To the inhabitants of the Town of Mason, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

Voting on Article 1 will be at the polls.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in Mason on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at twelve of the clock in forenoon, then and there to choose all necessary Town Officers for the following terms:

You are hereby notified to meet at eight of the clock in the afternoon of the same day at the same place to act upon Articles 2 - 22.

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing terms.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of tax receipts.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by taxation, or borrowing or otherwise, such sums of money as may be necessary for the operation and expenses of the Town for the year ensuing, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to affirm the vote of the 1986 Special Town Meeting to raise and appropriate by borrowing, the sum of \$21,780 plus interest thereon to be repaid in two years in installments of \$10,000 plus interest or take any action relative thereto.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to expend Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) funds and state emergency funds paid to the Town for any and all highway expenses in compliance with state and federal law or take any other action relative thereto.

- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer FEMA and state funds in an amount of \$26,000 to the Highway Capital Reserve Fund, and to authorize the Selectmen to expend such amount from such fund.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by taxation, borrowing, or otherwise, the sum of \$1,000 to purchase two new radios for the Highway Department or take any other action relative thereto.
- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by taxation, borrowing, or otherwise, the sum of \$7,800 to purchase a new sander for the Highway Department, or take any other action relative thereto.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate from the Revenue Sharing Fund, the sum of \$3,579 in partial purchase of JCB Backhoe, or take any action relative thereto.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by taxation, borrowing, or otherwise, the sum of \$13,295 to partial purchase a backhoe for the Highway Department, or take any other action relative thereto.
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Town's Representatives to the General Court to take all necessary measures to insure that no low level radioactive waste from the Seabrook nuclear plant shall be stored or disposed of within this Town of Mason unless and until the proposed site of the proposed storage or disposal has been approved by the voters of the Town at the annual Town Meeting by written ballot.
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to abolish the assessment, levying, and collection of residence tax, pursuant to RSA 72:1-c or take any other action relative thereto.
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by taxation, borrowing, or otherwise, a sum not to exceed \$5,400, said sum to be presented to highway department employees as a bonus for their dedication and hard work beyond the call of duty in the aftermath of the flood, to be presented as follows: Curtis M. Dunn \$2,000; Bruce Berry \$1,800; Arthur Rafter \$1,600; or take any other action thereto
- Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by taxation, borrowing, or otherwise, the sum of \$1,395 to purchase a copy machine or take any other action relative thereto.
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by taxation, borrowing, or otherwise, the sum of \$500 to purchase a typewriter for the Mason Public Library, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by taxation, borrowing or otherwise, the sum of \$700 to purchase an encyclopedia for the Mason Public Library, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,575 to purchase a new vehicle for the Police Department said sum to be raised as follows: \$6,000 to be taken from the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund and the balance to be raised by taxation, or borrowing, or otherwise, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by taxation, borrowing, or otherwise, the sum of \$2,000 to purachase two self-breathing apparatuses for the Fire Department, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by taxation, borrowing, or otherwise, the sum of \$800 to purchase two new tone pagers for the Fire Department or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriateby taxation, borrowing, or otherwise, the sum of \$1,650 to purchase a new four channel radio and scanner for the Fire Department or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by taxation, borrowing, or otherwise, the sum of \$10,000, said sum to be added to the Fire Department Capitol Reserve Fund, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer any balance remaining after the FEMA contract period ends. to the Highway Capital Equipment Fund.

Article 2: Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$329,893.00 for the purpose of defraying Town Charges for the ensuing year.

Article 3: Voted to authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

Article 4: Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$860 for the purchase of two mobile radios for the Highway Department.

Article 5: A motion was made, seconded and passed to amend this article. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the Fire Truck Replacement Capitol Reserve Fund.

Article 6: Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to change the frequency and paging tones of the Fire Department radios and pages: any unexpended monies to be

used for the purchase of 2 new tone-operated pagers with cases and chargers.

Article 7: Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6.000 to be placed in the Police Cruiser Reserve Fund.

Article 8: Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 for the purchase of four (4) hand guns for the Police Department.

