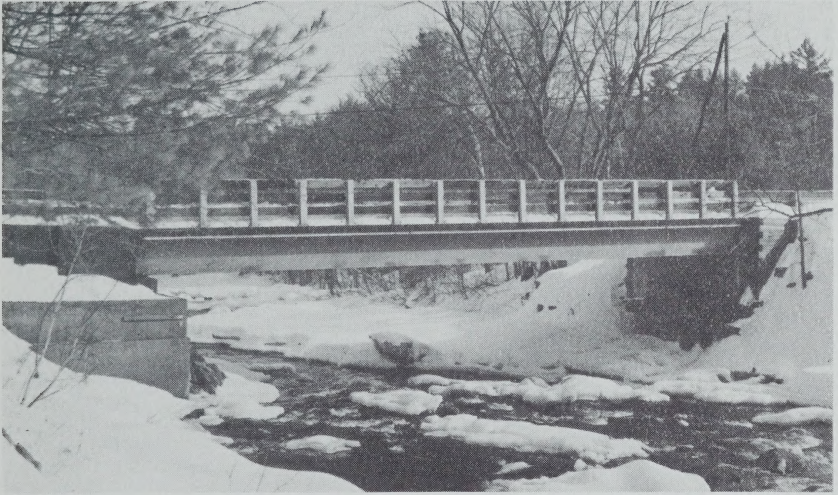

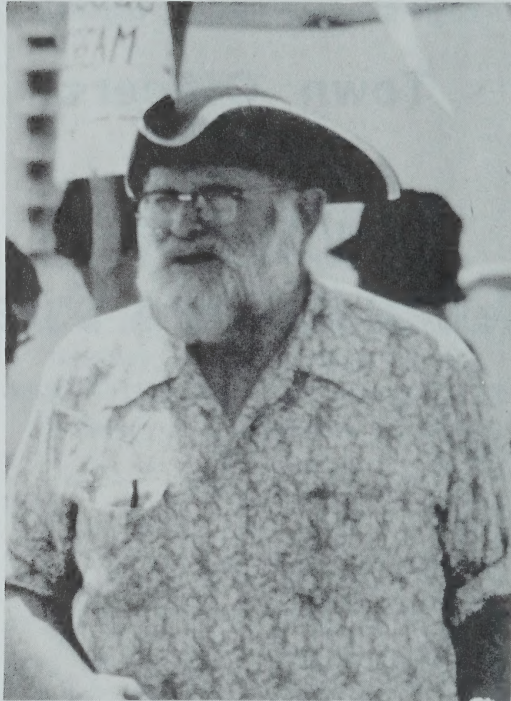

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth, County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Kenneth A. Brett School in said Tamworth on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at Ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

The Fire Department held 12 regular drills in 1989 and one mutual aid drill at Pine Tree Power which involved 8 Fire Departments, and our Rescue Squad standing by at the scene.

As you can see we are still having a lot of chimney fires. Sometimes these fires turn into structure fires, so don't hesitate to call us. If we can get to the scene and put out the chimney fire before the chimney gets hot enough to crack or start a nearby combustible burning, we can keep it from becoming a structure fire. Check your chimneys frequently and keep all combustibles at least 3 feet from your wood stoves. If you aren't sure whether your wood stove is installed correctly, contact the Fire Department for a pamphlet covering their safe installation.

## REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

During calendar year 1989, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were fires kindled without a fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden, children and debris burning fires that escaped control. All these causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. By New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27b), No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or caused to be burned any material, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire Permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done.

Violations of RSA 224:27 and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable of fines up to \$1,000. and or a year in jail and you are also liable for paying all fire suppression cost.

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1989 including several large fires in Allentown, Alton, Chesterfield and Concord areas, as well as the 100 acre fire on Mt. Belknap in Gilford.

## REPORT OF THE TAMWORTH PLANNING BOARD

A wide variety of projects were presented to the board for consideration in 1989. These projects ranged from 20 plus lot full scale subdivision to many boundary line adjustments between neighbors. Several of the projects submitted were denied approval as they failed to meet town regulations, and still others were scaled down or re-submitted in a more acceptable form.

Several amendments were made to the subdivision regulations. Most of these were minor "housekeeping" corrections. The most important change made was an increase in our per lot or unit filing fee from \$25. to \$100. This increase will help to recover some of the review process expenses of the board. This added developer cost may help to promote subdivisions of less density.

