# TOWN WARRANT

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## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

**To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hancock in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:**

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects: (Polls not to close until 6:00 P.M.)

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (five hundred dollars) \$500 for the Town History Reserve Fund, or take any other action relating thereto.

4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (one hundred dollars) \$100 for the Fire Hose Reserve Fund, or take any other action relating thereto.

5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (fifteen hundred dollars) \$1,500 for the Fire Truck Reserve Fund, or take any other action relating thereto.

6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (five hundred dollars) \$500 to replace the old V-snowplow, or take any other action relating thereto.

7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (one thousand dollars) \$1,000 for repairs to roof and steeple of the Town Meetinghouse, or take any other action relating thereto.

8. To see if the Town will give authority to the Selectmen to defend the Town against any action which The Nature Conservancy may take for tax exemption and to raise and appropriate the necessary money for cost of same, or take any other action relating thereto.

9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (seven hundred and ninety-four dollars and seventy cents) \$794.70 as our share of the T.R.A. program, and to see if the Town wishes to borrow money for a two, three or



four year program, and to raise and appropriate the necessary interest money, or take any other action relating thereto.

10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (four hundred dollars) \$400 for Old Home Day, or take any other action relating thereto.

11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (three hundred and fifty-one dollars) \$351 for the Monadnock Region Association, or take any other action relating thereto.

12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (one hundred and seventy-five dollars) \$175 for replacing present wooden fence with chain at south side boundary of Norway Plains Cemetery, or take any other action relating thereto.

13. To see if the Town will vote to adopt regulations for the government and organization of the Hancock Water Department, as previously posted and advertised, and incorporated herein by reference, and to appropriate to said Hancock Water Department the revenues thereof for the year 1963, and each year thereafter, for the annual expenses of said Water Department, any annual surplus thereof to be automatically transferred to Water Department's capital reserve fund; or take any other action relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate (one thousand two hundred dollars) \$1200 for the maintenance of the Water Department, or take any other action relating thereto.

15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (one hundred dollars) \$100 for White Pine Blister Rust Control, or take any action relating thereto.

16. To see if the Town will approve the action of the Selectmen in giving the State permission to alter the approach to Route 137 at the top of Sand Hill, or take any other action relating thereto.

17. To see if the Town will ratify, approve and confirm the action of our Fire Department in joining our Town to the Southwestern N. H. District Fire Mutual Aid System in 1958 and in agreeing that our Fire Department may give and receive outside aid as provided in R.S.A. 154 as amended, or take any other action relating thereto.

18. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to transfer a portion of the Delia Thacher Park land to Robert English for damages left to his property after the Juggernaut Water Line was laid, or take any other action relating thereto.

19. To see if the Town will vote to prohibit the placing or use of so-called bob houses or other structures on the ice on Nubanusit Lake in the Town of Hancock, or take any other action relating thereto.

20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, or take any other action relating thereto.

21. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of 1% on property taxes if paid within 30 days after date of bill, or take any other action relating thereto.

22. To see if the Town will accept gifts and legacies left in trust for the Town, or take any other action relating thereto.

23. To hear the reports of auditors and committees heretofore chosen, or take take any other action relating thereto.

24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## PREVENTING FOREST FIRES IS OUR RESPONSIBILITY

Costs of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires in New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such fires for which no responsibility could be placed cost another \$24,634. What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and esthetic values in the 2200 acres burned. Residences, farms, and other business places were threatened with possible total destruction.

Carelessly set man caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his responsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can help to keep our fire loss low by remembering these simple rules.

1. Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.
2. If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain a permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites.
3. Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late in the day.
4. Have something to keep the fire under control — pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.
5. Be sure your fire is dead out before you leave it.
6. If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives.

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never too early for parents to install in the child's mind a respect for fire.

Keep our town safe from fire.

In 1962 we had 2 fires.

We burned 1-1/3 acres.

