TO REPORT A FIRE DIAL 911

Burning Regulations

The State of New Hampshire requires that written permits be obtained for all open fires at all times when the ground is not snow covered.

Permits may be obtained from the Auburn Volunteer Fire Department for grass, brush, campfires, etc. Permits must be obtained on the day burning is to be accomplished. Burn when there is no wind, on rainy days, in a safe place and in accordance with the term of the permit. Burn before 9:00 a.m. and after 5:00 p.m. Keep some buckets of water close by; if wind develops, promptly extinguish the fire. All fires must be extinguished before you depart the scene.

Parking During Snow Storms

- A. From November 2 to April 1 of each year no person shall park any motor vehicle on any public highway between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m. or at any time in such manner as to impede snow removal operations.
- B. Any vehicle parking in violation of Section A hereof may be towed by the road agent, the chief of police or their agents or by independent contractors engaged by the road agent or the chief of police; any vehicles so towed shall be stored and released to the owner only upon payment of the cost of towing and storage by the owner.
- C. Any person violating Section A hereof shall be subject to a penalty not to exceed twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars for each offense.

Dog Ordinance

- A. **RESTRAINT:** All dogs shall be restrained from running at large within the limits of the town, except when they are on the owner's or keeper's property or being used for hunting or training purposes.
- B. **PENALTY:** Any person or persons, firm or corporation violating any provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be fined not more than fifteen (\$15.00) dollars for each offense.





SOLID WASTE COMMISSION

YEAR END SUMMARY

1997

The year 1997 has been a year of "staying the course" for the Auburn Recycling Facility. Thanks largely to the efforts of the Facility Manager, Ken Smith, and the excellent compliance of town residents to our recycling requirements, the incinerator was able to stay on line without having to invest the funds set aside in the warrant article voted on at the last Town Meeting. These funds will go back to the town as NH law stipulates, however it may be necessary to budget some money as an insurance policy for the coming year to cover the cost of tipping our trash in the event the incinerator goes down before the transfer station opens. No significant repairs beyond normal budgeted maintenance of the incinerator will be undertaken since it will be shut down before the end of 1998.

In general the facility has been operated in a clean and efficient manner during 1997, and was in compliance with all state and federal emissions requirements for a facility of its size and type. Operation was within the \$167,771 budget for 1997 with \$ 6101 returned to the town from recycling.

This past year has also been a year during which the NH Courts and the Department of Environmental Services granted Waste Management Inc. (WMI), all the necessary approvals to build a regional trash transfer station in our town. WMI intends to have this facility open by late summer 1998. This will mean significant changes to the role being played by the Auburn Solid Waste Commission, as we work with the Board of Selectmen and Waste Management Inc. to ensure that the transition from our municipal facility to this commercial facility is as smooth as possible for Auburn residents. Issues we will be addressing over the course of this year include: resident drop off privileges, rules and regulations at the WMI facility; costs and timeline for closure and reclamation of the Chester Turnpike site and WMI's role and financial commitment to this efforts; clarification of how Auburn and/or WMI will address yard waste/compost; the changing roles of the Auburn Solid Waste Commissioners; future budget requirements for this commission; formulation of a long term financial strategy for handling Auburn's trash "after" WMI, when that happens. This year the town will carry a full year budget for Auburn Recycling Facility of \$165,168 for 1998 to protect the town in the event that the WMI facility does not open for business this year. Any unused moneys will be returned to the town.

The year 1998 will be a year of significant change for Auburn. Whereas we are "all in the same boat," it is incumbent upon us to work together to preserve our community and make these changes work for the best for the Town of Auburn. Interested residents are urged to attend Solid Waste Commission meetings, usually the second Tuesday night of each month at 7:30 p.m. at the town hall.

TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE-ROCKINGHAM, SS

To the inhabitants of the town of Auburn, in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the gymnasium in the Auburn Village School in said Auburn on Tuesday, March the tenth on next, at seven of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subject:

To bring your ballots for:

FIRST: Selectman for three years
Moderator for two years
Treasurer for one year
Supervisor of the checklist for six years
Library Trustee for three years
Cemetery Trustee for three years-Auburn Village Cemetery
Cemetery Trustee for three years- Longmeadow Cemetery
Trust Fund Trustee for three years
Auditor for two years
Police Commission for three years

SECOND: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 40:13 to allow official ballot voting on all issues before the Town of Auburn? (By Petition) ((3/5ths vote required to pass the article) (Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

THIRD: Shall we modify the elderly exemptions from property tax in the Town of Auburn, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers, to be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years (\$45,000); for a person 75 years up to 80 years (\$55,000); for a person 80 years of age or older (\$75,000)? To qualify a person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least five years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married at least five years. In addition the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than (\$20,000); or if married, a combined net income of less than \$30,000; and own net assets not in excess of (\$35,000) excluding the value of the persons residence. (Majority vote required) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

FOURTH: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following amendments to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board.

1. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1, as proposed by the Planning Board, For the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Amend Article 2 **DEFINITIONS, 2.02 WORDS AND TERMS**, 91. Use, Accessory, to add two sentences to provide that:
Aircraft takeoffs and landings shall be subject to all zoning requirements that pertain to the use of land as a private airstrip. See definition #64. Private Airstrip.
2. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.2, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Amend the Zoning Ordinance to allow for the use of land in certain zones for Cultural Facilities, to read as follows:

Amend Article 2 **DEFINITIONS. 2.02 WORDS AND TERMS**, to add a definition of Cultural Facilities to read as follows: Cultural Facilities. A building used for a museum, local historical society, library, non-commercial art gallery, planetarium, science education center and the like. Any such facility shall be subject to site plan review and approval by the Planning Board. Amend Article 4.05 "R" Rural district to provide that Cultural Facilities may be allowed in the Rural District by Special Exception and further amend the **ZONING MATRIX OF USES AND DISTRICTS** accordingly.

Amend Article 4.06 "R-1" Residential-One District and "R-2" Residential -Two District to provide that Cultural Facilities may be allowed in those districts by Special Exception and further to amend the **ZONING MATRIX OF USES AND DISTRICTS** accordingly.

Amend Article 4.07 "C-1", Commercial-One District and "C-2" Commercial-Two District to provide that Cultural Facilities shall be permitted uses in the Commercial-One and Commercial-Two Districts and further to amend the **ZONING MATRIX OF USES AND DISTRICTS** accordingly.

3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Amend Article 3.11, Cluster Development, subsection 6, Roadways, to read as follows: All Cluster Roadways whether private or public shall be constructed to the Town's Road Design Standards. Cluster Roadways may be of private ownership with the following additional provisions:

- a. The ownership of the roadway, and the responsibility of the owners as to maintenance, plowing, repairing and replacement, when necessary are to be specifically stated in all ownership documents.
- b. The owner and or owners recognize in such documents that they assume all liability for said roads.
- c. The owner and or owners recognize that the roadways shall be open and accessible at all times to emergency and police vehicles, and town officials, in order to promote and maintain health and safety for all occupants of the development.

4. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.4, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Amend the first sentence of paragraph 3 of Article 4.04 District Regulations-General to read as follows:

All *nonresidential*, commercial, and industrial uses, all clustered residential developments and all multi-unit dwellings consisting of more than two dwelling units, regardless of the district in which they are built, shall be subject to Site Plan Review by the Auburn Planning Board prior to the issuance of a building permit.

5. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No 5, as proposed by the Planning Board , for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Amend Article 6.08 Zoning Board of Adjustment, section 4. Powers, to insert a new statutory reference in the preliminary sentence and to insert a new subsection e., adding new authority to grant equitable relief from the dimensional requirements of the Zoning Ordinance in certain limited cases, to read as follows:

4. Powers-Pursuant to New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 674:33 and 674:33-a, the Board shall have the following powers:
- e. To grant equitable waivers from the physical layout or dimensional requirements of the zoning ordinance in accord with NH RSA 674:33-a.
Under no circumstances shall this authority be used to grant a waiver from a use restriction in the ordinance. An equitable waiver granted under this authority shall not be construed as a nonconforming use, and shall not exempt future use, construction, reconstruction, or additions on the property from full compliance with this ordinance. This authority shall not be construed to alter the principle that owners of land are bound by constructive knowledge of all applicable zoning requirements. This authority shall not be construed to impose upon town officials or boards any duty to guarantee the correctness of plans reviewed by them or property inspected by them.

6. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.6, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Amend Article 6.09 Appeals to Board of Adjustment to add a new paragraph incorporating the requirements of NH RSA 676:6 as follows:

The effect of an appeal to the board shall be to maintain the status quo. An appeal of the issuance of any permit or certificate shall be deemed to suspend such permit or certificate, and no construction, alteration, or change of use which is contingent upon it shall be commenced. An appeal of any order or other enforcement action shall stay all proceedings under the action appealed from unless the officer from the appeal is taken certifies to the board of adjustment, after notice of the appeal has been filed with such officer, that, by reason of facts stated in the certificate, a stay would, in the officer's opinion cause imminent peril to life, health, safety, property, or the environment. When such a certification has been made by the enforcing officer, the officer's enforcement proceedings shall not be stayed other than by a restraining order which may be granted by the board or by the Superior Court on notice to the officer from whom the appeal is taken and cause shown.

7. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.7, as proposed by the Planning Board , for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Amend Article 6.11 Motion for Rehearing to add language in the first sentence incorporating to provisions of NH RSA 677:2 as to when the twenty (day) time period for filing a Motion for Rehearing commences, to state as follows;

Within 20 days after any order or decision of the Zoning Board of Adjustment *has been filed and first becomes available for public inspection in the office of the Board*, the Selectmen, any party to the action or proceedings, or any person directly affected thereby may apply for a rehearing in respect to any matter determined in the action or proceeding, or covered or included in the order, specifying in the motion for rehearing the ground therefor; and the Board may grant such rehearing if in its opinion good reason therefor is stated in said motion.

8. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.8, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Amend Article 6-ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT to add a new section 6.15 Appeals to Superior Court, which incorporates the language of NH RSA 677:9 as follows:

The filing of an appeal with the Superior Court shall not stay any enforcement proceedings upon the decision appealed from, and shall not have the effect of suspending the decision of the Zoning Board of Adjustment, unless the appealing party has been granted a restraining order by the Superior Court.

9. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 9, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Amend Article 7.07 VIOLATIONS AND PENALTIES, subsection 2, to read as follows:

2. Failure to comply with any provision of this Ordinance, any specific conditions and safeguards established by the Board of Adjustment in granting a variance or special exception, or any condition or requirement of Site Plan or Subdivision approval of the Planning Board, shall cause the violator to be liable for a fine not to exceed \$275.00 for each day such violation continues unabated after the remedy of the same is ordered by the Building Inspector.

Polls will be open at 7:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m.

You are also notified to meet on Saturday, March fourteenth next, at 1:00 p.m., at the Auburn Village School to consider the following articles:

FIFTH:To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Million Five Hundred Thousand (\$1,500,000.00) Dollars or any other sum for the purchase of lands and the construction of a Safety Complex Facility consisting of the Police, Fire, and Town Offices; and for purchasing equipment and furnishings of a lasting character in connection therewith; and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$1,500,000.00 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33) and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate in interest thereon; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to take any and all actions necessary to carry out any vote thereunder; or to take any action relative thereof. The sum to be raised may be reduced by the amount of funds from grants-in-aid or other funds as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local, or private agencies that would benefit the Town. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (Amount included in the Budget)(2/3 vote required) (Polls will remain open for one hour)

SIXTH: To see if the Town will vote to pay a stipend to the members of the Auburn Fire Department in partial compensation for hours expended, and to appropriate the sum of \$25,000. for the ensuing year for this purpose. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (Amount included in the Budget)

SEVENTH:To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 31:95-b, authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the Board of Selectmen to apply for , accept, and expend without further action by the Town Meeting, unanticipated money from a state, federal, or other governmental unit or a private source, which becomes available during the year. (A public hearing is required before such funds may be expended)

EIGHTH:To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to prepare a Master Plan for the development of land adjacent to Sandy Acres Recreation Area, for recreational purposes. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Not recommended by the Budget Committee)

NINTH: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 31:95-c to restrict Ninety Three Thousand, Two hundred Twenty Two (\$93,222.) Dollars of revenues from State Highway Block Grant Aid for the purpose of road reconstruction. Such revenues and expenditures shall be accounted for in a special revenue fund and added to the existing Highway Reconstruction Fund. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (Included in the Budget)

TENTH: To see if the Town of Auburn will raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Six Thousand Seven Hundred Seventy Eight (\$206,778) to be added to the Highway Reconstruction Fund. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Not recommended by the Budget Committee)

ELEVENTH:To see if the Town of Auburn will vote to raise and appropriate \$35,000 for the future revaluation of the municipality. This amount to be added to a Capital Reserve Fund established for this purpose. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (Included in the Budget)

TWELFTH: To see if the Town will vote to accept such Trust Funds as may come in during the year and Trust Funds as have not been previously accepted.

THIRTEENTH: To see if the Town will vote to use the income of the H. B. Burnham Fund for the schools or library.

FOURTEENTH: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts, for the use of the Town as may now or hereafter be forthcoming.

FIFTEENTH: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

SIXTEENTH: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any or all property acquired by tax deed, by auction or sealed bid, with right to reject all bids.

SEVENTEENTH: To hear the report of the Budget Committee and to see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town charges and legal obligations for the ensuing year.

EIGHTEENTH: To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

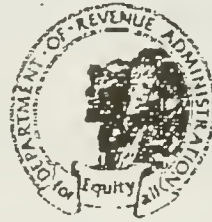

To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than (\$13,400.00) or, if married, a combined net income of less than (\$20,400.00); and own net assets not in excess of (\$35,000.00 excluding the value of the person's residence). (Majority vote required) (Recommended by Board of Selectmen)

FOURTH: To see if the Town of Auburn will vote to adopt the following amendments to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board.

1. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No 1. as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows : Amend Article 2.02 Words and Terms to change the definition of "Lot" in the zoning ordinance to further clarify those circumstances under which nonconforming lots in common ownership will be merged and to add the provisions for voluntary merger in accord with NH RSA 674:39-a.

6. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 6. as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Re-adopt Article 3.09 Growth Management as written in the 1996 Amended Ordinance to continue to control the rate of growth in the Town of Auburn. (Recommended by the Planning Board) YES 860 NO 171

7. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 7. as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Amend certain sections of Article 3.14 Watershed Protection Regulations to clarify that for the purpose of the Watershed Protection Regulations the watershed protection area shall include a buffer zone of a one hundred twenty five feet (125 ft) set back from the edge of bodies of water, brooks, streams and wetlands.

Also, amend 2. Allowable Activities to require a functional analysis be submitted by the applicant which conclusively demonstrates that engaging in the allowed activity listed in section 2. Allowable Activities will not result in the deterioration of the water quality in the protected area.

Amend 4. Prohibited to provide that the one hundred twenty-five (125) foot buffer may, at the discretion of the Planning Board, be reduced to no less than seventy-five (75) feet for certain uses upon submission of a functional analysis which shows conclusively that construction closer to the protected area will be of no negative impact to the protected area.

You are also notified to meet on Saturday, March the fifteenth next, at 1:00 p.m., at the Auburn Village School to consider the following articles:

Bruce Mason, Moderator, opened the meeting at 1:00 P.M. with the Pledge of Allegiance. There were 176 registered voters in attendance.

All newly elected officers present were sworn in by Town Clerk, Nancy Gagnon. The Moderator gave the rules of the meeting, which gave time limits and rules for those wishing to speak, five registered voters may request a secret ballot vote before vote is taken, a vote may be taken to restrict reconsideration of any article. He read the results of the ballot voting on Tuesday. There was a 40% voter turnout.

FIFTH: To see if the Town will vote to accept such Trust Funds as may come in during the year and Trust Funds as have not been previously accepted.

Moved by Dorothy Carpenter, seconded by Carl Mayland. **Article Five passed.**

SIXTH: To see if the Town will vote to use the income of the H.B. Burnham Fund for the schools or library.

David Griffin moved the funds for the library. Mary Griffin seconded. **Article Six passed as moved.**

SEVENTH: To see if the Town of Auburn will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 202-A:4-d authorizing the library trustees to accept gifts of personal property, other than money, which may be offered to the library for any public purpose, provided, however, that no acceptance of personal property by the library trustees shall be deemed to bind the town or the library trustees to raise, appropriate or expend any public funds for the operation, maintenance, repair or replacement of such personal property. (Recommended by Library Trustees)

Moved by Nancy Mayland. Seconded by David Griffin. **Article Seven passed.**

EIGHTH: To see if the Town of Auburn will authorize the establishment of a Capital Reserve Fund (pursuant to RSA Chapter 35) for the future revaluation of the municipality and to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Five Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$35,000.00) towards this purpose, and appoint the selectmen as agents to administer the fund. (Majority Vote Required) (Recommended by Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (Amount Included in the Budget)

Moved by Paula Marzloff, seconded by Joe Leverone. 1987 was the last time the town was revalued. **Article Eight passed.**

NINTH: To see if the Town of Auburn will authorize the establishment of a Capital Reserve Fund (pursuant to RSA Chapter 35) for funding the town's share of rehabilitation of bridge #095/145 (Depot Road over Clark Pond Brook) and to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-Seven Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$57,000.00) towards this purpose, and appoint the selectmen as agents to administer the fund. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Not Recommended by the Budget Committee) (Amount Not Included in the Budget)

Moved by Wallace Titcomb. Seconded by Gail Christensen.

Budget Committee Chairman, John Chambers, stated that due to all the budget increases this year that the Budget Committee felt that this could wait another year.

Selectman Titcomb explained that a letter has been received from the State red-flagging this bridge. According to a State estimate for repairs, this amount equals 20% since funds raised under this RSA bring an 80% aid for bridge repair from the State of N.H. Other less expensive options may be available, such as a pre-fab bridge which would cost the town \$10,000. All options will be investigated. The bridge was built in 1926. Paula Marzloff explained that the State would review our proposal for repair. We must use a registered engineer, and then it would be put out to bid by the Town. No deadline from the State was attached. Selectman Marzloff stated that other funds cannot be used for repair if we want to receive the State aid of 80%. The assembly was reminded of the Town liability.

Albert Samson moved to amend the article to read \$10,000.00. Seconded by Orrin Chase.

Selectman Titcomb stated that if the State refused the pre-fab bridge this amount would not be sufficient.

Joe Stacy asked if a new culvert wouldn't do the job. Marzloff stated that all options would be looked at and the lowest cost would be used.

The question was moved and all were ready to vote on the amendment.

Vote on amendment: **Amendment Failed.**

Question was moved and all were ready to vote on the Article. Vote on Article Nine: **Article Nine Failed.**

TENTH: To see if the Town of Auburn will raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed One Hundred Twenty Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$120,000.00) for a rebuild of the incinerator and costs related to the rebuild. (Recommended by the Solid Waste Commission) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (Amount Included in the Budget)

Paula Marzloff moved Article Ten, and Joseph Cleaves seconded.