Regrettably, zoning became a very controversial issue in 1989. You will remember an ordinance was approved at the 1989 town meeting, a vote which was ruled invalid due to a legal "glitch". As a result a special town meeting was held in September and the proposed ordinance was presented and defeated. Because of this defeat the board had to decide on a course of action. In an effort to help the board with its decision the voters submitted two petitions signed by nearly the same number of people. One asked the board to bring the defeated ordinance to another vote and the other opposed a re-vote. It is interesting to note that several people signed both petitions and many unregistered voter names appeared as well. It was clear to a majority of the board that a mandate from the people was in order. It seemed irresponsible to resubmit an ordinance which had just been defeated and which a majority of the planning board felt needed further work. An other important fact in this decision was the lack of funds needed to work on the proposal as the zoning budget had already been over spent by several thousand dollars. As a result of all this we are asking the people to tell us by their official vote what steps they would like the board to follow. If you vote to instruct the planning board to produce a new ordinance for the 1991 town warrant you will also be asked to raise \$25,000 for that purpose. This money will be required for the legal, engineering and publishing costs related to producing an ordinance. It will also be needed for the hiring of a part-time enforcement officer and the increased legal and administrative costs related to such a hiring. Funds will also be needed for improved office space and equipment for this officer as well as the Zoning Board of Adjustment which will be required under a zoning ordinance.

Regardless of your personal opinion on zoning it is time for us to get back to the job at hand, and that is to work in the best interests of our town. We can not allow ourselves to become a community divided by only one issue, Tamworth deserves better than that.

## TAMWORTH CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT FOR 1989

**DREDGE AND FILL** - Tamworth Conservation Commission (TCC) has checked on ten dredge and fill applications, or complaints of violation. Most applications were recommended for approval by the Wetlands Board. Two larger projects have required extensive work to deal with the complexities. In one case - a complaint of violation of a 1987 permit: After site inspection and several consultations with the Wetlands Board it was determined a new permit was needed because of change of purpose, and the owner was so notified. In the other case - of a large development with dredge and fill application: TCC checked the site and made recommendations to the engineers which resulted in submission of a revised plan. TCC made comments on the revised plan to the Wetlands Board which approved the application subject to conditions and restrictions as advised by TCC.

**SEPTIC SYSTEMS** - As a result of a new state law, application for septic systems must now be reviewed by the Selectmen before being submitted to the state. And these applications at times include requests for variance from the Town Wetland Ordinance. At the request of the Selectmen, TCC now checks each site and reports the facts to the Selectmen as to soil types, drainage, distance from wetlands, etc. It is the opinion of TCC that no variance from the Wetlands Ordinance should be given except in unusual circumstances. Six septic sites have been checked and reports made to the Selectmen.

**GRAVEL PIT** - At the request of the Planning Board, TCC members checked the site of a major gravel pit proposal on Route 41, and attended two Planning Board hearings. This was a complex situation with many ramifications. A waiver of the Wetlands Ordinance was requested, which TCC advised should be denied, or if accepted a list of restrictions should be imposed. The owner eventually withdrew the application.

**COMPLAINTS** - Several other complaints were handled, as well as those of dredge and fill violations - oil running from a junk yard across a road, violation of the Scenic Roads Ordinance by cutting of trees, blocked drainage, and building of a foundation near a wetlands. These were checked on and reported to the proper authorities.

**HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE** - TCC proposed an article in the Town Warrant to appropriate \$1227 as the town share of a household hazardous waste collection, subsidized in part by the State and by Lakes Region Planning Commission; voters approved the article. Two TCC members were at the collections sites to help and to observe. The aim is to keep hazardous wastes out of the landfill and thereby out of ground water. It is hoped this program will be continued and Tamworth's participation will grow as more people understand the serious problems with landfills and pollution of water supplies, and understand how many

and which household products are hazardous when thrown in a landfill. There is also the consideration that some products disposed of through this program, with EPA licensed haulers, can be and are recycled. According to category of wastes they go to different centers capable of handling that category.

TAMWORTH LAND PROTECTION COMMITTEE - TCC has continued to support this committee with time and funding some expenses. Report by the committee appears elsewhere in this booklet.

EASEMENTS - An easement along Mill Brook has been given to the Town by Robert Freeto. TCC has monitored easements in Tamworth held by the Soc. for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests.