**LIBRARY TRUSTEES' REPORT**

We are pleased to report that the use of the Library by adults, juveniles and children appears to be increasing. During the summer the Library was kept open until 8:00 P.M. on Thursdays, with good attendance during the evening periods.

On September 1st Ruth W. Johnson was appointed Librarian, thus enabling Mrs. Richardson to devote all of her attention to the Childrens' Section. At the same time the part-time position of Clerk was discontinued. Even with this change in staff set-up it has not been possible to meet the needs of increased traffic and preparation of new book acquisitions for circulation. In response to our appeal for help Mrs. Dorothy Churchill and a group of volunteers have contributed greatly to improvement of this situation. All who use the Library are deeply indebted to them.

The childrens' Librarian of the Medford, Mass. Public Library, Marguerita Francis, very generously contributed her services to the very considerable task of "weeding" our childrens' books.

Volunteer helpers have reassembled the entire stacks of books in the back room to correct alphabetic order in preparation for "weeding" under supervision of a State Library expert. When that has been completed it should be possible to move inactive books from front to back rooms, replacing them with books now in demand.

The Library is sincerely appreciative of the contributions of valuable books which have been given during the year by several of our townspeople.

During the year the following essential items of building maintenance and improvement were completed: replacement of defective furnace oil burner; repairs to roof and chimney; replacement of middle room lighting fixture.

## HANCOCK 1962

Using wide angle, long view glasses people in Hancock noted that in 1962 our nation escaped, by no one knows what margin, a nuclear war in October when we demanded the removal of Soviet atomic-carrying missiles from Cuba. Also John Glenn, Scott Carpenter and Walter Schirra successfully orbited the earth in this same year and a single negro student at the University of Mississippi and thousands upon thousands of negroes in the Congo were week by week in the newspapers read by Hancock people.

Adjusting to short view glasses there was much of interest to observe and note close to home. Let's start with the November election. Not that Hancock had anything much to do with it but the fact is that a Democrat was chosen Governor and, to boot, a Democrat defeated Perkins Bass of Peterborough for the U. S. Senate. It seems there are currently about 55 pretty solid Democrats in town but another 50 voters can, and in this case did, vote for Democrats few, if any, had ever seen. About 325 Republicans saw no reason to waiver.

While on subjects political, it is well to record that Town Meeting and the School Meeting (which is held on the preceding Saturday) were marked only by boisterous weather – not disharmonious citizens. Was it Paul Daly who was heard to say that some of us got home from the School Meeting in time to catch half of Lawrence Welk's TV show?

What figures most besides the short summers and cool weather in our information exchanges down at the Tremblay's store? Maybe because Arthur has developed a sideline as a dealer in real estate but more likely because it just plain interests us – What is to become of the Inn?

On July 1st the Manchester Savings Bank bid it in for \$36,000, the value of the mortgage – since then nothing has happened. The John Hancock House has been closed up tight. Occupying as it does a key position on our main street, everyone is concerned. It was saved once back about 1940 by the late Congressman Foster Stearns who had it rebuilt and refurnished. Shortly after, in 1946, William and Marian Roche bought it from him. In 1957 the Sammets took over and it was a part of a story in Holiday magazine in August 1959.

Nothing – just nothing – stays unchanged but some things alter faster than others. These glimpses of Hancock

do include changes like the whine of chain saws or distant jet planes on a still November morning when a few decades ago it would have been the softer sound of lowing cattle, cackling hens or baying hounds. Our report should also include non-change, or very gradual change.

We cling to, and our visitors revel in, those gentle sometimes rushing streams that wind through the woods; the outlines of greenclad hills. Fire-towers and microwave installations are too distant to hint that all is not as it always has been. Restful illusions can be preserved. So it is with special interest we note official figures listing places hereabouts having more than 30% seasonal residences. Hancock is credited with 32%, Harrisville 33%, Dublin 52%, Stoddard 55%, Nelson 58% and Sharon 30%. Other nearby towns fall below 30%.