Solid Waste Committee members Mark Granoff and Gail Clark spoke to the issue. The incinerator is in very bad shape. We are currently hauling at a budgeted amount of \$33,000 this year because the incinerator is not burning at capacity. If incinerator is not usable, hauling all of our garbage would be very expensive. Because of the small size of our incinerator, we are allowed by the State to rebuild.

Steve Vanni questioned, since we may not need this, could we hold a special town meeting if needed? Paula Marzloff explained that a special town meeting must be granted by the Superior Court, which would do so only in the case of an emergency. Our failure to budget when anticipated would not constitute an emergency.

Selectman Marzloff stated that unless absolutely necessary, we would wait until the Waste Management issued was settled in the court. An appeal has been filed, and the court has 45 to 60 days to decide if they will hear the case.

Steve Vanni asked for a poll of the Selectmen for agreement that this would not be spent unless absolutely necessary. Paula Marzloff, James Headd and newly elected Albert Samson all agreed. If Waste Management builds in Auburn, this will not be needed.

Mr. Delande asked why we would not borrow the money over three years if needed.

The question was moved, and the majority present were ready to vote.

A secret ballot vote was requested by five registered voters.

BALLOT VOTE ON ARTICLE TEN: YES 117 NO 39 ARTICLE TEN PASSED.

ELEVENTH: To see if the Town of Auburn will vote to create an expendable general trust fund under the provision of RSA 31:19-(a), to be known as the Safety Complex Site Assessment Fund for the purpose of developing an architectural design for a safety complex, to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$15,000.00) towards this purpose and to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Not Recommended by the Budget Committee) (Amount Not Included in the Budget)

Moved by Charles Kellett and Seconded by Jim Thompson. Charles Kellett reported for the Safety Complex Committee. The Raymond Road building which currently holds the Police Department and Fire Department is beyond renovation. The site is 3 feet above the water table, the doors are not wide or high enough for new fire equipment, and space is an important issue for the Police Department. This is only a study, and the issue will come before the Town for final approval.

Steve Vanni remarked that volunteers can only go so far, and this would allow the committee to come back to the town with a viable plan.

The question was moved. There were two requests, each signed by five registered voters, for a secret ballot vote on Article Eleven. **BALLOT VOTE: YES 119, NO 42. ARTICLE ELEVEN PASSED.**

The Moderator was requested to read the names of persons requesting the two ballot votes taken. The Moderator complied.

TWELFTH: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 31:95-c to restrict Eighty-Eight Thousand Sixty-seven Dollars and 30/100 cents (\$88,367.30) of revenues from State Highway Block Grant Aid for the purpose of Road reconstruction. Such revenues and expenditures shall be accounted for in a special revenue fund to be known as the Highway Reconstruction Fund, separate from the general fund. Any surplus in said fund shall not be deemed part of the general fund accumulated surplus and shall be expended only after a vote by the legislative body to appropriate a specific amount from said fund for a specific purpose related to the purpose of the fund or source of revenue. (Majority Ballot Vote) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (Amount Included in the Budget)

James Headd moved the Article, and Carl Mayland seconded. Selectman Headd explained that this dollar amount is money returned to the Town by the State from gas taxes. Traditionally these funds go into the general fund. This Article would restrict those funds.

After further discussion, the question was moved. Majority present were ready to vote on the Article.

According to RSA, a printed ballot was used for the vote. **PAPER BALLOT VOTE : YES 131, NO 28. ARTICLE TWELVE PASSED.**

THIRTEENTH: To see if the Town of Auburn will raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Eleven Thousand Six Hundred Thirty Three and no cents (\$211,633.00) to be added to the Highway Reconstruction Fund. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (Amount Included in the Budget)

Moved by James Headd and seconded by Hubert Topliff. Jim Headd explained that based on an engineering study by UNH \$300,000 (if you add Article Twelve and Thirteen) will be needed each year for five years. The Highway Safety Committee will prioritize the roads. Once back in shape, our roads should be good for 35 years.

Mr. Delande asked why not bond over 10 years instead.

Alan Cote felt that we need a long term fix, not just preventative. Also, we would rather pay as we go than to bond. (This comment received some applause.)

Paula Marzloff related that this would mean \$150.00 per \$100,000 on the tax bill.

Nancy Pelton asked if there would be a separate warrant article each year. The Selectmen stated that there would be.

Vote on Article Thirteen: **ARTICLE THIRTEEN PASSED.**

FOURTEENTH: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts, for the use of the Town as may now or hereafter be forthcoming.

Paula Marzloff moved article and Robert Hayes seconded. Vote on Article Fourteen: **ARTICLE FOURTEEN PASSED.**

FIFTEENTH: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Moved by Wallace Titcomb and seconded by Dale Phillips. Vote on Article Fifteen: **ARTICLE FIFTEEN PASSED.**

SIXTEENTH: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make application for and to receive and spend such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for Town purposes as may now, or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private agencies.

James Headd moved article and seconded by Bert Ouellette. Vote on Article Sixteen: **ARTICLE SIXTEEN PASSED.**

SEVENTEENTH: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any or all property acquired by tax deed, by public auction or sealed bid, with right to reject all bids.

Moved by Paula Marzloff and seconded by Bernardine Donelson. Vote on Article Seventeen: **ARTICLE SEVENTEEN PASSED.**

EIGHTEENTH: To hear the report of the Budget Committee and to see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town charges and legal obligations for the ensuing year.

John Chambers moved Article Eighteen in the amount of Two Million, Fifty-eight Thousand, Five Hundred and Twenty-two Dollars (\$2,058,522.00). Seconded by Ernest Allard.

There being no discussion on the Article, vote was taken. **Article Eighteen in the amount of Two Million, Fifty-eight Thousand, Five Hundred and Twenty-two Dollars (\$2,058,522.00) to defray Town charges and legal obligations for the ensuing year PASSED.**

NINETEENTH: To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Carl Mayland moved reconsideration on Article Nine for informational purposes. Seconded by James Headd. Since there was no vote to restrict reconsideration of any article, the Moderator declared that discussion on whether or not to reconsider Article Nine could ensue.

Selectman Wallace Titcomb read a letter received from the State of N.H. Department of Transportation dated March 3, 1997. "Re: Critical Bridge Deficiency, Auburn Br. No. 095/145, Depot Road over Clark Pond Outlet. During a recent Town Red List inspection, the following critical deficiency was noted: The bridge is in poor condition overall and does not have the capacity to carry full legal loads. We recommend that this bridge be posted "Weight Limit 6 Tons". The bridge is currently posted at one end only. We have enclosed a copy of the latest inspection report for your use." He then read from the inspection report. "Bridge Rail No W-beam. Deck-Structural Condition: Timber - cracked, split, heavy decay. Holed area at backwall 1'w. x 6'l. One holed area at north midspan. Concrete deck at south-OK. Bearing devices: Bear on timber. Stringers: Timber - splits with light decay. Several cracked. Beams: I-beams-encased at south. Flanges exposed and heavily rusted with minor section loss. Paint: Fair. Rust: Heavy. Collision Damage: None. Alignment of Members: One stringer bowed. Vibrations, Deflections Under Load: No loads observed. Abutment-Breast Walls: Stone with concrete extensions at south-voids, settled, unstable. Concrete-undermined. Backwalls: Timber-cracked, decayed, settled. Bridgeseat: Timber-cracked, decayed, settled. Wings: Stone at north-stones fallen and unstable. Concrete at south undermined. Footings: Ledge-not visible. Heavy erosion behind abutments." He further stated that the Town has a liability issue with this bridge since we have been notified by the State of its poor condition.

Regarding reconsideration, Albert Samson felt that since many people had already left the meeting that it should not be done. Carl Mayland noted that many of those people left even before the budget was voted on.


VOTE TO RECONSIDER ARTICLE NINE: FAILED. ARTICLE NINE WILL NOT BE RECONSIDERED.

That increase is also a measure of our success in encouraging **LITERACY** in our children.

We continue to receive the generous support of our patrons and of the volunteers without whom much of the work of the library would remain undone.

A most exciting development was the first steps taken by a grassroots group of patrons to fund the addition of another room to the existing library to include a bathroom!

To all those who donated time, books, equipment, or just hard work, may we extend our heartfelt thanks. If you haven't been by lately, come on in!

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT
1997

This year turned out to be another very active year of me as Health Officer. Complaints ranging from failed septic systems, possible zoning violations, water and air contamination and possible unsafe living conditions were investigated.

In May, I attended the annual NH Health Officers Educational Conference in Concord. Subjects such as Septic System Troubleshooting, Water Contamination Issues such as the flooding in Exeter, Asbestos Removal in Johns Manville in Nashua were discussed. Also on the agenda were other subjects such as New Food Rules/Emerging Pathogens, Radon Tests/Radon in Schools were very enlightening.

Four (4) septic systems were inspected and found in failure. Homeowners were notified to repair or replace the systems. One from last year was pursued through legal channels with court involvement. This was time consuming in that numerous update meetings and hearings were necessary.

There were six (6) Child Day Care Inspections for license renewal and three (3) new Foster Home Inspections.

Three (3) rental properties were inspected at the property owner's and /or tenant's request for possible Housing Code violations.

In late December the annual inspection of Auburn Village School was conducted. No reportable incidents were found. The school staff should be commended for a very well maintained building. A revised inspection form was used this year that insures a Clean, Healthy, and Safe learning environment. Food and Nutrition Services are second to none. In-house Health Care facilities have written policies and procedures on site for providing adequate care for students and school personnel during school hours and scheduled school activities.

I would like to remind everyone that the RABIES problem is still around. The raccoon caused rabies may have subsided somewhat, but now it seems FOX Rabies has taken over. A newsworthy case was recently discovered in Belmont, NH Please play it safe, avoid all wild animals.

