

**THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE****TOWN WARRANT**

**THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M. to act on Articles 1, 2 & 3.**

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Webster in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grange Hall in said Webster on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next at 10:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. (By Ballot)

2. "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-f for the adjusted elderly exemptions from property tax? These statutes provide for the following exemptions, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$10,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$15,000; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$20,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$10,000 or if married, a combined net income of less than \$12,000, and own net assets of \$30,000 or less, excluding the value of the person's residence." (By Ballot)

3. To vote on the amendments as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance. (By Ballot)

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**BUSINESS MEETING WILL BE HELD AT THE GRANGE HALL ON SATURDAY, MARCH 17, 1990 AT 10:00 A.M. TO ACT UPON THE FOLLOWING SUBJECTS:**

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,886. for Webster's share of the bonded indebtedness.

20. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Future Sanitary Landfill Capital Reserve Fund created in 1977. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, to be transferred to the town's general fund. (Majority vote required)

25. To see if the Town will vote to designate and proclaim April 22, 1990, as Earth Day 1990, and to set aside that day for public activities promoting preservation of the global environment and launching the "Decade of the Environment". (By Petition)

26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to accept prepayment of taxes.

28. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal or state grants which may become available during the course of the year, and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money, provided: (1) that such grants and other monies do not require the expenditure of other town funds, (2) that a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and monies, and (3) that such items shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to limitation and expenditure of town monies, all as provided by RSA 31:96-b.

29. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

**INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON  
FINANCIAL PRESENTATION**

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen  
Town of Webster  
Webster, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Webster and the combining and individual fund financial statements of the Town as of and for the year ended December 31, 1989, as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Asset Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Webster at December 31, 1989, and the results of its operations and the changes in financial position of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Also, in our opinion, the combining and individual fund financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of each of the individual funds of the Town at December 31, 1989, and the results of operations of such funds for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general

purpose financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining and individual fund financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements of the Town. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose, combining and individual fund financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements of each of the respective individual funds and account groups, taken as a whole.

**NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS  
DECEMBER 31, 1989**

**NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

The financial statements of the Town of Webster have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) as applied to the governmental units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The more significant of the government's accounting policies are described below.

**A. Governmental Reporting Entity**

For financial reporting purposes, in conformity with the National Council on Governmental Accounting Statement Number 3, "Defining the Governmental Reporting Entity," the Town of Webster includes all funds, account groups, agencies, boards, commissions and authorities that are controlled by or dependent on the Town's executive or legislative branches. Control by or dependence on the Town is determined on the basis of budget adoption, taxing authority, outstanding debt secured by revenues or general obligations of the Town, obligation of the Town to finance any deficits that may occur, or receipt of significant subsidies from the Town.

**B. Fund Accounting**

The accounts of the Town are organized on the basis of funds or account groups, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures, as appropriate.

Governmental resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled. The various funds are grouped by type in the financial statements. The following fund types and account groups are used by the Town:

#### **GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS**

**General Fund** - The General Fund is the general operating fund of the Town. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to another fund are accounted for in this fund. From the fund are paid the general operating expenditures, the fixed charges, and the capital improvement costs that are not paid through other funds.

**Special Revenue Funds** - Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than expendable trust or major capital projects) requiring separate accounting because of legal or regulatory provisions or administrative action. Included in this fund type are the Conservation Commission and Library Funds.

#### **FIDUCIARY FUNDS**

**Trust Funds** - Trust Funds are used to account for the assets held in trust by the Town. The Nonexpendable and Expendable Trust Funds (which include Capital Reserve Funds) are shown in this fund type.

#### **ACCOUNT GROUPS (FIXED ASSETS)**

All governmental funds are accounted for on a spending or "financial flow" measurement focus. This means that only current assets and current liabilities are generally included on their balance sheets. Their reported fund balance (net current assets) is considered a measure of "available spendable resources". Governmental fund operating statements present increases (revenues and other financing sources) and decreases (expenditures and other uses) in net current assets. Accordingly, they are said to present a summary of sources and uses of available spendable resources during a period.

General fixed assets have been acquired for general governmental purposes and have been recorded as expenditures in the fund making the expenditure. These expenditures are required to be capitalized at historical cost in a General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts for accountability purposes. In accordance with the practices followed by most other municipal entities in the State, the Town does not maintain a record of its general fixed assets and,



accordingly, a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in this financial report.

**C. Basis of Accounting**

The accounts of the General, Special Revenue, and Expendable Trust Funds are maintained and reported on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, sources of financial resources and assets are recognized when measurable and available to finance operations during the year. Uses of financial resources and liabilities are recognized when obligations are incurred from receipt of goods and services, when assessments are made by the State or, in the case of judgments and claims against the Town, when there is a probability that such judgments and claims will result in liabilities, the amounts of which can be reasonably estimated. Exceptions to this general rule include: 1) accumulated unpaid vacation and sick pay, and 2) principal and interest on general long-term debt which is recognized when due. All Nonexpendable Trust Funds are accounted for using the accrual basis of accounting.

