

### RESULTS OF THE 1987 LITTLETON WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton in said state qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on the tenth day of March, 1987, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon (the polls are to open at 8:00 a.m. and may not close prior to 6:00 p.m.; business meeting to be held at the High School Auditorium at 7:00 p.m.), to act upon the following:

Article 1. To choose one Selectmen for the term of three years, one Park Commissioner for a three year term, a Town Treasurer for a one year term, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library for three year terms, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a three year term. (Ballot vote)

The following Town Officers were elected:

Article 2. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. one as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinances as follows:

To amend Article XV, Section 15:01 on Enforcement and Penalties to read as follows: "Any person who violates any provision of this ordinance may be made punishable by a civil fine of not more than \$100 for each day that such violation is found by a court to continue after the conviction date or after the date on which the violator receives written notice from the Town that he is in violation of this ordinance, whichever date is earlier." (Proposed by Selectmen, approved by the Planning Board.)

This article was voted 341 yes to 279 no. Passed

Article 3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. two as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinances as follows:

To amend Article II, Section 2.01 on Definitions, to include the following phrase: "Accessory uses to include but not limited to garages, swimming pools, carports, and sheds.

This article was voted 354 yes to 254 no. Passed.

Article 4. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. three as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinances as follows?

To create a new section in Article VI on Special Provisions addressing Yard Sales and Flea Markets.

"6.03.01 DEFINITION. A "YARD SALE" or "FLEA MARKET" for the purpose of the ordinance shall be deemed to be the sale of used items offered to the public in an indoor or outdoor display on property normally used for purposes other than such sales. Examples of other purposes include but are not limited to residences, vacant lots, and commercial properties. This ordinance section shall also include "barn sales", and "garage sales" or other similar activities.

6.03.02 TIME LIMIT. No property located in any area of the town not zoned for retail sales shall be used for the purpose of operating a yard sale or flea market for more than 10 days in any calendar year. Any property so designated in the zoning ordinance as allowing retail sales may be used for the same in excess of this limitation provided all appropriate permits and licenses are obtained. It should be the responsibility of the owners of the premises to ensure that the time limitation contained herein is not violated.

6.03.03 SIGNS. No sign advertising any yard sale or flea market as controlled by this ordinance shall be posted more than two hours prior to the commencement of the sale and all signs shall be removed no more than two hours after its termination. No signs shall be posted on any property, including utility poles, without the permission of the owner thereof. It shall be the responsibility of the person or persons operating the yard sale to comply with this provision.

6.03.04 NOTIFICATION TO POLICE DEPARTMENT. Any person wishing to operate a yard sale or flea market within the Town of Littleton shall notify the Littleton Police Department no less than 24 hours prior to the commencement of the sale. This notification shall include the location of the sale and the proposed times and dates of the event. Any person operating such a sale and any person attending the same shall comply with all requests and requirements of the Littleton Police Department or its individual officers with regard to the flow of traffic and parking of vehicles in connection with such sale.

6.03.05 PENALTY. Any person who violates any of the above provisions shall be subject to a penalty. This will be done in accordance with Article XV of the Littleton Town Zoning Ordinances." (Proposed by Selectmen, approved by Planning Board.)

This article was voted 336 yes to 324 no. Passed

Article 5. Are you in favor of the adoption of amendment No. four as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows?

To add to Article II, Definitions, the definition of Yard Sales and Flea Markets. Section 2.38 will read as follows: A "YARD SALE" or "FLEA MARKET" for the purpose of this ordinance shall be deemed to be the sale of used items offered to the public in an indoor or outdoor display on property normally used for purposes other than such sales. Examples of other purposes include but are not limited to residences, vacant lots, and commercial properties. This ordinance section shall also include "barn sales', "garage sales", or other similar activities.

This article was voted 364 yes to 263 no. Passed.

Article 6. Are you in favor of the adoption of amendment No. five as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinances as follows?

"To change the present industrial district, bordered on the North by the Ammonosuc River, on the West by the Route 93 overpass, on the East by Bridge Street and on the South by the R-I zone along South Street, to a Commercial-I zone. (This change does not effect the present R-I zones along both sides of South Street)." (Proposed by Selectmen, approved by Planning Board)

This article was voted 409 yes to 206 no. Passed

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to satisfy the purposes specified in the budget posted.

An amendment was approved to increase the Fire Department budget by \$13,894.00 to purchase a new stainless steel tank for the 1971 Dodge tanker as the existing tank has cracked. Another amendment was approved increasing the contribution made to North Country Home Health Agency from \$9,000.00 to \$10,858.00 (increase of \$1,858.00). Another amendment was approved to increase the library budget by \$4,000.00 to repair a sewer line. The total budget approved was \$1,994,280.00.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$144,700 for road improvements.

This article was voted in the affirmative.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$100,000 to the reserve fund established by the 1986 town meeting for closure of the municipal landfill.

This article was approved by a voice vote.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$25,000 for improvements to the Town Hall heating system.

Article 10 was approved by a voice vote.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to create a special unpaid committee to be known as the Upper Grafton/Lancaster Area Refuse Disposal Planning Committee pursuant to RSA 53-B:1 and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$19,323 for investigative engineering services. This committee shall study the advisability of establishing a Regional Refuse Disposal District and shall report back to the Selectmen and the Town for further action at a subsequent Town Meeting.

This article was approved by a voice vote.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to establish a capital reserve fund for purchase of a fire truck, and to appropriate \$10,000 to that fund, and name the Board of Selectmen as the agents of that fund as required by RSA 35:15.

Article 12 was approved by a voice vote.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$2,592 for contribution to a regional household hazardous waste collection project.

This article was approved by a voice vote.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$18,454 for increases to members of the Police bargaining unit. Pay rates are according to the units proposed pay scales as outlined in the factfinders report, with step increases given on anniversary dates of hire - based on length of service.

This article was approved by standing vote - yes - 223 to no - 148. Article passed.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to rescind previous appropriations of \$23,722 previously committed from the federal revenue sharing fund, for the purposes of reappropriation. This amount represents the remaining balance from the following previous allocations: 1983 articles 12, 14, and 15; 1984 articles 15, 19, 2%, and 21; 1985 article 25.

This article was approved by a voice vote.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$21,000 for purchase of communications equipment, and further to authorize withdrawal of \$21,000 for this purpose from the federal revenue sharing account.

This article was approved by a voice vote.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$130,000 for the purchase of highway equipment (street sweeper and loader) and further to authorize withdrawal of \$92,871 for this purpose from the federal revenue sharing account.

This article was approved by a voice vote, the \$130,000 to purchase a new street sweeper & loader.

Article 18. To see if the Town shall adopt the provisions of RSA 72:1-c which authorizes any town or city to elect not to assess, levy, and collect a resident tax.

This article was approved by a voice vote - not to have resident tax in 1987.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$336,000 for the Mill Street project, with \$286,000 from the community development block grant received for that purpose, and the remaining \$50,000 to come from the parking meter fund.

This article was approved by a voice vote.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to establish a capital reserve fund for a solid waste disposal facility, and name the Board of Selectmen as the agents of that fund as required by RSA 35:15.

