# **TOWN WARRANT**

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

#### THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 11:00 A.M. TO 7:00 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of WESTMORELAND in the County of CHESHIRE in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Westmoreland on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, in the year two thousand and three at 11 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subject:

Article 1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Following the counting of ballots, the meeting will recess until 7:00 P.M. Wednesday March 12, 2003 at the **Westmoreland School Gymnasium**. The balance of the Articles will be acted on at that time.

- Article 2 To hear the reports of Agents and Auditors and take any action relative thereto.
- Article 3 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixty-five thousand dollars (\$65,000) to purchase a one-ton truck for the Highway Department. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)
- Article 4 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell the 1997 1-ton truck, plow, and sander as they see fit.
- Article 5 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) to drill a well at the Fire Department. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)
- Article 6 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-seven thousand eight hundred fifty dollars (\$27,850) to pave .4 of a mile of Paine Road.

  The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)
- Article 7 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000) for bridges. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)
- Article 8 To see if the town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of closing the town landfill and to raise

- fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to be placed in this fund. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this. (Majority vote required)
- Article 9 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of forty-two hundred dollars (\$4,200) for Map Digitizing. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation and the Budget Committee does not. (Majority vote required)
- Article 10 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to be placed in the existing Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund.

  The Selectmen recommend this appropriation and the Budget Committee does not. (Majority vote required)
- Article 11 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to be placed in the existing Highway Truck Capital Reserve Fund. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation and the Budget Committee does not. (Majority vote required)
- Article 12 To see if the town will vote to increase the Disabled Veterans exemption from seven hundred dollars (\$700) to fourteen hundred dollars (\$1400). The Selectmen recommend this.
- Article 13\* To see if the Town will vote to designate Poocham Road and River Road as Scenic Roads and to designate the Planning Board of the town to administer said designation in accordance with RSA 231:157 and RSA 231:158 of the State of New Hampshire. The Selectmen do not recommend this. (Majority vote required)
- Article 14\* To see if the Town of Westmoreland will pass a truth in voting clause stating that in each article presented "the cost to the tax payer in dollars per one hundred thousand dollars of assessed evaluation be stated, within said article to be voted on".
- Article 15\* That we, the citizens of WESTMORELAND, New Hampshire, call on our elected officials from all levels of government, and those seeking office, to work with consumers, businesses, and health care providers to ensure that:
  - -Everyone, including the self- employed, unemployed, un-and underinsured, and small business owners have access to an affordable basic health plan similar to what federal employees receive;
  - -Everyone, including employers, consumers, and the state, local, and federal government makes a responsible and fair contribution to finance the health care system;
  - -Everyone receives high quality care that is cost efficient and medically effective; and
  - -That these efforts help control the skyrocketing cost of health care. This resolution is non-binding and represents no fiscal impact.
- Article 16 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 685,978, which represents the operating budget. Said sum does not include special or individual articles addressed.

Article 17	To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The annual Town Meeting was called to order by Moderator, Peter Heed on Tuesday, March 12, 2002 at 11:00 am with the readings of Articles One, Two, and Three of the Town Warrant and Article One of the School Warrant amd decalring the polls open. The remaining Articles are to be considered on Wednesday, March 13, 2002 for the Town Warrant and Friday, March 15, 2002 for the School Warrant each at 7:00 pm after a recess. Polls were declared closed at 7:00 pm on Tuesday, March 12, 2002. Moderator Peter Heed called the meeting to order at 7:01 pm on Wednesday, March 13, 2002 with the Pledge of Allegiance and the singing of the National Anthem.

<u>ARTICLE ONE</u> - To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. The results of balloting were as follows: Total ballots cast were 347 of the registered 912 voters = 38%. \*Declared elected by Moderator, Peter Heed.

 Are you in favor of the adoption of amendment No. 1 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows:

Section 104 Terms

Lot frontage: Distance measured across the width of the lot  $\underline{along}$  the property line that fronts a Class V or better road.

 Are you in favor of the adoption of amendment No. 2 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows:

Section 403 Protection of Home Occupations

Any home occupation permit shall be subject to approval by the  ${\tt Zoning\ Administrator}$  .

3. Are you in favor of the adoption of amendment No. 3 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows:

Section 406 Lots in Two Zoning Districts

Where a district boundry line divides a lot of record at the time such district boundry line is adopted, the regulations for either district of such lot shall extend not more than thirty feet into the more restricted district, providing the lot has frontage on a Class V or better road in the less restricted district.

4. Are you in favor of the adoption of amendment No. 4 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows:

Section 414 Location of Driveway

All driveways are to be located at least one hundred (100) feet from a street line intersection for all uses, except one and two family residential uses, and shall be subject to approval by the Town Road Agent. All driveways must be accessed from the frontage of a Class  $\mathbb V$  or better road.

5. Are you in favor of the adoption of amendment No. 5 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows:

Section 434 Signs in Commercial / Industrial Districts

The following signs are permitted when located on the immediate property:

A. When one business exists:

- 1. One directory sign not larger than 10 square feet
- 2. One sign not larger that 32 square feet
- B. When more than one business exists on a property:
  - l. One directory sign not larger than 40 square feet
  - One sign per business not larger than 12 square feet located on or immediately adjacent to each business.

6. Are you in favor of the adoption of amendment No. 6 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows:

Section 453.7 Telecommunication Facilities Waivers

Delete entire section regarding waivers for towers and replace it with a new Section 453.7: Any company wanting to co-locate an antenna on an existing tower can do so by obtaining a building permit. The co-location must be in accordance with the approved site plan.

7. Are you in favor of the adoption of amendment No. 7 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows:

Table 502 Commercial / Industrial

Single Family Residence must meet requirements of Areas & Dimensions as set forth in Table 505 – Rural Residential

8. Are you in favor of the adoption of amendment No. 8 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows:

Section 2:03 Building Permit Fees

The Selectmen will set building permit fees as they see fit

NO - 158 YES - 166

Are you in favor of the adoption of amendment No. 9 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows:

Section 4:02 Building Inspector

The Building Inspector shall in all cases visit the site of any proposed building or remodeling in company of the owner of the site before issuing a building permit. He shall satisfy himself that the proposal will meet the requirements of the Town Building Ordinances.

10. Are you in favor of the adoption of amendment 10 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows:

Minor line changes to clearly define zoning areas, along with the following rezoning:

- To change the Patton Rd./South Village Rd. area to Medium Density Residential
- To change the Pierce Lane area to Medium Residential
  To change the area of Rte. 12/Depot Rd. to Commercial/Industrial

YES - 204\* NO - 111

ARTICLE THREE - To vote the following referendum question: Should an expansion of the current jail and/or building a new jail be allowed if either would result in an increase in the number of inmates confined in Westmoreland? This is a non-binding Article.

NO VOTE - 4 YES - 77 NO - 266\*

Russ Austin, Selectman spoke stating that on the voting of the zoning ordinances, all but Number 8 were overwhelmingly voted in favor of. Number 8 was to have the Selectmen set fees for building permits. If anyone has any comments or suggestions of fees, please contact the Selectmens' Office as they have no idea as to what the Town is looking for fees.

Moderator Peter Heed suggested that in response to Article 3, he suggested that the County build the jail in Keene where the stadium was to go that got defeated, and keep the House of Corrections here in Westmoreland. Having the jail right in Keene would cut the Sherriff's Department Budget in at least  $\frac{1}{2}$  for the transportation section. The Town applauded his comment.

After reading the House Rules as to how this meeting is to be conducted, we started with Article 4.

ARTICLE FOUR - To hear the reports of Agents and Auditors and take any action relative hereto.