**D. Budgetary Accounting**

General governmental revenues and expenditures accounted for in budgetary funds are controlled by a formal integrated budgetary accounting system in accordance with various legal requirements which govern the Town's operations. State Statutes require balanced budgets but provide for the use of beginning general fund unreserved fund balance to achieve that end. In 1989, the beginning fund balance was applied as follows:

**E. Fund Balance**

The portion of fund balance which has been legally segregated for a specific future use, or which indicates that that portion is not appropriate for expenditures, is shown as reserved.

**Reserved for Encumbrances**

Encumbrance accounting, under which purchase orders, contracts, and continuing appropriations (certain projects and specific items not fully expended at year end) are recognized, is employed in the governmental funds. Encumbrances are not the equivalent of expenditures and are therefore reported as part of the fund balance at December 31 and are carried forward to supplement appropriations of the subsequent year.

The General Fund reserve for encumbrances at December 31, 1989 is detailed in Exhibit A-2 and totals \$12,425.

**Other Reserves**

Other reserves used by the Town include Reserve for Special Purposes (which includes Capital Reserve Fund balances) and Reserve for Endowments.

**F. Cash and Investments**

At year end, the carrying amount of the Town's deposits is \$502,847 and the bank balance is \$420,277. Of the bank balance, \$312,051 was covered by Federal depository insurance and \$108,226 was uninsured.

State Statutes authorize the Town to invest excess funds in the custody of the Treasurer in obligations of the United States Government, in savings bank deposits of banks incorporated under the laws of the State of New Hampshire, in certificates of deposit of banks incorporated under the laws of the State of New Hampshire, or in national banks located within this State or the State of Massachusetts. These financial statements report investments in certificates of deposit and savings bank deposits under the caption Cash and Equivalents.

The Town is further authorized to invest Trust Funds in obligations of political subdivisions and stocks and bonds, as they are legal for investment by New Hampshire savings banks. Capital Reserve Funds must be kept separate and not intermingled with Trust Funds. Capital Reserve Funds may be invested only in savings bank deposits of New Hampshire banks, or in United States or State of New Hampshire bonds or notes.

**G. Accumulated Unpaid Vacation and Sick Pay**

Accumulated unpaid vacation and sick pay is not accrued in the governmental funds using the modified accrual basis of accounting. The Administrative Assistant may accumulate up to 202 1/2 hours sick leave at a rate of 67 1/2 hours per year. The police chief may

take sick leave as needed. Vacation is granted based on length of service. Vacation pay accumulation does not exceed a normal year's allowance. Estimated value of sick leave is \$225.

#### **H. Taxes Collected For Others**

The property taxes collected by the Town include taxes levied for the Merrimack Valley School District, Merrimack County and Pillsbury Lake District, which are remitted to these governmental units as required by law. The ultimate responsibility for the collection of taxes rests with the Town.

#### **I. Property Taxes**

The National Council on Governmental Accounting, Interpretation 3, referring to property tax revenue recognition, requires disclosure if property taxes receivable, which are to be collected beyond a period of 60 days subsequent to year's end, are recognized on the balance sheet and not reserved. In accordance with the practice followed by other municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Webster annually recognizes, without reserve, all taxes receivable at the end of the fiscal year. The Town believes that the application of NCGA Interpretation 3, which would result in a decrease in the undesignated General Fund unreserved fund balance, would give a misleading impression of the Town's ability to meet its current and future obligations. This practice is consistent with the previous year.

The property tax year is from April 1 to March 31 and all property taxes are assessed on the inventory taken in April of that year.

Interest of 12% is charged on property taxes unpaid after thirty days delinquent.

A partial payment of the taxes assessed on April 1 is computed by multiplying the prior year's assessed valuation by one half of the previous year's tax rate, and is due on July 1.

A payment, of the remainder of the taxes assessed on April 1 less the payment due on July 1, is payable on or around December 31.

Annually, the Town establishes and raises through taxation an amount for abatements and refunds of property and resident taxes, known as overlay. All abatements and refunds are charged to this account. The amount raised in 1989 was \$7,043 and expenditures amounted to \$100.

As prescribed by law, the tax collector places a lien on properties for all uncollected property taxes in the following year after taxes are due.

The lien on these properties has priority over other liens and accrues interest at 18% per annum.

If property is not redeemed within the two-year redemption period, the property is tax-deeded to the Town.

