SELECTMEN'S REPORT

To the Citizens and Taxpayers of Gilford:

We present the annual reports of the Selectmen and the Treasurer, the Town Clerk, Collector of Taxes, Trustees of Trust Funds, Trustees of the Public Library, also the reports of Town Officers and Committees and annual report of the School Board, for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1933

The Weirs Road construction under the Special Legislative Act has been finished at a cost well within the appropriation, giving us an unbroken line of surfaced road along our entire lake front.

The Unemployment Relief Construction allotment from the State has enabled us to continue operations on the Gully Road in a year when we had anticipated no progress.

The condition of our Town roads has caused much favorable comment from officials of other towns as well as the travelling public, which further strengthens our conviction that our present method of maintaining our highways is the best that has yet been advanced.

Our equipment is modern, fairly complete, and in excellent condition. Apparently there are no major projects advisable or necessary at this time.

We trust that our citizens will not curtail our Highway appropriation without first giving considerable thought to the probable result. For several years past many of our people have welcomed employment on our larger road construction operations as a means of meeting at least part of their living expenses. In view of the prevailing unemployment situation, and the absence of any large construction project, it is our opinion that curtailment at this time

would result in a loss to the Town rather than a saving. Money spent in creating honest employment results in material benefit to the community. Money spent for the relief of the poor, while very necessary brings no permanent benefit to anyone.

Our budget which follows, contains only those items that are practically mandatory, or in our opinion essential to the proper management of the Town business for the ensuing year.

REPORT OF GILFORD PUBLIC LIBRARY

To the Citizens of Gilford:

The undersigned, trustees of Gilford Public Library, respectfully submit the following reports for the year ending January 31, 1933.

The trustees organized the first of the year with the same officers: Mrs. Helene E. Jackson, Secretary; Mr. Frank R. Varney, Treasurer; and Miss Eunice L. Hunt, Chairman. The business and needs of the library were discussed at frequent meetings throughout the year.

A Garden Party was held at "The Morrill Place," the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Jackson, in August for the benefit of the library. Owing to the hearty support of the townspeople and friends this party was a success. Grateful appreciation is extended to the following who made the entertainment possible: Miss Harriette Kahn, of Cambridge. Mass., and a guest at "Ames Farm," who told fortunes: Mrs. George W. Osgood, Miss Rachel Osgood and their Camp Lynnholm girls, who presented "The Belle of Bagdad" by Geoffrey F. Morgan; and the local cast who gave the Indian play, "Mother Minnetonka" by Jack Stuart Knapp. Thanks are extended also to those who served on committees and to the road men who moved the piano, chairs, and tables. The proceeds, \$38.30, were turned over to the treasurer and used to purchase juvenile literature.

The lawn has been cared for at a slight cost. In the interests of economy the magazine list was revised and by changing agencies a saving was made. Books, also, were purchased with ten per cent discounts in most cases and semetimes additional discounts were allowed. In accordance with the Bi-Centennial observance some trees were planted on the lawn. REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Gilford:

I herewith submit my annual report as superintendent of schools. This is the fourteenth such report which I have had the pleasure of submitting to you. This report is brief but includes material which should have reference value.

Your attention is called to the financial reports and the proposed budget for next year submitted by the school board. The first report covers the full school year ending June 30 last and is in detail; the second report covers the period from July 1, 1932 to January 31, 1933, a little more than one-half of this current financial year.

Our attendance the last year was good and there was a marked drop in the number of tardinesses. The increased attractiveness of the modern school and the excellent attitude of parents have had much to do with improved attendance records. Most of the absences which we have had were due to emergencies or to illness. Those children who have had perfect records are to be commended for their perseverence and to be congratulated for being blessed with good health and freedom from illness. Teachers and Present Enrollment

Our teaching force remains the same as for two years past. This indicates appreciation on the part of both parents and school board of the fine quality of work which these teachers are continuing to do. The following table shows the teacher assignment and enrollment in the several schools at the present time:

This total enrollment of 53 is one more than the enrollment one year ago. There are enrolled 70 local children in the Laconia schools, 28 in the high school and 42 in the elementary schools, 20 of this second group being in the junior high.

Tuition Rates

The tuition charge in the Laconia schools has been increased about \$9.00 per year for each pupil. The rates are now \$45 per year for children in grades one to six, \$66.50 for children in grades seven and eight or the junior high, and \$85.50 per year for children in the high school. This increased tuition rate was not determined upon until last summer and of course was not anticipated when the budget was prepared a year ago. Because of a drop in the number of local pupils enrolled in the elementary grades in Laconia the total expenditure for elementary tuition will not greatly exceed the amount estimated in the budget. There has been no drop in the number enrolled in the high school and the necessary expenditure will be considerably more than was estimated.

Repairs

The principal outlay for repairs was at Lily Pond. The chimney here was found to be a real hazard, built in the center of the building and resting on timbers of the ceiling of the school room. This was replaced by one more satisfactorily located and resting on the ground. At the same time much needed repairs were made on the foundation of the building. These improvements result in a much more comfortable room. The toilets in this building should be replaced before another school year.

We have at the Intervale an attractive school room but it is very much in need of new and additional black boards. The expense of this improvement would be comparatively small.

The need of improvements in the No. Nine building if it is to be continued in use, is recognized. The enrollment is small. It would probably be more economical and more satisfactory to close this school and make provision for the few children elsewhere, than go to the expense of remodeling this building.

School Nurse

The school board has made arrangements for the employment of a part-time school nurse. Miss Ruth Whiteomb of Concord, N. H., has been secured for this work. Miss Whitcomb has charge of the health work in several towns in this vicinity. It is expected that the work of the nurse will prove beneficial to the children in our schools.

Finances

The school board's estimates of the necessary expenditures for the next fiscal year are printed elsewhere but the following table will make easy a comparison in detail of the proposed budget with the budget adopted a year ago for this current fiscal year:

It will be noted that the proposed budget shows decreases in several items, but, on the other hand, an increase of \$1,000 in high school tuition, the increase in the total budget being about \$1,050. It is quite impossible to estimate accurately the amount needed for high school tuition.

This year's budget provided for an expenditure of \$2,000, but we shall actually spend nearly \$2,600. Three years ago the cost of high school tuition was \$1,600. It seems probable that there will be an increased number of high school pupils next year and that not less than \$3,000 will be needed for this purpose.

In the study of the budget it should be further noted that, although the total of the proposed budget is but \$1,050 more than the total of the previous budget, the total amount of the appropriation recommended by the school board exceeds the appropriation made a year ago by approximately \$1,700. This is due to a drop in the "estimated income." In the "estimated income" of a year ago there was included a probable balance of \$600 in the treasury at the close of the year. There will be no balance in the treasury at the close of this fiscal year.

Deficit

On February 1 the estimated amount available to meet necessary school expenses for the remainder of the year was \$4,587.22. A careful estimate places the necessary expenditures at \$5,540. This means a deficit this current year of approximately \$950. This is accounted for largely by the increase in the cost of high school tuition, of transportation, and of repairs.
