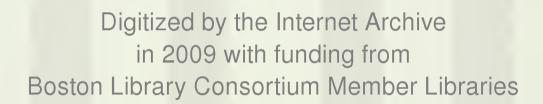

TOWN OF CROYDON TOWN WARRANT THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF CROYDON, County of Sullivan, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Croydon Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday the 13th day of March next, at 11:00 o'clock in the forenoon, (polls not to close earlier than 7:00 o'clock in the afternoon), to act upon Article One; and to meet at the said Hall on Saturday the 17th day of March next at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon remaining warrant articles.

- Article 1. To choose one Selectmen for three years, one Trustee of the Trust Funds and Cemeteries for three years, and all such offices and agents that may be necessary for the transaction of the Town business for the ensuing year.
- Article 2. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$140,000 for the purpose of purchasing land in the Town of Croydon for future Town and School purposes and to conduct such surveying, soil testing, and appraisal work as may be deemed necessary by the Board of Selectmen in negotiating such purchase. Further to see if the Town will authorize the issuance of not more than \$140,000 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33) and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon.

 (By Petition, the Board of Selectmen does not recommend this article)
- Article 3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$237,925 for general town operations.

- Article 4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Thousand Three Hundred and Eight Dollars (\$11,308) for the Croydon Police Department. (Recommended by the Selectmen)
- Article 5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty Five Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars (\$65,900) to replace the 87GMC cab and chassis with a 2001 Freightliner Model FL80 cab and chassis; to switch the body on the 87GMC to the new cab and chassis; to purchase a new plow frame, wing tower, wing plow and OnSpot automatic chains which will be installed on the new truck; and to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw \$34,000 from the Capitol Reserve Highway Equipment Fund to offset the amount to be raised by taxation. (Recommended by the Selectmen)
- Article 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) for the Capital Reserve Fund for Highway Department Equipment. (Recommended by the Selectmen)
- Article 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) to use toward digitizing permanent town records.

 (Recommended by the Selectmen)
- Article 8. To Transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Croydon Police Department Report for the Year Ending December 31, 2000

My first full year in office has been an exciting one. There have been several unique calls in Croydon for the Police Department, to include a home invasion and a few acts of animal abuse involving horses.

Upon taking this position, the selectmen tasked me with the reduction of speeders on Route 10. This, I believe, has been accomplished. As you will be able to see in the statistical part of this report, I have written many summonses, although toward the end of the year the number of summonses had slacked off, due to the lack of speeders located. Many warnings were issued.

I have maintained a 100% conviction rate for the year. On one particular arrest and conviction, I was able to recoup 13% of my police budget in fines.

The 1995 Ford Explorer has been driven 4877 miles during the past year and is still in good shape and has been maintained properly. The current mileage is 33916. I have received a recall for the cruiser and I will have this matter taken care of.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the persons who have helped the Croydon Police Department during the past year with donations of educational material for the school children and donations of office products for the police department. This has resulted in me not asking for any monies for education for the children, and no monies for office products this year.

In conjunction with the Sullivan County Sheriffs Department, I have conducted several classes at the Croydon Village School. The classes include Stranger Danger, Halloween Safety, Firearms Safety, and the Dangers of Smoking. The classes will continue once a month throughout the school year.

I have upgraded the police department with a computer, a modern typewriter, a crime scene / finger printing kit, and a digital camera. The cruiser has been upgraded with a security cage for the rear seat. These items were obtained at no cost to the taxpayers of Croydon.

TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER REPORT

There are 2,200 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the state. Each town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention, and law enforcement. The number of fires reported during the 2000 fire season was below average as referenced in the statistics below. Despite this, our network of fire towers and detection patrols were still quite busy with the fire towers being first to report over 135 fires. These fires were quickly and accurately reported to the local fire department for their prompt and effective suppression efforts. Wildland fires occurring in areas where homes are situated in the woodlands are a serious concern for both landowners and firefighters. Homeowners can help protect their homes by maintaining adequate green space around them and making sure that houses are properly identified with street numbers. Please contact the Forest Protection Bureau to request a brochure to assist you in assessing fire safety around your home and woodlands. To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing ALL outside burning. Fire permits are required for any open burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow where the burning will be done. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are eleven Forest Rangers who work for the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. Forest Rangers have investigated numerous complaints regarding violations of the timber harvest and forest fire laws, and taken enforcement action to ensure compliance. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our office at 271-2217, or for general information visit our website at www.dred.state.nh.us.

The State of New Hampshire operates 16 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols, and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection system and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. These factors are critical in controlling the size of wildland fires, and keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible. Due to permitting and fire safety concerns, please contact your local fire department **BEFORE** using portable outdoor fire places and vessels, including those constructed of clay, concrete or wire mesh.

Please contact your local fire department before doing ANY outside burning.

FROM THE CROYDON HISTORICAL SOCIETY - a few facts for you to think about...

The East Village School building and District 2 came into existence in 1780, that's 221 years ago. The building has seen some changes and modernization over the years, but the exterior bricks and size are original. In 1853, 80 students attended the winter session within its two rooms. Miss Augusta Cooper instructed the 42, four to fourteen year olds and Dr. Williams Barton instructed the 38, fifteen to twenty-one year old students. All grade levels attended District 2 - East Village - until 1912, when 5 high school students were tuitioned to Newport at \$24 each.



In 1953, Lawrence Darling purchased a bus, and drives the students to Newport, the East Village and Flat schools. By 1958, we retain only the 25, first through forth grade students in the East Village school, Croydon native Doris (Barton) Farrington is teacher at \$2850 annual salary. In 1965, the town leases a new bus. In 1966, we enter an area agreement with Newport, with an estimated average per student cost of \$285.00. (The rate will be estimated and determined annually by the receiving District-Newport. No vote or input to have any effect on this rate.) 1966-Actual Avg. per student cost-\$356.

In 1968 Harry and Marie Newcomb share the duty of driving the bus, salary \$2080. In 1991, we purchase a new bus for \$38,960. In 1999, the

school gets a handicap ramp access. In June 2000, Harry retires from driving the bus after 32 years.

REPORT OF NEWPORT EMS DIVISION Calendar Year 2000

During the period January 1, 2000 through December 31, 2000 this department responded to 39 calls for service in the Town of Croydon, compared to 33 calls handled in calendar year 1999.

As the 911 EMS provider for five communities, we will handle approximately 1,200 emergencies this year. We hope you don't require our services, but you may rest assured that if you should need us, we will respond in a timely and professional manner.

State law requires that we transport to the closest appropriate facility for emergency patient care. This means, in most cases, New London or Valley Regional hospitals. In certain circumstances, we may transport to Dartmouth Hitchcock, depending on location of the call and nature of the injury or illness.

We wish to thank the citizens, and the emergency service providers of Croydon for their continued support.

Lake Sunapee Region Visiting Nurse Association and Affiliates

It seems that everywhere we look we see or read something about technology and its impact on our lives. Increasingly we communicate, shop, investigate and learn online. During the past year, Lake Sunapee Region Visiting Nurse Association has invested resources and time to educate staff so that we can use technology to its best advantage in caring for patients in their homes. Since so much of what we do involves the healing touch you might wonder why we would invest so heavily in technology. Our mission at Lake Sunapee Region Visiting Nurse Association is to provide home health services that will preserve the dignity and independence of those for whom we provide care. Technology is one tool that supports that mission.

Over the past year, we have spent a great deal of time preparing for a change in Medicare reimbursement going from a cost-reimburse system to a prospective payment system (PPS). This is the first major change to Medicare since it was initiated in 1965. Under PPS each patient must receive a comprehensive assessment called OASIS, a questionnaire involving over 100 questions about the patient's clinical status, functional status and need for therapy. From those questions, a payment for an episode of care lasting up to 60 days is determined. One of our major concerns was to ensure that we provided technology that would allow the nurses and therapists to collect this information, but have the time needed to actually provide *care* to the patient. Over the summer, all clinicians have been trained and received laptop computers. This allows the staff access to the most up to date information on each patient and allows administration to have the data necessary for regulatory and reporting purposes.



