The Selectmen, on behalf of the Townspeople, wish to express thanks to the Bicentennial Committee and all others who helped to make our Country's 200th birthday such a success.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN WARRANT

To the INhabitants of the Town of Newfields, in the County of Rockingh , in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Newfields on Tuesday the eighth (8th) day of March next, at two o'clock in the afternoon until nine o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

(Business meeting to be held at seven-thirty o'clock in the evening.)

- To choose all necessary Town and School District Officers for the ensuing term.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith or take any other action hereon:

Town Dump	1,524.00

- To raise and appropriate such sums as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, in case of disaster, to apply for, contract for, receive and expend Federal Funds for disaster relief.
- 5. To see if the Town will grant a discount of 2% on taxes paid in full thirty days after the taxes are committed to the Collector.
- 6. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate of \$80,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes therefore, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year from taxes collected within the current municipal year.
- 7. To see what action the Town will take relative to the authorization of the sale of real estate held oracquired by the Town on account of purchase at tax sale.
- 8. To see what action the Town will take toward the acceptance of reports of Town Officers as printed in the Town Reports.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Water Commissioners, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of revenue.
- 10. To see what sum the Town will appropriate from the Albert H. Varney Bequest for a placque as a memorial to said Albert H. Varney.

- 11. On the petition of Nancy Matthews and eleven (11) others to see if the Town will vote to adopt the following article: "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-b and 43-c for expanded exemptions on real estate which provides for a resident sixty-five years of age up to seventy-five, a five thousand dollar exemption; a resident seventy-five years of age up to eighty, a ten thousand dollar exemption; a resident eighty years of age or older, a twenty thousand dollar exemption, provided that the resident owns the real estate individually or jointly with another of his spouse with whom he has been living for at least five years as man and wife; said resident had a net income of less than seven thousand dollars or combined income with spouse of less than nine thousand dollars; and owns assets of any kind, tangible or intangible, less bonafide encumbrances, not in excess of thirty-five thousand dollars?"
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed fifty-three hundred dollars (\$5300.00) for a salt spreader.
- 13. On petition of Margery P. Brooke and twelve (12) others to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixty dollars (\$60.00) to reimburse, in part, Rockingham Child and Family Services, a private, non-profit organization, for services rendered to six families in the Town of Newfields during the 1976 calendar year.
- 14. Whereas the Town of Durham, in cooperation with the University of New Hampshire in response to an expressed interest of the Selectmen of its neighboring towns in a joint Solid Waste Disposal Program, has proposed a feasibility study estimated to cost \$20,000.00 for the construction of Incineration facilities in Durham to accommodate a limited regional Solid Waste Disposal Program. The feasibility study to be initiated following approval at the March 1977 Town Meetings, with a report to be completed with recommendations for further action to be presented to the participating towns at their 1978 Town Meetings. To fully cooperate with the Town of Durham and the University of New Hampshire, be it resolved that the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to cooperate with the Town of Durham in its Regional Incineration Feasibility Study and to raise and appropriate the sum of nine hundred and twenty-one dollars and seventy-four cents (\$921.74) as its share of the cost of the study.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the work of the Newmarket Health Center. The Health Center in turn will be able to request matching funds at a ratio of \$3.00 for every \$1.00 appropriated by the Town.
- 16. To see what the Town will vote to do with the unexpended Bicentennial Funds.
- 17. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from its Social Security plan services performed by election officials or election workers for each calendar quarter in which remuneration paid for such services is less than \$50.00.

- 18. To see what sum the Town will appropriate from the Albert H. Varney Fund for further water studies.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to reclassify Old Lee Road from the home of Robert LaBranche to the home of Dennis Lapham to a class V highway.
- 20. If the above article is passed, to see if the Town will reopen and maintain this portion of Old Lee Road.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to accept the proposed changes to the Town's Building and Zoning Ordinances as follows: (Said changes to be voted on by ballot at the Town Meeting)

