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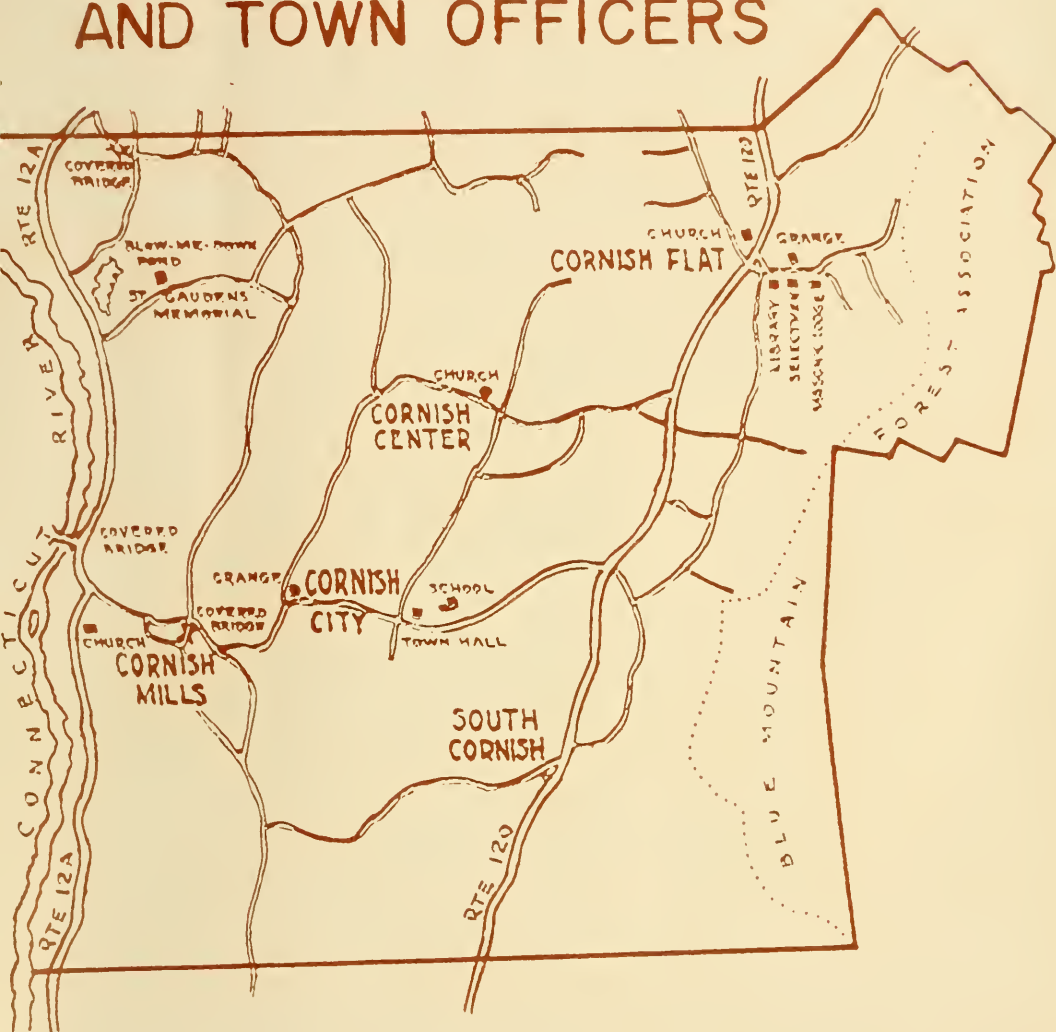

The Duncan Fund money was spent this year on the Platt road, widening a narrow and dangerous stretch, and on the Lang road for widening, gravelling, and drainage.

TRA funds were expended on the Meriden Stage road for grading, widening, drainage, and gravelling.

The Fair Association contributed \$1500 towards the addition to the Town Hall and is now contributing overhead fluorescent lights which are in the process of being installed.