**J. Total Columns (Memorandum Only) on Combined Statements**

Total columns on the combined statements are captioned "Memorandum Only" to indicate that they are presented only to facilitate financial analysis. Data in these columns do not present financial position, results of operations, or changes in financial position in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Neither is such data comparable to a consolidation. Interfund eliminations have not been made in the aggregation of this data.

**K. Comparative Data**

Comparative total data for the prior year have been presented in the accompanying financial statements in order to provide an understanding of changes in the government's financial position and operations. However, comparative data have not been presented in all statements because their inclusion would make certain statements unduly complex and difficult to understand.

**NOTE 2 - DEFINED BENEFIT PENSION PLAN**

Only the police chief participates in the New Hampshire Retirement System, a multiple-employer public employee retirement system. The payroll for employees covered by the system for the year ended December 31, 1989 was \$23,600; the Town's total payroll was \$90,753.

All Town full-time employees are eligible to participate in the system. Employees who retire before age 65 are entitled to a retirement benefit equal to 1/60 of the employee's average final compensation multiplied by years of service. After attainment of age 65, the payment by the retirement system is reduced to 1/66 of the average final compensation. The system also provides death and disability benefits which are established by State Statute.

The police chief is required by State Statute to contribute 9.3% of his salary to the plan. The Town is required by the same statute to contribute a percentage of the employee's salary, based on an actuarial valuation of the entire State plan performed June 30, 1985. These contributions represented



5.53% for police through June 30, 1989. From July 1, 1989, the Town's contribution rate was 6.23% for police. The contribution requirements for the year ended December 31, 1989 were \$3,583, which consisted of \$1,388 from the Town and \$2,195 from the employee.

The "pension benefit obligation" is a standardized disclosure measure of the present value of pension benefits, adjusted for the effects of projected salary increases and step-rate benefits, estimated to be payable in the future as a result of employee service to date. The measure, which is the actuarial present value of credited projected benefits, is intended to help users assess the system's funding status on a going-concern basis, assess progress made in accumulating sufficient assets to pay benefits when due, and make comparisons among retirement systems and employers. The State retirement system does not make separate measurements of assets and pension benefit obligations for individual employers. According to plan administrators, the pension benefit obligation at June 30, 1987 for the system as a whole, determined through an actuarial valuation performed as of that date, was \$633,344,000. The system's net assets available for benefits on June 30, 1987 (valued at market) were estimated at \$792,615,988, leaving no unfunded pension benefit obligation. The percentage that the Town of Webster has in relation to the entire plan cannot be determined.

**NOTE 3 - TRUST FUNDS**

The principal amount of all Nonexpendable Trust Funds is restricted either by law or by terms of individual bequests, in that only income earned may be expended. The Town's Nonexpendable and Expendable Trust Funds at December 31, 1989 are detailed on the following page:

#### **NOTE 4 - SANITARY LANDFILL AGREEMENT**

The sanitary landfill agreement with the Town of Hopkinton provides that the Town of Webster will pay 20% of the yearly expenses of the landfill operation. In addition, the Town receives from Hopkinton 20% of gross receipts from the use of the facilities. Under Article 2 of the March 14, 1989 Town Meeting, the Town authorized an appropriation of \$210,500 in accordance with the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33), for the purpose of committing to its share of the total costs for equipping a transfer station and for the landfill closure.

The amount to be paid annually to the Town of Hopkinton is to be based on the actual costs. Due to the uncertainty of the final amount, it is not reflected on the financial statements at December 31.

#### **NOTE 5 - CONCORD REGIONAL SOLID WASTE/RESOURCE RECOVERY COOPERATIVE**

During 1986, the Town entered into an intergovernmental agreement with several municipalities to create a cooperative among them, in order to design, construct, operate and maintain a "centralized solid waste-to-energy facility." Under the terms of the agreement, each municipality is obligated to appropriate annually its share of the budgeted costs of the ensuing fiscal period. This agreement was subsequently ratified by a special act of the legislature. The cost incurred in 1989 was \$1,426.

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## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The year 1989 presented your Selectmen with many challenges. Several problems were solved but others, as you will see, will continue to receive special attention into 1990 and beyond. Monday night meetings continue to run four hours and beyond, along with special trips and meetings with outside organizations and persons.

The following activities are the highpoints of the year.

