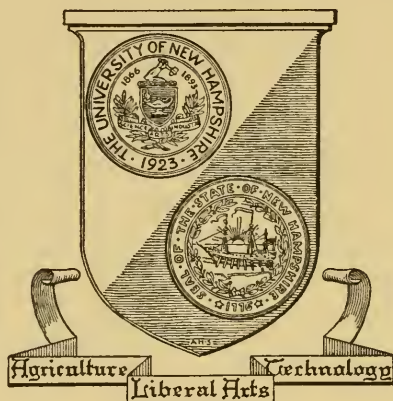

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# ORGANIZATION

of the

## CITY GOVERNMENT FOR THE YEAR 1940

The city government for 1940 was organized Wednesday evening, January 3, at a meeting held in the main hall of the Opera House and Mayor Henry J. Proulx delivered the following inaugural address:

### Mayor Proulx's Inaugural

Rev. Father, Members of the City Council, Ladies and Gentlemen:

As a result of the decision of the electorate on November 28, I stand privileged, as your Mayor of the City of Franklin for the year 1940, and for the highest honor accorded a citizen of our community, I am grateful. For this recognition, I am thankful to my party for its nomination and loyal support, and I am indebted to Franklin's liberal voters, who shared more than generously in their contribution to the largest majority ever accorded a mayor in the history of our city election.

Time and time alone will tell if I am worthy of this confidence and can live up to this trust, which I propose to guard with every effort at my command.

It would be a breach of faith to use this opportunity, reminiscing on pre-campaign experiences and propaganda, which were perpetrated by our "Blue Ribbon" Machiavelian politicians, whose influence has been so keenly felt during the periods of our city elections: it should be sufficient to say, that honest people expect their confidence to be treated with consideration and sooner or later, they will resent the misuse of the only privilege they can delegate to anyone.



Insofar as I am concerned, my sole interest rests in an administration for the people, which can be hoped for in the harmony and understanding found within our governing body, while striving to attain a common objective, an administration of constructive economy.

To carry out this program, deliberations should be non-partisan in nature and it will require the utmost cooperation of the members of the City Council, in whom I have the utmost confidence and in whom I expect there will be a spirit of resolve to adopt the same objective, in behalf of the electorate, to whom they owe their unselfish efforts as trustees.

### **Unemployment**

Were it not for the uncertainty of unemployment, we could look forward to the coming year with optimism; but unemployment and its associated agencies, depending on its extent, has a far reaching influence on our economic structure, and a farther reaching effect on a city budget, the problem of any city government, and the concern of all taxpayers.

The outlook for 1940 should, however, offer economic encouragement to our industries, so indispensable to any community and upon which we rely for our existence. One factor should be the demand for their commodity, created by a state of war, involving several foreign countries, who are using their man power for national defense, and who are depending on neutral countries for their requirements.

### **Flood Control Dam**

Another sign of encouragement should be the Flood Control Dam which will require two years and a half to complete and, which will involve an expenditure of 11 millions of dollars. This project should absorb the greater part of our unemployment that can qualify physically.

Our proximity to the Flood Control Dam allows other opportunities to repatriate unemployment, as there cannot be an activity of this proportion which will not reflect benefits to the community, and this should be of a sizable aspect. Merchants, farmers and builders will require more help, and many unemployed who are partially impaired by temporary disabilities, may find their opportunity to help themselves in this field.

An effort by Franklin manufacturers, the Franklin Chamber of Commerce and Franklin citizens in a crusade to employ Franklin unemployed, ought to be a hopeful experiment to those vitally concerned.

## W. P. A.

W. P. A. is a grant to which we subscribe from the Federal Government, intended to absorb the unemployment in a classification of employees, who otherwise would be idle and would become needy, through no fault of their own, and it has acted as a reserve to which we can appeal and which otherwise would have to be raised by taxation. This benefit of the Federal Government saved the taxpayers of Franklin \$44,068.90 in the year 1939. Since 1935, the year of the institution of the W. P. A., our city has been the beneficiary of \$199,063.46 divided into the following projects:

Roads, Streets and Sidewalks,	\$60,374.37

Through the medium of the W. P. A., it should be possible to certify employees not assimilated in the previous suggested groups and round out our problem of unemployed to a reasonable solution. Incidentally, for the benefit of a few who have been misinformed about my position on the W. P. A., the figures above should be enough to convince them that no one can afford to "kill the goose that lays the golden egg" and be responsible to cut the lifeline that has been extended to communities to solve their unemployment problem. I am opposed, however, to city officials who use W. P. A. as a means to obtain overseers' jobs, when they are financially independent and when they use it to further their own personal advancement and security. I think it little short of crime when city officials will certify in preference to eligibles, non-eligibles for the purpose of their political expediency. In view of the limited number that can be involved or certified for the W. P. A., unless a strict attitude is maintained for qualification, a worthy eligible is denied and becomes wanting, at the expense of a non-eligible who thrives at the other's misfortune.

### Relief

The problem of relief is our responsibility and regardless of its causes, those affected should receive an encouraging and helping hand. Applicants and their cases for this service, should be immediately checked and if found qualified, the decision should be swift and expedient. As a work of mercy, it should be timely, as time is a factor to health and health is a factor to morale.

Without encouragement and sympathy for their temporary plight, strong and promising citizens may become tempered subjects of crime, violence and "isms". Whereas no one wants to see privation in a land of plenty, many are justified in their censure of a possible excess, and this should be carefully guarded against, if we are to expect distribution, because, after all, the success of distribution is adequacy.

Our only safeguard against this possibility, due to the weekly change in the status of a recipient on relief, is contact which should be done by a qualified social worker, trained in the fundamentals of social work. To support this contention, I refer you to the recommendation of Harry O. Page, Director of Relief for the State of New Hampshire, under whose supervision a survey of our relief problem in the City of Franklin was made in 1938. This recommendation has never been adopted by our City Council. I could at length give you data in this report which was revealing, but could not stress upon your mind any more vividly the need and emphasis of close supervision, than to say that an excess of \$1.50 per week per family would effect the city and county appropriation by \$7500. I do not want to convey to you by intimation that there has been any excess in the relief department in 1938 and 1939, neither could anyone vouch that there hasn't been any excess during the mentioned period. What I want to imply is that the causes for excess in 1937 have not, in my opinion, been remedied, that relief and its associated agencies was a \$114,068.98 business in 1939. Nevertheless, it was administered by one city official who has a clerical assistant in this department and who holds a multitude of offices and commissions, spending and making decisions on spending, without so much as a committee to suggest or supervise his activity.

I would like to make my position clear on this matter, as I have no grief toward any city official, but I would like to see this department handled as it can be, if given the proper opportunity and proper machinery. I know we can save money.

We have no right to blame a city employee for consequences such as were revealed in the survey of relief of 1937. This employee had more to do than he could handle and he finds himself in the same position today. The policy of centralizing our government is sound and is economical providing the consolidation of offices does not become a load too heavy to carry and as soon as it does, you are bound to lose its efficiency, its economy and the chances for success.

In connection with the department of relief, I believe some understanding can be reached with the county officials to defray their share and cost of engaging the services of one or two city physicians for the administration of medical requirements of those who are on the relief rolls. This plan is in operation in many of our cities and has been recommended as very satisfactory to patients and city.

### Highways

The equipment of the Highway Department should not necessitate any additional appropriation for the coming year. I believe we are showing signs of "catching up" in our roads, but the oiling should be extended if possible to preserve the foundations of those roads now in good condition as it would stimulate their need and bind its fibre. This additional oil required without additional appropriation can be provided for if some retrenchment is made in the cost of the handling of this department. For instance, I do not believe this department is large enough to support one assistant to the Commissioner, neither is the possibility remote of combining the "Barn" supervisor with the position of mechanic. This will effect a saving of \$2100. I am not suggesting, by these recommendations to discharge any employees active in these capacities, as I think the men who would be affected could be absorbed in the department.

