Inaugural Address

MAYOR EATON D. SARGENT

January 1, 1926

In completing a two year term as your Mayor and approaching another I do so with a realization of the Mayor's dependence upon a helpful and constructive attitude on the part of the Board of Aldermen. The past two years have been a period of substantial and needed development in our various municipal activities. This would not be the case but for a fine spirit of co-operation in all City Departments and the unqualified support of a splendid Board of Aldermen. I am certain that you, gentlemen, members of the new Board, will in all respects guard the best interests of Nashua with the same degree of intelligent care. I want to make it very clear that the Mayor is ready and glad at any time to discuss with you individually or collectively, or with any official or employee of the City, matters that have to do with conduct of the City's business to the end that best possible results may accrue to our municipality. Constructive criticism from any source is welcomed.

In the Inaugural of January 1st, 1924, I invited the attention of the Board of Aldermen to what seemed to many as rather an ambitious civic program. Most of the suggestions made at the time have, I am glad to say, become accomplished facts, and other important measures that were not then mentioned have either been concluded or are underway.

In retrospect let me mention:

New Mount Pleasant School Building.

New James B. Crowley School Building.

Main Street widened between West Pearl and West Hollis Streets.

Motorization of the Fire Department completed.

New Fire Station on Crown Hill.

Municipal Swimming Pool, Bath House, and Bath-House Bridge.

New Passageway north of City Hall and Police Station.

62,862 square yards of new permanent street.

9.18 miles of new permanent sidewalks.

18,754 feet of new sewers.

Development of both North and South Commons.

Purchase of additional land for Shattuck Street School Yard.

Marked development of recreational activities.

Improved milk inspection facilities.

Organization of Historical Society.

New Main Street Bridge authorized.

Development of Howard Square named in Honor of Ex-Mayor J. Woodbury Howard.

Development of City Yard on East Hollis Street including new brick barn together with a great number of lesser but altogether desirable improvements.

City's Valuation and Indebtedness

The assessed valuation of the City of Nashua for 1925 is \$43,414,370. Our total net indebtedness to date is \$1,943,666.85. Using the 1925 assessed valuation figures would permit an indebtedness of \$2,604,862.20. The net increase of Bonded indebtedness for the year, including Bonds issued for the Main Street Bridge, Crown Hill Fire Station, and motorization of the Fire Department, is \$269,937.90.

The tangible assets of the City in the shape of Real Estate, Buildings, and Equipment are easily \$2,500,000 so that in making up a Statement of Condition, such as would be made in any well ordered business, it is plain that the City of Nashua is in very excellent condition financially.

1926 Budget

Our City Charter provides that on or before February 1st of each year every department shall make and submit to the Mayor an estimate of their needs for the year. During the past two years all departments have been prompt in this respect. May I ask a continuance of this good work.

Every department will be required to submit a detailed schedule of their needs and every economy consistent with good work must be practiced.

Tax Rate

Our present tax rate of \$25.40 per thousand compares favorably with other cities and is substantially lower than the average tax rate throughout the State which is \$26.90 per thousand. A large amount of development work in the shape of building operations has been done during the year just closed. On every hand healthy activity of this sort is much in evidence. It is estimated that an increase in taxable assessed valuation to a total of rising forty-five million dollars will be reached when the next tax roll is made up. Having this in mind, also having in mind no **unusual** expenditures for the coming year, there should, it seems, be but little variation in the present exceedingly reasonable rate of taxation in Nashua.

Budget Appropriations

With the exception of the School Department practically all of our City Departments during the past year have kept within their appropriations. The School Department was under unusual and unexpected expense in the matter of new heating apparatus, new plumbing facilities, and the general improvement of conditions at the Arlington Street and Lake Street Schools. In addition to these unexpected expenditures many of the teachers took advantage of special training

requirements as outlined by the Board of Education which secured for them an increased salary. The cost of this feature was underestimated at the commencement of the year.

An unexpected expenditure of about five thousand dollars was made necessary on account of the installation of a new boiler in the City Hall to replace two old boilers that had given more than forty years service and were wholly inadequate.

Schools and Schoolhouses

May I emphasize what has previously been urged concerning the desirability of the very best educational facilities in our public schools. Quite all of the unsatisfactory and in some cases impossible conditions in our school structures have been eliminated, and to my mind Nashua now possesses modern school buildings and modern equipment that compare favorably with those in any city. The crowded condition of the Palm Street School, to which I previously called attention, has been mitigated to some extent through the use of suitable quarters in the Greek Church nearby.

Later on I shall take up with you the matter of changing over the old fire engine house on Arlington Street so that it can be used for various municipal and community purposes, one of these being the Crown Hill Kindergarten which now occupies a rented building.

On the whole I have but complimentary things to say concerning the operation of our School Department. The health and mental development of the children of our city is being carefully and wisely guarded through the medium of our Board of Education activities supplemented by a very excellent corps of superintendents and teachers.

Fire Department

We feel justifiable pride in our Fire Department now newly and completely motorized. I am informed by the very effi-

cient Board of Fire Commissioners that everything needful has been done to place our Fire Department on the highest possible plane of efficiency. The various stations are adequate and the equipment is the best obtainable. A fine body of loyal men make up the personnel of this Department.

Police Department

The affairs of our Police Department are, so far as I know, in entirely satisfactory condition. I especially urge that this Department has the sincere support and cooperation of all citizens in its effort to do away with prevalent forms of crime. Our policemen have many unpleasant duties to perform, and always the criminally inclined endeavor to discredit our police officers and interfere with their attempts at law enforcement. It is the unquestioned duty of every good citizen of Nashua to aid in every reasonable way our efficient Police Department in its effort towards crime prevention.

Board of Public Works

It is the purpose of the Board of Public Works to continue the policy of previous years in making some substantial, permanent improvements in our streets and sidewalks along well defined lines.

Previous reference has been made to the amazing amount of permanent work done during the past two years, and all this is beneficial and wise. There have been over nine miles of cement sidewalks constructed, nearly sixty thousand square yards of new pavement laid, and over three miles of new sewers built, a record which few cities of our size can match. There is a pressing demand from all quarters for new street and sidewalk development. I feel, however, that only a moderate amount of this work should be undertaken during the coming year, but I do feel that we should address ourselves particularly to an improvement in some of our outlying

roads, notably the Pine Hill and Dunstable Roads which need considerable attention.

East Pearl Street

The condition of East Pearl Street continues almost intolerable. The Board of Public Works and, I am sure, the Board of Aldermen would be glad to remedy it when the work can be done in a proper and permanent fashion. May I repeat the opinion expressed a year ago to the effect that East Pearl Street should be widened some five or six feet, which can be done without interfering with any building, and then properly paved it would then be one of the best streets in Nashua. I am unwilling, however, to consent to a make-shift job.

Building Regulations

I had hoped that before this proper building regulations would be in effect. This work, however, has been under way for several months by a special committee, and will without doubt be submitted to your honorable Board within a short time for definite consideration.

Municipal Officers

Two years ago I invited attention of the Board of Aldermen to the need of a re-arrangement of the City Hall interior so as to provide for the separation of the offices of City Treasurer, who is also Tax Collector, and the City Clerk, who is likewise Overseer of the Poor. I am particularly impressed with the importance of a separation of these municipal activities by constantly increasing detail work in both Departments; and to that end I recommend that consideration be given by competent architects to the matter of the re-arrangement of the interior of the City Hall.

Band Concerts

I am much in favor of municipal band concerts. We are handicapped, however, in respect to these concerts by reason of a lack of suitable bandstands in various sections of the City. I think a start should be made to correct this situation, and would recommend that consideration be given the matter of erecting a suitable, permanent, and **modern** bandstand on South Common.

New Main Street Bridge

The destruction by fire of the historical Main Street Bridge, connecting the very heart of the City, created a most trying situation. It was possible however, to re-establish traffic by means of a temporary structure without much delay or serious inconvenience.

The Board of Aldermen authorized the erection of a modern concrete bridge of greater width, and to accommodate these plans the City purchased some of the adjoining properties.

Progress on the new bridge has been slow but thorough. Numerous construction and other difficulties have been encountered. I am confident, however, that the structure will be completed without unreasonable delay at the agreed contract price, that it will be a credit to the City, and an evidence of a broad, far-sighted policy on the part of the City Government.

Additional Voting Facilities in Wards 7 and 8

I recommend for your consideration the establishment of two voting precincts in each Wards 7 and 8. The number of voters in these Wards is very large and rapidly increasing. Steps should be taken to not only relieve the congestion and consequent delay in voting but to make the polling places accessible and convenient.

I have no suggestions concerning an early development of the Artillery Pond and North Common project in the shape of a Memorial Athletic Field as has been well suggested, or concerning the necessity or desirability or widening Main Street at the "neck of the bottle". These two subjects will in my opinion, be up for consideration by reason of a demand on the part of the citizens generally, but they are not matters for this Administration to take up.

In Conclusion

I am anticipating an opportunity with you for helpful service to the City of Nashua. Doubtless some mistakes will be made, but let it be said that such errors will be of omission rather than commission. Much can be accomplished by team work,—everyone pulling for Nashua and for New Hampshire.