This article was approved by a voice vote.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the following parcels of real estate owned by the Town as described by the following map and lot numbers of the Town tax map: Map 107, Lot 20; Map 111, Lot 14 & 51; Map 112, Lot 80; Map 114, Lot 3; Map 117, Lot 46; Map 120, Lot 34 & 73; Map 123, Lot 72; Map 125, Lot 26; Map 202, Lot 8; Map 229, Lot 5; Map 251, Lot 22.

Amendments were made not to sell Lot 3 and Lot 22 - the Mt. Eustis ski area, and the "Pest House property off Skyline Drive. Voters gave the Selectmen the authority to sell the remaining lots.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to exchange a portion of real estate owned by the Town described as Map 125, Lot 33 for a portion of real estate owned by Edward and Ruth Marland described as Map 125, Lot 34 upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen deem appropriate.

This article was approved by a voice vote.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to abolish the Parks Commission, and place the responsibility and authority for Town Park Facilities and Recreation Programs with the Board of Selectmen. And further, to empower the Board of Selectmen to appoint an advisory committee to recommend a plan for the maintenance of the Parks, and for the establishment of recreational and leisure time activities. (By petition)

This article, after much discussion, the voters voted to keep the Park Commission.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1987 and to be paid therefrom.

This article was approved by a voice vote.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, money from the State, Federal or other governmental unit, or a private source or bequest which becomes available during the fiscal year in accordance with the procedure set forth in RSA 31:95-b.

This article was approved by a voice vote.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and convey real estate acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed, and to further authorize the Selectmen to sell any other personal property owned by the Town which is no longer used for municipal purposes. In every instance, sale shall be by public auction, or advertised sealed bids.

This article was approved by a voice vote.

Article 27. To transact any other business that may legally come before the Meeting.

Rev. Thomas Campbell read a letter he would like to be part of the minutes.

The meeting adjourned at  $8:12\ p.m.$  (this being the second night of the meeting).

# LITTLETON WARRANT The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton in said State qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on the eighth day of March, 1988, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon (the polls are to open at 8:00 a.m. and may not close prior to 6:00 p.m.; business meeting to be held at the High School Auditorium at 7:00), to act upon the following:

ARTICLE 1. To choose one Selectmen for the term of three years, one Park Commissioner for a three year term, a Town Treasurer for a one year term, three members of the Board of Trustees of th Public Library for three year terms, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a three year term, one Supervisor of the Checklist for a six year term, and one Moderator for a two year term. (Ballot vote)

ARTICLE 2. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Ordinance as follows:

To delete Article II, Section 2:01 through 2:38 and replace section 2:01 with "Interpretation of Certain Terms and Words" and section 2:02 with "Definitions, 1 through 178."

ARTICLE 3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To clearly define by reference to specific properties the existing boundary between the Rural and R-II Zones along Partridge Lake Road around Partridge Lake to the Lyman town line.

ARTICLE 4. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To restructure the Table of Use Regulations, Section 4:02 in the R-I and R-II zones and to amend the Rural and C-I, C-II, C-III, and C-IV zones in terms of the allowed uses by right and those uses allowed by special exception.

ARTICLE 5. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Article VI, Special Provisions, to include a new Section 6:04 to read: "Accessory Uses shall be setback no less than 10 feet from the side or rear property lines."

ARTICLE 6. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 5 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Article VI, Special Provisions, to include a new Section 6:04.01 to read as follows: "Accessory buildings on corner lots shall conform with front yard setbacks for both intersecting streets."

ARTICLE 7. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 6 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Article VI, Special Provisions, by adding Section 6:05 and subsections stating Off-Street Parking provisions. These sections establish the minimum size and number of required parking spaces for commercial, residential and industrial purposes.

ARTICLE 8. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 7 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Article VI, Special Provisions, by adding Section 6:06 which establishes Manufactured Housing Park standards.

ARTICLE 9. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 8 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To add section 9.03.08, to Article IX, Sign Regulations to read: No sign, portable or otherwise, is to be placed within the public right-of-way or located to conflict with the vision clearance requirements as found in Article II.

ARTICLE 10. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 9 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To delete the present sign regulations as found in Article IX, Section 9:01 through 9:11 and establish new sections 9:01 through 9:08 (excluding 9.03.08) dealing with the purpose, definitions, general sign regulations in terms of size, location and zoning district, temporary signs and signs exempt from permits.

ARTICLE 11. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 10 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To rewrite existing portions of Sections 10:01C and 10:01D which deal with apartment buildings and other types of multifamily residential developments. In addition to rewording the sections generally, this article increases the minimum lot size for multi-family development from 25,000 to 30,000 square feet. Minimum lot density is also increased from 3,000 to 4,000 square feet per dwelling. The section also allows a maximum of twelve attached units per structure and requires a minimum distance of at least 30 feet between structures.

ARTICLE 12. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 11 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To create a new Section 10:03, under Article X, dealing with proposed Planned Unit Development Regulations.

The objectives of a Planned Unit Development are to encourage flexibility in design for large scale development by permitting mixed housing types, which may include multi-family dwellings, and mixed land uses; to provide for shopping centers; to allow for a more economic provision of street and utility networks; and to encourage the preservation and recreational use of open space in harmony with the natural terrain, scenic qualities, and outstanding land features.

ARTICLE 13. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 12 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Article XII, Section 12:02.3 to extend application review time from 20 to 30 days as provided by state law, and to allow additional review time if circumstances warrant.

ARTICLE 14. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 13 as proposed by the Planning Board as follows:

To delete Section 12:04 of Article XII which is already provided for under Article XV. This article deals with fine provisions, which has been superseded by vote of the 1987 town meeting.

ARTICLE 15. Are you in favor of the adoption of an amendment to the Town of Littleton Zoning Ordinance to permit certain parcels of land within the Town of Littleton (hereinafter specified) owned by D.B. Neomi Khedker, Hilltop Road, Littleton, New Hampshire, currently zoned as R-1 and R-2 usage to be changed to Commercial usage to permit the development of a health spa, hotel, golf course and cluster housing.

The parcels are located on Hilltop Road and Route 18, and are indentified as Map 240 Lot 21, Map 241 Lot 5, Map 239 Lot 17, Map 239 Lot 24, Map 240 Lot 22, and Map 241 Lot 4. (By petition, Planning Board opposes)

ARTICLE 16. Are you in favor of adopting a new Floodplain Development ordinance replacing the existing ordinance including definitions, building permit application, flood elevation information, and flood proofing for construction in the floodplain to insure continued availability of the Federal Flood Insurance Program in the Town of Littleton.

Article 17 through 31 will not appear on the official ballot, but will be discussed and decided at the business portion of the meeting Tuesday night.

- ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$4,260,000 for construction of a secondary treatment plant and related costs. This amount will be raised by the issuance of municipal serial notes and/or bonds under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, with \$4,047,000 reimbursed by the State of New Hampshire. This article further authorizes the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such notes and/or bonds and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such notes and/or bonds as shall be in the best interest of the Town (2/3 Ballot vote required)
- ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to satisfy the purposes specified in the budget as posted.
- ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$265,000 for construction and related costs of a fire station. Of this amount, \$140,000 will be withdrawn from the 1972 Capital Reserve fund established for town buildings.
- ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$100,000 to the reserve fund established by the 1986 town meeting for closure of the municipal landfill.
- ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to establish a capital reserve fund for the purchase of highway department equipment, and to appropriate \$30,000 to that fund, and name the Board of Selectmen as the agents of that fund as required by RSA 35:15.
- ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$3,240.00 above and beyond monies already raised for the Chamber of Commerce, for the purpose of maintaining the Information Booth (including costs of wages and electricity) for the period May 28th through October 16th (by petition).
- ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$20,000.00 for the purpose of repairing the Remich Park Pool (By petition).
- ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell a parcel of land known as the Pest House Property (Map 251, Lot 22), and further provide that the funds received from such sale, plus interest, will be used for capital repairs and improvements to Park and Recreational facilities, as determined by the Park Commissioners (By petition).
- ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue pursuant to RSA 231:43 the following as Town Roads: Cross Road, Old Route 18 (encompassed by the Wagner Property at Map 243 Lot 2), and Wild West Farm road (encompassed by the Wilbur Willey Property Map 215 Lot 1).

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell a portion of the land (approximately 1,200 sq. ft.) known as McBean Circle to an abutter. The portion to be sold is not needed for road purposes, and would be transferred upon such terms and conditions as the Board deems appropriate.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1988 and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, money from the State, Federal or other governmental unit, or a private source or bequest which becomes available during the fiscal year in accordance with the procedure set forth in RSA 31:95-b.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and convey real estate acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed, and to further authorize the Selectmen to sell any other personal property owned by the Town which is no longer used for municipal purposes. In every instance, sale shall be by public auction, or advertised sealed bids.



To The Citizens of Littleton:

During the past few years your Board of Selectmen has spent a great deal of time preparing and implementing plans for municipal service improvements and orderly growth for the Town of Littleton.

In 1987 some of these plans came to fruition:

The completed construction of the Mill Street area provides needed additional parking space, improved traffic flow, access to the riverfront, and an opportunity for additional downtown commercial activity.

The implementation of semi-annual property tax collection has reduced our annual interest cost dramatically. The interest cost for borrowed funds in 1984 was over \$100,000.00. In 1987 it was \$2,734.38.

The consolidation of the part time Zoning Officer position and contracted town planning services into a single, full time Zoning Officer and Town Planner has improved service in this area. While much progress has been made, we acknowledge that there is still a ways to go.

The upcoming landfill closure and solid waste disposal project will require much discussion, deliberation, and ultimately, a major community decision. We will keep you informed.

The first year benefit of the town roads improvement plan has been very good. This multi-year plan is now a part of the Public Works Department annual budget.

This year's warrant contains an article proposing the construction of a new fire station. The Selectmen feel that it is time for a new one, and a plan will be ready for consideration.

It is a pleasure to note that voluntary citizen participation on the various boards, commissions and advisory groups continues at a high level. We are very fortunate, and most appreciative of the time and talent that they give to the town.

We recognize the fact that as a community we must plan for the current and future needs of each municipal department, and reflect these plans within the budget. Our plant and equipment needs to be upgraded and replaced at reasonable intervals. Some of our infrastructure improvement projects and major equipment purchases can cause a substantial increase in a departmental budget in one year, then be minimal in the next. Thus, when appropriate, it is our intent to ask you to establish capital reserve accounts that can be drawn on at a time of major expenditures, thereby dampening wide year-to-year budget fluctuations. We want to plan ahead!

The Selectmen are optimistic. We feel that the expanding tax base shows that the town is going in the right direction and that Littleton is a great place to work and live.

1987 began with controversy and heated debate over such issues as the police contract, merit pay, the park commissioners, and teacher raises. It settled quickly, however, into a quiet and productive year. The year saw a fair amount of time devoted to an issue that we all thought had been resolved - the proposed secondary treatment plant. Changes in federal and state funding of waste water projects threatened the \$3.4 million aid package the town would receive to complete this project. That shortfall would have to be made up directly from increases in property tax or sewer user fees revenues. Since that would create an unbearable hardship on Littleton residents, every effort was made to reverse the funding proposal. Those endeavors were successful, and the project will achieve final resolution at the 1988 town meeting.

Another area which received much attention in 1987 was the effort to identify a regional solid waste solution. This undertaking has included an analysis of solid waste disposal alternatives by thirteen North Country communities. A proposed area wide solution will be presented for voter consideration within the next year.

1987 was the first year in a fifteen year road improvement plan. Based on an engineering review of the condition of town roads, a local highway committee suggested which road improvements should be undertaken during the year. This marks an important step in the reconstruction of our much neglected transportation network. The Mill Street project was largely completed in 1987, and should prove to be a major asset to the downtown area. Town Hall renovations were continued through the year, and sale of town owned lands was begun. The town and the Water and Light Department received a demonstration grant to replace street lights on Main, Union and Pleasant Streets. This project caps a renewed cooperative effort between the town organizations which is most gratifying. A dozen volunteer firefighters completed an extensive training program, and received state certification. The level of dedication and technical ability of that department, including volunteer members, has never been greater than in 1987. This past year also brought a major change in the structure of our planning department, which we expect will better serve the needs of residents and permit applicants.

For most residents, the best news of 1987 was a decrease in the tax rate, as the town portion of the tax bill dropped 17%. Tax rates were not the only thing to drop last year. Volunteer boards saw large turnovers in membership, as several experienced members chose to step down. As always, I thank them for the long hours and difficult decisions which they must endure. #### LITTLETON POLICE DEPARTMENT

This past year has been not only a productive one, but an interesting and educational one for the twelve full time employees of this department. Events occurred that were somewhat unfamiliar to us, but despite this, they assisted us all in our personal growth and in our development as a unit working towards a common goal.

Our dispatch center, which is manned 24 hours a day by trained personnel from the fire and police departments, logged a total of 7,641 calls. Of those calls, 501 were for vehicle assistance; 278 were animal complaints; 402 were business alarms; 146 were medical emergencies; 100 were domestic complaints; 282 were motor vehicle accidents; 137 were unsecured premises; 1,691 were motor vehicle stops; 81 were fire department assists; 216 were traffic details, 22 were burglaries, and 75 were reported thefts. There were 78 acts of vandalism; 606 motor vehicle summonses and arrests; 377 criminal arrests, and 2,649 calls regarding citizens concerns and complaints.

During the past year the Littleton Police Department made a total of 1,025 arrests, with 109 of these being juvenile cases. There were a total of 606 motor vehicle violations and 377 criminal arrests. We also brought an additional 57 felony complaints before the Grafton County Grand Jury for prosecution and an additional 3 felony arrests were served for individuals being Fugitives from Justice.

According to our Juvenile Officer, Corporal Ralph Brooks, we processed 109 cases through our juvenile court system. There were 17 felony arrests, 61 misdemeanor arrests and 31 children who were found to be in need of supervision. A breakdown of offenses committed by juveniles are as follows: 12 burglaries, 3 arsons, 1 firearms theft, 1 forgery, 46 criminal mischief, 4 simple assaults, 5 shoplifting, 6 thefts and 15 truancy complaints.

Corporal Brooks spends approximately 1,159 hours on juvenile matters. Court prosecution accounts for 327 hours while the remaining is spent on diversion meetings, review hearings, meetings with parents, juveniles, school officials and the Division for Children and Youth Services.