Quite a few small streets such as Monroe, Wood, etc., have lost their surface and labor and oil used to condition them have been sacrificed. During the past year some experimenting has been made in this department with oil and roads. Experimentation is expensive and with information available at our State Highway Department on requirements and standards, I think we should leave the stage of experimentation to those who can best afford it.

Sanding, no doubt, means some cost but it is justified as it is the means of averting many serious accidents and numerous personal injuries. I cannot suggest any service which is generally so far reaching to the people of the community and is any more appreciated. Periods for sanding can be chosen so duplication of the work will be averted and its cost minimized.

In our industries and in commerce the employer usually recognizes the merit of his employees and their ability to produce. The reward for this is position and compensation. The incentive of employers is obvious and the effect on employee is acknowledged. I believe this application of a merit system in the Highway Department could be worked out effectively.

### **Police Department**

The result of the Annual schooling to which our police department has attended at Durham yearly, is beginning to make its manifestation in this department and the marshal and staff with the Police committee are to be congratulated for their "set up" on finger printing, photography, and for its consideration of the police radio, that now makes our police department a "D. C. I." and prepared to score in the work that makes them so invaluable for the protection of life and property.

### **Fire Department**

Our Volunteer Fire Department is accorded a rank with the best of our state and is performing its assignment with pride to our community, and its record vouches for this deserved consideration. Probably no other department in our city government is called upon to perform such varied duties "out of line of duty", from assisting in disaster to rescue work and lending a neighborly hand to another department. Three instances are recorded in the past three years, where the fire department rendered a service to the Water Department, estimated at \$1,000 and did not receive any compensation for the same. The appropriation of the Fire Department I believe stretches the farthest of any in our city in benevolence, and our taxpayers ought to be grateful for its administration and efficiency.

### **Schools**

With one of the best High School buildings in New England, at a saving of \$110,000, as the result of a grant by the Federal Government, the citizens of Franklin are realizing a long wanted need and, although the maintenance should be slightly more than the amount required for our old High School, this amount should not surpass the cost of repairs that were expended annually on the old building.

No one regrets the wise application of school appropriations, providing a certain measure or standard is derived and providing the program consistently remains within the means of our ability to pay.

A new athletic field in the rear of the new High School would not only improve the background and help the surface water shed, but it would centralize athletic activity with school programs. This cost would not exceed \$1500. We owe it our students who are participating, to have the playing field accessible for their safety and health, if not for their convenience.



May I suggest to the Alumni Association this improvement as a Memorial to the Alumni now deceased, which will perpetuate the achievements of the students and athletes of Franklin High, and merit for its sponsors the hearty approval of the community.

### **Water Department**

This \$300,000 utility now free and clear, owned by the citizens of Franklin, is the only revenue bearing department in our government. People are eager to follow its progress and development, and one way this can be made possible is to suggest to the Board that they make their annual report more detailed, and thereby dispel the impression, gained by such brief reports, that the Water Department is a closed corporation.

Appreciating that extensions and improvements cost the department approximately \$60,000 in the last four years (\$17,467.56 of which was granted by the W. P. A.) the equipment should be in excellent condition, and the board should be ready to contribute to the annual budget, required to run and operate this city yearly.

Taken from the city reports of '36, '37 and '38 are figures which are interesting and which I hope are no indication of the trend we are to expect this year. I refer to the commercial sales of '36 which were \$24,868.71; in 1937 which were \$21,669.14; and in 1938 which were \$16,451.33.

Ordinarily the above figures should be contrary to expectations, owing to improvements and extensions in this department and without an explanation for these decreases in sales in these reports, it becomes increasingly difficult to explain to the people, that there are factors that contribute to make these differences.

### **Parks—Playgrounds**

In no city in New Hampshire can be found the opportunities offered at Odell Park, to both young and old and for summer and winter. I would like to impress the City Council that although conditions might be improved at the park with the present appropriation, that we spend the least for recreation of any city of the State of New Hampshire and with small addition to our yearly allowance in this department we can receive the benefits of a general diversified program. Besides the skating rink I think allowance should be made for a hockey rink, grounded and lighted, which will not be available only to children, but give the boy who

is working during the day a means of relaxation and enjoyment, and something for the non-participant to get interested in. This ground rink will contribute to another purpose, namely the assurance of early skating, caused by the difficulty of the pond freezing, as the result of the action of the river.

During the past summer about 100 boys, formed in two leagues, at a cost which was almost negligible (I believe it was \$35) used the park almost daily and good clean amusement for spectator and participant was the result. Expressing the reaction of this activity, by the City Marshal, John Dodge, I quote: "I think this is one of the greatest moves to keep the boys' minds interested that we have ever had, you do not see them on the streets and the parents and I know they are safe in good clean sport".

I realize that this is not a complete program and that it will not involve all groups, but it is a start that has merit, and can be improved on yearly.

I want to extend to the Commission my whole-hearted cooperation in this program, which will be within our reach and certainly confined to means.

### **Recommendations**

1. That a Board of Three Citizens, one from each ward, direct and supervise activities of an Administrator of Relief and Unemployment, (or Overseer of the Poor) and that this department obtain the services of a social worker or contact employee, for the advancement of the department.

2. That the office or offices of city physicians be created to answer the needs of the relief department at a stated salary per year.

3. That a citizens' committee representing the Manufacturers and Chamber of Commerce be invited to cooperate with the Administrator of Relief and Unemployment (or Overseer of the Poor) in a crusade to "Employ Franklin Men Unemployed".

4. That the contractors of the Flood Control Dam be invited to meet with the Council, this Administrator of Relief and the representation of the citizens' committee, and determine to what extent we are to expect their cooperation in employing physically fit, "Franklin men unemployed".



5. That we use the facilities of the W. P. A. in the continuance of this benefit in a program that will prove useful and constructive.

6. That we continue the policy of borrowing money in anticipation of taxes, applied so ably by my predecessor.

7. That we recognize the length of efficient and meritorious service rendered the city by Mrs. Mildred Gilman, by promoting her to the office of Deputy City Clerk, at the salary she now receives, that the services of the office of City Clerk will not be interrupted by sickness, absences, or other unforeseen contingencies.

In conclusion, if to any of you gentlemen of the City Council my remarks appear critical or disapproving, I want to assure you that such is not my intention, but rather to point out our existing weaknesses in the structure of our City Government and the ways and means to overcome them, and inaugurate a policy of understanding for the advancement of our cause, the City of Franklin and the people who live in it. I wish you all a Happy and Prosperous New Year.

# AUDITORS' REPORT

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Hanover, New Hampshire

January 23, 1941

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council

Franklin, New Hampshire

Gentlemen:

Pursuant to engagement we have audited the accounts and records of the City of Franklin for the year ended December 31, 1940. Our procedure included a detailed verification of the assets and liabilities of the General Fund, High School Bond Fund, City Trust Funds, and Water Department, as disclosed by the various general ledgers and, without making a detailed audit of all transactions for the period, a review of the recorded receipts and disbursements of those funds and of other City agencies to satisfy ourselves that all income due the City had been properly accounted for and that all disbursements had been made under proper authority and were supported by satisfactory vouchers.

Based on such examination, the following exhibits in our opinion fairly present the financial condition of the City of Franklin on December 31, 1940, and the results of its operations for the year then ended.

## FINANCIAL CONDITION

The City of Franklin has concluded another successful year. Net Debt has decreased \$37,112.76. Condensed comparative balance sheets, showing in summary the changes in financial condition that have taken place as a result of its operations for the current year, follow:

Bonded Debt decreased \$28,250.00 during the year. Since January 1, 1940, all notes due to Trust Funds, amounting to \$37,638.00, have been paid in full from cash on hand. A net saving in interest charges of between \$1,100.00 and \$1,200.00 is thereby assured for 1941. Cash on hand is still sufficient for current requirements.