Article 9: Voted to issue a quitclaim deed to Charles E. Kelley to correct an error made at Tax Sale.

Article 10: Voted to empower the planning board to exercise Site Plan Review authority pursuant to the provisions of RSA 647:43-44 and to make it the duty of the Town Clerk to file with the Registrar of Deeds of Hillsborough County a certificate of notice showing that the planning Board has been so authorized: giving the date of authorization.

Article 11: Voted to accept the gift of less than one (1) acre of land on Old Ashby Road from Charles Sullivan and Philip Heald, jr.

Article 12: After much discussion, the town voted not to purchase less than one (1) acre of land in the center of the cul de sac in the Jenney sub-division.

Article 13: Voted to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1986 appropriation, said funds to be placed in a special Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5.

Article 14: Voted to authorize the Selectmen to accept donations for the renovations of the stable located on the Benjamin Mann property for a Police Station.

Article 15: Voted to authorize the Selectmen to accept \$1,600 in previously donated private funds and additional future donations for the renovation of the stable located on the Benjamin Mann property and to establish the Police Station Building Trust Fund in which to deposit these funds: and to establish a committee to oversee the expenditure of such funds.

Article 16: Voted to raise and appropriate a sum of \$1,600 for the Police Station Trust Fund.

Article 17: Voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to adopt written welfare guidelines as required by Chapter 380 of the Laws of 1985. This Law requires the Town to adopt these guidelines by April 1, 1986.

## HOME HEALTH CARE AND COMMUNITY SERVICES, INC.

#### FINANCIAL REPORT

The total cost of services provided for partial fee, or at no charge to residents in 1986 is projected to be \$1,066.00.

Funds applied toward the cost of these services is as follows:

Town Funds \$658.00 Membership Drive Funds 408.00

In 1987, if you wish to continue home care services at the current level, we anticipate that services not paid for by the client, or any other source will be \$1,200.00.

#### MASON HIGHWAY REPORT

This year was a very interesting year to say the least. We were in the middle of several new projects; pug mill mix for shimming some of the out of shape areas, rebuilding a rough area on Brookline Road, ditching along paved roads and getting ready for sealing them with oil.

On the evening of July 29, we had a tremendous thunder storm that gave us between 7 and 8 inches of rain in approximately 2 hours time. Since most of our roads flooded and washed out, we started to work immediately trying to get everyone a way our, at least, in one direction. Thanks to the help from the Selectmen, C.D. Director, Fire, Police, Mason Highway members, Neighboring towns, and local individuals we were able to restore our town roads. Highway crews, with a lot of part-time help, worked long days and weekends to repair our roads and bridges. Our last closed road was opened for travel on Dec. 31, 1986.

We spent approximately \$160,000 in this year on flood damage and have approximately \$100,000 left to do in 1987. We applied for relief funds and we qualified for Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) along with several other town in New Hampshire. This allowed us to continue on our regular work program. We shimmed approximately 350 tons of pug mill mix on some of our out of shape areas. After ditching approximately 3 miles of paved roads, they were sealed with oil.

In the spring, our gravel roads received over 2,000 yards of screened gravel during grading season.

Our road system is used more today than a few years ago causing more wear and tear on them. This means we have to be able to give faster service to keep our system at its present level. This is being done by use of radios, better equipment, and more man power.

I would like to thank the residents of Mason for being so patient during the times of restoring our road system after the flood of 1986. CURTIS M. DUNN, ROAD AGENT

#### THE MASON POLICE DEPARTMENT

1986 was a busy year for your Police Department. We logged over 460 hours in the class room and in the field in an attempt to keep up with required training. For 1987 we will need to at least double those hours just to satisfy our liability carrier.

The Police Station Building Committee is making head way on the renovation of the stable located on the Mann property. Many citizens have either made cash donations or offered needed services so as to make the needed renovations.

Citizen awarness continues to be a vital tool of your police department. In 1986 we received over 100 calls reporting suspicious persons and motor vehicle complaints, of these several summons were issued and one case a fugitive from justice was arrested.