We deeply regret the loss of Herbert Hodgeman from the Board. He had served the Town conscientiously and ably and it was a pleasure to work with him.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Association.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of 200.00 for use in the operation and planning of the Lebanon Regional Airport.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of 14,500.00 to replace the iron bridge at Cornish Mills.

6. (By Request) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary sum of money to tar approximately one and one half miles of Jackson Road.

7. (By Request) To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Non-Partison Ballot System for the election of Town officials as provided in the revised law of New Hampshire. (vote by ballot)

8. To vote by ballot on the Zoning Ordinance and the Building Regulations proposed by the Planning Board.

9. To see what action the Town will take in regard to trading the Oshkosh truck and raise and appropriate the necessary amount.

10. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money, if necessary, in anticipation of taxes.

11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the selectmen to sell or otherwise administer property acquired through tax sales and leins.

12. To see if the Town will vote to have all dogs confined to the owners' premises between February 15th and December 15th unless accompanied by a person responsible for the dogs behaviour.

13. To hear the reports of Officers Agents Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The polls will close at 7 p. m.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

We wish to acknowledge thanks to the townspeople for the contribution of gift books and magazine subscriptions, and to our town students for the loan of many paperback books which greatly expanded our reading material. They were enjoyed by young and old, alike.

Our high school reading room was used extensively by the students for reference work, term papers and book reports. We are most pleased to report this.

1,149 people patronized the Library this past year, with a grand total of 4,352 books loaned out. The children borrowed 428 books, and the State Library loaned us 276 books. 601 magazines were loaned and 142 books were loaned to our local teachers. We have \$1.62 in petty cash.

It is my sincere wish to add two new books to our collection, written by Professor Ralph Brown, and published in August. Professor Brown was a former Cornish resident.

The new light fixtures, installed through the kindness of Roy Stewart, has improved our Library, and all our readers benefit from them. Thank you, Roy.

TRUSTEES REPORT

Mrs. Gladys LaClair has continued as our Librarian, and she has been most faithful, pleasant and helpful in this position.

Annotated lists of the gift books and of the regular book purchases of the library were duplicated and made available for distribution at the Library.

The Library is open from 4 to 8 P. M. on Tuesdays throughout the year, except on holidays. These hours are now printed on the PTA Community Calendar.

Our building has been kept warm, our steps shovelled clean, and our lawn mowed by Gary LaClair, whose work has been most thorough.

The Library's major problem, as we see it, is the need to bring our card catalogue up to date. New books have not been catalogued for a considerable number of years. It is impossible to tell if the library possesses a particular book, or exactly where on the shelves it might be located, or what the Library has on a given subject.

Therefore, we propose to allocate \$300 toward the task of cataloguing under the direction of a trained, professional librarian. We hope that such a person may be assisted by volunteers interested in making our Library more useful.

Town Planning Board

The Planning Board has held thirteen meetings this year and also two neighborhood meetings open to the public. Most of the time and attention of the Board has been devoted to a study of the need for a revision of the existing zoning ordinance. Since this ordinance was enacted in 1955 changes have been made in the New Hampshire statutes relating to zoning, making revisions of our ordinance essential. Furthermore, as the result of its study, it became apparent to the Board that the existing ordinance should be up-dated in order to meet the changing needs of the community and to prepare for an orderly future developmet of the town's growth.

The Board made an exhaustive study of the zoning ordinances of other comparable towns in New Hampshire it met with representatives of other Planning Boards it sought and received advice from the N. H. Department of Resources and Economic Development; it conferred with representatives of the U. S. Soil Conservation Office. After drafting and redrafting a proposed new ordinance, the Board has prepared a revised zoning ordinance together with an official zoning map which the Board members unanimously believe should be adopted at the next Town Meeting if the best interests of the Town of Cornish are to be served.

The proposals of the Board were presented to interested citizens at two neighborhood meetings, and the Board appreciates the helpful and constructive suggestions made by those who attended these meetings.

Two public hearings are scheduled for February 5th. and February 21st., as required by State statutes, for open discussion of the Board's proposals, and Cornish citizens will have an opportunity to vote for the enactment of these proposals at Town Meeting.

