

RULES OF PROCEDURE

According to RSA 40, the Town Moderator determines the procedures to be used in Town Meetings. The Moderator determines the rules without regard to parliamentary or other procedural rules. The voters can overturn the Moderator's rules at any time, however. A motion to overturn the Moderator's rules, or establish new rules, will always take precedence to other business which is already "on the floor".

So that you will know the ground rules by which we are maintaining order, these procedural rules are announced to you ahead of time.

- The Moderator will read each <u>article</u> in its entirety before that article is considered.
- There can be no discussion until there has been a <u>motion</u> under the article. (usually the first motion is to approve the article as it appears on the warrant)
- All motions must be seconded by a different individual.
- <u>Discussion</u> will only take place after a motion has been moved and seconded.
- All discussion must take place only when called upon by the <u>Moderator</u>. You must have permission from the Moderator before you can speak.
- When the Moderator recognizes you, <u>standup</u>, <u>speak out</u> loudly and <u>announce your name</u> before proceeding with your comments.
- If you want to change a portion of a motion, you can do so by making an <u>amendment</u>. We will consider only one move to amend at any given time. When discussion regarding an amendment comes to a conclusion, the amendment will be voted upon. If the amendment <u>passes</u> we will then continue considering the original motion as it has now been amended. If the amendment <u>fails</u>, we will return to considering the motion in its form prior to the motion to amend.
- A secret written ballot will be used on any article when requested by any 5 voters in writing (RSA 40:4-a).
- A vote will be re-tabulated by secret written ballot when requested in writing or orally by only 7 voters (RSA 40:40b). This action must be requested before we have already moved onto the next item of business.

One final word of advice from your Moderator: If you want to get action from the Town Meeting, you have to make a motion. It's okay to get up and ask a question or make a comment (as long as it's relevant to what's on the table), but if you want the Town Meeting to discuss and vote on your idea, you have to get it on the table with a motion. Let's work together to have a successful and efficient meeting.

TOWN MEETING - MARCH 9, 2004 WARRANT - MINUTES

Town meeting and the election of officers were both held this year on Tuesday, March 9, 2004, commencing at 9:00 a.m., at the Freedom Town Hall.

The Moderator, Donald Johnson, explained procedures to the election workers downstairs at the Town Hall and swore in new workers. Those present were: Alice Haslett and Karen Hatch, as ballot clerks, Rochelle Brooks, Deputy Town Clerk, Beth Earle, Assistant Moderator, James Brown, Gatekeeper and Libby Priebe, Town Clerk. The Supervisors of the Checklist were also present: Patricia McCoy, Daniel Brooks and Albert Godfrey. The polls were opened at 9 am downstairs in the Town Hall by the Moderator, who then proceeded upstairs to open the meeting.

Mr. Johnson explained the rules of procedure and noted same are printed in the Town Report; introduced the officials seated at the table: Libby Priebe, Town Clerk, Peter Hastings, Town Counsel, John Krebs, Les Babb and Eric Bossidy, Selectmen, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag, after which Mr.

Johnson commenced with the reading of the Warrant:

You are hereby notified that the Annual Town Meeting of the Town of Freedom will be held at the Freedom Town Hall on Tuesday, the 9th day of March 2004 at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects.

There will be voting by Official Ballot for the election of Town Officers and all other articles requiring vote by Official Ballot. The polls open at 9:00am and close at 7:00pm unless there is a vote to keep the polls open to a later hour. The ballots will be counted after the polls close at 7:00pm.

All other articles will be presented, discussed and acted upon beginning at 9:00am at the Freedom Town Hall.

Mr. Johnson read Articles 1, 2 and 3 and noted that they were being voted on by official ballot downstairs. For the purposes of these minutes, the results are included herewith.