Article moved by Russell Austin and seconded by Coral Stewart. No discussion. Article voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

ARTICLE FIVE - To see if the Town will vote to allow the Iibrary Trustees to have five (5) members in accordance with RSA 202-A:6. (Majority vote required)

Article moved by Iloyd Draper and seconded by Terry Cox. Susan West, Library Trustee spoke to the article stating that we now have a Board of 3 trustees, each with a three-year term. They would like to increase the Board to five members to help in the decision-making process. There is no monies involved with this article. They would appoint 2 more trustees. Article voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

<u>ARTICIE SIX</u> - To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a long-term lease/purchase agreement not to exceed the amount of one hundred fifty-three thousand five hundred dollars ( $\phi$ 153,500) payable over a term of sixty (60) months to purchase a new loader and backhoe for the Highway Department, and to raise and appropriate up to the sum of thirty-three thousand five hundred nineteen dollars ( $\phi$ 33,519) for the first year's payment for that purpose. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation (2/3 ballot vote required)

Article moved by G. Russell Austin and seconded by James Beeler. Russ spoke to the article stating that the Selectmen felt it was time for a new loader. The frame on the present one has been welded 3, 4, or 5 times, and they felt we need a new one. The Selectmen also felt they needed a new Backhoe, not only for the regular Highway Department work but also for them to help by doing the bridgework. The River Road bridge needs help. In the past years we have had to rent, and the rentals add up year after year, so the Selectmen felt they may as well buy one. We would be leasing it new and at the end of 5 years, we will own it! Bruce Russell spoke to the article stating that a number of towns are starting to lease their equipment. He stated that he did a lot of research. We could get a used loader for \$100,000 with no warranty. The interest rate on leasing is 4.75%, 5.25% for under \$100,000. The backhoe is \$71,000, we plan on it lasting 20 years. We have 475 culverts in town, 30 need replacement now. When we rent we pay for the gas, oil, parts when they break down. We actually need

a backhoe more than the loader. This is the time to do it, and this is the best deal we're going to get. The opportunity is out there now and for up to two years they will buy it back for what was paid. Backhoe rental is \$30/hour. That's \$1200/week, \$4800/month, \$57600/year. We're really getting a good deal. We'd be getting two pieces with a seven year warranty; 1 year unlimited warranty with \$250 deductable after one year. Bob Harcke asked if he compare the Leasing component to the Purchasing componaent and to please explain that. Bruce Russell stated that this is a lease to buy. We own it after five years. G. Russell Austin stated that we vote on this this year and it just automatically is part of the budget for the next four years. We do not need to vote on this for five years. No more discussion. Ballot voting started at 7:30 pm; to end at 8:30 pm.

Meeting continued at  $7:55\ pm$  with Article 7.

 $\frac{\text{ARTICLE SEVEN}}{\text{the }1970}$  Caterpillar loader as they see fit.

Article moved by Lloyd Draper and seconded by Paul Vincent. JoAnn LaBarre asked if this Article should be tabled awaiting the outcome of Article Six. Moderator, Peter Heed stated that no matter what the outcome of Article Six, this Article is just to authorize, not require disposition of the loader. Richard Daschbach stated that he knows that the Selectmen would use their best judgement for the interest of the Townspeople and use the proceeds from the sale of the old loader to help offset the costs of the new one. Voice vote to the affirmative.

ARTICLE EIGHT - To see if the Town will vote to purchase a wood-burning furnace for the Highway Garage and to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for this purpose. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Article moved by G. Russel Austin and seconded by Wesley Staples. Bruce Russell spoke to the article stating that we need to replace the furnace at the garage. We could go to oil for \$5000 - \$6000 and then buy oil for \$1500 per year. The Garage has three pieces of equipment going in and out and uses a lot of oil. We won't need oil. The wood is free. Marshall Patmos asked where the free wood is he'd like to get in on that deal. The Town picks the wood up on the sides of the road - it's free for them for the taking, replied Bruce Russell. Helen Trope asked if Bruce got one estimate or three estimates on the Wood Furnace. Bruce stated that there are 4 suppliers. Mrs. Trope stated that \$10,000 was a lot of money for a heating system. Bruce Russell replied that the unit is \$5000 to \$6000 and the distribution and covering area brings it up to around \$10000. David Fields asked how long the system should last and Bruce stated it is waranteed for 15 years. Christine Greenwood asked how it operated nights and weekends and Bruce stated that it would go 2 days without filling and it has 300-gallon oil capacity backup to get through weekends. Barry Shonbeck stated that he burns wood and in figuring out the money saved, had Bruce figured in the time and labor required for collecting the wood, cutting the wood, splitting the wood, stacking the wood -- his wood doesn't do all that by itself. Bruce Russell said that the door is 30x30 so it can take large pieces of wood. They have been picking up roadside wood for the past three years for the old system. Article Eight was voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

ARTICLE NINE - To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) to help support the work of the Community Kitchen, Inc. in Keene, NH. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee do not recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Article moved by Marshall Godon and seconded by Neil Van Zile. Marshall Gordon spoke to tha Artile stated that the Community Kitchen has been feeding those in need since 1983 in the entire Monadnock Region. Times have been especially difficult with more and more lay-offs and yet the Community Kitchen has risen to the occassion and taken care of them. They are grateful to Westmoreland for past donations. They deliver 24 boxes to Westmoreland residents. The cost is approximately 49¢/meal. The Kitchen runs on a lot of donated food and a lot of volunteers and their time. Nancy Fisken asked if people have to sign in. Marshall stated that they do and they have things on the computer as to needs. Lisa Moon asked the impact of \$2,000 is to the taxes on a \$100,000 home. Dick Frye stated that in "school terms" that would be about \$1.40/home. Robert Harcke asked why the Selectmen and Budget Committee do not recommend. G. Russell Austin stated that they would like to get it into the operational budget, line 4415 instead. Paul Vincent asked for clarification. Russ stated that it used to be under 4415, had to put in \$1 instead of 0. Jeff Rubin stated that if it was in the line item, it would not be earmarked for the Community Kitchen. Russ said the line item would leave it open for whatever the people say are their wishes. JoAnn LaBarre stated that the Kitchen gave \$2562 in benefits, and Southwest Community gave \$6600 in benefits. Marshall Gordon stated that they are actually only asking for one-half of what the Kitchen is spending on Westmoreland. Richard Daschbach stated that there is some benefit to decline. It gives us opportunity to focus and think. If one is hurt on a job, they apply for Workers Compensation. If an employer contests the Workers Compensation, it could take up to two years or more for compensation to the individual, and then at only 2/3 pay. Meanwhile, their earnings are immediately reduced. Sarah Bonneau asked if we are discussing Line 4415 now. Moderator Heed stated that we can discuss Line 4415 in Article 18. Article Nine was voted in the affirmative by Hand Vote 80 YES.

ARTICLE TEN - To see if the Town will vote to paint the Town Hall and raise and appropriate the sum of thirteen thousand dollars (\$13,000) for this purpose. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Motion moved by G. Russell Austin and seconded by Paul Vincent. G. Russell Austin spoke to the Article stating that the last time the Town hall was painted was in 1990 for \$8,900. It is overdue for painting. Shutters are in poor shape. The Selectmen are not sure if they can get it done for \$13,000 or if it can all be done at one time for that amount. If the Article passes, we will go as far as we can and wait on the rest. We just kind of picked this amount because we don't know what it would cost. There are some organizations that said they would like to help out too. Dan LaFleur asked why we are voting on and amount when the Selectmen do not have an estimate on the cost of the job. Russ Austin stated that in February or March it is unlikely to get a quote. If it doesn't pass, it's just one more year that it will deteriorate. Article passes with Hand Vote 101 - YES, 60 - NO.

After Article Ten, we broke to count Article Six ballots at 8:30 pm. At 8:30 the results were read: out of 174 votes, 137 - YES, 37- NO. Article Six passes.

The Selectmen then asked to speak to make a few announcements.

Thank you to Marcia Starkey for her years as Supervisor of the Checklist. She has been a Supervisor since 1986 and now is moving on to Supervising Other Things.

Thank you to Fran Laurent who is going off Budget Committee. She will still be on the Conservation Committee.

Thank you to Jim Beeler for his two years as Overseer of Public Welfare.

