements to the structure will be made by the Society at no expense to the Town.
17. To See if the Town will vote to accept a paved roadway known as Fairview Lane. This roadway is located in the Fowler River Bluffs Subdivision, off of Fowler River Road. The Selectmen and Planning Board approve this acceptance.
18. To see if the Town will vote to accept the first 775 feet of a gravel roadway know as Fox Hollow Road, beginning measurement from the intersection of Fairview Lane and Fox Hollow Road and continuing for 775 feet. Acceptance subject to the terms and conditions set forth by the Board of Selectmen. The Selectmen and Planning Board approve this acceptance.
19. Shall we modify the elderly exemptions from property tax in the Town of Alexandria, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers to be as follows:
- for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years of age, Five Thousand (\$5,000.) Dollars
 - for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years of age, Ten Thousand (\$10,000.) Dollars
 - for a person 80 years of age or older, Twenty Thousand (\$20,000.) Dollars.
- To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least five (5) years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married for a least five (5) years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$13,400.00 or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$20,400.00; and own net assets not in excess of \$35,000.00 (excluding the value of the person's residence).

1997 TOWN WARRANT - continued

20. To see if the Town will vote to enact the following Ordinance effective upon its enactment:
Required voter approval of facilities for the commercial production of flammable or hazardous substances in Alexandria.

Whereas:

- (1) Oil refineries and other facilities for the commercial production of hazardous substances may present a threat to public health, safety and general welfare within a community;
- (2) It is accordingly in the public interest to control the siting of such facilities within a local community; and
- (3) Voters in such local community have a vital interest in exercising options as to such siting.

Now Therefore,

1. Notwithstanding the provisions of any other Ordinance, an oil refinery or any facility for the commercial production of flammable liquid or gas or any hazardous substance, as defined in RSA 339-A:2 II, shall not be located in the Town of Alexandria without:

A. a vote of approval of a majority of the voters present and voting on the question at an annual meeting or a special meeting called for such purpose, and

B. a public hearing held by the Selectmen at least 14 days and not more than 30 days prior to the date on which the vote will be taken. Notice of such hearing shall be advertised in a paper of general circulation in the town and posted in at least two public places.

All votes on the question shall be taken by written ballot. The following question shall be placed on the ballot: "Shall an oil refinery or facility for the commercial production of flammable liquid or gas of hazardous substance be permitted within the Town of Alexandria?" Said question shall be printed in the form prescribed by RSA 656:13. If a majority of those voting on the question shall vote in the affirmative, approval of the location of such oil refinery or production facility in the Town shall be deemed granted, subject to any applicable zoning or other restrictions of the Town. If a majority of those voting on the question shall vote in the negative, such approval shall be deemed not granted, and no oil refinery or aforesaid production facility may be located in the Town unless approval is subsequently granted in accordance with this Ordinance.

1997 TOWN WARRANT - continued

2. This Ordinance shall not prevent the continued operation of any facility in active legal use at the time of passage of this Ordinance, unless such facility is reasonably deemed to present a threat to the public health, safety and general welfare.

3. The invalidity of any provision of this Ordinance shall not affect the validity or applicability of any other provision. (Article submitted by petition.)

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before this Meeting.