1. We were pleased to note a modest decrease in the 1989 tax rate. However, we do not predict tax decreases in the next few years. There are several major items that will impact our future taxes.
2. Building permits (21) were issued by August, 1989.
3. The school budget accounted for 60.4% of the 1989 expenditures. Your Selectmen and Town Administrative Assistant have been attending school budget hearings and making known our views on controlling school district expenses. During the year a three year contract was negotiated and approved raising teachers' salaries about 12% annually over the three years. The effect in 1989 was slight due to the availability of unexpended funds but the 1990 and 1991 effects of the raises will be considerable.
4. The 1989 county tax assessment dropped \$5,335 over 1988 and represented 7.8% of 1989 expenditures. A 1990 decrease is not anticipated.
5. The Hopkinton/Webster town line was perambulated as required by State law (every seven years).
6. Certain Class Six roads have been declared unbuildable by the Selectmen and Planning Board. This has resulted in some appeals to the Zoning Board of Adjustment and litigation, but our position is firm and has been supported by the New Hampshire Courts in similar situations.
7. Several joint meetings were held with the Hopkinton Selectmen on matters related to the Landfill, Transfer Station and Recycling operations. The new transfer station commenced operation in October and appears to be functioning with a minimum of problems, while costs are up substantially over the old landfill operation.
8. Closing of the landfill continues to receive close attention and monitoring wells are located throughout the area perimeter. Meanwhile we have received relief in the disposal of some trash such as stumps, ash and building materials which may be reduced and/or buried. The metal heap is in the process of being eliminated.
9. Recycling became a major effort during 1989 through a joint committee with Hopkinton. A temporary recycling center went into operation in October and aluminum cans, glass, cardboard and newspaper are being recycled. An excellent joint presentation was made to the State which resulted in a \$21,000 matching grant toward

- building a permanent facility in 1990. When completed plastics, tin cans, other paper and a mulching operation will be added to the recycling center.
10. Schoodac Bridge on Warner Road was resurfaced in the spring of 1989.
  11. An additional stretch of Deer Meadow Road was reconstructed. Sealing of the roads was deferred until 1990 and the money encumbered to 1990.
  12. A Cable TV contract was negotiated and signed with Cable One. Installation has fallen behind due to delay in the utility pole work which must be done. Cable One tells us we will have Cable TV in Webster in the middle of 1990 but your Selectmen feel this could be optimistic. Cable One was the only company interested in signing with Webster.
  13. The salt shed is a serious problem and is presented to the Town in the Warrant. There is a time limit here.
  14. Old Home Day came off bigger and better than ever thanks to a high spirited and innovative committee.
  15. The Town Hall/Library Building was painted.
  16. Through the efforts of an aggressive and competent "Steering Committee" and a massive "Pitch In and Build It Now" community effort an outstanding playground was constructed at the elementary school.
  17. A Sports Committee was organized within the framework of the Parks and Recreation Committee and through the generosity of the people of Webster we now have a well organized program in an ongoing operation with properly equipped soccer, basketball and baseball teams.
  18. Through generous offers of the Daniel Webster Grange and the Women's Union we have a Town Municipal Building program in progress, under the direction of an outstanding committee, that could provide for town needs well into the future.
  19. Our 1989 Town Annual Report won first place in our category.
  20. Prominent citizen Randy Inman was recipient of a "Municipal Volunteer Award".
  21. Our new computer arrived and Barbara Mock and Judy Jones are busy adopting town records and procedures into the modern world. A thoroughly competent committee composed of Gordon Bezanson, Michael Royce, Michael Borek, David Holton and Clarence Jeffrey, helped us to select what we feel is the best computer for Webster needs.
  22. Construction has started on the Route 127 improvement project. The State has advised that the road will be passable during construction but some delays can be expected. Completion is expected by Fall 1991.

23. All underground fuel tanks were removed from the fire house and a heating fuel oil tank and protective structure installed.

The Selectmen wish to extend special thanks to Barbara Mock and Judy Jones for their assistance and special efforts during the year. Barbara carried on during a very serious back problem and Judy filled in most ably while Barbara was recovering from surgery. We are very fortunate to have them on the team.

Marie Scribner is retiring as Treasurer, Bobby Pearson as Moderator and Ron Finlayson as Member and Secretary of the Planning Board. A special thanks to Marie, Bobby and Ron for their many years of valuable service to the Town. The Town and Selectmen appreciate your efforts.

We also wish to thank all the people who sit on and/or direct the various Town Committees and Boards on a volunteer basis. We know there are long hours involved and some intrusion on their personal lives. The same thanks to our Members of the Fire Department and Rescue Squad under Chief Bill Welcome and Assistant Chief Bob Lake; and to Police Chief Aime Roy, our Police Matron and Policemen.

Webster has retained its rural character another year and the active participation of the Community is the envy of other towns. Yes, Webster is beautiful and a Town of which we can be proud.