School Warrant

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Cornish qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said district, on the ninth day of March, 1968, at ten o'clock in the morning to act on Article 1; the remaining articles will be acted upon at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon. Polls will close at 7:00 P. M.

1. To choose a Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Auditors for the ensuing year and a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

2. To determine and fix the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To choose Agents and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.

5. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, together with other income, the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

6. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the U. S. Government and/or state agencies. Further, to see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.

7. To see if the district will authorize the school board to appropriate receipts from federal lunch reimbursements, tuition, gifts and any other receipts from miscellaneous sources in addition to the original appropriation for 1968-69, for the lunch program, general expenses, equipment and improvements.

8. To see if the School District will vote to continue the Cornish School District Building Study Committee as authorized at the annual meeting on March 11, 1967; and further to instruct said committee to complete its work, and prepare and submit to the voters its recommendations at the 1969 School District Meeting.

9. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Report of the School Board

The School year was an eventful one in Cornish. The School Board usually met on the third Monday of each month at the school, and often in extra sessions.

The Opportunity Class is achieving remarkable results with Mrs. Symons as teacher and with the aid of Title I funds.

The Board has developed many procedures of policy and standard operating methods during the year, including school and bus discipline, teachers' sick leave and personal leave, position specifications for full-time teaching, Principal, School Secretary, custodian, play ground attendant, music instructors and others. Policies have been established for first grade entrance age, achievement awards, class trips, extra activities, teachers' summer courses, method of calling off school, summer maintenance and many others.

The Board has attended meetings of the Public Schools Association, The N. H. School Boards Association, The Supervisory Union, The Governor's Conference on Education and others. Board members have appeared before the Committee on Education of the General Court in a effort to improve State support of education and to strengthen local control of the schools. The Board has participated in the meetings of the Cornish School Building Study Committee which was appointed in accordance with the vote of the last District meeting, and has attended meetings of the Area School Concept with Claremont.

The Board has been constantly on the alert for improvement in teaching methods and text books, for example the non-graded reading classes, the emphasis on phonics and the Open Court series of reading. Other text books in History and Geography have been reviewed and adopted to the end that our students may know the world in which they live, and learn to appreciate with pride the history and achievement of our own nation.

The School Board has participated in the planning and operation of many other school functions which are described in the reports of the Superintendent, the Principal and the School Building Study Committees, to which we call your attention.

The Cornish School lunch served more than 20,000 meals during the school year 1966-1967 and ended the year with a balance of \$700.00 thus recovering part of the loss of the previous year. The average daily count was nearly 130.

Figures for the present year indicate that the lunch count is continuing to grow and that the balance is increasing slowly despite higher costs and extra expenditures.

The constantly rising number of pupils taking hot lunch is a vote of confidence for our school lunch operators Mrs. Frances Ackerman and Mrs. Vera Bean who work hard to serve about 140 excellent meals per day for considerably less than the recommended "minimum wage".

The Board is conscious of the very considerable time and attention given to our needs and demands by the Supervisory Union Office in Claremont and especially by Assistant Superintendent Richard Waldo, who has devoted many long hours to our educational interests. The Board finds it difficult to express in words the great appreciation felt for the entire loyal staff of our School, who have given much sincere effort to maintain and improve our high educational standards, and would mention Mr. Norman Stowell, who in our need accepted the added burden and responsibility of Principal, a position he has filled very effectively.

The School Board also acknowledges the significant role of the P. T. A. in contributing much to the School in many ways to make it a distinguished place of learning. The Board likewise thanks all those parents and individuals who have by gift and suggestion made the Cornish School a better place in which to live and learn.

To the School Board of Cornish and Citizens of the Town, I herewith submit my third report as Superintendent of Schools.

Instructional Staff:

Mrs. Ruth Schneider of Claremont, N. H. was elected to teach grade 2, replacing Mrs. Nellie Wilber, resigned. Mrs. Schneider accepted this position as her first teaching assignment. She attended Plymouth State College.

We were fortunate to have only one change in the teaching staff this year. An experienced faculty that has worked together for a period of time is a definite advantage to the educational program of any school system.