TRAILS - Most trail clearing this year was done on a volunteer basis by TCC members. Also a small bridge has been built, by TCC members, on Jackman North trail, making it passable again after flooding by beaver. However, the western end of the trail, where it is on private land over which TCC holds a public right of way has been all but obliterated by gravel operations making it necessary to go through the pit rather than following the trail. TCC is working to rectify this situation.

HEMENWAY STATE FOREST - TCC's 5-year use permit has again been renewed by the State. The box with trail information near the trail head was vandalized and has been replaced by a volunteer.

GREAT HILL TOWER - Clapboards on the north side, which had been torn off, have been replaced and the interior repainted to cover over graffiti.

BIRD WALKS - TCC again sponsored Wednesday morning birdwalks, led by Peggy Damon. Six to twelve people attended each walk and received considerable help in bird identification. Walks were publicized in the newspaper and with posters.

MEETINGS - Two TCC members attended the Annual Meeting and workshops of N.H. Association of Conservation Commissions, and one member went to the Governor's Conference on growth management. Reports on these were made to the Commission.

MEMBERS - Scott Aspinall was appointed by the Planning Board as its representative on TCC; Peg King and Betty Steele were re-appointed by the Selectmen for 3-year terms.

## TAMWORTH LAND PROTECTION COMMITTEE

The Tamworth Land Protection Committee (TLPC) was established by the Selectmen in 1987 to work with the Trust for New Hampshire Lands/Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP) to identify and protect, in perpetuity, environmentally significant areas important to the residents of Tamworth. The means to preserve such "target properties" is through outright purchase or the purchase of development rights, using funds provided by the LCIP together with matching funds or the value of easements donated by other - local landowners who wish to preserve their land from development.

In June, the TLPC submitted an application to the LCIP for a grant of \$225,000 to purchase development rights on the Behr Farm. The application was the culmination of 1 1/2 years of putting together natural resource inventories, conducting surveys of resident opinion, holding public informational meetings and consulting with landowners.

Residents of Tamworth expressed much support for the protection of the Behr Farm because of its strategic location as open space in the middle of the village, its setting for the village's historic buildings, its panoramic views to the Ossipees and the Sandwich Range, its access to the Swift River for fly fishermen and its productive agricultural land and sugar bush.

The Behr family provided part of the necessary matching funds by offering to sell the easements at less than market value. The remainder of the match was made up by donated easements on lands of Richard Alt and Ray Reed.

The LCIP offered \$100,000 in support of the project, citing its merits and the quality of the application. Competition for existing funds was given as the reason for funding below the requested amount. The Behrs declined the offer.

The TLPC plans, again, to submit an application in either June or October of 1990 to the LCIP. Because studies showed the Bearcamp River Valley to have the greatest concentration of natural resources compared to other areas of the town and because it is at the greatest risk of development, the TLPC is particularly interested in putting together a project in this area.

The year 1990 will probably be the last that funding for land acquisition is provided by the state under this program. Therefore, the TLPC, in reassessing its opportunities and goals, is most anxious to hear from landowners in any part of town, who are interested in protecting their lands by the donation easements which could also be used for a match. Lands to be considered for easements under this program would have to meet certain criteria and would have to have development potential.

The TLPC would also like to hear comments, questions and suggestions from residents interested in Tamworth's land resources which are bound to be placed under stress in the future.

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### AGENCY INFORMATION

State inspection of our agency took place in August. Patient records, agency policies, protocol and office procedures were examined by Ann Lance, R.N. Surveyor/Consultant for the Bureau of Health Facilities Administration. Re-licensure was granted with commendation of the agencies' progress and growth of deliverance of services to area residents.

Dr. Melvin Meyer assumed the position of Tamworth Community Nurse Association Medical Advisor this past year. His input and availability over the past year has been of great benefit.

Heritage Home Health Care of Bristol has been a welcomed asset to the community during 1989. This agency has been providing physical therapy, speech and occupational therapies and home health aides to area residents in their homes.

In June Walda Warren R.N. was hired as a part-time employee of the agency.

We now have a beautiful carved sign in front of our office. Thank you to Tony Velardo for his efforts.

### MEETINGS AND CONFERENCES

Over the past year 13 staff meetings were held to discuss patients patient care, inter-agency services, patient record review, office record keeping and policies and special programs or services being planned by Tamworth Community Nurse Association.

