THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Loudon in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Loudon on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To choose Delegates to the Constitutional Convention.
4. To vote on the question "Shall sweepstake tickets be sold in this city or town?"
5. To see if the Town will vote to allow 2% discount on all property taxes paid within thirty days after presentation of tax bill.
6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums of money not to exceed in the aggregate more than 75% of the anticipated amount to be collected in taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town of Loudon negotiable notes, therefor, said notes to be paid in 1964 from taxes collected during the current municipal year.
7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the Highway Capital Reserve Fund.

8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Fire Department's Capital Reserve Fund as set up in the 1963 Town Meeting.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the prepayment of taxes after April 1st and before tax bills are sent out for the current year.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with other Towns in the Merrimack Valley Region.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$275.00 for the Concord Hospital to help defray their estimated deficit for the year 1964.

12. To see if the Town will vote requiring the Town Clerk to revert back prior to 1939 and use the original form in preparing the Vital Statistics in the Town Report.

(By Request)

13. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Building Code enacted by ordinance at the March 12th, 1963 Town Meeting so that Paragraph three thereof shall read as follows:

For the purpose of this ordinance mobile homes and trailers used for human habitation shall be considered as buildings, structures, or other cover and shall conform to all the requirements of this ordinance, except that Travel Trailers temporarily located within the town for periods not in excess of thirty days in any one

year shall be exempt from the provisions of said ordinance.

This amendment shall take effect on May 1st, 1964.

14. To see what action the people at Town Meeting wish to take on the continuance of the Municipal Court, which is to be voted Yes or No on the Town ballot. (RSA 502a:35)

15. Whereas, a Town Report is a report to the people and further, that a property inventory is a most useful and informative piece of information, it is felt that the inclusion of the same, in the Town Report might be in order.

Now be it resolved: An inventory of all taxable property and assessed value of each lot and parcel be included in the Town Report of the Town of Loudon, once every five years, commencing with the report of 1964.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT, 1963

Looking back over the past year we feel that we have accomplished a few things that the people should know about. What ever has been done has been done only with the full cooperation of all the town officers and you people of the Town of Loudon.

We can not recall when our town has been able to conduct its business for the year without borrowing money to work with. That has been accomplished this year. You people have paid your taxes with such promptness that our treasurer has had a balance on our check book large enough to cover any check we make out. This has been a great saving to our town.

It also may be noted we have been able to pay the school their total amount of money for the school year before closing our books on December 31st. This is the second time we have been able to do this. In the past we have usually had to wait until we could borrow money to make the final payment in May or June.

Your Selectmen decided at the start of the year that we would have to do something about our assessed valuation. Our valuation as stated by the Tax Commission was only 53% of the true value of the property. We were told that we should raise our valuation to 100%. This we did not agree upon. We have felt that our land values have been much higher then our building values. It was decided to raise our building values and not our land values. After much deliberation your Selectmen decided on raising the building values in town by a minimum 20%.

As a result some properties in town paid more taxes then last year, although we had a lower tax rate. We must realize that we were called upon to raise more money than we did one year ago.

Our Highway Department has been able to gravel more miles of road this year than for a long time. The new front end loader has proved to be more efficient than the old one. This winter they have used it to plow snow, thus giving us three plows to use in bad storms.

Our T.R.A. project on the Lower Ridge Road is progressing very well. We now have it tarred from the Ridge Church to the Cement Bridge by Russell Hunt's. From there to the Twin Bridges the Road is shaped and graveled. It will be completed this next summer.

We have put a road mix on Mudgett Hill and the Flagg Road to the top of the hill by Norman Bowles'. These are 2 bad hills to keep gravel on. Now we hope they will be in good condition for many years. It is the intention of the Selectmen to tar all hills where it is possible and as soon as it is possible. These roads were improved with our Duncan money. We have about \$1,100.00 left and will use it on the Clough Pond Road in the spring.

REPORT OF ROAD AGENT

Since July 1st, when we took over, there have been a number of jobs completed, plus new ones started.

Paul Merrill excavated and graveled Mudget Hill last year, and this year we mixed and sealed it. Also we excavated and mixed a portion of Flagg Road, from Clough Pond Road to Norman Bowles residence. Money for that was from the Duncan Fund, received from the State.

We also mixed about 80 yards of coal patch, and graded that into sections of the Center Road and the Ridge Road.

This year we built a screen to sift the sand for tarring, so as to get full benefit of the Asphalt that was applied for the tarring operation. Approximately 41,000 gallons of Asphalt were used for all projects.

Paul Merrill put steel stringers in the New Dover Bridge, thus making it safer for future travel, and we also have enough left to fix the Christina Clough Bridge this coming spring.

The roadsides of all major roads were mowed this year and we plan to inaugurate a program of spraying this summer, to stop their growth, consequently cutting costs of mowing.