And to hold when and if acquired by the Town each of the above lots as a part of the Town Forest provided these shall be saved, excepted and reserved and held by the Town for general Town use a contiguous area of no more than 200 acres to be carved out of one or more of the above parcels within the Town of Freedom with its exact boundaries to be determined by the Board of Selectmen, and to authorize the Freedom Conservation Commission to manage the balance of said land as Town Forest under the provisions of R.S.A. 31:112 II and to authorize the placement of any proceeds which may accrue from said forest management in a separate Forest Maintenance Fund, which shall be allowed to accumulate from year to year as provided by R.S.A. 31:113; said Forest Maintenance Fund is to be used to manage the forest expenses within the Town.

Katie Gove, as a member of the Conservation Commission, spoke on behalf of this article and explained that they have been working on this project for over three and one-half years and now have a Purchase and Sales Agreement and are ready to move forward. Chuck Depew spoke on behalf of the Article and made reference to the Town's unanimous vote of support at last year's town meeting, which "energized" the group. Republic Financial took the property off the market and explored other options for its use. Rodger Krussman of the Trust for Public Lands was introduced and spoke on behalf of the Article; and Barry Keith spoke on behalf of the article and did a visual presentation. Blair Folts, Executor Director of the Green Mountain Conservation Group, also spoke in favor of this article.

Mr. Krussman noted that the purchase of this property is a line item in the federal budget - a very positive sign. It was also noted that the LCHIP grant of \$250,000.00 was still in effect and going forward and that other grants will be applied for, and that Senator Gregg is lending his support to the project.

It was also noted in the discussion regarding the Madison parcel that Freedom can own land in another town and that fund raising would also be tak-

ing place in Madison and that a Stewardship Committee would be established to determine uses. The Stewartship Committee will be a large Committee, volunteers welcome, and will take public input and will represent many interests, and will have final say, although the Town of Freedom will own the property and will also have input.

Mr. Krussman also noted that the Federal money does not come free and clear and that the property would have a conservation easement with legal language for parameters of use. Every ten years the Stewardship Committee plan needs to be updated - will be a "fluid process over the course of time".

It was further noted that the town is ready to patrol this property with ATVS - the police are getting a grant and that the ATV Clubs will patrol, too. Chief Pearson noted that it would be a State grant - not from the Town budget.

Discussion.

Laurie Morrow, a town resident and author, stepped forward and noted that the Trout Pond area was made popular by Corey Ford and she would be willing to utilize his stories, and her own, to publish a book, as a fundraiser, and would donate 100% of the royalties received from this publication toward this project,

Tom Kondrat asked if this Article would have to come up every year. Peter Hastings, Town Counsel, advised that because this was not a money article, if the town voted in favor of this Article, it would remain in effect until revoked.

ARTICLE 21:

To review real estate acquired by the Town by Tax Collectors deeds since the last Annual Town Meeting and to consider whether or not to sell any or all of such properties and the appropriate terms and conditions regarding their sale.

SECONDED: Jim Breslin.

Tom Kondrat, the Tax Collector, announced that there were no properties to discuss.

A motion was made to accept the Tax Collector's report as given.

ARTICLE 22:

To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

John Krebs explained that Article 18 had been tabled because there hadn't been enough time to put together accurate numbers prior to Town Meeting. Purity Spring Resort - which purchased Shawtown Campground - came to the Town within the last month with concerns about Shawtown Road, which is a dirt road. John asked for a show of hands, or a straw vote, to see if the townspeople would like to have the Selectmen look in to doing a cost share to rebuild Shawtown Road. He noted that this would be a show of hands only and would be without obligation.

Discussion.

The Moderator asked for a straw vote: would it be worth the time and energy of the Town to look in to paving this road in the future - noting that this was not a legal vote and non-binding:

Option 1: pursue and bring back to the Town: only 1 person in the room raised his hand in favor of Option 1.

Option 2: That the Selectmen do not waste time pursuing this matter: YES - Option 2 - by majority.

Ann Hand inquired about the status of the bike path. Selectman Krebs explained it is in progress, in conjunction with repairs to the Ossipee Lake Road.

