

#### TOWN WARRANT

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy in the County of Cheshire, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the 13th of March next, at nine-thirty in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a town clerk, one selectman for three years, and all other necessary town officers.
- Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
- Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for snow removal and sanding.
- Article 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for repairing town highways and bridges.
- Article 5. To see if the town will accept State Aid for Construction of Class 5 roads.
- Article 6. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$300 for the installation of a dam and water hole to be situated on the north side of the highway, in the brook near the Deem homestead on West Hill. Said construction work to be completed in 1945.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for street lighting.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on all taxes, excepting poll taxes, paid before dates to be designated at this meeting, and all poll taxes shall be collected on or before July 1, 1945.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the fire department.

- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the police department.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of the water system.
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing a new fire pumper, and the recommendations of the Fire Department adopted.
- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for trimming and spraying the shade trees in town.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of employing a district nurse and other health activities.
- Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for repairs and heating town garage.
- Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for new equipment for the highway department.
- Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$135.00 for observance of Memorial Day.
- Article 19. To see if the town will vote to allow the American Legion to use the town hall one Friday night each month without pay.
- Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and improvement of cemeteries.
- Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 in addition to the amount required by law for the public library.
- Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$117.00 for the purpose of advertising the resources and natural advantages of the town, said sum to be expended under the direction of the selectmen, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 23. Excerpt from the will of Warren W. Kimball: "To the Town of Troy, N. H., as a building fund for a Public Library to be erected on land deeded to the Town of Troy, N.H., by Walter N. Gay for a library building; I give, bequeath and devise the sum of Ten Thousand dollars (\$10,000.00). This fund is to be expended by the Trustees of the Public Library at such time as the Town shall so vote."

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money for the purpose of purchasing baseball uniforms and equipment, said uniforms and equipment to be used by the Town baseball team.

Article 25. To see if the voters of the town will by vote express their sentiments relative to a through highway in the town of Troy, results of which will be conveyed to the State and Federal Highway Departments.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to support United States membership in a general system of international cooperation, such as that proposed at the Dumbarton Oaks Conference, having police power to maintain the peace of the world. Each town clerk is directed to forward to the secretary of the state the result of the vote, in his town, if any, on this question. The secretary of state is hereby authorized and directed to canvass the vote on this article as returned to him and transmit his findings to the clerk of the United States Senate.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to borrow money to pay town charges.

Article 28. To hear the reports of agents, officers or committees heretofore chosen, and take any action relating thereto.

Article 29. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Troy:

I submit my 2nd annual report as superintendent of schools: The problems that confront our American school system in general have become much more acute since my last report. The teacher shortage, the scarcity of materials, and the lack of home supervision for pupils due to the total war effort are sample issues. It is gratifying to note that despite these shortages our local community still considers the welfare of its children of primary importance and provides the facilities and personnel

necessary for a good school.

The maintenance of a modern school plant is an investment of increasing significance. The new challenge of "Education for World Understanding" implies many new responsibilities. The peace and happiness of the post-war world will depend on the democratic ideals and leadership of those who govern it. Universal education is the means to this objective and the public schools will continue to be the most vital factor. If common cooperative purposes of education can be determined and accepted by all nations, competitive, political and economic systems will no longer necessitate wars. This new and broader concept of education implies that our schools must be strengthened if we are to win and maintain peace.

The present is not an appropriate time for recommendations concerning additional school facilities due to the limited personnel and shortage of material. The school plant provides very well for the health, safety, and welfare of the pupils. The installation of numerous improvements prior to the war are now paying excellent dividends. Most of this equipment is no longer available even though the demand for it in other schools has greatly increased. Careful maintenance is now the most

significant factor in upholding these standards.

### ORGANIZATION FOR SCHOOL YEAR 1943-1944

# REPORT OF HEADMASTER OF TROY HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

It is my privilege to present my first annual report as headmaster of Troy High School.

### CERTIFICATION

Troy High School has again been certified by the State Board of Education as a standard four year high school for the present school year.

### CURRICULUM

To meet the changing needs of students it is necessary to make revisions in the curriculum. This year the main changes have been made in the curriculum of the seventh and eighth grades. General Science is now taught in both seventh and eighth grades where formerly it was taught in the eighth. The content of the seventh and eighth grade mathematics courses have also been changed to be more in line with the "New Revised Mathematical Standards." Drawing and penmanship have been made an integral part of the junior high program.