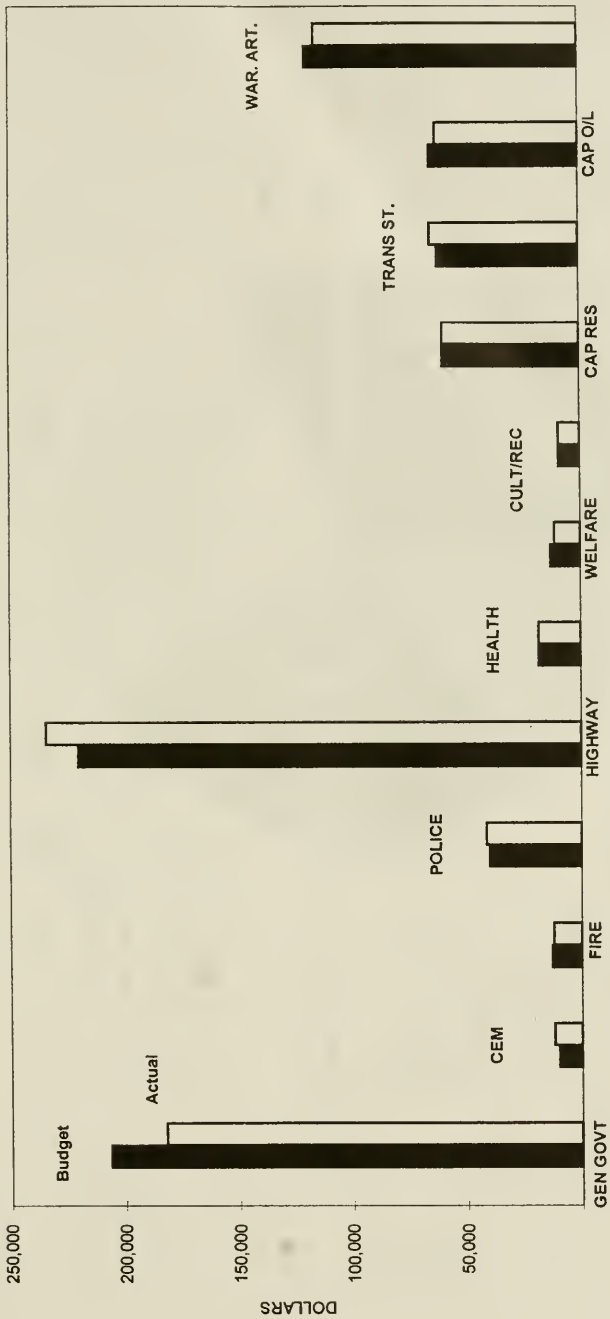

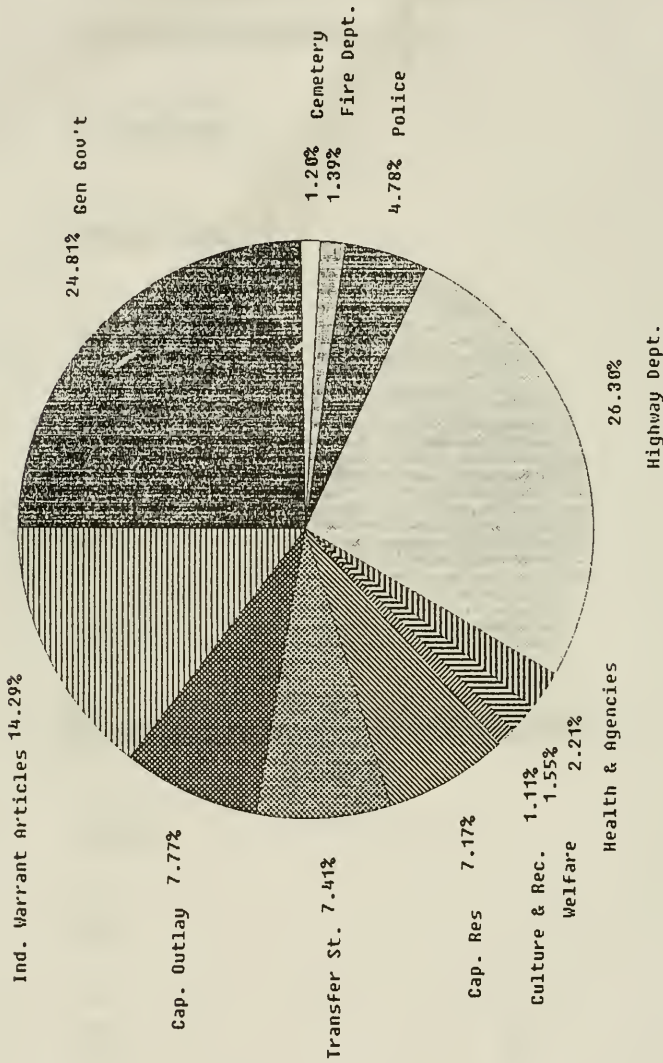

1996 TOWN BUDGET VS ACTUAL EXPENSES





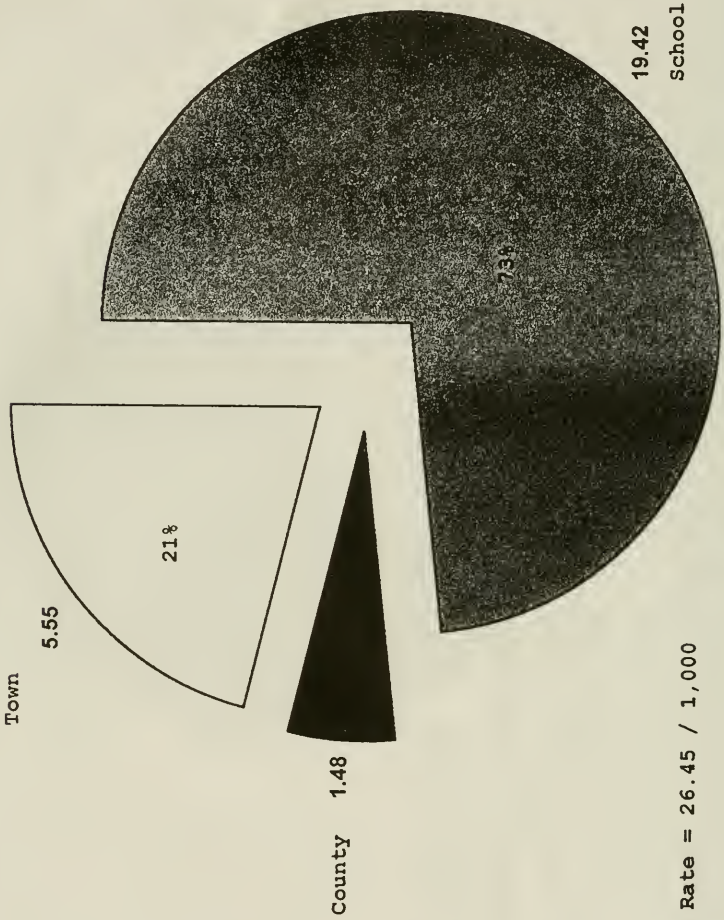

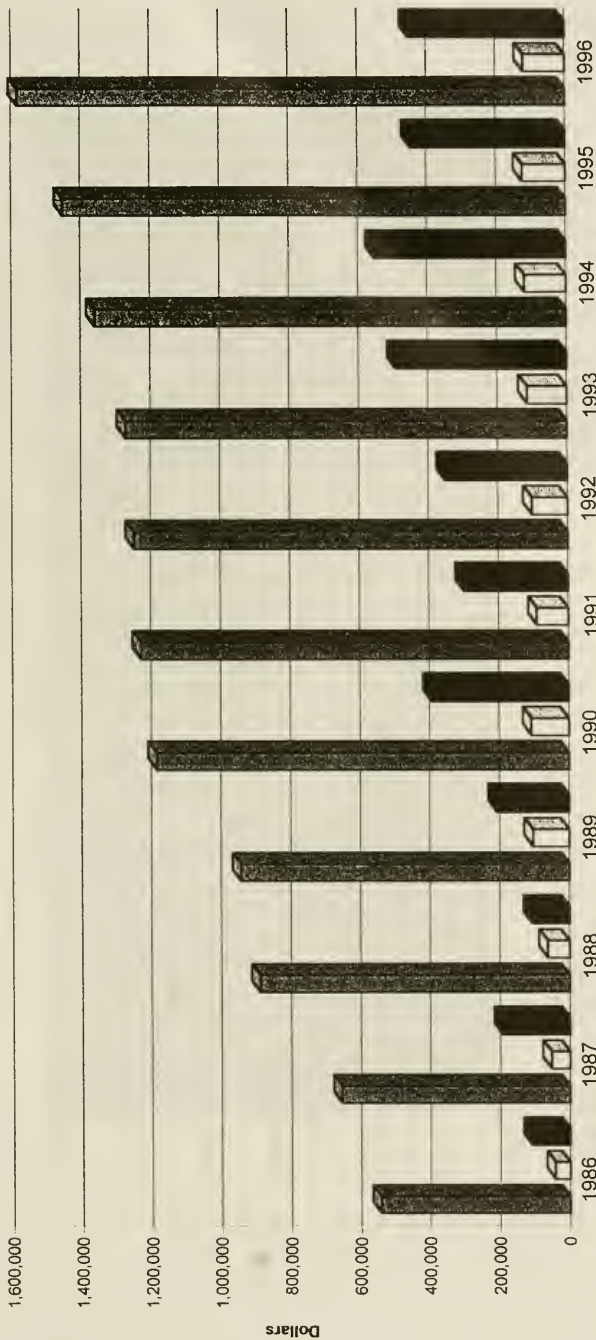
Net Appropriations By Year

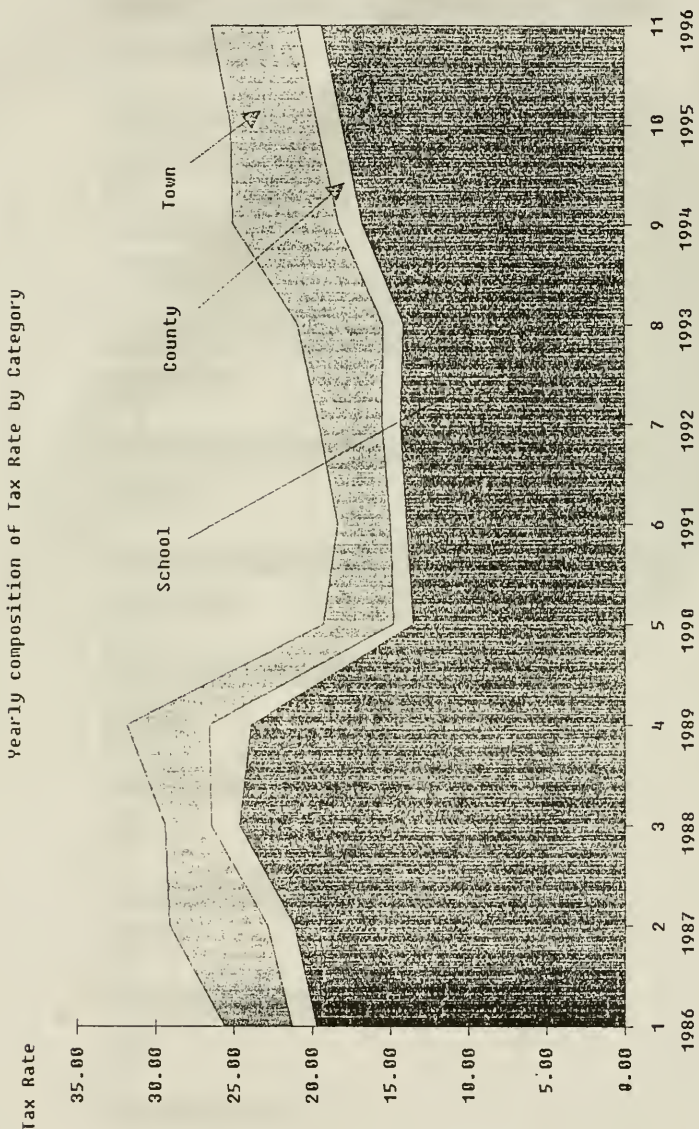
1996 Tax Rate in Dollars by Appropriation



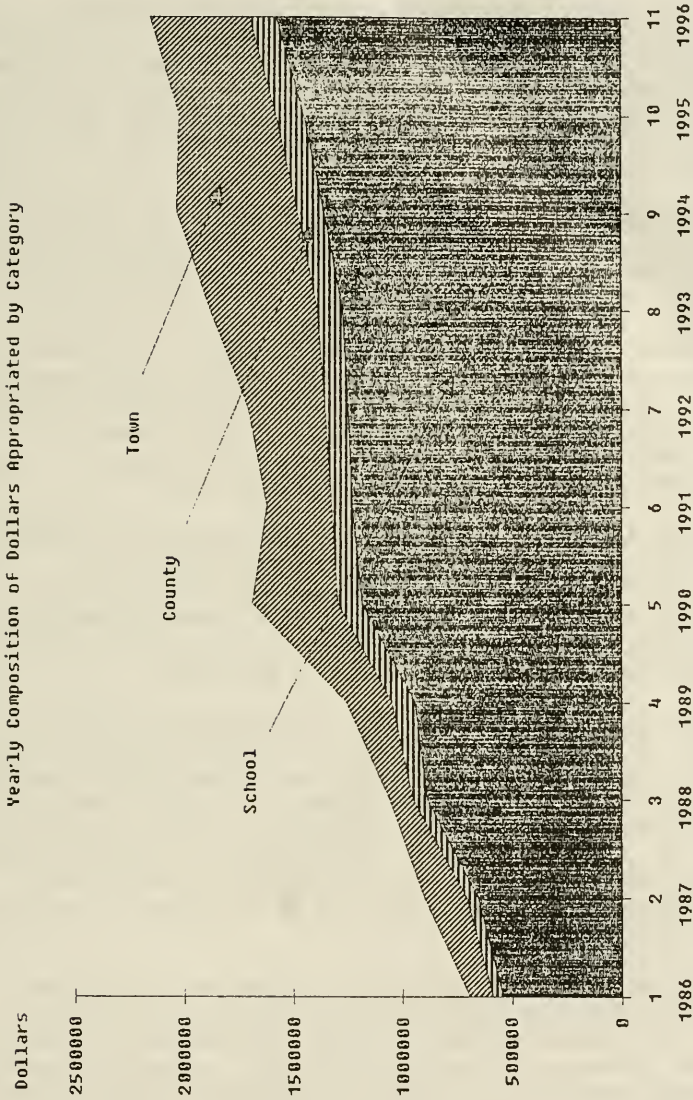

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Alexandria, New Hampshire, as of and for the year ended December 31, 1995, as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of Town officials. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the general purpose financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by Town officials, as well as evaluating the overall general purpose financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As more fully described in Note 1, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the financial statements of the General Fixed Asset Account Group, which should be included in order to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Asset Account Group is not known.