Throughout the year, Tamworth Community Nurse Association confers with area professionals on a daily basis. Much of the communication with physicians, nurses, agencies, hospitals, social workers, town officials and health care workers is done by phone, on 53 occasions actual

meetings with these people were required. Tamworth Community Nurse Association also confers very frequently with family members or others involved with patient care within the home.

Carroll County professionals providing services and assistance to area residents of all ages continue monthly "Network" meetings. These gatherings are a valuable recourse in updating knowledge of other agencies' programs and information available to the public, as well as exchanging ideas and offering insights into commonly shared problems between professionals. Programs presented over the past year include resources, assistance and outreach for the elderly, Hospice, loans and grants, abuse and neglect, support systems for new mothers and children, Alzheimer's and related disorders and housing in Carroll County.

## WORKSHOPS

In March, I attended a conference in Hershey, Pennsylvania which presented many valuable insights into the topic of "Innovations in Home Health Care".

In April, the Concord Technical Institute housed the "First Annual Conference on Aging".

In June, the Community Action program provided an update on state and local services and programs available including food, healthcare, shelter and substance abuse.

The American Cancer Society offered a valuable workshop in October in New London, New Hampshire with discussion of the types of treatments for cancer-including conventional and unconventional methods.

Carroll County Home Health Care provided its annual Alzheimer's conference in November in Wolfeboro.

## COMMUNITY PROJECTS

As "harder times" financially have been witnessed this past year, our Community Food Pantry has become an increasingly valuable and indispensable service. In addition to their regularly scheduled pantry hours, the Food Pantry again provided holiday food baskets with complete dinners. Tamworth Community Nurse Association assisted with delivery of these dinners to six families at Easter, 12 families at Thanksgiving and 10 families at Christmas.

Thanks to the tremendous efforts of local Boy Scouts and the generosity of the community, food stuffs and canned goods went out of the Tamworth Community Nurse Association office to over 175 households between Thanksgiving and Christmas.

Tamworth Community Nurse Association assisted the Community Surplus Food Program this past year with deliveries in the spring and the fall to qualifying area residents.

June Donovan continues to coordinate our Meals On Meals program. Scheduling drivers five days a week every month keeping them updated changes as they occur in the delivery census and alerting Ossipee Concerned Citizens of changes in the program require a tremendous amount of time and organization. June has successfully and effectually carried out the task. During 1989, Meals on Wheels have been delivered to between 14 and 18 area residents.

Tamworth Community Nurse Association offers a monthly Blood Pressure Clinic in our office on the last Wednesday of each month. This clinic is free and open to all. T.C.N.A. also checks blood pressures on a monthly basis at the Congregate Meal site.

In addition to scheduled visits in patients' homes, T.C.N.A. continues to offer "office hours" 5 mornings a week. During these hours patients have come into the office (with or without appointments) for monitoring of vital signs, assessments, dressing changes, suture removal or for direction with problems or health needs.

The Dental Program is another program again sponsored by T.C.N.A. Twenty two children from Kenneth Brett School, ranging from Kindergarten to Junior High ages received dental care and cleaning by Dr. Michael Glick of Ossipee. We thank him for his time and efforts.

The Tamworth Community Nurse Association "loaner closet" continues to assist many in need of walkers, canes, commodes, wheelchairs and other pieces of medical equipment as available. We are always grateful for donations of these supplies so that we may continue to loan (without charge) to residents in need of the equipment.

In April, T.C.N.A. co-sponsored with the Lioness a "World Health Day Clinic" at Runnells Hall. Stations were available for screenings of vision, glaucoma, blood pressure, hearing, dental problems, cholesterol, glucose and nutrition. Over 200 people were screened with over 20 being referred to their physicians for potential problems discovered at the clinic.

In response to many requests, a flu shot clinic was offered by T.C.N.A. in September. 154 people received the vaccine at this clinic.

T.C.N.A. worked with the American Red Cross this past October to offer a course in Infant, Child and Adult CPR. The 3 week course was held at the Kenneth A. Brett School.

In November, our Biannual Cholesterol Clinic was held at the Chocorua Public Library. For the first time, a complete profile was offered as well as to "total" cholesterol level screening. Life Guard Associates from Dover provided this service for us.

