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



TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy in the County of Cheshire, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the 14th of March next, at nine-thirty in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a town clerk, one selectman for three years, and all other necessary town officers.
- Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
- Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for snow removal and sanding.
- Article 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for repairing town highways and bridges.
- Article 5. To see if the town will accept State Aid for Construction of Class 5 roads.
- Article 6. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to extend Dort Street from a point at the Crown lot line, North, 335 feet on said lot, now owned by Edgar Rocheleau and appropriate a sum of money for same.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for street lighting.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on all taxes, excepting poll taxes, paid before dates to be designated at this meeting, and all poll taxes shall be collected on or before July 1, 1944.

- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the fire department.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be set aside as a sinking fund, to pay for the water bonds at maturity.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of the water system.
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the purchase of additional land for the water system.
- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for trimming and spraying the shade trees in town.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to make the office of Highway Agent appointive by the selectmen beginning with the year 1945, after the town meeting.
- Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$1,000.00 for the purpose of employing a district nurse, and \$100.00 for other health activities.
- Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purpose of purchasing a new dump site and approach.
- Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$135.00 for observance of Memorial Day.
- Article 19. To see if the town will vote to allow the American Legion to use the town hall one Friday night each month without pay.
- Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and improvement of cemeteries.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 in addition to the amount required by law for the public library.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$108.00 for the purpose of advertising the resources and natural advantages of the town, said sum to be expended under the direction of the selectmen, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to have a Post War Planning Committee appointed, to study the post war needs and work that will probably be done in town.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to borrow money to pay town charges.

Article 25. To hear the reports of agents, officers or committees heretofore chosen, and take any action relating thereto.

Article 26. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The present crisis in world affairs has created an emergency in the education of American youth that requires immediate attention and action. Large numbers of pupils and teachers are now leaving school to go to work. The motives which impel youth to leave school for work are understandable. The alarming response to these motives of high wages and the desire to do something definite to help win the war has been made without giving ample thought to other considerations which are of far greater importance to the national welfare. All adults concerned in these matters—particularly employers, school officials, and parents—should see that youths clearly understand certain basic conclusions before making the decision to leave school.

The greatest service which the older boys and girls can render to the war effort is to get ready for the national service which most of them will be called upon to give at the age of eighteen—in the armed forces, in war production, in civilian war agencies, or in specialized training. The high officials of the Army and Navy, of government and industry, have urged youth to use the years up to eighteen to build the foundations of a broad education. This duty of securing an education will pay high dividends in the highly competitive labor market of the world in post-war years. The national welfare and the welfare of youth require that education have first claim on the time and energies of youth.

"Twenty-seven million citizens of the decade beginning 1950 are being prepared in our public schools now for the world that is being shaped with so much 'toil and blood and tears.' How futile our every war effort if these citizens are not fitted for their places!"

This great challenge to our educational system must be met in spite of the innumerable demands on limited time, energy, and materials resulting from the war emergency.

We wish to continue the improvement of the standards in our schools and we must realize that it can be done only through sacrifice and earnest cooperation between teachers, parents and pupils. Research authorities in the field of juvenile delinquency recommend a review of the particular responsibilities of parents for children outside of school time. From this cooperation there will be a clearer understanding among all concerned.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER OF TROY HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

It is my privilege to herewith present my seventh annual report as headmaster of Troy High School.

In September, 1943, the High School began its tenth year as a four year school, and although this report should be primarily concerned with the school year 1942-43, it should be of vital interest to the citizens of Troy to consider the achievements and progress made by the school during its first decade of existence. Even though it is too soon to appraise accurately all gains and losses made during this short period of time, a relatively clear picture can be drawn of our accomplishments to date.

Probably our most important achievement, and the one which should head the list, is the number of finished products which have been turned out, and the use which has been made of these products to society in general. In publishing the list, however, due consideration should also be given to those whom we may consider as having been but partially processed or not bearing the stamp of final inspection. By the finished product I refer to our graduates which number ninety-four for our first nine years as a four year school. The total will exceed one hundred following the graduation of the tenth class in June, 1944.

From records which have been kept as nearly accurate as possible we learn that of these ninety-four graduates, thirty-six considered the value of education highly enough to continue their efforts in post-secondary institutions. These institutions included schools of college, normal, nurse training, business, and trade level, and of those that began such courses, only five have to date failed to continue the prescribed curriculum to its ultimate conclusion with the exception of those who were called for military service. Many of our alumni are still attending advanced schools and yet in spite of our relatively short life, it is indeed gratifying to include among our graduates, six young people who hold bachelor's degrees, five who are registered nurses, seven who have gone through business schools, and four

who have learned specific trades at accredited trade schools. Unfortunately the war has disrupted the normal completion of study for many others, or our list might soon include a much larger number. In connection with the war it might be well to mention here that among our alumni (graduates only) are included twenty-nine members of the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, and Merchant Marine. Included also are one Army Nurse, one Navy Nurse, and one member of the WAC. Only six of the male graduates of the past nine years are still in civilian life. Consideration should doubtless also be given to those twenty-one of our girl graduates who have taken up housekeeping as a profession and who, from all appearances, are proving themselves successful in that field.