Zoning Ordinances

- 1. Zone Industrial a triangular area bounded on the northwest and
 Eastern sides by the B. & M. Railroad and on the Southern side by
 land of the Society for the Preservation of M.H. Forests with the
 apex of the triangle at Rockingham Junction; the area to include
 part of the Industrial Zone.
- 2. Rezone Residential-Agricultural the remainder of the present Industrial Zone on each side of the B. & M. tracks northwest of Rockingham Junction (Concord track).
- 3. Rezone Residential-Agricultural the present Industrial Zone along the westerly division of the D. & N. south of Newfields between the land of the Newfields Building Corporation and the Exeter-Newfields boundary.
- 4. Rezone Residential-Agricultural the present Commercial Zone on the East side of Route 108.
- 5. Delete Section 1.4.4 in the present Zoning Ordinance which now reads "Any non-conforming lot may be built upon subject to satisfying the provisions of the Zoning Ordinance excepting when the lot owners on the date of the amendment (3/7/72 have an interest in adjoining property which could be combined with said lot so as to create a conforming lot in which case such adjoining property shall be combined with said lot so as to create a conforming, or more conforming lot."

Building Ordinances

- 6. Delete Article I, Section 2, Sub-section B (2) which now reads:
 "The owner shall furnish a statement from the local area or state board of health that the lot is capable of adequate sewage disposal"; and substitute "The owner shall furnish a statement from the State Board of Health that the lot meets the minimum standard requirements."
- 7. All test pits and percolation tests shall be performed in the presence of a qualified test pit inspector approved by the Selectmen. After installation the septic system must also be approved by the same official before it is covered over. A fee will be charged, and returnable to the inspector, and shall constitute payment in full for his services.

- 8. The bottom of the tile in a proposed leaching bed or trench and the floor of a leaching cesspool or leaching bed shall be a minimum of four (4) feet above the seasonal high water table. Fill may not be added to meet this requirement.
- 9, The bottom of the tile in a proposed leaching bed or trench and the floor of a leaching cesspool or leaching bed shall be a minimum of eight (8) feet above the top of any hardpan or impervious layer. Fill may be added to meet this requirement.
- 10. "To building of any kind shall be placed on soil which has a seasonal high water table at the natural ground surface or within two feet of the natural ground surface, as judged by the approved inspector as specified in (7). Fill may not be added to meet this requirement.
- 11. Any soil with a percolation rate of over thirty (30) minutes per inch shall not be used for the disposal of septic tank effluent. Fill may not be added to meet this requirement.
- 12. A building permit will not be necessary for any person or persons making structural alterations to existing buildings, or for any new structure providing said alterations or new structure does not exceed \$500.00 in cost.
- 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The year 1976 was not as good to us as was 1975, but in comparison with reports of surrounding towns, we have been lucky.

We had four house fires, one was a total loss, but with the assistance of mutual aid, serious loss was prevented in the others.

We purchased 500 feet of $2\frac{1}{2}$ inch hose, and hope to purchase 500 feet of $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch hose this year.

A telephone has been installed at the station this year and with the Base Station our communication system works very well.

This has been a real old fashioned winter with plenty of ice and snow. Our trucks and equipment have been ready to roll at the sound of the alarm.

Spring is just around the corner: This snow and ice will be gone and people will want to clean up and burn. Remember - all fires shall be BEFORE 9.00 A.M. or AFTER 5.00 P.M. NO FIRE SHALL BE KINDLED BETWEEN 9.00 and 5.00. A permit must always be obtained for outside fires. Call your Forest Fire Warden (772-3735), William E. Chick, for this permit.

This report gives me the opportunity each year to thank all members of the Department; also all the Departments that are called upon to assist by Mutual Aid. Many thanks go to the Fire-Flies and the townspeople for their cooperation. I can say they all do a wonderful job for the Town of Newfields.

NEWFIELDS WATER DEPARTMENT

The Water Department has experienced some busy periods during the past year. Following is a list of the major projects completed:

- Extensions on Railroad Avenue and Otis Road with an additional fire hydrant on Otis Road.
- Accomplished numerous renovations and improvements at number 2
 Pumphouse, and installed additional instrumentation at both
 Pumphouses.
- 3. Added eight new domestic water services.
- 4. Finalized the engineering study. Results of the study are available in booklet form at the Newfields Public Library.
- Completed drilling of one new well yielding over 1,500 gallons an hour of excellent quality water.