As described in Note 1, the Town has recognized tax revenues of \$359,499. in the General Fund which were not received in cash within sixty days of year end as required by generally accepted accounting principles (GASB Interpretation 3). Town officials believe, and we concur, that the application of this accounting principle, which would result in a decrease in the undesignated General Fund balance by \$337,332. to (\$22,167.) would give a misleading impression of the Town's ability to meet its current and future obligations.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the general purpose financial statements of the omission described in the third paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to in the first paragraph present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Alexandria, New Hampshire as of December 31, 1995, and the results of its operations and the cash flows of its non-expendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT - continued

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The combining financial statement and schedules listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Alexandria, New Hampshire. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

ROAD AGENT REPORT

First I'd like to say, I greatly appreciate the patience the people of Alexandria have shown during the reconstruction and maintenance of our Town roads. I would also like to thank the Highway Dept. crew for doing an excellent job. Without them a lot of these projects would be impossible to do.

The 1996 winter season will be a hard one to forget. With at least 26 days of snowfall and a total of 116 inches of snow, it kept the crew and myself very busy keeping roads passable. We also had 5 days of freezing rain and 1 day of heavy rain that caused a few minor erosion problems during the winter months. With the freezing rain, we used an enormous amount of sand, more than during a snowstorm.

We started off the spring season by preparing one mile of Cass Mill Road for reconstruction. We replaced 23 sets of culverts before we had G.M.I. Asphalt Corp. come in with reclaimers to grind up the old asphalt. Next I subcontracted the gravel and hauling of the gravel to Cass Mill Road to J. P. Morrison Construction of Bristol. They added 1600 cubic yards of 1 1/2" crushed gravel over the reclaimed base which raised the grade of the road 4 to 6 inches. Then it was fine-graded and compacted before paving with a 2" coarse asphalt mix, 20 feet wide by 5280 feet long. The total tonnage of asphalt used was 1384.67 tons. The project was slightly over budget because we raised the road in a few spots to get it above a damp base. Next year we hope to do another one mile which will bring it to Jewell Road. Then there is only 1/2 mile left to do the following year. There are many other paved roads that are in desperate need of resurfacing.

Some of the other things we have done are: graded, raked, added a total of 4,000 cubic yards of 1 1/2" crushed gravel to all our graveled roads, patched potholes on paved roads with 110 tons of cold patch mix, replaced 34 sets of culverts, repaired washouts on at least ten roads that were damaged by heavy rain, stockpiled 4,500 cubic yards of screened sand, mowed all road sides, and maintained all the equipment the Highway Dept. owns.

ROAD AGENT REPORT - Continued

With these extra projects, I find it hard to keep up with some of the basic road maintenance. There is a lot more that could be done, but we don't have time to do them. The community is requesting more services from its Highway Department than it has in recent years. I feel the Department is going to need an additional employee in the near future to keep up with the growing community. We are a three-man department, counting myself, but during the winter months I hire a part-time person to help with the plowing.

With the heavy rain we had this summer and fall, a few of our roads were heavily damaged by erosion. On July 13-14, we lost a section of Washburn Road, leaving it impassable for a few days until we could get a subcontractor to repair it with heavy equipment. This was an unexpected expense, and FEMA did not share in the expense. At the time of the washout, we were in the middle of preparing Cass Mill Road for paving and could not reschedule, which is why I hired J. P. Morrison Construction to repair Washburn Road. On April 23 we lost another section of Washburn Road and part of Thissell Road. We have corrected the water problem by increasing culvert pipe sizes to handle the heavy flow of water we have seen in recent years.

On October 23-24 we had more major rainfall which washed out sections of eight graveled roads in Town. These were all repaired before freezing weather set in. FEMA declared a Federal emergency, so Alexandria was reimbursed \$13,281. from the Federal Government to offset the cost of repairs to the roads that were damaged by flooding rains.

As of August 12, 1996 the Highway Department has been short an employee due to medical reasons. We hired a temporary employee on November 25 to take his place until he is capable of returning to work. Being short one worker, we were not able to do all the maintenance we wanted to do before snowfall.