Discussion.

R.A. Oram noted a matter of public safety: he has concerns about Freedom Point/Round Pond residents entering on to the newly constructed Route 25, due to the speed on Route 25.

Discussion followed as to whether this was the right venue for this discussion and it was recommended that the Selectmen bring this matter to the attention of the State Highway Department. Selectman Krebs noted that he had attended the public meetings on the reconstruction of Route 25 and that issue had not been mentioned, adding that the Selectmen will check to see if something can be done.

Jane Davidson thanked Eric Bossidy for his years of service as a Selectman - Eric got a round of applause from the meeting.

Elaine Kondrat made a MOTION TO ADJOURN; the Moderator said that he wasn't going to consider the motion at this time - would let the people continue to talk.

Jim Breslin made a MOTION TO ADJOURN; vote on MOTION TO ADJOURN: YES, unanimous.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:15 p.m.

To the extent the Board of Selectmen are unable to enforce those provisions, they are directed to take all such steps as maybe legally necessary and proper to revoke the 2004 approval. BOARD OF SELECTMEN REPORT

With the dedication and commitment by town employees, members of the various boards and volunteers as well as concerned citizens, there was a lot of good work accomplished as well as serious issues addressed.

Continued growth again was a very big item. New building, subdivisions and expansions.

With growth comes an increase demand on all town services. Finding a balance between the need for services and the cost in providing them is quite challenging. While the municipal portion of the total tax bill that we have control over is less than 25% of the total tax burden, the need to keep it manageable to all tax-payers is paramount.

After the unanimous vote to support the Trout Pond project last year, as well as the overwhelming concern expressed about growth and possible ways to control it, we have been working with the Friends of Trout Pond and Trust for Public Lands to bring forward the best available option to preserve the 2653-acre parcel. Although there is an immediate impact on the tax rate the long-term dividends will be much greater.

A large infestation of milfoil was brought to our attention in Danforth Bay and the north end of Broad Bay. After reviewing the options with the dedicated volunteers and receiving generous donations from area businesses and individuals a massive harvesting operation was under taken removing literally tons of milfoil from these areas. This along with the planned maintenance is a big step in preserving the integrity, quality and values of our waterways.

Thanks to the hard work and over-time put in by Scott Brooks and the highway crew, the necessary improvements were completed so the Bike Path and Ossipee Lake Road resurfacing could be done as scheduled. This along with the reconstruction of a portion of West Bay Road and their overall maintenance program allows us to continue to have some of the best roads in the county.

2004 was our tax certification year in which the state reviewed all of our tax procedures and required a statistical update of property values to 100%. With the last revaluation just four years ago, it was a real eye opener for many people as to what the impact of growth has meant to our town.

The new compactor has been installed at the transfer station and as predicted, even with the large increase in use, it has allowed Justin's budget to go down.

As we work to accommodate growth and comply with mandates it becomes difficult to maintain a balance between holding the bottom line and planning for the bottom line in the future.

I have made hard decisions on your behalf trying to consider all variables. I look forward to your input and direction at town meeting.

FREEDOM PUBLIC LIBRARY'S REPORT

The Freedom Public Library has had a busy, active and successful year! Patronage has increased markedly and circulation is up in all areas. Elizabeth Rhymer, our Library Director, who works 20 hours a week, has had a productive first year.

Pat Parker, Assistant Librarian, continues to work 10 hours a week, focusing her efforts on the automation of our collection. This monumental task of computerizing all 14,000 plus materials in the library is nearly half completed. Judy Johnson has served as library aide in the library since February 2004. She works 20 hours per week and is paid for the AARP.

The library continues to support the town's needs by making meeting space available, hosting monthly book club, and offering beginning computer classes. Elizabeth has coordinated several well-attended sessions of preschool story hours, a summer Lego club, a bookmark contest, and a writing workshop for children. The summer reading program was a huge success with 60 children actively participating. The library was also pleased to offer two well-attended performances from two professional storyteller-musicians.