We have experienced a serious water shortage during the past few months which prompted drilling of the new well. Our Superintendent, Ernest Chick, has done an outstanding job of "nursing" the pumps at our old wells in order to prevent interruption of service to our customers.

The Water Extension Committee is continuing the search for additional water sources in an effort to be assured that we will not be faced with water shortages in the future.

There have been two freeze-ups during the extremely cold weather. One is Water Department responsibility, and we plan on having the problem corrected in order to prevent future freeze-up of water department lines.

We have responded to two "leaking water mains" during the winter. One turned out to be an over-flowing sewerage system and the other was a plugged culvert.

We wish to thank all of our customers who cooperated in our request for water conservation during our critical period. This serves to remind us what a valuable resource we have in our water supplies, and should encourage all of us not to be wasteful with it.

EXETER AREA VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

The Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association, Inc. is a Community Health Service providing health care to individuals and families in their place of residence or in ambulatory care settings for purposes of preventing disease and promoting, maintaining or restoring health or minimizing the effects of illness or disability. The services are as follows:

Home Health Care. Home visits are made on referrel from physicians, patients, families or other agencies. The nurse gives treatments, assists with renabilitation, instructs designated persons in necessary care between nursing visits, teaches good nutrition and understanding of specific diets, sickness and accident prevention. She provides health assessments, motivates patients and families to self care and independence and refers when appropriate to other agencies.

The physical therapist establishes and supervises a program to return the patient to his maximum potential.

The Home Health Aide provides non-skilled care to patients and families under the supervision of the registered nurse or physical therapist.

Maternal and Child Health Program. Home visits to new or expectant mothers are made to provide information and instruction in the care of themselves and their babies. The Child Health Conference is held twice a month providing the following services: physicals by local pediatrician, immunizations, hearing and visionscreening, lead and urine testing, PKU's, special counseling, family planning and referral when appropriate for infants and pre=school children of low income families.

Senior Citizens Program. Blood pressure screening held twice a month for blood pressure and weight checks, diet and medication counseling and referrals.

Aftercare Program. Follow-up of mental health patients primarily those recently discharged from N.H. State Hospital. Coordination of care between patients, family, psychiatrist and community, administration of injectable meds and supervision of oral meds.

<u>Communicable Disease Program.</u> Home visits to patients with Tuberculosis or patients who have had Tuberclosis or who are contacts of patients with Tuberculosis for testing and/or medication and general health supervision.

<u>Discharge Planning.</u> Service provided by placing an agency nurse in the Exeter Hospital five mornings a week to assist in planning, coordinating and arranging for continuing care at home.

The Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association is a Medicare and Medicaid certified agency.

Representative to the Board of Directors from Newfields is Miss Marie Finn.

Minutes of the Newfields School District Meeting Held on Monday, March 1, 1976, as Recorded by the Newfields School District Clerk

The annual School District meeting was held on Monday evening, March 1, at the Newfields Town Hall before a capacity audience. The School District Warrant was sworn to by the chairman of the School Board, Ray LaBranche, and read by the moderator Lindsey Brigham as follows:

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Newfields, New Hampshire, qualified to vote in District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said District on the first day of March 1976 at eight o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 2. To choose agents, auditors and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 3. To see if the District will raise and appropriate a sum, not to exceed three thousand two hundred fifty dollars (\$3,250.) for the purpose of hot topping the driveway up to and around the Newfields Elementary School.
- 4. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of school district officials and agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against and appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Equalization Fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the apporpriation, which balance is to be raised by the Town.
- 5. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

ARTICLE 3 - Moved by Justin Renner, seconded by Elizabeth Hankin that the article not be adopted.

Raymond LaBranche explained the article saying they had had an estimate from an outside firm as to hot topping. There are various opinions as to the length of time hot topping will stay. Mary Stevens asked if there was any reason why the driveway couldn't be oiled. Mr. Renner asked how much it would cost to oil same. Mr. LaBranche said under \$1,000.00.

The moderator put the motion to a vote, and it was voted not to raise the money asked for in the article.

Norman Rollins then asked if the driveway would be oiled. The School Board said that it would be.