ROAD AGENT REPORT - continued

The Highway Department purchased a new 1997 Ford L-8000 dump truck with a 10 ft. stainless steel sander and a 12 ft. power angle plow. The new truck has cut our plowing and sanding time down considerably. With the equipment the Town has, we could definitely keep a fourth employee very busy. The Highway Department has three equipped Ford L-8000 dump trucks, one Chevy 1-ton dump, one John Deere motor grader, one Caterpillar backhoe, one Case front-end loader, and two York rakes. The Department will need to replace the Caterpillar backhoe in the near future.

In closing I'd like to thank my wife and children for being patient with my job; it takes up a lot of my time, from being with my family.

TO REPORT A FIRE DIAL 911; give the dispatcher the exact address location of the fire and, when possible, stay on the telephone so that further information can be obtained. Free 911 stickers are available upon request.

Another year has gone by and the AVFD has continued to respond and meet the challenges and needs of our community as an all-volunteer rural fire department. The men of the AVFD have worked hard all year putting in many hours of training, working on projects, maintenance on equipment and just keeping everything in readiness for the next call. Each call means taking the time to respond and help those in need, providing the best support and service that we can. Then afterward there is equipment to be rechecked, trucks to fuel, and incident reports to be filed.

The AVFD continues to offer chimney inspections and promotes fire safety in the home, our village school, and through other inspection and enforcement programs as required. There are no fees charged for our services, but donations are always appreciated by those who are able to do so. Our annual appeal letter continues to be an important part of our fundraising activities to support and defray budgetary items and to ensure another year of positive growth with quality services. The Town budget appropriation is another very important part of the financial picture, ensuring the success and continued quality of service to our community. We are very thankful for your continued support, and that of the community as a whole.

One of the highlights of the past year was the announcement of Firefighter of the Year, Chief Engineer Kenneth Patten, by the Insurance Women of Central New Hampshire. The organization gives the award annually to an outstanding firefighter chosen from entries around the State. Ken Patten, a charter member of the AVFD was chosen for his "exceptional dedication and pride in firefighting." Patten received a plaque and the AVFD was given a plaque to retain in the station for the year.

ALEXANDRIA VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT - continued

The AVFD has purchased a "Rescue Alive" ice rescue vessel. The 22 sq. ft. unit consists of two foam-filled pontoons capable of supporting 600 lbs. The unit unfolds readily and can be easily deployed in less than one minute and weighs only 88 lbs. The AVFD purchased the unit because of Newfound Lake; that no other water/ice rescue equipment quite like it is readily available. The unit was placed in service immediately and placed on the Bristol Fire Department rescue truck. Both departments work closely together and they have cold water rescue suits, safety lines, and a Zodiac rubber boat. "We felt that this was an opportunity for the AVFD to do something important for the lake area and to show our gratitude to the Bristol Fire Department for sharing some of their special tools and equipment that we have called on them for," said AVFD Chief Francis Butler. Most important is that the devise is readily available and may save a life someday, anywhere in the Newfound area.

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REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing any open burning.

Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000. and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are ten Forest Rangers who work for the N.H. Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. State Forest Rangers are available to assist communities with forest fire suppression, prevention and training programs as well as the enforcement of forest fire and timber harvest laws. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our office at 271-2217.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments.

Tri-County Community Action, a private, not-for-profit agency requests funding assistance for our Outreach Program in Alexandria in order to provide necessary social services. For 1997, we would like to request \$416.00 from your town. This represents a modest 4% increase over the allocation which we received from the Town of Alexandria for 1996.

Families and individuals in need in the Town of Alexandria are served from our new office in the Whole Village Family Resource Center located in Plymouth (formerly the Campton office). Therefore, we are asking for your continued financial assistance and a small increase.

Community Contact (formerly Outreach) is the field services arm of Tri-County Community Action. Our purpose is to assist low-income, elderly and handicapped persons to solve problems and to meet their physical and financial needs. Community Contact staff accomplish this purpose by providing information, counseling, referrals, guidance, organizational assistance, and by effectively linking households with CAP assistance programs and utilizing community resources.

With your help, we anticipate being able to provide at least the same level of services to Alexandria this year. Through January 31, 1997, we have obligated \$10,305.00 in fuel assistance benefits to 28 Alexandria households. Several more applications are in progress.

TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION - continued

1996 Community Contact Report to the Town of Alexandria

Community Contact (formerly Outreach) is the field services arm of Tri-County Community Action. Our purpose is to assist low-income, elderly and handicapped persons to solve problems and to meet their physical and financial needs. Community Contact staff accomplish this purpose by providing information, counseling, referrals, guidance, organizational assistance, and by effectively linking households with CAP assistance programs and utilizing community resources.

