ALTON WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

- To the Inhabitants of the Town of Alton, in the County of Belknap, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:
- You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House, in said Alton, on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:
- Article 1. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay all necessary charges of the Town for the ensuing year.
- Article 2. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of highways and bridges for the ensuing year, in addition to that required by law.
- Article 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the removal of snow from the Town's highways.
- Article 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to be expended on roads leading to shore property, in conjunction with the amounts raised and expended by property owners.
- Article 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of Tarvia and the application of same.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$865.67 provided that the State will contribute \$5,771.15 for Class V roads, so called.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary monies in anticipation of taxes.

WARRANT (continued)

- Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the decoration of Soldiers' graves.
- Article 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Public Library in addition to that required by law.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to be expended under State supervision for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$344.00 to the Lakes Region Association of New Hampshire, which is one hundredth of one percent of the assessed valuation, for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town.
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for spraying trees along the highways.
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,900.00 for band concerts, summer and winter activities.
- Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to lay 600' of 15" cement drain pipe and install (6) catch basins on School Street.
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to rebuild a portion of the so called "Letter S Road"
- Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to rebuild so called "Riverside Drive" passing on the West side of the Merrymeeting River.

WARRANT (continued)

- Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Municipal Improvement Fund and to authorize the Selectmen to transfer a like sum to the Municipal Improvement Fund from the surplus of cash on hand on December 31, 1952.
- Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$6,600.00, providing the State will contribute \$4,400.00 for the construction of a bridge crossing Beaver Brook, near the old "Evans" place, so called, and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow the necessary funds on three long term notes of \$2,200.00 each for the construction of the same.
- Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of House Bill #44, an act relative to retirement of bonds for Class IV and Class V Highways and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow on long term notes or bonds the amounts necessary to cover the following Class V construction, if and when this Bill becomes a law.
- Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the following roads or portion of roads: The road leading from Fleming's Corner to the Barnstead line—a part of the road leading from Fleming's Corner to Gilmanton, starting at the old Clough's place, so called, continuing to the Gilmanton line—and the road connecting the Old Cove to the road that leads to Camp Kaybeyun.
- Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 to take care of the present emergency that exists in the Police and Fire Departments until December 31, 1953, due to the installation of the dial system of telephones.
- Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for advertising "This is New Hampshire" in an advertising program sponsored by the magazine "New Hampshire Profile."

WARRANT (continued)

- Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the support of Huggins Hospital at Wolfeboro, N. H.
- Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the support of Laconia Hospital at Laconia, N. H.
- Article 26. To see what action the Town will take in regard to renting the Community House at Alton Bay.
- Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to abolish the present Water Commission. (By Petition)
- Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to create the office of Superintendent of Water Works to be either elected by popular vote or appointed by the Selectmen, said official to be subject to supervision by the Board of Selectmen whether elected or appointed. (By Petition)
- Article 29. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 30. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, to elect one Selectman for three years, one library Trustee for three years, one Trustee of trust funds for three years and one Water Commissioner for three years.

To the Taxpayers and Inhabitants of the Town of Alton:

Again it is my pleasure to present you my annual report as Collector for the year ending December 31, 1952. As in my previous reports, I have endeavored to give a detailed picture of the activities of this department so that you, the Taxpayers, may study the various accounts and the condition of each.

The total collections for 1952 were almost \$31,000.00 in excess of those of 1951 due in part to a considerable larger warrant, partly to the fact that both 1951 and 1952 Timber Yield Tax Warrants were committed to the Collector during 1952 and also due to the fact that the amount of the uncollected items was reduced approximately \$6,000.00 from that at the end of 1951.

REPORT of the ALTON FIRE DEPARTMENT

To the Citizens of the Town of Alton

During the year 1952 your Fire Department answered nine calls for Fires in homes. These calls were for one house trailer and eight wooden dwellings. The total loss from these Fires amounted to four thousand dollars with insurance covering twelve hundred dollars of this loss making our Fire loss for the year twenty eight hundred dollars. We responded with one truck to one call from a neighboring town for assistance.

You and your Fire Department are faced with a serious problem; The best way within the bounds of economy of notifying the Department of a Fire or other emergency in which we can be helpful, with the least amount of delay. This problem is brought about by the installation of the new Dial Telephone system for our town which will eliminate all our Telephone Operators in this town. Your Fire Department has been studying this problem for several months and feel that the voters have two choices in taking care of this.

One method of handling this situation is to hire men to stay at a permanent location and be immediately available to answer telephone calls for Police or Fire protection.