### Operations

Operations for the year, as detailed in Exhibits III and IV, resulted in an improvement in financial condition (shown as a decrease in Net Debt) of \$37,112.76. Exhibit II presents a summary of the additions to and deductions from this account as a result of the City's business transactions during the year. Condensed comparative statements of Revenues and of Appropriations and Expenditures are given on the following page:

Revenues for the year increased \$23,180.20, due largely to an increase in the tax rate made necessary by increases in appropriations. Departmental income and reimbursements decreased \$5,594.15. Total charges against funds made available by appropriations, earnings, etc. increased \$14,978.59, the final result being charges of \$1,640.56 in excess of available credits.

**AUDIT PROCEDURE**

**Assets**

**Cash in Bank—\$53,610.18**

We have verified the above by reconciliation of the balance shown in the general ledger and on the books of the City Treasurer with the ledger balance of the depository, which was confirmed directly to us. All checks were accounted for numerically.

**Due from Tax Collector—\$1,455.92**

**Due from School District—\$600.00**

Verified in connection with our audit of the Tax Collector's records, and the records of the Board of Education.

**Taxes Receivable—\$35,425.15**

In our audit of the Tax Collector's records we have verified the 1940 tax levy as committed to him with the records of the Assessors, traced all tax collections to the general ledger and to the receipts of the

City Treasurer, and have proved the unpaid balances of all tax levies as recorded above with the books of the Tax Collector. Unpaid property taxes for 1940 are in process of further confirmation by direct correspondence with the individuals concerned.

**Taxes Bought by City—\$996.61**

We have analyzed all transactions in this account, have checked the purchases and sales for the year with the records of the Tax Collector, and have adjusted the account for additional taxes, interest, property deeded to the City, etc. The above-mentioned balance agrees with the total cost to the City of all property now held by tax sales.

**Deferred Charges—\$557.67**

This amount represents the net cost to the City in 1940 of the Marsh and Sargent Houses. The balances are carried forward to 1941 in order that a record of the total income or expense of these properties over a number of years may be available.

**Net Debt—\$275,225.95**

A complete analysis of all changes in this account is shown in Exhibit II.

**Liabilities**

**Unexpended Balance—Bridge Appropriation—\$4,195.64**

The balance listed above has been carried forward to 1941 on vote of the City Council.

**Deferred Credits—\$37.84**

This amount represents the net income to the City in 1940 from the Thomas House. The balance is brought forward to 1941 in order that the total income or expense of the property over a number of years may be available.

**Bonded Debt—\$326,000.00**

In our review of this item we have verified all interest payments and inspected or accounted for all cancelled bonds and payments in reduction of long-term serial notes.

**Due Trust Funds—\$37,638.00**

This entire amount, consisting of 3½% notes of the City of Franklin held by the Trustees of Trust Funds, was paid during the course of our audit. We have inspected the cancelled notes and have traced the payment to the books of the Trustees of Trust Funds.

## Revenues

Exhibit III shows in detail all revenues received by the General Fund during the year. Tax revenues have been verified as detailed above, receipts from the State of New Hampshire have been compared with remittance letters, and other local revenues have been checked to duplicate receipt books, license stubs or duplicate permit cards where available. We found all recorded receipts properly accounted for.

## Expenditures

We found all appropriations authorized by votes or resolutions of the City Council, and all expenditures properly recorded and supported by cancelled checks and satisfactory vouchers. Total expenditures for each month have been approved by the finance committee on each monthly draft, and the total of all drafts approved for the year have agreed with total expenditures as recorded in the general ledger.

## Other Agencies

Trust Fund transactions are summarized in Exhibit V. We have verified all trust fund assets by direct inspection and count, have determined that all income that should have been received has been received, and that all disbursements have been properly made and supported by cancelled checks. Disbursements to other City agencies have been traced to such agency's receipts.

Transactions in the New High School Bond Fund are shown in Exhibit VI. This project has been completed, and the balance of cash on hand, \$6,707.59, represents the estimated total of amounts still due to sub-contractors from the general contractor. Payment of this money to the general contractor is being held up by the City pending satisfactory adjustment of the sub-contractors' claims.

A balance sheet of the Franklin Water Works and a comparative statement of income and expenses for the past two years are presented in Exhibit VII. We have verified all assets and liabilities disclosed by the balance sheet, have adjusted asset accounts to reflect correctly only proper capital expenditures, have revised the permanent depreciation schedules, and have allocated the reserve for depreciation to the individual asset accounts. Accounts receivable, as recorded in the general ledger, did not agree with the total of individual accounts as listed on individual customers' ledger cards, and after rechecking the individual accounts with Water Department officials, we adjusted the general ledger. In accounting for income we traced meter readings for the last quarter of the year to customers' ledger cards and test-checked computations. Recommendations for improving present accounting records have been made direct to the Board of Water Commissioners. Disbursements were supported by cancelled checks and satisfactory vouchers.

Recorded receipts of the School District have been checked and found properly accounted for. Disbursements have been supported by satisfactory vouchers. The balance of cash on hand agreed with a reconciliation of the records of the depository confirmed directly to us.

We have examined the records of the Franklin Park Commission. Income has been properly recorded. Disbursements agreed with vouchers and cancelled checks. Balance of cash on hand agreed with the records of the depository.

Receipts and disbursements of the Public Library have been audited. We have satisfied ourselves that all recorded income had been properly accounted for and that proper vouchers, bills or receipts were on file covering expenditures. Cash on hand was correctly stated.

All receipts of the Overseer of the Poor have been reconciled with advances from the City Clerk as recorded in the general ledger. Disbursements have been compared with cancelled checks, and the balance of cash on hand reconciled with the balance confirmed to us by the depository. All reimbursements for relief received from Merrimack County have been checked to letters of transmittal from the County. Warrants authorizing all disbursements had been approved by the City Council.

Owing to the custom of listing all City trust funds at original values, regardless of actual gains or losses in principal resulting from changes therein, some funds are now carried at totals much in excess of the actual value of their assets. We recommend a reappraisal of all City trust funds, a restatement of their principal wherever necessary, and a reflection of actual gains or losses in principal for all funds hereafter whenever sales, maturities, or other changes result in an increase or reduction in the principal of such funds.

A satisfactory audit of the disbursements made by the Overseer of the Poor is difficult under present accounting procedure. Checks must be vouched either to the check book stubs, which is unsatisfactory from an auditing standpoint, or to the warrants presented to the Finance Committee for approval, which is likewise unsatisfactory because of the fact that one check may be divided among several different entries on the warrant. No regular cash book of receipts and disbursements is kept, and we recommend the installation of a columnar cash book with proper distribution columns for each classification of expenditure. A permanent record of all receipts and disbursements would then be available at all times.

No appropriations were made to the various City departments for 1940 until August. It is obvious that there can be very little budgetary control of expenditures under present practice. We again suggest that sound municipal accounting would be furthered by an earlier preparation and passage of the yearly budget.

Our audit of the Board of Education has disclosed unpaid bills amounting to \$2,764.12, payable in 1940, and accounts receivable of \$710.07. The difference should be appropriated in 1941 as a part of the 1941 appropriation for Schools.

Abatements made in 1940 have been listed and the reasons for each abatement detailed as recommended in our 1939 audit report. These abatement lists had not been signed as approved by the listers at the time of our audit, but we were advised by the Tax Collector that this would be done. In this connection we have noted that poll taxes of relief clients, usually abated during the year, had not been abated to date, a fact which accounts in part for the reduction in total abatements for 1940 as compared with 1939.

We were given all assistance and information necessary for a thorough audit.

# HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

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## Report of the Highway Commissioner

Favored by good weather, and with no bad washouts during the past year, the Highway Department was able to do considerable amount of work on streets and outside roads.

The road to the Manuel Farm washed out at the time of the hurricane was re-built for a distance of 710 feet, Monroe Street was graveled and treated with two coats of tar, also 400 feet on Edwards Street was graded and graveled.

The following streets were tarred during the summer: Pearl, Chestnut, Bow, Franklin, River, Memorial, Prospect, School, Webster, Gerrish, Dole Road and the road around the foot of Webster Lake.

Under a W. P. A. Program the following streets were graveled and treated with two coats of tar: Thompson Park 800 feet, Maple Square 650 feet, Wood Street 1150 feet, Proctor Street 1200 feet, Kendall Street 1500 feet, Pine Street 400 feet, Myrtle Avenue 350 feet.

With T. R. A. funds 2500 feet on the so-called Shannon Road, 1.3 miles on East Pleasant and 1.2 miles on South Prospect Street were treated with clay and chloride. On Clark Street 750 feet of new sanitary sewer was laid; also on Prospect Street a new two foot cement pipe to take care of the surface water from that section has been laid from Prospect Street along the East side of the Railroad to the river, a distance of 520 feet.

The equipment of the Highway Department is old and worn out and I recommend trading some of our trucks and plows for more up-to-date equipment.

I want to take this opportunity to thank the Mayor and Council and Committee and the employees of the Department for their loyal support and co-operation.

# FIRE DEPARTMENT

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## Engineers' Report

The following is a report from January 1, 1940 to December 31, 1940, inclusive.

The manual force of the department consists of Chief Edgar H. Wheeler, Assistants Leslie N. Boomhower and Ernest H. Brown; Engine Co. No. 1, 15 men, Francis T. Butler, Jr., Captain; Ladder Co. No. 1, 15 men, Henry J. Poisson, Captain; Hose Co. No. 1, 10 men, Bernald Cook, Captain; Drivers, Charles D. Cunningham and George St. Cyr.

### Location of Apparatus

#### Hose Co. No. 1—South Main St.

One Chevrolet hose truck, 1,000 feet of 2½ inch hose, 2 Foamite extinguishers, 2 soda and acid extinguishers, 1 30-foot ladder, 1 25-foot extension ladder, 1 12-foot roof ladder, 11 uniforms.

#### Central Fire Station—West Bow St.

One American Lafrance, Type 75 pumper with 750 gallon pump and 40 gallon booster tank, 1000 feet of 2½ inch hose, 200 feet of 1 inch booster hose, 2 smoke masks, 1 roof ladder, 1 extension ladder, 2 2½ gallon soda and acid extinguishers, 1 Brennan revolving cellar nozzle, 1 electric battery searchlight, 1 1½ inch spray nozzle, 10 uniforms.

One Mack City Service ladder truck with 500 gallon pump, 281 feet of ladders, 500 feet of 2½ inch hose, 1 deluge set, 1 cellar syphon, 1 life net, 2 hose covers for traffic, 6 salvage covers, 8 squeegees, 6 brooms, 6 mops, 1 mop wringer, 3 pails, 1 complete lighting plant consisting of 1 5-KW generator, 1 1500-watt floodlight, 1 1000 flood-light, 2 200-watt portable floodlights.

One Reo chimney and brush fire truck with 250 gallon pump and 60-gallon booster tank, 200 feet 1-inch booster hose, 800 feet 1½ inch hose, 2 24-foot extension ladders, 1 portable electric searchlight, 6 2½-gallon soda and acid extinguishers, 1 salvage cover, 4 uniforms, 1 carbon dioxide extinguisher. This truck is equipped with trailer attachment for pump cans for brush fires.

One Lincoln Special Service truck with 400 feet of 1½ inch hose, 1 pure air blower, 2 pure air masks, 300 feet pure air hose equipped with telephones, 1 inhalator, 1 first aid kit, 2 drawers of first aid supplies, 1 1500-watt generator, 1 stationary 500-watt searchlight, 1 portable 200-watt searchlight with 250 feet of cord, 1 portable battery lamp, 2 reels of half inch rope (500 feet), 1 stretcher, 2 salvage covers, 1 carbon dioxide extinguisher, 7 uniforms, saws, chains, bars, jacks, wrenches, and other equipment to handle all kinds of emergency calls. This truck is equipped with trailer attachment for life boat and trailer.

There is on hand at the Central Station 3400 feet of spare 2½ inch hose of which 500 feet is in poor condition, 20 long handled shovels for forest fires, 20 pump cans, 5 2½ gallon soda and acid extinguishers in good condition and 1 2½ gallon Foamite extinguisher.

### **Recommendations**

This has been a record year as to bell alarms, 37. Though this is more alarms in one year than we have recorded, the actual fire loss is comparatively small. This has been a drain on our funds and we have therefore been unable to carry out the plans for repairs on the building which is in need of much repairing, the roof should have a new covering, the floor and ceiling in the assembly room are in poor condition, and the building needs painting inside and out.

Due to the lack of funds we were unable to extend the Fire Alarm system as planned. The present street boxes should be placed nearer together and extensions made to cover sections of the city that at present have no such protection. Sirens should be installed at some of the intersections as a safety measure, but I doubt if this can be done out of the present amount of money that we now receive. We have installed a new bank of storage batteries at the Fire Alarm station as the old ones were unreliable. These batteries are of the latest type and are guaranteed for ten years of service.



Early this year all members of the department were blood typed for transfusions and to date have given ten transfusions. We believe this service has been a great help to the doctors in emergency cases and is an example of the kind of service the Franklin firemen are endeavoring to render to the public.

We believe that serious consideration should be given to the replacing of worn out and obsolete apparatus. Three of the trucks were purchased in 1925. Two of them are in good condition, one is in very poor condition and should be replaced this year. This could be financed over a short period if the money could not be raised at the time of purchase. The Board of Engineers feels that a certain sum of money should be set aside each year, as a depreciation fund so that when apparatus has to be purchased there would be available funds for that purpose, and would not necessitate an appropriation.

We recommend the purchase of the usual amount of fire hose, also 150 feet of booster line hose for the Reo. This should be bought soon, as the hose on the Reo is in very poor condition. We recommend that the city buy a portable pump of a capacity large enough to pump out cellars and could be used to flood both skating rinks, thus making less drain on the city reservoir, and no doubt would be useful in many other ways.

We wish to take this opportunity to thank His Honor the Mayor and the members of the Council for their assistance and cooperation through the year 1940, we feel that only through friendly discussions of our problems and cooperation in carrying them out can progress be made and in this respect we have had the pleasure of enjoying both. We are also grateful to all citizens who in any way have helped in the work of safeguarding our city from loss of life or property by fire. We believe the coming months will see a large increase in our fire losses throughout the country due to war in Europe. Therefore, it calls for extra vigilance on the part of every good citizen to be extra careful.

# PUBLIC LIBRARY

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## TRUSTEES' REPORT

January 29, 1941

To the Mayor and Members of the City Council,  
Franklin, New Hampshire.

Dear Sirs:

The reports of the Librarian and Treasurer of the Public Library for the year 1940 are herewith submitted.

Our Library is well supplied with books and other reading matter to take care of its requirements.

The number of citizens who patronize the Library rates high with the average patronage of libraries.

The cost of maintaining the Library has been kept low for a long period of time.

A small endowment fund and book fees paid by the Library patrons and gifts of books and other reading matter by interested citizens has helped much to spread the usefulness of the Library.

The physical condition of the Library building with expenditure of small amounts of money has been kept in reasonably good condition during all the years of its existence. At the present time it seems in the minds of the trustees that some necessary substantial changes to the interior of the building should be made to provide better facilities for carrying on the work done by the library and make it a more useful building to the community.

