To the inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth, County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Kenneth A. Brett School in said Tamworth on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next at Ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE No. 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Are you in favor of amending the wetlands conservation ordinance as proposed by the planning board and the Conservation Commission?

Are you in favor of the adoption of the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the planning board?

Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:28, V and VI for an optional veterans' exemption and an expanded qualifying war service for veterans seeking the exemption? The optional veterans' exemption is \$100, rather than \$50.

The Meeting will be in two parts.

1. In order that the preceding article may be legally voted on by Non-Partisan ballot, you are hereby notified that the polls will be open for this purpose at 10:00 of the clock on said Tuesday, March 12th. Polls shall not close earlier than 7:00 p.m.

ARTICLE No. 53. To see if the Town will vote to give permission to the Tamworth Fire Department to install now, or possibly in the future, an antenna and radio transmitter on the Great Hill Fire Tower for the use of the Tamworth Fire Department and the Ossipee Valley Mutual Aid Association. Also to give the Tamworth Fire Department control over what other transmitters might be installed in the future.

ARTICLE No. 54. "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board to review and approve or disapprove site plans for the development or change or expansion of use of tracts for nonresidential uses or for multifamily dwelling units, which are defined as any structures containing more than 2 dwelling units, whether or not such development includes a subdivision or resubdivision of the site. Futhermore should this pass at Town Meeting to make it the duty of the Town ClerK or other appropriate recording official to file with the register of deeds of the county in which the municipality is situated a certificate of notice showing that the planning board has been so authorized, giving the date of such authorization. As referenced in RSA 674:43.

ARTICLE No. 55. To see if the Town will vote to pay their taxes twice (2) a year.

ARTICLE No. 56. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the board of selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal and state grants which may become available during the course of the year, in accordance with RSA 31:95-b and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the town may legally appropriate money.

ARTICLE No. 57. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any property acquired by Tax Collector's deeds.

ARTICLE No. 58. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

ARTICLE 59. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Members put in 1286 hours of training this year. Four took the Career Level course, one the Level II course, eleven took the Hazardous Materials Awareness course, two the Incident Command System and one took the Train the Trainer courses for Hazardous Materials Awareness and Incident Command System courses.

We took delivery of a new Hose Truck in December and it was put in service on January 10. It replaces a very rusted old State truck that we made into a hose truck. Unlike the old truck, the new one has a power reel for our four inch hose and our air cascade system for refilling air bottles on it. With the addition of the cascade system on the truck, it allows us to make better use of our air paks at all fires, which are necessary these days with all the toxic fumes from burning plastics and synthetic materials.

The Tamworth Firemen's Club bought a 7500 watt diesel generator (\$5200) to go on the Hose Truck and \$2000 worth of turn-out gear for the Department this year. This is a savings to the taxpayers.

I would like to remind everyone you should have a minimum of one smoke detector on each level of your home. It is now the law that smoke detectors have to be hard wired if your home is new or substantially renovated. I personally recommend combination battery and hard wired, especially if you live in an area where you lose power a lot.

Report of Town Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

During Calendar Year 1990, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were fires kindled without a fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden, permit fires that escaped control and rekindled fires. All of these fires are preventable, but ONLY with your help.

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27 II) requires that, "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material in the open, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done."

Violations of RSA 224:27 II and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail and you are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1990, including a 262 acre fire in Moultonboro and several fires in Hooksett.

In 1990, the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands trained 844 local Wardens and Deputy Wardens in the Incident Command System (ICS), an incident management system for all types of emergencies. In 1991, Wardens will be trained in the use of Class A foam in wildfire suppression.

Tamworth Planning Board Annual Report 1990

The year 1990 has been an active year for the Board. There were twelve regularly scheduled meetings and 15 work meetings, as well as sub-committee sessions. We have reviewed 18 subdivision requests, 4 boundary line adjustments and 1 condominium request and 4 continuing projects currently under review. The average meeting length was just over three hours for 347 hrs for the years with an average of $5\frac{1}{2}$ Board Members per meeting.