We plan on conducting another finger print program in early spring. With the large number of new homes and new residents we feel there will be a big turn out for this important program.

The Conservation Commission met regularly on the second Wednesday of the month at 8:00 p.m. Two topics which occupied much of our time in 1986 were wetlands and the railroad right of wav.

Following the acquisition by Mason of the B&M railway line through town, the Conservation Commission took over responsibility for maintaining and improving the line for public use. The major efforts undertaken in 1986 were: (a) rebuilding the trestle bridge at Jackson road, with generous donations of both materials and labor: (b) surveying, assessing, and documenting damage to the railroad bed, following the July 29 rain storm; and (c) working with the Selectmen on posting the right of way as a recreational area and controlling access to it. particularly by motorized vehicles.

The role of a conservation commission is to promote proper utilization and protection of natural resources. Watershed resources are of prime importance. It has been determined by the state that it is in the interest of the public to protect and preserve submerged lands and wetlands, to prevent adverse impacts on stream channels and their ability to handle run-off, and to prevent disturbance and reduction of the natural ability of wetlands to absorb flood waters and silt. this end, Mason Conservation Commission members are present when appropriate to observe perk tests conducted by state officials on land being considered for development. In addition, if you have drainage problems or are contemplating subdividing your property for development and think you may have wetlands in some areas, Commission members are familiar with the plant types that characterize wet areas (a very reliable way of determining wetlands), and will be glad to walk the land with you and advise you on what areas may need to be protected.

We all value the very special quality of life in Mason but we must remember that it is currently threatened by severe development pressures. Our heritage of abundant natural resources -- including ponds, running streams, plenty of open space, flourishing woodlands, and many kinds of wildlife--deserves to be preserved. One way this can be done is by setting aside tracts of land for conservation. The Commission is working to develop guidelines for people considering donating land to the town (or putting a conservation easement on some of their land). For the landowner this provides benefits by saving taxes year after year and by ensuring that a favorite natural area will never be despoiled by development. For the town, open space provides many benefits often overlooked: recreational elbow room, buffer areas between developments, pleasant scenery which preserves the rural character of the town, wildlife habitat, conservation of soil and other resources, air purification, water storage and recharge, and natural flood control. Also, although you might not think it at first, setting aside land for open space can even save tax money for the town. We are pleased to announce that Mr. Bronson Potter made a generous donation of land to the Conservation Commission in December. We hope other residents will follow his example in the coming years.

#### CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT

The storm of 29 July '86 dumped 6-7 inches of water on our town in a few hours. The storm closed all but one road in and out of Mason. Damage to our roads exceeded a quarter of a million dollars. In addition, many Mason citizens suffered personal driveway, septic and yard damage.

Civil Defense first attempted to use the Selectmen's Office as a Command Center. However, this was eventually abandoned in favor of the fire station due to their radio hook-ups with Base 500 and the fire trucks. Also, the town highway trucks were tied into the command center by radio. There is a need to tie in Mason Police into this network.

The New Hampshire Civil Defense deserves a thank you in that they were deeply involved in the process of helping the state (and thereby the Town of Mason) in obtaining Federal and State funds to assist in the repair of our town damage.

#### ANNUAL REPORT TO TOWNS - 1986

During 1986, the Service answered 247 calls. This is broken down among the four town as follows: Mason, 25; New Ipswich, 95; Temple, 27; and Greenville, 100.

This service is possible NOT ONLY through the complete support of all of the town involved, but through the extraordinary dedication of well trained Driver/Attendants, all of whom are <u>VOLUNTEERS</u>. Almost all of these volunteers are Nationally Registered Emergency Medical Technicians-Ambulance. Those who are not registered, are qualified personnel in First Aid proceedures, and are working their way toward registration in the near future.