Our community should be extremely proud of the volunteer work that is being done by the members of our Juvenile Court Diversion Committee. The two Littleton residents who have served on the committee since it began in 1982, and who have also been assisting us in diverting juveniles from the justice system are Mrs. Ann Quinn and Mrs. Mary Sue Kelly.

The Police Department, along with Littleton residents, should take great pride in knowing that we have experienced our second consecutive fatality-free year on our highways. There are many

reasons for this: the holiday press releases by both this department and the members of our high school SADD chapter, the willingness and cooperation of motorists in abiding by the state's motor vehicle laws, and the rigid enforcement by the officers on the department.

There were a total of 282 traffic accidents in Littleton during the course of this past year, 49 of them involving personal injury. We also covered 5 motorcycle and off highway recreational vehicle accidents, 5 bicycle accidents and 1 pedestrian accident.

Training of police officers always has been and will continue to be a top priority. During this past year several officers attended various programs throughout New Hampshire. Officer Mikel Dyne recently completed his studies towards his Bachelor of Science Degree in Human Services. A Hazardous Material Seminar was attended by Sergeant Gilbert, Corporal Brooks, Officer Rick Dyne, and Special Officer Mary Ann Duranty. A class of Female Prisoner Search and Control Techniques was attended by Eileen Wright, Sue Bourque, Mary Ann Duranty and Thurita Grammo. Officer Donald Marsh was certified in the use of our Intoximeter and our five operators were also recertified. Sergeant Fred Gilbert was recertified as our Firearms Instructor and Officer Devine was recertified as the department's self defense instructor. Officers Herbert Lloyd, Jeff Stiegler, Michael Devine and Special Officer Sue Bourque completed a 40 hour course in the field of drug education and prevention. Sergeant Fred Gilbert and Corporal Ralph Brooks attended a seminar on presidential security. Mrs. Thurita Grammo completed a program on Word Processing and Self-Harming Behavior Among Adolescents. Finally Officer Herbert Lloyd is continuing his correspondence course from the State of Florida on Traffic Accident Reconstruction.

Our in-service training sessions dealt with CPR recertification, AIDS, Youth and Family Mediation, and an update on laws relating to the Fish and Game Laws and Off Highway Recreational Vehicles. We wish to thank publicly our instructors for these in-service programs. They are: Lt. Jeff Gray of the N. H. Fish and Game Department, Bureau Chief Doug Eoute of the OHRV Department, and Terry Flaherty of the Youth and Family Mediation Program. We instructed classes in topics such as search and seizure, Law Related Education, shoplifting, and alcohol and drug abuse. We were honored to be invited to the first annual Careers Day at our elementary school. We also held our annual Christmas party, Halloween movies and Easter Egg Hunt.

Thanks should be extended to the officers who volunteered many long hours to instruct these classes and conduct these activities.

Enforcement is an important part of our job butwe feel that public relations and education, especially among our younger people, is even more important.

We are pleased to be able to sponsor our School Safety Patrol again this year. Special thanks should be extended to our elementary school principal Grant Harris for the excellent job he does in assisting us with the organization of this program. Our sixth graders do an exemplary job, sometimes under very adverse weather conditions,

in making certain that the younger students arrive at school safe and sound. The department would like to publicly recognize these hard working students.

#### PUBLIC WORKS AND HIGHWAYS

The major road projects this year were the reconstruction of Bishop Street, widening and repaving of Slate Ledge Road and the repaving of Railroad Street.

We installed a new storm drain line the full length of Chiswick Avenue and added 4 new catch basins on Bishop Street.

Mt. Misery Road was widened to 20 feet of traveled way. The Mill Street rehabilitation project was completed.

We rebuilt 15 catch basins around town and replaced 8 manhole frames and covers.

We cut brush and did some ditching on our outside roads.

We repaved Main Street sidewalk from Topic of the Town to the Social Security office and Union Street sidewalk from Sherwood Manor to Pike Avenue.

The Department worked with the Water and Light Department repairing water leaks and digging test pits.

We have hauled around 10,000 yards of material to the landfill to use for cover. We have removed roughly 30,000 tires from our landfill (gone to Connecticut). We have done testing for a new landfill at two locations.

#### LITTLETON FIRE DEPARTMENT

The year 1987 has been the busiest year the Fire Department has had. We reached a record number of runs at 207.

The addition of Twin State Mutual Aid to our firefighting force has been greatly received. In 1987 we had 8 mutual aid calls 3 of which were for Twin State towns, the rest for North-Pac towns of which we are also a member. On the other side, we have received Twin State aid 8 times and North-Pac only once. The organization is very strong and progressive and is currently in the process of initiating a hazardous materials incident response team.

Training is still a large part of our effort. This year we added ll certified firefighters and 9 first responders. In addition, firefighters Whitney, Hoitt and Nute attended and successfully completed Fire Instructor training. We now have 4 certified Fire Instructors. For the coming year we will have another certified Level 1 course along with a career course in addition to regular training drills on the first and third Tuesday of each month.

The Fire Department has become a very active part of the building permit process and this has worked out very well. We are able to ensure that all new buildings in town are in compliance with all necessary codes. A large part of our time is spent on inspections and this, we feel, is a very necessary and beneficial part of our job.

Fire prevention week, 1987, was a success. We visted Lakeway Elementary School during the week and conducted numerous fire safety classes.

The construction of the Cottage Street Bridge caused a few anxious moments at times, but we survived with only minor inconvenience.

I would like to thank the towns people for their support in 1987 and as always, we welcome your comments and suggestions, and look forward to serving you in 1988.

#### REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

#### AND

#### STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July, 1986 and June, 1987, we experienced fewer fires than normal. The three leading causes of forest fires were again children, fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden and debris burning. All causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest tax law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden, or Concord Forest Protection Headquarters at (603)271-2217.

If you own forest land, you became responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.

#### PARKS AND RECREATIONS

This year the Parks and Recreations Department has had a great year. Steps have been taken for future development; maintenance of the area was at its best; the pool and summer camp again increased in size; badly needed repairs were made to all facilities; and best of all, volunteerism was at an all time high.

Besides general maintenance, the Common had all the copper piping replaced; coat racks installed; safer basket-ball stands and hoops put up; all new lighting system at the field was installed and the old lights were placed on the tennis courts. A full set of bleachers were rebuilt; all playground areas were sanded; a new lock system was installed and a new separation net put up at the tennis courts.

At the pool, all the pool buildings were repainted, all the copper piping was replaced, all showers and toilets were replumbed, new guard chairs were built, new guard equipment was purchased, a new lock system was installed, three main motors and pumps had to be replaced, a new baby pool chlorinator was purchased, and new racks were built for equipment.

The park was the main concentration point as new benches and tables had tobe built. The inside walls and floors of the ground level were cleaned and painted, heating was put into the shop area, and a cement floor was finally poured in the shop area. New doors were made for the upstairs area and the bathrooms downstairs, an insulated door was installed in the front to begin the proper insulation of the old building; racks were made for skating and day camp use; the hockey boards and penalty box were removed; the front entrance was greened up and fenced in; two dugouts were made and put in place; fencing was put up for safety reasons; the field area was cut and totally seeded, fertilized and limed; the little league building was closed in to store equipment; the rotting top to the tower was totally replaced; extra parking was created by the swings and little league area; the bandstand was repainted and stairs repaired; over 40 bleacher boards were replaced and painted; tires were removed from the new field area; new shelves and storage facility were built for the office area. Playground areas were sanded, playground equipment was replaced and repaired. A swale was started by the main field. Tractor equipment was replaced and a new small tractor and lawn mower were purchased. All locks were changed and rekeyed.