Much work has been done to correlate new subdivision changes into the old subdivision regulations, which is finally completed with help from Lakes Region Planning Commission. The Subdivision Regulations were completely retyped and reprinted as part of our membership fee.

The Board is in the process assembling all town land use regulations into a single booklet. The booklet will be for sale at a nominal fee to cover printing costs.

The May 1989 proposed Zoning Ordinance was reviewed and several sections were revised with the intent to present the revised ordinance at the 1991 Town Meeting. (There have been 2 public hearings on the Ordinance with attendance figures of 36 and 15 respectively. There will be one more public hearing scheduled for 2/4/91.)

There were meetings held to incorporate the Federal Emergency Management Agencies (FEMA) Flood Plain Management regulations into the Zoning Ordinance as our Flood Plain Ordinance. The Town has been advised that communities that fail to enact the necessary flood plain management regulations will be suspended from participation in the National Flood Insurance Program and subject to the prohibitions contained in Section 202(a) of the 1973 Act as amended.

The resignation of Amanda Simpson was accepted with regrets. The Board thanked her for all her assistance. The Board appointed alternate Walter Upson to fill her position for 1 year. In March 1991 the seat will be up for renewal for 1 more year, to complete the three year term.

Tamworth Conservation Commission Report For 1990

WETLANDS - Prime responsibility of the Tamworth Conservation Commission (TCC) is wetlands. Three members of the commission who have professional background have revised the town wetlands ordinance to bring it up to date with the latest knowledge in delineation of wetlands and in assessing extent of potential damage. In the revised version all uses are not restricted to the same distance as at present - some are permitted much nearer to wetlands and others are restricted to greater distance. And added to the present ordinance is the provision to authorize the Planning Board to review applications for septic systems. This is now done by the Selectmen, after a fact finding, on-site inspection and report by TCC on any septics proposed which could affect wetlands. Under the new provision TCC would make this report to the Planning Board.

This revised ordinance will be presented by written ballot and, since a written ballot allows no opportunity for discussion at Town Meeting, a public hearing was called in January, and copies of the ordinance are available to the public at the Town Offices, as provided by law.

In 1990 TCC members did on-site inspections of 7 proposed septic systems which were near wetlands and reported to the Selectmen as to possible damage to wetlands, accuracy of plans, or suggestions for change in plans.

TCC has inspected 8 proposed dredge and fill projects and has reported to the state Wetlands Board, which issues permits. In most cases TCC recommended issuing a permit, or issuing one with specified restrictions - and in all cases this year the Wetlands Board has followed these recommendations. In two cases TCC has reported violations to the Wetlands Board.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE - 38 people from Tamworth brought hazardous waste to a special unit in Moultonboro for disposal. This is a continuing project of Lakes Region Planning, a project on which TCC has worked and will continue to work. TCC purchased hazarous waste wheels - a turn of the wheel shows types of household waste which are hazardous. Though most were sold a few are still available (call Peg King, 323-7907). TCC publicized the collection event, distributed descriptive folders, and posted a sign at the dump listing date and collection side. This work will continue in 1991.

SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT - TCC, which was concerned on this subject - publicized the need for people to study recycling and received good response from its notice. In September a committee was formed with Bar-

bara Nordeen, chm. John Mersfelder from TCC, Louis Flaccus, Andrea Johnson, Bill Kurth, Herb Cooper, Kate Mitchell, Anne Mock, Dee Peterson, Martha Sylvia and Louis Wiesner. The committee, which holds monthly meetings, met 4 times in 1990, with its first project to find what is done in neighboring towns. It will pursue its study and report recommendations to the Town

Three TCC members attended a meeting held by Little Pond Disposal to describe and discuss a proposed sorting and recycling plant in Tamworth. However, this plan has proved to be financially unfeasible. Two TCC members attended a meeting in July on solid waste, sponsored by Lakes Region Planning.