## REPORT OF THE WEBSTER POLICE DEPARTMENT

1989 was a very busy and "exciting" year for the Webster Police Department! We are continuing to see infiltration into our quiet, rural community of more serious crimes more commonly found in cities. Some good examples are:

1. New Year's Day, 1989, started out with a burglary. Two days later, we had another burglary. However, Town residents working in the area saw several young males running from one of the homes involved and gave us a good description of both the subjects and of the vehicle used. We shared information with another department, and together we cleared up not only our two burglaries, but also broke up a seven member ring of individuals who had been burglarizing homes in four surrounding towns.
2. Most of you are already aware that with the timely information June gave us when her store was robbed we were able to call upon Mutual Police Aid from surrounding towns, Sheriff's Department and State Police and, with all these departments working together, were able to shut off all roads leaving town, which resulted in the apprehension of the perpetrator within 20 minutes from the crime!
3. This year we assisted the Reading, Mass. Police Department in arresting a Fugitive from Justice suspected of committing a series of armed robberies in Mass. They had managed to trace him to our town where he was living quietly among us between sojourns in N.H. and Mass.

All of the members of the Webster Police Department want to thank all of you Townspeople for allowing us to purchase both the "assault vest" and the Ruger P-85 semi-automatic pistols. The vest has come in handy several times this year on calls involving firearms. We sent three of our officers, (Officer Steven Faer, Officer William Shackford and myself), to the ARMOURERS SCHOOL for a week last May. This school is run by the Ruger Company and taught all the functions, servicing, and safety aspects of the use and care of the weapons purchased. All three officers completed the course and were awarded pins and Certificates.

As you know, the Town is growing rapidly. The more people we have, the busier we become. We are fast approaching the point where you may want to start thinking about the possibility of adding a second full time officer sometime in the next few years.

As always, we value your efforts and vigilance in notifying us of suspicious persons and vehicles seen. It is because of this assistance you give us that we are successful in keeping crime in our Town to a minimum. Many thanks to you, the Townspeople, for your continued support and assistance.

## REPORT OF THE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Reconstruction work on Deer Meadow Road from the Cummings' property to the north side of Corliss' property (3,500') was done this year. A bulldozer was hired to break up the old pavement. Pike Industries was contracted to hot top the road. Total costs were \$45,450 - \$21,237 encumbered from 1988, \$22,000 appropriated in 1989 and \$2,213 from town maintenance money.

Cost of tar for the pug mill was \$6,105 which was paid for from the \$5,500 encumbered from 1988 and \$605 from 1989 funds. Roads were not sealed this year, so unexpended funds for this purpose (\$9,395) were encumbered to be used in 1990.

Portions of Pleasant Street and Corn Hill Road will be fixed in 1990 as funds allow.

The winter of 1989 (January to March) saw more ice storms than snow. In November and December we had both ice and snow storms.

One new front plow was bought in 1986 and now the other front plow, which was purchased in 1979, needs to be replaced. We have also requested purchase of a brush chipper, which would save much time and money in handling and removing brush, plus the availability of having it when we need it.

## REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

In 1989 the Conservation Commission reviewed applications to the State Wetlands Board and made site inspections, completed a Natural Resource Inventory, developed shoreland and protection amendments to Webster's zoning laws, and led spring nature walks. The Commission is working with the Central N.H. Regional Planning Commission on a water resource management and protection plan for the Beaver Dam Brook watershed, and is participating in a U.N.H. Extension project to provide land management information to landowners.

Recycling and Webster's Land Conservation Investment Project are subjects close to the Commission's interests, and we follow their progress with enthusiasm. We ended the year by beginning to plan Webster's Earth Day 1990 Celebration.

Expenditures for 1989 were \$262.34. Donations to the Webster Land Trust Fund -\$1,300.00 and donations for Tyler Road Maple Trees -\$100.00. Commission meetings, open to everyone, are held in the Town Office at 7:30 P.M. on the second Wednesday of each month.

## REPORT OF THE TOWN HISTORY COMMITTEE

### Highlights of 1989

A demonstration of ice-cutting took place on Lake Winnepocket on January 21. In spite of the extreme cold, over 100 attended.

The Land Conservation Investment Program aroused the interest of a number of landowners, and at least six persons have expressed a desire to participate in this project.

Charles Bartlett was elected to represent Webster on the Merrimack Valley School Board. The estimated District Assessment for 1988-89 for the Town of Webster was \$801,333.46, with the estimated share of reimbursement from Business Profits Tax \$17,651.00.

The 5th New England Division Canoe and Kayak races were held April 22-23 on the river below the dam. There was a large attendance with 159 entries.

Ambitious plans for a NEW ADVENTURE PLAYGROUND at the Webster Elementary School were undertaken, with many fund-raising events and a construction day weekend scheduled for June 3 and 4.

For the first time, money was appropriated at town meeting to help defray the cost of uniforms and equipment used by the organized sports programs in town; soccer, basketball and Little League.

Habitat for Humanity began the construction of a home for the Ken Charlton family, with a number of local residents assisting.

James "Luke" Roberts retired as project manager of the Blackwater Dam, a position he held for 28 years.

The Meeting House Society sponsored another successful ice cream social.

