## TOWN WARRANT

### The State of New Hampshire

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To the inhabitants of the Town of Bow in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Community Center Building in said Bow on Tuesday, the twelfth (12) of March, next, at eight o'clock (8:00 p. m.) in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To see if the town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the budget committee.
2. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
3. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit by the division of municipal accounting of the town accounts. \*
4. To see if the town will vote to give the trustees of the Baker Free Library the authority, to purchase a track of land, adjacent to the rear of the Baker Free Library, for a sum not to exceed one thousand five hundred (\$1,500.00) dollars and this sum to be withdrawn from the Capital Reserve Fund for this purpose. \*
5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fund of the Highway Equipment, the sum of seven thousand (\$7,000.00) dollars for the trading of the two highway trucks. \*

6. To see if the town will vote to improve the construction of the public highways known as White Rock Hill Road and Bow Bog Road and raise and appropriate the necessary sums thereof. \*

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund established for the purchase of Fire department equipment. By Petition.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund established for the purchase of highway equipment. \*

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand five hundred (\$1,500.00) dollars to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund, established for alteration, addition, improvement and acquisition of lands for the Baker Free Library. \*

10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase tract of land adjacent to the Alexander Cemetery, for cemetery purposes, for a sum not to exceed one thousand five hundred (\$1,500.00) dollars. \*

11. To see if the Town will vote to increase the size of the Planning Board from five to seven members with duties as set forth in Section 1-15, Chapter 36, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955. The Board shall consist of one Selectman and six other citizens appointed by the Selectmen as provided in Chapter 36: 5 N. H. R.S.A., 1955. \*\*

12. To see if the town will vote a new article, No. 16, to Zoning Ordinance and Building Regulations of the town of Bow. \*\*

PENALTY

(A) Violation of Zoning Ordinance, building regulations and amendments to, of the Town of Bow.

(B) Every person, persons, firms or corporations violating any of the provisions of the ordinances, regulations and amendments to, shall be fined not more than (\$10) ten dollars upon conviction by any court, for each day such violation may exist. \*\*

13. To see if the town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Bow. \*\*

(A) Article 5, Paragraph 4, to read, Residences may be used to house such uses by the owner or tenant as offices for doctor (other than animal), engineer, architect, lawyer, real estate and insurance agents, hairdresser or dressmaker, or other recognized profession. Except that the number of persons employed at any location shall not number more than four (4) persons at any one time in addition to the owner or tenant.

(B) Article 6, Paragraph 1, to read, Any use permitted in Residential District under the same provisions as applied to residences in that district, except that the following shall also be allowed. Home manufacturing of food products and craft products and the sale thereof, also any other recognized trade as long as the number of persons employed in any one location shall not number more than four (4) at any one time in addition to the owner or tenant, also duplex dwellings may be allowed, subject to approval of the Board of Adjustment.

(C) Article 7, Paragraph 2, shall read as follows: Lodging houses, apartment houses, tourist courts or cabins, subject to approval of the Board of Adjustment.

14. To see if the town will vote to buy a Fire Truck for a sum (not to exceed sixteen thousand (\$16,000.00))

dollars, moneys from the Capital Reserve Fund established for this purpose, to be used and the balance to be raised and appropriated. By petition.

15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to obtain options and purchase lands for town dumps, upon recommendation of the dump committee, and raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars for this purpose.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate one thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars, for planning and engineering of a town pond, next to Community Building.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate three thousand (\$3,000.00) dollars for construction and if need be, acquisition of lands, for town pond, this money to be spent upon recommendation of Budget Committee.

18. To hear the reports of standing committees and take any action relating thereto.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Bow for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

**SCOPE OF AUDIT**

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Baker Free Library and Volunteer Fire Department.

**FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

**Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1961 —  
December 31, 1962:** (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1961 and December 31, 1962, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$20,083.15 in 1962.