Thank you to Bob and Elaine Wheeler who have served us reluctantly but very well as Auditors for the past two years, and to Elaine who has also served but is now going off the Joint Loss Management Committee.

Also JoAnn LaBarre is going on vacation from March  $18\,$  -  $27.\,$  She will be back on March  $28.\,$ 

ARTICLE ELEVEN - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-thousand dollars (\$70,000) for engineering projects. This will be a non-lapsing appropriation per RSA 32:7, VI and will not lapse until the engineering is completed or by December 31, 2003, whichever is sooner. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Motion moved by Lloyd Draper and seconded by G. Russell Austin. Mike Reed spoke to the Article stating that this is what is known as the "Dump Article". The State has required that we close the "dump". It does not recognize what we had done as a closure. If we do not adhere to their rules and regulations, the State recourse is to come in, do the work and chrage us! We had capped it some years back and believed at that time that it was closed. The state did not regognize this. The Town may be able to do some of the work itself. Contamination will be closely checked. Engineering studies were done previously, but we got what we paid for back then. The estimate is 65,000 for the Ground Water Managemnt Plan and 1 year of well testing. The engineering study is about \$5,000 to cover. To cap, the state will reimburse us 20% of the old and new figures. JoAnn is in the pain-staking process of collecting all the old payment figures for us. Mr. VOse stated that he thought we had paid to have it closed and thought it had been closed. Mike Reed stated that the state did not recognize the work done. Barry Shonbeck asked about the wells that were tested. Mike Reed stated that he thought the testing with the two contaminated wells was within the site itself. 1998 was the last time they were tested. JoAnn LaBarre stated that we would be paying the Engineering portion this year, we are on the State's list for it to be completed by the end of 2003. The fine if this is not completed is \$1,000 per day and no 20% expenditure back. Larry Siegel asked for some clarification. Mike Reed stated that between 1985 and 1990 \$54,500 was spent and set up the procedure. The Transfer Station just recently got a permit to operate, thanks to JoAnn. The engineering study is needed to tell us what we need done. Some parts of it will need a rubber membrane. We're hoping to do a lot of the work ourselves with our new equipment we just passed through. The landfill sits on 6 acres, the actual dump site is about 2 acres and the estimate is around \$100,000 to complete. Article Eleven voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

ARTICLE TWELVE - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for an Audit in the year 2003. This will be a non-lapsing appropriation per RSA 32:7, VI and will not lapse until the audit is completed or by December 31, 2003, whichever is sooner. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Article moved by Mike Reed and seconded by G. Russell Austin. Bob Moore spoke to the Article. Elaine and I won voting mandate by 4 votes each to do the Audit and now we're looking at \$5,000. In speaking to Walpole, they do theirs every 5 years. Thinking if we would like to hold our budget costs down a bit, we could wait another year to do this audit. Patti Patmos asked if there was a legal time limit. Bob stated that he didn't think so, because we've never had one that he was aware of. Article Twelve is defeated by voice vote.

ARTICLE THIRTEEN - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixty-two thousandthree hundred dollars (\$62,300) to purchase a new body for the Rescue Truck, authorize the withdrawal of eight thousand one hundred eighteen dollars (\$8,118) from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose, authorize the transfer of up to six thousand nine hundred dollars (\$6,900) from the December 31st fund balance and to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend unanticipated money from state, federal or other governmental sources which become available during the year to reduce support required by taxation for this project. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Motion moved by Lloyd Draper and seconded by David Putnam. Michael Reed spoke to the article stating that this is a proposal to buy a new body for the chassis of the truck we presently have. We have researched some state government sources for some help. We asked the County Commissioners for assistance with some of the funding as we provide both Maplewood and the County Jail with services and neither pay taxes. 20% of our calls with the Rescue are to the Jail and Maplewood. They said that it was on the agenda, but Monday night was tabled. We received one quote - two were askef for, but one refused to give a quote. The chassis on the body now is in very poor shape. In order to keep Westmoreland well serviced, we really need this. Dan LaFleur asked the life expectancy of the truck on which they were placing this chassis. Harry Nelson stated the lifetime. Dan LaFleur asked whose lifetime? Harry stated that the last chassis was purchased in 1992 - this would go another 20 years. Dan asked if the body they were asking for tonight was going to fit the new truck they will need in 20 years. Jim Beeler spoke to say that the Townspeople need to call their representatives to voice the request for the County to chip in the \$15,000. Bob Harcke stated that we need to know what the funding is in order to vote. Moderator Peter Heed stated that we could amend the article to be upon the condition of receiving the funds. Marshall Patmos stated that raise and appropriate speaks of raising new money - the wording is confusing. Chrissy Greenwood asked how much this new body will hold. It will hold what we have, it is a bit bigger, stated Harry Nelson. Article Thirteen voted in the affirmative by voice vote.

ARTICLE FOURTEEN - To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of bridge reconstruction and to raise twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to be placed in this fund. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Motion moved by Lloyd Draper and seconded by Wesley Staples. Bruce Russell spoke to the article stating that we have 13 bridges in town, 7 are in need of replacing/repairing to be up to State Regulation. This is to set up the Capital Reserve Fund so that we can get things started. Next year we will put in more eighty percent recovery from the state in the next year, not this year to cover costs under state funding. We need to outlay funds to be reimbursed when they are finished. Voce vote in the affirmative and Article Fourteen passes.

ARTICLE FIFTEEN - To see if the Town will vote to deposit 50% of the revenues collected pursuant to RSA 79-A (the Land Use Change Tax) into a Westmoreland Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5 III as authorized under the provisions of RSA 79-A:25II. The Selectmen recommend and the Budget Committee do not recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Motion moved by Marshall Patmos and seconded by George Duke. Marshall Patmos spoke to the Article stating that this is the only article that does not require

new appropriation. Using last years figures this would have put \$2000 plus dollard into this fund with the rest into the general fund. This fund will be used for assistance and aid to conservation easement assistance. We can't do much with a couple of thousand a year, but it is a start, and it won't add to the budget. We will go after mortgage funding and grants as they become available. Barry Shonbeck asked who would distribute the funds and who would decide where the monies would go. Marshall stated that the Conservation Commission would have public process and meetings to go through. Jim Blake stated that the Conservation Committee had some questions on the Master Plan Survey, and this Town wishes to stay very high on the land conservation areas. Other Towns are receiving 25% to 100% of the monies received by their towns from the Land Use Change Tax into their Conservation Funds. Robert Moore Jr. stated that he had served on the State Board and thinks that the the monies from the Tax should go back to reduce taxes. Sarah Bonneau stated that she disagrees with Mr. Moore -- we are not talking about a lot of monies here, and is asking to have it supported -- this is a volunteer commission. Voice vote to the affirmative passes Article Fifteen.

ARTICLE SIXTEEN - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eighty thousand two hundred eighty-seven dollars (\$80,287) for a complete revaluation and authorize the withdrawal of forty-three thousand five hundred sixteen dollars (\$43,516) from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. The balance of thirty-six thousand seven hundred seventy-one dollars (\$36,771) is to come from general taxation. This will be a non-lapsing appropriation and will not lapse until the revaluation is complete. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Motion moved by Lloyd Draper and seconded by Wendy Putnam. G. Russell Austin stated that this revaluation is long overdue. The last one was done in 1989. According to the State, we are of the first groups to be done in 2003. The Selectmen surveyed companies and received 7 - 8 quotes. We really wanted to go with Avitar again. Mike Reed got on the phone and they will give us the best price as well as the software. Mike Reed stated it is much like the Dump situation. It is a State Law now and if we vote this down, the State will have it done and we will have to pay their fees. We have been petitioned by the Court for this and we must do it. Tom Reish stated that he recalls the 1989 revaluation as being dreadful and questioned the quality of the work. Mike Reed stated that Avitar is one of this state's approved firms. Fran Laurent asked if the Tax Bills would be generated from the software we get in this package. Elaine Moore stated that Walpole has Avitar software and it is working well. It is :friendly software". JoAnn will like the software and they will work well with her. Voice vote to the Affirmative and Article Sixteen passes.