Our agency enlisted the assistance of area groups and organizations for the 1989 Christmas effort due to increasing number of families and individuals with needs. T.C.N.A. served as a recourse center by obtaining names, ages, sex and sizes and then supplying this information in coded form for Christmas shopping to be done. Thanks to the generosity and concern of many, Santa's assistants were able to deliver packag-

es to 34 families (which included 88 children). T.C.N.A. also delivered fruit baskets and remembrances to many patients seen through our agency.

Throughout 1989, T.C.N.A. has pursued its goals of addressing pertinent community needs, promoting health awareness, providing nursing care and of maintaining these services, programs and clinics without charge to Tamworth residents. We take this opportunity to gratefully acknowledge all of the support and contributions which have enabled us to continue serving this community. We look forward to the challenge of the 90's with enthusiasm and optimism.

## ANIMAL CONTROL 1989

This year's statistics show a slight decrease in all categories. I responded to 86 complaints, travelled 909 miles and held 53 dogs at the Tamworth Dog Holding Facility. Most of the dogs were claimed by their owners but two required euthanasia and two were taken to the N.H. Humane Society for adoption. I responded to three reports of cows running loose and one complaint of loose sheep. Five dogs were killed on the highways and three complaints required hearings in Ossipee District Court. The majority of the complaints received continues to be dogs running loose resulting in their being impounded as strays. The owner must then pay a fine in order to reclaim his dog and must also license the dog if this has not already been done. This year there were several complaints about the bear dogs running loose during their training sessions. In one such incident a moose was chased to death by a pack of nine dogs. It is hoped that in the future there can be more control over this particular activity.

A Rabies Clinic was held on March 15 at the Tamworth Town House. Kris Heffner, DVM an Associate of Tevis Kraft, DVM officiated at the Clinic and gave 31 Rabies Vaccines. A thank you to Ann Hale who helped me with the paper work and to Terry Woodward who gave out 28 licenses. There will be another Rabies Clinic in the spring of 1990. Remember that the vaccine is considerably cheaper when given at the Clinic and that State Law requires all dogs to receive the Rabies Vaccine at specified intervals and to be licensed at three months of age and by May 1st of every year.

### **From the Humane Society of the U.S.**

Dogs riding in the back of pickup trucks may look like they're having fun. With nose testing the wind and ears flopping, the dogs seem to enjoy the trip. And they get to go with their masters, after all.

Whether the dog enjoys the ride or not, she is in great danger riding in an open truck bed. If you hit a bump, swerve to avoid an obstacle or brake suddenly, the dog could easily fly out of the truck. If the fall doesn't injure or kill the dog it is likely that another car will. And in an attempt to avoid hitting the fallen dog, another driver may cause ensuing accidents. Carrying dogs in pickups poses a threat to both the animal and other motorists. Simply tying a dog in the truck bed is not enough. Ropes and leashes become nooses if the dog should be jolted out of the truck. And the wind whipping through the dog's ears is full of dirt, debris and gravel that can lodge in the eyes, nose or ears and cause serious damage.

Take your dog along for the ride. But let her ride secured in the front with you. She will enjoy the trip a lot more if she doesn't have to fight for her life against gravity, momentum, and traffic to get there.

A new law in the books, RSA 644:8 IVa makes it possible for your

dog to be taken into temporary protective custody when there is probable cause to believe that it has been abused or neglected. Remember that you must provide proper care, sustenance and shelter for your animals.

I continue to enjoy my job as your Animal Control Officer and I try to respond to your complaints as quickly and efficiently as is possible.

My thanks, as always, to the Selectmen, the Town Clerk, the Town Secretary, Troop E, the Sheriff's Office and the State Highway Crew. Without their help my job would be impossible.

## COOK MEMORIAL LIBRARY

1989 was the best year in the history of the library in both patronage and in circulation (total attendance-6,577 & total circulation-9,298) again reflecting the tremendous growth in our town. This year the increase was particularly noted in the children's area. I believe this is the result, to a large degree, of the efforts and interest of the members of KIDS-WORTH who handled our summer story hour and initiated children's movie night at the library. In addition these figures are also due to the continued participation of Tamworth Pre-School/Day Care in library use.