I would like to take this opportunity thank everyone for their continued cooperation in helping Auburn remain a healthy place to live, work, and play. Should anyone have any health related concern or complaint, I may be reached by calling the Selectmen's Office, 483-5052.

Kenneth Rhodes moved Article 2 as written. Second by Joseph Leverone. Mr. Rhodes explained the reasons for placing this article in the warrant and that circumstances had changed and the article was not necessary. Motion to withdraw was made by Mr. Rhodes. Second by Stoney Worster.

Article 2 was withdrawn.

Article 3: To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries and benefits for School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.

Motion was made by John Chambers, Chairman of the Budget Committee, that the sum of \$5,325,316.00 be appropriated. Second by Kenneth Rhodes. A discussion followed regarding specific budget items and explanations were given. The vote was taken. Vote was in the affirmative.

Article 3 passed in the amount of \$5,325,316.00.

Article 4: To obtain a sense of the community regarding possible options to address anticipated future school district facility needs. The School Board will be considering construction of a new elementary school or an addition to the current facility to provide for an increase in enrollment. This Article is for discussion purposes only and any vote taken will be non-binding on the District.

Kenneth Rhodes moved the Article. Julie Gage seconded.

Mr. Rhodes explained the reason for including the article in the warrant. Many suggestions were made and questions asked. Mr. Rhodes made closing remarks. Vote was taken.

Article 4 passed.

At this time, the Moderator asked that the newly elected member of the School Board and the School District Clerk

come forward to take the oath of office. Joseph D. Leverone and Mary F. Griffin were duly sworn by the Moderator, Bruce A. Mason, Sr.

Article 5: To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Mr. Leverone moved the article. Seconded by Kenneth Rhodes.

Hu Topliff congratulated the voters for turning out in record number for the elections on March 11, 1997.

John Chambers moved to adjourn the meeting. Seconded by Mitchell Henley. Motion passed.

The Annual School District Meeting was adjourned at 8:45 p.m.

Principal's Report

On August 28, 1996, Auburn Village School opened its doors to a student population of 600 and the promise of an exciting new school year. With both regrets and congratulations we saw Mr. William Estey, who had served our community as Assistant Principal for seven years, move on to be Principal of Mont Vernon Village School. Mrs. Pamela Shepard replaced Mr. Estey in the position of Assistant Principal. Other new staff members welcomed to the community included: Mrs. Susan Young, Middle School teacher; Mrs. Bonnie Boucher, Second Grade teacher; Mrs. Kim Carbonneau, Second Grade teacher; Mrs. Wendy Cahir, Middle School teacher; Mrs. Jan Brown, School Psychologist; and Mrs. Mary Ann Dostie, Custodian.

On September 27, 1996, Principal Raymond Bourque died unexpectedly, shocking the Auburn School community and the Town of Auburn. He had been a dedicated educator in the town for over seventeen years. He touched the lives of many students and teachers and was loved by all. Mrs. Shepard assumed the duties and responsibilities of Principal until November when Dr. Angelo Panteli was appointed Interim Principal for the 1996-1997 school year.

The entire community, faculty, staff, students, volunteers, PTA, Fire Department, and Police Department rallied to support the school and continue the educational process in Mr. Bourque's absence. The staff remained steadfast in the wake of the tragedy, always focused on their mission to provide the students of Auburn with a positive educational

experience. Fire and Police Departments offered support wherever and whenever needed, assisting with fire drills, inspections, and the popular D.A.R.E. Program. A community group raised funds in Mr. Bourque's memory and with the help of family and friends created a park at the front of the school building dedicated to his memory.

The academic year progressed successfully. Students were offered a well-balanced curriculum focused on basic skills and supplemented by the arts, enrichment, and athletics. Teams were sponsored by the school for upper level students in the areas of soccer, basketball, softball, baseball, cheerleading and volleyball. The year was highlighted by many accomplishments of which Auburn can be proud.

Our school was chosen to participate in the Regional Alliance for Mathematics and Science Reform, thanks to the efforts of Mr. Steven Welford, Assistant Superintendent. Teachers participated in a summer institute at Bentley College from July 29-31, 1996. They studied new methods of instruction and ways to integrate technology into the curriculum. The Alliance continued throughout the school year and the school was provided with support and training to expand our technology and science programs. The local Technology Committee, composed of both community and school volunteers, met on a regular basis with the teachers involved in the alliance to further the efforts of both groups.

A Middle School Advisory Committee was created by the School Board to further communications amongst parents, students, teachers and administration. The committee met on a monthly basis with Mrs. Shepard to share ideas, offer support, and facilitate improvements to the school program. Due to the input of the committee, a mission statement was developed and an orientation program was established for incoming sixth graders and their parents. An evening program was provided for parents and a school day program for students. The PTA was instrumental in providing support and, of course, refreshments for this event.

1996-1997 was a banner year for our Student Council. An election was held at the beginning of the school year complete with voting booths provided courtesy of the Town of Auburn. Students followed a realistic procedure by first registering to vote and then voting via secret ballot for representatives and officers. Officers included: President, Carrie Burnap; Vice President, Sharon Fredette; Secretary, Jamie Wolfe; Treasurer, Emily Lagana. Their goals were to provide school and community service, promote school spirit and plan a social calendar. Advised by Mrs. Gail Boucher, they organized school events such as Spirit Week, Pep Rallies, Student/Faculty games, Middle School Dances, a ski trip to Gunstock, after school movies, and an ice skating trip. They raised funds to contribute to the Raymond Bourque Memorial Fund, Auburn Village School D.A.R.E. Program, and Kid's Café, a children's soup kitchen in Manchester sponsored by the Salvation Army. Mrs. Boucher and six Student Council members attended

the Annual Student Council Conference for Middle Schools in October. The culmination of such a successful year was the receipt of an Honor Council Excellence Award from the National Association of Elementary School Principals. We are proud to have such a hardworking group as part of our school and look to them for leadership in the future.

Thanks to a large group of parents and teacher volunteers, nine teams of sixty-one students represented Auburn Village School in the regional Odyssey of the Mind competition at Goffstown High School on March 15th where they competed with teams from other schools in creative problem solving and enjoyed the camaraderie. Four out of seven competitive teams moved on to the State level. Our three Division I teams, Omerdroid, Heroic Proportions, and Double Trouble, competed at Nashua High School. Our Division II team, Balloonacy Cars, competed at Dover High School and took first place. This team moved on to the World Finals at the University of Maryland in College Park where they ranked number one out of 53 teams and won congratulations from Jeanne Shaheen, Governor of New Hampshire.

Partnerships with the Daniel Webster Council of the Boy Scouts of America, the Auburn Police Department, and Notre Dame College continued this year to help our students develop into self-confident citizens able to resist some of the negative pressures in our society. D.A.R.E., Adventure Based Activities, Outing Club and Project Safeguard were among the activities available to students and parents. We owe a special debt of

gratitude to Officer Bartis who has spent hours in our school befriending and supporting the youth of Auburn.

Our School Volunteers worked tirelessly to support our program with clerical assistance, refreshments, and student support. They successfully logged over 3,354 hours making our school eligible for the Blue Ribbon Award from the National PTA. We cannot thank these dedicated parents enough for their hours of hard work.

Several of our students were selected to participate in the 1997 Talent Search conducted by John Hopkins University. Congratulations go to Zachary Cross and Jay LaFountain who received Certificates of Distinction and State Awards, and Alexander Piccioli and Kara Verryt who received State Awards.

Thanks to the efforts and financial support of staff and PTA, seven teachers attended the Annual New England League of Middle Schools Conference in Providence, Rhode Island where they learned more about the characteristics of young adolescents and successful teaching practices.

Physical improvements to the building included the addition of two portable classrooms located behind the school to house second grade classes. Thanks to the monumental efforts of Mr. John Ciempa, our Maintenance Supervisor, the classrooms were wired and ready to go for the beginning of school. The Leach Field was cleared of overgrowth and a new septic pump system was installed.

On June 19, 1997, sixty-three eighth graders graduated from Auburn Village School. With our congratulations and best wishes, they move onto Pinkerton Academy, Memorial High School, and promising futures. We are proud to have been able to provide them with a nurturing environment in which to grow and a rigorous well-balanced academic program in which to learn. Their success would not have been possible without the continued support of a well-informed community, a concerned School Board, a supportive and efficient SAU office, an active PTA, and a large group of dedicated volunteers, staff members, teachers, and parents.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the School Board

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Auburn School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 1997 as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the School District's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Auburn School District has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Auburn School District, as of June 30, 1997, and the results of its operations for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements of Auburn School District taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed as schedules in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Auburn School District. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

Superintendent's Report

1996-1997

To the Citizens of Auburn:

The past year has been an eventful one for the Auburn School District. Due to the transition in the Superintendent's Office, I have been asked to submit this year's Superintendent Report.

Dr. Angelo Panteli continued as Interim Principal of the Auburn Village School, and has done a wonderful job overseeing our educational program. Assistant Principal Pam Shepard and Special Education Coordinator, Chris Farrah have provided outstanding administrative support to Dr. Panteli, as we have continued through the transition after Mr. Bourque's passing. The School Board has undertaken a search process for a permanent principal, and hopes to name a successor in April 1998.

The school began the process of replacing the existing computer network in the school, with one that has a more sophisticated structure and will avoid some of the problems the school has experienced in the past. A high speed data line has also been brought into the school providing virtually unlimited Internet access to the classrooms connected to the new network. This project was a result of the recommendations of a dedicated group of townspeople and teachers comprising Auburn's Technology Committee. The future promises more classroom connections to the network and the continued addition of modern computers into the classrooms.