ARTICLE 4 - The budget was read by Ray LaBranche who explained it item by item as he read it. After the reading of the prepared budget, Mr. LaBranche asked if Mrs. Mary Lyster, principal of the school, could speak. There were no objections. Mrs. Lyster spoke of her many proposals for the betterment of the Newfields Elementary School in the coming year. She explained that in as much as Mrs. Pearl Marston, first grade teacher, is retiring this year she plans to have the first and second grades together and use a "master intern" teacher from the University to work with the first grade. This teacher will come for a salary of \$3,000.00 and is able to do everything a regular teacher can do. She plans to match each child in grades 3, 4 and 5 according to their level. She feels the District is and has been spending too much money for what we're getting. There will be no transition children this year, and no one at the Rockingham School. These will be absorbed in the Newfields School. There will be no permanent substitute as previously. We will save \$699.00 per student on transition and \$1800.00 per student at the Rockingham School.

Some one questioned the number of teachers for so few children. Mr. LaBranche said we have six full-time teachers and including the part-time teachers it would come to a total of 7 and one-fifth teachers. Many people questioned the apparent high salaries being received by the teachers.

Alfred Conner, Jr., asked what the rental was we pay Exeter for children attending school there. He was told it was based on our equalized valuation.

Dr. Mixter stated that the amount of money Newfields has control of is s.5% or about \$2,000.00.

Robert Nixon moved that the district raise and appropriate \$268,904.00 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, and that there be applied against said appropriations such sums as are estimated to be received from the State of New Hampshire together with any other income and that the School Board be authorized to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated income and the appropriation as an assessment to be raised by the Town by taxes. Motion seconded.

Moderator called for a "yes" and "no" vote and declared the "yes" vote carried. Lester Plumer challenged the decision of the moderator. The moderator then asked all those in favor to stand and William Tebo made the count. Those against then stood. The moderator declared again that the motion was carried.

ARTICLE 5 - Under any other business Norman Rollins suggested all present write the Governor, our legislators, etc. that they support a State Income Tax to help support the education of our children.

No other business to come before the meeting it was voted to adjourn.

Newfields Report - Superintendent of Schools

The year 1976, the Bicentennial Year, has now passed. I feel the pupils' lives have been enriched by the various activities the school was involved in to commemorate this year. A major thread running through the history of American education has been a concern for students as individuals. I feel Newfields has emphasized this greatly in the school programs we have and Mary Lyster, the school principal, reflects this in the following report:

"It is with pleasure that I submit my second annual report as Principal of Newfields Elementary School.

The year has been most successful and productive as the plans developed during last year have become a visible part of the teaching-learning environments and programs. The Primary and Intermediate units are functioning extremely well as students' needs and talents are being recognized and met through various grouping patterns allowing for greater interaction among peers and teachers. Achievement scores have risen dramatically, the budget is in good shape, the building is in fine condition and the students and staff are working daily to further achieve our goals of excellence and commitment.

My thanks and appreciation are extended to the staff and citizens who have helped further these goals and who share the pride we all have in Newfields Elementary School."

We have, and we will continue to provide a solid basic education to fulfill the needs of the students. As students progress through our schools I believe we want to strive to see they acquire the skills to interact compatibly with each other, to become economically sufficient, to use communication effectively, and to develop civic responsibilities.

If the student is to survive in the job market ahead he needs these vital skills. I also feel the schools have an added goal. To be educated means also to be responsible, with a "value" system which strengthens law and order, human relations, uniqueness of the individual, and a true sense of moral obligations. As a tax payer you have every right to have the school join the church and family in aiding in the training of our children to examine value more carefully. One cannot involve a child in schooling from the time he is 6 until he is 18, and not expect an effect upon the way he thinks about moral issues and the way he behaves.

As your superintendent my goal is to produce a citizenry that will do us proud in the twenty first century. Let's all work together in the education of the Newfields' children toward that goal!

Newfields School Board Report

"Your committee in presenting to the town this annual report of the condition of our schools, can say, that upon the whole, they have made very good progress during the past year."

"An extended examination in all the studies pursued in a school, is not necessary to judge of its character and condition. The appearance of the scholars, the way they sit, stand or move from place to place, the tone of voice — these are some of the items to be considered, scarcely less important then the mere answers to questions proposed."