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THE TASK FORCE AGAINST DOMESTIC AND SEXUAL VIOLENCE

On behalf of The Task Force Against Domestic and Sexual Violence, I would like to thank you for your past support. During 1996, your contribution helped the 364 clients that the Task Force served. This includes 58 women and children that were housed at the Task Force shelter. The following Task Force services are provided free of charge:

- * 24 hour crisis line staffed by trained volunteers.
- * Confidential emergency shelter, food and transportation.
- * Support groups for domestic violence survivors. Separate support groups serve adults and children.
- * Hospital and police accompaniment. Court and social service advocacy.
- * Community education programs for schools, civic organizations, etc. Training programs for volunteers, law enforcement, and other professionals.
- * Peer education programs in area high schools, covering domestic violence and building healthy relationships.
- * Walk-in office at Whole Village Family Resource Center.

This year we are requesting \$800.00 from the Town of Alexandria to further support our services to both adult and child victims of domestic and sexual violence. The amount requested is based on town population from the 1990 census.

LAKES REGION COMMUNITY SERVICES COUNCIL

During the past year, Lakes Region Community Services Council has continued to provide comprehensive services to the residents of Alexandria who are developmentally disabled. Such services as residential, vocational and transportation have long become an integral part of their lives.

Last year the Town of Alexandria honored our request for support with \$600. We greatly appreciate this generosity, and have earmarked the funds for new capital expenditures within our transportation system.

We remain alert to the fiscal pressures that town governments continue to face. In keeping with this, we would like to ask again for the same amount of \$600. that we have received in previous years. It is our hope that you will look favorably on this request. We would leave any possible increase to your discretion, given it may be within the means of the Town.

The "Greater Laconia Transit Agency" (GLTA) is a sub-corporation of the Council. It provides transportation to LRCSC clients, as well as the general public. During the past year, it has expanded its services to a steadily increasing ridership.

Alexandria's support for our Agency has been very meaningful in helping us to operate a comprehensive community-based system of care. Without it, our mentally retarded citizens, who are our primary responsibility, would be completely isolated in their homes. These transportation services are therefore indispensable for a variety of day programs, whether they be rehabilitative activities or gainful employment.

We greatly appreciate the assistance that the Town of Alexandria has given us and earnestly hope that you will continue to support us in our efforts to help your developmentally disabled citizens to lead meaningful lives. Later in the year, I will attend a Selectmen's Meeting, whereon I can answer any specific questions on the scope of our many services at that time.

PEMI-BAKER YOUTH & FAMILY SERVICES COUNCIL
1996 Annual Report

The Pemi-Baker Youth & Family Services Council, Inc. is an organization that is dedicated to promoting community-wide approaches which aid in the development of healthy youths and their families. The Council currently coordinates four programs which are available to people in Eastern Grafton County (Lincoln to Alexandria):

1. Juvenile Court Diversion: A voluntary program for first-time juvenile offenders which holds them accountable for their actions without going to court. The Diversion process involves the participants with volunteers from the community who develop a contract with each youth and their family. Contracts may include community service, referrals to other human service agencies and programs, personal development tasks, etc. We have found that, of the 39 students who graduated from Diversion in 1995, more than 89% have not committed a subsequent offense since.

2. The Challenge Course: A 15-hour early intervention program for teens which focuses on issues surrounding alcohol, tobacco and other drugs. Courses are non-judgmental and confidential. Teens in the small groups are asked to assess their relationships with these substances and learn what they can do to reduce their use or stop using entirely. Additional topics of discussion include high-risk behaviors and HIV/AIDS education.

3. Information and Referral: Provides area residents with a clearinghouse of information on regional human service agencies and programs. People with a variety of needs can receive free and confidential assistance on how to access these resources. Callers in the past have requested information on how to report suspected child abuse, how to access public assistance or counseling services, where to find after-school activities for children, etc. The Council also publishes a comprehensive Guide to Community Resources for use by towns, police, schools and other human service providers.

4. The Rated PG Program: A new program for parents and guardians who would like to receive more information about alcohol and other drugs. The program discusses how to talk with their kids about these subjects without running into a brick wall. It also provides information on what they and their children can do to reduce the risk of ever experiencing an alcohol-related health or impairment problem.

PEMI-BAKER YOUTH & FAMILY SERVICES COUNCIL - continued

In the past year, the Council: has become one of the agencies working together in the Whole Village Family Resource Center, continued to co-write the semimonthly "Families First" column in the Record Enterprise; provided administrative support to the 5th Annual Conference for Parents; and involved the eighth grade students at PES in the Middle School Challenge Course.