In October, Superintendent, Paul Fillion left SAU #15, to assume the superintendency of the Miami, Arizona School District. He has been ably replaced by Mr. Damon Russell, who is currently serving as Interim Superintendent. The SAU #15 Board has

decided to advertise and seek candidates this spring to fill the superintendency, with the new Superintendent to begin in July 1998.

The results of the State Assessment Testing Program were released in November. Auburn's students continue to perform exceptionally at the third grade level, distinguishing themselves as the most consistently high-performing school in the state. At the sixth grade level, our scores showed improvement over last year's, but we have more work to do to match our third grade results. Every member of the staff of Auburn Village has done an extraordinary job refining curricula and using different teaching strategies with our students to bring about improvements in students achievement.

Accolades for Auburn's students were not restricted to their performance on statewide assessments. A group of Auburn's students traveled to the University of Maryland to compete in the Odyssey of the Mind World's, and came home with First Place honors. Their efforts were recognized by the Auburn School Board, community, and Governor Jeanne Shaheen.

I would like to personally thank the School Board, administration, staff, parents, and citizens of Auburn for their continued support of the Auburn Village School and its students. Your willingness to invest your volunteer time, tireless efforts, and financial resources for the benefit of Auburn's children have all contributed to make your school one of the most outstanding schools in the state.

His leadership during the trying times of last year and the challenging days of this school year have been of enormous help to our students, staff, and community. I would like to extend my thanks to him both personally, and as Chair of the Auburn School Board for doing such a great job as our Principal. Our school is a better place for Dr. Panteli having been a part of it.

I would like to again extend my congratulations to our students, staff, and volunteers for their performances on the statewide assessment testing program and their First Place finish at the World Odyssey of the Mind Championships. Each of these accomplishments are strong indicators of the level of excellence the Auburn Village School pursues, and neither would be possible without the generosity and support of a caring community.

In looking ahead, the spirit of volunteerism is alive and well in Auburn. The School Board has undertaken a number of initiatives this year, all of which are utilizing the talents and skills of our community members. The Facilities Committee has published a report in this edition of the annual book, and the School Board hopes you will take the time to read their recommendations on dealing with the space problems of Auburn Village. The committee was comprised of a broad cross section of the

community in an attempt to represent and hear as many different points of view as possible. The Kindergarten Study Committee has also utilized the services of our townspeople, and sent out a survey asking the opinions of our residents regarding the establishment of public kindergarten in Auburn. The returns were very gratifying, and as a result of the committee's work, warrant articles will be presented at this year's Annual School District Meeting calling for the establishment of a public kindergarten program. The Board is also conducting a Principal Search, and again, community members are well represented on this important committee. The Board's goal is to appoint a permanent principal in April 1998. The Technology Committee has made a number of recommendations to the School Board, several of which are contained in this year's budget request. The expertise of community members in this highly technical area has been of tremendous help to the Board and allowed us to make prudent decisions in our educational technology program.

Whether it has been the fund-raisers for OM, the construction of the Memorial Park for Mr. Bourque, the active and continued support of the PTA, or citizen work on School Board established committees, education in Auburn has truly been a total community effort this year.

I am proud of our school, and the things our students and faculty have accomplished. None of them, however, would have been possible without the efforts of the entire community working together to benefit our children. When community spirit, wonderful administrators, and a dedicated staff all work together with a common purpose, the results are a school of uncommon excellence.

On behalf of the entire Auburn School Board, I would like to thank all of you for your continued support of the Auburn Village School, as we work to be the absolute best that we can.

Dear School Board:

As you directed our Committee, the Building Facilities Committee has met to discuss and make recommendation to the Board regarding the expansion of Auburn School District Facilities. Please recall the committee's charge did not include determining the chronological timing for more facilities, but only to recommend a strategy that can be implemented when needed.

In summary of our discussions over several meetings, **it is this Committee's recommendation that, when required by any of one or several factors that require significantly more educational space, the Board pursue construction of a separate new facility for the Auburn School District.** The specifics for this recommendation are included in the attachments to this letter, but we strongly feel that a new separate facility will provide a much greater return on investment to the community than continuing to make major investments at the present site, as required.

Please review the back-up to this recommendation carefully, as the Committee has attempted to focus on the critical decision questions in this matter and give the Board solid reasoning with which they can move forward on this matter.

It was a pleasure serving the Board on this and the members of the Committee will be available to assist in discussing our recommendation with the community as needed.

Factors regarding decision-making - Existing vs. New Facility

Addition to Existing Facility

PROS

- Addition to the existing facility to accommodate approximately 300 to 400+/- additional children is possible.
- Addition to the existing facility will require addition of more administrative space (office) and 'core facilities' (cafeteria space, activity space, media area, etc.), and additional on site parking.
- The cost of adding onto the existing facility at the current site is perceived as less expensive than construction of a separate new facility. Savings are primarily related to less extensive sitework and development of non-classroom facilities.
- It is also perceived that maintaining all staff in one facility will limit the cost of District administration.

CONS

- Size of the existing property will limit the opportunities to provide additional outdoor recreational areas for the children and the community.
- Addition of facilities to provide capacity for nearly 900 - 1,000 students will create a very large facility to administer discipline and schedule.
- The current AVS was last modified to attempt to meet the standards of a middle school.
- The existing facility and support staff are being over-utilized and may lead to premature degradation.
- Addition to the existing facility will require addition of more administrative space (office) and 'core facilities' (cafeteria space, activity space, media area, etc.), and additional on site parking.
- Capacity of core facility is reaching serviceable capacity.

Factors regarding decision-making - Existing vs. New Facility

Construction of New Facility

PROS

- A new facility can plan for classroom and other spaces more efficiently to address either elementary or middle school needs.
- Since the current AVS has middle school capability, it seems logical that a new facility should be planned as an elementary school to accommodate younger school children. Additionally, construction of elementary classroom space is less expensive on a square footage basis.
- Two separate facilities allow for more manageable administration of facility usage for both educational and community needs.
- New facility allows for construction of additional community activity spaces; i.e., additional gymnasium, additional multi-purpose rooms including stage, additional cafeteria for meetings.
- Planning a new facility allows the district to create enough potential space to accommodate the full build out of the town's residential land. There is a much better planning scenario utilizing a new elementary facility and adjusting classes between the existing AVS and the new facility to allow for planned, coordinated classroom capacity growth.
- New facility allows for proper planning and scheduling of non-core curriculum (health, phys ed, languages, computer/media center).

CONS

- The cost of constructing a new facility from a developed site is perceived as more expensive than addition to an existing facility. Costs are related to more extensive sitework and development of non-classroom facilities.
- Transportation of children to two different facilities will involve more extensive costs of maintaining an effective bussing system.

General Information and Tasks

In November 1997, the Auburn School Board decided to reactivate the Building Facilities Committee which had been created in November 1995 for the purpose of investigating long range planning for the Auburn Village School facility.

The Committee's charge was now to develop a plan to present to the Auburn School Board on how to handle the pressures on the existing educational facility, as we cross the student population threshold or take on additional curricula.

The Committee identified its four main tasks in order to accomplish its charge:

1. Identify the thresholds (or breaking points).
2. Identify the need for one or two facilities.
3. Outline a transition plan.
4. Deliver their recommendations to the Auburn School Board.

It should also be remembered that when the last major addition to AVS was made in 1986, the addition proposal was passed in preference a new separate facility which was proposed on an alternative site. In retrospect, it appears that this addition was put on to alleviate an immediate overcrowding problem. The community was told at the time that this addition to the AVS would be the last major expansion that could be done at this facility. Furthermore, it was presented that if a new separate facility was constructed, that the AVS could serve as the community's middle school.

Existing Facility Usage

Presently, the Auburn Village School was constructed for a rated capacity of 660 students. This capacity was based on the number of classrooms being utilized on an equal distribution basis with class sizes of 25 students for grades entry through third grade and 30 students up to eighth grade.

Presently, for the educational program, class sizes have been maintained at smaller sizes which has resulted in better attention to individual student needs. This strategy has returned good results. Also, individual classrooms in some areas are not appropriate in size to accommodate the recommended number of students and other classrooms have been utilized for in-house special needs resource areas to control district costs.

Overall, the combination of these three factors, has resulted in forcing the district to bring on-site modular classroom space to meet all current (1997-98) programmatic needs. Currently, there are five modular classrooms on-site providing additional classroom space for approximately 100 students. These modular classrooms have a limited useful life, due to the nature of their construction, in comparison to the permanent facility and should not be considered effective solutions to long term planning.

Ultimate Entry through Eighth Grade Facility Capacity Needs

For several years, the Auburn School District has established several committees that have attempted to establish the long range growth potential of the Town of Auburn's student population.

In February 1995, a Long Range Planning Committee charged with reviewing student population projections and space recommendations reported to the Auburn School Board. One of the basic pieces of information, to be gleaned from this report and the Town's Master Plan, is an estimate of the range of the number of entry through eighth grade students that might be possible in the Town of Auburn under our current residential land use and zoning.

By combining information from these two reports, it can be inferred that the Town of Auburn currently has developed approx. 40 - 45% (use 42.5% for planning) of its available residential land area. This estimation does not include some accounting for the area of the lake, major wetland areas, parcels owned by the Manchester Water Works and other non-usable spaces. Utilizing a simple ratio that assumes the Town will grow with the same aggregate number of school children as has occurred to date, it is logical to conclude that a full build-out scenario of the Town can only provide approximately a total of 1,400 entry level through eighth grade students.