Plans have been made to cover these changes and will be submitted to the consideration of the city officials. The trustees believe the means for carrying out these changes can be provided by the city without hardship to the taxpayers or detraction from any other city department.

## LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

To the Trustees of the Franklin Public Library:

It is indeed a pleasure to present another annual report of the work accomplished at the Franklin Public Library.

Sixty-four thousand eight hundred fifteen books have been loaned during the year. Sixty-four per cent of these were adult fiction, 18% were non-fiction, and the other 18% were children's books. Unfortunately there is no way of estimating the number of books, magazines, and newspapers used by readers in the library nor of counting the numerous reference questions which have been looked up. If there were, a truer picture of the library's usefulness could be presented.

The library continues to act as the school library and carries the burden of reference work and supplementary reading for all the schools of Franklin. The teachers are increasingly co-operative.

During the year, two four-drawer legal size files have been added to the library equipment and have already proved their usefulness in relieving the congestion of valuable art and New Hampshire material.

Nine hundred sixty-six books have been added this year, and 256 have been withdrawn because they were worn out. On January 1, 1941, the library collection of 23,119 included 21,368 adult books and 1,751 children's.

Nine hundred fifty-nine dollars and thirty-nine cents (\$959.39) of the \$1,567.42 spent for books has been paid directly by the public. Two hundred thirteen dollars and seventy-five cents (\$213.75) has been used from the trust funds designated for book purchase, so that only \$393.78 has been used from the city appropriation.

The following trust fund purchases were made:

**The Dictionary of American History** from the Helen Pike Parsons Fund; **The Encyclopedia Britannica Yearbook** from the Contributors' Fund; **The Volume Library** from the Frank L. Morrison Fund; **The Scribner Radio Music Library**, to augment the Hancock Music Collection, from the Anna G. Blodgett Fund; **The History of Littleton, N. H.**, and **The History of Dartmouth College and Hanover, N. H.** continuing the policy of increasing the New



Hampshire historical collection, from the Jeremiah Clark Fund; and from the Franklin Library Association Trust Fund, the subscription to the Junior Literary Guild, and the sets, **My Bookhouse** and **My Travelship**.

Many friends of the Library have been generous with praise and books. Of the 966 books added during the year, 210 have been gifts. The library receives regularly 26 magazines and two newspapers as gifts. The Ordway Law Library has recently been increased by Mr. Ordway's gift of **The Cyclopedia of Law Proceedings**.

Story hours for the children have been held every Saturday morning during seven months of the year, and the response of the children is still enthusiastic. An attendance of 150 is not unusual. Many interested persons have generously contributed time and energy to make the story hours the success which they undoubtedly have been.

Three art exhibits have been held in Library Hall under the auspices of the W. P. A. New Hampshire Art Project.

The library has increasingly shown its interdependence with other libraries during the year. From the State Library we have borrowed technical books which we could not afford to purchase but which were needed by the borrowers in Franklin. The Manchester City Library has generously and regularly supplied, through the interlibrary loan plan, Polish books to augment our own much read and meager collection. On several occasions we have been able to loan books to other libraries.

The library continues as an institutional member of the American Library Association and the librarian is also a member. The staff are members of the New Hampshire Library Association and take an active part in its work.

The Library Hall has been used by the Woman's Club, the Hospital Aid, and the Red Cross. The latter two organizations, being charitable, have of course paid no rent.

If the library is to continue as the adult education center of the community, more money must be made available. Expansion and repairs are imperative, for without them our increasing services to the community will be greatly curtailed.

### Wood Account

We now have on hand about 300 cords of slab wood worth \$3.00 per cord, and 89½ cords of hard wood worth \$7.00 a cord.

This wood cost \$272.70 which includes gas, oil, yarding, storage delivery, foreman for cutting the wood. \$250.50 of this wood was sold to the county.

### Sewing Project

Six thousand and five articles were produced by the project from January 1, 1940 to December 13, 1940. The total cost was \$1,424.67 of which \$883.52 was reimbursed by the county. The city cost was \$541.15. This gave employment to an average of 10 women most of whom took care of themselves without extra help from relief department. The cost to us, per article, was \$.23 2-3.

## City Expense

This includes meals to transients, use of truck for bringing goods to and from sewing project, supplies not included under administrative expense and transportation of WPA workers to Hill Project, etc.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The new high school has now been occupied a year. The general arrangement of rooms, the many conveniences offered throughout the building, the splendidly lighted, heated and ventilated rooms have created a much improved attitude and interest among the pupils. The entire student body has demonstrated their respect for and appreciation of this building. It would be difficult to find a new building occupied for a year by more than

three hundred pupils, that has been kept so free from damage, or disfigurement as has this one. The pupils have seemed to feel a personal responsibility in maintaining the newness and neatness of the entire building. Much credit is due the janitors for their part in keeping the building neat and clean. They have taken pride in doing so.

The building has become a real social and civic center. Its rooms are used regularly for several club organizations not directly connected with the school, like: Hi-Y, Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C. A., Red Cross School of Instruction, Adult Evening School, and the Leadership Training for Boy Scouts. Other organizations occasionally make use of a room or rooms for an afternoon or evening function. The Assembly Hall has the past year demonstrated its popularity as a public assembling place. The K. of C., the Rotary, the firemen, have used it for their Annual Balls. The Plymouth-Keene Alumni and several other organizations have also used it. The school, of course, has made use of it for its parties, musicals, dramatics and various other activities.

The school is a public building and should be used within reason for public occasions. The public should understand, however, that the use of the building, especially for evening affairs, increases very materially the lighting cost which is charged to regular school expense. The City offers no place, no opportunity for its youth to gather in a social and civic capacity; hence the school, as a part of its educational program, is sponsoring these various activities, some of which we doubt as primarily belonging to the schools to sponsor.

In this same manner, the Junior High School gymnasium is used every night, for Boy Scout organizations, Badminton Club, composed of adult men and women, and Girls' Club, composed of office girls and clerks of the city. In other words, the school department is offering to the boys and girls, and men and women of Franklin the advantages that would be offered by a Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A.

### **Defense Project**

The school is co-operating with the Federal Government and State Department of Education in sponsoring a project for training men for machine shop work who may be able to respond to the call for skilled workmen as a part of the Defense Program. 33 different men have been enrolled in the Pre-Employment Course in this school since it began last August. 32 have enrolled in the Supplementary course, meeting one night a week for 6 hours. These men have jobs, but desire some extra training.



Of the 33 enrolled in the Pre-Employment Course, 20 have left. Only 4 of these are without jobs at present. Of the 32 enrolled in the Supplementary Course 19 have left—3 of these have jobs attributable to the school training—16 did not finish the course. There are now 26 men taking the courses.

The interest in the work is shown by the fact that very seldom is a man absent. The working hours for this group of trainees is from four o'clock P. M., to midnight five nights a week. The cost of this project is paid for by the government. The school district provides a place and equipment for carrying on the work.

We have been fortunate in having a local man who qualified as instructor, Mr. Alfred C. Elliott. The work done by these men is amazingly excellent.

### **New Course**

This year a new course has been added to our curriculum, known as "The Consumer's Course". We consider this course as practical a course as we have in school; practical because it deals with the economic side of every day living—personal and community. I mention some of the subjects considered in the class that will give an idea of what the course embraces:

1. The Problem of Existence.
2. Consumer and Producer Relationships.
3. Consumers' Economics.
4. Consumers' Money Management.
5. Consumers' Personal Loans.
6. Consumers' Use of Banking Services.
7. Shopping and Buying Methods.
8. What Consumers Should Know About Advertising.
9. Agencies Aiding the Consumer.
10. What Consumers Should Know About Insurance.
11. Spending for Housing.
12. Spending For Investment.
13. What Consumers Should Know About Law.
14. What Consumers Should Know About Frauds.
15. The Consumer Co-operative Movement.

