THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Belmont in the County of Belknap, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Community Hall in said Belmont on Tuesday, the 11th of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To choose one Selectman for three years, Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, one Trustee of Public Library for three years, and one delegate to the Constitutional Convention.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray all expenditures as listed in the Budget and make appropriations for the same.
4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to buy new trucks.
5. To see if the town will raise \$12,683.00 toward the construction of the Trunk Line road and authorize the Selectmen to borrow from the State (aggreably to Chapter 50, Section 5, Session Laws of 1929) the balance necessary to complete this Trunk Line.

6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for a new Bridge in place of Union Bridge.
7. To see what the Town will vote to do with its Parsonage Fund.
8. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money for Laconia Hospital.
9. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on all taxes paid on or before July 1st, 1930, and if so, how much.
10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Next to a good teacher, the all important factor, perhaps good attendance has as much to do as anything else in making a good school. The names of the pupils who deserve special commendation for faithful attendance during the last school year are found on another page.

TEACHERS

Resignations in June caused numerous changes in our teaching force. It is significant that these teachers who left us were offered more lucrative positions in other places. Miss Nancy Knowlton who had been at the head of the High School since its establishment was offered and accepted a position in the Junior High School at Concord, N. H. Miss Knowlton had been a faithful and efficient teacher. Mr. Howard C. Moore a graduate of the University of New Hampshire was selected to fill this vacancy. Miss Irene Hebert and Miss Lillian Youngquist accepted positions in Concord, Mass. Miss Hebert had been successful as teacher in grade seven and eight and as teacher of French in the High School. Miss Youngquist had been with us in grades III and IV only one year but had been very satisfactory. Miss Adelaide J. Ryan, a graduate of the three year course at Keene Normal School, succeeded Miss Hebert and Miss Myrle Cleveland, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School, succeeded Miss Youngquist. Miss Alberta Piper, who resigned to go to Franklin, was succeeded by Miss Mary Graham, a graduate of Lowell Normal School. Miss Eleanor Fuller, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School was selected to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Miss Agnes Darling. Miss Mella Boron, who had been a year at Ladd Hill, was offered and accepted a position in Amherst, Mass. She was succeeded by Miss Arline Meserve, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School.

We have an excellent school in charge of Mrs. Bartlett.

This year shows no increase in the enrollment in the high school. While we can never expect a large high school I do not feel that we have as high an enrollment as we might reasonably expect. The number of our high school pupils including those who attend at Laconia and Tilton, is small compared to our total registration.

HEALTH SUPERVISION

A careful physical examination of school children at least once a year is now generally recognized as a necessary part of the school program. For several years Dr. N. W. MacMurphy has been the examiner for the Belmont schools and has invariably done this work in a very satisfactory manner. However, the best results from this examination are not generally realized unless there can be some "follow up" work. Miss Ruth Whitcomb of Concord, a registered nurse, who serves as school nurse in several towns, has been secured to put in some time in connection with the schools in Belmont. Miss Whitcomb should prove to be a helpful

agent in bringing about improved health conditions and in securing remedial treatment whenever possible.

IMPROVEMENTS

The furniture in the Gale building urgently needing attention has been replaced. There is more that needs replacing. Electric lights are now installed in all the school rooms and in the corridor of this building. The outside doors on this building should be replaced.

Some very much needed improvements in the arrangement of the toilets have been made at the Ladd Hill school.

I repeat my recommendation in regard to the Plummer School building made last year. The lighting of the school room is not satisfactory and should be improved. Different toilet arrangements ought to be made.

FINANCES

As was anticipated a year ago the financial year closed last June with a balance in the treasury of approximately \$2,000.00. There should be no deficit at the close of this current fiscal year. The School Board's budget printed elsewhere shows no marked increase in proposed expenditures for next year. Belmont's share from the State Equalization fund will be \$3,824.48 next year, an increase of nearly \$400.00 over this year.

CONCLUSION

It is always easy to find fault and most of us seem to have that gift. The word of commendation does not come so readily. School work, of course, has its disappointments, and these must be met. It also has its joys. Obviously it is quite impossible for me to make mention of all of the good things in our schools. I am going to refer to only two and probably these are no more deserving of com-

commendation than many others. No school has made greater progress in school spirit and in the quality of work done than the Plummer. The teacher, Miss Hamilton, and the children are deserving of special commendation. Under the leadership of Miss Ryan the children of the Gale School are producing a school paper which is a credit to all concerned. It is a good piece of work. The effort and the results are commendable.

I again wish to express my appreciation of the assistance which has come to me from the School Board and the co-operation and loyalty manifested by the teachers during the last year.