Daniel Webster Grange's annual scholarship was awarded to Stanley Andrewski. The William R. Pearson Scholarship went to Jay Vachon.

Rev. Mary S. Caldwell of Concord, NH was welcomed as the new minister of the First Congregational Church of Webster.

Public suppers, sponsored by Grange, Church and Women's Union, netted each organization over \$1,100.

Twenty-one building permits were issued in 1989.

Marion R. Davis, 90 years old the previous day, was Grand Marshal of the Old Home Day parade. With ideal weather, we had the best and largest parade in many years. Marion Davis also participated in the ribbon-cutting ceremony, when the completed playground was officially opened. Games, chicken barbecue and the third annual street dance were all very successful.

The first recipient of the new Webster Cane was Ethel M. Simmoneau, age 98, of Tyler Road. This cane, presented on Old Home Day by the History Committee to the Town, will be given to the oldest person in Webster. The cane was beautifully crafted by Robert H. Pearson II from locally cut apple wood, with the top made from a black birch burl. A silversmith added the



silver crown and inlay.

The Webster Church Booth at Hopkinton Fairgrounds had another successful year netting \$13,014.72.

The landfill transfer station and Penacook trash to energy incinerator went into operation in October, and a voluntary recycling program was started.

On October 5, considerable vandalism occurred at the Webster school's new playground. Thanks to the efforts of many, trees cut down have been replaced and most of the damage repaired.

An armed hold-up occurred October 28 at the Corser Hill Country Store. Fortunately, no one was injured and a Belmont man was promptly arrested.

The second annual town-wide flea market, sponsored by the fire department, was a great success.

The Eastman house (pg. 215 in Town History) was dismantled, moved, and reconstructed in another town.

A computer has been purchased and is now in operation at the Selectmen's office.

The Hydro-Quebec transmission line construction has been completed.

The 3rd annual Christmas party at the Meeting House brought out the largest attendance ever.

Annual pop-corn ball party, sponsored by Grange and Women's Union was again held at the Drown farm. Candy and popcorn balls were distributed to Webster children at the Christmas program, held at the Webster school on Dec. 19, with all 5 grades participating.

The winter of 1988-89 was the driest for many years. December of 1989 was the coldest on record.

The Town of Webster won an award from the N.H. Municipal Association for the best Town Report (1988) in its category. Randolph Inman received an award for outstanding service in various volunteer positions in the town.

Due to strong opposition from local residents protesting the destruction of stone walls bordering Route 127 (caused by new road construction), the Transportation Commission, Gov. Gregg and the Executive Council have endorsed a policy aimed to preserve stone walls along the state-maintained system and the Webster walls should now be saved.

ARTICLE 2. Voted to raise and appropriate not to exceed the sum of \$210,500., in accordance with the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33) for the purpose of paying its pro rata share, as provided in the Refuse Disposal Agreement between the Towns of Webster and Hopkinton, of the principal and interest of the bond issue authorized by the Town of Hopkinton for the purpose of preparing for landfill closure and planning, designing constructing and equipping a transfer station. Such payments shall be raised and paid over, on an annual basis, over the term of the Town of Hopkinton bond issue. Further, to authorize the Board of Selectmen to determine the terms of said payments and take any other action or pass any other vote relative thereto. To authorize the Selectmen to apply for, obtain and accept Federal, State or other aid, if any, which may be available for said project.

(Required 2/3 majority vote to adopt - by ballot)

139 votes cast -- 134 yes -- 5 no.

After a very lengthy discussion of this article, this motion was made by Jeremy Pendleton, Sr., seconded and passed. (ballot vote) Hopkinton's share of the costs are 80% and Webster's 20%. The sum of \$210,500. includes

\$65,500. from last year's expenses for test holes, ground water studies, etc. Although the money was appropriated last year it was disallowed due to the fact a ballot vote was not taken, as required in a bond funded issue.

ARTICLE 21. Conservation Commission: Voted \$400.00, for the operating budget.

ARTICLE 22. Voted to establish an expendable trust fund under RSA 31:19-A to be known as the Webster Land Trust Fund, for the purpose of helping defray expenses of surveys and appraisals on lands that shall be protected for conservation by gift or easement to the town, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to be placed in such fund, but only if the fund has received private contributions of at least an equal amount, and to authorize the Webster Conservation Commission to act as agents to carry out the objectives of said fund. (Voice vote)

ARTICLE 23. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to accept private donations of land, interest in land or money for the purposes of contributing to the local matching portion required for acquiring conservation land or interest in land and other costs associated therewith for permanent conservation use under

the New Hampshire Conservation Investment Program (LCIP) RSA 221-A, and authorize the Selectmen to apply for and accept the State matching funds under the LCIP in an amount up to \$250,000 for the purposes of acquisition of the fee or lesser interest in conservation land. (Voice vote)