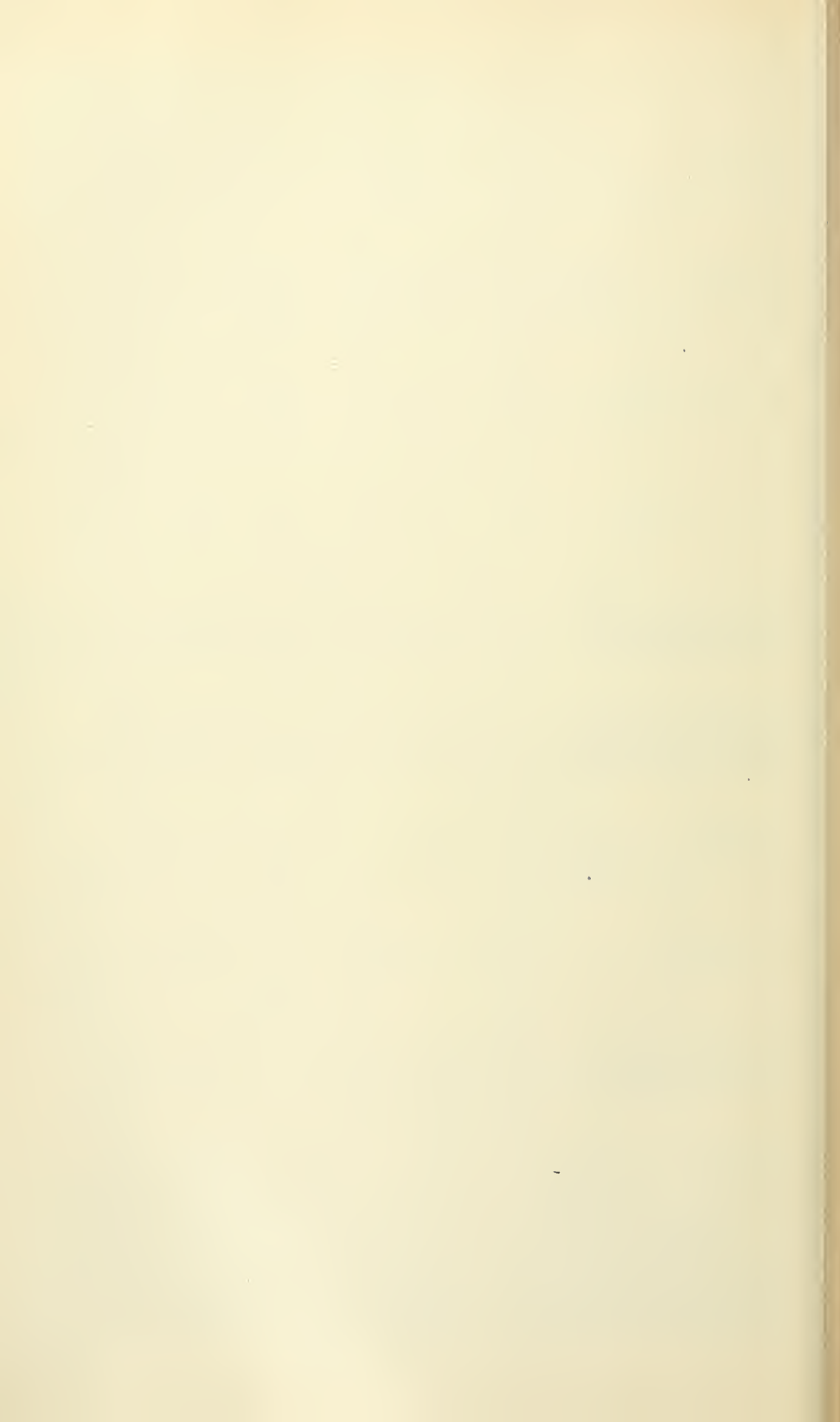

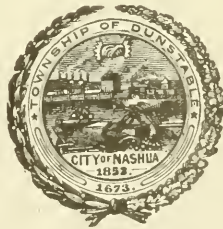

RESOLVED, By the Board of Aldermen of the City of Nashua Pursuant to the provisions of the Municipal Bonds Act of 1895 as amended by the Laws of 1917 and to the provisions of a special act which was approved on May 4, 1923 entitled "An Act empowering the City of Nashua to incur debt to the amount of six percent of its valuation" the Mayor and Treasurer are hereby authorized to issue and sell, under the direction of the Finance Committee, bonds of the City of Nashua in the aggregate principal sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.00).

AN ORDINANCE

IN RELATION TO FIRE PROTECTION

BE IT ORDAINED, By the Board of Aldermen of the City of Nashua:

Section 1. No person, firm or corporation shall have in any building, or upon any premises or other place, or in or about any highway or way, whether used as a public or private thoroughfare, in close proximity to any building or buildings, any combustibile or explosive matter or dangerous accumulation of rubbish, ashes, or accumulation of waste paper, boxes, shavings, or other inflammable material, which is so situated as to be a fire hasard.

Section 2. No person, firm or corporation, shall obstruct any fire escape, stairs, passageway, door or window, of any building in such manner as to interfere with the operation of the Fire Department, or aggress of occupants in case of Fire.

Section 3. No person, firm, or corporation shall place ashes in any wooden container, which is in contact with any wooden surface within any building.

Section 4. No person, firm or corporation, shall keep or permit to be kept, in or about any building, any oily waste or oily rags, unless when not in actual use, such oily waste or oily rags are kept in a self closing metal container with riveted joints, no parts of the body of said container to be within five inches of any inflammable surface.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the Chief of the Fire Department to inspect, or cause to be inspected by such officers or members of the Fire Department as he shall designate as often as he shall deem necessary, all buildings, premises, and public and private thoroughfares and caused to be corrected any conditions liable to cause fire, or any violation of the provision of this Ordinance; said inspection shall be made at least once each month within the limits beginning at the junction of Concord and Lowell Streets, thence by Lowell and Lock Street to Chandler Street southerly on Chandler St. to Canal and Bridge Streets to the B. & M. R. R. to include the section North of Bridge Street between Jackson Square and Jackson St., thence southeasterly by B. & M. R. R. tracks to East Hollis St., thence easterly by said East Hollis St. to C. Street, thence westerly on East Hollis St. to corner of Denton St. thence by Denton Street, south to Crown St., thence by said Crown St., westerly to Allds Street and East Hollis St., thence westerly on East Hollis St., to Marshall St., and southerly on Marshall St. to Bowers St., westerly on Bowers St., to Harbor Avenue, southerly on Harbor Avenue, to Bowery and westerly on Bowery to Pond

St., thence northerly to Otterson St., thence by said Otterson St. to Main St. and northerly on Main Street to Kinsley Street, thence westerly on Kinsley St., to Wilder St., and northerly on Wilder Street to West Hollis St., westerly on West Hollis to Eaton St., northerly on Eaton St., to Ledge St., westerly on Ledge Street to Pine St., northerly on Pine St., to Myrtle St., thence on Myrtle St. to Chestnut Street, Chestnut St., to Factory St., easterly on Factory St. to Washington St., Washington St. to Water St., to Main St., and northerly on Main Street to Franklin St., westerly on Franklin St., to Front St., Main St. northerly from Franklin to Amherst St., and to include all public garages whether inside or outside of the foregoing limits, or any building that he thinks is a menance.

Section 6. Whenever the Chief of the Fire Department or any officer or member of the Fire Department designated as aforesaid, shall find any violations of the provisions of this Ordinance, the Chief of the Fire Department or said officer or member of said Department may give 24 hours in which to clean up and correct the condition then if nothing has been done at the expiration of said 24 hours the Chief of the Fire Department shall by notice in writing, delivered to the tenant or occupant, the owner of such buildings or premises, immediately order the removal of the fire hasard, or the condition corrected, within such time as he shall designate in said order and such order shall be complied with by such tenant or occupant, and owner. In case a condition contrary to the provisions of this ordinance is found in a public highway, alley or way, the Chief of the Fire Department shall immediately give written notice to the Superintendent of Streets who shall forthwith remove such condition.

Section 7: The service of any order of the Chief of the Fire Department upon any tenant or occupant, and owner of any building or premises to whom it is directed, shall be made, by delivering true copies of said order to such tenant or occupant, and owner, if within the jurisdiction of the offi-

cer making the order, otherwise, by mailing true copies of said order to the said tenant or occupant and owner, at their last known post office address.

Section 8. All tenants, occupants and owners of building or premises, shall permit the Chief of the Fire Department, or officers or members of said Department designated by him, to inspect at any reasonable time, their buildings or premises, for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 9. The Chief of the Fire Department shall keep a record of all inspections, and a copy of all orders issued by him, on forms provided for that purpose, which shall remain on file and of record in the office of the Chief of the Fire Department.

Section 10. Any person, firm or corporation, failing to comply with the order of the Chief of the Fire Department may be fined not more than \$20.00 for each offense, and each twenty-four hours of maintenance of prohibited conditions, shall constitute a separate offense or the City of Nashua may proceed to remove the hazard and charge expenses so incurred to the owner of the premises.

Section 11 This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

ORDINANCE

AMENDING CHAPTER 35 OF THE REVISED ORDINANCES,
ENTITLED, "SALARIES AND COMPENSATION" AS
AMENDED BY ORDINANCES PASSED
JULY 10, 1923 AND JULY 13, 1920.

Section One.

Amend Section 1 as amended July 10, 1923 by striking out the whole of said Section and inserting in place thereof the following:

The City Clerk and Overseer of the Poor shall receive in full for his services and for all duties appertaining to his office the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) per annum, to be paid in equal monthly payments of Two Hundred and Eight Dollars and Thirty Three Cents (\$208.33) each.

All fees, perquisites and emoluments allowed the City Clerk and Overseer of the Poor excepting the fees provided for by Chapter 173 of the Public Statutes and Chapter 55 of the Laws of 1919 and amendments thereto shall be accounted for and paid by him to the City Treasurer.

Amend Section 5 as amended July 10, 1923 by striking out the whole of said Section and inserting in place thereof the following:

The City Treasurer and Collector of Taxes shall receive in full for his services the sum of Twenty Seven Hundred Dollars (\$2,700.00) per annum payable in equal monthly payments of Two Hundred and Twenty Five Dollars (\$225.00) each, and, all fees and perquisites pertaining to the office of Collector of Taxes shall be the property of and paid in to the City.

Amend Section 8 as amended July 13, 1920 by striking out the following: The Clerk of said Board shall receive in full for his services the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) per year and inserting in place thereof the following: The Clerk of said Board shall receive in full for his services the sum of Eighteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,800.00) per year so that as amended said Section 8 shall read as follows:

Each member of the Board of Assessors shall be paid in full for his services the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900.00) per year, excepting one member thereof to be designated by said Board, who shall receive in full for his services the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) per year, and whose duties in addition to his regular duties as a member thereof shall be prescribed by said Board. So far as practicable the said Board shall perform continuous services during the months of March, April, May, June, October and November in each year, and the member who shall perform duties in addition to his regular duties, as prescribed by said Board, shall perform continuous services for the additional months of January and February in each year. The Clerk of said Board shall receive in full for his services the sum of Eighteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,800.00) per year.