EARTH DAY 1990 - Celebration of Earth Day was initiated and sponsored by TCC through an active committee chaired by TCC member John Mersfelder. Committee work involved 70 people in this event, which was attended by several hundred. Focussed on environmental concerns, the day included panel discussions, display booths on environmental themes, a pot luck supper, and evening entertainment related to the environment. This was held at Brett School, with students participating in many phases of it. Volunteers covered the town to pick up huge volumes of roadside trash, which was then sorted for recycling and taken to the dump.

LAND - George Davies has offered the Town a gift of 22 acres of land which borders Mill Brook. This fits well into TCC's ongoing plan to protect the shores of the brook. The deed is currently being drawn up, with no restrictions, and a right of way to give public access. Richard Alt has given the Town an easement on 21 acres of land on the west side of Bunker Hill Road.

TRAILS - Jackman Pond North. Extensive work has been done by TCC member Chris Conrod to relocate and improve this trail. Trail Head, formerly on Pine Grounds Road, is now on Route 113 just west of the bridge over the pond outlet. It skirts the edge of the marsh, with attractive views, then turns toward the edge of the gravel pit, follows along that edge until it enters the woods and follows its former route. At present it's unmarked where it follows the edge of the pit; eventually this will be corrected with a well marked trail crossing the tip of the marsh on board walks. Boxes have been installed, one near the beginning of this north shore trail, and the other near the Bunker Hill Road trail head for Jackman South trail, with directional maps and a register.

GRAVEL PIT - Commission members Peter Cooperdock and Chris Conrod have attended meetings of the Planning Board in regard to the new 1989 State Excavation Law (155-E amended). Chris has made an inventory map for the Planning Board of 25 existing pits.

MEETINGS - Other meetings attended by one or more TCC members: Annual Meeting N.H. Association of Conservation Commissions, Carroll County Conservation District workshop on Gravel Pit ordinance amendment, Sandwich re Greenway Belt on Bearcamp River, Lakes Region Planning Committee meeting on Household Hazardous Waste, and Ossipee Conservation Commission meeting with Regional Commissions.

GREAT HILL TOWER - At the request of the Selectmen TCC manages the Tower. The floor of the lookout was repaired temporarily last fall, with a permanent floor to be laid when there is an appropriation for it.

Tamworth Land Protection Committee

In October, the Tamworth Land Protection Committee submitted an application to the Trust for New Hampshire Lands/Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP) for funds to purchase development rights on 323 acres of the Estella Perkins farm in South Tamworth and 65 acres of the Charles E. Aspinall land on Cleveland Hill Road.

The Perkins land has outstanding conservation value for the town, including 8750 feet of frontage on the Bearcamp River, navigable by canoe and a prime riverine habitat for trout, old agricultural and pasture fields which are stocked with pheasant and grouse by the N.H. Fish and Game Dept. and panoramic views across fields to the Sandwich and Ossipee ranges. In addition, it provides a corridor complex for wildlife between the Bearcamp River and Jackman Pond and acts as a buffer for the aesthetic and ecological values of Jackman Pond. The Perkins land also abuts 223 acres of the A.B. Thompson Land bordering the Bearcamp which was recently conveyed to the state of N.H. under the LCIP Program. The two properties together would protect over 2.5 miles of the river, in addition to providing excellent wildlife habitat and corridors for animal and human traffic.

The Aspinall land borders 1150 feet of the Mill Brook and abuts land both to the east and west along the brook which already are under conservation easement protection. The 25 acres of open meadows and 10 acres of wetlands, together with the forest land, provide a rich habitat for many species of large and small animals and birds. Several beaver dams permit canoe use. The Mill Brook is an excellent trout fishery. Old stonewalls, open meadows and the Ossipee range can be viewed from the road.

This project has been made possible by the generous contribution of a 742 acre conservation easement to the Town of Tamworth by Joan Cave. The value of this land, which surrounds Great Hill Pond, is being used as a match toward the funds requested from the LCIP for the purchase of easements on the Perkins and Aspinall properties. The donated easement protects a designated "great pond" and all the wetland, wildlife and recreational values that it includes. With a common boundary of 7444 feet with Hemenway State Forest, a crown of protected land now sits atop Tamworth, with Great Hill Pond, the crown jewel.