There are 30 pupils in the class.

### **Advanced Education**

The per cent of our high school graduates enrolling for advanced educational courses in the standard colleges, teachers' training schools, commercial schools, nurse's schools, etc., is large considering the size of our classes.



The per cent each year varies from 28 to 42. Twenty years ago 5% of any graduating class going on to college would have been considered a high average.

Are too many boys going on to college? With the trend of the times—educational and industrial—are we thinking too much of the “white collar” jobs, which field is largely overcrowded and too little of industrial opportunities, which field is calling for skilled laborers or at least for intelligent boys willing and capable of learning some particular phase of industry that will prepare them for high paying positions. In the city of Franklin we have graduates of the high school who have taken positions in the mills with the idea of growing up in the business and some day becoming an overseer, superintendent, or manager. A city no larger than Franklin cannot afford to maintain a training school preparing its boys for the varied industries of the city; the expense would be prohibitive. We are training in two industrial lines only—machine shop and commercial. It is quite possible that the State of New Hampshire in the near future may provide training by means of one industrial school or several regional ones that shall prepare boys and girls as skilled laborers for the varied industries of the state. It would be well for graduates and parents to carefully consider some of the points here mentioned and decide what is best for their child.

#### **Additional Teacher**

That the 7th and 8th grades of St. Mary's School might have the advantage of Domestic Arts and Woodwork training, like what the public school children were having, the City Council voted an extra \$1000.00 for preparing, equipping and furnishing supplies for the room formerly used as machine shop in the Hancock building.

To afford the opportunity for Domestic Arts in the regular Domestic Arts rooms at junior high school, necessitated the employment of an extra domestic arts teacher. Two afternoons a week are used for both boys and girls in these departments. The remaining time of the two teachers employed is used in the regular public school work. The arrangement seems to be working out satisfactorily.

#### **Transportation**

Franklin has been transporting to its schools all the children for whom there was room in the buses on the transportation routes. The law, however, requires the school district to transport only those below 9th grade living two miles or more from the school they attend. The drivers of the buses have been very kind in

taking in the pupils along their route so long as they had room at no extra expense to the district. This year the Motor Vehicle Department and State Board of Education insist as a matter of safety that each child riding in a School Bus shall have a seat without any crowding. This has necessitated refusing bus privileges to many who have previously enjoyed them, and confining the choice of those carried to those we are obligated to carry. Because of this, many complaints have come to the Board. I am submitting the state law regarding school transportation that all interested may better understand the School Board's position.

"The district shall furnish transportation to all pupils below the ninth grade who live more than two miles from the school to which they are assigned; but when it shall appear that children live in homes so remote from schools or regular school transportation routes that the cost of transportation would constitute an unreasonable expense, the school board may, at the expense of the district, board the child near a public school; provided, that the parent or guardian may appeal to the commissioner with proposals for transportation by himself or by another, or with other solutions, and the order of the commissioner shall be final".

#### **Extra Curricula Activities**

The usual sports and various activities have been carried on as in previous years and in a quite satisfactory manner. An additional activity has been provided this year through the interest of Mayor Proulx in ice hockey. A splendid hockey rink has been constructed on the intervale land at junior high school. It is equipped with electric lights for night use and is intended for use of pupils and citizens. It is being patronized liberally. Thanks for, and appreciation of Mayor Proulx's efforts in providing the rink are herewith extended.

Mr. Holmes, janitor of the junior high school, has general oversight of the rink as he does of the tennis courts and other school activities. Too little appreciation is given Mr. Holmes for the valuable services he renders to the boys and girls of the school that they may better enjoy and profit by the school activities.

It is hoped that the athletic field may become a reality this year as its need is great.

#### **The Old Bell**

It is quite generally hoped that some provision may be made for retaining and making use of the old high school bell by the school district regardless of what disposition is made of the

building itself. There is considerable sentiment connected with the old bell and rightly so. I doubt if there is a graduate of the school who would not be glad to know that it was to be used by the schools and again listen for its telling of victory after games as it has done for many years past.

### **Finances**

The school expenses the past year were unusually large as it was expected they would be in equipping the new high school, grading the ground, etc. Several unforeseen and unprovided for expenses of an emergency nature developed; the council decided to cut the school budget by \$1600.00. As a result the school department ends the year with a deficit, to meet which an appropriation must be provided in this coming year's budget. This will necessitate asking for about the same amount of money as last year.

### **Per Pupil Cost**

The per pupil cost of education in all the schools last year was \$87.10.

The per pupil cost of high school education, grades IX-XII in Franklin for the school year 1939-40 was \$73.71.

For elementary schools, grades I-VIII, \$82.19.

The teacher cost was 61.73% of the whole cost.

### **School Meeting**

The annual school meeting was held Saturday P. M., December 28th. It was the largest attended school meeting in the history of the city, 1,308 votes being cast for a member of the school board. The Australian ballot system was used. The candidates were Leo C. Connors and Charles E. Douphinett. Mr. Connors was elected by a vote of 702 to 595 for Mr. Douphinett. There were 11 blank ballots.

Mr. Douphinett had been a Board member for 12 years. He has always been interested in the schools, and as a Board member has given unsparingly of his time in the interest of school

affairs. Mr. Douphinett may retire from the Board knowing that all with whom he has worked really appreciate his efforts.

I appreciate fully the co-operation of teachers, pupils, school board, and citizens which we have received in our efforts to better Franklin Schools.

## FRANKLIN HIGH SCHOOL HEADMASTER'S REPORT

This report covers the last half of the school year for 1940 and the first half of 1941. The total enrollment for the school year ending June 14, 1940 was 309, an increase of 17 over the previous year. The number of graduates in the class of 1940 was 90. The enrollment up to February 1st of the current school year is 338, classified as follows: Post graduates 3, Seniors 91, Juniors 110, and Sophomores 134. This large enrollment is partially offset, for practical purposes, by 34 pupils who have left school. Four of these went with the National Guard to Texas. Eleven moved away from Franklin because of connection with the flood control project. Five secured regular employment, and the remaining fourteen left school because they found it difficult to keep up with their classes, or were needed at home, or because of illness. One of the fourteen has joined the army and another expects to be accepted in the near future.

This large enrollment makes it necessary for every teacher to carry the maximum teacher load both in the number of teaching hours and the number of pupils per teacher. Since every pupil has to take English, the burden of the English teachers is too heavy for the best results in these courses. The enrollment for the machine shop is much too large for the equipment we have. The present demand for trained men for national defense makes it necessary to add new equipment at the earliest possible time in order that the Franklin High School machine shop may be run at the maximum capacity.

Our activities program is designed to meet the needs of all the pupils. Athletics and competitive games have a large place in the school program. In addition to the so-called major sports, football, basketball and baseball, we have bowling for boys and girls, girls' field hockey, intramural basketball for girls, winter carnival for boys and girls, which includes an interclass basketball tournament, track and field competition, boys' and girls' tennis, and a boys' golf team. The matter of financing the two last-named sports presents many difficulties. We need more tennis courts, and some satisfactory financial arrangement for the use of the local golf course. These two sports are among the most valuable of all the high school activities, because they carry over in a very practical way into life after high school days are past.

The non-athletic activities consist of a Swing club, which runs a regular social program two or three times a month, a Swing club band, Dramatic club, Camera club, and the regular class organizations. This year, the high school, under the leadership of

the Senior class, plans to publish a yearbook which will give a full, well-illustrated history of the school's activities. The good influence of the new building on all activities and work should be mentioned. Its extended facilities, a few of which are a first class gymnasium, stage, dark room, laboratories, and practical arts rooms have and will continue to have far reaching results for the school and community.