All of said Salaries shall be paid Quarterly.

Section 2.

All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Report of the Board of Health

Nashua, N. H., March 1, 1926

To His Honor the Mayor and Board of Aldermen:

In submitting our annual report we wish to call your attention that on account of not having suitable funds at our disposal we have been unable to carry out the present day intensive work to eradicate diphtheria. Most of our neighboring cities are doing this work and as near as we can learn are getting some very good results.

During the year we had five deaths reported from whooping cough and other deaths from broncho pneumonia in children which is reasonable to assume was caused by whooping cough. At best this disease is hard to control. The attitude upon the part of some that it is a disease that children must have without doubt contributes to its prevalence. Some more stringent measures, making it compulsory to make every case of whooping cough to be reported combined with isolation of a case for a period should be enacted in the form of an ordinance to stop the progress of this disease.

During the early Spring of the year 1925, on account of the prevalence of German Measles and other mixed infections in cooperation with the State Board of Health this department conducted an investigation as to course and origin of these infections and maintained a consultation service for the same which was productive of very good results.

The collection of Garbage in our city is progressing satisfactorily a major portion of the same being collected by our local garbage truck, which means with the constantly increasing demand for collection will necessitate our having a larger truck or trucks to properly collect and dispose of the garbage in our city.

The tuberculosis clinic has been doing a wonderful work in the early recognition of tuberculosis and pre-tuberculosis in

children the immediate effect of this work will not be manifest, but the wonderful results from this work that will be accomplished to prevent tuberculosis in early adult life cannot be over estimated. Our City is greatly indebted to Dr. Robert B. Kerr, and his assistant for this wonderful work.

The Venereal Disease clinic is functioning and doing a good work in their department.

The work of the Milk and Health Inspectors are submitted in a separate report.

The annual "Clean-up" was conducted in conjunction with the Board of Public Works under direction of the Health and Milk Inspectors.

Our office quarters are being rapidly outgrown. We must depend upon artificial light entirely and ventilation is poor. I trust we will soon be in a position to have more adequate and better lighted office for this department.

During the past year I have paid special attention to Tonic manufacturing plants and the sterilization of their bottles. There is a new law which requires every manufacturer of tonic to be equipped with an automatic filling, rinsing and capping of bottles. All bottles prior to refilling shall be cleansed and sterilized by soaking in a solution of not less than 3 1-2% or caustic alkali for a period of not less than five minutes. There are now seven of these manufacturers which are equipped with these sterilizers.

I also collected samples of ammonia, molasses and butter etc., with Mr. Duval, State Food Inspector, to be analyzed in Concord.

Also followed up paper teams which were collecting paper by the Board of Public Works to see that there was no garbage being mixed with the papers.

During the Month of April Mr. Smith, the Milk Inspector, assisted me in the Spring Clean-up Campaign.

I have made a special effort to see that the fruit stores had their windows conform to the state law.

I collected samples of Ice Cream in July at the Ice Cream plants and stores and these were tested by Mr. Smith the Milk Inspector and found to be very satisfactory.

Report of Milk Inspector

Nashua, N. H., March 1st, 1926

To the Board of Health, City of Nashua, N. H.

Gentlemen:—

One of the changes which has taken place within the Dairy industries in the city last year is the buying milk by weight and test by two of the largest dairies. This method gives the farmer an incentive to produce milk containing more butter fat, because he is paid more for a high testing milk than for milk which is low in butter fat. In the past all milk produced brought the same price per can and the result was that quality was not as important as quantity, which resulted in the production of much milk which was low in butter fat. This milk was unsatisfactory to the consuming public although it might pass the State standards. The dealers in this city desire to sell milk which tests 3.7% butter fat, which is considerable more than is required by the State law by 3.35%

The milk plants in this city are installing new equipment which includes three pasteurizers, one automatic refrigerating machine and two outfits for bacterial examination of milk. These bacterial outfits will be important because in the course of time all milk bought at these plants will be examined by the retailers themselves and will give the farmers an idea of the quality of their milk both as regards bacteria and butter

fat.

The past year considerable time was taken to help retailers of the city sign up their milk producers to have their cattle tested under State and Federal supervision. This work has progressed satisfactory and today all indications seem to show that we will have a supply of milk and cream in the city by July 1st, 1926, entirely from herds under State and Federal supervision.

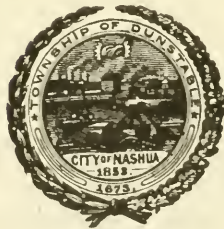

THE MAIN STREET WIDENING

Main Street Widening between West Pearl Street and the Boston & Main Railroad, Worcester Branch.

PERMANENT PAVING

There were no funds provided from bond issues for paving, but Crown Street was completed with cement concrete

French Street was improved with cement gutter and curb. This was paid out of the Regular Appropriation.

MAIN STREET BRIDGE

The J. R. Worcester Company of Boston was engaged to furnish plans and specification for the new bridge, and contract was let May 25, 1925, to Cunningham & Burdwood Co., for \$173,767.00. The Flaherty Property and Willens property was purchased by the City.

There was a special bond issue for \$300,000.00 for this work and it is expected that the Bridge will be completed in 1926.

MILFORD HIGHWAY

The State and City resurfaced 2.77 miles or 29,757 Sq. Yds. on the South Side Highway, each paying one-half of the cost.

This work cost \$28,598.84.

SIDEWALKS

There were 13,743 Sq. Yds or 4.68 miles of public walks, five feet wide, and 6,430 Sq. Yds., or 2.19 miles of private walks five feet wide.

In connection with this work 847 lineal feet of steps and back curb were built.

NEW BARN

The Aldermen made a special appropriation of \$10,000.00 for a new barn on the East Hollis Street Property. This was a much needed improvement and all the equipment is now in one yard.

SEWERS

The Storm Sewers in Cottage, Factory, Walnut and West Pearl Street were completed.

The development of the Swart Street Property required sewerage, so a new outlet was established through an under pass with the Merrimac River, and this system can later be continued through Greeley Park, and serve the district north of the Park.

There was no appropriation made in 1925 for sewers, but there was a balance left from 1924 of \$46,976.65.

The expenditures were \$57,200.03, leaving an overdraft of \$10,223.38.

Gentlemen:—

We respectfully submit to you the report of the Fire Department for the year ending December 31, 1925.

The Board of Fire Commissioners, consisting of H. C. Lintott, C. H. Austin and E. W. Duncklee, met January 1st, and organized by electing H. C. Lintott as Chairman and E. W. Duncklee as clerk.

The Fire Department had by far the busiest year in its history, having answered 433 alarms, 53 more than any previous years, and 926 ambulance calls.

The following appointments were made: Drivers of Motor Apparatus, A. C. Taggart, P. V. Jauron, H. Dubois and C. L. York.

Fire Prevention Week, October 7th to 15th, was again fittingly observed by the Department.

INSPECTIONS OF THE DEPARTMENT

Officers and members have made Inspections of Blocks, Cellars, Yards, etc., to guard against the accumulation of rubbish and inflammable material and to note any conditions liable to cause fire.

These Inspections are of great benefit to the citizens and property owners in general. The Inspections are also of great value to this department, allowing the members to familiarize themselves as to the nature of contents and the construction of the different buildings within their districts.

We think that every effort should be made to lower our insurance rates. This we are sure can be accomplished with

the drafting of a new building code in addition to the changes and improvements being made in this department.

In conclusion, we wish to extend our thanks to His Honor the Mayor, and the members of the Board of Aldermen, for their co-operation and interest in our department, to the Chief of Police and members of the Police Department; Superintendent and employees of the Water Department for valuable services rendered; also the Gas and Electric Departments of the Traction Co.

The officers and members of the Fire Department have our commendation and sincere thanks for the efficient and faithful manner in which they have performed their duties.

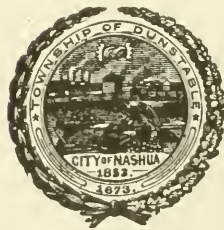

During the first part of the year a boy was bitten by a dog having the rabies and died. It appeared that several dogs had been bitten, which had shown signs of having the rabies. The City Government took action and ordered all dogs running at large to be muzzled for a period of 90 days. A warrant was issued to this department to kill all dogs found running at large not complying with the order. By reason of this order 73 dogs were killed. Of these 73 dogs killed only one of them had a legal right to live, all others were either unlicensed or not complying with the dog law which applies to all dogs during the whole year. The streets were cleaned of wandering half fed dogs which were becoming a menace to the city.

During the year it required special policing of the approaches to the Main Street bridge and this expense amounted to approximately \$3,000.00 a detail which was not taken into consideration in the appropriations for the year 1925. If the bridge is not completed during the present year I would estimate that it will cost \$3,500.00 to properly police the bridge and approaches during construction.

Owing to the conditions in the city it was found advisable to assign two more officers to liquor work and by the efforts of the four officers assigned to the work and the assistance of the the rest of the department 381 cases were presented to the Municipal court and of this number 224 were convicted and a total of \$20,582.50 for fines and costs, not including the witness fees was assessed. \$7,846.70 of this amount actually being paid into the Municipal Court which ultimately is paid into the city treasury. The cases which represent the balance of the \$20,582.50 went to the Superior Court upon appeals and we disposed of in that court, the fines and costs in these cases revert to the County of Hillsborough.

It must be remembered that it is only by special assignments of plain clothes officers that any appreciable amount of successful work can be accomplished in the apprehension of liquor law violators. No uniformed police officer, no matter how good his qualifications are, is of great importance in apprehending liquor violators owing to the secrecy and crafty methods employed in plying their trade. If the liquor law is to be properly enforced it will require the continued vigilant effort of this special detail in the future.

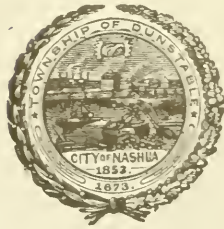

The general health of the community has been excellent for the past year. There were no epidemics. The work of the hospital has steadily increased. This is due to social and economic conditions, and to the growing popularity of institutional care. With beds and cots set up in the corridors

and library, and the normal capacity taxed to the limit, it has often been necessary to take over the waiting room and one of the superintendent's rooms for the accommodation of patients.