On January 31, the LCIP announced that of 47 applications submitted, Tamworth was one of 28 Towns and Cities whose application was given preliminary approval, subject to the acceptance by E. Perkins and C.E. Aspinall of the amounts offered and completion of surveys, appraisals, and drafts of deeds to be conveyed.

Should all final negotiations succeed, the Tamworth Conservation Commission will hold and monitor the easements on these properties.

Although, the LCIP program will come to an end early next year, there may be landowners who feel that their properties should be protected from future development. The TLPC as a subsidiary of the Tamworth Conservation Commission is anxious to work with those people.

AGENCY INFORMATION

The annual state inspection of Tamworth Community Nurse Association took place on June 25, 1990 by Mary Frost, R.N., M.Ed./D.D. As per state mandate, our office records for patient care and services, Tamworth Community Nurse Association protocol and procedures, medical equipment and supplies and nursing practice were examined and reviewed to renew our license

Dr. Melvin Meyer has continued with our agency as medical advisor. His presence at our clinics and his valuable input throughout the year has been greatly appreciated.

Many residents of Tamworth have benefited throughout 1990 by services of Heritage Home Health for Physical, Speech and Occupational therapies. This agency has also been available for "back-up" nursing coverage for TCNA, for home health aides and for "private duty" nursing coverage as needed.

Also offering beneficial services to Tamworth residents during this past year was Carroll County Home and Health Care, whose homemaker aides have allowed many of our elderly to remain in their own homes longer than otherwise possible.

COMMUNICATION, MEETINGS, AND CONFERENCES

The Tamworth Community Nurse Association Board of Directors meet on a monthly basis in order that members be kept abreast of patient caseloads, requests for services and day to day office operations. Approval, advice, support and assistance has been requested of the board as projects and services are planned. Their continued concern and involvement has been an integral part of the success of TCNA in serving Tamworth residents.

On a daily basis, this office consults with hospitals, physicians, nurses, social workers, home care agencies, pharmacists and other service-related professionals in our combined efforts to ensure adequate and necessary services in the patient's home environment.

Monthly network meetings with Carroll County Professionals from health and human service fields has assisted greatly with exchange of ideas, effective communication and insight into existing issues. Meetings during 1990 addressed Carroll County Outreach Services, Division of Human Services programs, Domestic Violence, Investments, RSVP, Hospice, "Caregivers", N.H. Cooperative Extension Services, New Hampshire Association of the Blind, Community Action Program, Ossipee Concerned Citizens and Kennett High School Life Skills Department Services.

Area Visiting Nurse Associations have also met periodically to update one another on respective programs and services. Exchange of ideas occurred and information regarding problems and achievements was discussed.

The American Cancer Society of Northern and Southern Carroll Counties has also held meetings in its attempts to coordinate its programs and services within Carroll County and Tamworth.

TCNA has met during the year with area clergy to address problems and needs of families and persons of mutual concern.

In June, I attended a seminar regarding New Hampshire State Board of Nursing Requirements for relicensure. This conference was held at St. Anselms College.

"Home Health Care in the $90\ensuremath{\text{'s'}}$ " was the theme of a conference in September held in Portsmouth.

I participated in a statewide meeting held in Meredith in October to discuss formulating a "New Hampshire Pain Initiative" for pain control and treatment.

COMMUNITY PROJECTS

Tamworth Community Nurse Association offers "office hours" five mornings a week in addition to home visits for those unable to get out. Individuals may come to our office (with or without appointments) for monitoring of vital signs, suture removal, dressing changes, assessments and consultations, or other services as arranged with our office and the patient's physician.

We provide a monthly Blood Pressure Screening. This clinic occurs in our office from 12-1 PM on the last Wednesday of every month and is open to the general public without charge.

Cholesterol screenings were offered twice during the year as a service of Life Guard Associates. Reasonable charges for these screenings enabled many to check or follow up cholesterol levels while following treatment plans to lower cholesterol.