Thresholds for Expansion of Facilities

The Committee considered that there could be several thresholds of needs for significant expansion of facilities. Several of these needs include but are not limited to:

- Significant increase in student population
- Addition of public kindergarten
- Addition of new curriculum initiatives requiring space

- Replacement of modular classrooms
- Class size increase to unacceptable levels
- Overuse of district facility

The Committee discussed that the community has been "suffering" from chronic small increases that do not require us to take any major action regarding facility capacity; however, if any one or more of the above factors come into play, it will require the District to address significant capacity issues.

In addition to these straightforward growth factors, the Committee also discussed the changing dynamics of several pressures on the community. These included:

- The loss of Pinkerton Academy as a sending high school
- Auburn's very favorable comparative local tax rate
- The relative perceived quality of the Auburn Village School program

Conclusion

Overall because of the limits of on-site expansion capability, limitations in program space, and community space, and compromises made in planning additions to an existing facility, it appears logical that a Master Plan for development of a new facility is appropriate to meet the District's long term needs. The cost of developing this new facility will not be significantly more than the cost of continuing to add to the Auburn Village School. This new facility should be based on the following basic parameters:

- Site and layout to create a 900 to 1,000 student entry through fifth grade elementary school. As opposed to having a school this large at the existing Village School, this facility should be planned specifically for educating younger children as opposed to attempting to address all the communities' education needs.
- The facility should be able to be constructed in capacity phases which will allow for flexibility of programs between the existing and new facility.
- Auburn Village School should complete its transformation to the Village Middle School.
- The community should be presented with a logical transition plan fully outlining how the facilities should be utilized as the community grows to a high student population need.
- Initial construction should create capacity for approximately 300 children (12 classrooms), and initial core spaces.
- The modular and portable classrooms at the current AVS site should be removed or transitioned to alternate uses, as appropriate. This removes capacity for approximately 100 students at the current AVS.
- Initial occupation should consider having entry through third grade at the new elementary school. This will place approximately 250 students in the new school on "day one," an 85% initial occupation.
- AVS will retain grades four through eight with a population of approximately 400 students, an 80% occupation.

Transition Plan

A significant problem with adding a new facility is the immediate creation of an uncharacteristic amount reserve classroom capacity. In order to make good use of what will be two facilities without having too much excess capacity, the following is the outline of a recommended transition plan to two full community school facilities:

- Layout and plan an elementary school that has a total capacity of 900 - 1,000 children (40+/- classrooms)
- The building plan should consider that the facility should be built as three or four projects. Core facilities must also be planned for phased expansion.

- As needed, utilize the excess capacity to balance class sizes and facility utilization.
- As the community education needs continue to increase, add to the elementary school in 250 - 300 student capacity phases until the Village Elementary School is completely built out.
- At final build out:

*Auburn Elementary School -
1,000+/- students*

*Auburn Village Middle School -
500+/- students*

**INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT
ON REPORTABLE CONDITIONS
AND OTHER MATTERS**

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen
Town of Auburn, Auburn, New Hampshire

In planning and performing our audit of the Town of Auburn for the year ending December 31, 1996, we considered the Town's internal control structure in order to determine the scope of our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements. Our review of these systems was not intended to provide assurance on the internal control structure and should not be relied on for that purpose.

Under the standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, reportable conditions involve matters coming to our attention relating to significant deficiencies in the design or operation of the internal control structure that, in our judgment, could adversely affect the Town's ability to record, process, summarize, and report financial data consistent with the assertions of management in the financial statements. A material weakness in a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors or irregularities, in amounts that be material in relation to the financial statements being audited, may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. Our consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might constitute reportable conditions and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all reportable conditions that are also considered to be material weaknesses as defined above.

We are pleased to report that, during the course of our review of internal controls, no material weaknesses in the Town's accounting systems and records were identified. Minor weaknesses or other consideration coming to our attention were generally procedural in nature and dealt with administrative or record keeping practices. In these instances, we made specific recommendations or provided instruction to those individuals involved during the course of our audit fieldwork.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of management and others within the administration. This restriction is not intended to limit distribution of this report, which is a matter of public record.

RECREATION COMMITTEE THE YEAR 1997 IN REVIEW

The year 1997 proved to be a year of continued improvements to Appletree Park and Sandy Acres Recreation Area. Progress based on long-range plans took another step forward. Programs which have become staples over the years, such as the After School Ski Program, and the Senior Citizens spring and fall trips, were continued.

In March, the Commission welcomed the new representative of the Board of Selectmen, Albert Samson, who replaced Jim Headd. Stan Lewis was appointed as a new member of the Recreation Commission.

The ball fields at Sandy Acres Recreation Area saw increased use by Auburn baseball, softball, and soccer leagues. In excess of 500 children use the fields annually. The fields continue to be maintained and improved by fertilizing, seeding, reseeding, and adding loam. The Auburn Little league organized a clean-up day on April 12, 1997 - debris was removed, fields were raked, seeded, repairs were made, and part of the fences was re-installed. Primary excavation was begun on the addition of two new ball fields. Volunteers of the Little League donated many, many hours all summer, materials, equipment, and funds for the improvement of the fields. The conversion from the basketball court to tennis court is making progress. Poles and nets from the old tennis court at Appletree Park were brought to the new tennis court at Sandy Acres.

The Derry Eagles donated soccer nets and poles for the soccer fields and the Commission supplied the soccer balls.

The Commission sponsored a Softball pitching clinic under the direction of the YMCA. It also sponsored in part the Auburn Babe Ruth League.

Landscaping, bleachers, fencing for the tennis court and softball field have been ordered but could not be installed due to the early snowfall in November. Work will continue on these projects in 1998. Improvements at Appletree Park are continuing. The basketball court was cracksealed and basketball hoops and balls are ordered. In the fall the Park was cleaned up, trees removed and hauled away. Landscaping is planned for next year.

The After-School Ski Program started on January 8, 1997, and ended on February 5, 1997, under the volunteer direction of Lucy Rhodes. The students were transported by bus from the Auburn Village School to Pat's Peak, and were returned to the school. Lucy Rhodes offered her services again for the 1998 season which will run from January 7, 1998 through February 4, 1998.

Constant contact has been maintained with P.L.A.Y. The playground received damage from a storm which was repaired in the spring by volunteers. The playground will be landscaped next year and a gazebo added. P.L.A.Y. will continue to oversee the playground.

The Summer Recreation Program has been taken over by the Audubon Society of N.H.. The Commission sponsored the program in part. The Audubon followed the same format as in the past. Forty-seven children and twelve student volunteers participated. The program was held at the Auburn Village School and consisted of five week - long sessions starting July 5, 1997 and ending on August 8, 1997. The program was staffed by the Massabesic Audubon Center. Next summer the Audubon Society will be running the program at the Massabesic Audubon Center. It will endeavor to introduce a nature day-camp and to increase the number of weeks as well as expand the number of daily hours.

On April 1, 1997, the Commission received 26 acres of additional land adjacent to Sandy Acres Recreation Area. It was decided to have a Public Hearing on June 18, 1997, in order to allow the community to have input for the use of this land. All Boards, Commissions, Committees, and Organizations in town as well as the abutters and Town residents were invited to attend. At

the hearing, maps, photos, and details on that area were available. During a brain-storming session, many ideas were brought forward. At the end of the hearing a multi-purpose community/recreation Center was favored. Volunteers for a sub-committee in charge of developing a Master Plan for this parcel of land, were requested and came forward. The sub-committee started working in September and are now meeting twice a month, the first and third Tuesday of each month. All meetings are open to the public. Members of the sub - committee have visited a number of sites in other communities, such as Newmarket, Hooksett, Candia, and Hudson to obtain information and cost details. The building will be funded with grants and coporate donations. Additional information from the community will be obtained via a survey in the "Village Crier's January, 1998 issue.

The Auburn Volunteer Fire Department again volunteered its firefighters to fill the ice rink and maintain it during the season.

The Senior Citizens participated in a spring tour to the Seacoast area, Portsmouth and Kittery. In the morning a 2 1/2 hour boat trip was undertaken, cruising around the Isles of Shoals. Lunch was enjoyed at Warren's Lobster House in Kittery. After a tour along the seacoast, a short stop was made at the General Store at Strawberry Banke in Portsmouth. The Senior Citizens Fall Tour was to the Lakes Region. In the morning a visit was made to the Country Braid House Workshop and Showroom in Tilton. The trip continued to Meredith for a two hour train ride along Lake Winnepesaukee. Lunch was catered by Hart's Turkey Farm and served on board the train. In the afternoon the New Hampshire Pewter Co. was visited where craftsmen were at work making beautiful pewter products.

The recreation Commission looks back on the year 1997 and is grateful for the amount of volunteer hours, materials, use of equipment, and monetary funds given by so many. The Commission wants to thank all those who have given so generously of their time and is looking forward to this continuos support.

The Commission sponsors programs and activities for all residents of Auburn. Please contact any of the Commissioners with your suggestions or ideas for activities and programs. The Commission wishes to serve the community and is always looking for volunteers to lead the different programs. It enjoys serving the residents of Auburn. The Commission meets on the first Wednesday of each month at 7:30 p.m.. in the Town Hall. All meeting are open to the public.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Zoning Board of Adjustment meets on demand at the Auburn Town Hall at 7:30 p.m. on the fourth Tuesday of each month. Requests for a hearing are made to the Zoning Officer. The Zoning Board is comprised of volunteer members and alternates appointed by the Board of Selectmen.

During the year 1997, the Board held seven hearing handling ten Variances, three Special Exceptions, three Appeals from Administrative Decision, and two Rehearings.

The hearings are open to the public and are posted at the Town Hall and Post Office. They are also advertised in the "Union Leader".

Minutes of the hearings are posted at the Town Hall for public review.

AUBURN PLANNING BOARD

Report of 1997

The Auburn Planning Board is made up of volunteer members appointed by the Board of Selectmen. This year we welcomed two new alternative members to the Board.