An unheated debate exists – to go back to progress – as to whether as in the past on certain slippery days Sand Hill has been improved. This summer Route 137 was widened and slightly straightened at the point between the house of Marguerite Johnson and the Willis Johnsons (distant cousins) as it pitches up toward the Harold Bullards and Main Street. And while we are recording changes in this part of town it is well to mention the new heating plant, kitchen and fire escape recently added to the Vestry. It means that gatherings like the new nursery school run by Peg Brown can be held on the second floor which before was an inescapable spot in case of fire.

The Woman's Club usually meets downstairs in the Vestry and this year marked their fortieth anniversary. Lu Wheeler and Maud Brown (whose daughter Hilda Pierce built a house on Depot Road this year) were on hand to help mark the occasion. Other charter members – Annie Hadley, Cora Otis, Bessie Hanson, Louise Stearns, Margery Cheney, Nancy West – for various reasons couldn't make it.

Now while some of our mature citizens are well known for the contributions to our way of life there are rapidly growing up a bright-eyed group we should keep track of. To mention just a few – and it may not be a complete list – of those currently in college: at UNH Barbara Eva, Al Garand, Susan Weller, Ann Dillon and Betsy Sheldon; at Clark University, Chuck Gleason; at College of the Sacred Heart, Maria Ceres; at University of Rochester, Robert Russ; at Middlebury, Bayard Russ and at the Coast Guard Academy, Al Reynolds, Jr.

Space to record our doings in 1962 runs out . . . so at random let us mention a few just to give a hint of how lively we are. Big activity down at the library with Ruth Johnson gracefully and helpfully presiding. Sportsman's Club fishing prizes were won by Edna Fisher, Ray Shaw, Peter Bott, Luana Dunbar, Roger Luby and Herbert Gardner. Donna Daly miraculously escaped alive an accident in which others were killed. Laura Garand was named "Good Citizen", honored as Queen Escort and class secretary at Peterborough Consolidated School. Shirley Otis graduated from Tufts Medical School. The Color Guard on Old Home Day included John Haas, Ken Blood, Warren Pierce, Arthur Koskela, Elijah West and Captain James Burt.

And there was much, much more.

## REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

Your Selectmen have decided to report on various matters not covered in other sections of this booklet and which have been uppermost in their minds this past year.

Most of you know that the State Tax Commission has urged all towns and cities to assess property at 100% of value. Only a few towns have complied, and Hancock together with the majority has not. Each year more do so and it is believed the time will come when most towns and cities will conform. At the present time we are assessing all property at 40% of value determined to the best of our knowledge and ability. Incidentally, the Tax Commission made spot check appraisals in Hancock in 1960 and reported that our assessments were only 29% of values.

There are several advantages in using the 100% method, chiefly that it would distribute the tax burden more equitably. The new boat law with the \$100 exemption when applied to 40% of value has considerably reduced our tax income from that source. The veterans exemption of \$1,000 on the 40% assessed value basis means considerable tax must be absorbed by non-veterans, whereas this would be less if the assessment was 100%. In 1961 there was \$47,500 property valuation exempted in Hancock, representing \$2,166 tax saving which had to be absorbed by non-veterans. On the basis of 100% assessment the amount would have been about \$866. Finally, to not tax property at 100% of value is to violate the State Tax Law.

The principal argument against using the 100% assessment is that the material reduction in the tax rate would tend to encourage excessive spending. Your Selectmen have come to no final decision regarding this matter but do feel that it has considerable merit and should be given further favorable consideration.

Another item for discussion is the rate of pay for all employees of the town with the exception of the Highway Department. Presently, most employees such as ballot clerks, auditors, firemen, supervisors of the check list, and the moderator receive \$1.00 per hour. The police officers receive \$1.25 per hour. Selectmen and the town clerk now receive \$1.50 per hour. It is our intention to raise all pay rates to the \$1.50 per hour figure. We feel that anyone called on to do work for the town should not be expected to receive less than this figure. The budget as printed in the Town Report has provided for these increases.