The other method is with a system of telephones installed in various homes and business places that would be equipped to handle incoming calls only. When the assigned number would be dialled for the Fire Department all the phones in this Red Network would ring at the same time. Any of the phones then may be answered and recieve the Fire call. Each location of a phone would have a switch for sounding the Fire Alarm. On recieving the call the person answering would sound the Fire Alarm to indicate the type Fire and alert the Firemen as follows:

One blast to indicate a chimney fire.

Two blasts to indicate a house fire.

Three blasts to indicate other fires.

Five blasts to indicate any other emergency, Firemen to report to station.

On arrival at the Fire Station a number would be set up on the Fire Alarm system to indicate the location of the Fire as follows:

PROPOSED FIRE ALARM NUMBERS

These numbers are intended to give the Firemen the approximate location of a Fire without having to call anyone for this information. The town is divided into areas with the first number of the number to indicate the general area, and the last two numbers the location in the area.

To set up and accurrately transmit these numbers it is necessary to replace our present Fire Alarm System with a new system. Our present system is very old and outmoded. The majority of the Fire Alarm wire on our poles is bare of insulation and not properly positioned on the poles. With a new system if one wire should be broken the alarm will still operate through the ground, at the same time a signal is given that there is trouble on the line so that repairs could be made. This system is also non interferring that is if any box is pulled it will complete its signal before any other box pulled at nearly the same time will blow its signal. The transmitter at the Fire Station has a keyboard like an adding machine for setting up numbers and does not use gears as at present.

To maintain our present favorable insurance rates and for the protection of our extensive valuation of real estate a reliable Fire Alarm System is a must.

I wish also to call to your attention the need of two additional doors at the Fire Station. This would not be very expensive and would give the Firemen a good station house.

(b) Report of the Superintendent

School Year 1952-53

Teachers

I think nearly all will agree that a good faculty is the foremost element in having a good school. Your Superintendent and School Board were greatly concerned late last summer that good teachers for all the vacancies were just not obtainable. We are pleased to report that all positions were filled in time, with qualified and experienced teachers. Though many adjustments have had to be made as the improved facilities were completed, new subjects were offered, and teachers of music added, your school is functioning smoothly. Fortunately, you retained a capable, experienced group of elementary teachers. Mr. Richard Lovejoy, our new principal, has demonstrated real leadership in taking over the difficult task of re-organizing our high school, and has had fine cooperation from his staff. I call your attention to the chart later in this report giving information about all of your teachers. Desiring good schools and realizing the importance of high quality teachers, I trust that our community will do all it can in terms of cooperation, friendliness, and compensation to retain our present faculty.

Curriculum

Relatively small high schools always have difficulty in trying to offer all of the courses to fit the needs of all of the pupils. It is seldom possible to compete with the quality and offerings of larger high schools, at least to do so without excessive costs. It appears that we are quite successful now in approaching this goal. We are providing college preparatory courses, general courses, commercial courses, shop courses, and home making courses. Probably we are not giving as much training in physical education as desirable. Our faculty hasn't the time or training and our facilities are not adequate at present. As we start another new year, all of our programs should operate to the greatest advantage of our children. We can serve a few more tuition pupils in the high school until our increased numbers of elementary pupils reach the upper grades and fill all available space.

Improvements and Repairs

When your district voted generously in August to add the shop and to make major renovations in the present buildings, it did not seem logical to expect all of the work to be completed for use this year. However, before school started in September, most of the repairs had been finished and by the end of the Christmas vacation the new shop was completely in readiness. You are fortunate in having a School Board whose members have much ability in building and finance. Probably no other dis-

trict in New Hampshire has built and repaired so much for so little. Our school plant is now in excellent physical condition. It is a pleasure for teachers and pupils to work in such a clean, attractive, and well-equipped building.

The new budget for 1953-54 requests some money for floor improvement. We are investigating the practicability of covering those most nearly worn out with tile. Some can be refinished and saved for more years of wear by sanding and sealing. I strongly urge that a reasonable amount be voted each year to maintain our buildings and equipment in the best condition possible. In the long run, it is wise economy.

Within a short time, we must obtain more space for our increasing elementary enrollment. If we are to provide the best of instruction we should have fewer pupils for each teacher, particularly in the primary grades. We can add one or two rooms to our present building without great expense if this procedure seems wisest to the majority of our citizens.