Motion moved by Lloyd Draper and Seconded by June Hammond. Susan West asked where the \$80 comes from. JoAnn LaBarre explained that the Jotham Lord Fund interest has almost always gone to the Library. The amount of the \$80 is the 2001 interest. The state informed us that this is the way it needs to be worded now. Article Seventeen passes with voice vote in the affirmative.

<u>ARTICLE EIGHTEEN</u> - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$644,431, which represents the operating budget. Said sum does not include special ro individual articles addressed.

Motion moved by Lloyd Draper and seconded by Larry Siegel. Marshall Gordon stated that we weem to be playing catch-up tonight. It's great we put money in but we shouldn't wait on everything. Jim Beeler proposed amendment to Line 4415. "By the way, I see the Overseer of Public Welfare's salary doubled this year. Due to my present situation, I would have run again." He would like to amend the article to increase line 4415 to add \$2700 to: Monadnock Family Services of \$1500, Home Health Care \$700 and Southwest Community Services \$500. Southwest Community Services has given the largest amount of cash services to Westmoreland. Motion moved by G. Russell Austin and seconded by Marshall Gordon. Marshall Godon spoke to the amended article stating the need for funding these agencies. Bob Harcke asked if we are funding these agencies twice by this amendment. Jim Beeler stated that there is no funding of Welfare line for the agencies. The Welfare Funding is running into the thousands for assistance. Bob Moore stated that any of these agencies being funded by the county would be double taxation on us. Fran Laurent stated that this is totally new funding and if we fund this one, another, then another will be knocking at our door. Sarah Bonneau stated that the county budget does not have funding in for Monadnock Family Services. Elaine Moore agreed with Fran. Amended article voted in the affirmative.

Sue West asked to amend Article 18 to increase Line 4550 to change from \$20580 to \$23,000. Richard Daschbach seconded motion. Fran Laurent spoke to the amendment that the amount of money appropriated wias adequate funding for the Library. Barry Shonbeck asked what was gained or lost by this additional \$2500. Sue West stated that they would buy more new books. There are 72 patrons, 700 plus use the Library, we had 500 volunteer hours given, this saves us. Dick Frye asked how much money is in the budget for new books without this \$2500. Sue West stated that each book runs \$10 - \$15. \$3229 was spent last year, there is \$2500 budgeted for this year. Grants have been applied for to help fund the Library - New Building Grants, Energy Grant - These funds are in the "Building Fund" for projects in the future - oil furnace, painting the building, etc. Hand vote defeated this amendment by 51 - YES, 57 - NO.

- G. Russell Austin moved to amend Article 18 to raise Line 4153, Legal Expenses to \$6000 from \$4500. Lloyd Draper seconded the motion. Fran Laurent stated that it is a matter of deep pockets, some can be taken care of. If there is a lot there, it will be used. George Duke akded if we run over the \$4500, why can't it go into next year's budget. Mike Reed stated that we cannot do that. We have already spent \$200 on legal fees and it is only March. We have litigation on with Hubbard Farms right now. If you've ever dealt with lawyers, you'd understand. Voted in the affirmative and amendment passes.
- G. Russell Austin stated that the request to pay the fire cheif and members of the fire department should be left to the Town to vote on not the Selectmen or the Budget Committee so he moved to amend to raise Line 4220 to increase \$4035. Amendment seconded by Wendy Putnam. Dan LaFleur asked how the monies was to be dispursed among the department. Mike Reed stated that Cheif Nelson would keep a log as to the number of calls each member responds to (there are 18 people on the squad). They have unlimited calls - not everyone is able to respond - it's getting harder and harder to get people to be able to leave work. The fund is a set amount. Fran Laurent stated that proposal was a last minute proposal right before the final budget meeting. Fran stated that the Budget Committee had budgeted \$1000 to be prorated to \$850 for the Fire Chief only as originally proposed. Some Towns pay their fire departments, some pay just the chiefs and a lot don't pay their volunteers. Mike Reed spoke again to the amendment. Fran Laurendt stated that this was all worked out last minute and perhaps we should postpone this increase this year and work out what is good for the Fire Department and the Town and come back next year with a full and complete work-up. Ballot vote was requested and signed by five registered

voters. At 10:50 pm ballot vote results were read on the amendment to Article Eighteen and was defeated with 106 votes: 43 - YES, 63 - NO.

Amended Article Eighteen now reads with an Operating Budget of \$648,631. This reflects an increase of \$4200. Amended Article Eighteen voted in the Affirmative by voice vote.

### ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT Activities in 2002

In 2002, the Zoning Board of Adjustment had nine (9) requests for Variances, of which three (3) were granted, three (3) were denied, two (2) were withdrawn, and one (1) is pending. Upon appeal one denied variance was reheard and granted. None were denied.

Zoning Hearing Applications consist of five different components: the denied Zoning Permit Application from the Zoning Administrator, Application for Hearing Appeal available in the Selectmen's Office, a diagram showing current condition of property and proposed changes, and the filing fee.

As of January 1, 2003, the filing fee for a zoning hearing is \$55.00 plus \$4.00 for each abutter, payable to the Town of Westmoreland.

### **Planning Board**

The Westmoreland Planning Board holds regular meetings on the second Tuesday of each month. The meetings are held in the Selectmen's office of the Town Hall and begin at 7:30 PM.

In 2002 there were 8 Site Plan approvals and 3 Subdivision approvals. Meetings were very busy toward the end of the year and 2003 is shaping up to be just as busy.

The board experienced some losses this year with the passing of Reginald Simino and the resignations of Linwood Burt and JoAnn LaBarre. Reggie served on the planning board for many years including the last 5 as chairman. He worked hard to make sure that the issues brought before the board were being addressed in a sensible but fair manner. He also made sure that the board addressed critical issues. Lindy was our historian – when questions of former roads and other planning issues came up, he was able to give historical perspective to the changes that had occurred over the years. JoAnn was our researcher; she was wonderful at checking with the appropriate agencies and organizations for answers when the board ran into puzzling questions. We greatly miss these members who had the interests of Westmoreland and its citizens at heart. We welcome Alan Johnson and Laurie Burt as new members of the board, and Elaine Hall as secretary. The Selectman are in the process of finding an alternate for the board as well.

The Master Plan subcommittee, energetically led by Jim Blake, has worked very hard on updating our town master plan. The final draft review will be early in 2003 and the new plans should be available for purchase at cost in the Selectman's office toward the end of the year. Refer to their committee report elsewhere in this booklet.

We would like to remind residents that booklets listing the necessary steps and applicable ordinances for subdivision or site plan review are available in the Selectmen's office. Also, if a resident is planning any changes or construction on any land in town, a call to the Zoning Administrator or Building Inspector would be wise. This is the best way to find out if any necessary permits or processes are needed.

### HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Westmoreland Historical Society was formed in 1955. The purpose of the group was to serve as a historical society and to preserve the historical Corner School house on the corner of the River Road and Poocham Road. The group is currently writing a book on all the houses in Westmoreland, new and old. The project was started in the Fall of 1997 with the hopes that it would take us seven years to complete. Properties are researched from the most current owners to as far back as we can go, alot of times back to the 1700's. The group, called the House Committee, has dwindled since 1997 but we are overall on schedule. This has been a very challenging year for me and I sincerely thank the people of Westmoreland and the selectmen who have been so supportive of the Highway Department.

### POLICE DEPARTMENT

Before I begin with reporting the Police Department statistics, I would like to take the opportunity to announce a change at the Westmoreland Police Department. For those of you who don't yet know, Jack Zeller has retired, and as of October 1st I have been serving as the town's Constable. I am a full-time Police Officer with the City of Keene Police Department. I am currently assigned to the investigations division as a police detective. I have a master's degree in criminal Justice and bring several years experience in patrol, investigations, and crime scene processing to the job. I look forward to serving your community, and appreciate the warm welcomes I have already received by those who have met me.