In addition to the programs listed above, in 1997 we will also be: coordinating a conference for all 200 eighth graders in SAU #48 and Ashland; expanding our presence in the Lincoln, Newfound and other areas; and organizing several other exciting projects in the 17+ communities we serve.

PLYMOUTH REGIONAL CLINIC

Plymouth Regional Clinic is requesting that area towns appropriate funds to the Clinic in their 1997 budgets. The Plymouth Regional Clinic is a nonprofit, all-volunteer organization providing general medical care to area residents who have limited incomes and no health insurance. The Clinic has been open one evening a week since July 1994 and has provided care for almost 600 patient visits. We have seen patients of all ages and for varying medical complaints, from minor ailments to life-threatening illness, with many seeking treatment for illnesses or conditions which have gone unattended because the patient could not afford medical care. Our volunteer social workers have assisted many patients in identifying other available services which might help them. Please note that in July of this year, the clinic moved to the offices of Family Planning at the Whole Village Family Resource Center on Highland Street and changed its evening of operation to Tuesdays.

Plymouth Regional Clinic has managed to keep its operating expenses low through the generous donation of in-kind services and space by Family Planning, Plymouth State College, Speare Memorial Hospital and area businesses; as well as the volunteer services provided by area physicians, nurse practitioners, nurses, social workers and others. As in the past, the Clinic is seeking funds for three main purposes, among others: to cover operating expenses such as insurance, medical and office supplies, and licensing fees; to hire a part-time administrator to ensure the Clinic's effective ongoing operation; and to create a fund to allow the Clinic to pay for patient prescriptions - one of the highest medical costs many patients face. In order to raise the necessary funds, Plymouth Regional Clinic will solicit donations from area individuals and businesses, and will be applying for grant money. In addition, the Clinic is requesting that area towns place in their 1997 budgets (for Fiscal Year 1998) an appropriation of \$1,000.00, or any portion of this which the town feels is appropriate. It is hoped that the towns will realize some savings in the medical account of their welfare budgets due to the Clinic's services.

If you have questions not addressed or would like more information, please feel free to call the Clinic Administrator, Eileen Towne, at 536-4467. We hope the towns will support our efforts to meet the medical needs of community members who cannot afford health care. Thank you for your consideration.

REPORT TO THE CITIZENS OF COUNCIL DISTRICT ONE

It is an honor to report to you as a member of the New Hampshire Executive Council. The Executive Council is five in number and serves much like a Board of Directors at the top of your Executive Branch of State Government in Concord. We vote on most contracts over \$2,500. to outside agencies, individuals and municipalities; also major permits to use State waters, 267 unclassified positions as Commissioners and Directors within the Executive Branch of State Government and the entire Judicial Branch of NH State Government is voted in by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Executive Council. We also vote on gubernatorial nominations of hundreds of citizens to various boards and commissions as prescribed by NH law. Anyone desiring further information should write or call our State House Office (listed below).

Citizens in this region should be attentive to several projects:

- 1) The State-wide Health Care Council's 18-month planning project will be coming to conclusion in December of 1997. There are three very active Councils in this District. Information can be obtained by calling Commissioner Terry Morton, Department of Health and Human Services at 1-800-852-3345.
- 2) The ten-year highway planning process will be underway this coming summer and fall. I will be conducting at least three hearings in this district to ascertain regional needs. Information on this project can be obtained by calling Commissioner Leon Kenison, Department of Transportation, at 271-3735.
- 3) The NH Joint Tourist Promotional Program will, I expect, be funded at least with \$500,000. to be matched by local Chambers of Commerce and tourist groups to promote your region. Information on this program is available from Commissioner Robb Thomson, Department of Resources and Economic Development, at 271-2411.
- 4) There is approximately \$172,000. waiting to be matched by local economic development promotion dollars from local groups. Information can be obtained on this program from Director Norman Storrs, Economic Development, at 271-2341.

5) There is about 10 million dollars waiting for applications from local governments for Community Development Block Grants to improve your local town and area. Information on how to apply can be obtained by calling Director Jeff Taylor, Office of State Planning, at 271-2155.

6) Local towns, cities, counties and eligible organizations should be aware of the large Federal and State Surplus Distribution Programs (the State surplus distribution center is open to the public at White Farm on Clinton Street in Concord NH on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. 7) Citizens and groups concerned with disabilities should be aware of the large number of services available from the Developmental Disabilities Council by calling Director Alan Robichaud at 271-3236.