Since rigid entrance requirements have been abolished in practically all colleges of the U.S., interest in Latin has dwindled to the point where it is not being taught in many schools in the state. Though it was offered at our school this year, lack

of interest caused it to be discontinued.

### WAR EFFORT

The students of the Troy School are doing their share in the War Effort. This fall students of grades 3-8 picked approximately 200 bags of milkweed pods for the government. This achievement was the best in the supervisory union.

Bond and stamp sales totaled over \$1500 between September 1 and December 16, and we have been proudly flying the

Minute Man flag. This year each school was asked to buy a military vehicle on or before Pearl Harbor Day. The Student Council chose the jeep. This jeep was paid for before December 1. In recognition, a placque will be attached to the jeep stating that it was purchased by students of the Troy School. A duplicate placque will be given to the school.

In addition to this more direct form of participation, many students are helping by taking over duties formerly held by adults such as working at the Troy Blanket Mill, stores.

town, etc.

### HEALTH

A very comprehensive health program is carried on in the school. Each child is given a physical examination, eye test, and an Audiometer test. These are followed by a periodic checkup during the school year.

### EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

The annual three act play, "Brother Goose", under the able direction of Miss Joslin, was successfully produced by the Senior class.

The school magazine, "The Trojan" is being published on

an annual basis this year.

An exceptionally fine and well attended Freshman Reception, under the sponsorship of the Sophomore class, was held this fall. In addition to the more formal events a series of informal socials are held at the school during the year.

Boys' and girls' basketball teams have been organized and full schedules are being played by both teams. Mr. George Mason is generously giving his services as coach of the boys'

team.

Other active organizations of the school are the Student Council and the newly organized French club.

### OTHER FORMS OF INSTRUCTION

To help overcome a hearing disability one student is taking

a special course in lip reading in Keene.

We are fortunate in having a sound projector which helps us to emphasize visual education. With the availability of a great number of government films, it is now possible to increase the scope and amount of visual education with very little cost to the community.

### SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

Owing to various factors, many of which are brought on by the war, about seventy students eat their lunches at school. To be sure that each child eats a healthful hot lunch, a federally aided program was established. The menus of these lunches are so planned that each meal is nutritionally balanced. In addition, thirty students take advantage of the morning milk program. Both programs are carried on at no cost to the school district.

### Music

The music of the school is under the supervision of Mr. Arthur Coogan. Mr. Fredyum Hendrickson gives lessons in violin and guitar, and Mrs. Nora E. Beauregard teaches piano. All instrumental lessons are paid for by the individual student.

### **FACULTY**

It is interesting to note that every member of this year's faculty received his training at Keene Teachers College. Though there have been four faculty changes in the high school, the work being done by the students and the faculty is of a high caliber.

In conclusion, on behalf of the staff and myself, I wish to thank the townspeople, school officials, and the students for their whole hearted cooperation and support of the school.

### REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Music is one of the most valuable subjects in the school curriculum and the influence of music in the lives of both children and adults is more potent than that of almost any other educational activity. Because of its poser to stimulate both body and mind, its effect to socialize, its possibilities in preparing one for a worthy use of leisure time, and because of its influence in causing increase in human happiness, music has become more and more commonly regarded as an indispensable subject in educational activities.

Supervision of music in the grades has been carried on through weekly visits to the several classes. A definite course of study is being followed. Some new methods of teaching music have been suggested and much of the non-essential work has been eliminated. More time is available for the study of sight singing, rhythms, reading, tone production, and interpretation. A new set of music books for the grade schools is recommended.

In directing the musical activities of the high school, the first consideration is that the students shall get satisfaction and pleasure from this experience; the second, that they shall know and appreciate beautiful music; the third, that each individual student shall acquire an increasing amount of skill in the use of the voice; the fourth, that the student shall understand the theory and principles of music; and lastly, that the student shall use his musical talent as a medium of self-expression.

The school schedule has been arranged so that the girls meet in one class and the boys in another. The students are taught vocal technique, enunciation, phonics, breathing, and other essentials of vocal training. Definite progress is being made in these classes and excellent response and interest are evident.