There have been some questions as to how to get in touch with the Constable. Since I am a part-time officer for the town this can get a bit confusing. The first and foremost thing to remember is this; if you have an emergency of any sort, call 911 and the appropriate emergency service personnel will respond immediately. If there is a situation that is not an emergency, but you need police service, you should call mutual aid at 352-1100. For non-emergency problems, animal complaints, business related issues, questions, comments, or to relay police related information, etc. I have a dedicated line, in my home, for these types of calls. The number is 357-7305.

I have spent some time reviewing the police logs from the past several years to compare them with the 2002 activity. It appears as though calls for police service have followed a typical pattern over the past few years. The majority of calls for service revolve around animal complaints and motor vehicle complaints. I have already mitigated a few animal complaints, and will continue to do so as they arise. However, animal owners should make a conscious effort not to allow your animals to run astray or become a nuisance. I am in the process of compiling some data to find the motor vehicle problem areas in town. I will then try to coordinate a targeted motor vehicle enforcement routine.

2002 showed a sharp reduction in violent crimes, compared to other years. The most significant decline was the number of calls for families in need of assistance with domestic violence issues. There were no reported sexual assaults and no reported criminal threatening.

As done in the past, I will continue to rely on State Police to handle the majority of motor vehicle accidents and major crimes. The State Police have the personnel, emergency vehicles, and specialized equipment to better handle these situations. I have spoken to Lt. Kelly and Sgt. Reisenberg from Troop C and both have offered their continued support to handle these matters in the town. This is greatly appreciated, as it saves the taxpayers thousands of dollars each year.

### WESTMORELAND PUBLIC LIBRARY ANNUAL REPORT 2002

One of the major changes at the library has been the addition of two new Trustees, making a total of five on the Board. A landscaping project to honor Marion Starkey was completed with a garden and sundial in front of the new addition. Snow removal from the paved parking lot has been much easier. Book shelves have been repaired by additions to some of the older stacks, and a new bookcase was made for newly acquired materials.

Following are some goals that were achieved in addition to providing books, reference services, and programs to the public: the safety and security of materials; entry of our juvenile inventory on a database record, coordination with the Westmoreland School for a website, the increase of our children's programs, and consequently a strengthening community involvement with the library. With regard to safety and security, we now regularly back up all computer files, and have a photo-inventory of our equipment and furnishings. We have collaborated with the School to add information about the Public Library on their website. All Juvenile Fiction and Non-fiction materials have been uploaded on our File Maker, a copy of which should soon be available for use by the School. As part of their community service and as volunteers, six students have worked at the Library, helping with the database, maintaining and repairing the collection, and offering story hour for young children.

Our association with Nubanusit Coop connects our library to other libraries in the area and to the New Hampshire State Library. Every library is using Epixtech, a new Interlibrary Loan software for the ordering and tracking of books borrowed throughout the State. The staff has participated in workshops to learn about this new program, HTML programming, E-books, and puppetry. Our library hosted a Nubanusit Coop meeting in September. Through the State Library, we received a Library Services and Technology Assistance Grant of \$500 for multicultural and diversity materials. We were able to update our juvenile collection in these areas.

The Library was open a total of 149 days; 75 new patrons registered and 2830 patrons visited.4295 materials were circulated of which 56% was fiction, 21 items were in Large Print. 39 reference questions were answered.205 patrons used the reading room, and 70 used the computer. We borrowed 281 materials from and loaned 43 items to other libraries. Purchased acquisitions included 133 adult and 116 juvenile books. Donated acquisitions included 80 adult books, 111 juvenile books, 25 audio tapes, 63 videos, and 10 CDs.

The Library reports that 775 items were withdrawn from the juvenile fiction, adult fiction and biography sections. 9 books were lost, and 214 items were overdue throughout the year. Patrons donated responsibly to our contribution jar when returning overdue books. 26 books were repaired. Our discarded books were added to our Annual Book Sale which brought in a total of \$568.55. The raffle of a quilt, donated by Rosalie Walker, raised \$389.

Our Assistant Librarian, Elizabeth Landry, moved away in November, and Julie King was hired to fill this position.

Volunteers served 542 hours at the library, helping at the circulation desk, adding inventory to the database, shelving, processing new acquisitions, and helping staff with technical aspects of the computers. A workshop for volunteers was held in March.

**Programs:** In addition to weekly visits from the Kindergarten and First Grades, and visits from the Third Grade to their Community Library, we held a Game Night in February, and Story Hour for 3 and 4 year olds met in the spring, under the direction of Danielle Simmons. An Intergenerational Story Hour was held in the fall, and led by two students as part of their community service project. The Summer Reading Program, based on the theme "Lions, Tigers, and Books, Oh My!" involved many volunteers and children in lively programs. Christina Gibbons gave a slide presentation on the History of Women's Literacy. A quilting group met for several weeks. 298 Children and 119 adults attended programs at the library throughout the year.

Some of our goals for 2003 are to rebuild the workstation and the circulation desk area to be more ergonomic for volunteers and staff and easier for patrons to access. A completed inventory of adult fiction and non-fiction is planned. This will involve our updating the non-fiction areas, and entering titles on our database. We will be updating all patron information so we have an accurate patron file.

In summary, the library has been fortunate this year in having the assistance of so many volunteers. We continue to build on the strong support of patrons, and townspeople who assist us in many aspects of our services, and to collaborate with other town organizations for mutual benefit.

### Master Plan Subcommittee

The Planning Board setup our subcommittee late in 2001 with the goal of updating the town's Master Plan of 1986. A master plan is a document developed by a community to guide its future land use and development and is therefore intended to aid the planning board in its duties.

As an initial part of the process of generating a new master plan, we conducted a town survey. The purpose was to determine public concerns and perceptions of the present town and what direction the people would like to see the town take in the future. From the results we put together a list of charts and recommendations for town growth.

The mechanics of initiating the survey was to modify a survey used in the previous master planning process. We reviewed town surveys from similar sized communities in the area using a library of surveys from SWRPC. We had 850 forms printed. About 150 went to out of town property owners and 650 were distributed to all post office boxes and town mailboxes. This then included all town property owners and renters. The forms were mailed out late February.

With regard to results, we received a total of 241 forms which included 277 individual responses. 202 forms were from residents. With 576 households (per 2000 census) this means a 35 % response rate for households. About 150 forms were sent to out of town property owners. 38 of these forms were returned for a 25% return rate. Both of these return rates were quite good. The returns were then tabulated onto a survey worksheet and charted using Excel and included with the draft master plan.

In addition to the survey, I made public presentations to the Historical Society and at a town hall meeting hosted by the Conservation Commission. An article was also included in the Westmorelander. From these and the survey results we developed an understanding of what direction the people wanted the community to grow.

The master plan includes a number of sections that are devoted to various aspects of a community, including land use, housing, conservation, economics, public service, roads and public services. The 2000 census, Southwest Regional Planning Commission, and town office data were valuable sources of information. Our team then began the updating of these sections. First drafts of 10 of the 12 sections have been completed. A new zoning map was completed and a development constraints map is underway. We are expecting to begin the review process early this spring.

### 2002 REPORT OF THE WESTMORELAND CONSERVATION COMMISSION

NH RSA 36-A provides a Conservation Commission with the basic purpose to identify, protect and conserve the land and water resources of their community. Additionally, as charged by RSA 483-A, the commission also reviews wetland applications for local review in conjunction with the NH Wetlands board. A wetland application (forms available in the town office) is necessary for any activity that involves projects to excavate, remove, dredge, fill or construct a structure in any surface waters or wetlands of the state.

The Commission continues to work on a natural resource inventory that will give an overview of the towns' natural resources including wetland and fragile soil information that highlights some of the environmentally sensitive areas of the town. Working with Southwest Region Planning Commission, the Commission has had digital maps and overlays prepared of soils data, wetland and water resources, aquifers, floodplains, aerial photos, topographic and general land use. An updated digital zoning map has also been prepared to assist with town planning. The base maps and overlays which provide a comprehensive look at the town are available for use and are helpful to the selectmen, commission, planning and zoning boards and citizens.