**Analysis of Change in Financial Condition:** (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

## GENERAL COMMENTS

### Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased from \$19.81 to \$3,711.34, in 1962, as shown herewith:

### Balance Due Capital Reserve Fund:

In 1961, the Town voted to transfer \$11,000.00 from Surplus to the Capital Reserve Fund. Actually \$10,000.00 was paid to the Trustees of Trust Funds in that year, leaving a balance due of \$1,000.00. This item was carried as a liability account in the Balance Sheets of December 31, 1961 and December 31, 1962 (Exhibit A-1).

This balance due the Capital Reserve Fund of \$1,000.00 should be paid over to the Trustees of Trust Funds.

### Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Bow for their assistance during the course of the audit.

### **AUDIT PROCEDURE**

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

This was a record number of fires for your Fire Department. The net Fire loss for the year was negligible. We instituted a fire inspection program for our industry and the inspections will be of great value to them in the future. This program will be followed again in 1963. The school was also inspected by State Fire Marshall and found to be in very good condition.

An alarm system was started and the panel is in the Station and operating satisfactorily. The school is also tied in on this alarm system.

We bought 60 feet of new 1½ inch hose in 1962 to replace some old hose that had rotted out. A new pump was purchased for the C. D. Tanker and will soon be in operation.

A red network system was installed in the Fire Department Call System to insure better service for townspeople. This system cannot be used to make outside calls as there isn't any dial on any of the six phones. The number remains the same to report a fire.

Many thanks again this year to our hard working auxiliary for a generous \$400.00 contribution for three new portable radios which are vital equipment in fire fighting.

Earl Lamora, who was First Deputy Chief, resigned in June and was replaced by Kenneth Morgan.

A vigorous training program was held last summer for training on our new FWD and we have approximately ten good qualified operators.

1962 was a year when we had too many fires and too many runs for Bow but we hope 1963 will prove to be a small fire year. Remember, only you, the individual can prevent these fires. Have an escape plan for your family and a place for them to meet in case of fire.

Your Fire Department stands ready to serve you whenever needed.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF BAKER FREE LIBRARY

---

It's time again to report the activities of Baker Free Library for the past year 1962. The staff, Mrs. Virginia Brown, Mrs. Helen Robinson and myself are very pleased to report a successful year. We have had an increase in readers, both adult and juvenile. The teachers of Bow School have been very cooperative. We have tried to find all subject material that they have requested. New books have been added every month. The bookmobile of the State Library left books about every eight weeks.

Our hours are:

Monday — 2:00 to 8:00 p. m.

Wednesday — 2:00 to 5:00 p. m.

Saturday — 2:00 to 5:00 p. m.

From the day in June that school closes until Labor Day we are closed Saturdays but open Friday evening — 7:00 to 10:00 p. m.

The library has also undergone physical improvements. We were closed for ten days during Christmas vacation. Our walls were painted a lovely shade of green. New shades, three easy chairs, new toilet and formica tops for our charging desk and work tables were installed. Due to this closing our circulation dropped 362 books from last year; but, at that, the circulation was 25,567 books and magazines.

In March, as we have done for several years, we had a big display of new books at the town meeting. In June we entertained the Tokalot Club, explaining library service in Bow and had an exhibit of books. On November 19, the Mothers' Club met with us. The librarian spoke on "Books that children shouldn't miss." Books lists were distributed and the books themselves were on display. Many were checked out. In November, the staff attended a neighborhood meeting at the

State Library. A panel discussion was held on library standards and how we could improve the services of the small library.

Your trustees are constantly trying to improve the service and keep the Bow library up to national standards. To do this we need the support of all the people. We cordially invite you to drop in, talk with us, browse awhile and try our facilities.

## SCHOOL WARRANT

### The State of New Hampshire

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To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Bow qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Bow Community Building in said district on the 8th day of March 1963, at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, and Committees or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district and

to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will authorize the school board to contract with the Concord Union School District and the Manchester School Department and any other school districts for the tuition of Bow pupils in the high school of said districts at an amount necessary to provide therefor.

10. To hear the report of the Building Committee established at the last Annual School District Meeting.

11. To see if the District will vote to authorize the design, construction and equipping of an elementary school and for such other expenses as are necessary and incidental for the completion of same and to appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$450,000 therefor to be financed by the issuance of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, RSA c. 33 or otherwise.

12. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to act as Agents for the District to contract with the Architect, approve the design, execute the construction contract, select the furnishings and equipment and to do all things necessary and incidental to the completion of the project and to execute all papers and instruments necessary and incidental thereto.

13. To see if the District will authorize the Trustees

of the Trust Funds to pay over the accumulated funds in the Capital Reserve Fund established for the replacement of and acquisition of lands for present and future school buildings, to the School Board as Agents of the School District to be used in the construction program of the new Bow School and for the necessary equipment and furnishings.

14. To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$8,500.00 for the purchase of a new school bus and to authorize the School Board to purchase same at its discretion.

15. To see if the District will vote to withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fund for Busses a sum not to exceed \$4,000.00 to apply towards the purchase price of a new bus.

16. To see if the District will vote to carry over and apply all encumbered balances as of June 30, 1963 to the 1963-1964 school year to be used in the construction program of the new school.

17. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$3,800.00 for the purpose of converting the elementary school coal-burning furnace to an automatic furnace.

18. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States, provided such grants do not jeopardize local control of our system.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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To the School Board and Citizens of Bow:

I am pleased to submit my first annual report relating to the Bow Elementary School.

The Bow Elementary School enrollment for the 1962-63 school year is a total of 259 pupils. By grade the enrollment is as follows:

Grade —	Grade —
1 - 29	4 & 5 - 21
1 - 28	5 - 23
2 - 25	6 - 31
3 - 22	7 - 30
4 - 23	8 - 27

This year is the first year that two first grades have been established in Bow. The projected enrollment for next year is also indicative of two first grades. The need of added facilities is evident as we note the graduation of one eight grade and the entrance of two first grades.

The school board is studying the problem of additional facilities for a fast growing school population. This study is being carried out as a joint undertaking with the building committee. The recommendation of an immediate building program to erect a new school to house the upper grades is a realistic one in light of the fact that the anticipated overcrowding will be relieved and the facility will be adequate for a number of years.

There is a definite need in Bow for an adequate number of classrooms and specialized teaching areas which would provide facilities for an enriched program of study suited to today's needs of college bound boys and girls.

Quality education is not generally possible to attain in an overcrowded school, with inadequate teaching facilities and with the use of modern teaching techniques and the enrichment of courses curtailed by a limited physical plant.

### **Staff**

The annual teacher turnover in Bow has been reasonably low. A qualified staff with a low annual turnover of personnel, is an assurance of the continuity of a sound educational program and a minimum of interruption of a coordinated effort, over the period of the pupils' enrollment in the Bow school system.

Bow is endeavoring to provide satisfactory facilities, adequate equipment and materials for teachers and pupils, for effective educational opportunity, and an attractive salary schedule to encourage the employment or the retention of capable and dedicated teachers. The school board, the budget committee and the citizens are to be commended for insisting on and providing for the securing and retaining of superior teachers for our school.

### **Supervision**

Mr. Edward Briggs, the teacher-principal, is currently effectively directing efforts toward curriculum development and the development of syllabi for the various grade levels.

As our school population increases, a full time principal will have an opportunity to exert leadership to unify and coordinate the school programs, based upon teacher supervision, continued evaluation and curriculum development and effect changes as they evolve from a mutual effort on the part of the teachers, principal, the administration and the community.

Bow has the part time guidance services of Mr. Chris Agraftotis. The services provide an opportunity for every boy and girl to receive counseling based upon his interests, needs and abilities and to benefit from advice regarding future academic and vocational pursuits.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation for the many courtesies and excellent cooperation and encouragement extended to me by the school board, principal, teachers, pupils and citizens of Bow. I further wish to acknowledge the invaluable aid given by Spiro Anastos, Teacher Consultant, Mrs. Ruth Henk, Mrs. Harold Smith, and Mrs. Clifford Martel, present and past office personnel.

I trust that our joint efforts in behalf of the educational welfare of the youth of Bow will maintain and improve the quality of the education of Bow.