TCNA's second annual Flu Shot Clinic was held in November. Over 150 people took advantage of this vaccine being available in Tamworth to the general public.

Once again in 1990 TCNA ''teamed up'' with the Lioness to offer a spring health screening at Runnell's Hall. Area professionals volunteered their services for screenings in area of vision, glaucoma, hearing, blood pressure, blood sugar, dental, and nutrition as well as cholesterol.

This agency has assisted throughout the year with distribution of USDA Surplus Foods to qualifying residents who are housebound. We have also delivered holiday food baskets to families at Easter and Thanksgiving which were given by the Community Food Pantry which is located at St. Andrew's Church.

June Donovan has continued to successfully coordinate the Tamworth Meals on Wheels program. Meals have been delivered five days a week, fifty-two weeks a year to an average of eighteen households; at one time during the year MOW delivered to twenty-four persons a day.

The Boy Scouts of Tamworth again this fall provided valuable assistance in their annual collection of canned goods. Foods collected were divided between The Community Food Pantry and the TCNA office. Over 1000 cans went out to many appreciative households in Tamworth from the office over the holidays.

TCNA played an active roll during 1990 in obtaining petitions to regain the Tamworth site for the Congregate Meal Program. We are grateful to

Ossipee Concerned Citizens for their revitalization of this important program for Tamworth residents. TCNA also offers a monthly Blood Pressure screening at the Congregate Meal Program.

The Dental Program is another TCNA service project which allows children from the Kenneth A. Brett School to receive dental care without charge. Many of these children would be without dental care if this program did not exist. This fall began with 42 children enrolled. Dr. Robert LeCroy has given much time and effort; his contribution is greatly appreciated!

TCNA continues to offer its residents use of medical equipment and supplies (without charge) from the "loaner closet". We gratefully received several commodes and walkers this year and always are able to put to good use any donations for this purpose.

This fall I participated in the Carroll County Extension Service "Reach" program held at St. Andrew's Church by offering programs for both the caretakers for the weekly sessions and to the young mothers participating in the program.

In October Rev. Clare Fischer Davies and TCNA worked together to provide a four week parenting forum. Guest speakers offered insights into parenting issues as related to physiological, emotional, psychological, educational, and spiritual growth and development.

The TCNA Christmas effort was larger than ever this year as a result of the economy of the area. Many heartfelt thanks to all who contributed in any way this year! One hundred and two households received the "spirit of Christmas" from this program in 1990.

Home health care is one of the most important, exciting and growing issues of the 1990's. Early discharge after hospitalization for surgeries and illnesses necessitates more skilled care nursing visits to patients in their homes. Advances in medical technology offer opportunities for longer lifespans which also creates the need for more home health service. TCNA hopes to continue, through the 1990's, with provision of these needed services. We hope to continue to promote health awareness, address the pertinent issues and to work towards meeting the home health needs of Tamworth residents. TCNA will need continued and increasing support of Tamworth residents to pursue these efforts.

Animal Control 1990

This was a busy year for animal problems in Tamworth. I traveled a total of 1,133 miles, responded to 110 complaints and impounded 31 dogs. Two dogs were killed on the highways, 2 dogs had to be euthanized and 3 problems required court appearances. There were also 8 dog bite cases. Fortunately 7 of these dogs were up-to-date on their rabies vaccines and could therefore legally be restrained by their owners. But one dog was never located and 2 dogs were restrained at the Tamworth Dog Holding Facility.

Most of the complaints I received continue to be dogs running at large and causing problems on other people's property or barking for extended periods of time so as to disturb the peace. Although most of the complaints I receive do pertain to dogs, I also responded to 6 complaints involving loose horses, one lost pig, and one noisy rooster.