Much attention has been given to laboratory work. All blood examinations, such as blood counts, blood sugars, blood coagulation tests and urine examinations, smears, sputums are made by the technician, Miss Nellie B. MacManus, and for the past year these number 1657. The hystological specimens are examined at the State Laboratories at Concord and Hanover, and number 106 for the same period.

The X-Ray department has rendered increased and efficient service both for diagnosis and treatment. In addition to its regular work, it has this year filmed the chests of all the underweight school children in Nashua for the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association, and information as to possible incipient Tuberculosis and other conditions has been secured for the study of these cases.

Nashua is the first city in the state to begin and follow up this investigation, and the Memorial Hospital gladly lends its aid in promoting the public good and in preserving the manhood of the state.

Mindful of the future needs, title to the F. W. Estabrook estate extending from the Hospital westward to Main St. was secured early in the year, and this fine tract of land with buildings is now hospital property.

Coincident with this purchase, your building committee, following the plans outlined at the several meetings held during the successful Hospital Campaign of 1924, began the active work of building the new Nurses' Home and the addition to the hospital proper.

The buildings on the east side of Dearborn Street were sold and removed. The old Nurses' Home was torn down, and the nursing staff was quartered at the Estabrook mansion.

Contracts were awarded to the Nashua Building Co., for

the Nurses' Home and to S. Belanger and Son, Inc., for the Hospital Extension, both firms being successful bidders on the plans and specifications furnished by the architects, Stevens and Lee of Boston.

The work was begun promptly and has gone on steadily. The Nurses' Home, completed, was opened to inspection of the public Saturday, January 16, and is pronounced by all a model of its kind.

The Hospital addition is nearing completion and will be ready for occupancy in three weeks. This building, fireproof throughout, is a model of convenience, elegance and completeness.

The various details of property changes, correspondence, conferences with architects and builders, and with the different contractors installing special features, constituted an amount of work which took up many hours out of every twenty four, for a year.

It is with a deep sense of justice that your committee accords to one of its members, Mr. Herbert L. Flather, full credit for doing practically all of this work. His knowledge of construction, his mechanical and business ability, and his untiring and unselfish devotion have helped most materially both contractors and hospital in securing a high standard of results.

We record with pleasure appreciation of the achievements of the Ladies Auxilliary, whom in addition to their usual work of making and salvaging hospital supplies, have this year made curtains and other articles of furnishings for the new buildings and acted as hostesses to the visiting public at the opening of the new Nurses Home.

The spirit of the nursing staff has been praiseworthy; the interest of the physicians commendable; and the work of employees in general, satisfactory.

Nashua Memorial Hospital Training School

REPORT, 1925

At this time it may not be amiss to give a brief resume of the work and the inception and growth of the Training School for nurses of the Nashua Memorial Hospital. Thirty-five years ago through the efforts of the Nashua Medical Society we opened our little seven room Emergency Hospital in a cottage on Spring Street, with a staff of two graduate nurses. In spite of public sentiment against hospital treatment, we soon outgrew these limited quarters, and the Holt homestead, on the site of our present building was purchased and enlarged, giving room for a training school, which was opened with five pupils under the able leadership of Miss Shattuck of Pepperell; soon this number was more than doubled and we began to need extra room for our pupils, whose only accommodations were in the attic and cupola of the hospital. They had no opportunity for needed relaxation. Nashua was not accustomed to pupil nurses, and if they laughed or showed other signs of youthful enjoyment outside of work hours, the dear critical public branded them as frivolous; and in their rooms they must make no noise, else some poor sufferer on the floor below would be disturbed. Their work was not lightened by the modern equipment we now possess; yet with a sterilizer made from a wash boiler with a few wires soldered across to hold the sponges and instruments out of the water, and other appliances equally crude, they did such good work that for many months at a time, no slightest case of sepsis developed.

We of the staff longed for more nurses and better housing for them, and we hailed with joy the chance given us by the beneficence of Dr. Wilbur to move back the old hospital and use it for a nurses home. But our contentment was short lived. People had contracted the hospital habit, and soon the

building overflowed with patients and we needed more and more nurses. The night nurses had no bedrooms for themselves and were liable to be disturbed by the other occupants of the room. The special nurses had no place to hang their outdoor things nor to change to their uniforms, except one bath room, which was rather close quarters for seven or eight girls, which the hospital often required for extra care of the patients which could not be supplied by our limited number of undergraduates.

Two years ago the lack of beds in the hospital become so acute, that it was necessary to enlarge and build upon the ground occupied by the nurses' home and our building committee with rare acumen and foresight have erected a home for our girls, second to none in the country, and large enough for our needs for many years to come. With its fifty single bedrooms all equipped with running water and modern furniture, its beautiful reception room, library, classroom and recreation hall, it should prove an attraction to girls of culture and refinement, and be a social uplift to all our girls.

The school has now twenty-six nurses in training and from this number we have been able to supply an average of two special nurses daily throughout the year. There were six nurses in our graduating class, four of whom went up for the state examinations and passed with honors.

Seven probationers entered, five being accepted. In spite of the extra work caused by the building of the new wing, lectures have been kept up to date.

There has been no change in the training school staff except a vacancy caused by the resignation of Miss Benfield, head nurse of the first floor. Ill health obliged her to take a long rest, and her place has not yet been filled. Two of the recent graduates who had not quite completed their time have been doing efficient work looking after one floor till a suitable successor to Miss Benfield can be found.

On April 20, 1925 the Executive Committee purchased from Mr. F. W. Esterbrook the real estate situated at the corner of Main and Prospect Streets for the sum of \$35,000 and one-half the current taxes. The purchase of this property was both necessary and desirable. Necessary on account of their being no proper place to house our staff of nurses during the erection of the new home for nurses and the addition to the hospital itself. Desirable because we now own sufficient

land on which can be erected when required, another addition large enough to double the present hospital together with its new addition. I predict that the when additional facilities will be required will arrive much sooner than even our most optimistic friends believe today.

To finance the purchase of the Esterbrook property, fifty thousand dollars was borrowed from the New Hampshire Savings Bank, Concord, N. H. on a mortgage. Of this sum, thirty-five thousand dollars was paid Mr. Esterbrook, thirteen thousand five hundred to the Old Guaranty Savings Bank of this city to discharge our old mortgage, and the balance, fifteen hundred dollars was used to pay in part for the furnishings of our new home for nurses.

Report of City Librarian

The circulation of books for the year was 125,876, which is an average of 10,490 a month and 4.43 books per capita of the city's population. The increase over 1924 is 748. The number of volumes purchased, 1430, and 117 gifts, makes 1547 new books added during the year. Deducting the number lost and discarded, the net gain to the collection is 905, making the total number of books in the library 39,518.

The total number of registered borrowers is 5024, 1440 of these being registered in 1925. The percentage of borrowers to the population is merely 18 per cent.

The deposit station at Crown Hill has circulated 8102 books; 2805 adult and 5297 juvenile. There is hope this year of a permanent branch, which seems to be justified, judging from the use made of the present very inadequate quarters. We are still indebted to the Department of Education for their kindness in allowing us the use of the kindergarten building.

A small deposit of books is kept at the police guard room, and at the Mary E. Hunt Home. The library is glad to serve any city department or institution in this way.

The picture collection has proved of great value on special holidays and for use in schools. Besides the many pictures used for display in the library, 418 have been given out.

The new shelving in the historical room will make it possible to arrange all the New Hampshire and Nashua material in one place, which will be a distinct advantage to the library staff and to the public.

This valuable material with the interesting pictures on the walls makes this room a beginning for a notable historical collection of local material.

Report of the Superintendent

To the Board of Education,
Nashua, New Hampshire.

The accompanying reports from the various school departments, together with whatever I may add, constitute the annual summary concerning the schools for the past year.

The school census taken last fall showed the enrollment in the local public schools to be 4263, fifty-six more than at the corresponding time the year before.

Josephine Callahan who had taught the school near the Country Club for seven terms died during this year.

Carrie Ober, first elected in 1889 died January 11, 1926.

She resigned after thirty-five years of teaching.

Sara Collins, elected in May 1871, died in December 1925.

Her teaching experience was approximately fifty-two years.

In September 1925 for the first time pupils were admitted to the Junior High School from the non-accelerated classes which entered the first grade six years before and other pupils were admitted to the same school who entered the first grade seven years before. This made an unusually large first-year class of 377 members. There were 214 in the second-year class so that the Junior High School enrollment was a little over one hundred larger than it was the preceding year. Four additional teachers had been secured for the school. Accommodations for the classes were obtained by discontinuing in the Junior High building the seventh grade classes taught by Miss Wheeler, Miss Earley and Mrs. Stickney, and by transferring Mrs. Woodbury's special class to the Quincy St. School. There are now only Junior High classes in the Temple St. building except the special groups in charge of Miss Valcour and Mrs. Jennings. The number of pupils in the Junior High School will be large next year but should be normal thereafter.

We now have one less special class than we had last year, not because the number of pupils who could profitably be placed in such classes is smaller but because we have no available room for another special class. Last year one of the rooms in the Junior building was used in the afternoon for a special class but this is made impossible now that the Junior High has two sessions each day.

Every room in the new James B. Crowley building and every room in the new Mt. Pleasant building is being used constantly. The only unused school rooms in the city are two in the O'Donnell building, formerly occupied by the kindergarten. Even a small increase in the number of children in the public schools would cause overcrowding. This is

made evident by the average number of pupils in each class room. After the schools were organized for the present year the reports, from all the city grade schools having more than three teachers, show an average enrollment per teacher of approximately 34 pupils. If we should have an unusually large influx from the private schools we would be swamped. One hundred seventy transferred this year from the local private schools to the public elementary schools and sixty others entered the High School.

The rural school house in District No. 4—the one on the road to Hollis Station—should be renovated or a new building should be provided. While the building is the smallest, the number of pupils there is the largest among the suburban schools. Twenty-seven pupils have been crowded into that little, old building this last term. This rural school house was built about one hundred years ago.

Very much needed repairs have been made in the Lake St. and in the Arlington St. buildings to the sanitary appliances and to the heating systems.