The Friends of the Library continue to support the library in many ways including fund-raising projects - most notably the book and bake sales - author events, the purchase of a pass to the Squam Lake Natural Science Center and volunteer services. The Friends funded the Freedom Public Library magnets that went out in their annual mailing and which are available at the front desk of the library. They also funded the oral histories project which is nearing completion with 25 town residents having been recorded as they spoke about their memories of Freedom. The oral histories will soon be available for the public's enjoyment in audio and written form.

The Bear Camp Cooperative continues to supply the library with a rotating supply of audio books and videos. An increasing number of patrons are taking advantage of the interlibrary loan program in which books and other materials are borrowed from public and academic libraries across New Hampshire.

Many generous donations to the library have allowed enhancements to the library and the collection. The Ellie Thurston Fund has enabled us to purchase many new children's books as well as replace worn out copies of old favorites. Monies given in memory of Merton Sargent will also be used to purchase books and materials for the children's room. A media center - a television, VCR, DVD player, and boom box on a large rolling cart - was purchased with money given in the memory of Bette Bossi. This money was also used to purchase a beautiful birch tree which was planted near the main entrance. The library plans to purchase gardening and wildlife books with this money as well. Green Mountain

Furniture donated a loveseat for the children's section, making the space even more cozy and inviting.

The library continues to grow and find new ways to meet the community's needs. It remains an exciting meeting place and educational focus point of our town.



This last year was fairly wet throughout the spring and summer months, however we finished the season with an active fall fire season. In order to meet an increased demand for services, the Forest Protection Bureau was reorganized into three regions with smaller Forest Ranger Districts and over the last several years we have added two Forest Rangers. The fifteen state fire towers were the first to report on many fires throughout the state and they completed many other projects on the low fire dangers days. The state implemented a program called Tower Quests to help citizens learn about fire towers and the need to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. The United States celebrated Smokey Bear's 60th birthday in 2004, and celebrations were held throughout the state. Please help SMokey Bear, you local fire department and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire smart and fire safe!

MEDSTAR ALS, INC. ACTIVITIES REPORT

Though is does seem possible, another year has passed. 2004 proved to be another busy year for our EMT's. In Freedom we responded to 208 calls for service. Throughout our coverage area, we responded to over 1700 emergency calls. These calls ranged from simple standbys to critical multi system trauma, to an eight-hour standoff with shots fired and personal injury. Recently, in a five-day period, four of our patients were so critically injured they required med flights to major advanced services. As a result we continue to upgrade the qualifications of our staff, and maintain six of them on duty 24 hours a day 7 days a week. I would like to take this opportunity to express my appreciation to the Board of Selectmen and the Taxpayers of Freedom for their continued support. A very special THANK YOU goes to the members of Freedom's Fire and Rescue Departments, its Police Department, and the Highway Department for their tremendous assistance throughout the year. Their efforts far to often go unnoticed.

POLICE REPORT

The Freedom Police Department is currently serving the community 24 hours a day seven days a week. Officers are available through call out after their regular tour of duty. The department has office hours on Monday from 6:30 pm to 8:00 pm. Special appointments are also available. To contact a Freedom Police Officer you should call our dispatch at the Carroll County Sheriffs Department at 539-2284. This is the most direct way to reach the police department. Enhanced 911 is also available for emergency use only.

The department continues to rely on the use of part time officers in order to have the coverage that the town requires. I am happy to report that we are staffed

appropriately to perform this type of coverage.

Each cruiser is now equipped with a Zoll AED PLUS defibrillation unit (a life saving device for heart attack victims). All officers are currently certified in CPR and the use of this device. This was accomplished by donations over the past two years from several groups and individuals in town. Certification training was provided cost free by Med Star Ambulance Service. A special thanks to all of you that made this possible.

The department has also received a grant from the New Hampshire Fish and Game. This was very helpful in putting an officer on an OHRV patrol in the

Trout Pond area. I have applied for this grant again this year.