The Service has the best to offer....ambulances, fully equipped with the State of New Hampshire EMS Board requirements, and then some; Driver/Attendants who are constantly renewing their certifications, along with attending seminars and classes to keep them up to date on all of the newest procedures, all on their own time!! Driver/Attendants are on call about six (6) times a month. There exists a continuing need for additional volunteers to become a part of the Service, and there is a special need for day-time volunteers, as almost all of our Driver/Attendants hold down full time jobs, and answering calls during the day causes a hardship to many. We welcome any one who may be interested in becoming part of our team.

During the past year, we were forced to change radio frequencies due to notification by the Federal Communication Commission that we could not continue to operate on the Greenville police frequency. Capital reserve funds of \$12,000.00 had to be used to purchase new radio equipment necessitated by this change. Please note that this does not have any impact on our price per capita.

When you observe a Souhegan Valley ambulance answering a code three (3) call for someone who is either critically ill or hurt in an accident, give thanks to your town for supporting the Service and for the many volunteers who make it work. It may be you or one of your family members who may need the Service next, and you can rest assured that all will be done in their power to assist you.

On Feb. 20, 1986, Alwin Hodson stepped down after holding the position of Chief for 23 years. His have been big shoes to fill indeed. I have found that there are demands averaging as much as 15 hours per week over the time I put in as a department member to do the job as Fire Chief. I am developing a 20-year plan for fire apparatus replacement. Buying a fire truck must be well planned, with careful consideration for the town's needs. Last year engine 3 was out of service for four months and parts are getting harder to find, with some parts not being made. The projection of this time is to replace engine 3 in 1989-1990.

This was a busy year for the fire department. Our fire whistle, which had to be blown by the first member in the door, is now operated by the communications center. There is a single test blast at 11:45 and we are working on a no-school whistle.

The state has set up a licensing process for underground storage tanks carrying gasoline and fuel oil. The first line of inspection on these

must be done by the local Fire Chief.

On July 29th the town was torn by a major rain storm. As was the case in the hurricane of '85 the fire station became the town's command center with fire, police, hwy., and civil defense operations being run from from there. Crews were fed and housed at the station even as the yard outside was washing away. Fire trucks were manned for 30 hours by department members in different areas, to cover the town.

In August, with assistance from the State Fire Marshall's office, town buildings. the school, church, and our larger businesses were inspected for fire safety. I hope to make this an on-going yearly event. Any residents wishing their homes or woodstove installations inspected may

contact my office.

After rebuilding our yard and parking lot we were able to follow through with our plan to pave our yard, in September. This was done at no cost to the town. I wish to thank those who aided us in this endeavor.

I would like to thank my officers, firefighters, and fellow chiefs from surrounding towns who helped me through my first year. I would also like to thank publicly my family who try to understand all the times I've had to be away as Fire Chief instead of being at home.

### REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN and STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1985 and June 1986 we experienced fewer fires than normal. The two leading causes of forest fires were again children, and fires kindled without written permission of a forest fire warden. Both causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your forest fire warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of state forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your forest fire warden.

If you own forest land, you became responsible for the Timber Tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all owners of forest land. Contact your Board of Selectmen for Timber Tax forms.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT MASCENIC REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

I am pleased to submit my third report to the District for the 1985-86 school year.

The school year began with a student enrollment of 1,183 students, with 529 secondary students and 654 elementary students. This repersented and overall increase of 83 students over the previous year's enrollment.

Several new teachers joined the staff. At the elementary level, Linda Scribner - Grade 3, and Debbie Spring - Grade 2, joined the New ipswich Central staff. Ellen Caravell - Readiness, joined the Mason Elementary staff, and Dee Broussard - Grade 4, Donna Crowley - Special Education, Daniel Deneen - Grade 2, and Laura Robinson - Special Education, joined the Greenville Elementary staff. New teachers at Appleton were: Laura Hall - Grade 6, Christopher Sousa - Grade 4, who was replaced by Linda Johnson, and Cheryl Superson - Resource Room. Katherine Snape was appointed elementary Art teacher.

At the secondary level, the following teachers joined the high school faculty: Michael Caravella - Physical Education, Mari Domanski - Social Studies, Susan Goodrich - Home Economics, Andrew Linn - Mathematics; Bruce McComish - Industrial Arts, David Rousseau - Music, Elizabeth Seagers - Science, Timothy Sloman - Industrial Arts, William Channon - Science, and Michail Mezzocchi - Administrative Amaistant.