The new Mount Pleasant school building was dedicated May 7, 1925. The principal speaker at the exercises was the Deputy Commissioner of Education of Massachusetts, Frank W. Wright. The building contains an assembly hall with three hundred eighty-six seats, ten class rooms each accommodating forty pupils, and two attractive rooms for kindergarten children. All these rooms are well filled now. The accommodations for pupils are very much better and more modern than in the old building but not any greater number of children can be housed in the new building than were there when all three stories of the old building were in use. For

the school year ending in June 1901, the records show that four hundred seventy-three pupils attended the Mount Pleasant School two weeks or more. The membership in the new school with all the rooms occupied, including the kindergarten, is four hundred twenty-six. This is the number who have attended two weeks or more and it is forty-seven less than the corresponding number in this school twenty-five years ago.

The domestic science department is looking for more room, especially for High School classes. I recommend putting at their disposal, as soon as the matter can be arranged, the rooms on the third floor of the High School building now used by the dental clinic, the eye clinic and the biology classes. These rooms are well located for domestic science work and poorly located for the young children who come to the clinics from the different schools of the city. The biology laboratory could be provided for in the annex that should be built in the rear of the High School building. The present quarters of the High Schools are over crowded. Two large rooms have each been divided, making four recitation rooms, and some domestic science recitations are regularly held in the basement. The class which will enter the Senior High School in September 1927 is likely to be larger by one hundred pupils than any preceding class. The clinics could be held in hired rooms or possibly in the rearranged City Hall building, or perhaps in the Community Council building.

A separate building for manual training should eventually

be provided and the property at the corner of Quincy and Pearl streets seems to be the best location for it. Manual training machinery and scholastic work do not mix well in the same school building. The rooms in the Quincy St. building now used for shops and drawing will readily be filled for pupils are always glad to attend schools in the center of the city. The basement of the Quincy St. school is sorely needed for play room. The four hundred children in this school now have almost no play room except the adjacent street.

A new school house is also needed in the section west of Palm St. At present we are hiring the Greek school building and accommodating one hundred and fifteen children there. Moreover there is no grade above the fourth nearer than the Crowley school or Quincy St. for children living west of Main Street. This means a walk of a mile or more through city streets for children ten or eleven years of age. Approximatively one hundred houses and apartments have been built in the last few years west of Pine St. on the property of the Nashua Manufacturing Company and many houses have recently been erected west of St. Joseph's Hospital.

The new salary schedule for women teachers has been in operation for one year and under it the salaries of all the women except beginners have been increased. All who are affected by this schedule, and who have taught in Nashua four years or more, now hold full state certificates with two exceptions. A large proportion of our younger teachers

have secured state certificates during the last year. Regular classes have been held by the superintendents for those preparing to take examinations in order to qualify for state certificates. State certification of Nashua teachers has been materially helped by the requirements of the salary schedule. Largely because of this same schedule eighty-six percent of those who are eligible to an increase in salary next year because of professional work have studied during the past year in summer courses and extension courses.

I recommend that the following be added to page 12 of the Salary Schedule: Credit for sixty college hours will be given for travel overseas extending through a period of not less than two months. No more than one hundred twenty college hours of credit may be obtained from foreign travel.

Report of the Assistant Superintendent

Herewith I submit my third annual report as Assistant Superintendent of Schools. Instead of following the usual procedure of such reports, specifying several needs of the school system and treating each rather discursively, I am submitting for your consideration just one need which to me seems outstanding. I am treating this in some detail emphasizing its significance in our schools. In my other reports I have mentioned briefly this subject, i. e., The Need of a Director of Health and Physical Education.

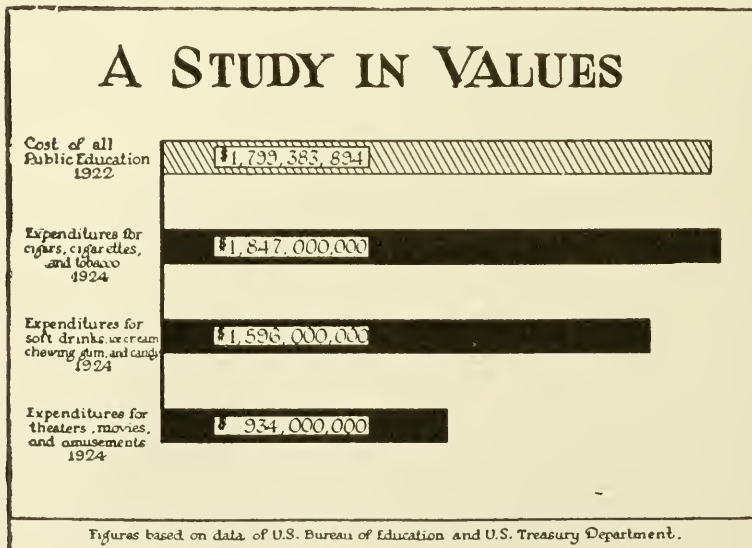
We Are Educating All Children in America.

At the beginning let me stress one basic principle of American education. The belief that the education of all individuals in a republic like ours is fundamental to its safety and welfare is now quite thoroughly accepted and put into practice. For ours is not a nation in which a few lead and the multitudes servilely obey as in the German State of pre-war days. In the United States, because of the great powers granted each individual voter, it is highly important that each be educated. In a democracy like ours the schools must re-

gard each pupil as a potential leader. The acceptance of this principle has been the result of a slow growth. To develop the belief that it is necessary to educate girls as well as boys, the children of wealthy property owner as well as the children of the poor, black children and white children the children of the native born and the children of the recent immigrant, has been the result of many years of struggle. That this principle has been put into practice in Nashua is manifest in many phases of our work, but notably in the household and industrial arts departments and in the richer offering of courses throughout the school system. It is apparent that we have embarked upon the policy of educating all children.

The Expense of Educating All is Not Too Great.

To those who protest that the cost in educating all instead of a few is too great, I present the following data:

The cost of educating all children is but a minor part of the expenditures regularly made for luxuries. In fact, the present cost of education could be doubled without undermining any basic economic need in the nation. The statement so

frequently made, that the schools cost more than society can bear, is fallacious, for it is not supported by facts but is rather the conclusion of the imaginings of small-visioned persons.

Health Education is Fundamental.

The importance of health as a phase of education is so obvious that any explanation seems unnecessary. Yet, while persons will readily grant the importance of the acquisition of proper health habits as an end in education, real recognition as an integral part of the school program is not even now fully established. It was not until 1918 that a committee of educators of nation-wide reputation, in determining the objectives of education, placed **health** as first and fundamental. This is the first committee of national importance to make such a declaration. The committee declared: "To discharge the duties of life and to benefit from leisure, one must have good health. The health of the individual is essential also to the vitality of the race and to the defense of the Nation. Health education is therefore fundamental." Having accepted the principle that all children must be given an adequate education, that society can conveniently bear the cost, and that health education is essential, we may ask,

"What is Nashua Doing to Fulfill These Requirements?"

We are not caring for the health of all school children. To be sure, the Committee on Medical Inspection is doing excellent work in the physical examinations of children, in recor-

ding defects and in attempting some follow-up work. But it must be remembered that the real health problem has little to do with the combatting of disease, and much to do with fostering in increasing strength in our young people, and laying the foundation of strong and capable lives. Our teachers are attempting to give the children an appreciation of the principles of health promotion and disease prevention. But the work is not systematized.

Physical exercises in the classrooms consist, to a great extent, of "canned calisthenics" and other formal gymnastics, a survival of the German and Swedish systems introduced into American schools in 1880. We have not a thorough program in formal and informal gymnasium work, folk dancing, plays, games, organized athletics and mass competition. Rather, the stress has been placed upon the development of a very few in the high schools. A football or baseball team is simply a by-product of a school health program. To those who regard the success of a school by the victories of the football team in a kind of gladiatorial combat, let me say that the adoption of a proper health program from grade one throughout the school system, would develop not one powerful football team but several. We would have need of not simply a stadium but several stadia in this city. Charles H. Keene, director of the Bureau of Health Education, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, has well said, "The community which employs a coach primarily with the idea of turning out win-

ning interscholastic teams while the general student body is largely neglected is sinning not only against this large group, but quite as much against the small, nearly physical perfect group that needs the special attention the least. As a result, this small group frequently gets an exaggerated idea of its importance in the school and in the community." Our emphasis upon interscholastic competition has resulted in the neglect of the physical condition of the vast majority of our boys and girls, so that it may be safely said that a great percentage of our graduates are "physical illiterates." To realize this one has simply to observe the posture of so many of our pupils as they receive their diplomas at graduation in June.

Space does not permit an enumeration and explanation of all the various divisions of a practical school health program. Let me cite one specific case in Nashua to illustrate simply one needed line of endeavor. Of three hundred fifty-six under-weight children examined by the secretary of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association, one hundred nine were found to have suspicious signs in the chest and were referred to the Tuberculosis Clinic. Fifty-nine cases of glandular Tuberculosis were discovered and treated thus reducing the probability of developing the pulmonary type of the disease. The "Report of the Clinic" states: "The teachers report that underweight children are the first in the schools to develop measles, scarlet-fever, diphtheria, etc., and that children who have been brought up to normal weight are more resistant— The Association recommends that the local Board of Educa-

to make suitable arrangements for an open-air school or open-air class rooms."

The problem of the underweight children displaying symptoms of incipient tuberculosis is only one of the many and varied parts of the work of a health program which shall care for all children. The problems in the organization and administration of the program of health education, when one considers the great number of children and teachers, the numerous activities required, the time schedules and adequate play facilities, are indeed complex. Individuals of the same racial group differ greatly. Individuals from a variety of racial groups present strikingly greater differences. In Nashua classrooms are children sprung from many racial groups. The entrance into our schools of children, both of whose parents work daily thus frequently causing lack of parental guidance, and the lack of knowledge of right health habits on the part of parents, make the task complex.