In addition to having reviewed a number of applications for the planning board, we are assisting with the update of the town's master plan. Member Jim Blake is chairing the plan update subcommittee.

Permanent land protection and the conservation of open space in town is an important issue as highlighted in the results of a town survey completed earlier in the year. Efforts to assist with land conservation and protection are worthwhile. A Conservation Fund was approved at the 2002 town meeting where 50% of the current-use penalty tax would be put in the fund for purposes of land protection. The commission has already had some public information sessions and has plans for land protection information and education efforts and perhaps forming a committee of interested citizens to assist with the effort.

The Connecticut River Corridor Management Plan for the town was updated in 2002 and will be submitted as part of the master plan update.

2002 saw a terrible loss to the Town and the Conservation Commission because of the untimely passing of long time Commission member Fran Laurent. She was a conscientious and dedicated individual in all of her civic efforts and provided a practical approach to the conservation of natural resources through her work on the Commission. Fran is remembered for her gentle manner, high standards, and perseverance and is one of the people in life that we feel honored to have worked with through the years.

The Westmoreland Conservation Commission meets on the first Tuesday of the month and is always looking for interested individuals to join our ranks or to help us with the tasks at hand. Feel free to contact any member with questions or concerns you may have about environmental or conservation issues.

### **ANNUAL REPORT - 2002 Wantastiquet Region River Subcommittee Connecticut River Joint Commissions**

We have distributed boating guides to the river and a new map and guide for the Connecticut River Byway, a regional economic development project focusing on the river, natural resources, recreation, farming, history, culture, and local products. Copies of both of these free publications are available.

We have continued to carry out our legal obligation to provide information and assistance to the states, towns, and local landowners on projects near the river, advising the State of New Hampshire on the rehabilitation of the Chesterfield/Brattleboro bridge and expansion of a marina in Hinsdale. We also provided the Connecticut River Flood Control Commission with advice on revised floodplain maps.

We have encouraged all towns in our region, including Westmoreland, to review our Connecticut River Corridor Management Plan, and to incorporate its recommendations as they update town plans and revise their zoning ordinances, particularly for shoreland protection. Westminster has recently accomplished this, and other towns are following suit. All riverfront landowners should be aware that the NH Shoreland Protection Act now applies to the Connecticut River. Contact the town office for more information.

Westmoreland currently has a vacancy on the Subcommittee, following the resignation of long-time member and secretary, Jan Kos. The Subcommittee is most grateful to Jan for her dedicated service to the river. Citizens interested in representing the Town are encouraged to contact the Selectmen.

The Wantastiquet Region River Subcommittee is advisory and has no regulatory authority. The public is welcome to participate in our meetings, on the fourth Wednesday evening of every other month, usually at the Westmoreland Town Hall. More information, including a calendar, advice on bank erosion and obtaining permits for work in or near the river, and a summary of the Connecticut River Corridor Management Plan, is on the web at www.crjc.org/localaction.htm.

To the inhabitants of the school district in the Town of Westmoreland qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Westmoreland School Gymnasium in said district on the 14th day of March, 2003, at 7:00 O'clock in the evening to act upon the following articles:

- <u>ARTICLE 1</u>: To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- ARTICLE 2: To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the statutory obligations of the District, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 3: To see if the District will vote to appropriate and authorize the school board to transfer up to \$5,000 of its unencumbered funds, if any, remaining on hand at the end of fiscal year June 30, 2003, to be deposited in the Capital Reserve Fund established by the voters of the District on March 16, 2001, for the purpose of major renovation/reconstruction of school buildings and related costs, or to take any other action in relation thereto. Said appropriation to be funded from any excess unreserved funds over \$33,000, which is available on June 30, 2003. (The Westmoreland School Board and the Westmoreland Budget Committee support favorable action on this warrant article.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Westmoreland School Gymnasium in said district on the 4th day of October, 2002, at 7:00 O'clock in the evening to act upon the following articles.

The special Westmoreland School District Meeting was called to order by Moderator Peter Heed on Friday, October 4, 2002, at 7:00 p.m. at the Westmoreland School. The Moderator reviewed the rules and procedure of acting upon one amendment before moving on to the next amendment.

ARTICLE 1:

To see if the District will vote to ratify and be bound by the financial provisions of a four-year collective bargaining agreement between the Westmoreland School Board and the Westmoreland Education Association which calls for the following increases in salaries and benefits, said sums representing the additional costs attributable to the increase of salary and benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year: \$9,536.00 in 2001-2002; \$25,549.00 in 2002-2003; \$24,763.00 in 2003-2004; and \$25,829.00 in 2004-2005; and further, to appropriate \$9,536.00 from the 2001-2002 undesignated fund balance (surplus) to cover the costs of the increases attributed to the 2001-2002 fiscal year, and further to approve the cost items for 2002-2003, said sums to come from a transfer of appropriations within the current approved budget and will not require any additional funds to be raised through general taxation for the 2002-2003 fiscal year. (The Westmoreland Budget Committee and the Westmoreland School Board recommend favorable action on this article.)

Motion by Michael Acerno that the District vote to ratify and be bound by the financial provisions of a four-year collective bargaining agreement between the Westmoreland School Board and the Westmoreland Education Association which calls for the following increases in salaries and benefits, said sums representing the additional costs attributable to the increase of salary and benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year: \$9,536.00 in 2001-2002; \$25,549.00 in 2002-2003; \$24,763.00 in 2003-2004; and \$25,829.00 in 2004-2005; and further, to appropriate \$9,536.00 from the 2001-2002 undesignated fund balance (surplus) to cover the costs of the increases attributed to the 2001-2002 fiscal year, and further to approve the cost items for 2002-2003, said sums to come from a transfer of appropriations within the current approved budget and will not require any additional funds to be raised through general taxation for the 2002-2003 fiscal year. After the Pledge of Allegiance and National Anthem, the Moderator reviewed the rules and procedure of acting upon one amendment before moving on to the next amendment.

Mr. Peter Heed introduced the administration from the S.A.U.: Dr. Phillip McCormack, Mr. John Harper, Mr. Thomas Kane, Mr. Douglas Hatfield, Ms. Pat Trow Parent, Mr. Timothy Ruehr, and the Westmoreland School Principal, Mr. William Gurney.

<u>ARTICLE 1</u>: To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or offices chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Motion by Mr. Stuart Adams that the District appropriate a supplemental appropriation of \$15,000.00 for additional special education and special education transportation costs for the current school year. This amount will be funded from existing revenues including unanticipated Medicaid reimbursements and insurance refunds and dividends. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Flossie Grav.

Motion by Mr. Michael Acerno to amend Article 2 by increasing the sum by \$29,892.00 to read \$44,892.00. This amount will be funded from existing revenues including unanticipated catastrophic aid revenue, unanticipated Medicaid reimbursements and insurance refunds and dividends. Motion seconded by Mrs. Flossie Gray.

(The Westmoreland School Board and the Westmoreland Budget Committee support favorable action on this warrant article.)

Motion by Mr. Stuart Adams to pass over Article 3. The motion was seconded by Ms. Flossie Gray.

No discussion.

Article 3 passed over by a voice vote.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the District will vote to ratify and be bound by the financial provisions of a three-year collective bargaining agreement between the Westmoreland School Board and the Westmoreland Education Association which calls for the following increases in salaries and benefits: \$7,752.00 in 2001-2002; \$46,268.00 in 2002-2003; and \$29,841.00 in 2003-2004; and, further, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,752.00 as a deficit appropriation to fund the costs for the 2001-2002 fiscal year, and further to raise and appropriate the sum of \$46,268.00 to fund the cost of the 2002-2003 fiscal year. (The Westmoreland School Board supports favorable action on this warrant article. The Westmoreland Budget Committee does not support favorable action on this warrant article.)