We have also invested in state of the art technology or contracted with other providers to bring the latest in clinical advances to your home. As patients leave the hospital more quickly or have operative procedures done on an outpatient basis, more technology is needed in the home. This technology enhances patient care, improves efficiency and lowers costs. Technology can allow a terminally ill child to be at home with his family or can allow an adult needing intravenous therapy to continue going to work.

During the past year we have also invested in training and in competency assessment for our staff to ensure that their assessment and treatment skills are of the highest quality to meet patient needs. We have specialists on staff in the areas of cardiology, wound care, diabetes, pediatrics and hospice. All of our clinical staff and the support staff back at the office are committed to achieving the best outcome for each and every patient we see. We are gratified by the strong community support we receive and by the comments on our care submitted by patients and families.

In fulfilling its mission, Lake Sunapee Region Visiting Nurse Association provided a number of community benefits for residents of Merrimack and Sullivan counties in addition to charity care in excess of \$75,000.

- Administered the Lifeline Personal Response System for 208 individuals
- Provided weekly Parent Child Support Group sessions for 40 families, including free child care and transportation, if needed
- Presented community education programs on CPR, first aid, Sudden Infant Death Syndrome, Caregiver Training and others
- Trained 10 new Hospice Volunteers and provided continuing education for 16 established volunteers
- Participated in community health fairs
- Provided clinical experiences for 12 nursing students and special project sites and internships for nursing, business and social work students
- Provided meeting room space for outside groups
- Distributed weather emergency information and File of Life kits to each patient admitted to LSRVNA services
- Provided medication assistance and preventive dental care for needy children
- Provided storage space and distributed food for the Kearsarge Food Pantry
- Offered job shadowing opportunities for students from local high schools, technical schools, colleges and universities
- · Participated on the Merrimack and Sullivan County ServiceLink advisory boards
- Provided vaccines free or at cost to adults in the community
- Promoted early reading by providing a children's book to each child delivered at New London Hospital
- Provided bereavement support groups and home visits

During the past year 50 residents of the town of Croydon utilized the services of Lake Sunapee Region Visiting Nurse Association. Our Home Care program provided 495 visits to 14 patients. The Pediatrics programs cared for 11 children and families. Our Long-term Care program provided 150 hours of care for 3 patients. Influenza vaccine was provided for 20 residents and Life Line services for 2 residents.

All of us at Lake Sunapee Region VNA thank you for your support, and look forward to providing home health, hospice and community services for the residents of Croydon in the coming year.

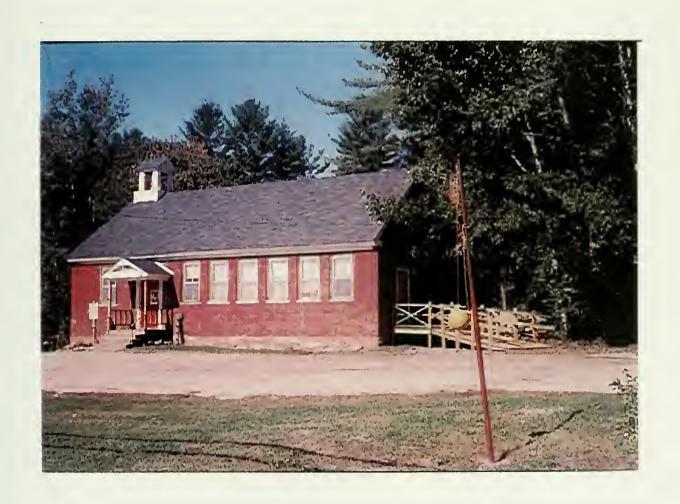

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Croydon qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall located on Route 10, in said district, on Saturday March 17, 2001 at 1:00 PM to act upon the articles set forth in this warrant not covering the election of district officers. Said officers will be elected by official ballot and checklists at the Town Hall on the 13 day of March 2001. The polls will remain open for this purpose from I 1:00 AM and 7:00 PM.