Recommendation

The plan of health and physical education for the Nashua schools must be devised by an expert. Such a leader must have thorough training in the organization and supervision of the various interests and activities that come in physical education and athletics. He must also have a broad fundamental training in subjects of the liberal arts college and those acquainting him with scientific methods of teaching and educational administration. This director must have a comprehensive knowledge of the structure and functions of the body and its organs and with the normal vital processes. Further, he must be trained in the recognition of the various

abnormal body processes which so frequently appear during school age. While not necessarily a doctor, the director must be able to detect early disease processes and refer the individuals for treatment to physicians and specialists. The director must co-operate with the school physicians, the nurses, the city's health department and the homes.

While the amount of money necessary for such a director may seem large, it must be remembered that health education is necessary if we are to have real education for all. This is no mere theory for many communities are already providing such directors. The comparatively small expenditure necessary bridges the gap between illness, absence resulting in retardation, physical defects, and sometimes death on the one hand, and on the other hand a modern school system with "training for complete living."

Truly Nashua owes this to all her youth.

Report of the Principal of the High School

Mr. Charles H. Noyes,

Dear Sir:

I herewith submit the annual report for the Senior High School.

The year of 1925-26 opened with but a slight decrease in enrollment, although very many pupils left during the summer and early fall. Since I have had charge of the school there has been no time when so many pupils were asking for transfer cards to schools in other towns. The decrease was undoubtedly due to a smaller entering class from the Junior High School — twenty-three less to enter than the year before. The Freshmen came from the following schools:

The total number of new pupils outside of those from the Junior High School has been well over one hundred for a number of years.

At present 21% of the school is taking the Latin Curriculum, 15% the Latin-Scientific, 13% the General, 33% the Commercial and 17% the Practical Arts.

Last fall seventeen Nashua High School pupils attempted to enter colleges requiring either examinations or certificates. Fourteen of that number entered. Three failed to satisfy some part of the requirements. Twenty others entered colleges requiring only a diploma and fourteen entered normal schools.

The constantly increasing numbers which are applying for admission to colleges and the limited numbers which they can accept and the consequent increasing severity of the entrance examinations, all these factors are placing the general high school under a great handicap when compared with the special classical high schools or the private college preparatory schools. Many of the pupils of these institutions take five years for the kind of preparation which is strictly cramming for the examinations.

The Report of the National Committee on the Reorganization of Mathematics states "Schools sending students . . . to any institution where examination form the only or pre-

vailing mode of admission, inevitably direct their instruction toward the entrance examinations. This remains true even if only a small percentage of the class intends to take these examinations, the point being that the success of a teacher is often measured by the success of his or her students in these examinations." The late Professor Inglis in his *Principles of Secondary Education* discussing the preparation for college entrance examinations states "Nevertheless it must be recognized that it represents a portion only, and by no means the largest portion, of the high school population. More numerous and certainly not less important are those pupils who will not complete the high school course, dropping out after one, two or three years of secondary education or, completing the high school course, will not continue their education beyond that limit."

It is periodically reported that pupils cannot enter college after being in our school four years and proof is offered by a few examples. It is practically an assured fact in my mind that it is impossible to pass the present day college entrance examinations unless the pupil has received a rank of "A" in our school. Some pupils who could ably do college work cannot pass the examinations and there will always be some, probably the greater part of every class in a general high school such as ours, who cannot be recommended and the headmaster takes a good deal of pride in his record of not giving to graduates certificates without the proper ranks to justify it.

The privilege of entering Radcliffe College on the headmaster's recommendation has just been taken away from several of the schools in and around Boston because of the character of work done by those whom the headmaster recommended. The fact that our pupils are doing such satisfactory work that our school was not removed is something of a challenge to those who contend that we do not prepare for the better colleges.

I wish to call your attention to the serious disturbance which is caused by the different groups of people who hire the auditorium. The confusion, which is of course unavoidable, caused by trucks driving in and out, unloading at the entrances, people walking and talking in the corridors, calls at the telephone, moving seats in and out of the auditorium changes what ought to be a quiet school building into such a noisy condition that it is impossible for the pupils to do much that is expected of them. This nuisance not only happens one and two days before an event but also the day following. Conditions surely can be questioned when regular school exercises must be cancelled in order that the auditorium may be used for some public gathering. Teachers in the rooms near the entrance cannot expect much from pupils when their voices cannot be heard above the noise of running motors and the moving of decorations, etc., just outside the door.

It seems desirable that with the more or less annual change in teachers there should be added to the staff more men. Six men teachers in a staff of thirty-two are not enough to give a proper balance. Undoubtedly there are pupils in the upper classes who have never been under the instructions of a man.

I recommend that an art course, or an extension to every day of the present designing course, be offered as an elective in at least one of the years of the domestic arts and general curricula. This course should be a regular full time course requiring outside work and receiving credit as any other course. I feel that it is not only needed for those who will become grade teachers but is also very essential for others who may later use it in the leisure of their own homes.

There is an imperative need that some measures be taken at once to care for the crowded condition which is already upon us. At present there is no room where an added teacher could have a class; two teachers now have no rooms and another is holding recitations in the basement. This requested

addition would also furnish rooms for the girls of the domestic arts department and avoid their long round-about and somewhat dangerous tunnel trip through the boiler room to the Quincy Street cooking laboratory.

The library is an increasingly useful adjunct to every school and ours should be used more than its present limited capacity allows. The present room was planned to accommodate a much smaller school and to be workable today its size should be doubled so it might care for 5 to 10% per cent of the school. The two thousand or more books on the shelves have never been systematically numbered which makes it impossible to locate a book except by a clever feat of memory. During the summer the books should be renumbered by some one familiar with library cataloguing.

The value of physical education in the high school is fully recognized but the consideration of this very vital matter in our high school cannot be attacked until the question of adding a gymnasium is met and decided. This would not primarily accommodate some regular high school team but would bring together larger groups of both boys and girls exercising for pleasure without any highly developed spirit of competition.

I am glad to report that twelve teachers have taken state examinations, that eight teachers took courses at summer school, and that fourteen teachers are now taking an extension course. Such a commendable effort on the part of the teachers is sure to make itself felt in the regular every day teaching.

During the year a committee of students with one of the teachers published a little handbook of seventy pages which states in printed form many of the customs and procedures which formerly were not learned until the student had been in the school for at least a year, and also furnished a valuable

project in English. The effort and expense in its publication was considerable but the result amply justifies both.

The cosmopolitan and democratic nature of the school appears in the following table which indicates the parentage (both male and female) of the pupils:

Almost 40% of the parents were born outside the United States. It is also interesting to know that 63% of our pupils have parents who are not high school graduates and 22% have one parent who completed high school.

In closing I wish to state whatever has been accomplished during the year is due to the combined efforts of the Board of Education, the superintendents and the teachers, to all of whom I feel greatly indebted.

Report of the Principal of Junior High

Dear Sir:

Herewith I respectfully submit to you the annual report for the Junior High School for the year 1925.

In accordance with the recommendation made in my last report, our school is now approved by the State Department of Education. This approval was accomplished by certain changes in the Program of Studies. Already we are seeing the advantage in many ways of being in close touch with the State Department.

By the elimination of the seventh grade the Junior High School received a much larger registration this fall. This increase necessitated more teachers and rooms. The rooms formerly used by seventh grades and specials have been utilized so that at present there is only one room in our building used by other than Junior High School pupils. This abnormal condition will continue for another year when graduation will bring us back to normalcy and place the Senior High School in the same situation to a modified extent. The fol-

lowing teachers were added to the Junior High School staff to care for the increase in registration; Miss Christine Bingham, Miss Esther Connor, Miss Madeline Broderick and Miss Mary Ryan.

By a vote of the Board of Education the school is now operating on a two session day. It was unfortunate that the present system was inaugurated under hostile feeling but it augurs well in that the system has been as sufficient in the face of these conditions. Time will expose all faults and then a fair and sane comparison can be made with the one session day. The outstanding features of the present system are a longer school day, elimination of required home study, and directed study.

Recommendations.

(1) Once more I urge the Board of Education seriously to consider the advisability of adopting the 6-3-3 plan. In my last report I went into some detail about this plan so it is unnecessary to reiterate.

(2) The removal of the special rooms has improved the general morale of the building. There are still two classes occupying one room in morning and afternoon sessions respectively. Next year these two groups ought to be withdrawn and all special rooms combined in the same building.

(3) Closer correlation of the Junior and Senior High Schools ought to be obtained. No amount of effort on the part of the principals can effect this as quickly as a sympathetic and mutual understanding by the teachers of each others' problems. The appointment of one teacher from each school to study this problem would effect much.

(4) The Board of Education are requested to consider the abolition of the present graduation exercises of the Junior High School. The present graduation causes an abrupt break and attaches a pseudo importance to the completion of the work in this school. Junior High School work would merge better into Senior High School work if this graduation were eliminated.

(5) I urge the Board of Education to investigate the feasibility of introducing a broad program of physical education in our schools. Athletics have their place in a school program but nobody can deny that their place is absolutely subordinate in such a program. Our job is to see to the physical fitness of all the boys and girls and not of a selected group.

Activities

The students have participated in many helpful activities such as Basketball, Baseball Clubs, School paper, Prize Speaking, Assemblies, Physical exercises, Junior Police. It is sufficient to say that all of these activities are maintaining a higher standard than ever before. The school library is doing a work of inestimable value under the guidance of Miss Agnes Gardner.

Repairs

The building is in excellent condition. A new lunch room with cafeteria tables and chairs has been added to our equipment. Electric lights have been installed in the library.

Conclusion

The school holds an enviable record for attendance and according to reports from the office of the principal of the Senior High School its graduates are maintaining a good standing. It is my earnest wish that this coming year may see the school realize its purpose to the fullest degree. I sincerely express my appreciation to the Board of Education for their confidence in me and my work, their helpful suggestions and their courageous stand for what is best for our boys and girls.

Report of Director of Music

The twenty-ninth annual report of the Director of Music in the Public Schools is submitted for your approval. The year has brought joy and beauty to the students of our schools who participated in the singing and playing.