Motion by Mrs. Fran Laurent, Budget Committee, that the District raise and appropriate the sum of two million, seven hundred forty-one thousand, five hundred fifty-three (\$2,741,553.00) dollars for the support of schools, for the salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the statutory obligations of the District. Motion seconded by Mr. Lloyd Draper.

Mrs. Laurent spoke on how the Budget Committee decided to cut the \$9,049 from the school budget. She stated that, basically, the Budget Committee agreed with the School Board's recommended budget. She stated that the cuts were basically in salaries for substitute teachers, custodian supplies, new equipment, leaving the school nurse position at a 63% position, as opposed to the 75% position requested by the School Board.

Motion by Mr. Stuart Adams to amend Article 7 by increasing the sum by \$9,049.00 to read \$2,750,602.00. Motion seconded by Mrs. Flossie Gray.

 $\mbox{Mr.}$  Stuart Adams explained why the cuts  $\mbox{Mrs.}$  Laurent had presented should not be made.

Discussion ensued.

Motion to amend Article 7 passed by a voice vote.

Article 7, as amended, passed by a voice vote.

ARTICLE 8: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,211.00 to fund the costs associated with the expansion of the Kindergarten program at Westmoreland School from 60 percent to 100 percent, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (The Westmoreland School Board supports favorable action on this warrant article. The Westmoreland Budget Committee does not support favorable action on this warrant article.)

Motion by Mr. Stuart Adams that the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,211.00 to fund the costs associated with the expansion of the Kindergarten program at Westmoreland School from 60 percent to 100 percent, or to take any other action in relation thereto. Motion seconded by Mrs. Flossie Gray.

Dr. Dan Lafleur spoke to this article, stating what parents were interested in and that the study committee, formed to look into the expansion of the kindergarten program, had looked at what other districts were doing. He stated that a survey was sent to the parents of children under the age of five. He noted that a majority of the surveys were returned and that all people showed an interest in a full day kindergarten program.

Considerable discussion ensued.

A ballot vote was requested on this Article.

Votes: Yes: 109; No: 89

Article 8 passes.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 to fund the costs associated with major renovation of the playground at Westmoreland School, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (The Westmoreland School Board supports favorable action on this warrant article. The Westmoreland Budget Committee does not support favorable action on this warrant article.)

Motion by Mr. Stuart Adams that District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 to fund the costs associated with major renovation of the playground at Westmoreland School, or to take any other action in relation thereto. Motion seconded by Mrs. Flossie Gray.

Mrs. Dawn Merrill, Playground Committee, spoke on this Article. She stated that the committee had done considerable research on costs, standards of the current playground vs. a new playground, American Disability Act (ADA) laws,

etc. She stated that some of the old playground could be incorporated into the new proposed playground.

Mr. Doug Adler asked about fund raising the money for a new playground.

Mrs. Merrill stated that fund raising has been taking place, stating that the PTA had some fund raisers. Currently they have approximately \$6,300.

Mrs. Laurent stated that it appeared that the present playground was a safety issue and that the present playground just needed to be made safer.

Considerable discussion ensued.

A request for a ballot vote was requested on this Article.

Vote: Yes: 69: No: 105

Article 9 was defeated.

ARTICLE 10: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be deposited in the capital reserve fund established by the voters of the District on March 16, 2001, for the purpose of major renovation/reconstruction of school buildings and related costs, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (The Westmoreland School Board and the Westmoreland Budget Committee support favorable action on this warrant article.)

Motion by Mr. Stuart Adams that the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be deposited in the capital reserve fund established by the voters of the District on March 16, 2001, for the purpose of major renovation/reconstruction of school buildings and related costs, or to take any other action in relation thereto. Motion seconded by Mrs. Flossie Gray.

Article 10 passed by a voice vote.

ARTICLE 11: To see if the District will appropriate and authorize the school board to transfer up to \$12,618.00 of its unencumbered funds, if any, remaining on hand at the end of fiscal year, June 30, 2002, to the Special Education/High School Tuition Fund established by the voters of the District on March 16, 2001, for the purpose of paying future year unanticipated special education and/or high school tuitions or to take any other action in relation thereto. (The Westmoreland School Board and the Westmoreland Budget Committee support favorable action on this warrant article.)

Motion by Mr. Stuart Adams that the District will appropriate and authorize the school board to transfer up to \$12,618.00 of its unencumbered funds, if any, remaining on hand at the end of fiscal year, June 30, 2002, to the Special Education/High School Tuition Fund established by the voters of the District on March 16, 2001, for the purpose of paying future year unanticipated special education and/or high school tuitions or to take any other action in relation thereto. Motion seconded by Mrs. Flossie Gray.

No discussion.

Article 11 passed by a voice vote.

Mrs. Lisa Moon asked if Article 4 could be reconsidered for less money. Mr. Heed stated that we could not go back to Article 4 because of the motion made.

Motion by Mr. Stuart Adams and seconded by Mrs. Flossie Gray to adjourn the meeting at  $11:20\ P.M.$

### ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

Several important things have occurred at Westmoreland School which have contributed to a productive and positive year for students and staff. Some of these include the formal introduction of an all-day kindergarten program, the passage of a multi-year collective bargaining agreement between the school board and teachers' association, the completion of renovation projects in and around the building, and the recruitment of new staff to fill several teacher vacancies. The positive learning environment that exists at the school has also contributed to student success for those at the school and those who have moved on to Keene High School. As has become characteristic of Westmoreland Elementary School, a great deal of community support and involvement have been of tremendous value to school initiatives.

Probably the single greatest initiative that has occurred this year is the formal introduction of the all-day kindergarten program. This follows a highly successful pilot program last year that was supported by private funding. This initiative provides children with the opportunity to spend the entire day at the school and, thus, greatly increases the amount of time available to develop skills needed to be successful in school. The success of similar programs in other SAU 29 schools, as well as in other schools throughout the country, indicates that students will have more time to master respective academic concepts and skills; more opportunity to become involved in school activities and develop a greater sense of belonging; and greater opportunity to work in groups, as well as independently, and to develop the ability to accept responsibility. Initial indications are that the 17 students in this year's kindergarten class are meeting with the same types of success that is in evidence in other SAU 29 schools with all-day kindergarten. Monitoring the success of these students over time will greatly assist our efforts to assess the long-term benefits and impact of this program.

The staff has continued its efforts to assess the effectiveness of the existing curriculum. This assessment has resulted in initiatives in the areas of reading and math. The role of the reading specialist has been expanded to work with students in the upper grades. A new math program, Houghton-Mifflin, has been implemented in kindergarten through grade 6. This program places a major emphasis on problem solving and common applicators of mathematical concepts. There is also a strong remedial component that is beneficial to students.

Decisions relative to curriculum and programming are based on teacher assessment of student performance. This usually occurs in two ways. First is the observation of students in daily classroom activities. Research shows that this is probably the most effective form of assessment. However, other forms of assessment exist. One is the analysis of student performance on various testing instruments. The state mandated testing program (NHEIAP) is one test that is used throughout the state. Given the relatively small class sizes in Westmoreland, it is most helpful to look at average scores over the last three years. The three-year average scores for Westmoreland's third grade students in English/language arts and math (the only subjects tested) show some gain, but overall, are at a less than state average level for those students scoring "Basic" or better. "Basic" is what the State Department of Education equates to performing at grade level. The trend in evidence at this level indicates this is an area that the school staff needs to monitor more closely over the year.

The opposite is true of sixth grade scores that show Westmoreland students' three-year average scores (at the "Basic" or better level) as higher than the state averages in all subject areas tested -- English/language arts, mathematics, science and social studies. Differences between Westmoreland and state average scores in math, science and social studies differ as much as 12 to 18 percentage points. These are significant differences.