May I call attention to some more of our outstanding needs. First: an athletic field, not only for competitive games, but for general physical exercise and games for senior and junior high school pupils. Without too great expense, the land between the high school building and the Daniell property might be cleared and graded for that purpose. Second: enlarged parking facilities. The lawn between the auditorium and shop section and the back of the building could easily be made into an adequate parking space. Third: a more practical and definite program of educational and vocational guidance.

In closing, I wish to express appreciation for the fine spirit of cooperation of the Superintendent, School Board, teachers, pupils and all others who have so generously contributed to the working out of the high school program.

## DANIELL JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Dear Mr. Libbey:

In September 1923, the junior high school was organized in the Warren F. Daniell "barn" with an enrollment of 197 for the year. At the beginning of this, our sixteenth year as a separate organization, our enrollment is 302. It is interesting to note that many who were pupils in the first class graduating from this school are now holding noteworthy positions in our own city, and they always refer to the months in the "barn" with pleasure and satisfaction.

Another point of interest is the fact that last June 132 pupils were promoted to senior high school. Of that number 126 students entered Franklin High School or some other high school. There is no question about the interest of the majority of our young people in getting an education. One important duty of the junior high school is to stimulate an interest in and desire for a higher education.

It is the policy of this school to provide practical education that will open the minds of pupils to as many avenues of living as possible. We can not fit any one of them for his place in life but we can teach him how to use the tools of learning to his individual advantage. We endeavor to do this through work and organized play.

With these ideas in mind we allow pupils to elect whatever subjects we are able to offer that will prepare them for their special vocations or professions, as the case may be. To be sure, our courses are very inadequate but we seek to use what we have as best we can. The greater the variety of subjects we have to offer, the wider experience of every pupil.

For these same reasons we provide organized activities of as many types as we possibly can. Our clubs fill one type of need, our intra-mural basketball games, the skating rink, the dancing class, regular moving pictures, assemblies, Franklin Junior City, and all other social activities provide for other needs. We consider all of these things necessary, for when school days are over future citizens must work and play with all types of people. It



is well that they learn how to engage in a variety of practical experiences, while they are young and impressionable.

It is a fond hope that a long dreamed of plan may become a reality within this school year, in part, at least—a School Club room. The room formerly used for the woodworking shop will be ideal for this project as it is large, pleasant, and can be heated with no added equipment. If possible we would like to have a badminton court, ping-pong tables, card tables for games, all sorts of games that have interesting appeal, good books, a piano for those who love to play and sing and any other added amusements that pupils can enjoy. This room will need furniture that will provide a homey atmosphere, and we hope the boys can make some of this. We hope, too, that some of you readers may have some things you might like to donate. The girls are to make curtains, rugs, and cushions and keep the “housework” done. Each class will have one period per week in this room to do exactly as each member pleases. At noon those who have to remain for lunch may play there and at all times there will be a supervising teacher. Such a set-up as this offers far-reaching opportunities and should yield results greater than mere play.

You will find in the nurse’s report mention made of the rest periods which we are able to offer a small group of pupils. Upon the recommendation of Miss Moynihan and with the permission of parents, pupils are given three forty-five minute periods of rest per week. These children go into a room at a given time where they find a bed ready for them. Each one puts on his bath-robe and gets into a warm blanket. Girls acting as assistant nurses then open the window and often the pupil sleeps the entire period. He is called at the end of the time and the bed is prepared for the next one. A chart and graph of weight and general improvement is kept and usually a marked improvement is shown. These pupils are given milk and cod liver oil during the weeks when they have the rest periods. Our wish is that we might be able to offer these rest periods to ten times as many pupils. While boys and girls are growing they need added rest, sleep and general toning up and in our limited way we hope to help some of them.

By doing all these things which are so often called fads and fancies we are trying to develop right attitudes toward work, play, other people, our community, and life in general. We are striving to instill into each pupil a sense of honor, a sense of responsibility to himself, his family and his community. We are trying to supplement the home training in every way we can and solicit your cooperation and interest.



Our needs are the same as last year, the most outstanding one being more places to play. Growing young folks need large areas for large activities.

May I state that the printing may also become a reality in a very small way, before this year is over. The Class of 1940 left a small sum of money to this school last June to be used toward the purchase of a small press. With this and a trained teacher such as we have in Mr. Thomas McCullough, we could do many school printing jobs.

It is again my privilege to express my appreciation to my most loyal and cooperative staff, to Superintendent Libbey, and to the Board of Education for their invaluable interest, understanding and helpfulness.

## SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

Mr. Fred S. Libbey  
Superintendent of Schools  
Franklin, New Hampshire

Dear Mr. Libbey:

I herewith submit my report for the school year of January 1940 to January 1941.

Number of pupils examined, 1452.

130 children showed defective vision

18 children showed defective hearing

650 children were in need of dental care

62 children had enlarged tonsils

15 children showed orthopedic defects

87 children attended the chest clinics which were sponsored by the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association in January and June.

The Winnebago Indian Tooth Magic Show sponsored by the Good Teeth Council for children, was shown to 1,175 children in the High School Auditorium. The show conveyed to the children the proper way of caring for their teeth—by brushing, eating the right foods, and the importance of seeing their dentist at least twice a year.

A physical therapy center has been established at the Junior High School, where children with poor posture and orthopedic defects are given exercises and treatment by a registered physical therapy nurse once a week. A doctor's order is secured before any treatment is given. This center was established in September 1940, and the total number of treatments given are 69.

Arrangements were made with the State Board of Health in Concord whereby the State Nutritionist came and spoke to the pupils in the Junior and Senior High Schools on "The Value of Good Nutrition".

Ten orthopedic cases were cared for during the year. Three of these cases received treatment at the orthopedic department of the Elliott Hospital in Manchester.

Classroom inspections were held for symptoms of communicable diseases and pediculosis. Conferences were held with pupils, public health nurses, social workers, and parents.

A hearing device was purchased by the Franklin Rotary Club for a pupil with defective hearing.

Six cases of defective hearing are receiving treatment.

The children were weighed four times and measured three times during the year.

408 children purchased milk

250 children purchased cod liver oil during the winter months

370 children were supplied with milk and cod liver oil

38 tonsil cases were corrected. 23 of these cases were cared for by the Franklin Rotary Club

A Rest Period project was held at the Junior High School. The pupils received one-half pint of milk and two teaspoonsful of cod liver oil daily. The pupils are required to rest 45 minutes certain periods during the week. These rest periods have proven beneficial to the pupils, but due to unavailable room space, our number is limited.

The names of 244 children were placed upon the Dental Honor Roll. A certificate signed by a dentist stating that all the necessary dental work has been completed, must be submitted before a child's name may be placed upon the Dental Honor Roll.

156 children received vision corrections.

During the recent epidemic of the grippe we were very fortunate that only one of our schools was obliged to close. This school closed Monday noon and reopened Thursday morning.

Total number of school visits, 1346.

Total number of home visits, 662.

I express my appreciation to the Directors of the Tobie Trust Fund, Franklin Rotary Club, the doctors and dentists of Franklin, Mr. Libbey, members of the Franklin School Board, teachers, parents, and pupils for the assistance they have given me during this school year.

## SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS

### Sanger Scholarship

Resolved by the Board of Education of Franklin:

Whereas, Warren F. Daniell has by his written communication addressed to the Board of Education, expressed his intention of establishing a free scholarship for graduates of the Franklin High School in Simmons College in honor of his mother, and to be known as the "Sanger Scholarship", and agreeing to pay annually a sum sufficient to pay the costs of tuition for one student for four years in any of the courses described in the catalogue of the College, and

Whereas, a student to be awarded this scholarship must comply with the following regulations: First, she must have completed four years' satisfactory work at the Franklin High School; second, her parents must reside in Franklin; third, the student's parents must be unable without undue deprivation to pay the tuition themselves.