I would like to thank all members of the Freedom Police Department for the professional service they continue to provide. I wish everyone a safe and healthy 2005. Attached are some of our calls for service.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT REPORT

The Zoning Board of Adjustment received 20 applications since January 2004; sixteen of those were requests for dimensional variances (requests to build new structures or additions which are located at least in part in the side, front, or rear setbacks). Fourteen dimensional variances were granted, and two were denied. The Board also;

- Upheld an administrative decision of the Selectmen to permit Roy and Jean Magnussen to park a vehicle for hire on their property.
- Approved a special exception to allow Ossipee Lake Realty Corp. to install a well and water line within 75' of the lake.
- Approved a special exception too allow Matthew Kfoury to clear an area of 30' for a beach and dock.
- Approved a special exception to allow Sherwood Forest, LLC to have a single-family dwelling as well as retain a camp structure on a single lot.

BUILDING CODE REPORT

The year 2004 has experienced another period of growth with respect to new homes, remodeling and additions. The number of building permits issued totaled 184. Of this number, 31 were for new homes. The estimated value of construction for these new homes total to just under 1.8 million dollars, while construction value to the remaining permits issued valued to about \$900,000. In all, about 2.7 million dollars of value has been added to the town tax base.

As one can imagine, building codes continue to improve, to keep pace with the ever changing construction materials manufacturers introduce to the industry along with methods that improve the use of manufactured construction materials.

To keep myself informed with all of these developments and changes I continue to be a member of the N.H.B.O.A. and attending the monthly code training seminars presented by the association.

I continue to spend an average of ten hours per week between inspections and office hours. During peak construction periods my hours may be extended beyond the ten hours. With continued growth in the Freedom area, the year 2005 may be as active as the previous year.

FREEDOM CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The Freedom Conservation Commission (FCC) continues to be an advisory group to the Selectmen, Planning Board and the NH Department of Environmental Services. The year 2004 proved to be busier than normal for the Commission, starting with the March Town meeting, when the Townspeople voted to establish a Town Forest and the mechanism by which with the Friend's of Trout Pond, the Trust for Public Land, Green Mountain Conservation Group (GMCG), the Selectmen and the Planning Board to see that his most important project moves forward. The Commission acknowledges the strong grassroots effort by the Friend's of Trout Pond that brought the Town this once in a lifetime opportunity to create a legacy for Freedom's future generations, as well as the effort of our Congressional team in securing the 1.2 million Forest Legacy grant and the \$250,000 LCHIP grant. Next year the FCC hopes to be reporting on our first year as managers of Freedom's first town forest.

The milfoil that has invaded Danforth Bay and Ossipee Lake has united the forces of the FCC, the Ossipee Lake Alliance, the Selectmen, the Ossipee Lake Marina and the Danforth Bay Campground. This ongoing project will only be successful if our citizens continue to volunteer with the identification and the hand pulling of this exotic invasive species. Milfoil has the potential of ruining our lake. Please contact us if you can assist.

The FCC has also been working with the Green Mountain Conservation Group to develop a Watershed Coalition that will establish a master plan for our watershed. The master plan will assist towns to establish appropriate plans for the watershed within their town. Members of the Freedom Conservation Commission have also worked closed with the GMCG Water Quality Program which has been testing the various water bodies in Freedom. The testing provided the Town with valuable data about the quality of our water.

The FCC also held a very successful educational event, a hay ride though the future town forest during Old Home Week and anticipate sponsoring another event this coming year. The Freedom Conservation Commission thanks all of our fellow town officials who work diligently for the Town of Freedom throughout the year. Freedom will continue to be a special place to live because of all who work so hard on behalf of our town. Thank you.

- Ossipee Lake Road: Retaining wall.
- Ossipee Lake and Bennett Roads: Finish coat of hot asphalt top.
- Ossipee Lake, Bennett and Rice Hill Roads: Shoulders graveled.