Mr. Stowell assumed the responsibilities of teacher-principal, and has done a commendable job. The educational climate within the school, discipline, and school-community rapport have benefited because of his efforts. He is supported by his able assistant, Mrs. Jesse Stone.

Mr. Frank Stone of Claremont was employed by the Board to initiate a vocal music program. Mr. Stone is a talented musician as well as an experienced teacher. In this first year of operation, we can already see the results of his instruction. Music classes in the grades demand the major portion of his one day per week visit to Cornish.

Enrollment:

A small decrease in enrollment is evident. June ended with approximately 248 students; presently we have 235 in our grades. The first grade student-teacher ratio, critical last year, is presently somewhat relieved. Grade three with 37 and grade two with 33 are too high. Without the competent teachers that we have in these classes, we would have had to consider employing an additional staff member to combine a double grade; the lack of classroom space presents an additional problem.

Building Study Committee:

The building study committee created at last year's District meeting, has a task confronting it. Not only must it project future

growth in Cornish and plan facilities for these students, but it also must consider improving the quality of the present program. I refer the readers to the committee's report in this publication. Its members' talents and energy devoted to this Community Service venture are appreciated. I recommend to the voters that the article calling for their continued study of school building problems be unanimously endorsed.

The School:

Your School Board and administration have pursued a preventive maintenance schedule at the school. The interior is on a master painting schedule; some is completed yearly. The fluorescent lighting fixtures now in all classrooms provide for better and safer school work. New bulletin boards allow for additional student work display. The exterior, partially painted last year, will be done this summer. The school-community and townspeople can take pride in our building whether it be used for classes, evening meetings, or the Cornish Fair.

AREA:

Our first year of operation within the AREA school contract has been a successful one, there appears to be no problems with attendance, transportation, or adaptation to Stevens High School.

Under the "old" arrangement students could terminate their formal schooling after graduation from grade 8. Because of this contract, students involvd in the AREA complex must attend Stevens High School until they are 16 years of age. The new "compulsory school" aspect is of obvious benefit to the students.

Public-Law 89-10

Title I and II of Public-Law 89-10 continue to be an asset to us. The Opportunity Class, now in its second year of operation is almost completely funded with these monies.

Again this year Cornish received an additional \$2.00 per student for the improvement of its library materials from the Title II program. Approximate \$1,500 has been realized over the past three years in this category.

Curriculum and Supervision

The reports of the principal and School Board refer to this phase also, however, I feel it important to comment briefly. Innovation and improvement are the two words that best describe current

academic programs in the Cornish School. The continuous progress programs in reading is but one example. At curriculum meetings teachers are devoting extra hours to curriculum improvement. The teacher consultant's program of demonstration lessons and assistance to teachers is an ongoing process.

Your School Board

So many hours are devoted by this dedicated board, individually and collectively. The pursuit of scholastic excellence is always foremost in their scholastic minds. To improve teacher morale, they authorize an accumulative sick leave policy and employed a teacher aide to relieve them of non-teaching duties, thereby enabling the teachers to devote extra time to individual student problems,, or simply to return to the classrooms more refreshed and thereby more effective.

In Conclusion:

This report could and perhaps should continue indefinitely; however, so as not to become laborious to the reader, let me conclude by thanking first the citizens of Cornish for their continued support of their school; the teaching and non-teaching staff for their loyal devotion and competence; the school board members for their guidance and support; and Mr. Amari and Mr. Waldo for their invaluable assistance.

Public education in Cornish will continue to strive forward because of their leadership.

Principal's Report

The school year 1967-68 has been one of change and progress. It has been one in which new ideas are being tried so that the students of the town might be offered a better and more complete education. It has been one in which everyone, administration, faculty and other members of the working staff buckled into harness to make it a most fruitful year at the school.

The teaching staff has remained basically the same. The two exceptions are Mrs. Ruth Schneider who is in charge of second grade and Mr. Frank Stone who teaches music to all 238 students.