The twenty-fifth annual music festival given jointly by the chorus of the High School and the Nashua Oratorio Society was given at the Auditorium, May 14 and 15, two evening concerts and a matinee. The High School gave the opening concert, when a chorus of over 200 voices sang a concert arrangement of the opera, *Carmen*, composed by Georges Bizet, with the assistance of Miss Vesta Thyden, soprano; Miss Betty Gray, contralto; Charles Stratton, tenor, and Walter Kidder, baritone. The Boston Festival Orchestra furnished the instrumental part of the program, with the assistance of Miss Mildred Chaplin, pianist. Beside the *Carmen* performance there was a concert program of an hour, in which the professional soloists and the orchestra took part, and which proved one of the best concerts given in twenty-five years by this High School.

During the year the High School orchestra, eighteen pieces, rehearsed and played at the senior play, and at two assemblies. This year the orchestra numbers twenty-one pieces, and already has played at the senior play, and at one assembly,

This year a glee club of fifty girl students has been organized and a glee club of fifty boys has been also formed with the idea of singing at assemblies, and possibly of giving a concert for the piano fund.

A chorus of some over two hundred voices is studying the wonderfully fine choral work "The Death of Minnehaha," composed by S. Coleridge Taylor, which will be given at a concert during the season, with the assistance of professional soloists.

The two choruses of the Junior High School are studying the beautiful and fascinating American Folk Songs, and those of European countries as well, thereby establishing a knowledge of the best musical literature of the world, which will prove a source of pleasure in their lives.

The singing in the grades below the Junior High School is progressing as well as usual, and the pupils getting enjoyment from their singing. The books used are the Music Education Series, which are the latest and best books published.

To you, Mr. Superintendent, to the Board of Education, to the Music Committee, and to the teachers, for help and cooperation the Director of Music is thankful.

Report of Director of Manual Arts

Dear Sir:

I submit to you the annual report of the Manual Arts Department for the year 1925.

This department has been in the Quincy St. building for ten years. When entering the building, the enrollment of both grades and High School was four hundred and forty-six. Today we have an enrollment of over eight hundred students, an increase of one hundred percent during the last ten years.

I have been in this building nine years, and from my own personal knowledge the quarters allotted to this department have not been large enough adequately to care for the various classes.

A staining-room has never been provided for the large pieces of furniture. In order to finish these pieces we have used the halls, the old forge-shop, the drawing room, or any other place that it was possible to use. A shop or even a corner of a shop has never been provided for the moulding of patterns made in the pattern-making course. This work has been done in a forge shop over a forge. We had a classroom up to three years ago; then it was taken away and used for elementary grade work.

For the past past three years, we have used the old Kindergarten building at the corner of Quincy and East Pearl Sts. for storage purposes, to store lumber, parts of autos, etc. During the summer of 1925, the entire building was turned over to the Veterans of Foreign Wars as temporary quarters. This necessitated our vacating the building and crowding the material into Quincy Street School.

In mechanical drawing we have a combination of Juniors and Freshmen in the first two periods, and Sophomores and Seniors in the last two periods, taking drawing together. This is a very poor arrangement, and should not exist, but it is the best that can be done under our present crowded conditions.

In the Junior High School on the girls' side of the basement, it has been necessary to have a temporary shop, to handle the sixth grades. This is a poor arrangement for student and teacher and undoubtedly disturbs the routine of the Junior High School, but under our present crowded conditions it was the only available place for a shop.

At present we have about one hundred boys who ought to take shop work, but for the lack of room are denied the opportunity. These boys should have the same privilege as their fellow students.

From all indications this coming school year, there will be a heavy enrollment of pupils in all classes, and it will be a serious problem to handle them; in fact we cannot accommodate our present classes, and therefore it will be impossible to take care of the increased classes this coming school year.

There are other circumstances, beside crowded conditions, that are not conducive to obtaining the best educational results. At times, complaints have been made of the noises which emanate from this department. Some are just and some otherwise.

In Quincy Street School we have four distinct departments, the elementary grades, kindergarten, Domestic Science, and Manual Arts. Where there is such diversified work, there is bound to be more or less noise and confusion, and when it is multiplied by the thousand odd students using this building, you have a multitude of noise that makes teaching a difficult job.

I realize our own department creates considerable noise, but where you have machinery working you are bound to have noise, even though we try to run these machines at a time that will cause the least disturbance to other departments. Still it is impossible to eliminate all the noises and satisfy all departments.

We have tolerated transgressions from other departments, that have not added to the peace and harmony of Quincy Street School. The following are a few examples:

Every morning shortly after eight o'clock the grade boys enter the lower hall; there is talking, running in and out, running up the stairs. This continues until the 8:40 bell. For the past year during the warm weather some twenty odd boys play a (free-for-all) basket ball game under the drawing-room windows. These windows are about ten feet above the ground. They play before school in the morning, morning recess, afternoon, and afternoon recess. You can imagine the shouting and yelling that accompanies a game of this sort.

I have my doubts if the average layman understands the difference in duties of an academic teacher, and a manual arts teacher. I will not enumerate the responsibilities of an academic teacher, for their duties require different working conditions. A manual arts teacher outside of his regular classroom duty is required to get out stock for about two hundred

students, and keep some one hundred fifty bench tools sharpened besides his regular tool room equipment. This work must be done in the shop where the necessary machinery is running and after four o'clock when the class is dismissed.

I have given teacher-coaching in this department a trial for the past two years and there is not a doubt in my mind that, for a manual-training teacher, coaching in this particular department is a failure. For the good of this department I recommend that teacher-coaching be discontinued this year..

There is only one economic and practical solution to the problem in this department and that a building erected on the corner of Quincy and East Pearl Streets large enough to care adequately for the future growth of vocational education in this city. This is an ideal site, being located between the Senior and Junior High Schools and centrally located to all grades.

This year, as in previous years, a large amount of work, outside the regular class-work, has been completed. Some of the jobs are as follows: A number of chairs have been repaired, and bulletin boards made for the grades. Five tables were made, forty folding chairs were repaired, and a number of stools, bulletin boards and shelves were made for the Senior High School. Three small cabinets, and a number of chairs and shelves were completed for Domestic Science.

The grade shop in the Quincy Street School was partitioned off by the Freshman class. This gave us two shops about twenty-four feet square. One is used as a grade shop and the other as an electrical laboratory. Two benches fourteen feet long and six feet wide were made by the Freshman

class for the electrical laboratory. Twelve drawing tables with six drawers in each and adjustable tops were built at a cost of thirty dollars apiece. These benches were quoted at seventy-five dollars apiece, thus saving the department five hundred and fifty dollars.

All this work was accomplished through the hearty cooperation of the teaching corps in this department.

Evening School.

It is very gratifying to see the continued growth of vocational education in our Evening School. This year we had the largest enrollment of any year and it would have been larger, if there had been room to accommodate the men. A great deal of credit is due these men who labor all day and voluntarily come to Evening School to gain further knowledge of their chosen vocation.

This year we had fifty-five men registered in the auto-mechanics course. It is useless to try to crowd sufficient equipment for a class of fifty-five men into our present shop which will only accommodate twenty-four men and necessary equipment.

It was also necessary to crowd four more benches into our cabinet-making shop to handle the twenty-nine men registered in this course. Such crowded conditions as we are working under necessarily retard the progress of the work. This applies to day school as well as evening school.

The following courses were offered this year in evening school: auto-mechanics, auto-ignition, house-wiring, cabinet-making, mechanical drawing, and machine-shop.

I recommend for next year that a course in radio with laboratory work, and a course in house-framing be added to our present curriculum. I also recommend that the evening school sessions be extended to sixty nights at two and a half hours per night instead of our present schedule of thirty-six nights. These recommendations are based on the demand of the two courses above mentioned. There is not sufficient time for the men to finish a large piece of furniture. As a number of these men are advanced students a number of large pieces of furniture were made this year, but were not completed at the close of school and it was found necessary to continue work a few weeks longer. It takes some time for the men to become familiar with the general routine of the shop.

I wish to thank Messrs. Sheehan and Tracey for their hearty co-operation in the advancement of the work of this department during the past year.

I wish to thank the honorable members of the Board of Education and Superintendents for their loyal support and co-operation in advancing vocational education in the schools.

Report of Director of Domestic Science

This report dates from September 1925 as it was at this time that I took up the work of Director of Household Arts.

In September Miss Georgia Gutterson of Beverly, Massachusetts, was elected to teach sewing and cooking in grades and Junior High School, taking the place of Miss Dorothy O'Meara. Miss Gutterson is a graduate of the four year course at Framingham Normal School, has studied at Pennsylvania State College, and has had two years teaching experience. Miss Loretta Dolan was also elected a regular teacher in the department in September. She is a graduate of Lesley Normal School of Cambridge and has substituted at various times very successfully in our classes for the past two years.

An increase in classes and the lengthening of periods in the Junior High School has made the program so full that it has been necessary to discontinue the teaching of sewing in the fifth grades.

The work in the Senior High School could be carried on much more successfully if we had properly equipped rooms in which to work. At present one division of the Freshman

sewing class is being conducted in the drawing room. The Sophomore cooking classes are obliged to go through the tunnel to Quincy Street School for their cooking and to a basement lunch room for recitations. The Juniors are using one of the drawing rooms for their work in Home Nursing and the Seniors must omit some of their most successful work in planning and serving meals for lack of a kitchen in which to work. If this department could all be centralized in suitable rooms, much time would be saved and more work accomplished.

Report of Director of Drawing

Dear Sir:

For several years there has been an increasing amount of work required of the drawing department, and last year, the opening of the two new school buildings, with their additional classes, brought matters to the point where the work cannot be done properly by one teacher.

The high school should offer a course in drawing. At present pupils are allowed to drop drawing when they leave the junior high school, and complete their high school course without any further instruction in that subject. This is doing an injustice to those pupils who later take normal or kindergarten training, where great importance is attached to drawing and all kinds of artistic hand work.

I suggest that a course in drawing be offered to all high school pupils and that it be a required subject for all girls who are being fitted for normal schools.

The increasing needs of the lower schools, and the additional work which I am suggesting in the high school will require a second trained teacher, and therefore I recommend that one be engaged to begin work in September 1926.

Fifty-two teachers are taking a course in blackboard drawing with Mr. Frederick Whitney of the Salem Normal School. The instruction which they are getting will be a very definite help to them in their class room work.