Many more projects are planned for the future that go far beyond the regular every day maintenance of the grounds and buildings.

We had a very successful day camp this year as over 200 children from K through 4 enjoyed six great weeks. The 5th through 7th grade group had over 300 different children from our community enjoying an outstanding program directed by Ron Bartholomew.

The swimming pool had an average of 100 different people using it daily. All ages of children were enrolled in our swim lesson program from preschool to advanced lifesaving. This was a very successful program.

Other programs that ran extremely well were the 13 - 15 girls softball team coached by Deb Mason, Biddy and Giddy leagues run by Brian Nelson, the men's basketball program run by John Simon, the men's tennis tournament, and an excellent skating program for all ages.

As Commissioners we would like to thank all 100 plus students and adults of Littleton, who volunteered to make this a very productive year.

A special thank you goes to the outstanding efforts of park custodian Brian Lineman for his dedication and hard work he has exhibited in his first year as a Parks and Recreations employee.

The Park Commission this year has taken a considerable amount of time to look into the overdue needs of the parks. Already there have been professional evaluations of the antiquated electrical systems of the park building, filter and pump system at the pool, insulation problems of the park, resurfacing of the tennis courts and new programs for the adults and elderly of the town.

We are looking for even a better year in 1988.

#### LITTLETON PLANNING BOARD

1987 was a year of substantial change in the direction and activities for the Littleton Planning Board. The Board spent three months, along with the Zoning Board of Adjustment, reviewing some critical problems in the existing zoning ordinance in terms of definitions, manufactured housing parks, planned unit development regulations, parking, signs, and the Table of Use. Also, the office hours were expanded to five days a week when a full time Town Planner was hired.

The Planning Board's relationship in terms of communication and cooperation improved with the Town's Department Heads, the Zoning Board of Adjustment, and the Littleton Conservation Commission through joint meetings and better information dissemination.

The Master Plan was completed and will be adopted in 1988. New composite tax parcel maps were also completed this past year. Based on the ementioned, it is apparent that the majority of the goals the Planning Board established for itself in 1987 were accomplished.

The following are a few of the highlights of this past year:

- 1. Subdivision and Site Plan Review Summary:
  - -Site Plan: 21 approvals
  - -Subdivision: 30 approvals involving approximately 791 acres -Minor Lot Line Adjustments: 6 approved
- Establishment of a new building/zoning clearance permit system.
- Development of a better compliance system for building permits and improved enforcement
- 4. Review of Master Plan
- 5. Hiring of a Town Engineer to review and supervise the construction of proposed roads
- 6. Issuance of approximately 180 building permits

The Planning Board has also established several goals for the 1988 planning year. These include:

- 1. Review existing zoning lines
- 2. Develop new zoning districts
- 3. Development of clear purposes for existing zoning districts
- 4. Establish a procedure for minor site plan review
- 5. Examine parking in the downtown area to develop a better means of addressing this issue

- 6. Develop a tracting system to more accurately estimate population growth and housing needs
- 7. Examine growth in Littleton and provide direction on future growth
- 8. Develop new application forms that are more informative for review purposes

The Littleton Planning Board would like to thank all those people and groups who have worked with the Board in making this such a productive year.

#### LITTLETON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

After a late start and a reorganization, the Conservation Commission has been meeting on a monthly basis or more whenever necessary.

We have contacted the County Forester regarding tree removal in the Dells. They will be marking trees for removal and advertising for bids from local loggers, to remove the selected trees. This selected tree removal will open up the area to allow more light. This project is being completed at no cost to the Town.

We are also initiating a program of ADOPT A PICNIC TABLE. This is being done to get some new picnic tables for use in the Dells. We are very hopeful that the Dells will be a more enjoyable place to visit this summer and will be used more.

The Commission is taking a more active role in Wetlands protection. We have reviewed seven (7) dredge and fill applications and have sent five (5) letters notifying that a permit may be needed for work in or adjacent to a wetland area. We have made a few site visits in conjunction with the Planning Board. This is being done in an effort to have people comply with State Law RSA 483-A Dredge and Fill in Wetlands.

One of our members has been appointed to the Planning Board to better coordinate Wetlands concerns to the Planning Board and the Commission.

We have acquired from the Soil Conservation Service soil maps for the Town that identifies poorly and very poorly drained soils for better wetlands protection. The Commission and the Planning Board both have copies of these maps.

The Conservation Commission welcomes your comments and suggestions.

MAJOR ACTIVITIES, 1987:

WATER SYSTEM-

As far as physical installation of new water system facilities is concerned, two events stand out: the installation of a new 12" main line on Cottage Street and the successful testing of a new, bedrock well off Brickyard Road. The new line was installed in association with the State's upgrade of the Cottage Street Bridge.

Winterset, Inc., the State's prime contractor, did the tiein and bridge work, Department crews with Clinton Clough placed the line beneath the railroad tracks, a major engineering accomplishment. The new well, located by BCI Geonetics, is capable of delivering good water at a rate of 200,000 gallons per day. It remains to be seen if that well figures into the Department's long range plans.

Perhaps more significant than a new pipeline and a well is the approach the Department is taking to ensure an adequate supply of good water for now and into the future. The Department has engaged D.L. Maher Co. to continue our groundwater search program. D. L. Maher will be looking for sand and gravel wells in the western and northwestern parts of Littleton near Moore reservoir. The Department has committed itself to a water meter installation program, an effort which will permit the fair distribution of costs; each customer will pay only for the water he or she uses. A water meter at every point of distribution will also ensure a measure of conservation and should end the waste of one of our most precious commodities. Meters will also permit the development of usage statistics needed to set proper rates and to account for water distribution, a prerequisite for funding future water supplies by the sale of municipal bonds. The Department also implemented a Water Impact Fee schedule. Fees will be collected from new customers to ensure that additional costs related to facilities to serve new customers are borne fairly by those new customers. Each fee collected will be deposited in an account, restricted in its use, to construct new water supply, treatment, storage, and distribution facilities only.

#### ELECTRIC SYSTEM-

The electric system received major improvements in 1987. A new transformer, twice the size of the old one, was installed at the Lafayette Substation. However, it won't be enough to serve the growing needs of our community. Amazingly, in the last quarter of the year, more electrical power was requested by prospective new customers than was available in the unused capacity of all four Department substations. The Department's staff recognized that another substation was not the answer: it would cost too much and take two years to build. A new idea was needed. One surfaced, and was adopted: the Department would distribute electric power at the same high voltage that now serves the substations themselves. It will take some work, a lot of training and a lot of dedication, but there will be no electric power shortage in Littleton.