We spent six weeks this past summer on the T.R.A. project, mixing from Jay Green's Bridge to the Cement Bridge, excavating and graveled from the Cement Bridge to the Twin Bridges.

Also we graveled and penetrated the parking lot behind the Library.

Approximately 5,600 yards of sand and gravel were used for all these projects.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The year 1963 was a busy one for the Loudon Volunteer Fire Department, responding to 5 chimney fires, 6 building fires, 6 trips to Town dump, 8 brush and grass fires, 3 motor vehicle, 1 missing person, 1 debris burning, and 11 mutual aid runs.

We asked for and received help from Concord, Canterbury, Chichester, Pittsfield, and Ctr. Barnstead.

A large and more audible siren was installed in the Ridge section.

A start towards sufficient protective clothing for the Ridge firemen has been made, with the purchase of four complete outfits. We hope to add as many more next year.

The men from the Ridge station responded to several calls and handled the fires fast and efficiently.

A deficiency in badly needed equipment was partly corrected with the purchase of three 1½" PDQ. for nozzles. One more 1½" fog nozzle will solve the nozzle problem for the foreseeable future. These are wonderful nozzles at a "working" fire when water is in short supply.

Short pike poles have been added to the trucks for inside work.

The pump on Tank 3 has been overhauled by the crew of that truck, after 17 years of service.

An electric re-wind was installed on Tank 3 booster reel by volunteers at no cost.

Two additional "Red Phones" are now in service for emergency calls from the Chichester exchange. Townspeople who are on that exchange are now able to make faster toll free emergency calls to the department. These additional phones make for better over-all coverage and no difficulty should be encountered in calling the department in time of need.

The meeting room mentioned in last years report is nearly completed and is a very definite asset to the station. The Volunteer Firemen have contributed many hours of labor in addition to a substantial sum from their funds.

The Ladies Auxiliary have been most helpful towards the completion of this room by contributing most generously from their treasury.

The Ladies Auxiliary is still a very necessary part of the Department. Their readiness with lunches, day or night — fair weather or foul — and when the occasion permits wholesome hot meals, their financial support and physical help is much appreciated by the entire Department.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

During the past year New Hampshire faced the greatest forest fire threat to its woodlands in more than sixty years. The continued drought brought home to our citizens, as never before, the potential threat of destructive fires to their beautiful and valuable forests, homes and livelihood. In true American tradition of meeting a common threat by volunteer effort, this fire danger was minimized by active prevention, patrol and a relinquishing of personal rights for the common good. It was the greatest demonstration of public cooperation ever experienced by those responsible for local and state fire control. The ready forces of volunteer fire services kept the losses low. For their effort and public response the general fire service expresses its heartfelt thanks for a job well done.

Prevention however, is not just an activity for the bad fire years. It must be practiced until it becomes a part of our public conscience — a habit. Just plain carelessness with fire causes too many of our fires.

The following practices and suggestions will help:

1. Always have a permit for outdoor burning and burn within the terms of the permit and in a safe place. Burn late in the afternoon when the wind is down or on rainy or damp days. Check your fire and if winds develop extinguish it promptly.
2. Carry your rubbish to the public dump — it's safer. A neglected backyard incinerator causes many fires.
3. Never discard lighted cigarette or match. Make this a year round habit regardless of the safety of your surroundings.
4. Children caused fires are now a major concern. Keep matches away from them and teach them to respect fire and not make it a subject of play.

Lets all join with "Smokey the Bear" and "Keep New Hampshire Green" and growing in 1964.

LOUDON SCHOOL DISTRICT

Annual Meeting Proceedings — March 9, 1963

Moderator Stanley H. Prescott called the meeting to order at 7:40 p.m. The salute to the flag was led by William Brown. Jessie Cate and Homer LaBonte were appointed as ballot clerks. The warrant was read.

Articles 1, 2, 3, 4 to choose officers for the coming year were skipped over because of paper balloting to be exercised for the first year.

Article 5. A motion of Raymond Cummings passed on salaries of District officers to remain the same as the budget \$254.00. The article was adopted.

Article 6. Auditors report was given by C. A. Brinkmann. Raymond Cummings reported on the co-operative school committee still in existence and perhaps soon to become active. On motion of Raymond Cummings, the committee to remain the same as present, was passed.

Article 7: Motion of Everett O. Dow that the school district accept the town auditors elected at the next Tuesday's election was passed.

Article 8. On motion of William H. Brown for the sum of money for the district to raise to be postponed until rest of warrant had been acted upon.

Article 9. Everett O. Dow's motion for school district to establish a capital reserve fund in the amount of \$3,000.00 for financing of additional elementary school facilities was passed. This article was adopted.