Without doubt, the biggest and most significant change occurred in the reading program. In the past it has been the practice for each teacher to give reading instruction to every student in her class. Since there are many ability levels in a given grade, often the teacher to reach each student effectively had to teach reading at four different speeds. This obviously took a great deal of time and did not allow much, if any, individual attention. To alleviate this condition somewhat, a student is placed in a class whose reading level is close to his. The result is a group of 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th graders all at one reading level. They are easier to instruct, get more of the teacher's time and learn more effectively because they do not have to compete with faster readers or wait for slower ones. The program has been enthusiastically received by student and faculty alike and would not have been possible without the wholehearted support of the administration. As a continuation of the policy of innovation and change for the better, the administration and staff are engaged in a study of the history and geography program. Out of this study we hope to emerge with a program that will offer the child a more solid and meaningful approach in this subject area.

Once again this year student activities are many and varied. There is, of course, our sports program consisting of basketball and baseball for the boys and cheerleading and softball for the girls. Since the inception of this program many of these young athletes have gone on to do respectably well on their respective high school teams.

Another activity for the eighth grade students is the annual trip to Burlington, Vermont where four of them appear on the WCAX-TV "Current Events Quiz." Although they have not beaten

their competition in either of the two trips, they nonetheless enjoyed themselves and were provided with an enlightening experience.

Then, too, there is the annual spelling bee in which 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th graders compete against each other for the top spelling honors in the school. The winner of this then travels to Claremont where he competes against others from the area.

A most significant development occurred this year with the organization of the building committee. A number of items were studied by this committee and I would like to emphasize some points brought out by the study. First of all the school is too small. While the classroom numbers have not yet reached overflowing proportions they are nonetheless full and we have no room to cope with our ever-growing population. There are youngsters who need special help, yet we have neither the facilities nor the staff to help them. We desperately need a library. It is presently impossible for a student to engage in independent research for he has no place to go and nothing to read if he could get there. Our cafeteria is presently doubling as an auditorium causing problems of scheduling. Finally, we should consider a kindergarten to give the youngsters another year to learn to fit into a world that has new knowledge literally raining down on us every day.

It would have been impossible to have functioned effectively throughout the year had it not been for the support of the school program by the school staff, the administration, the P.T.A., the Y A K Club and the townspeople. To the Board must go a great deal of the credit for the progress which has been made this year as they, along with Mr. Disnard, Mr. Waldo and Mr. Amari have provided enthusiastic support to enable us here at the school to do our job more effectively. The teachers must be congratulated on their fine job for the year. The fact that they took on new assignments enthusiastically is indicative of their desire to work for the betterment of the school for the students sake.

Our all-purpose handy man and custodian Raymond Mark deserves a vote of thanks from all. In addition to his regular chores of keeping the school spotless his typical day might range from taking a sick youngster home to fixing a broken desk with many and varied activities thrown in. With all the jobs he handles it would be difficult for us to imagine the school operating smoothly without him.

The cooks, Mrs. Frances Ackerman and Mrs. Vera Bean are once again supplying us with the finest lunches in the area. It would be impossible to count the comments during the year that are spoken in praise of this fine food.

Our two teacher aides, Mrs. Clara Weld and Mrs. Anne Greenleaf have been most valuable this year by taking much of the non-teaching burden of supervision off the teachers. The teachers are most appreciative of this.

There are many thanks which are due the P.T.A. for its support through the year, to the Y A K Club which again has made it possible for the sports program to work and to the townspeople who supported the school through gifts or any other means.

It could be said that the office would not be the same place without our most efficient secretary, Mrs. Alice Cushing. Called upon many times to undertake a new assignment, she comes through with the job done just as we would have wanted it done. She has done a magnificent job directly for me by taking the daily routine details and keeping them in order and then referring to me only matters which might require my personal attention. This, of course, eliminates much time that I otherwise would have to be absent from the classroom.

It has been an interesting and satisfying year for me and I look forward to returning next year as your teaching principal.