Burt's crews installed or transferred 29,330 feet of electric cable in 1987: thats over  $5\frac{1}{2}$  miles! That effort included the upgrade of the Mill Street electrical system. We are proud of our accomplishment there. We were pleased when it was announced that, with the help of the Town Manager, the Department received the first Governor's Energy Office grant in the State for new street lighting. From the far end of Union Street to the far end of West Main, new high pressure sodium lamps cast more light than

there had been using less electricity. Pleasant Street, Pine Street and Manns Hill are decked out in new lights as well, plus numerous intersections where better lighting was needed.

In the meter department Ray Hopkins received the first of many new demand meters with digital read-outs. These meters are highly accurate and can be programmed with a little computer to read a variety of electrical outputs.

#### THE STAFF-

In 1987 there were notable events that took place in the office. The Department hired Steve Griffin as Controller, the manager of financial affairs. In addition his expertise will be used to help develop and implement new computer utility software. That software includes business programs such as billing, accounting, and payroll. Those programs will be tied to a new computer generated Work Order system that will be put into effect in 1988.

Sara Marvin was promoted to Computer Systems Operator and Louise Grammo to Accounting Supervisor, a job which has both a bookkeeping and inventory control function.

In a training context, Department employees hit the books in 1987. Todd Ross and Kevin Sorrell got well into the Utility Lineman correspondence course: Howard Tewksbury completed that course, the first to do so since Burt Ingerson received his diploma. Howard also received State certification as Water Treatment Operator, Class II and Water Distribution Operator, Class II. Richard Carignan and Ray Hopkins received training certificates from an intermediate level Electric Metering course put on by ECNE in Nashua.

Bob Miller retired in May, 1987 after  $36\frac{1}{2}$  years of dedicated service. He couldn't stay away however; and as a "part timer" helped out with water department duties. We were glad to have him: we certainly needed him.

Eric Hesseltine joined the Department in 1987, as a new lineman. Jackie Kenny joined as well to fill a vacancy in Customer Services. Jackie will work closely with Faye White whose manner continues to bring smiles to most customers' faces.

#### 1988 FORECAST OF MAJOR EVENTS:

In the 1986 Annual Report we alluded to growth and development in Littleton, electrical demand up 6 per cent at that time. In 1987 that demand increased by 10 per cent with more growth, at least another 10 per cent, expected in 1988. The Gale River, during periods of peak demand could not supply the needs of the Town. It took continuous operation of the Brickyard Road well to "break even" at times. Accordingly, the activities we will undertake in 1988 represent Phase I of our plans to ensure we will have enough water and enough electrical power. Those activities

#### are:

- (1)
- Continued upgrade of the Lafayette Substation Continued upgrade of Lafayette and South Street (2) Substation circuits
- Creation of a 34,500 volt distribution system (3)
- Upgrade of the North Littleton Road distribution (4)line
- (5) Continued ground water exploration efforts
- Installation of approximately 1300 water meters, (6) town-wide
- Upgrade of Railroad Street master meter and (7)chlorination facilities

The above items do not include work associated with normal, or regular, duties. There will be a lot of line extension projects and more new street lights. More water pipe too.

Your support of our efforts is much appreciated. Many of you have offered ideas, some which we have embraced. We thank you.

#### 1987 COUNTY NEWSLETTER

Budget for the current fiscal year is \$8,947,343. Town taxes to the County average 6.7% or \$2.21 per \$1,000, of the property owner's tax bill. The major portion of county expenses goes to the operation of the Nursing Home (39.69%) and to human services programs for the elderly, disabled, nursing care and children (26.86%).

REGISTRY OF DEEDS had gross income of \$3,630,159 in 1987. The total number of documents processed in 1987 was 29,983. \$3,184,982 was received in transfer tax, of which 96% or \$3,057,584 went to the State of NH and 4% or \$127,398 was retained as county income. Other receipts include recording and copy fees in the amount of \$445,177. Total income to the County was \$572,575 compared to a total of \$3,057,584 paid to the State, although the County is liable for 100% of all operating costs.

HUMAN SERVICES: Old Age & Disabled grant programs remain fairly constant with the elderly program averaging 100 cases at \$4,800 per month and the disabled averaging 225 cases at \$21,000 per month. Intermediate Nursing Care caseload increased with SB-1 where the county became responsible for all INC cases and eliminated town liability. INC cases now average 255 at \$110,000 per month, a rapidly increasing cost to the counties with savings to the towns. Children and Youth Services also became a county liability under Senate Bill 1, with counties reimbursing the State for 25% for all child service costs. It is impossible to give accurate figures for child expense, as they are rapidly increasing monthly. Current accounts reflect 130 to 150 cases costing from \$64,000 to \$75,000 per month. (At the beginning of this fiscal year, we had approximately 120 cases at about \$50,000 per month.) The County has 25% funding liability of child placement costs and we are taking an active interest in the needs of children in Grafton County.

<u>Social Service</u> agencies receive \$247,217 or \$4.03 per capita, to provide much needed services for home health, mental health, developmentally disabled, senior citizens transportation and nutrition and many other valuable programs.

CORRECTIONAL FACILITY is increasingly overpopulated, now averaging 58 inmates per day and frequently housing 60+. The current cost of operation is \$28.63 per immate day. We have contracted with an architect to present design and cost for a 34 bed addition. Schematic designs and price estimates are expected by mid-January to go out for bid by late January with bid results due in by the end of February. Funding issues should go to the delegation and public in March with anticipated ground breaking in April.

GRAFTON COUNTY NURSING HOME for intermediate nursing care is licensed for 136 beds and is about 80% reimbursable. FY 87 cost per patient day was \$68.78 with \$58.87 reimbursed by Medicaid.

GRAFTON COUNTY FARM continues to be self-supporting and provides work for inmates as well as offering access for experimental agricultural projects. This is primarily a dairy farm with an average herd of 170, but also grows produce for the nursing home.

GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS meet weekly on Wednesdays. We encourage public attendance and welcome facility tours.

We are deeply saddened by the deaths of Commissioner Arthur E. Snell, Dist. #2, and Commissioner Leonard Anderson, Dist. #3, early this year.

#### LITTLETON INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION REPORT

The Littleton Industrial Development Corporation is non-profit organization, established in 1974 through the efforts of the Littleton Chamber of Commerce, the Town Selectmen, and approximately 150 other interested area citizens as an entity to own and develop the Littleton Industrial Park and to accept the responsibility to lead the Town's effort to attract new and desirable industrial employers.

Burndy Corporation, Kenmartin Enterprises (Tender Corporation) and Hitchner Manufacturing continue to provide stable, quality employment opportunities. The primary efforts in 1987 of the Directors of LIDC have been directed toward the completion of the 20,000 square foot Trapper/Brown building, with 25% current occupancy by J.M.K. Industries. In addition, 1.6 acres were sold to Schwan Sales Enterprises, Inc. for a 6,000 square foot building to be completed in 1988.

In August, 1987, LIDC was approached by "Company X" concerning a possible land sale. After several weeks of many meetings, comparisons with alternative sites and review of many factors, the New England Electric Wire Company of Lisbon, New Hampshire announced their intention to purchase 16 acres in the LIDC Park, build a 50,000 square foot building in 1988 employing approximately 125 people and look forward to a Phase II additional 50,000 square feet and another 100 jobs.