Finances

Every effort is being made to spend the school money wisely, to provide what is needed for good instruction, good facilities, but to waste nothing. We have added an additional teacher, our instructor for industrial arts. Experienced teachers cost more to hire and to keep than beginners. Costs of improvements and the new addition have to be met each year as we pay off sums borrowed. Transportation costs have increased as children must be carried now from nearly all corners of town which is large in area. Supplies and books are more expensive. The effect of inflation adds its burden, too, more drastically than any other single factor to school costs. Though we have devoted many hours in an analysis of costs and discussion of minimum needs, the final budget recommended for the district's consideration is higher. I hope that the citizens will support the new budget, as good schools for better communities do cost money.

* * * * *

During the past half century of turmoil and change, the values of our American educational system have been apparent to all thinking citizens. Leaders of our past and present have expressed their faith in a public school system. Presidents Washington, Lincoln, Roosevelt, and now Eisenhower have made statements of its prominence among the important institutions of the free American society.

Perhaps some foreign leaders have recognized its possibilities more fully than we. They continue to use it as a device to twist minds, spread untruths, and promote isms that benefit the few at the expense of the many.

In our democracy, the ideals of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness are brought closer to realization by means of the free public school. As we govern ourselves, better conditions for all of our peoples depends upon a constantly improving citizenry. Our schools are generally recognized as the best means to promote this improvement, and are deserving of continued public belief and confidence.

Though occasional weaknesses are observed, and slurs are cast, our free public schools continue to survive political and economic emergencies, and wars. We constantly seek to improve as new methods are devised, and new needs of the children are demonstrated.

Part V. Auxiliary Activities, Special Reports

(a) Report of the High School Principal

I would like to commend the students of the high school for the way in which they have adjusted themselves to an almost entirely new faculty and to a definite program of study which the superintendent and I made out to cover the following courses: College, Commercial, Home Economics, Shop, and General. This in some cases resulted in unavoidable conflicts, but in the future these will be avoided, if one keeps within his chosen course. This programming has two definite advantages: 1. if the program is adhered to, one will have the requisite courses for college admittance, and, 2. in case of transfer, it means that the student can more likely continue his courses without interruption.

I would like further to point out for those who have not visited the school this year, that many changes have been made in the building, and all the rooms have been repainted in light, cheerful colors. A new room for the typing classes has been made from what was the upstairs hall---thus adding one more room to the high school and relieving the noise and confusion present in the main room last year.

We also have a new shop that is very much enjoyed by the students taking shop. This is an important addition to the program as it will enable students to learn to handle tools and acquire skills which have a strong carry-over throughout their lives. Furthermore, it will go a long way toward meeting the needs of those students who have little or no interest in purely academic subjects.

The hot lunch room has been done over and looks very well. We now have seating capacity for sixty. This year the number taking hot lunch averages around eighty-five, so that we feed the students in two shifts.

The faculty and I appreciate the untiring efforts of Mr. Stevens in keeping the building and grounds in good order, for this is an important part of a well-run school.

Not only is the school district and school endeavoring to give the students as diverse a program as possible, but it has also looked out for their physical well-being by having each student covered by liability insurance. In addition, we are instituting an aptitude testing program for the seniors through the University of New Hampshire. This is also available to the rest of the high school student body at one dollar per pupil.

I want to thank the school board, the superintendent, and the citizens for their cooperation.

(b) Report of School Health Work

To the Townspeople, School Board and Superintendent of the Alton School.

The following is my second annual report of the school health work of Alton:

During the year of 1951-1952 we had one case of polio, one case of scarlet fever, one case of pneumonia, and five cases of the measles. However, the common cold and the flu have probably caused the majority of absent children.

A medical examination of the pupils of grades II, IV, VI, VIII, X, and XII has been made by Dr. Appleyard, M. D. This includes a thorough physical examination and urine test for albumin and sugar. The parents have been notified where defects were found.

The routine hearing tests with the audiometer were made during the year with satisfactory results.

The eye examinations have been made using the Massachusetts vision testing machine. Parents have been notified where defects were found and corrections have already been made.

Through cooperation with New Hampshire Tuberculosis a TB patch test is planned for next spring.

Dr. Copeland has been giving free dental care to some of the pupils.

Classroom visits and classroom inspections have been made whenever necessary for routine health work or to give individual advice to pupils regarding personal hygiene.

Your school is fortunate to have a hot lunch program, which means so much to the students. We are happy about the wonderful improvements in the lunchroom facilities and the new drinking fountains.