During the school year, the District accomplished or pursued a number of goals. In response to the New England Association of Schools and Colleges recommendations, a Supervisor of Maintenance and Custodians was hired to upgrade the maintenance of facilities. A differentiated staffing proposal was funded and implemented to compensate teachers for their leadership and additional work in curriculum development, educational research and new teacher training. Curriculum projects in Social Studies R-8, Computer Science, Gifted Education, Fine Arts, R-12, Writing R-12, Secondary Work Study and Elementary Science were undertaken. Teacher research projects included the study of Math and Language Arts testing results, Federal and State Funding Sources, and the Needs of Gifted and Talented youngsters. The athletic fields project was completed. A hot lunch program was instituted at Greenville elementary, Appleton Elementary and Mascenic Regional schools, and now all Mascenic students are afforded the opportunity for a hot noon meel. Finally, the building Construction Program was reinstituted and currently involves twenty-one Mascinic juniors and seniors in the complete home construction process.

The voters at the 1986 school district meeting approved a budget of \$3,507,115. The Mascenic School board and Building Committee presented a proposal for construction of a new high school and renovation fo the existing high school into a middle school for grades 5 through 8. The bond issue article was defeated. The meeting supported establishment of a capital reserve fund to finance future construction or reconstruction of school buildings and replacement of school building equipment.

Carlene Gavin was re-elected to a three-year term on the school board as Mason representative and Everett Parmenter was elected as New Ipswich representative, for a three-year term, replacing Joseph Cartwright. Corrine Hall was appointed School District Treasurer, replacing Judith Willard, and Lynne Way was reappointed School District Clerk. Earl Somero was elected Chairman of the Mascenic School board and Thomas Welden, Co-Chairman.

In August, the school board appointed Michael Mezzocchi Associate Principal, Secondary, replacing Michael Connolly. Paul Ralston was appointed District Principal in November, 1986, replacing Edward Martin.

I want to thank the members of the school board, staff and communities, for their confidence and support. I shall continue towork closely with the other members of the Mascenic administrative team to provide the best possible education for the young people of Greenville, Mason and New Ipswich.

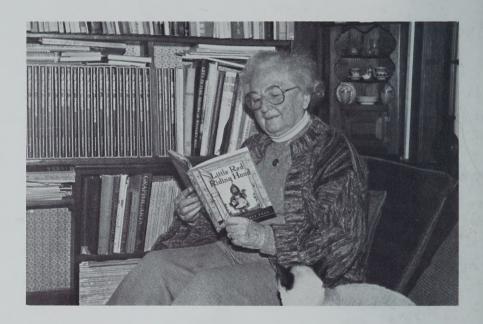

# NOTES





All of us can recall one special teacher who was able to draw from us our best work by expecting far more from us than we thought possible to give. But it is a rare thing when a whole town has such a resident teacher. Elizabeth Orton Jones -- "Twig" to us -- has been that inspiring teacher for Mason since she settled here in 1945. For forty-two years she has worked among us as an author, teacher, illustrator, historian and playwright. As a founder of Andy's Summer Playhouse Twig sought to bring the imaginative, creative world of theatre to the children and adults of our town. She has been a constant source of energy for the Mason Public Library and the Mason Historical Society. Her dedication has been formative for these two town institutions.

The world of ideas has no geographical boundaries and no political limits. Twig has given her whole life to this limitless world in her work as an artist. We are simply fortunate that she has chosen Mason as her place to live. As her authorship of the Mason Bicentennial Book shows us so clearly, she has helped us to reflect on our past while looking to the future with a hope that great things await us in this marvelous community. Author of many books, winner of the Caldecott Medal for the most distinguished children's picture book published in 1944 -- these are notable accomplishments. However, it is as our continuing resident teacher of the creative arts that we cherish her. May she keep at her work with us for many more years.