I regret that my over crowded program has prevented my giving the grammar and primary school teachers as much help as usual and I thank them for the faithful way in which they are carrying on the work.

Report of School Nurse

The work at the Dental Clinic for the year 1924 and '25 has progressed with interest and enthusiasm.

The following doctors have assisted at the clinic: Dr. E. T. White, Dr. E. J. Belanger, Dr. A. G. Coffey and Dr. D. J. Hagerty. Owing to the increase of time given, from eight to fourteen half days a month, we have been able to go through all the grades up to Junior High School. Thus it has been possible to give 725 children dental attention this year. The number of fillings has been 1,594; extractions, 1,309; cleanings, 710.

It should be understood that the clinic is only for children unable to pay their own dentist. We have treated children who should have been attended by their own dentist, but in cases where the parents were insistent it has been hard to eliminate them, as we find on examination that the children are badly in need of dental work.

We get gratifying reports from outside doctors and dentists on the work done at the dental clinic. This is encouraging for the school dentists who are trying to do their best for the public school children.

With the continuance of the co-operation we have had in the past, from the principals, teachers, and all others who are interested in the clinic, we hope to be able to further the work, getting added results.

Report of School Nurse

Dear Sir:

The health work in the public schools of Nashua in the year 1925 has continued with few changes.

Medical Inspection has been conducted under the supervision of Dr. S. G. Davis and each child has been examined during the year. Notices have been sent to parents of all defects found, home visits have been made where it was necessary to get these defects corrected. Eighty-six children were vaccinated.

Much time was given by both Dr. Davis and myself during the earlier part of the year examining for contagious diseases, and all cases were excluded from school and reported to the Board of Health.

All children have been weighed and measured and notices have been sent to the parents of all who were found to be underweight.

Milk lunches have been continued at the morning recess, free milk being furnished to those who could not afford to pay for it.

Dr. Robert Kerr, Secretary of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association, has made a special chest examination of

all pupils 10% or more underweight. Three hundred and fifty-six pupils have had this examination and one hundred and nine were found to have suspicious signs of tuberculosis. One hundred and six were given the skin test and sixty-nine of these had a positive reaction. Through the co-operation of the Memorial Hospital and Dr. S. G. Davis, all of the positive cases were X-rayed, giving us a positive diagnosis of tuberculosis. None of these cases were active so the children did not have to be excluded from school. Two of them have since become active and have been sent to the sanatorium. All of the positive cases go regularly to Dr. Kerr for examination so if they become active they are found at once and excluded from school.

A clinic for the examination of eyes was started in January for all of the children from the third and sixth grades, and any child from any other grade who, the teacher thinks, does not see as well as he or she ought is examined. Four optometrists are employed, each giving a half day each week. Questionable cases are referred to Dr. C. F. Nutter. Notices are sent to parents of all defects found, and in all cases where the parents are unable to care for this the Board of Education pays for the glasses. Fifty-seven percent of all cases found have been corrected.

The Community Council has been most helpful in raising the money for the free milk, in finding agencies to care for difficult cases, and also in the orthopedic and mental clinic.

I wish to thank the teachers for their splendid co-operation. Much of this work could not have been accomplished but for their help.

Report of School Nurse

Herewith is respectfully submitted to you my second annual report. The work has varied somewhat from last year, new work having been added.

The eye clinics which are supervised by one oculist and four optometrists, were started in January. One afternoon each week being devoted to eye examinations of all third and sixth grade pupils, also of those whose eyesight was tested by the teacher and found to be abnormal. A majority of defects have been corrected and others are being treated.

For several weeks in the months of January and February, during the prevalence of contagious diseases, which a number of school children developed, such as scarlet fever, measles, diphtheria, etc., it was necessary to co-operate with the Board of Health and devote full time to that work.

The work of vaccinating, medical inspection and physical examinations by Dr. A. F. Mulvanity has proceeded as usual in the schools assigned us. Many skin, eye, ear, nose, throat, glands, decayed teeth and orthopedic diseases were discovered and corrected through the kind co-operation of teachers, physicians, parents, and welfare organizations.

Since the opening of Tuberculosis Clinics in the schools, Dr. Robert B. Kerr has examined 356 children. Of this number 109 were found to be suspicious cases. A Tuberculin Skin Test was given to 106 with 69 showing a positive reaction.

Through the efforts of the Community Council a Tag Day was held, the proceeds of which are being used for the distribution of free milk among the under-nourished children and those with a tendency to tuberculosis, whose parents are without adequate means.

Mental cases were given mental examination by Dr. A. E. Brownrigg at the Mental Hygiene Clinics, Community Council Rooms. Results of the examinations were given to the school department and an effort was made to follow the physician's advice.

The weighing and measuring of all the children has been carried out as in previous years. Those 10% or more underweight for their height were given special attention and their parents notified.

In many instances home visits were made in order to inform and advise the parents concerning their children.

I take this opportunity to express thanks and appreciation of the co-operation of the several clinics, doctors, teachers, parents and welfare agencies.

Report of Principal of Evening School

I submit herewith the annual report of the Evening School for the year 1925-26.

The opening of Evening School was preceded by a meeting of the teachers at which time the methods and directions were carefully explained. This preliminary meeting contributed much to the efficient opening of the school. The registration was conducted under the same system as last year, and with equally good results.

Mr. Arthur DeMontigny spoke to the Illiterate Minors at a general assembly, emphasizing the opportunity side of the Evening School. This assembly was a repetition of the year before because of its apparent helpfulness.

The school is conducted by necessity in three buildings, Junior High, Quincy Street, and the Senior High. All classes in Americanization are in Junior High. All Shop Work, Mechanical Drawing, Cooking, etc., are in Quincy St. and the Commercial Work is in the Senior High.

It is pleasing to note the growth of the Commercial Department which is making a special appeal to young men and women who wish to advance in the field. We are indeed fortunate to have Miss Grace Campbell in direct charge of the work.

Classification of School

1. Illiterate Minors.—These are persons between the ages of 16 and 21 who cannot read and speak English understandingly, and who are required by law to attend Evening School.

2. Illiterate Adults.—Persons 21 years of age or over who cannot read or speak English understandingly, but who are not compelled to attend Evening School.

3. Literate Persons—These are 16 years or above who do not belong to either of the first two classes.

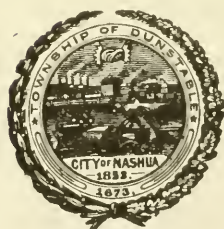

Park Commission

To His Honor the Mayor and Board of Aldermen.

The Park Commission makes the following report for the year ending December 31, 1925.

The special appropriation of \$2,000 for South Common was used in the final grading and seeding and will be rolled in the spring so that before the season is over the Common will present a fine lawn with its natural slope. The Commission has ordered 80 cement posts made by the Board of Public Works to replace the broken posts on south side of Common along Lake Street.

There has been some talk for a permanent band stand in center of Common and the Commission recommends this but will not ask for it this year.

The changing over of baseball field on the Manchester Street side of North Common will cost \$1,000 and the Commission recommends the same.

Since our last report we have added one set of swings and other amusements for the children at Greeley Park. This has been an incentive to encourage mothers and children to visit the grounds daily. Undesirable brush has been removed thus giving the healthy trees more sunlight. Other improvements have been made during the year which were in accord with the general plan for the Park, which the Commission endeavors to carry out each year as their appropriation will permit.

There are several squares that ought to be beautified and can be made so with a small expenditure, especially at the junction of Manchester and Abbott Streets.

The special appropriation of \$500. for grading the grounds near the Swimming Pool was all used. We also set out a number of trees and plants.

Browntail and Gypsy Moths continue to bother but not in

as great numbers as formerly. The Satin Moths are giving a lot of trouble and are found only on poplars and willow trees.

The Park System needs the same appropriations this coming year to meet the expense of added improvements and it is the wish of the Commission to make as many improvements as possible each year along the lines suggested in general plan.

Recreation Commission

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen:

The Recreation Commission of the City of Nashua respectfully submit a report of their work during the year 1925 as follows:

In January a skating rink was established on South Common also a hockey rink adjacent to the regular rink and these were very largely used as long as the weather permitted. For the hockey rink we borrowed the necessary equipment from the Nashua Country Club and the seats were provided by the Board of Public Works.

In June we opened the summer season by acting as hosts for the Playground Supervisor from about thirty New England Cities who received instructions in the work from many of the best known Playground Directors in this country and the benefits were easily seen in the results secured during the season.

Mr. Ray Pendleton directed the work most efficiently assisted by chosen young men and women, most of whom had previous training which is very desirable.

Miss Theresa Schmidt the efficient Field Secretary of the Playground and Recreation Association of America, came to Nashua frequently, without expense to the city, to render assistance and make suggestions.

The Swimming Pool, in its first full season, more than justified the expenditure for its erection and the Mayor and your honorable Board are entitled to the praise of the citizens in general for making such a splendid municipal project pos-

sible. The general arrangement and the bath-house have been highly commended by experts and several cities have asked to be allowed to use our plans. Many children have learned to swim and the teaching of life saving by the efficient instructors, Murphy and Kelley, is part of the daily routine; many of the children passing with ease the Red Cross Life Saving Tests. This report would not be complete if we did not commend the work of Wm. J. O'Neil who served as Superintendent. He was always on duty and watched every detail and while he maintained strict order he was universally popular with all who used the pool.

This winter it seemed advisable to have all skating activities under one head, consequently the Mayor requested the Recreation Commission to care for the skating at Artillery Pond as well as on the South Common and good skating has been provided at both places. Mr. Wm. J. McBride is the Superintendent in charge and his work is well done as he is thoroughly familiar with the making of ice for out door rinks. Supervisors have been provided at both rinks to maintain order and to prevent accidents as well as to furnish instructions in skating to those who desire it.

There is a demand for a rink in the Crown Hill district which we were unable to furnish this year as our appropriation was insufficient.

We recommend, in view of the increase in duties given us during the year, that your appropriation for the current year be \$9,000.00. The extra amount covers the increased area given to us for skating, additional expenses of maintaining the swimming pool and an estimated expense of \$500.00 for labor by the Public Works Department in dredging the Salmon Brook.