The Planning Board duties include reviewing subdivision and site plan proposals. During 1997 several "minor" subdivisions were approved, along with various non-residential site plan proposals. A new boat launching area was proposed by the Auburn Selectmen and the Manchester Water Works to replace the Severance Beach site. The new launch will be located off Manchester Road and is scheduled for Fall 1998 construction.

Other approvals granted were with regards to proposed roadway designs and/or improvements. The Planning Board, along with consulting engineers, work to assure that proposed roads and/or improvements are designed and constructed to Town Subdivision Regulations. Also, as a result of past zoning ordinance amendments, the Board is now responsible for reviewing functional analysis reports submitted for construction purposes.

The new 911 street names were implemented into the Town Zoning Map and the Zoning Ordinances, with the 1997 changes, were printed and are now on sale. The Board has begun work on updating the Subdivision Regulations and hope to have them finalized and reprinted in 1998.

Residents are reminded that all meetings are open to the public and are held Wednesday evenings, beginning at 7:30 p.m. at the Auburn Town Hall. Agendas and meeting minutes are posted outside the Planning Board Office for public viewing.

AUBURN ANIMAL CONTROL

1997 showed an increase of 36 licensed dogs from 1996, for a total of 814. We as a town, should be pleased that our citizens take responsibility for their animals' welfare.

Rabies is still a concern we should be aware of. Not only should our cats and dogs be vaccinated, but all of our farm animals as well. Horses, cows, sheep, and goats can also develop rabies if bitten by a rabid raccoon, skunk or fox. The best way to keep raccoons and skunks from visiting your property is to keep all garbage tightly sealed and stored so animals can't get into them. Pet food should not be left outside. Raccoons and skunks are night feeders and will help themselves to whatever is available. Sunflower seeds are a favorite of raccoons, so be aware of your bird feeders and keep the spillage to a minimum.

Walking, jogging and bicycling are very popular in Auburn. We have many miles of beautiful trails and roads available to our residents. If you own a dog that is protective of his property, please be aware of these residents and properly restrain your dog. We've had quite a few incidents of people being chased by protective dogs, so be aware of your dog's disposition, and these incidents can be avoided.

Auburn Police Department

Nineteen hundred and ninety-seven (1997) has been a non-stop year and can only be described in one way --- Stressful! In 1997 there was a heavy load of calls for police service, changes n the police department staff, a new town political structure, tragedy and an unbelievable community involvement. The Auburn Police Department has handled the task and has become stronger as a result of these encounters.

The police department handled over 7300 calls for service in 1997 and many of those calls were for major events. We started in early January when the body of Rose Miller was found in a wooded area near the Route 28 By-Pass. All the full time officers were taken from their regular assignments and teamed with Manchester Police detectives and New Hampshire State Police detectives to investigate this very frustrating case. Each day was long, putting a real burden on the departments budget. In the end, each member of the Auburn Police Department received notoriety for their professionalism. Unfortunately, the case remains open.

Auburn's shared border with Manchester not only gave us the Miller murder case but continued to keep us very busy with a long list of incidents. In July a Manchester woman was arrested in Auburn for committing six area burglaries of horse stables. As a result of the arrest, the Auburn Police Department recovered \$ 50,000.00 worth of saddles and other related riding gear. A trial is now pending at the Rockingham County Superior Court.

A Manchester man was arrested for burglaries and became known as the "Mountain Bike Burglar" for his use of a mountain bike as he went from house to house to commit his burglaries. He is also awaiting trial.

Three Auburn men with heavy ties in Manchester were arrested in Auburn for a number of felony offenses. Other police agencies in Manchester, Londonderry, Merrimack and Lincoln have arrested these men also for other felonies. Even the state of Maine has been interested in these three. Our officers have worked with many police agencies as a result of these and other investigations. This only illustrates how well our officers are trained and how respected they are throughout the State of New Hampshire.

Auburn's officers work hard to keep the town a safe place but not without an incredible amount of cooperation from the citizens of Auburn.. The crime rate remains relatively low and the rate for solving these crimes is respectable. However, we are very aware and empathize with the victims who don't get their lost items recovered. It is with that in mind that we continue to improve our efforts to lessen the crime in Auburn. Sergeant Flight has also been working towards that end by being an effective prosecutor and having a successful rate of guilty findings at the Auburn District Court.

On June 13, 1997 tragedy struck our police department. Lieutenant Don Eaton died of a heart attack while working at his desk. His administrative skills and his leadership were well known throughout the police community. His passing left a large void in our department. Chief Picard saw a need for immediate change to get his department back on track and to get past the tragic loss of his right hand man. Now the second in command, Sgt. David Flight, is doing a great job of filling Lt. Eaton's large shoes. Sgt. Flight learned his lessons well from the Lieutenant and continues to learn and do his supervisory duties as well.

Detective Gary Bartis is the first and only full time detective the Auburn Police Department has had. The year was a successful one, solving many cases and building a close working relationship with the surrounding towns. Also, Detective Bartis has taken on the duties as

Juvenile Officer, which works right in with the other duty of teaching the D.A.R.E. program at the Auburn Village School.

Officer Michael McGillen continues to be our motorcycle officer in the summer months. His hard work has added to the safety on the town roads. We do not have a large number of crashes in Auburn and only a small number of those crashes have resulted in serious injury. Mike's aggressive enforcement of the motor vehicle laws has created this safe atmosphere. The number of alcohol related traffic incidents have dropped in 1997. Officer McGillin is the departments' maintenance officer and insures that our police vehicles stay in good running condition. He takes great pride in the police cruisers preventative maintenance and is able to keep some cars safe after they exceed the 100,000 mile mark. This is a great benefit to the budget.

Officer Scott Tardiff has grown into a very fine police officer. This year he hopes to get trained for mountain bike patrol. This is a great asset for the town and it will be another extension of his very successful community - policing program. Tardiff is well known and respected with the residents of our town. From the security surveys of your home to the bicycle rodeo, Officer Tardiff is very civic minded.

As a result of Lt. Eatons passing, the police department was able to promote Officer Michael Bernard from part-time to full-time police officer. What a catch this man was and just in time. Officer Bernard is a very sought after man by other police departments. He is a bright young man with an infectious personality. It appears the community has welcomed him. From January to March of 1998, Officer Bernard will be attending the New Hampshire Police Academy. His growth as an officer has been steady and we plan to keep him, much to the dismay of other agencies. As a result of other changes in 1997 we had openings for part-time officers and two positions have been filled. We've hired Michael Bermtsen and Marc Bilodeau. Both men are married with families and they both have college degrees in Criminal Justice. They will be attending the part-time academy in January and February. We have high hopes for them once they are ready to patrol on their own. We still have two openings for part-time officers. Efforts are going on now to get those positions filled. They were created by the only resignation this year by Officer Thomas Wickey and by an unfortunate change in status by Paula Page. Paula was a very fine officer and I know one that will be missed by many Auburn residents, however her duties as the departments secretary have consumed her energies.

Our present active part-time officers are Dan Goonan, Dave Patten and Tim King. They have really worked hard to take up the slack due to reduced manpower and by the demands of following up on the major incidents handled by the full-timers. They deserve a great deal of recognition by the citizens. These officers have instrumental in maintaining a cost effective budget.

The town voters saw fit in 1997 to give the police department its own autonomous Police Commission. THANK-YOU! Really this was a stroke of genius. The three members of the commission are, Hubert Topliff, Aldis "Skip" Christie and Mark Gosselin. These men are responsible for a marked change in the departments moral and its smooth operation. They have shown a great rapport with the Chief of Police, a real concern for the daily duties of the department and its budget. Most of all, the Commissioners have demonstrated a sincere caring and respect for the members of the Auburn Police Department. They are a large part of the reason we had such a smooth transition after losing Lt. Eaton and also for the reality of only one resignation in 1997. The members applaud them and the community should too.

New Hampshire saw the violent deaths of three police officers in 1997 and the serious wounding of four other officers. Police shooting incidents in New Hampshire have become a reality and we don't have to go far to realize that. Manchester, Londonderry and Derry have all had shootings in 1997 and they all border Auburn. The Epsom officer, Jeremy Charron, was killed by a Manchester resident while doing exactly what each Auburn officer does on a daily basis.

Charron was checking a suspicious car in a park just like the ones we have in Auburn. That incident hit home for our department because it could have been any Auburn officer just as easily as it was the Epsom officer. The Auburn Police Department received many telephone calls, letters and cards from the residents of our town expressing great concern for our safety. They showed great sympathy in all the tragic events we were burdened with in 1997. For that, we thank-you very much and we will continue to do the best we can for you.

One last thing, on a much brighter note. There are many wonderful people in Auburn but we must mention one family for its generosity, caring and support. Pat, John, Jeremy and Justin Foscitt. The Foscitt family donated a car to the DARE program. But that was not the end of it! They went out and got total involvement by the community to get the car painted, equipped and ready to be the major sign post for the Auburn DARE program. This is why Auburn is great. This is why we do our best as police officers in Auburn. This is why we survived 1997. This is why we will do even better for the Auburn residents in 1998.

HIGHWAY SAFETY COMMITTEE

The Highway Safety Committee was pleased to welcome in April, the new representative of the Board of Selectmen, Al Samson, who replaced Jim Headd. Also in April a new member, Carl Mayland, was added to the committee. It was with regret that Bruce Mason resigned in October for personal reasons.