ARTICLE 24. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Hand vote -- 74 Yes -- 0 No

ARTICLE 25. Voted to authorize the Tax Collector to accept pre-payment of taxes. (Voice vote)

ARTICLE 26. Voted to authorize the Planning Board to review and approve or disapprove site plans for the development of tracts or changes or expansion of use of tracts for non-residential uses or for multi-family dwelling units and as otherwise stated in the warrant. (Voice vote)

ARTICLE 27. Voted to amend the Hopkinton-Webster Refuse Disposal Agreement, entered into by the towns in July of 1975 to provide as follows:

1. Amend Paragraph 1 of original agreement: There shall be a Refuse Disposal Committee, consisting of three citizens from the Town of Hopkinton and three citizens from the Town of Webster, appointed by their respective Boards of Selectmen to 3 year terms.
2. Amend paragraph II of original agreement: Delete power of said Committee to expend joint funds appropriated for such purpose.
3. Eliminate Paragraph VIII of original agreement: Deleting the power of said Committee to authorize other towns, not parties to this Agreement, access to the refuse disposal facilities.
4. Amend Paragraph IX of original agreement: Should a party to the Agreement seek to withdraw from the Agreement, it shall nevertheless be the continuing responsibility of the withdrawing town to fund its share of all bond indebtedness incurred prior to withdrawal.

To authorize the Board of Selectmen to adopt and approve such contract language within the scope of the foregoing provisions as may be necessary to carry out its general purpose and intent and take any other action relative thereto. (Voice vote)

ARTICLE 28. Voted to accept a deed of a short terminal section of a public highway with a cul-de-sac, known as Manchester Drive Extension, a road fully completed to Town standards and approved by the Planning Board. (Voice vote)

ARTICLE 29. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to sell, trade or dispose of any surplus used items or equipment which are available or may become available during the year, at an amount or in a way they determine to be in

the best interest of the Town. (Voice vote)

ARTICLE 30. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax lien property to private owners by advertised sealed bids with the power to accept or reject any or all bids, or to negotiate the sale of the property at an amount they determine to be in the best interest of the Town. The Selectmen shall sign and deliver suitable deed to successful purchaser. As provided by RSA 80:42 the authority herein granted shall continue in force indefinitely until otherwise voted at some future Town Meeting. Voice vote; hand vote requested. Majority in favor of article as presented. (Hand vote)

ARTICLE 31. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal or state grants which may become available during the course of the year, and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money, provided: (1) that such grants and other monies do not require the expenditure of other Town funds, (2) that a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and monies, and (3) that such items shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to limitation and expenditure of town monies, all as provided by RSA 31:96-b. (Voice vote)

ARTICLE 32. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting. Cynthia Holton requested that balloting for elected town officials be held during the day on the second Tuesday in March and the business meeting to be held the following Saturday. She was assured this would be inserted in next year's town warrant. Robert Austin, who had served as a Selectmen for nine years, was given a standing ovation for his years of service. Randolph Inman was also honored for serving as Vice-Chairman of The Concord Regional Solid Waste Resource Recovery Cooperative.

The meeting adjourned at 12:45 A.M.

5. To see if the District will vote to establish an expendable Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA: 1 to be known as the Water Pump Replacement Fund, and to transfer from the old existing Water Survey, Exploration & Engineering Fund five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to fund this new Capital Reserve Fund and to designate the Commissioners/Treasurer as agents to expend.  
(Majority Vote Required)
6. To see if the District will vote to establish an expendable Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA: 1 to be known as the Water, Survey, Exploration and Engineering Fund, and to transfer from the old existing Water Survey, Exploration & Engineering Fund thirty-seven thousand, one hundred sixty dollars and thirty-one cents (\$37,160.31), plus accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, to fund this new Capital Reserve Fund.  
(Majority Vote Required)
7. To see if the District will vote to discontinue the Water Survey, Exploration & Engineering Fund established date unknown (known as the old existing fund). All funds remaining in this account with accumulated interest to the date of withdrawal are to be transferred to the just established Water, Survey, Exploration and Engineering Fund.

## ANNUAL MEETING

The Annual Meeting of the Pillsbury Lake District was held on Tuesday, March 21, 1989 at 7:00 P.M. at the Pillsbury Lake Community Center.

At 7:05 P.M. the meeting was called to order by Moderator Michael R. Royce. Persons not registered to vote were asked to identify themselves, and told not to vote on any matter.

ARTICLE 1. To hear the reports of the district commissioners and any vote relating thereto. Jeffrey J. Siegel, Commissioner, gave an oral report. He mentioned that Mark R. Moser is the new Commissioner filling out the term of John R. Wilson, who moved from the area. He then proceeded to mention the events that had transpired during the year.