A Rabies Clinic was held on March 31, at the Tamworth Town House. 37 rabies vaccines were given by Kris Heffner DVM and 22 dog licenses were issued by Terry Woodward. Melinda Heimlich helped me with the paperwork. A Rabies Clinic will be held in the spring of 1991. The vaccine is considerably cheaper at the clinic than it is in your veterinarian's office and State law requires all dogs to have an up-to-date rabies vaccine. Notice of date, time, and place will be in your local newspaper and broadcast of WBNC two weeks prior to the actual date. Your dog must be licensed in the town of Tamworth every year at the age of 3 months, and cannot be licensed without an up-to-date rabies vaccine.

From the bulletin of the N.H. Doberman Rescue League. "Will neutering turn your male pet into a sissy or change his personality? NO WAY. Neutering will help your cat or dog to be better behaved. He won't run after females in heat. He will be less likely to fight with other males. He will be rid of urine marking and less likely to suffer from certain diseases, and he won't get fat and lazy if given a balanced diet and enough exercise. Male dogs should be neutered between 7 and 9 months of age." As your Animal Control Officer I strongly recommend neutering or spaying your pet to help with the immense problem of vast numbers of unwanted, abandoned and mistreated puppies, dogs, kittens and cats.

I greatly enjoy my job as your Animal Control Officer and I try to do my best for you and your animals. It would be impossible to do a good job without the invaluable help of the Selectmen, the Town Clerk, the Town Secretary, Troop E, the Sheriff's Office and the Town and State highway crews. My thanks to them all.

Cook Memorial Library Tamworth, New Hampshire 03886

1990 was a year of innovation and change for Cook Memorial Library. We received our computer (a gift from the State Library) and it has been used considerably for Inter-Library Loan. It gives us quick access to the collections of libraries statewide and, thereby, speeds up the process of borrowing books for our patrons. We also initiated the offering of videos (no charge) to our patrons over 18 years of age. Cook Memorial Library joined other local libraries in the Bearcamp Libraries Video Association wherein we purchase videos as a group and exchange them among our member libraries. We also borrow 10 videos from the State Library each month and we own a few videos from the State Library each month and we own a few videos and plan to purchase some more in the future.

In compliance with state law on confidentiality, we began, in the autumn, a re-registration of patrons and issued a numbered library card to all patrons seven years of age and older. When a child reaches seven years, he too may receive a card.

In 1990 both attendance (6,958) and circulation (9,759) gave us our busiest year ever. Of course all of the above means a great increase in work and it could not be accomplished without the aid of this wonderful group of volunteers — Arlene Farnum, Martha Sylvia, Bertha Eastwick, Sally Zink, Theresa Bender and Priscilla Murray.

My thanks go to the Garden Club — and in particular to Cathy Mersfelder and Charlotte Cooper — for the loving care of the window boxes and plants, to Angie Stearns for her continuing bouquets of beautiful flowers, to Bob Trask, Dick Stearns and Woody Fromm for their aid on many occasions, to Sally Zink, my assistant, and to Pat Trask, my substitute, for their loyal assistance.

In 1990 we purchased or were given 661 books, received 229 books on Inter-Library Loan at the request of individual patrons, borrows 103 Large Print books for our visually handicapped, and requested films/videos from the State for 176 film and 63 video showings for Day Care and Kidsworth and 78 videos for our patrons' use.

We thank those who exhibited their art at the library for our patrons' enjoyment. Library programs included Peg King's lecture/slides on an African safari, Earth Day table presided over by Sally Zink and Priscilla Murray, participation with the Arts Council of Tamworth in the Rural Arts Program

with Purly Gates and the Poets in Residence Program with Mimi White, Wine & Cheese party for our volunteers & Friends, Book & Bake Sale (with the Friends), Summer Story Hour of 6 weeks and Winter Story Hour of 1 day.

We are always grateful to the Tamworth Foundation for their generous donation for books. We thank those who gave in memory of Robert Finlay, Ruth Flaccus, Lyle Carter, Maestro Fausto & Mrs. Irene Cleva as well as the Gregg Memorial Trust, Bear Paw Trust, Mason Trust and the Ulitz Memorial — all of which enable us to purchase books or materials and, at the same time, honor the memory of a neighbor and friend. We are deeply touched and very grateful for the legacies received from the estates of Lyle Carter and of Robert Finley and each is now a memorial trust.