"The importance of the Primary School cannot be overrated. It forms the basis of our educational system. Here the child must learn what a school is -- how to behave, and how to study when in school. The work well done here will never be lost in subsequent life."

"It seems to me that most of the questions pertaining to order and government should be settled at home by the parents. There should be a right public sentiment in regard to those annoying evils which have crept into our schools. Would it were not necessary for teachers to expend so much of their time in enforcing obedience and order."

"The art of writing is being neglected altogether too much in our schools. Something should be done to redeem this art. Good writing and good spelling are indispensable requisites in the business of life. Our Schools are intended by the laws of the State to instruct children in writing as well as other branches, and care should be taken that every one of suitable age should be able to write a legible and correct hand."

The previous text was taken from the school report of the town of "South Newmarket, N. H." for the year ending March 1, 1868. These excerpts are not meant to necessarily reflect present conditions in our school, but serve to remind us that each generation had their own set of problems.

Many changes have been made this past year in staffing, curriculum, and in the organization of the school day. As we reflect on the past and look to the future we must realize the constant need for re-evaluation.

We, your school committee in 1976, are very pleased with the advances made in the educational program at the Newfields School, made possible through the efforts of the principal, staff and many dedicated volunteers.

We also with to thank Mrs. Gladys Chick for loaning us the 1868 annual report.

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS ADMINISTRATOR

Daniel C. Durgin

Rising prices, increased cost for services, higher utility rates, inflationnone of us is unfamiliar with what the foregoing represents.

Unfortunately, school districts are no less subject to the economics of our society than are we as individuals. Because just as we are consumers, so too is a school district. Deing a consumer of goods and services, the school district is confronted with the same budgetary pressures as is every family.

The impact of sharply rising costs on the school district is usually dramatic and has a direct effect on every resident, whether property owner or renter. Assuming no significant increase in revenue from state sources, the property tax must continue to bear the burden of inflation. Although, this is a most serious problem for everyone, some communities with a broader tax hase (taxable property which includes not only residences but significant non-residential property as well) are better able to cope with the problem than others. It is the small community comprised of mainly modest residential property that gives one particular cause for concern.

Typically, the small school district, such as East Kingston, Newfields or Kensington, has an equalized valuation (the dollar amount of taxable property assessed at total value or 100%) of under \$20,000,000. A district with an equalized valuation of \$12,000,000 for example, would have to raise its tax rate the equivalent of \$1.00 for each \$12,000 of increased expenditure. In other words, adding an amount of money equal to a little more than an experienced teacher's salary to the school budget would add \$1.00 to the tax rate.

Salary increases to staff have a significant effect on the school budget. Although the size of the increase is important, it is also important to note the number of staff members covered by the increase. For example, a 6% increase granted to all Exeter staff would increase the budget by approximately \$160,000 equivalent to \$1.25 on the tax rate based on current valuation. Add to that another 8% for social security and retirement which are tied directly to salary and we have an additional \$12,800.

So a hypothetical increase of 6%, which is not an uncommon occurance today in the public or private sector, raises expenditures by \$172,800 before consideration of textbooks, fuel oil, utilities, equipment, insurance and the many other items that make up the total school budget. It is this kind of situation that confronts every school board and administrator.

While salaries rise in response to pressures brought about by inflation, costs of other goods and services necessary to the operation of the school district increase at what often is a more rapid rate.

We are all familiar with what has happened in the past four years to the price of fuel oil. In 1973-74, the total amount budgeted for fuel oil in the six towns of S.U.# 16 was \$32,450. For 1977-78, a total of \$77,336 has been budgeted or a 138% increase. Fuel costs over the same period have climbed approximately 157%.

Although fuel is an extreme example, increases in virtually every other expenditure area can be cited. Even something as subtle as increased values of school buildings leads to increased expenses due to the need to raise insurance coverage to keep pace with higher replacement costs.

Coping with the problems of our economy is not an easy nor a pleasant task. Among other things, it requires careful planning, management based on accurate information and, above all, restraint.

With the continued cooperation of everyone concerned, we shall strive to provide the best education possible with the resources available.