The Selectmen are convinced that the time has come to engage the services of a young man or woman, working under their supervision, to act as clerk and typist, to handle all books and records ordinarily the responsibility of the Selectmen. This should not add to town cost for it would considerably reduce Selectmen's time. The important point is that there would tend to be more consistency in statements and information as contained in Town Reports from year to year.

At our last Town Meeting, it was voted that steps be taken by the Selectmen to investigate the possibility of renting, leasing, or selling the old High School. We have contacted the Monadnock Region Association and Erle Bishop, realtor, in this regard, and we have an exclusive agreement with Mr. Bishop for six months. At the present time there are two parties interested in the property, one quite seriously. Should something materialize before another Town Meeting, it will be necessary to call a special Town Meeting before action can be taken.

Your Selectmen are also interested in locating someone who would like to or would be willing to accept the job of local Civil Defense Director. We all know how important civil defense is at this time, and we hope someone will volunteer for this job. Anyone interested should contact the Selectmen.

Also we will need the services of a new life guard and swimming instructor for the Town Beach this year. The assignment is eight weeks during July and August. Should anyone of you be, or know of, a person qualified for this position, please contact the Selectmen.

We should like to express our appreciation to the Town for the help that so many have given us in the performance of our duties. We hope that anyone wishing to discuss any matter with us will feel free to come into the Selectmen's Room on the second or fourth Monday evening of the month.

**D. REPORT OF DISTRICT CLERK****HANCOCK SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING**

March 10, 1962

On March 10 at 4 p. m. the Moderator, Robert English, opened the annual Hancock School District meeting and read the warrant. A motion was passed to keep the polls open until 8 p. m. to permit voting for the Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Member of the School Board for three years covered by the first four articles in the warrant.

Mrs. Alice Brown and Mrs. Ruth Johnson acted as ballot clerks.

At 8 p. m. the Moderator declared the polls closed and after reading Article 5 called for a motion.

Article 5. Motion by Mrs. Mary Garland, member of the School Board:

I move that the salaries of the district officers for the ensuing year be as follows: Chairman of the School Board \$75, each other member \$50, treasurer \$40, clerk \$15, moderator \$10, ballot clerks \$1.00 per hour.

The motion passed.

At Mr. Warren Pierce's request, the Moderator read the rest of the warrant. Action was taken as follows:

Article 6. Motion by Arthur Tremblay of the School Board: I move that the reports as printed be accepted and placed on file with the clerk. This motion passed.

Article 7. Nelson Gay and Valentine W. Gerrish were re-elected as auditors.

Article 8. Motion by George Hampson, a member of the School Board.

Moved that the school district raise and appropriate \$57,244.-13 and to authorize and direct the school board to apply against said appropriation such income as is estimated by the school

board exclusive of state aid, and upon the determination of the amount of state aid to be received by the school district during the next fiscal year, to authorize and direct the school board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received from state aid and with the school district clerk certify to the selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the town for school purposes.

Lester Phelps, a member of the town Advisory Committee, said he had been over the budget with the school board and considered it to be a minimum budget. Otis Wilder asked for a clarification of some of the figures. Paul Daly asked the school board if they feel that the seventh and eighth grades here are getting as good an education as they would get in Peterborough. The answer by Arthur Tremblay was, "Yes." The motion passed.

At this point the Moderator introduced two guests, Dr. and Mrs. Neville S. Haile, with Geological Research in Sarack, North Borneo.

Article 9. Motion by Arthur Tremblay:

I move that the school board be authorized to make application for and accept on behalf of the district, any or all grants forthcoming under Titles III, V, or VIII, or any combination thereof, of the National Defense Education Act, Public Law 85-864 or any or all grants of other funds which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire under the provisions of the National Defense Education Act.

Mr. Barnes, teacher consultant, suggested that scientific and mathematical material be purchased with this money.