Subdivision plans and site plan review regulations are approved with all state required releases in hand. Architects and engineers are at work and we hope to see an active 1988 with N.E. Wire as a welcomed corporate neighbor here in Littleton.

Engineering proceeds on a steady monthly basis for the reconstruction of Route 302 from Bridge Street to the Littleton Armory, the Bridge Street bridge replacement and a proposed access road into the Industrial Park (construction is set for summer, 1989).

I-93 is completed!! The expected pressures for residential, commercial and industrial growth are here! We have a solid foundation for quality growth and we must work together to gain full advantage for the benefit of all our citizens and employers.

#### WHITE MENTAL HEALTH & DEVELOPMENTAL SERVICES

#### 1987 DIRECTOR'S REPORT

We are pleased to announce that, during the past year, we received a three-year J.C.A.H. (Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals) accreditation for all programs offered through our agency. In addition to the work involved in "gearing up" for the accreditation, we have also initiated several program changes. They include the following:

- . Expansion of Respite Services We offer a period of respite to families of developmentally disabled or mentally ill clients. This is done by assuming the responsibility of care of the client for a brief period of time (usually 24-48 hours). This is done either in the client's home or in the home of the individual who is providing the respite service.
- . Initiation of Apartment Supervisors During the past year, we have been involved in the screening and hiring of individuals to assist clients currently living in the community. This creative program involves staff working with clients in their own homes or apartments in an effort to enhance their ability to live independently.
- . Expanded Work Sites We have increased the number of work sites within the community in which we have clients placed. The expansions of this program has afforded us the ability to offer more variety of work to our clients.
- . Transitional Employment This is a new program which has been initiated through a Vocational Rehabilitation grant. The program involves working individually with clients who are job ready. We locate suitable employment and provide support to help them transition into jobs which they will maintain independently from our agency.

These program efforts have been made in addition to our existing and very active services. Our activity in the more traditional services remains very constant.

Mental Health Services - We operate one full-time and three parttime offices. The full-time office is located in Littleton at 16 Maple Street. The part-time offices are located in Woodsville at Woodsville Clinic, in Lincoln at the Lin-Wood Medical Center, and in Lancaster at Weeks Memorial Hospital.

Last year, we provided the following services to our twenty-two town catchment area:

. Children's Services - Evaluations of children and/or their families, as well as treatment (therapy).

- . Adult Outpatient Services Psychiatric, psychological evaluations, treatment (therapy) including individual, conjoint, family and group services. Annually, we do 60% of our treatment with this population. We recorded 5,674 visits for children and adult services.
- . Emergency Services We operate a 24-hour-a-day phone line to respond to psychiatric emergencies. Last year, we responded to 700 crisis calls through our emergency services.
- . Inpatient Services We provide inpatient services through local general hospitals and a psychiatric inpatient unit (8 beds) in Berlin. We also make referrals to private hospitals and New Hampshire Hospital.
- . Case Management Services which help to keep clients in the community who otherwise might need institutional care. We had over 2,000 contacts in this supportive service program.
- . Alcohol Services Individual and group services to individuals with alcohol or drug problems.
- . Partial Hospitalization A day program for clients in need of more intensive services, including: therapy, vocational training, skills for independent living, and working with the clients to integrate into the community. This past year, we provided 4,742 hours of service to clients in this program.

#### Developmental Services

- . Early Intervention Home based service for 0-3 year old children who are delayed in their development. Services include: screening, assessment, treatment, and referral. Last year, we served over sixty-five families and provided over 1800 hours of direct service.
- . Day Habilitation Program Provides instruction to our most severely impaired adult population. The program works in conjunction with their residential programming as well as providing training and instruction in self care skills, pre-vocational skills, paid work, and other therapeutic services such as speech therapy and physical therapy. This program has been primarily used by former Laconia State School residents; however, we have or have had community clients who have been in the local school systems.

It is planned that by January 1988 a Day Habilitation Program, to be located in Pike, will be operating to provide services to the Haverhill area. Currently, it is planned that it will serve six individuals from that area.

. Supported and Competitive Employment - Provides training, instruction, and work adjustment for vocational and job needs. Paid work opportunities for the individuals can take place either in the community or in the Workshop itself. The programs have

been successful in meeting their objectives and are popular with the individuals who have participated.

## NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL ANNUAL REPORT

North Country Council was extremely busy in 1987 as it continued to provide a wide range of assistance to North Country communities.

As a regional non-profit, public agency chartered under NH RSA 36:45, the Council is responsible for assisting its member communities in local town planning, regional planning, economic development and numerous other community services. In addition to the direct assistance the Council provides each member community, it is an advocate for all North Country towns in legislative and funding issues with the state and federal governments.

The North Country is experiencing tremendous growth and development pressures. The Council is dedicated to assisting towns with the impacts associated with these pressures. In order to more efficiently serve its membership, the Council has assigned a staff person to respond to each town's request for assistance. In this way, continuity between the town and the Council is ensured and the overall effectiveness of the Council is increased.

In Littleton, the Town participated in the Council's Circuit Riding Planner Program. The Circuit Rider reviewed subdivision applications and zoning amendments. NCC completed the Master Plan and provided technical assistance to the Town staff on a variety of land use issues. The Council also sponsored a Soil Workshop in Littleton. Town officials participated in the Council's Industrial Marketing Workshops. The sessions provided special training for future Town business development and job growth. In addition, the Mill Street Project administered by NCC was completed as well as the Housing Feasibility Study. The Town also participated in the North Country Household Hazardous Waste Collection Project.

The Council again provided information and guidance to many towns on federal and state grant and loan programs. This past year the Council administered over \$6.7 million in Community Development Block Grant funds of fifteen communities. The funds were used for housing rehabilitation, downtown revitalization, public facility improvements, business revolving loans, and feasibility studies for housing rehabilitation and public facility improvements.

The Council has taken an active role in addressing the affordable housing issue in cooperation with member communities. The Council is presently administering a regional housing rehabilitation program which is making 358 housing units available to eligible North Country residents.

Community planning assistance has emphasized master planning and improvement in local land use controls. New state mandates and commmercial and residential growth in several towns have created busy work loads for planning boards. The Council's assistance takes many forms: regional workshops, newsletters, regulation review and update, and assistance on a regular or one-time basis for subdivision and site plan applications.

This past year the region witnessed increased economic development activity with companies locating and expanding their facilities in the North Country. This business activity will help to provide a diversity in the labor market and a stronger regional economy for all.

The Council sponsored four industrial development workshops for local economic officials. The workshops provided information on business recruitment, marketing and working cooperatively with federal and state officials to promote community economic development.

The council again co-sponsored the Municipal Law Lecture series with the NH Municipal Association. The Law Lecture this year covered local planning board procedures, administration and enforcement of ordinances, growth management and review of recent court cases and state law changes regarding local land use planning.

Overall, the Council's major objective is to work with North Country towns in solving local and regional problems. We rely on and appreciate the involvement of town officials and residents and look forward to assisting your town this coming year.