Report of Building Study Committee

January 16, 1968

At the last School District Meeting the School Board was instructed to appoint not less than 4 and not more than 6 voters to act with the Board as a building study committee to review the building needs and submit recommendations at the 1968 School District Meeting. Acting upon these instructions the following persons were appointed to the committee:

Mr. Robert Hilliard
Mrs. David Bevan
Mrs. Donald Hood

Mr. Roy Stewart
Mr. Stephen Tracy
Mr. Norman Stowell

The Committee has held six meetings during the year, and sub-committees have carried out special assignments between meetings. Among subjects which have received the Committee's attention are the following:

1. School population trends and predictions
2. The need for remedial classes in Reading and Mathematics
3. Team teaching
4. Ungraded school systems
5. Kindergarten
6. The existing school plant
7. School libraries
8. Expanded curriculum to include Physical Education, Music Art, and Vocational Education
9. Extension of present driveway facilities

The Committee submits the following report of the results of its activities:

A. School Plant: An analysis of the existing school plant shows that there are a number of deficiencies which make it difficult, and sometimes impossible, for the school to function effectively. Among these deficiencies are the following:

1. The dining area seats 100 pupils by excessive crowding, whereas the number of children participating in the lunch program is nearly 150.
2. The average classroom contains 712 sq. ft. with the largest containing 745 square feet. Using accepted standards, the existing classrooms should seat a total of 190 pupils whereas they are occupied by 245.
3. The eight classrooms do not allow the offering of such school programs as school assemblies, physical education, music, art, dramatics, remedial classes, and opportunity class.
4. There exists no space for kindergarten, although the School Board (as well as the Committee) believes that kindergarten should be offered.
5. No space is available for a school library.
6. The Town Hall offers the only facility for (1) assembly of the entire school group, (2) large group activities, (3) physical education and sports. These activities could be more effective if carried on within the school building itself.
7. Inadequate storage space for books and supplies.
8. Present driveway arrangement necessitates busses turning around and backing up in play area.

B. Expansion Needed: The Committee is convinced that an expansion of the school building is essential, but it is not prepared at this time to offer specific recommendations as to the precise nature and scope of such an expansion. The Committee feels the need for additional time in which to continue its studies of such matters as the following:

1. Kindergarten
2. Additional classrooms to relieve overcrowding and to provide rooms for remedial classes, regrouping of students according to ability and to allow a student to develop to his fullest potential in various areas such as art and music.
3. School library
4. Enlarged dining area and improved kitchen facilities.

5. The possibility of a Multi-Purpose Room to solve dining problem, to accommodate kindergarten, to permit assembly, to provide area for physical education and dramatics.
6. More office space for health, administration, teachers work room and lounge.

C. Recommendation: The Committee is requesting that it be authorized to continue its studies one more year so that it can complete its work and prepare and submit to the voters a number of specific recommendations for solutions of the existing problems.

D. Appreciation: The Committee wishes to extend its thanks for the valuable contributions which have been made by Assistant Superintendent Waldo, Mr. Amari, and Mr. Stowell. The Committee also wishes the citizens of Cornish to know that it would welcome comments and suggestions from any interested persons.

Report of the School Nurse

To the Cornish School Board and the Citizens of Cornish I herewith submit my annual report as school nurse.

Examinations given during the school year of 1966-1967 were as follows: Vision tests totaled two hundred and thirty-nine, of which eight were shown to need further examination by family eye specialist. Hearing tests were given to one hundred and thirty-two children, of which none required follow up work.

Four children attended the Child Guidance Clinic.

Two hundred and forty-eight children were weighed and measured and checked for noticeable health problems by the school nurse.

Tuberculin testing was done to fifty-two students of grades one and seven; no children showed a positive reaction. The Heaf Test was used.

There was a large number of cases of mumps reported for the school year, totaling sixty-six. No serious health problems occurred during the year

Dr. Wilmot had a Dental Health Program for the children in which dental kits were given out to each child.

The excellent school lunch program is continuing at Cornish and is well patronized.

I would, at this time, like to express my sincere appreciation for the cooperation and assistance given to me by the teaching staff and other school personal at the Cornish School. It was a pleasure working with them.