A recess was declared by the Moderator so that the votes for school district officers might be counted.

There were 85 ballots cast with the following results:

Moderator: Robert English, 59 votes.

Clerk: Mary E. Wilder, 77 votes.

Treasurer: William Brown, 43 votes.

School Board Member for 3 years: Mary T. Garland, 80 votes.

The Moderator administered the oaths of office and the meeting adjourned at 9:10 p.m.

## SCHOOL WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Hancock qualified to vote in the district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 9th day of March, 1963, at 4:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subjects embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
9. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants forthcoming under Titles III, V, or VIII, or any combination thereof, of the National Defense Education Act, Public Law 85-864 or any or all grants of other funds which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire under the provisions of the National Defense Education Act.

Changes in the teaching staff this year were C. Kendrick Capon, who replaced Mrs. Joyce Wilkes in Grades 5&6 and Mr. Charles Edgerly, who replaced Mr. Neil S. Bartlett as Music Supervisor. Mrs. Dorothy Whippie resigned as teacher of grades 3 and 4, as of December 31, 1962. Mrs. Barbara Metivier substituted until January 21, when Mrs. Nancy J. Ryan was hired as a permanent replacement for Mrs. Whippie.

## B. SCHOOL PROGRAM

School opened on September 5, 1962, with 88 pupils, approximately the same enrollment as a year ago. As mentioned elsewhere in this report, we had three staff changes—Mrs. Joyce Wilkes, Mrs. Jean Flewelling, and Mr. Neil Bartlett being replaced by Mr. C. Kendrick Capon, Mrs. Lorette Lithgow, and Mr. Charles Edgerly respectively.

The faculty of the school took advantage of the educational opportunities available in the area throughout the year. Mrs. Desrochers attended the New England Reading Conference in October and also a summer course in the Spalding Unified Phonics Program offered in Peterborough through Supervisory Union No. 47. Mr. Gendron completed extension courses offered by Monadnock Community College and Keene Teachers College. Mr. Capon also completed courses under Keene Teachers College.

During National Education Week an open house was held at the school in conjunction with the November P.T.A. meeting. At this time the faculty presented a panel discussion on the Language Arts program in the school. The P.T.A. has continued its support of the in-school vitamin program and the annual dental clinic. A much appreciated contribution towards the purchase of books for the school library was also made. During this year the group showed considerable growth in its membership.



Regular visits to the Town Library are made by the pupils serving to supplement the services of the school library. The cooperation and assistance of Mrs. Richardson has been appreciated throughout the year.

The testing program in the school included: S.R.A. and Otis Intelligence Tests given to grades one, three, and five in October; Metropolitan Achievement Battery and Pitner General Mental Ability administered in November to grades seven and eight; the Metropolitan Achievement Tests for grades one and two; and the Iowa Test of Basic Skills given in grades three through six.

The outdoor educational experience for grades five and six at Sargent Camp was held during the week of October 22-26. This marks the beginning of the alternate date system, whereby the pupils will have experiences at the camp during both the fall and the spring in alternate years.

Christmas was celebrated by all the town children at the annual party in the Town Hall sponsored by the Hancock Fire Department. The program was put on by the pupils in grades one through eight with the assistance of Mr. Charles Edgerly, music supervisor.

The school board has given considerable attention to the space and curriculum needs of the school. Although our local school has shown but little change in enrollment over the last few years, our pre-school census indicates that we can expect a gradual increase in our school population. It is quite probable that we will not be able to adequately accommodate the number of pupils in Grades 1 through 8 some five or six years hence.

It should also be recorded at this time that undoubtedly the Peterborough School District, within the next year or two, will be faced with the problem of providing additional space, if the Peterborough Junior-Senior High School is to continue its role as an area school. At that time, it is probable that the neighboring communities such as Hancock will be expected to make a long range commitment as to its intentions in the junior as well as the senior high school levels.
