TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Stratham in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Stratham on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate Two Hundred and Fifteen Dollars and Ninety-Three Cents (\$215.93) against the State's Eight Hundred Sixty Three Dollars and Seventy Cents (\$863.70) for state aid construction.
4. To see if the town will vote a 1 percent discount on such part of the taxes as are paid on or before August 15th.
5. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
6. To see if the town will vote to purchase a new Snow plow to replace the present Baker plow, raise and appropriate money for the same.
7. To see if the town will vote to install a fire exit in the Town Hall, to comply with the laws of the state of New Hampshire, raise and appropriate Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for the same.

8. To see if the town will vote to level the Baseball diamond at Stratham Hill Park, raise and appropriate Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for the same.

9. To see if the Town will vote to observe, during the month of August, 1949, the 50th Anniversary of Old Home Week, and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Stratham qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are herby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the eighth day of March 1949, at one o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the es-

timated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will authorize a committee to study the feasibility of the Stratham school district becoming a member of a cooperative school district, request the State Board of Education to assist in the preparation of a plan for the proposed cooperative school district and to prepare a complete report to the school district for presentation at either a special meeting called in accordance with New Hampshire Revised Laws, Chapter 139, or at the next annual school district meeting.

10. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to bond the town up to \$60,000.00 for construction of a new elementary school.

11. To see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to be placed in the reserved fund toward a new Central School.

12. To see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for the repair of the school fences and other deferred maintenance on the school buildings.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The School Board wishes to explain the reason for the insertion in the warrant of articles nine thru twelve inclusive. Exeter School District has expressed interest in a cooperative school. It has been requested of us that we include article nine in order that it may be studied and that a definite plan be presented to the voters of the several districts involved for a definite decision a year from now.

For several years now the School Board has adopted a policy in regards to maintenance of the school buildings of only doing the most necessary work. This was based on the theory that the district was prepared at an early date to either build a new building or consolidate with other towns. As a result of this policy the fences have deteriorated and there is an accumulated amount of deferred maintenance. The Board feels it is now time to ask the District for such instructions as they may wish to give them on the continuation of this policy.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Stratham:

I take pleasure in submitting my first annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

In the long run a community provides the kind of education for its children and youth that the whole community wants. The school does not belong to the superintendent, the principal or the teachers. It belongs to all the people. All American youth need formal education at least until they reach the age of eighteen. For such education to be meaningful to them, modifications must be made in many current school programs which were originally designed primarily for pupils seeking entrance to college.

Some objectives generally accepted by good modern schools are listed.

The school should

1. develop self-disciplined and responsible citizens who will live harmoniously with other members of the community.
2. develop and promote good physical and mental health.
3. develop in the youth the ability to use the tools of learning effectively.
4. develop in each youth employable skills for securing a respectable place in society.
5. teach youth to use leisure time wisely.
6. provide experiences to develop worthy home membership.

7. give knowledge of how to purchase and use goods and services intelligently.

8. develop an interest in and an appreciation of art, music, radio, screen and stage.

9. stimulate interest in and an understanding of the part that science plays in modern living.

For education to attain these objectives, the first requirement is full cooperation of citizens and parents, teachers and students.

A second requirement is to have competent teachers in charge of our young people, for a school can be no stronger than the teachers who are employed there.

A third requirement is to have adequate physical facilities such as school buildings and playgrounds which will assist rather than hinder the attainment of the objectives of modern education. Following are some yardsticks which can be used to help us to determine how adequate our present facilities are:

1. Housing facilities — Does the building provide accommodations to meet the increasing enrollments so that no room needs to house more than twenty-five students?

2. Age of Building — Is the building modern enough to meet the requirements of present day education?

3. Size of playground — Does the playground meet the national standard of five acres for the site and an additional acre for each one hundred students?

4. Provisions for cafeteria and auditorium — Does the building have a cafeteria and a combination auditorium and gymnasium?

If some of the above requirements are not being met to the degree which you feel they should be, may I encourage you to give serious consideration regarding what

can be done to fulfill these needs, for I am sure that you as an active and interested citizen are eager to have your community provide the best possible training which it can afford for its young people. There is no better investment in this troubled world than investment in youth.

Stratham has a well qualified and experienced staff of teachers who are doing very satisfactory work. Miss Edna Crane and Mrs. Elizabeth Merrill have returned to their former positions. Mrs. Hilda Barker is a welcome addition to the staff as teacher of grades 1 and 2. These are supplemented by Mrs. Leona Foster as teacher of music and Mrs. Regene Matthews as teacher of art. These two activities are important parts of the school program. Mrs. Eloise Sheehy continues her faithful and competent service as school nurse.

The immediate problem facing Stratham is school housing. The three school buildings which are now used are filled to capacity and a large enrollment is expected in the first grade for next year. Serious consideration should be given immediately to this situation, for the problem is now present and there is every indication it will become increasingly acute for the next several years.

I wish to congratulate the Parent-Teacher Association for its interest in the educational program.

I call your attention to the reports and tables which follow. I trust these will be of interest to you.

I wish to thank the citizens of Stratham, the members of the School Board, and the teachers for their fine co-operation and support.

REPORT OF THE ART SUPERVISOR

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The art course given in the schools this year has stressed creativeness. Every child should have an opportunity to develop his own talents and abilities, cultivate his own interests and express his own emotions. In so far as possible this self-expression has been encouraged and guided by helpful and constructive suggestions and individual criticisms. The use of patterns and copying have been discouraged as this only stunts the imagination.

The students of the first four grades have been working with crayons, cut paper and poster paint, depicting stories, school and seasonal activities. As the first grade is large, a great deal of work has been planned for their particular benefit. The third and fourth grade have planned several large murals as a group project.

The fifth and sixth grade have been using crayons, poster paint and textile paint. They have continued their studies of color harmony utilizing their knowledge in the various projects taken up during the school year. A great deal of time has been spent in developing skill in the cutting of stencils and the various stenciling methods such as brush and spatter techniques which will be utilized in the textile stenciling project.

In closing I would like to thank the Superintendent, the teachers and children of Stratham for their assistance and cooperation.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Following is the report of the school nurse from January 1, 1948, to January 1, 1949.

At the beginning of the year schools are inspected, and fresh first-aid supplies are placed in the schools for the use of the pupils.

During the early autumn all children are weighed and measured and again during the winter and spring terms. A weight and growth chart is kept in the schools for pupils. Examinations are made of eyes, teeth, hearing, tonsils and posture. Skin and hair are examined frequently. Immunization against small-pox and diphtheria are recorded. All defects found are reported to parents.

A dental clinic was held as usual in Dr. Winkler's office in Exeter during the spring months. Transportation was furnished by the school nurse. The dental clinic and milk program were sponsored by the Stratham Red Cross.

All children in grades 3, 4, 5 and 6 were given the audiometer test for hearing. The Maico individual test was given to the children who did not pass the group test. I hope that in the near future we can own a Maico Audiometer for individual testing. With this audiometer we can test the hearing of the first and second grade pupils which is important.