Article 10. On motion of Raymond Cummings it was voted that the School Board be authorized to accept contract proposals and enter into contracts for a period of not more than five years for the transportation of elementary school children. This article was adopted after a standing vote had to be taken. 102 Voters participated — 76 in favor — 26 opposed.

Article 11. On motion of Robert Hibbard this article was indefinitely postponed. The Congregational Church will not use the school for any Sunday School or nursery purposes.

Article 12. The motion of William Brown for the town to raise \$300.00 for maintaining a summer playground was rejected. This article was not adopted. 122 votes cast — 99 No — 23 Yes.

The moderator declared a 10 minute recess and announced coffee and donuts on sale by P.T.A.

Article 13. The motion of William H. Brown to see if District would transport all primary grade children was rejected. The Article was not passed. 121 votes cast — 82 opposed — 38 for.

Article 14. On motion of Raymond Cummings this article was adopted by paper Ballot. The school district will allow the school board members and any other committee members as necessary, to make a detailed investigation on annual cost for the district to buy and operate two school buses. A report of these costs to be at a special meeting held within three months of this meeting. 120 votes cast — 83 in favor — 37 opposed.

At this time the polls were open and balloting for the school officers took place. 120 votes cast.

Stanley H. Prescott received 98 votes for moderator.

Beatrice Jenkins received 115 votes for clerk.

Fred J. Hackett received 115 votes for treasurer.

Raymond C. Cummings received 106 votes for school Board.

The above officers, having a majority of votes for their respective offices, were therefore duly declared elected for the ensuing period.

Reopening under Article 7. To choose a committee for Article 14. A motion of Raymie Rattee, for adding two members to the committee in addition to the school board members, was amended by Harold Hill in effect that the

two senior selectmen (after election) serve with the school board members on this committee. A standing vote was taken. 84 Votes — 56 in favor — 26 opposed.

Reopening under Article 8. Raymond Cummings moved that the budget be accepted as read in addition to the \$3,000.00 capital reserve fund already voted. This article was adopted. The district voted to appropriate \$115,485.26 to balance budget. \$78,085.10 estimated to be raised as taxes and \$37,400.16 estimated income.

Article 15 — It was announced that the school board will post a new warrant for a special meeting within the next three months.

Moved to adjourn at 11:40 p.m.

Emergency Meeting Proceedings of Loudon School District — May 25, 1963

The meeting was called to order by the moderator Stanley H. Prescott at 7:35 p.m. William Brown led the salute to the flag. Warrant was read by moderator. Report of committee studying transportation was given by Everett O. Dow. Estimated cost of 1st year transportation was given as \$9,037.78. Everett O. Dow's motion to accept report was seconded by Arthur Austin. Motion was passed.

Article 1. To authorize the School Board to purchase school buses adequate in number and type to meet the transportation needs of the Loudon School District. A motion of William Chesley's to adopt this proposal as read was seconded by Arthur Austin. Moderator appointed Jeanette Hackett and Jessie Cate as tellers. Paper ballot showed total of 103 votes cast — 1 Blank — 61 No — 41 Yes. This proposal was not adopted. A short recess was declared.

Article 2. To raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$12,500.00 for the purpose of purchasing school buses adequate in number and type to meet the transportation needs of the Loudon School District.

Article 3. To authorize the School Board to issue serial notes or note or bonds in an amount not exceeding \$11,500.00 for the purchase of school buses adequate in number and type to meet the transportation needs of the Loudon School District, and to authorize the School Board to determine the time and place of payment and the rate of interest on such note, notes or bonds to provide for the sale thereof and to do any and all such acts and things as they may deem necessary to the issuance thereof in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and any amendments thereto. A motion of Raymond Cummings to skip over Articles 2 and 3 was seconded by Bill Brown.

Article 4. To raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$1,000.00 in addition to \$9,500.00 previously appropriated

for the purpose of providing transportation for the Loudon School District for the 1963-64 school year. A motion made by Ernest Wells to accept this article. Archie Minard seconded the motion. Motion was passed and proposal was adopted.

Robert Hibbard moved that thanks be extended to Committee for all the work put into their report.

Meeting adjourned at 8:55 p.m.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Loudon:

Loudon school enrollments continue to increase and we are fortunate to be able to absorb this increase in numbers without overcrowding. However, this cannot continue indefinitely.

The school board is very much aware of this problem and is asking that the district continue to build up a capital reserve fund to be used for building expansion when the problem becomes more critical.

Several towns in the immediate area are studying the regional school as a possible solution to some of our educational problems. Members of your school board and other interested citizens of Loudon are taking an active part in this study.

The results of this study should be evaluated very carefully by every district involved to see if the cooperative attack on the problem may not be desirable and beneficial to all concerned.

It is a pleasure to report that your elementary school is maintained and operated efficiently. Teachers and pupils are indeed fortunate to have the use of a modern, well equipped school plant.