A movie projector (maintenance fee of \$1.00), speakers, screens, cassette players, 1966 Tamworth Bicentennial slides, 1976 U.S. Bicentennial slides and oral history tapes are available to our patrons. For the genealogist, the library has a genealogy card file of early Tamworth vital statistics, a notebook of town vital statistics (compiled and donated to the library by Robert Duchano) and an alphabetically arranged record of early Tamworth families compiled by Helen Hidden plus genealogy records of some Tamworth families given to the library by Marian Nickerson. On permanent loan from the Tamworth Historical Society and available for perusal in the library are the remaining volumes of the Tamworth Social Library founded by Parson Samuel Hidden in 1796.

The Friends of the Library (President-Barbara Fromm) meets at 1:30 on the 4th Tuesday of the month (except in winter) and new members are always welcome. The Friends sponsored the Summer Story Hour (managed so well by Kidsworth), decorated the library at Christmas, purchased the computer desk, the modem and surge protector for the computer, the video display case, a chair for the computer and another chair for the office, a new vacuum cleaner, a small display table and three catalog card cabinets.

A very much needed oil burner has been installed. The Trustees gave the conference room a very necessary coat of paint.

Meetings of local community groups may be held at the library by reserving with the Librarian. In 1990, nineteen different organizations held 65 meetings at the library.

We appreciate gifts of books, paperbacks, magazines, newspapers, and monetary donations. Any material we cannot use is placed in our annual summer book sale.

The Board of Library Trustees meets on the 2nd Monday of each month at 4:00 at the library & the public is welcome. Our town is very fortunate in having 2 libraries and all residents have the privilege of using both:

Tamworth Red Cross Water Safety Program

In 1990 160 individuals from the PreSchool age to adults were enrolled in a variety of Red Cross swimming classes from the beginner to the Emergency Water Safety level. We continue to charge a higher registration fee for non-residents to help finance our program. Tamworth residents pay \$4.00 for an individual and \$10.00 for a family; non-residents pay \$15.00 for an individual and \$25.00 for a family. \$3.00 of each registration fee goes to the Mt. Washington Valley Red Cross to cover administrative costs.

This year our head instructor Judith Conway, took a well deserved leave of absence after 25 years with our program. We hope she will rejoin us for our 1991 program. In her absence Brenda Robinson did a great job of coordinating all the waterfront responsibilities. Our 3 returning instructors have a combined commitment of over 20 years with the program.

This year we are requesting \$2,800 from the town of Tamworth. This is \$200 less than last year's request. We reduced our request this year as we are aware of the financial hardships many people are facing in our current economy.

The town of Tamworth and the Tamworth Foundation have been very generous over the years in supporting the Swim Program and we sincerely thank them. Thanks also to our parent volunteers for helping with monitoring students waiting for their afternoon classes, to Jed Pike of the Tamworth Rescue Squad for his presentation on CPR, and to the management of White Lake State Park for the use of their facilities.

Voter Re-Registration

The Supervisors of the Checklist are required by law (RSA 654:39) to reregister all voters every ten years in order to keep the checklist up-to-date. Verification must take place in 1991 and that process has already begun.

You are considered to be re-registered and need do nothing to stay on the checklist if you voted in the November, 1988, general election (state & federal) OR in the November, 1990, general election (state) OR in the March, 1991, town election.

If you did NOT vote in ANY ONE of those elections you will need to re-register.

The Supervisors will be holding two sessions in July for the purpose of re-registration. Notices will appear in the Carroll County Independent when the dates and times are set.

If you did not vote in any of the elections mentioned above you will be sent a post card. On the card, you will need to confirm your street and mailing addresses and sign the return half of the post card. If you mail it, your signature will need to be witnessed by a Notary Public or Justice of the Peace. If you return it in person, you may be asked for positive identification. Detailed instructions will be on the card.

A small amount (\$600.00) has been added to the budget under Election Expenses to cover the costs of re-registration.