During its entire ten years of existence as a four year school, the State Board of Education has continually approved it as a standard school and rated it as highly as any other four year high school in the state. Such improvements or changes as have been made in the curriculum have come about through the close cooperation, approval, and in many cases the suggestions of that body. The courses in Home Economics and Mechanic Arts are examples of those improvements, and have certainly justified themselves as worthy additions to the school's former narrow program of study which held out little of value to those pupils who never had or could have hopes of further education beyond Troy.

These two courses are so planned and arranged as to provide for the teaching of certain skills, attitudes, and techniques in their respective fields those boys and girls whose school training will probably be ended with graduation from high school. Such courses appear doubly justified when a check up of our graduates reveals that approximately two-thirds of them completed their formal education in Troy. A further study of our graduates clearly illuminates the fact that in spite of persisting demands for the inclusion of a commercial course in our school, only seven of our graduates desired such training sufficiently to pursue a course of that nature beyond the secondary school, and only four of those that did are now actively engaged in commer-

cial work. From such a survey it would appear uneconomical, if not unsound, to include such a course in our curriculum.

As evidenced by the number of our alumni who have entered and remained in schools of high learning, it would appear that our college preparatory courses are adequate to insure reasonable success.

The fact that all but six of our male graduates have been inducted into military service gives convincing proof that our program of health supervision and athletics has built strong bodies to go with the sound minds developed in the classroom.

Formerly occupying but four rooms in the school plant, we at present make a complete utilization of seven. In a space of but ten years, very complete Home Economics, Mechanic Arts, and Science rooms have been fitted out in the most modern manner, and in a majority of cases surpass those rooms used for similar purposes in many of the other small schools of the state. In addition to these rooms we also utilize another room for music, assemblies, special activities, and visual education. All classes, including those which use the rooms mentioned above, are very adequately equipped with the tools, instruments, supplies, and texts necessary for the most efficient pursuit of the learning process.

The school has been extraordinarily fortunate also to have had a staff of teachers during these ten years whose interest in the pupils and whose educational background and experience has been of such a high type as to deserve favorable commendation. Through their efforts and cooperation the school rapidly improved and now stands among the best. Through their efforts the pupils have received a sound and well grounded education based on the most modern approved practices.

In extra-curricular activities our school has also equalled or surpassed many of its contemporaries. Our athletic teams have been outstanding for so small a school. To cite an example; our basketball team has twice been asked to participate in the annual basketball tournament at Durham, and in previous and subsequent seasons has exemplified the

best in sports and earned more than an even share of victories. The school paper, the "Trojan," is considered one of the best for the small schools of the state, earning two prizes for competition among school magazines in the state at the last meeting of school publications staffs at the University of New Hampshire. Its later issues have been most outstanding—the most recent one having a circulation in the neighborhood of three hundred copies. School plays. parties, and socials have been of a high level, and have done much to reflect the most valued tenets of a well-governed school. Closely related to extra-curricular activities is the continued exhibition of thrift and patriotism exemplified through the purchase by our boys and grls of war stamps and bonds. Over 90% of our pupils are making such purchases monthly and as a result, we have been proudly flying the "Minute Man" flag for several months. Total purchases in the school during 1942-43 amounted to \$3.582.90.

In recapitulation I think that we may well be proud of the way in which the experiment of a four year high school has resulted. If for no other reason than that we have a high school in town, we should be gratified, but to feel that it is as good, even though it may be smaller, than that which is in the next town, should make us swell with pride. In looking into the future it should be the desire, aim, and ambition of all—townspeople, school board, teachers, and pupils alike—to see that this splendid record is perpetuated and a still higher goal attained. By a true belief in our school and its potentialities, and by a continued healthy spirit of cooperation no one need complain of its inadequacy. True, the school does have its weaknesses, but these will never be improved by destructive criticism, nor by a continued allusion to supposedly superior institutions in adjacent communities. We have established a firm and enduring beachhead—let's push on to still more outstanding gains with undivided support and a ruthless uprooting of sabotage in the form of unfounded and disloyal adverse criticism.

In conclusion may I thank all who have contributed towards the success of the school throughout its embryonic state, and may I invoke your continued support and cooperation for the years which lie ahead.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

The school music program is carried on with the aim of advancement in vocal quality, song repertoire, rhythmic, recognition and activity, tone and tune recognition, feeling for mood, appreciation of vocal and instrumental music, study of history and composers, reading ability, and theoretical knowledge,—all of which is attained through the medium of ear training, written work, rhythmic activity and singing.

It was disappointing that, because of food shortage, it was necessary to cancel the New England Music Festival which was to have been held in Plymouth, Mass. in May 1943. Three Troy High School students had been accepted for the All-New England Chorus and were thus deprived of the benefit and pleasure of the Festival. There was no New Hampshire Festival last year, nor will there be a New England Festival this year.

Much has been done to promote patriotic fervor among students. Last spring much work was done in grades I through VIII in a Defense or Victory Song writing project, ending with an exhibit and rendition of all good songs collected from all schools where your Supervisor has charge of the music. The result was over sixty songs, many of them illustrated or decorated, in the collection.

I close with an expression of gratitude to all school officials and teachers for their interest and cooperation.