The Committee had a challenging, but successful, year of accomplishments. It was actively involved in the process of developing the Warrant Article for Road Construction and Repairs based on a study done by the University of New Hampshire. Since the Committee lacked the technical experience of how to bring the Town roads up to current engineering standards, assistance was requested from the Auburn town engineer, Dennis McCarthy, and Derry Town engineer, Alan Cote, an Auburn resident, the Board of Selectmen, and the Planning Board. Members of the Committee attended the Budget Committee hearing in February at which time the request for a Warrant Article was presented and accepted. The representative of the Board of Selectmen confirmed that in the future the State Highway Funds will be deposited into this account instead of into the General Fund.

The reconstruction of Beaver Brook Road brought it up to standards using part of the funds agreed to in the Warrant Article. Spofford Road was shimmed and tarred.

Line striping of the roads was postponed until they have been rebuilt or repaired.

Roads in need of crack sealing were recommended to the Board of Selectmen. Squirrel Drive, Rattlesnake Hill Road, and roads in the Spruce Lane/Buttonwood Drive area were done.

David Flight, Chair of the Highway Safety Committee, attended a number of meetings with the Manchester Water Works, to discuss the closing of the Severance Beach boating launch, an area which has been identified as a potential safety risk. A new boat launch will be opened on

the same road near the Fair Haven Baptist Church. This new area will offer ample parking and a turn-around space. The Manchester Water Works will do most of the work and has already started clearing the area. The new launch is expected to be open to the public in the early fall of 1998.

Abutters have asked for a stricter enforcement of the curfew, especially concerning noise and the use of the area after curfew hours. The Auburn Police Department as well as the Manchester Water Works Watershed Patrol will look into these requests. The boating launch at Deerneck Bridge also has come up for discussion. The possibility of additional parking space was checked. This area is not only popular as a boating launch but also as a hiking, cross-country skiing, snow shoeing and ice fishing area.

Renaming some streets in order to comply with the enhanced 9-1-1 System has been finalized and new street signs installed. A number of letters requesting 'Stop' signs and 'Curve' signs has been received. Recommendations were made to the Board of Selectmen when these signs were warranted.

Residents of Candia came to the June meeting to discuss parking problems on Tower Hill Road. The Auburn Police Department checked this problem and recommendations were made to the Board of Selectmen to place "No Parking" signs on the east side of the road. For further action, such as additional parking spaces, the Candia residents were advised to contact the Manchester Water Works since one side of the road is Manchester Water Works land.

The town of Candia asked to increase the speed limit on Old Candia Road. Candia had improved its portion of the road and requested to increase the speed limit. The Committee recommended not to increase the speed limit in Auburn since the area is densely populated. Candia was informed of this decision. A request from the Candia Board of Selectmen to lower the speed limit on Hook Road from 35 mph to 25 mph was granted. This makes the speed limit on this road the same for Candia and Auburn.

The Pingree Hill Road bridge needs replacing. However, winter set in too early to start this project. It will be done in the summer of 1998 during the summer school vacation so as to avoid detouring the school buses.

In November the Committee was involved in a sub-division plan at Dearborn Road/Bunker Hill Road, which Alan Cote, member of the Road Reconstruction and Repairs Committee attended. There is concern about the additional traffic it will create at this intersection. The location of the different proposed driveways and their sight distances as well as possible drainage problems were discussed. The Committee recommended to the Planning Board not to allow the sub-division unless improvements at the intersection were made.

The Highway Safety Committee meets on the third Thursday of each month, at 7:30 p.m., in the Town Hall. All meetings are open to the public. Auburn residents with concerns for road safety, street or road signs, and road hazards may appear before the Committee, or may make their concerns known in writing for discussion at the next meeting.

The Committee is looking forward to another active year in 1998 with many improvements for safety.

The Committee thanks the citizens of the Town who brought forward their concerns and so made Auburn a safer and better place for all.

AUBURN VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT
1997

Our year has proven to be very tiring, challenging and one of unsurpassed commitment. Our membership has stood together this year through some long, time consuming endeavors.

Early in the 1997 year, the fire department experienced a major breakdown. Our largest tanker blew an engine shortly after the budget was finalized. We needed to find a way to return the truck to full service and keep the cost minimal. After many meetings and planning, it was decided to send the work out. Estimates began coming in and we soon realized that the overall cost was larger than previously expected.

Preliminary estimates came in between \$35,000 & 42,000 to return the truck to full service. Once again we found ourselves in a bind and had to decide what the more economical & responsible route should be. After consulting with the Board of Selectmen & the department mechanic, we decided to make the commitment and repair the truck ourselves. After 4 months of very long time consuming nights & weekends, our membership was able to return the truck to full service. The overall cost was \$7200 worth of parts & meals for the fire fighters who volunteered there time. A savings between \$25,000 and \$30,000 to the Town of Auburn.

A joint effort between the Auburn Firemen's Association and the Town of Auburn Fire department once again has combined to save money to the Town. Through fund raising efforts, the Auburn Firemen's Association purchased 3 automatic defibrillators at a total cost of \$16,000. These units have been turned over to the Town and placed in service on Rescue 1, Car 1 and Engine 2. We are working on an agreement with the Auburn Police Department, where the fire department will train the police officers in the use of "Automatic Defibrillation". Once this is complete, the defibrillator on engine 2 will be placed in the duty cruiser. This will aid in getting these units to the scene of incident even faster and patient care can start even faster.

The membership once again made a strong showing at the annual town bazaar. From the traditional fire truck parade, to muster activities for all ages, fire department presenee was once again outstanding and shows the detection these men and women have to the Town. At the conclusion of a somewhat damp day, the bazaar ended with the "Towering Inferno". This event ends a two day pallet stacking ordeal by some 20 fire fighters. These men and women took time off from there jobs to stack some 2500 pallets, which made this the largest bon fire and a great ending to a damp day.

Our annual fire prevention week proved to be very educational and eye opening. We were able to put fire fighters in the schools and pass along fire safety tips through lectures and demonstrations. The annual fire department open house was also a great success. Over 100 Town residence attended the afternoon long event which was filled with fire fighters showing fire safety tips and fire related demonstrations. Local

Auburn businesses donated fire detection and fire related safety equipment which were raffled off during the fire prevention open house.

The fire department this year has once again kept to its commitment for higher education. Fire fighters this year have participated in hundreds of hours of fire and emergency medical training. Our department has become one of the best trained departments in the area, with 85% of the membership reaching the departments goal of Certified Fire Fighter and a minimum of First responder for EMS. Members are required to maintain a certain amount of training each year. This is because of all the changes that take place in today's society, our fire fighters must be ready for what ever they may encounter.

During this past year the Auburn Fire Department responded to 277 call.

The membership once again made a strong showing at the annual town bazaar. From the traditional fire truck parade, to muster activities for all ages, fire department presence was once again outstanding and shows the dedication these men and women have to the Town. At the conclusion of a somewhat damp day, the bazaar ended with the "Towering Inferno". This event ends a two day pallet stacking ordeal by some 20 fire fighters. These men and women took time off from there jobs to stack some 2500 pallets, which made this the largest bon fire and a great ending to a damp day.

Our annual fire prevention week proved to be very educational and eye opening. We were able to put fire fighters in the schools and pass along fire safety tips through lectures and demonstrations. The annual fire department open house was also a great success. Over 100 Town residence attended the afternoon long event which was filled with fire fighters showing fire safety tips and fire related demonstrations. Local Auburn businesses donated fire detection and fire related safety equipment which were raffled off during the fire prevention open house.

The fire department this year has once again kept to its commitment for higher education. Fire fighters this year have participated in hundreds of hours of fire and emergency medical training. Our department has become one of the best trained departments in the area, with 85% of the membership reaching the departments goal of Certified Fire Fighter and a minimum of First responder for EMS. Members are required to maintain a certain amount of training each year. This is because of all the changes that take place in today's society, our fire fighters must be ready for what ever they may encounter.

During this past year the Auburn Fire Department responded to 277 call.

SPECIAL REPORT-PART II AUBURN RIFLE RANGE

The year 1997 has proffered great strides in the Town's efforts to industrially develop the land off Wellington Road, commonly known as the Rifle Range. In the 1996 Town Report, it was reported that Senator Bob Smith's office had been contacted to assist the town in the remediation of the contamination known to exist on the site; lead, petroleum and asbestos.

At the Senator's request, the Army Corps of Engineers conducted several on-site reviews and studies of the area in an effort to fully assess the current contamination level at the site. As a result of these studies, the Rifle Range clean up has been elevated to a high priority hazardous toxic waste project. This means that Auburn has been placed at the top of the priority list for the cleanup work necessary at the site.

In August 1997, Senator Smith visited Auburn and the Rifle Range itself. During his visit he announced that the money had been approved and that the Army Corps of Engineers would begin cleanup in May or June of 1998, depending on soil and weather conditions.

On January 22, 1998, I met with Mr. Jeff Merrifield, legal counsel to the senator, at the Rifle Range. He conducted a survey of the area and was mapping the logistical problems with respect to entrance and exit, equipment parking, and security requirements for equipment during the cleanup. At the completion of his survey he advised that the bid process for the cleanup will go forward during the third quarter (April, May June) with the actual work to be completed during the fourth quarter (July, August, September) of 1998.

With the commitment for cleanup in place, the Auburn Industrial Development Commission has begun preliminary meetings with Industrial Real Estate developers in an effort to maximize the tax potential for the Town of Auburn. No decisions have been made to date. As the project continues, the AIDC will keep the citizenry advised. We invite and urge the taxpayers of Auburn to attend the AIDC meetings. Meeting dates are posted at the town hall and are generally held on Tuesday evenings at the town hall. Should anyone have any questions or ideas as the development of the Rifle Range, please contact the Selectmen's Office and your concerns will be addressed. With a bit of good luck, the final chapter on the Rifle Range can be written in the year 2000, confirming a substantial contribution to Auburn's tax base.