#### NORTH COUNTRY HOME HEALTH AGENCY, INC.

The North Country Home Health Agency, Inc. is a not-for-profit, New Hampshire licensed Medicare and Medicaid certified Home Health Agency. 1987 saw the Agency observe its' seventeenth year of providing care in Northern Grafton and Southern Coos Counties. Services available are:

- Home visits by Registered Nurses to make health observations and assessments, change dressings, give injections, draw blood, assist with medications, instruct families in care, made referrals and report findings to the physician. Prearranged weekend/holiday visits are available. In 1987 the R.N.'s made a total of 3,084 home visits.
- Homemaker/Home Health aides provide personal care, errands and light homemaking to help individuals remain at home.
   There were 4,739 Aide visits in 1987.
- Therapy services include Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy and Speech Therapy, by Registered or Certified Therapists or Pathologists. There were 403 therapy visits in 1987.
- Family Assistants provided 3,714.5 hours of direct service in 1987 to 38 families with children at risk for abuse or neglect or already involved in abusive or neglectful situations. The Family Assistants work very closely with social workers from the New Hampshire Division for Children and Youth Services to prevent abuse or neglect and reunite families.
- A new program in 1987 is Adult-In-Home Day Care, a State of New Hampshire funded program to provide day care at home to elderly or disabled individuals. 33,950 hours of service were provided February through December, 1987.
- Flu immunization, foot care, blood pressure and blood sugar testing clinics are also offered on a regular basis to North Country communities and groups.

Plans for next year include painting the outside of the main office and annex and refurbishing restrooms.

This year completes the 81st year of activity of Littleton Hospital Association. Some interesting trends occurred as far as volume of services are concerned. First of all, this year has been one of the lowest overall occupancy years as far as bed census is concerned. We finished the year with approximately 50% occupancy, however, new high levels were achieved in the number of births, emergency room visits, number of swing bed days for skilled and intermediate level care patients. Littleton Hospital is attempting to diversify and to enter many areas of new and improved services. The new Drug and Alcohol Detox service began in November, 1987 with two to four beds for patients suffering from substance abuse problems. This program is headed up by Donald Gilpin, ACSW, and the medical leadership is provided by Dr. Robert Peraino. Most of the nurses have been trained at Littleton Hospital, and high quality service will be offered to members of the Littleton and area communities.

Continued efforts are underway to construct new doctor's office suites on the premises of Littleton Hospital along with expansion of x-ray and emergency room facilities. In 1987, we were able to complete renovation of the operating rooms and an addition of one new operating room. Also, this building program provided a new library, pharmacy, and conference space. I wish to thank all the members of the community and the hospital family for contributing over \$260,000 towards this worthwhile building program. Major emphasis this year has been placed on physician recruitment in the areas of orthopaedics, cardiology, family practice for Lisbon, OB/Gyn and improvements in the oncology and tumor clinic services. We will be able to announce very shortly the arrival of a number of new physicians available for services in the summer of 1988.

We were pleased to be able to provide complimentary TV service for all patients at Littleton Hospital and complimentary newspapers. Improving the appearance of the main lobby and offering additional services for the comfort and convenience of our patients, are our current intentions. Another new service added in the fall of 1987 is ophthalmological services provided by Doctors Houle and Thomas from St. Johnsbury. They expect to perform between 8 and 12 cases per month by the first of 1988. Their activity at Littleton Hospital will represent a major new addition to the services available to our communities. Charron Sundman has helped us in a tremendous way with marketing and planning and we look forward to working with her in the months and years ahead as the hospital identifies its mission and implements various planning strategies.

Another important community service involves the Life-Line program, funded by the Smith Home for Aged Women, which links health care providers to the elderly population. Jewel Fogg, Director of Volunteers, administers this fund and we have forty-five residents in the Littleton area benefiting from this extension service provided by Littleton Hospital.

A major new service to be offered in the spring of 1988 involves a new CT scanner for the Radiology Department. Dr. Dale Childs will be interpreting CT scans, and we expect this service to be fully utilized in the near future. The Hitchcock regional scanning mobile service will be terminated shortly. One of our biggest challenges in the years ahead will be to responsibly deal with the nursing shortage situation. We are offering flexible hours and creative

staffing patterns in order to attract people to work in the nursing department at Littleton Hospital. Other departments are also changing staffing schedules to accommodate the needs of new and present employees. Our overall length of patient stay was approximately 4.3 days which is considerably lower than the state average, and as a result, our costs for each admission are approximately \$500 less than the northeast regional averages. As hospitals convert to a national reimbursement rate under Medicare, Littleton Hospital should do better than most in the northeast area because of efficiencies and intensity of care. It has been my pleasure to serve as President of Littleton Hospital Association and I wish to thank members of the Board of Trustees, Medical Staff, employees, volunteers, auxiliary and community members for the outstanding support and interest in Littleton Hospital and its programs. And I look forward to a most productive and challenging year in 1988!

The Littleton Area Historical Society completed its 20th year collecting and preserving material to establish or illustrate the history of this area. Much of this material is on display in the Museum located in the lower level of the library. Our volunteer staff is, at the present time, sorting these materials in an attempt to make them more accessible to interested citizens and researchers. As a result of this activity the Museum schedule, for the public to visit, has been curtailed to only one day a week, Wednesday, from 2 to 5 p.m. People with special interests or problems are encouraged to make appointments with Linda McShane our curator for use of the Museum. Recordings of some of this year's meetings have been added to our collection of magnetic tapes of historic events and Society meetings. More than 260 interested visitors enjoyed the Museum this year. We hope to increase this number in 1988.

The Society appreciates your many fine contributions to the Museum and we hope you will continue to remember us when disposing of memorabilia. Our collection of stereoscopic views grows each year, a fitting situation since Littleton was an important source of many of these views.

Interesting programs were provided, mostly by area residents, at our scheduled meetings. They were: "Bridging the Past" History of the bridges of Littleton by Kenneth E. Curran; "History of Clark's Trading Post" by W. Murray Clark; "Let's Picnic in the Dell's" a discussion of the Past, Present and Future of the Dells by Fran Heald (on tape), John Pilgrim and John Young, representing the Littleton Conservation Commission, and the Reverend Carleton Schaller, Jr. a former member of the Conservation Commission; "Is the Constitution Important to You" by Attorney Gary Boyle; "Shelburne Museum and Heritage Park" a bus trip enjoyed by more than forty area residents; "Our Mid-East Heritage" a program by Dorothy Corey Jordan and Joan Corey MacDonald.

The Historical Society worked closely with Chief Steven LaDuke in his efforts to preserve the valuable antique pumper in the possession of the fire department. Linda McShane wrote to museums all over the country obtaining much interesting information about similar

pumpers. The Smithsonian has volunteered to do further research on the "fine little engine".

The Society's Glenwood Cemetery Project, directed by M. Reginald Colby, is completed. Ruth Nute typed on file cards the information gleaned by many volunteers from the grave markers. This up-to-date information has been turned over to the Glenwood Cemetery Committee.

Littleton postcards and copies of: Historic Glimpses of a North Country Community, Littleton, New Hampshire by Mildred Lakeway; Littleton and the White Mountains by Paul R. Clay; and Littleton, Crossroads of Northern New Hampshire, the 1984 Town history, are for sale at the Museum.

Memberships in the Society help defray the cost of our many preservation activities. They are: Individual, \$3; Family, \$5; Contributing, \$10; and Sustaining, \$25. Whether or not you are a member of the Society, you are invited to attend meetings in which you have an interest.