ARTICLE 2. To choose all necessary officers as follows:

- a. To choose a clerk to serve until the next annual meeting.  
Eleanor L. Hoffman, Clerk, 1 year
- b. To choose a moderator to serve until the next annual meeting.  
Michael R. Royce, Moderator, 1 year
- c. To choose a treasurer to serve until the next annual meeting.  
Lee Durgin, Treasurer, 1 year
- d. To choose an auditor to serve until the next annual meeting.  
Carlton J. Leathers, Auditor, 1 year
- e. To choose (1) commissioner to serve until the annual meeting of 1990.  
Mark R. Moser, Commissioner, until 1990
- f. To choose (1) commissioner to serve until the annual meeting of 1992.  
Jeffrey J. Siegel, Commissioner, until 1992

ARTICLE 3. To adopt a budget and make necessary appropriations from water revenues and other available funds for the ensuing year.

It was unanimously voted.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the District will vote to authorize the commissioners to withdraw and expend the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000) from the Water Survey, Exploration and Engineering (Capital Reserve) Fund for the purpose of contracting for the fabrication and installation of street signs within the District at locations to be designated by the commissioners.

Motion amended to read \$2,000 and delete "and installation". The amendment failed by ballot vote.

Motion amended to read \$4,000 and delete "and installation". The amendment passed. Motion carried by ballot. Results: Yes - 12 No - 3. The motion reads as follows:

To see if the District will vote to authorize the commissioners to withdraw and expend the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) from the Water Survey, Exploration and Engineering (Capital Reserve Fund) for the purpose

of contracting for the fabrication of street signs with the District at locations to be designated by the commissioners.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the District will vote to authorize the commissioners to withdraw and expend the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) from the Water Survey, Exploration and Engineering (Capital Reserve) Fund for the purpose of defraying the cost of improving the water system by specifically increasing the diameter of the water main that runs across the Lake as outlined in the July 7, 1987 report of the State Water Supply & Pollution Control Commission.

Motion carried by ballot. Results: Yes -15, No - 0.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the District will vote to authorize the commissioners to expend the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00) for the purchase from Kevin Corriveau of land in Webster, N.H. on the east side of Rogers Drive, approximately .46 of an acre, and being known as Lots 54 and 55, Section 5. It was moved and seconded. The vote was unanimous.

ARTICLE 7. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise by taxation and appropriate to pay expenses and charges of the District not covered by water revenues and other available funds for the ensuing year. The sum of \$17,695 to be raised by taxation and such money be appropriated to pay expenses and charges of the District not covered by water revenues.

It was moved and seconded. The vote was unanimous.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the District will vote to authorize the commissioners to transfer any unexpended revenues from water service tie-in fees after payment of expenses for said tie-ins into the Water Survey, Exploration and Engineering (Capital Reserve) Fund.

A ballot vote was taken. Results: Yes -15, No - 0.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the District will vote to authorize the commissioners to borrow money in anticipation of revenue and taxes.

It was moved and seconded. The vote was unanimous.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the District will vote to authorize the district commissioners to transfer any unexpended balance of money from one appropriation to another with the budget.

It was moved and seconded. The vote was unanimous.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the District will vote to charge 12% interest per annum to any property owner whose water bill is not paid within (30) days after receipt of said water bill.

It was moved and seconded. The vote was unanimous.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the District will vote to authorize the commissioners to allow the land known as Park E to be transferred to the Town of Webster, N.H., for use by the Town solely for fire department activities.

It was moved and seconded. The vote was unanimous.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the District will vote to prohibit the use of a jet ski-type of recreational vehicle from use on Pillsbury Lake. (By petition).

It was moved and seconded. The vote was unanimous.

ARTICLE 14. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Richard Ober, a member of Webster's Land Conservation Committee, and District resident, presented the following article to be considered by the voters of the Pillsbury Lake District:

To see if the District will authorize the Commissioners to donate a conservation easement on the District's Hunting Preserve to the Town of Webster, recognizing that the easement will allow all current uses of the Preserve - including recreation and timber management - to continue, and that the Preserve will still be owned by the District. This donation will take place only if the Town's application for funds to conserve land in other parts of Town is approved by the New Hampshire Land Conservation Investment Program.

It was moved and seconded. The vote was unanimous.

To see if the Town will authorize the Commissioners to apply for, receive and expend federal or state grants which may become available during the course of the year, and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the District may legally appropriate money, provided: (a) that such grants and other monies do not require the expenditure of other District funds, (2) that a public hearing shall be held by the Commissioners prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and monies, and (3) that such items shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to limitation and expenditure of District monies, all as provided by RSA 31:96-b.

It was moved and seconded. The vote was unanimous.

The meeting adjourned at 10:00 P.M.