The academic background and skills that Westmoreland students leave the elementary school with has contributed to their success at Keene High School. This year, 97 students from Westmoreland attend Keene High School. Overall, their grade point average (GPA) increased slightly this year to 2.74, which equates to an approximate "B-" average. Student performance was particularly strong in the areas of English, science, social studies, and world language where 61, 66, 74, and 67 percent of the students taking courses in these subject areas, respectively, attained a grade of "B" or better. In addition to a solid academic performance, students from Westmoreland continue to participate in many cocurricular activities (e.g., football, hockey, soccer, basketball, Drama Club, Envirothon, Interact, National Honor Society). The attendance rate for Westmoreland students at the high school is 95.4 percent. This is higher than the rate for the whole school. A Westmoreland student was also one of the top ten graduates in the Class of 2002.

Students and staff at Westmoreland School continue to greatly benefit from a very strong community commitment. One measure of this is the level of community involvement in, and attendance at, school-related activities. Of notable comment is the tremendous community effort that was put forth to replace the playground equipment. Thanks to the hard work and commitment of numerous community members and volunteers, the children now have a wonderful play area. Community members who continue to serve on various committees also greatly facilitate improvements to the school. In particular, the work of the facilities committee continues to provide the focus and needed planning to assure a safe, clean and well-equipped learning environment. Community attendance at various curriculum and parent nights, as well as athletic contests, is another example of the way in which the community is actively involved in the school.

The staff at Westmoreland School and I are very thankful for the community's support and positive vote on the teachers' contract. It helped retain those staff members who have made a commitment to Westmoreland and its children, and it will greatly aid the administration's efforts to recruit new staff when necessary.

Effective communication between the school and community facilitates this type of community involvement and support. The publication of the *Blue Storm News* is a wonderful expansion of the school's attempt to keep community members informed. I ask that, in addition to reading this publication, you take an opportunity to visit the school, and/or attend a PTA or school board meeting. I also ask that you attend the annual district meeting on March 14 at 7:00 p.m. in the school gymnasium. Your input is important.

### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

We are enjoying a very good year at Westmoreland School. This fall, we welcomed 17 new kindergarten students to begin our first official year of all day kindergarten. As of January 8, 2003, our enrollment is 157 students and our class sizes are:

Our projected enrollment for the next school year is 153.

### Academics

We introduced a new reading program last year in grades five and eight. This year, we have included all middle school students in the reading program built around the use of literature circles or small reading groups. Following a year of program evaluation, a new math program has been instituted in the elementary grades. Teachers are pleased with the new math products. Our test scores on the New Hampshire Education Improvement and Assessment Program tests were mixed last spring. We noted gains in third and sixth grade English Language Arts scores, but other test sections' scores declined. Our students at Keene High School are doing well and taking advantage of advanced courses at all levels. Mary Duke was named Salutatorian and Hannah Lafleur was Valedictorian for our eighth grade class last spring.

### Athletics

We have been impressed with the hard work and enthusiastic play of our student athletes this year. Our fall soccer teams played well and the girls won the annual soccer tournament in a dramatic overtime victory. The tournament was organized by the Sports Boosters and led by Kim Brown and Dave Shelley. Our girls' basketball team remains undefeated in league play and the boys are improving steadily. Last spring, our baseball and softball teams played well and were coached by Scott Brown and Paul Deschenes.

### New Faculty

We have had a number of staff changes since the last school district meeting. Stacy Riendeau has returned from maternity leave. Brenda Shelly replaced Stacey until Christmas vacation and did a wonderful job. Amy Treat was selected as our new Guidance Counselor replacing Celia Slason who accepted a position in Keene. Chris Keyes has taken the reins of our middle school science program following Don Davis's acceptance of a position in Florida to be closer to his family. Our new Special Education teacher is Heather Hanley who had previously served as an aide in our Resource Room.

### Technology

We have been pleased with our increased use of technology and software during the past year. Rob Stack has assumed the role of Technology Coordinator and has done a fine job of implementing new programs. Debbie Nelson has gained a greater understanding of desktop publishing and produces our monthly newsletters and calendars. We purchased a new computer projector with grant funds.

Fun Run/Community Day

We again combined the PTA Fun Run led by Linda Rubin and Cindy Richard with the annual staff/community day. However, we found ourselves in the midst of a blizzard despite the spring date. Race winners selected their prizes by flashlight in our multipurpose room and afternoon activities were cancelled due to the power outage. However, the day was fun and monies were raised to help support PTA and school initiatives.

### **Facilities**

Summer maintenance projects, including the complete renovation of our primary bathrooms, were completed on time and within budget. The largest project undertaken this year has been our new playground, funded entirely by private donations. Last spring, our PTA decided to go ahead with this ambitious project and organized themselves into two committees. Linda Ruben and Lisa Moon headed the funding campaign and worked throughout the summer and fall to raise donations. Dawn Merrill and Lori Ingram worked with playground contractors to design a structure that met our needs and was within our budget. Ben Davis organized the site work in preparation for the project for his Eagle Scout badge. The new structure was erected in late October. The area is now busy every recess and has also become a magnet for young families during leisure hours.

### **Volunteers**

The growth of volunteerism at Westmoreland School has been overwhelming and greatly appreciated. We are blessed with a great number of parents and community members willing to share their time and expertise to improve our school. People helping to improve the school facilities included Stuart Adams, the Ingram family, Kyle Keith, Gary Gray, Tom Richard, Bob and Cindy Davis, and Deb and Bill McGahie. Other folks have spent many hours of time working with students including Flossie Gray, Missy Kritzer, Tina Fletcher, Chris Aguda-Brown, Susanne Bates, Carla Mansfield and Sue Castor. Becky Whippie, as president of the PTA, has provided great leadership to keep the organization focused on improving the quality of our school. Several companies have been generous with building materials, equipment and supplies. I would like to thank Sherwin Williams of Keene, Ingram Construction, Carroll Concrete, MacMillan Construction and Cold River Materials of Walpole.

On behalf of the families and faculty of our school, I wish to extend our gratitude to the Westmoreland community for an outstanding commitment to local education.

### HEALTH SERVICES REPORT January 2001 – January 2002

The health office is now open (since the start of this school year) from 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. five days a week. Student visits for illness and injury have totaled 1,872 for the entire year. This does not include scheduled medication visits, physicals, staff visits or routine screenings. This fall, 356 screenings have been done in the past two months for head lice. This elevated number reflects a minor outbreak of pediculosis (head lice) that occurred this fall. Classes are typically screened multiple times after an outbreak to ensure that each student is cleared. I will continue to provide periodic screenings throughout the year.

Other screenings that continue to be offered at Westmoreland School are vision, hearing, height, weight and scoliosis checks. This information becomes part of each child's school health file, which is updated on a regular basis.

Each year the State of New Hampshire mandates that each school nurse complete the Annual Immunization Report. This was completed and Westmoreland is once again 100 percent in compliance with state requirements.

This year, thanks to the help of the Cheshire Smiles Program, we have been able to offer a weekly fluoride rinse program to students in grades 1 through 4. As in the past, Cheshire Smiles has also been here in the springtime to provide dental screenings, cleanings and education to students in kindergarten through grade 4.

Dr. Sutton has once again offered her services as our school physician. She has been able to provide physicals for students in grades 4, 6, and 7, and for those students participating in sports for the first time.

A flu vaccine clinic was offered to all staff at school through the cooperation and assistance of Home Healthcare Hospice and Community Services.

In May, 2002, Westmoreland School was able to offer a dedicated blood drive with the cooperation of the American Red Cross. Many of our students were able to provide community service at this event; these students did an exemplary job at serving their community. Many thanks to all the people of Westmoreland who donated time -- and blood -- to this event.

Other activities include cleaning and stocking first aid kits, maintaining and ordering medical supplies, monitoring students on medications, meeting with parents regarding specific health concerns, and acting as a resource to staff regarding children with chronic illnesses.

As in the past, I have been attending various workshops and in-service training that broaden my knowledge base and increase my ability to serve the children of Westmoreland. It continues to be a pleasure to care for the students of Westmoreland.