ARTICLE 1

To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 2

To see if the School District will vote to determine and fix the salaries of school district officers as follows: school board members \$300.00 each; school district moderator \$50.00 per meeting; school district clerk \$35.00 per meeting; and school district treasurer \$435.00 per year.

ARTICLE 3

To see if the School District will raise and appropriate from undesignated fund balance, (surplus) as of June 30, 2001, if available, an amount not to exceed \$1,0,000.00 to be placed in equal amounts into the capital reserve funds known as School Capital Reserve Fund - Special Education and School Capital Reserve Fund - Buildings.

ARTICLE 4

To see if the School District will raise and appropriate as a deficit appropriation the sum of \$45,000.00 to the 2000-2001 school budget to cover special education and tuition cost overruns carried forward from the prior year.

ARTICLE 5

To see if the School District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$58,000.00 for the purchase of a full size school bus and to further authorize the withdrawal of up to \$58,000.00 from the School Transportation Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose.

ARTICLE 6

To see if the School district will vote to raise and appropriate \$834,615.00 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for the school district officials and agents, and for the payment for the statutory obligations of the district. This article does not include appropriations voted in other warrant articles.

ARTICLE 7 BY PETITION

To see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 10,000.00 for the purpose of conducting a feasibility study to determine if the Croydon School District should build an elementary school, and if so, where.

ARTICLE 8

To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

SAU ADMINISTRATIVE TEAM REPORT

The Croydon School Board, staff at the Croydon Village School and the SAU staff have worked together to

- address "quality education" for all our students.
- work toward a "shared vision" for the Croydon School.

The SAU staff is fully committed to making certain that Croydon receives its full share of services and even a little more. Our team brings specific expertise in the areas of administration, curriculum, finance and special education. Three or four of us attend all monthly meetings.

It has been a team effort to support the students and teachers of the school as we reinforce our commitment to high student achievement.

- Time has been spent linking our curricula to the New Hampshire proficiencies.
- The teachers have participated in SAU staff development programs to expand teaching strategies.
- Integrating technology has been a focus and donated computers have helped us increase the amount of time students can spend using the computer as a tool for learning.
- Entitlement grants from the Federal Government have provided us with resources to enrich and reinforce student learning.
- All students have been involved in state and standardized assessments to provide us with check-points throughout our students' learning process.
- Transition to Newport Schools has been systematically planned and smoothly implemented.

We appreciate parent and community involvement and hope that those of you that can will become a mentor to a student, a reader to the younger students, a visiting teacher on something that is special to you and would appeal to students in grades K-3. We want to provide a wealth of opportunities for our students. Please join us as we plan learning programs for Croydon students. We are only a telephone call away. Thank you for your support.

Our school bus is now 10 years old and in need of replacing. There are sufficient funds in our bus capital reserve fund to purchase a new bus. It is our intent to equip a new bus with automatic chains, a two way radio and other safety equipment needed to provide safe transportation for our children.

The school board is also addressing various building needs to keep our building safe and in good condition. We will be presenting and adopting a Capital Improvements Plan that will establish a plan for capital purchases and building renovations for the school district.

In the area of special education we are well into our second year of the Five Year Action Plan developed in 1999 as a result of our onsite evaluation.

Teacher work days have afforded Croydon staff training in a variety of areas including technology, curriculum adaptation and behavior management. Consistency in paperwork throughout the SAU #43 has facilitated the administration of special education services in Croydon. As we continue to expand special education services along a continuum that is most cost effective, new programs have been developed and existing programs and services have been restructured to meet the needs of Croydon students more efficiently.