Be it resolved: That the Board of Education of the City of Franklin fully appreciate the spirit that prompted Mr. Daniell to establish this scholarship for the benefit of the young women of said city, thereby creating an additional incentive for higher educational advantages: and

Be it further Resolved: That said Board of Education willingly accepts said trust: and

Be it further Resolved: That a permanent Committee on Scholarship shall be established to consist of the Chairman of the Board of Education, the Superintendent of Schools and the Headmaster of the High School of said city, and

Be it further Resolved: That this resolution shall be printed annually in the school report of said Board.

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### Franklin Student Aid Fund

To the Mayor and Members of the City Council, Franklin, N. H.:

In June, 1921, I placed with Dartmouth College at Hanover, N. H., a fund of \$2,500.00—the income from which I wished to be used to assist under certain conditions students at that institution who were residents of this city.

It was found incompatible with the methods of disposing of the funds at Dartmouth College, to handle this fund under the con-

ditions which I wished to impose—and for that reason I have transferred this sum from Dartmouth College to the City of Franklin.

I am attaching herewith the securities representing the fund together with a statement of the methods I wish followed in disposing of the income from the fund.

### **Franklin Student Aid Fund**

Established by Walter F. Duffy, June, 1921.

A sum of \$2,500.00 is entrusted to the City of Franklin, N. H., the income from which is to be used to assist worthy boys and girls, residents of this city, to secure a collegiate education or its equivalent.

The recipients of the income from this fund are to be selected by a board of three consisting of the Chairman of the Board of Education, Superintendent of Schools and Principal of the High School of the City of Franklin, N. H.

The income from this fund is to be disposed of under the following fixed conditions:—

#### **I. Scholarship**

A student must attain such satisfactory standing in studies as to make it apparent to the authorities of the institution of learning where he attends, that it is advisable that the student pursue his studies and that he is on this account worthy of financial aid.

#### **II. Financial Needs**

It is to be required that the students who receive benefit from this fund shall be obliged, through lack of family financial resources, to earn at least a substantial part of the money necessary to meet the expenses of their attendance upon their studies.

#### **III. General Restrictions**

It is to be understood that in allotting the proceeds of the fund, preference is to be given to students at Dartmouth College, Hanover, N. H., who are residents of the City of Franklin, N. H. If no such students apply for the benefits of this fund, then the income can be used to assist any boys or girls who are residents of the City of Franklin, N. H., and who are pursuing a course of studies in any institution of learning giving a collegiate education

or its equivalent, provided that the first two conditions covering the disposition of the benefits of this fund are fulfilled.

It is also to be understood that the income from this fund may be divided between two or more students, and that any students who receive financial aid from the institutions of learning where they attend are not thereby prevented from receiving aid from this fund.

If no students fulfilling the above requirements apply for the benefit of this fund the proceeds may be used as they accrue each year as seems best to the three persons mentioned above for the general educational good of the citizens of Franklin, N. H.

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### Daniell Scholarship

In the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and fourteen.

A resolution relating to the "Daniell Scholarship".

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Franklin, as follows:

Whereas, Jere R. Daniell of New London, Connecticut, on the second day of April 1914, by his written communication of that date, addressed to the Mayor and Council of the City of Franklin, expressed his intention of establishing a free scholarship for graduates of the Franklin High School to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, in memory of his father, the late Warren F. Daniell, and to be known as the "Daniell Scholarship", and together with his letter of the 16th of May, 1914, in which he agreed to give the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars each and every year, hereafter, beginning September 1st, 1914, to cover the cost of tuition for one student for four years in any one of the courses described in the catalogue of the Institute, and,

That a student to be awarded this scholarship, in whole or in part, must comply with the following named conditions:

First. He must have completed four years' satisfactory work at the Franklin High School.

Second. His parents or parent must reside in Franklin, and be unable without undue deprivation, to pay the tuition required themselves.

Third. He must show during his four years' work at the High School, marked ability in some one of the several subjects covered by the Institute courses.

In case several candidates present themselves in any one year, the scholarship will be awarded by competition in the entrance examinations for the Institute. The candidate entering with highest standing to receive the award.

A holder of the scholarship will be expected to maintain the same standard of work at the Institute as that required of holders of regular Institute Scholarships and the scholarship will be withdrawn in case the work is unsatisfactory.

The right is reserved to divide the amount of the scholarship among several applicants should such action seem desirable.

Be it Resolved, That the City of Franklin fully appreciates the spirit that prompted Mr. Daniell to establish this scholarship for the benefit of the young men of said city, thereby creating an additional incentive for higher educational advantages in those who through misfortune or adversity would otherwise be prevented from obtaining the same; and

Be it further Resolved, That said City willingly accepts said trust, and does hereby direct that the annual payment of the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars shall be made to the City Treasurer, who shall pay the annual tuition of said student or students upon the presentation of the bill for same by the Bureau of the Institute, and,

Be it further Resolved, That a Permanent Committee on Scholarship shall be established to consist of the Chairman of the Board of Education, the Superintendent of Schools and the Principal of the High School of said City of Franklin, and

Be it further Resolved, That this resolution shall annually be printed in the reports of said city.

## ORDINANCES

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An ordinance relating to the administration of Welfare and Relief.

In the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and forty.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Franklin, as follows:

1. The general management and control of welfare and relief shall be vested in a Board of Public Welfare and Relief, consisting of three members, one of each ward who shall be elected by the City Council at its annual meeting and who shall hold office for a period of three years, except at the initial appointment of the Board of Public Welfare and Relief, one member of the Board shall be elected to serve for one year, one for two years and one for three years.

2. The Board of Public Welfare and Relief shall elect one of its members Chairman, a second, Secretary, and all members of this Board shall serve without compensation.

3. The City Council shall at its annual meeting elect an Overseer of the Poor or Director of Welfare and Relief, for the period of one year, who shall give his entire time to the duties of such office, act as visiting agent to applicants of Welfare or Relief and perform such other duties prescribed by law, or which may rightfully belong to his office, or which may be assigned to him by the Board of Welfare and Relief. It shall be the duty of the Overseer of the Poor or Director of Welfare and Relief to appear before the City Council, monthly, to render a "broken down" report of all expenditures made by the Board of Welfare and Relief during the month, to include in this report the names of firms or individuals from whom the commodity or service has been purchased or rendered with amount paid them.

4. Appeal. In case of any disagreement as to welfare and relief or the administration thereof, between citizens applying for welfare or relief and the Overseer of the Poor or Director of

Welfare and Relief, an appeal may be taken by either party to the Board of Welfare and Relief for a determination of the question.

5. Funds. Funds necessary to operate and maintain the Board of Public Welfare and Relief and its duties, shall be determined and appropriated annually by the Mayor and City Council.

6. Members of the Board of Public Welfare and Relief as well as the Overseer of the Poor or Director of Welfare and Relief may be removed from office by the Mayor and Council for any just cause. Councilmen shall be ineligible to serve as members of the Board of Public Welfare and Relief.

7. All ordinances or parts of ordinances having to do with the Overseer of the Poor are hereby repealed or amended, to conform to the change of name provided for by this ordinance, and any reference by the Public Laws to the Overseer of the Poor and his duties shall hereafter refer to the Board of Public Welfare and Relief.

8. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

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An Ordinance relating to the parking of motor vehicles and carriages on the streets of the city proper.

In the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and forty.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Franklin, as follows:

No person owning or operating any type of motor vehicle or carriage, or having in his or her charge any motor vehicle or carriage shall cause or allow said vehicle to remain standing or parked within the limits of any street in the city in such a manner that said vehicle will interfere with or impede the plowing of snow from the surface of said street and so-called all night

parking on any street in the city is hereby prohibited during the months of January, February, March, April, November and December.

Any person convicted of violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not more than twenty dollars.

This ordinance shall become effective upon its passage.