As always my thanks go to the loyal group of volunteers with whom I have the pleasure of working: Isabel Hoag, Arlene Farnum, Martha Sylvia, Bertha Eastwick, Sally Zink, Cathy Mersfelder and Priscilla Murray for their help in carding & shelving of books and serving the public. I also want to express my gratitude to the Garden Club, particularly Cathy Mersfelder & Charlotte Cooper, for the planting and care of the flowers in the window boxes & on borders and for the greenery in the winter, to Angie Stearns for the vases of colorful flowers in season, to Joan & William Schultze for their expertise in clarifying the recordings the library inherited last year, to Bob Trask, Dick Stearns, Scott Evans & Woody Fromm for their aid, to Sally Zink, my assistant, and Pat Trask, my substitute, for their cheerful and unflinching help.

In 1989 we purchased or were given 644 books, received 216 books on Inter-Library Loan at the request of individual patrons, borrowed 124 Large Print books for our visually handicapped readers and borrowed films/videos from the state for 252 showings for Day Care & KIDS-WORTH.

Meetings of local community groups may be held at the library by reserving with the librarian. In 1989 twenty one different organizations held 70 meetings at the library.

Cook Memorial Library serves as the storage center for the town movie projector (maintenance fee of \$1.00), speakers & screen as well as cassette players, a collection of Tamworth 1966 Bicentennial slides and Tamworth's U. S. 1976 Bicentennial celebration slides and a collection of oral history tapes. The library also has a genealogical card file of early Tamworth vital statistics and an alphabetically arranged record of early Tamworth families compiled by Helen Hidden many years ago. We also have on permanent loan from the Tamworth Historical Society the remaining volumes of the Tamworth Social Library (founded by Parson Samuel Hidden in 1796).

October 1989 - Public discussion concerning the adaptation for a movie of Le Grand Cannon's book "Look to the Mountain".

We thank those who provided art/materials for display at the library for the enjoyment of all. We appreciate gifts of books, paperbacks, magazines, newspapers & monetary donations. Any material we cannot use is placed in our annual book sale.

The Friends of the Library (President-Barbara Fromm) meets at 1:30 on the 4th Tuesday of each month (except in the winter) and new members are always welcome. The Friends sponsored the Summer Story Hour, decorated the library at Christmas, purchased and installed the overhead fans, paid for the repairs on the tower clock, repaired the vacuum cleaners, bought a beautiful illuminated globe (a wonderful tool for teaching children about our ever changing world), a local history book-"Ossipee History", a file cabinet, date stamp and a table needed for exhibits & sales.

We are grateful to the Tamworth Foundation for the generous contribution for books (an always spiraling cost). We thank those who gave donations in memory of Bernard Ulitz, Frank Berry, Clara Read, Iley Irwin, Ruth Flaccus as well as the Gregg Memorial Fund (for children's books) and the Bear Paw Memorial--all of which enable us to purchase books and at the same time remember a friend or fellow townsman.

Our main goal for 1990 is to raise the funds necessary for obtaining a computer. Our initial purpose for automation at this time is to attain quick access to the collections of all the libraries in the state resulting in speedy Inter-Library Loan for the improvement of service to our patrons.

Other advantages of a computer system will be overdue books system, statistical records, treasurer's records, budget, letter writing, membership and book collection data, etc.

Board of Library Trustees meets on the 2nd Monday of the month at 4:00 P.M. at the library and the public is welcome. Tamworth is fortunate in having 2 libraries & residents have the privilege of using both:

The Recreation Department has had one of the best years ever. All programs doubled and in some programs, tripled in participation.

## **TAMWORTH RED CROSS WATER SAFETY PROGRAM**

In 1989 198 individuals ranging from infants to adults participated in a variety of Red Cross swimming classes from the Beginner to the Advanced Lifesaving level. This year we charged an increased registration fee for non-residents: \$15 for individuals and \$25 for family. Tamworth residents pay \$4 individual and \$10 for family. This additional fee helped generate a little extra income as there were 65 non residents enrolled. For each individual registered our program has to pay \$3 to the Mt. Washington Valley Red Cross for administrative costs so we were not able to retain the entire \$15 fee for our program's expenses.

We have been fortunate to keep such a stable staff. Our four instructors have a combined time of over 40 years with our program! This year all four instructors attended a recertification training for Water Safety Instructors sponsored by the Mt. Washington Valley Red Cross held at the Eastern Slope Pool. In addition two of the instructors attended training sessions to become certified to teach the new Red Cross life-guard program.

We thank the Tamworth Foundation and the Town of Tamworth for all their past support. It is through their financial support that we are able to continue this valuable training for both children and adults.
